

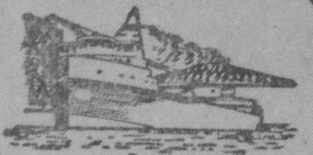

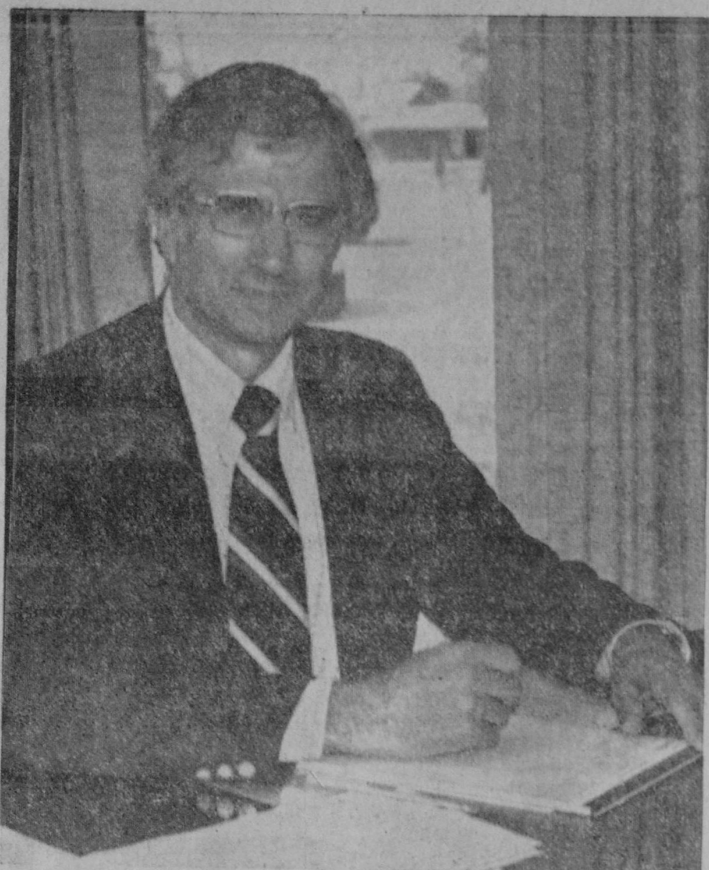

## New Administrator at Tawas Hospital

Donald W. Snyder, 55, became Tawas Hospital's new chief administrator effective Tuesday, May 4. He is the former administrator of Hackley Hospital, Muskegon.

"I feel that Tawas Hospital has excellent facilities and staff," said the new administrator. He singled out the cardiac care center, the laboratory and X-ray department for particular emphasis, stating that few small hospitals were so well equipped.

While he believed the hospital had too few beds for the population it served, he pointed out that the occupancy rate for those beds is higher than for most hospitals and could envision no problem concerning the number of beds.

Snyder said his main concern in his new job would be to coordinate activities of the hospital's board of directors, medical staff and administration, "working together to insure a smooth operation."

He comes here from a 365-bed hospital at Muskegon where he had served 12½ years, with the last 3½ years as chief administrator.

A native of Nebraska, he received his bachelor degree at Gosh-

on College, Indiana, and master degree in hospital administration in 1961 from Northwestern University. Part of his training included administrative residency at Riverside Medical Hospital, Chicago, Illinois.

He spent two years as an assistant to the administrator of Arlington Heights Hospital, then to Northwest Community Hospital at Chicago and from there to Muskegon. At Muskegon, he was a member of Central Methodist Church, the YMCA, a member of Rotary Club and participated in the United Way and Community Foundation.

He is a fellow in the American College of Hospital Administrators, is a member of American and Michigan hospital associations, worked on a committee for comprehensive health planning, served as a member of the board of trustees for Blue Cross-Blue Shield and was a member of the Michigan Fire Safety Board.

He and his wife, Leta, are parents of three daughters.

Snyder succeeds M. Jerry Norwood, who retired earlier this year.

## Seek 11-Mill Renewal Plus Three; New Vote on Addition

Faced with a loss of revenue, coupled with increased operational costs, Tawas Area School District voters will be asked to approve three additional mills of taxes and renew the 11 mills of taxes which expire this year.

Action to place a 14-mill proposal on the annual election ballot June 14 was authorized Monday night by the board of education. In addition to this action, the board authorized an advisory vote at the June 14 election asking voters to approve bonding for a middle school addition.

The second proposal, designed to eliminate the need for half-day sessions which have been in effect for the past three years due to overcrowding, is for \$1,545,000 and nearly one-half-million-dollars less than the proposal which was defeated earlier by voters. The debt retirement tax levy proposed for the addition would be 1.3 mills.

In his remarks to the board of education, Dr. Robert A. Halle stated that the school district was faced with financial circumstances which could only be alleviated by increased operational millage.

Because of inflation and loss of revenue, he said the school district just could not operate on renewal of 11 mills and anything less than 14 mills would lead to reductions in a school program which is already considered minimal.

Since last summer, said Halle, all school districts in the state have received two reductions in state membership aid. Due to the new state business tax, personal property taxes have also been lost to

schools and other local governmental units.

With a state equalized valuation now of \$84,000,000 and \$44,000 in tax base behind each child in the school district, Tawas Area School will not receive any state membership aid next term. A net loss of \$70,000 in revenue will be the result as the \$82,000 picked up through increased valuation will not offset the \$152,500 loss in state membership aid.

Tawas Area lost approximately \$43,000 in state membership aid this term through two cuts by the legislature and another \$10,000 was lost under the federal dependent program. It is expected that tuition paid by servicemen participating in this school's prep program at Wurtsmith Air Force Base will be reduced and approximately \$20,000 may be lost from that source, which has operated with a profit for two years.

Halle estimates that the total loss to the district in previous revenue will be \$140,000, representing 1.75 mills of taxes.

Due to an enrollment decline, plus program modifications and a reduction of six teachers from the staff next term, \$67,000 has been cut from the preliminary budget of \$2,241,590 for 1976-77. After the reduction, the final budget represents a 5.8 increase over the current year.

Halle said that the average operational increase in this school district's budget for the past seven to eight years represented 12½ percent, with some budgets jumping as high as 16 percent, and he

felt the budget for 1976-77 reflected a minimal increase under the circumstances.

"With a loss of revenue totaling nearly \$140,000, there is no way we can get by on a renewal of 11 mills and we have a need for 14 mills of taxes," said Halle. He said the new budget includes no major capital outlay expenditures, although three buses will be required due to the rapid deterioration due to split sessions.

He said, too, that the district will need the 9.30 mills of taxes which were allocated last year by the county. "We do not have money in other areas of the budget to snap up any loss from this source," he said.

"I know people will find it difficult to support three additional mills of taxes for operation," said the superintendent. "It would be nice if we had some options, but there are none available."

Although board members were unanimous in the need for three additional mills of taxes, voting was split on how to place the question before voters at the annual election. Some members believed that two proposals should be placed on separate ballots, one asking for a renewal of 11 mills and a second asking for three additional mills, while the majority felt that the proposal should be on one ballot.

Some members believed that two separate proposals would improve the credibility of the board, showing voters that the three additional mills were necessary to carry on operation of the school; others voiced the opinion that, faced with the decision on two separate ballots, voters would naturally vote only for a renewal of 11 mills and the school district cannot operate on that amount.

The 14-mill package on one ballot was approved by a four to three roll call with Trustees David Kennedy, Dr. James E. Jacques, Earl Davis and Clare Herriman voting "yes" and Trustees Willard Dillon, Mrs. Norman Payea and President Carl Babcock voting "no."

The second proposal calling for a tax levy of 1.3 mills in debt retirement was adopted unanimously by the board of education. This is to be an advisory vote and, if approved, the district would issue general obligation bonds to finance the measure.

The middle school proposal as outlined by the superintendent would eliminate the gymnasium and auditorium which were included in the \$2,050,000 proposal which voters rejected earlier in the year.

The superintendent said the last election brought out the fact that many people had expressed the need for the district to get off half day sessions and return to a normal school day. He said, however, that many persons could not accept construction of a new high school gymnasium and auditorium in that proposal and have been eliminated in the new plan.

He said the new middle school proposal would include 17 classrooms, a multipurpose room similar to that at the East Tawas Elementary Unit, a library, general office and storage area. He said the multipurpose room could be used for a cafeteria, physical education classes and possibly band.

Halle said that the new plan was a minimal proposal, "but students have been waiting for three years to get off half day sessions." He felt that no apologies were necessary for the board to come back so soon with another proposal. "We are only carrying out a commitment to return to a normal school day," he stated.

A final resolution adopted by the board stated that if the 14 mills of operation taxes are approved by voters, any increase in membership aid received from the state would be reflected by lowering the operational tax levy. Changing the state aid formula to benefit high valuation-low enrollment schools like Tawas Area and other Northern Michigan schools is not expected in the legislature.

## Judge Stops Hale Building Construction; Sets Hearing

Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller issued a temporary restraining order requested by Plainfield Township concerning a building violation and set Friday, May 28, 9:30 a. m., for a show cause hearing why the restraining order should not be made a preliminary injunction.

Named as defendants in the cause were Mr. and Mrs. Terry Clement of Hale, who own a parcel

of property fronting on M-65 at Hale and recently started construction of a frame commercial building at that site.

The township's petition to the court charges that Clement failed to comply with obtaining a permit under the building code requirement adopted by township ordinance on April 21, 1975. The building was constructed the week-end of May 1-2.

In his ruling, Judge Miller issued a temporary order restraining Clement from further acts of construction on the building without further order of the court.

Judge Miller said that the order was issued so that the township would not be confronted with a finished building or structure which "does not fulfill the standards and requirements relating to safety and sanitation."

The judge said it appeared that "time is of the essence and the defendants are determined to complete construction of the building or structure before the plaintiff is able to proceed with the normal proceedings and put a stop to the defendant's work."

He ordered that the defendants, "their agents or employees and those persons acting in concert to participate with the said defendants, who receive actual notice of this order, be restrained from further acts of construction until further notice."

## Fairless Resigns TA Coaching Post

Tawas Area High School will have a new varsity basketball coach next season. At Monday night's meeting of the board of education, a letter from Richard Fairless asked that he be relieved of that responsibility next term.

Fairless, a member of Tawas Area School faculty for the past 13 years, has served as head basketball coach for the past three seasons. His team won the district championship in March.

Prior to taking over as head coach, Fairless served two years as junior varsity coach and coached junior varsity football.

He is to continue as a science teacher in the system. A native of Flint, he received his bachelor of science degree from Adrian College and has a master degree.

In other business Monday night,

the board accepted the resignation of Ronald Chaney as maintenance supervisor. He had held the position for the past five months.

A six-week leave of absence was granted to William Blackmore, custodian, starting June 14. He had requested a leave of eight weeks to construct a new home. The board of education said that Blackmore would be permitted to take his annual two-week vacation at the end of his six weeks of leave.

Utilization of school buses to transport children to Oscoda to participate in the American Red Cross swimming program this summer was approved. The board of education established a fee of \$1 for each student to cover the cost of transportation during the two-week program.

Coming events for the middle school band include the spring concert featuring the junior and cadet bands at 8:00 p. m. on Friday, May 21.

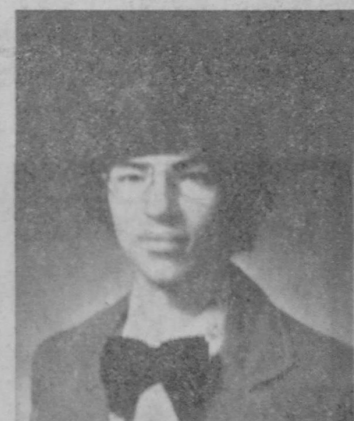

## City's Budget Hearing Next Monday Night

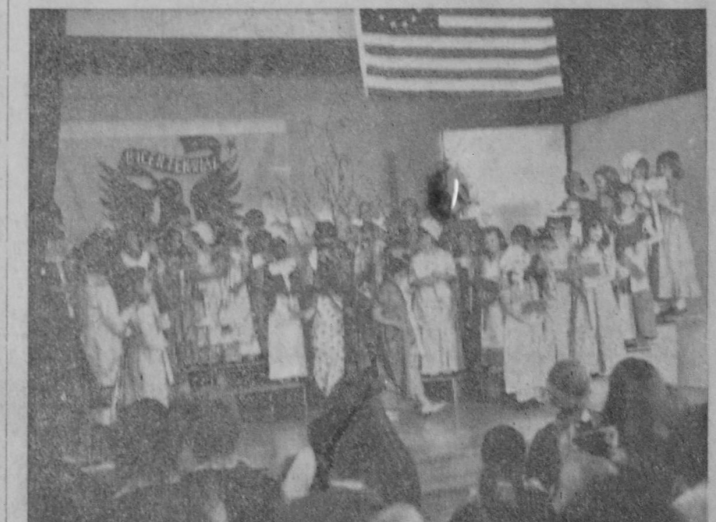
Tawas City Council will hold a public hearing Monday night on a \$198,850 general fund budget proposed for 1976-77. A tentative budget was prepared during a work session earlier this week.

With a valuation of \$10,707,000, it is expected that 15.55 mills would be spread on the tax rolls to meet the budget, an increase of 1.46 mills over the current year.

This would include 9.95 mills for the general fund, one mill for fire department improvement, 2.80 for streets and 1.80 for debt retirement.

The one mill allocated to the fire department is new this year and would raise approximately \$10,000 annually for the purchase of fire apparatus and building improvements.

The budget in its final form will include street construction for next year.

The Upper Room

(Read Matthew 14:22-21)

"Peter answered him, 'Lord, if it is you, bid me come to you on the water.'" (Matthew 14:20, RSV)

The other day, I thought of two experiences of Simon Peter on the Sea of Galilee. In one of them, Peter is depicted as walking on the water toward Jesus, but he begins to sink and is rescued by the Lord.

In the other, Peter discovers that Jesus has appeared on the shore and leaps into the water and swims to Him.

These two passages were probably never intended to be considered side by side. But, side by side, they scratch me where I am theological itching at the present moment.

Every now and then, like Peter, I long for a walking-on-the-water religious experience. I want to be caught up in a spectacular, dramatic manifestation of the presence of God.

On the other hand, I have discovered that if I am willing to leap into the sea of my daily round and swim in even the most routine way, it is possible to find myself in God's presence. If I am willing to tackle the ordinary problems with patience, understanding and love, what happens is as valid an assurance of His presence as if I had actually walked on water.

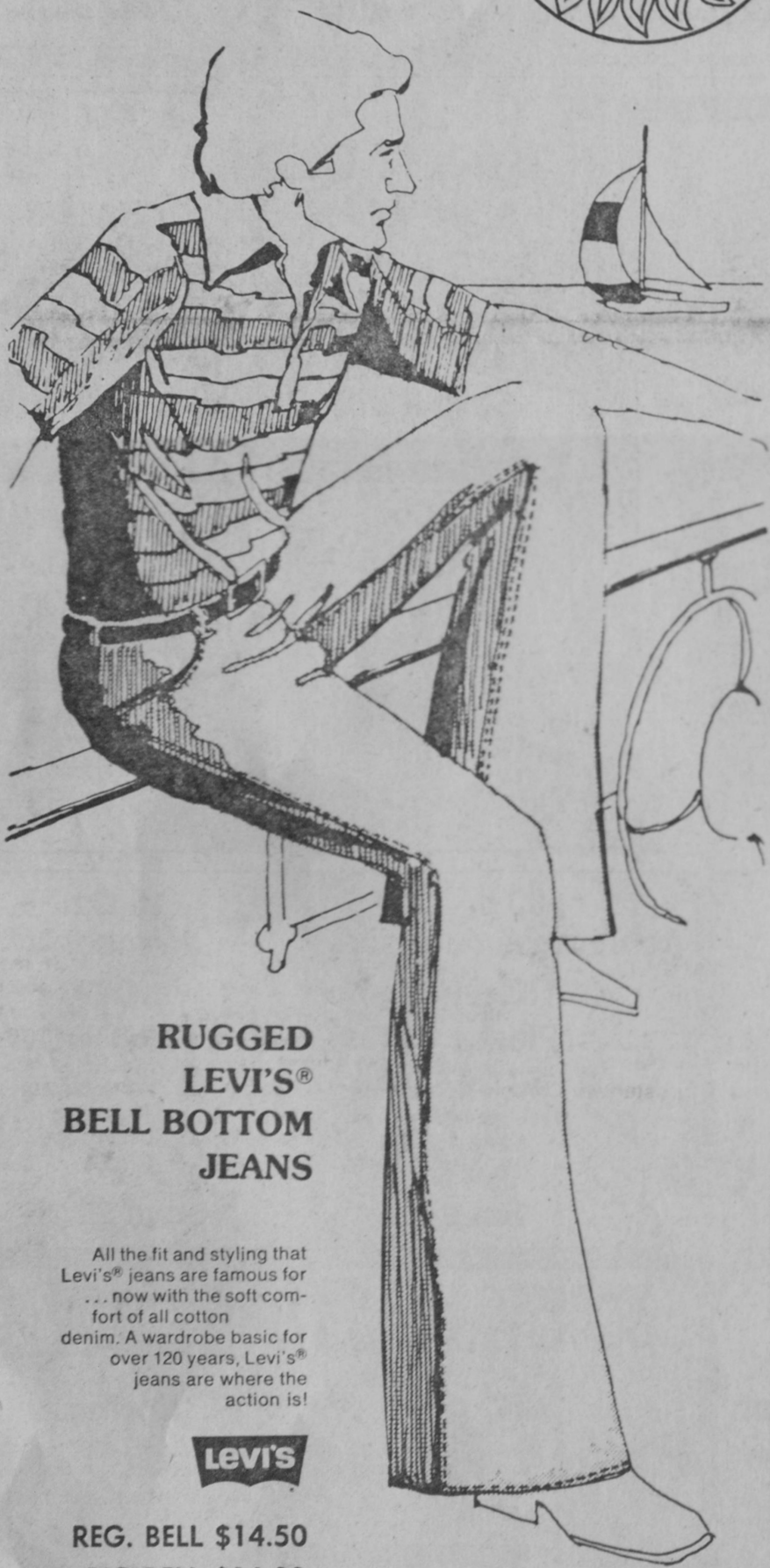

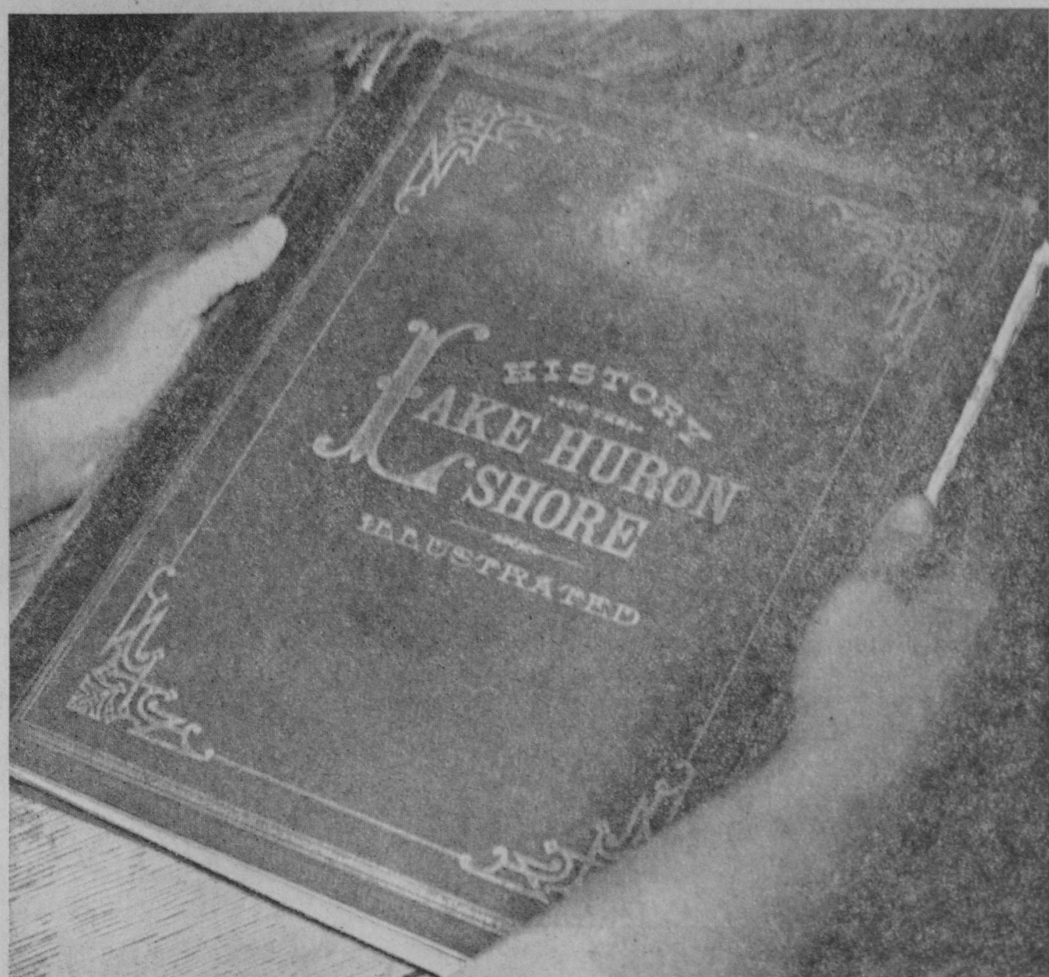

Ten years in the researching and writing, this source is a history of the founding and the naming of more than 5,000 past and present Michigan communities. Also included is an index of more than 10,000 personal names, each cross-referenced to the text.

## Iosco Vigilantes Organized to Combat BANK ROBBERS



Bank robberies became so frequent in 1927 that 80 of Michigan's 83 counties organized vigilante groups to combat the threat. Iosco was one of those counties to organize under a program launched by the Michigan Bankers Association, following a similar plan utilized in five other Midwestern States.

Organized crime was at its peak in metropolitan areas of the state and tough enforcement practices, coupled with an increase in armed private guards stationed in larger Detroit banks and new alarm systems, combined to make it more difficult to rob big city banks. As a result, some of the "smaller time" hoodlums turned their attention to banking institutions in rural areas, where practically the only protection offered was by a county sheriff and a few part-time deputies.

Armed robberies at Whittemore and Twining had been reported at banks and service stations in the early 1920s, but only one bank robbery in the area was reported in 1926 and that bandit eluded authorities for only a short time. The bandit robbed a bank at Omer on December 10, 1926, eluded an Arenac County sheriff's posse trailing him in automobiles and was captured later at an East Tawas restaurant by Sheriff Charles Curry of Tawas City.

A year earlier, September 18, 1925, robbers cracked a safe at the State Savings Bank of Turner and made off with \$5,000 in currency. On October 11, 1927, tear gas bombs forced would-be robbers to abandon their attempt to rifle the vault of the Twining Bank of Sleepers, Merrick and Company.

With this type of crime reaching neighboring Arenac County, officials of the Iosco County Bankers Federation decided to organize a vigilante unit for the protection of banks in Iosco and Alcona Counties.

Each vigilante unit consisted of three volunteers armed with rifles and revolvers, trained and in readiness in case of a holdup. Members were selected with special reference to their accessibility to the bank, were deputized by the county sheriff and were under his orders. Firearms and other equipment were purchased by the banks, but became the property of the sheriff's department.

"The success of our vigilante system is already apparent," stated E. R. McNichol, president of the Oscoda State Savings Bank and president of the Iosco County Bankers Federation in July 1927. "The bankers are thankful for the cooperation we have received from all law abiding citizens."

The Oscoda banker said that bankers and the general public "realize the fact that we are simply cooperating with the law enforcement agencies of our state, county and community. The next important step under our vigilante program is the training of the men, establishment of target ranges and a systematic procedure for local target practice."

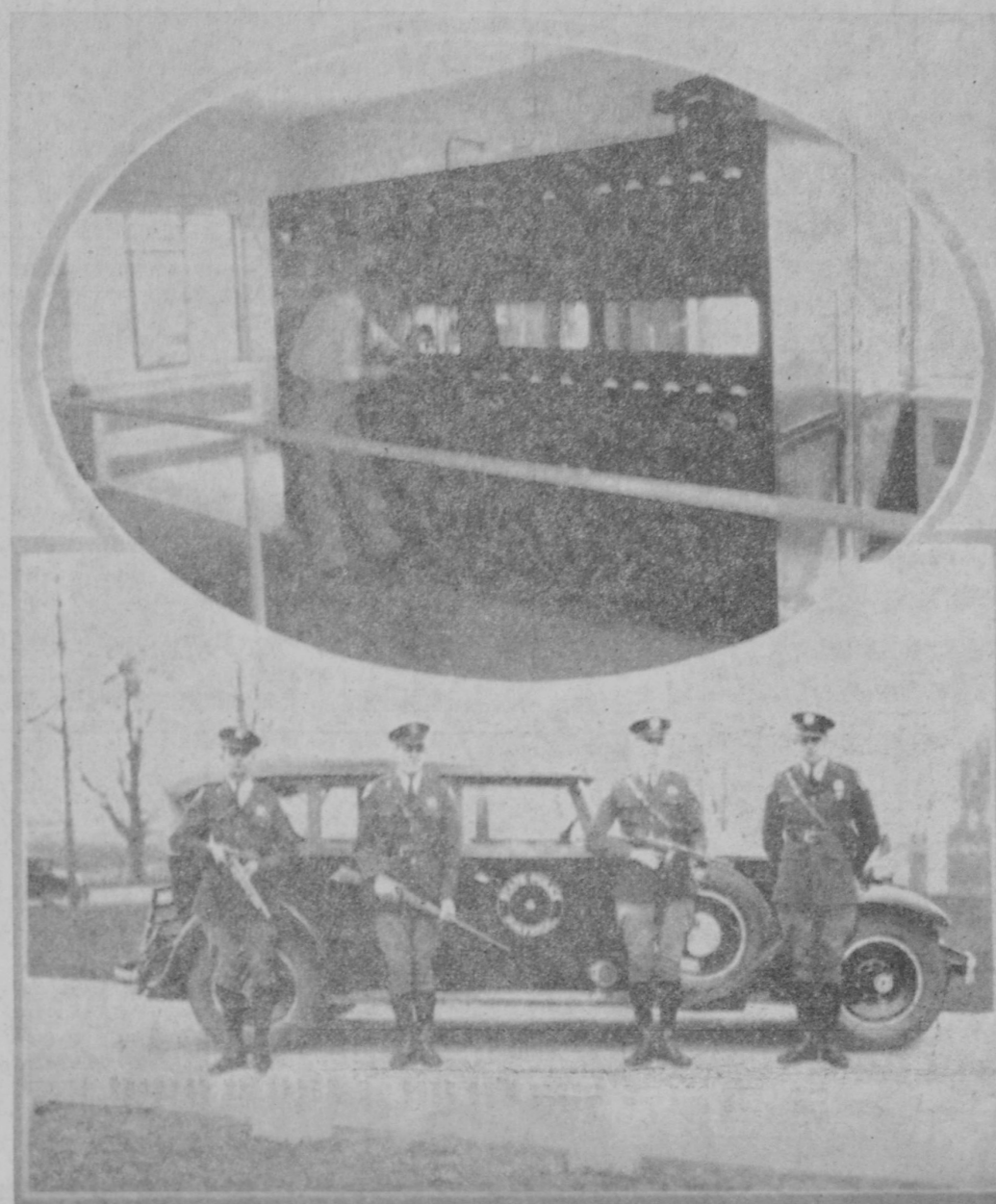
McNichol said the best evidence of the success of the vigilante program was evidenced by the fact that the "professional yegg men and bank robbers have decided to operate in other fields less amply protected and less vigilantly secured against their methods."

The number of bank robberies in Michigan were reduced by 84 percent in 1927 and bank losses were reduced 79 percent.

"The report from our state headquarters indicates that the officers and members of the vigilante committees in each state are taking as much interest in the success of the campaign as they would a successful military operation," said McNichol.

Only two armed holdups were reported in the area in 1928. Ironically, two armed men robbed McNichol's branch bank at Glennie, located in a drug store, then robbed a service station at Oscoda before disappearing.

Despite the early glowing reports concerning the vigilante system, arming local untrained citi-

zens never really proved to be practical in combating professional bank bandits, but a new tool utilized by police agencies throughout the state was soon to slam down hard on would be bank robbers.

On October 12, 1930, two Toledo, Ohio, men entered the Old Merchants Bank and Trust Company at Battle Creek, thrust the manager, teller and three customers of the bank into the vault, scooped up \$2,700 in currency and made their getaway in a car stolen from Ft. Wayne, Indiana. Bystanders jumped into another car and pursued the bandits to the edge of town, only to lose them when the gas supply failed on their car.

This holdup occurred less than two weeks after a new radio system was installed at Michigan State Police headquarters at East

Lansing and this first baptism of fire proved radio to be a priceless weapon in the hands of the state.

Within three minutes after receiving the holdup report, every police cruiser in the southern portion of the state had received orders to cover all roads leading from Battle Creek to Indiana. Four hours after the robbery, a dozen cars were concentrated in the area, each continuously directed by radio.

After killing one state police trooper, who attempted to stop them, the fleeing criminals resumed their mad race for the state line until they came within 1 1/2 miles of Indiana. They were forced to abandon their car when it became overheated and fled through the fields on foot.

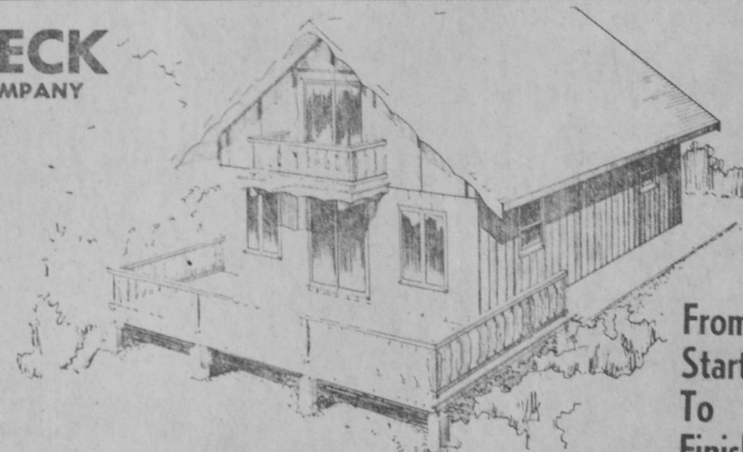
State police troopers met the two men walking down a road and the

bandits were quickly overpowered and disarmed. Less than 24 hours after the stickup, the two men had been sentenced to life imprisonment and were on their way to the state prison at Jackson.

Until that time, major activities of the state police radio in catching criminals had been in the apprehension of car thieves. When cars were reported stolen to the radio operators, messages were sent out and the thieves were usually apprehended before reaching another city.

The state placed 60 receiver sets in sheriff's offices throughout the state and equipped 50 state police cars with receiver sets. Any police information about bank robberies, prison escapes, stolen cars or missing persons was immediately broadcast from East Lansing and (See POLICE RADIO, page 4.)

### Study New Office for Vet's Counselor

Business conducted during the session saw authorization being given to the buildings and grounds committee to investigate the possible location of an office for the county veteran's counselor, Sidney Teague.

With approximately 2,400 veterans living in the county, he said the position has grown into a three-day-a-week position and felt that an office and telephone provided by the county was justified. The finance committee is to investigate a possible increase in salary for the position.

On recommendation of County Treas. Edward Nelkie, the commission canceled property taxes for 1973, 1974 and 1975 on a tract of land in Wilber Township and all units of government, including schools, county and township, are to forfeit \$3,661 in taxes for those three years.

An investigation by Nelkie revealed that an improper assessment of taxes had been made on the parcel of land, formerly owned by Sylvester McDonald, which has been owned by the United States government since 1942. The property had been taken off the tax roll in 1942, but was improperly returned to the tax roll at a later date.

### Police Radio

was picked up by the sheriff's offices throughout the state. Many municipal police departments in Michigan installed receiving sets in offices as well as in cars.

In the days before the use of radio for police purposes, the state police always had to hold half the total number of its men at the East Lansing post during stormy weather, as a reserve in case of accidents. The new radio system eliminated the necessity to have the re-

serve as officers were directed to the scene by radio.

Oscar Olander, chief of the state's department of public safety in 1930, called radio "the greatest weapon we have ever had against crime and Michigan may be proud of leading the way in using it for police purposes."

Gov. Wilbur Brucker said the significance of the state police radio "is a tendency to unify the efforts of all the police forces in Michigan—both state, county and municipal. It is impossible to ride in a patrol car and hear the messages telling of crimes committed in various parts of the state with-

out realizing this."

A number of years would pass before patrol cars of the state police and local sheriff's departments were equipped with two-way radios to achieve instant communication between cars and stations, but police radio communications, today, have grown into a comprehensive network throughout the state with major systems operated by both the state police and the state sheriff's association.

The need for armed civilian vigilantes in Michigan, including the unit in Iosco County, no longer became necessary after the advent of the police radio system and were

disbanded. For a short period of time, however, the vigilantes proved their worth in assisting with the apprehension of criminals.

Today, a civilian auxiliary assists the sheriff's department in times of natural disaster, assists in conducting searches for persons lost in wooded areas, along with policing major events or at other times when called upon by the sheriff for assistance.

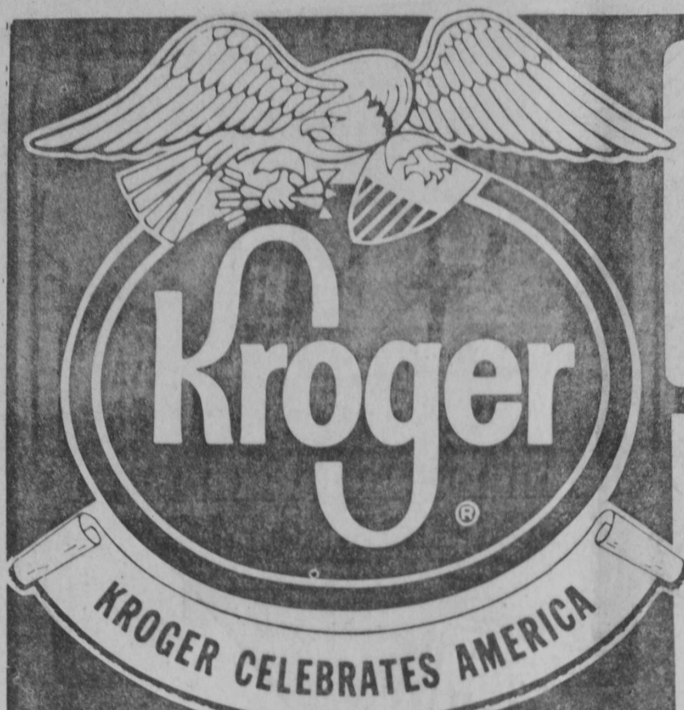

Members of Tawas Hospital Auxiliary and American Red Cross volunteers are to be honored at a tea in the cafeteria at 4:00 p. m.

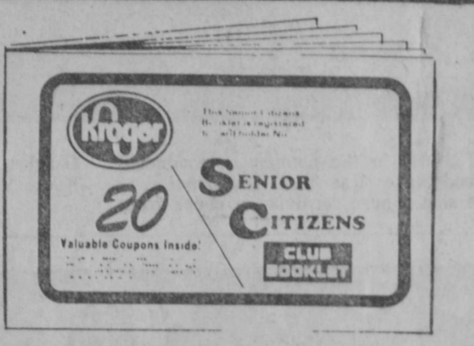

## Learn About Landscaping in County Tours

Joseph T. Cox, extension specialist in urban planning and landscape architecture at Michigan State University, is to conduct a tour in Isoco County concerning basic landscaping principles.

First stop on the tour Thursday, 1:00 to 3:30 p. m., will be at the newly constructed home of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley (Duke) Orr of Reno Township, formerly known as the James Irwin farm. The location is on Old State Road, 2½ miles west of M-65.

The Orrs wish to develop a plan for their new home. Basic landscape principles will be demonstrated at this stop. Every homeowner planning or doing any landscaping should attend.

A twilight tour will be held Thursday, 6:30 to 8:00 p. m., at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Davenport on Old State Road, one mile west of M-65 on the north side of the road. Mrs. Davenport wishes her new home landscaping plans to emphasize the natural setting. All are welcome to join the tour.

On Friday, 9:30 to 11:15 a. m., Cox will visit the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Cory on Slosser Road, one mile north of Kokosing Road on M-65. Turn right on Slosser Road for one mile.

The Cory residence is on the

northeast corner past Towerline Road. The Corys have a new home and wish to landscape it in such a manner as to have it fit into their 40-acre area. At this stop, Cox will demonstrate the process of preparing a site for landscape plantings and will explain techniques used to plan landscaping, including use of stakes, considerations for surroundings.

Friday afternoon, 1:00 to 2:30 o'clock, the home of Rex Milligan on Long Lake is to be visited. Drive three miles north of the light at Hale on M-65 to Kokosing Road. Turn left on Kokosing and drive 2½ miles to Campbell Avenue, turn left on Campbell Road one-half mile to 3378 Campbell Avenue.

The Milligans have an unusual site to landscape, including terracing as part of the plan. There is a vegetable garden area included in objectives.

Cox is to provide educational guidance needed to overcome possible erosion problems that might exist.

The Isoco County Extension Service emphasizes that all are welcome to join in the tour to share experiences and discuss mutual landscaping problems.

## Braves Won Over Oscoda

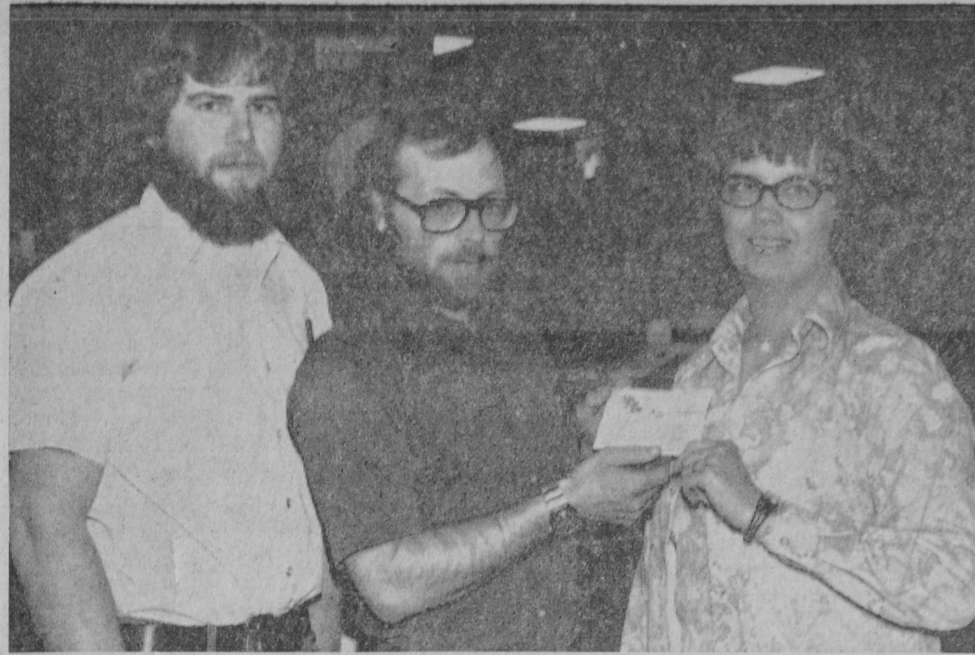
Tawas Braves won over the Oscoda Owls, 5-2, Wednesday to extend its record to six wins and two losses, with four wins and one loss in league play.

Said contract provides among other things that said County will acquire certain water improvements and will issue its bonds in the amount of \$982,000.00 to finance the same for the Cities of Tawas City, East Tawas and the Township of Baldwin and that the aforesaid Cities and Township will pay to said County all sums necessary to retire the principal of and interest on said bonds and will pledge as security for such obligations their full faith and credit.
