Said contract provides among other things that said County will acquire certain water improvements and will issue its bonds in the amount of \$982,-000.00 to finance the same for the Cities of Tawas City, East Tawas and the Township of Baldwin and that the aforesaid Cities and Township will pay to said County all sums necessary to retire the principal of and interest on said bonds and will pledge as security for such obligations their full faith and credit. PURSUANT TO SUCH PLEDGE, THE CITY WILL BE REQUIRED TO LEVY AD VALOREM TAXES ON ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY WITHIN ITS BOUNDARIES, WITH-OUT LIMITATION AS TO RATE OR AMOUNT, TO THE EXTENT NECESSARY TO

MAKE THE REQUIRED PAYMENTS TO THE COUNTY IF OTHER FUNDS FOR SUCH

The CITY pursuant to authorization of paragraph 2, Section 12, Act No. 185, Public Acts of Michigan, 1957, as amended, hereby irrevocably pledges its full faith and credit for the prompt and timely payment of its obligations pledged for bond payments as expressed in this contract, and shall each year, commencing with the year 1976, levy an ad valorem tax on all the taxable property in the CITY in an amount which, taking into consideration estimated delinquencies in tax collections, will be sufficient to pay such obligations under this contract becoming due before the time of the following year's tax collections.
