## Award Contract Soon for Tawas Harbor

A contract to build the long awaited breakwater for the Tawas Bay harbor will be awarded within the next two weeks, Cong. Philip E. Ruppe announced Monday.

Ruppe said the Army Corps of Engineers will award a \$1,743,063 contract to the low bidder for the project, Roen Salvage Company of Green Bay, Wisconsin. Construction of the breakwater has been a years-long goal of local leaders to

make the harbor and the area a more attractive waypoint for recreational boat owners.

The breakwater is being financed by federal and state funds on a 50-50 cost sharing arrangement. The contract was due to be awarded November 5, but was set back due to a delay in approval of funding for the project by the Michigan Waterways Commission

and by the state's administrative board.

Corps spokesmen say the construction is expected to start next spring with completion of the project coming as soon as the spring of 1978. Corps officials emphasize, however, that completion date for the construction will depend on the contractor's commitments and weather conditions. Once the breakwater is com-

pleted, the waterways commission says it intends to build more boat docks for the harbor to accommodate an increased number of summer cruisers.

"The letting of bids for the construction of the breakwater later this month will be a historic occasion for those Tawas Bay leaders who have seen the completion of the harbor breakwater as a key ingredient in promoting the Tawas

area as an appealing stop over point," Ruppe commented.

"I am proud of the federal government's role in making this harbor a safer refuge for those pleasure boaters on Lake Huron," he added.

Ruppe noted that the Tawas Bay project was significant in that very few harbor projects were being funded by the federal government.

## Provincial House Says Initial Work to Start in Feb.

Provincial House, Incorporated, announced Friday that construction on its new nursing home on North Street, Tawas City, is expected to start sometime in February.

A letter from Jeffrey E. Poorman, vice president of the firm, said that an option on property owned by Zion Lutheran Church, proposed site of the nursing home, had been extended until May 24. A six-month extension on the project has been given by the Michigan Department of Public Health.

According to Poorman, Provincial House is progressing as rapidly as possible with development of the nursing home and plans to make a final closing with Zion Lu-

theran Church around the middle of January.

Final papers requested by Farmers Home Administration before action on a loan were submitted last week by the Lansing based nursing home firm. The firm has completed a topographical and boundary survey of the site, has completed soil borings and ordered final plans and construction specifications.

Following a public hearing, the Tawas City Council rezoned the property bounded by Fifth Avenue and North Street from residential to multiple family to permit construction of the new 118-bed nursing home.

It is expected that construction work in February will consist mainly of site development.

## Fire Danger High in Woods

# Fair Deer Kill for '76 Season Opener

About three-fourths of Michigan's deer hunting army—in numbers the equivalent of approximately 10 World War II infantry divisions—took to wooded areas of the northern half of the Lower and Upper Peninsulas Monday in the annual quest for whitetails. Remainder of the hunters, who were unable to take off work for the opening day, will try their luck later this week-end.

Thousands of cars jammed I-75 Saturday on the annual trek northward and a good share of those cars continued up into the Huron Shore region via US-23 and M-65. A steady stream of traffic poured through Western Isosco County over M-65 and likewise through the Tawas and Oscoda.

Saturday was a banner day for area businesses catering to the visitors and gasoline service stations were jammed with vehicles of every description carrying hunters northward.

Sunday was a day of camp preparation for many of the nimrods stopping in this area to hunt either on federal or state forest lands or at private hunting camps. Complaints of trespassing on private property seemed to be fewer this year, but it is expected that the problem will increase as the first week of the season progresses.

Monday morning dawned with a bright and clear day and Walter Mikula, Tawas City, conservation officer for the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, reported Monday night that the best

hunting success in Isosco County appeared to be south of M-55 in Alabaster, Burleigh and Sherman Townships.

Mikula, who toured the deer hunting area throughout the day, said there appeared to be an excellent deer kill in Grant Township, but he believed that success in the prime areas of Wilber and AuSable Townships was somewhat lower than in previous years.

The local conservation officer believes that 1976 should be a banner year for deer hunters due to an open winter and a good crop of yearlings.

He said he had issued seven citations for conservation law violations Monday and about 30 warnings, ranging from untagged deer, loaded guns in cars to hunting from an illegal elevated platform.

Mikula said he had received excellent cooperation from hunters in reporting violations.

Ronnie Miller of Tawas Township was the first hunter to report in with his buck at The Tawas Herald office on opening day.

One person was injured by gunfire in this county on the first day. Darryl Glendening, 33, St. Clair Shores, was treated at Tawas Hospital for a minor self-inflicted gunshot wound below the right knee.

Glendening was hunting in dense cover and accidentally shot himself with a handgun, according to Michigan State Police from East Tawas.

On a more serious note, about 80 acres of marsh grass and brush were burned late Monday afternoon in the Tuttle Marsh area northeast of the Tawas. Employees of the United States Forest Service and hunter volunteers fought the blaze from 5:00 to 7:40 p. m. before bringing it under control.

A spokesman for the forest service said the blaze, believed to have started from the careless dropping of a match, started on high ground and quickly spread through the tinder dry marsh. A number of hunting camp sites were threatened in the federal forest area, but private hunting club property was not endangered. There were no injuries.

Two juveniles and four 17-year-olds were apprehended by Michigan State Police from East Tawas at a beer party in Alabaster Township. Police said that seven barrels of beer had been stolen Thursday from the Grabow Distributing warehouse at National City.

A spokesman for the forest service said Tuesday morning that freezing temperature late Monday night helped to contain the blaze and three employees were inspecting the area Tuesday morning as stumps and logs were still burning. Hunters are warned to be careful with matches and campfires while hunting in the national forest due to the extremely dry conditions which resulted from the late summer drought.

A number of area businesses were closed on opening day to allow employees to enjoy hunting. All schools were closed and many governmental offices operated with only skeleton crews. Regular meetings of city councils of Tawas City and East Tawas were delayed a week due to the opening of deer hunting.

Attending the meeting was Robert Foster, former chairman of the Isosco County Board of Commissioners and now supervisor of Oscoda Township, who serves as chairman of the Oscoda-AuSable Industrial Development Commission.

Others attending included community IDC officials and bank officials. Each member of the committee has been requested to pick an alternate so that continuity of representation from each county can take place when committee members are absent from meetings.

The workshop determined the need to consider several segments of a comprehensive plan in eight different areas. Included would be establishment of a non-profit organization to carry out expansion efforts and establish a structure for so doing.

Other ideas included a highway sign promotion program. The regional boundary under consideration is from Clare County to Arenac and all counties east of US-27 and continuing to the Straits of Mackinac, which includes Isosco County.

Other segments would include development of a shell building program, which would be constructed within certified parks by local IDCs, private investors or a combination including use of an established Northeastern Michigan non-profit corporation; a small business investment program; development of community profiles, to be distributed to interested clients; an industrial brochure developed for the 14-county area; enlist professional industrial realtors active in metropolitan areas to assist in selling this area to prospective clients.

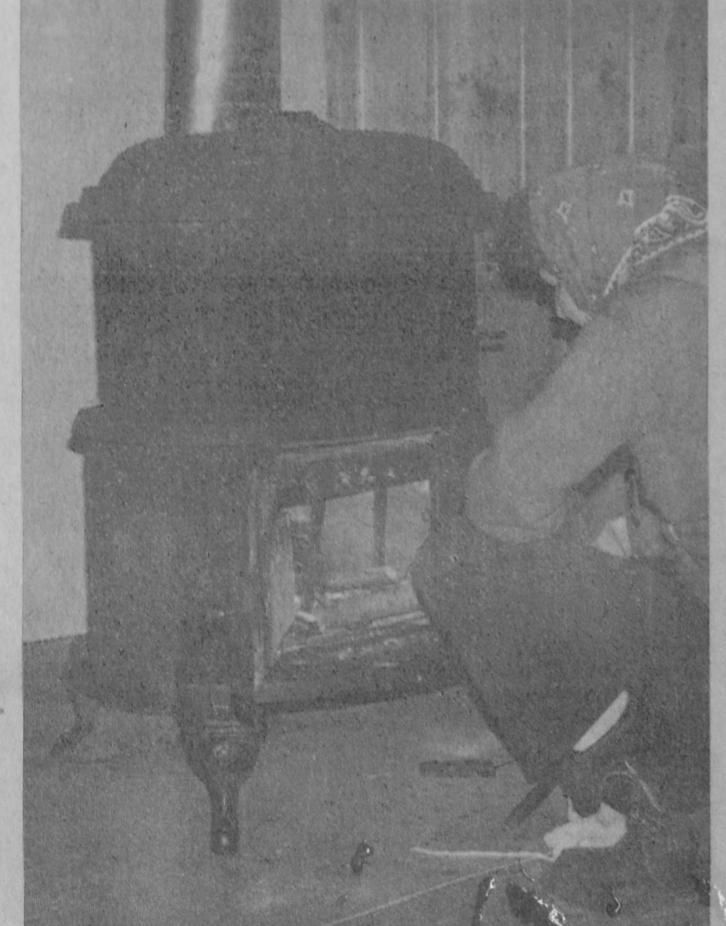

SCENES LIKE THIS were repeated in hundreds of private hunting camps here last week-end as nimrods prepared for the opening day of deer hunting season. About the only thing missing is a wood cook stove loaded with steaming pancakes, eggs and bacon and a friendly card game before an early "lights out" prior to the big day. Hunters enjoyed brilliant late fall weather over the week-end and the first two days of the season, but the forest service warns all to be especially careful with matches and outdoor fires—the woods are tinder dry and a blaze could cause devastation of wooded areas and camps such as this.

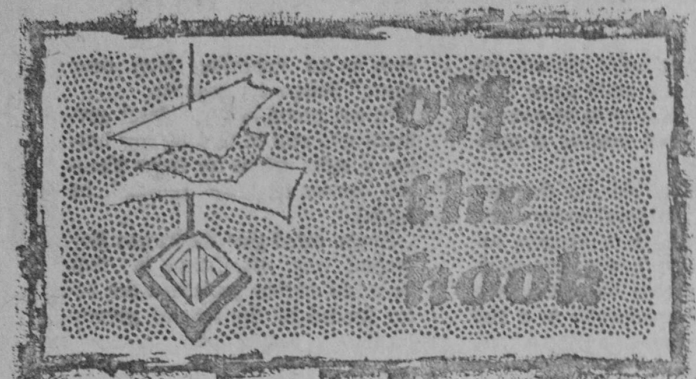
I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the republic for which it stands; one nation, under God, indivisible with liberty and justice for all.

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Gov. William G. Milliken and other speakers missed a very important point in presentations November 8 concerning the possible closing of Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

For security reasons, perhaps, the question cannot be answered, but we believe the point which should be uppermost in everyone's thinking—military, political and the general public—should be: How does Wurtsmith Air Force Base fit into our present and future national defense needs?

The economy of a county, region or even a state has little to do with this important question—national defense should be of primary concern when considering location of military bases.

If Wurtsmith does not fit into the nation's defense needs, if relocation is necessary for strategic purposes, if its usefulness has been abrogated by the introduction of new military hardware, if there has been a change in the philosophy of the future need for manned bombers, or if congress is unwilling to replace present out-moded bombers and other military hardware—then Wurtsmith, or any other base under similar circumstances, should be closed.

If the answer to the above questions is "no," then Wurtsmith and any other military base meeting this same criteria should remain open and active in our national defense picture.

This nation has wasted too many defense tax dollars on "dead horses"—the question to be addressed is defense, not the state of an economy brought about through

defense spending. "Political pull" should have nothing to do with defense or determination of strategic locations, although it must be admitted that could be considered naive thinking when past actions of congressional leaders is recalled.

During World War II and the Korean War, many military bases—including Oscoda Air Base and later Wurtsmith—were constructed, or reopened and expanded to meet necessary contingencies of those times—many "camps" and bases were later closed when the need for their existence was gone. It has always been that way following major wars.

However, the problem facing this nation since the end of the Korean War in 1953 has been that the "Cold War" with communism has never ended—we have been forced to remain strong militarily due to international tensions. Since the days of our Founding Fathers, the people of this country have abhorred standing armies and navies and for good reason.

As a consequence of the international situation, military spending has been a necessary millstone around the neck of this country—it has "helped" the economy of those areas where military bases—

Iosco, for instance—and the industrial complex furnishing military hardware, but other areas have not been benefited; had there not been a definite need for military spending, the tax dollars could have been used elsewhere to benefit mankind.

As we see it, the political and economical question should be

stripped away from the potential closing of any military base—the practice of constructing new bases, expansion of old bases or purchase of military hardware in any particular locality to the benefit of political influence should be stopped immediately and all thinking Americans should insist upon it.

As for the statement that Michigan has a low return from its tax dollars sent to Washington, this is not surprising. For too long, the majority of people have felt that their income taxes have been squandered foolishly and those states with either more effective leadership or those with more seniority on key committees have taken advantage of those states whose leaders have felt that the nation came first in terms of federal spending.

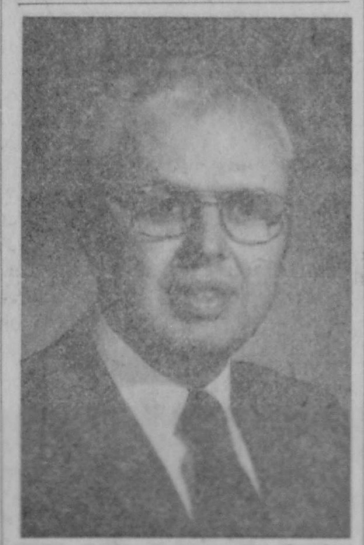
As we said earlier, this may be naive thinking, but this country simply cannot afford any more "dead horses."

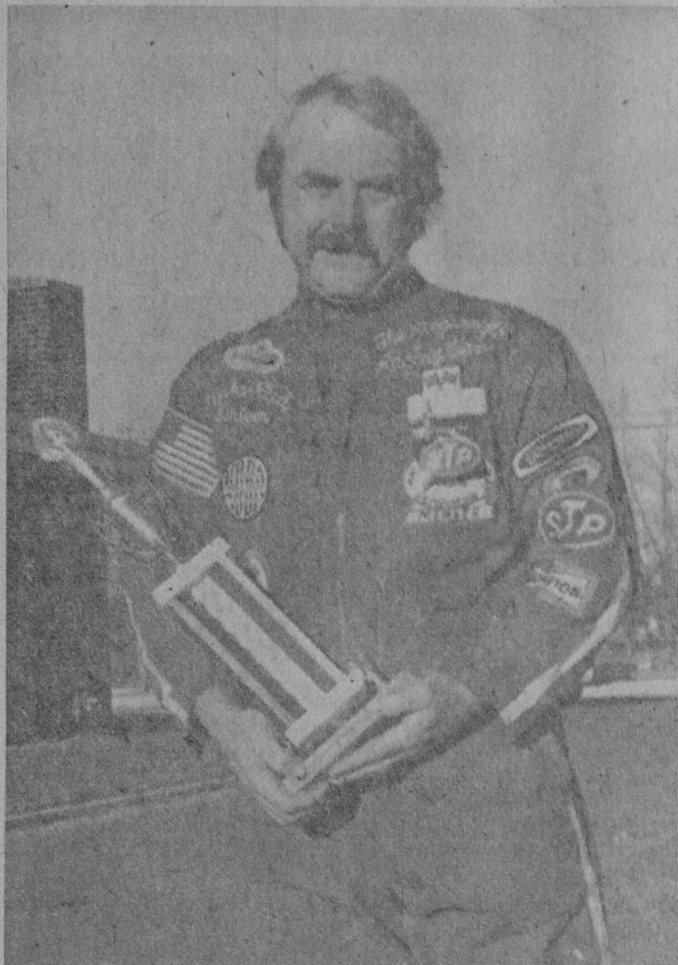

## Milliken Terms Threatened Closing of Wurtsmith a Shock for Michigan

Gov. William G. Milliken headed the list of those testifying at Oscoda November 8 concerning the issue of potential or at least threatened, closure of Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

"Because the lives and livelihood of a great many Michigan citizens are involved, let me state unequivocally on their behalf that we oppose the closing of Wurtsmith," stated the governor.

Wurtsmith is the second Michigan air base within the last year to be threatened with closure. The people of Michigan are already fighting to keep open Kincheloe Air Force Base, located in Chippewa County.

"All in all, Michigan has experienced a long series of shocks over the past year," said Milliken. "Wurtsmith is but one chapter in this unfortunate sequence."

The governor pointed out that Michigan is the seventh most populous state in the nation, yet it is seventh from the bottom in per capita federal spending for defense salaries.

"We were justly accorded the proud designation, 'Arsenal of Democracy,' during World War II for our industrial productive capabilities in turning out the materials needed to save our nation; yet today, we rank 36th among the 50 states in per capita federal spending for defense contracts."

"It is regrettable that Michigan, a state with so much capability to contribute to national defense, is relegated to a second string role."

The governor cited the fact that the office handling government contracts for the region had been moved from Detroit to Cleveland, Ohio, in March 1976, losing 394 civilian and military jobs; the Advanced Concepts Laboratory contract from the army was awarded to an Ohio institute, rather than to Michigan, which would have gained 120 jobs and \$12,000,000 in funding; the state faces a damaging loss of 6,800 jobs when the department of defense and the army reach a decision on the XM-1 tank; if the decision is made to go with a turbine engine, the state will lose 1,800 to 2,000 more jobs at Muskegon to Connecticut, which already has far higher per capita defense contract expenditures than any other state.

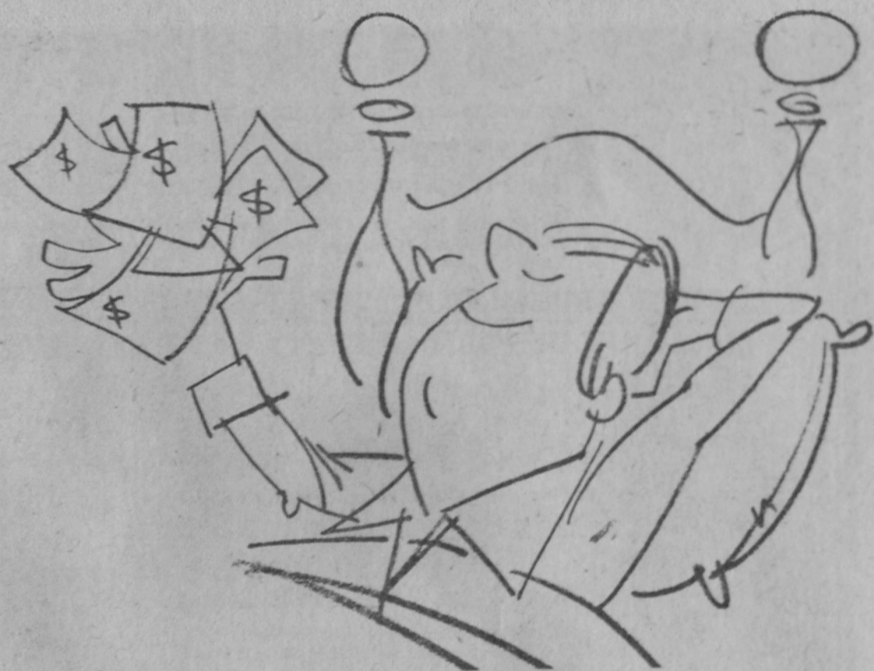
He said that the air force's projected impact of closing Wurtsmith has been limited to Iosco County, but the governor maintains that the impact is statewide because the bases purchase a significant amount of goods and services from outside the county, that military personnel do not restrict their purchases to Iosco.

"To illustrate my first point, in base procurement alone, \$5,400,000 would be lost to Michigan above and beyond that \$1,500,000 lost to Iosco County," said the governor.

He said that the state would lose revenue in the form of individual and business income taxes, reduced sales taxes and the state would face increased expenditures in such areas as welfare assistance, Medicaid and unemployment compensation payments, the latter easily costing Michigan \$8,000,000.

Michigan taxpayers would be footing this enormous bill. Since (See MILLIKEN, page 6.)

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## Gypsum Mining: Iosco's Oldest Industry

A legendary property transaction more than 100 years ago in which a squatter sold his rights to a parcel of land in Alabaster Township for "\$10, a rifle and two coon dogs," led to development of the oldest industry today in Iosco County.

Although the legend can neither be confirmed nor denied at this late date, it was repeated in an early day report of the "Michigan Geological Survey." The story later proved unacceptable, however, to the Michigan Historical Commission when an official state historical marker was to be erected on the site several years ago.

The site in question is the Alabaster quarry, one of the most important sources of gypsum rock in this country since the Civil War. During the intervening century, other industries have come and gone in this county—notably lumbering and fishing—but the importance of gypsum as a natural resource continues to contribute to Iosco's economic growth with three different firms doing business today.

Officially, the discovery of gypsum along the shore of Saginaw Bay is attributed to Douglass Houghton, government geologist, but it is believed by some that outcroppings of the rock first came to the notice of early Indian traders.

One story relates that the rock was "discovered" by a mail carrier, who came upon it during one of his trips between Bay City and Alpena. Variations of the story say that the mail carrier, driving a dog sled, either stumbled over an outcropping of rock along the shore or saw it glistening in the water of the bay.

That story cannot be verified, but it would appear that it would not stand the test of date comparison—the first post office established in the shore region was at Tawas City in 1856, more than 10 years after Houghton's geological tour; fishing villages at AuSable and points north date no earlier than 1848.

Regardless of the actual discoverer of gypsum, William McDonald, an Indian trader in the employ of the American Fur Company, entered his claim for a mile of property along the shore after the government survey of 1841 and returned to Bay City carrying samples of the rock with him. This statement was written in 1867 by James O. Whittemore, first register of deeds of this county and appears in "The History of the Lake Huron Shore."

When McDonald returned to Iosco with interested friends to look over the deposit, they found an old squatter claimed the land surrounding the site of the present Alabaster quarry. The squatter was eager to sell his claim, so the story goes in the "Michigan Geological Survey," and settled for the rifle, dogs and the \$10.

McDonald later sold portions of his interest to James Fraser, Harvey Williams and Alfred Harston of Bay City, who supposed it to be of great value. Their explorations failed to discover any great amount of gypsum and nothing further resulted until William S. Patrick of Flint bored into the ridges of rolling land and found an abundant supply of rock.

In 1862, Patrick sold his holdings to Benjamin F. Smith, the "father" of Iosco County's gypsum strip mining industry.

By 1865, Smith was quarrying gypsum and shipping it by boat to Detroit for calcination and processing into plaster. Later, Smith built a grinding and calcining mill

at the site and named the location, Alabaster, the Biblical name for gypsum.

In 1867, Smith began construction of a three-story hotel and mercantile building at Alabaster, a steam-powered mill, 30 dwellings, storehouse, a copper shop, a grinding mill, calcining works, a large warehouse and a dock extending into Saginaw Bay.

During each of the seasons of 1866 and 1867, Smith shipped from Alabaster about 10,000 tons of rock and increased his shipments to 15,000 tons in 1869. By 1871, Smith had invested \$250,000 at the installation and capacity of the mill had increased to 100 tons during a 10-hour day. The firm was averaging about 25,000 tons of rock plaster annually, along with 12,500 tons

of ground plaster for "sweetening" land and 7,500 tons of calcined plaster.

A description of Alabaster for 1871 is contained in "The History of the Lake Huron Shore." "Going now along the coast of Iosco County and at a distance of some 40 miles from the mouth of the Saginaw River, we reach the little village of Alabaster, seat of the famous plaster beds of this part of the state. The town has 150 inhabitants, all connected with the quarry in one capacity or another; no other business is done. All the supplies that sustain the community are brought from below and sold in Mr. Smith's store. A small school is taught by a lady and there is preaching once in two or three weeks by a minister who comes from Tawas."

By 1875, a partner joined the business and the firm was known as Smith, Bullard and Company. Due to an unstable economy, employment dropped to about 60 men in handling the product and preparing it for market.

The original plant at Alabaster continued operations until 1891, when the company was reorganized following a fire which destroyed the facilities.

The new company name was the Western Plaster Works, which rebuilt the calcining plant in 1892 and constructed a second processing plant at South Chicago, Illinois, to meet the growing demands for gypsum plaster in the Middle West.

That year proved to be a particularly prosperous one for the firm as it furnished plaster for the Chicago World's Fair of 1893. Many of the buildings erected for the great Columbian Exposition at Chicago were faced inside and out with gypsum plaster quarried at Alabaster.

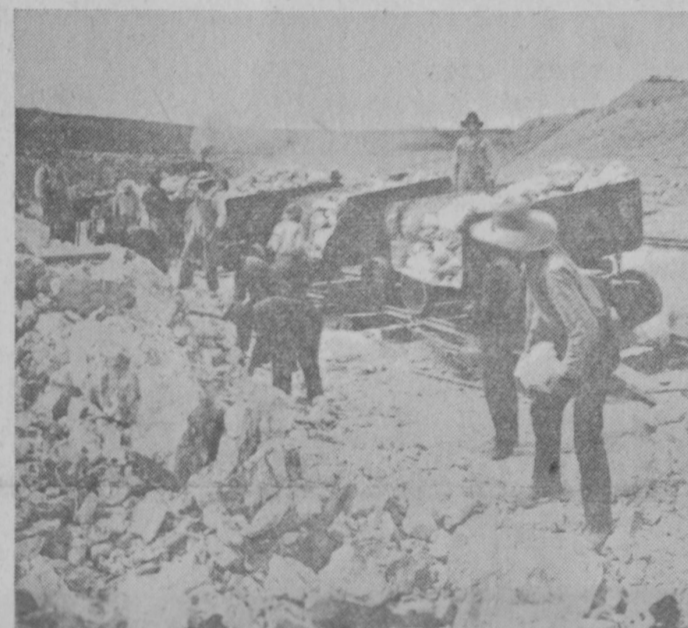
In 1898, the name of the company was changed from Western Plaster Works to the Alabaster Gypsum Company. When United States Gypsum Company was formed in 1902, taking Alabaster into its fold as one of the most important and valuable components of the new corporation, a young clerk by the name of Sewell Avery remained with the firm at Alabaster. He later became president of USG.

Many changes have taken place at Alabaster, both in methods of operation and equipment utilized. Hand forks originally used to fill horse drawn rail cars with rock gave way to steam powered and later electrically powered shovels; horses gave way to steam and later diesel locomotives; an aerial tramline was completed in 1929 to fill the holds of huge lake carrier ships, replacing sail powered vessels of an earlier day. Production of plaster was discontinued at Alabaster in 1929 as the firm concentrated on shipping raw material to other USG plants for processing.

The most significant change in more than a century of quarrying at Alabaster took place two years ago when a new conveyor system was developed and installed in the quarry. The shelf of gypsum, formed millions of years ago when Iosco County was part of an inland sea or basin, is now stripped of its overburden without the use of huge walking draglines; front end loaders now do the job.

The gypsum rock fractured by explosive charges is processed and transported by conveyor to the loading area; the conveyor is also used to transport the overburden to spoil areas to reclaim the land.

Gypsum's major usefulness to man is its peculiar quality: After being cooked and dehydrated into (See GYPSUM, page 6.)

## Deer Hunters Can Help Herd Study

Michigan deer hunters — the lucky ones, that is — can help the Department of Natural Resources determine the scope of future seasons by letting wildlife biologists make a simple examination of whitetails shot during the November 15-30 season. Inspections are set up at rest stop checking stations through the first week of the firearm season along I-75 south of Bay City, one on US-27 north of Alma, US-131 north of Paris and on M-37 south of White Cloud. Locally, a checking station is located at Tawas Point State Park. Dave Arnold, DNR deer specialist, says biologist carefully, but quickly, check antler development of bucks, plus an animal's age, sex and general physical characteristics, which collectively assist in learning of nutrition patterns and population trends. "These factors are an important part of our fact-finding process that leads to establishment of harvest quotas in each management area and whether a current year's deer hunting regulations are proper, or if suitable adjustments might be necessary for a following season," states Arnold. Cooperating sportsmen are rewarded with a "successful deer hunter" arm patch for stopping at checking stations. The patch was first developed and designed five years ago and is in itself a popular deer season collectors' item.

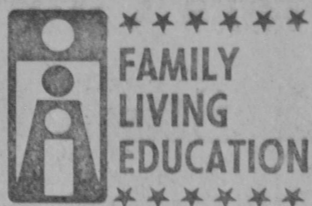

TALKING TURKEY

With Thanksgiving coming next week, it is time for most American families to start thinking

about the feast they will consume. And star of that feast, in most cases, will be a golden brown roast turkey.

Deciding how large a turkey to buy can sometimes be a problem. A good rule of thumb is to allow between three-fourth and one pound of turkey per serving for birds under 12 pounds. For turkeys over 12 pounds allow between one-half and three-fourths pound per person. Of course, lots of families buy a larger turkey and plan on having some left to freeze or use in casseroles, sandwiches and soup.

How about the self-basters?

These are turkeys which the processor has injected with a basting solution (often butter) which is later released throughout the meat as the bird roasts.

Do not forget to allow enough time to thaw the turkey safely. In the refrigerator, thawing will take one to three days, depending on the size of the turkey. This is the best way to defrost because the slow process helps the turkey retain its juices. If you need to hurry up the process, though, the turkey can be thawed under cold running water or immersed in a sink or pan of cold water (changing it often enough so it stays cold). Thaw-

ing this way takes about three to seven hours. Do not thaw the turkey at room temperature; that allows too great an opportunity for spoilage bacteria to grow.

The best temperature for roasting your turkey is 325 degrees. The following table will tell about how long it will take:

six pounds	3 hours
Eight pounds	3 1/2 hours
Twelve pounds	4 1/2 hours
Sixteen pounds	5 1/2 hours
Twenty pounds	6 1/2 hours

It is good to allow an extra half hour because cooking times do vary.

the state does not get an equal return on its federal tax dollars—only 65 cents of every \$1 paid in federal taxes in Michigan is returned to Michigan—this state's costs would be increasingly higher.

The governor said a severe economic setback could result when one considers what would happen to Iosco County: The county would suffer a direct population loss of 9,700 people, a 37 percent reduction; there would be an indirect loss of employment of 2,150 jobs, or a 22 percent reduction in the total number of jobs in the county; unemployment would increase by 2,450 people, resulting in an unemployment rate of 38 percent; housing vacancies would increase by 1,000 homes, resulting in a 38.9

percent vacancy rate.

In addition, he said there would be a one-time cost of \$780,000 for teacher severance pay, retail sales would decline \$18,800,000, county revenue would drop 18 percent and Oscoda Township would lose 25 percent of its revenue.

The governor said that the state and local communities were not given enough notice in order to prepare their cases. He asked the defense department and the air force to act with equal consideration for what is right and proper in connection with the closing of both Kincheloe and Wurtsmith.

"There is no overriding defense concern that can justify a double knockout punch aimed at the economy of one state. There is no logic in relegating a state as large as Michigan, as strategically located as Michigan and as capable of industrial productivity as Michigan to second class status through closing of military installations and

snatching away of defense contracts," said Milliken.

"Over the past several decades, there has been a pronounced shift in federal spending priorities. What at first was a trickle has become a flood of federal dollars to the so-called sunbelt states. Our state's federal dollar shortage is a direct result of this spending pattern," said the governor.

a fine powder, it can resume its original rock-like consistency by the addition of water plus a few minutes of hardening. It is indispensable to the building industry for wallboard, plaster, sheathing, lath and roof decks, but it has at least a thousand other uses—industrial, agricultural and artistic.

Gypsum forms the molds for bathroom fixtures, table china and other ceramics; it is in the head of a match, classroom chalk and the

mannequin in store displays; the dentist fashions bridgeswork out of gypsum, it is the filler for toothpaste and the doctor splints with gypsum orthopedic plaster, to name only a few of the uses for this material.

The shelf of gypsum extends entirely across the state, but it is at its closest point to the surface in this region and this is the reason for the location here of three different firms—USG, National Gypsum Company and Michigan Gypsum Company.

Gypsum has served man for thousands of years, having been used in the construction of the Egyptian pyramids; its usefulness is expected to last for a long time to come. Iosco County quarries have met the needs of the past and present; its vast reserves will continue to meet the needs of future generations, or as long as gypsum is utilized by man.

Stan Wooten appeared to answer questions regarding Cable TV reception in City. He described his company's efforts to upgrade equipment, and urged that users call his office to report reception problems when they occur.

Bid on City insurance needs from Wm. Brown Insurance Agency opened and discussed. Council decided to seek advice comparing coverages from expert provided by him. No other bids received.

Dr. John LeClair presented plans for his proposed new Kroger store and parking area. RESOLUTION proposed by Lansky, seconded by Rollin, that a Public Hearing be held November 1, 1976 at 7:30 P. M. on Dr. LeClair's request that a portion of River Street between US-23 and Court Street be vacated. Carried.

Manager reported new soil borings indicate adequate base,

therefore RESOLUTION proposed by Cotter, seconded by Ezo, that Council authorize City Engineers to prepare necessary papers for designating this area in City's industrial Park for new water storage tank location. Roll call vote: unanimous yes.

Manager reported status of Public Works Act project application plans, indicating City should rank high in eligibility, but needs further information from architects, engineers, and DNR.

Letters have been sent requesting bids for new fire truck.

Stop signs have been placed on Bay Drive and First Avenue. RESOLUTION proposed by Rollin, seconded by Cotter, that stop sign be placed on Roberta Drive at First Avenue. Carried.

Motion by Cotter seconded by Ezo that City include the statutory 1% collection fee on future winter tax billings, to avoid confusion described by County Treasurer. Carried.

Motion by Ezo seconded by Landon that bills totaling \$39,149.75 be paid:

Manager reported: 1. Audit is progressing normally. 2. No report from Tawas River Harbor Committee. 3. Committee on Convention Center attended County Commissioner's meeting. County is to report the extent of its interest, after study. New act, No. 338, might also be a source of funding for such a project.

Budget comparison with three-months' receipts and expenditures presented.

Meeting adjourned at 10:30. Council met briefly in closed session on a legal matter.

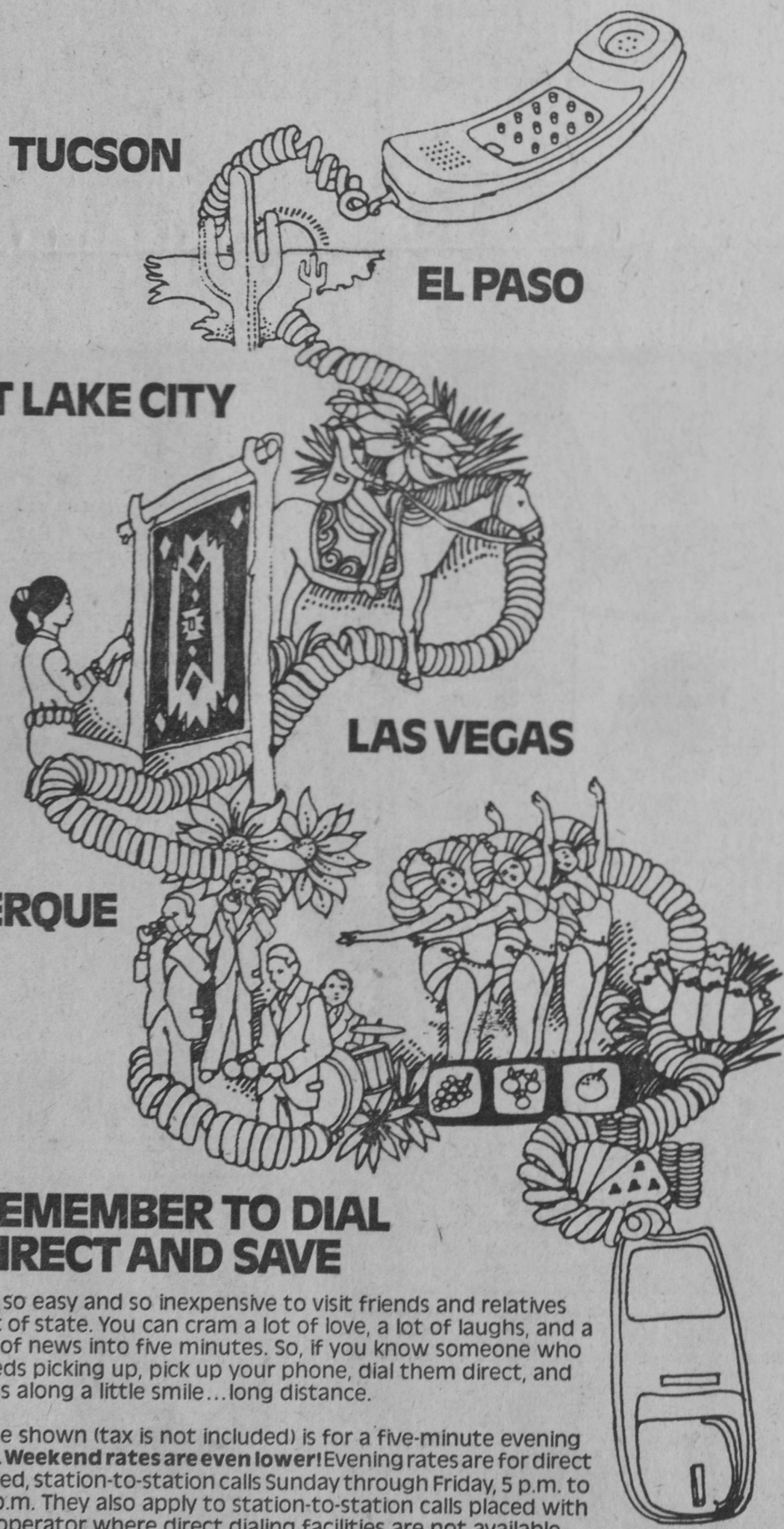
