## Interim Director Gives His 'Side'

"I have not applied for this job; I did not apply in the beginning and I have not made up my mind about submitting an application—the odds are not very good."

Speaking Monday was David M. Lindemulder, the interim director of the newly-formed Iosco-Ogemaw Community Mental Health Services Board, which becomes operational effective Friday.

Lindemulder, who has been under fire since early July as director of the Northeast Mental Health Board at Alpena and announced his resignation on July 23 to take effect September 30, has been assisting the new Iosco-Ogemaw Board in its efforts to become operational on the day appointed by the state.

With an extensive background in mental health since the days when the state first emphasized the need for community programs, Lindemulder is assisting in "starting up" his fourth community mental health operation in the state.

He received a master degree from Western Michigan University in counseling and, as an employee of the VanBuren County Probate Court, was assigned by the court as a mental health therapist to the clinic in that county. He assisted with formation of the county's mental health board, then moved to Cass County as a therapist and administrator for 1½ years. His next move was to Alpena.

During the recent controversy at Alpena, Lindemulder's academic qualifications to serve as director of the mental health service came under fire when detractors claimed he received his doctor of philosophy degree from a "mail order" unaccredited Wisconsin college.

Although the Wisconsin school which he attended is no longer in existence, Lindemulder said Monday that he never claimed that the school had North Central accreditation and, in fact, he said a number of Michigan schools do not have such accreditation. He said, too, that he enrolled in the school, attended workshops there and one of the requirements in his curriculum was to create a community health program from scratch, to evaluate that program and then write a thesis concerning it.

Lindemulder maintains, however, that regardless of the fact that his doctorate degree is being questioned at Alpena, he has a master degree from Western Michigan, that he has many hours of post graduate work in his field at that university, is certified as a social worker in Michigan and is legally qualified as a mental health professional.

"I was the only director in Michigan appointed to the state's mental health task force," he stated.

The new interim director for Iosco-Ogemaw said that he believed the major reason he became embroiled in a controversy at Alpena stemmed from the fact that two employees came under scrutiny during his directorship there. About the same time, Iosco County's representatives on the mental health board became disenchanted over the lack of service being received by this county and asked the attorney general's office to investigate one of the em-

## Iosco-Ogemaw in New Role

With Friday being the due date for its state sanctioned "birth," the Iosco-Ogemaw Community Mental Health Services Board Monday night adopted a resolution assuring residents of all seven counties served by the Northeast board "that mental health programs will continue with an independent Iosco-Ogemaw board."

Under the divisional agreement, the new board accepts from the Northeast board responsibility for all mental health programs; receives and accepts from the Northeast board all distributions as specified, including leasing of property according to amounts specified for duration of leases with the Northeast board.

The Iosco-Ogemaw board is to provide service to residents of Oscoda County as are now provided by the Northeast board through services based in the Rose City clinic, plus the Tawas City clinic, the ROOC-COOR sheltered workshop and work activity center in Tawas City.

The Iosco-Ogemaw board guaranteed employment invitations to all employees of the Northeast board, not on detached civil service, to join the staff of the new board in the same position as that currently occupied at the same remuneration as currently received.

All tenure as applied to employee benefits with the Northeast board is to be retained. Positions include activity counselors for Iosco and Ogemaw County, a client program worker in Iosco, outpatient therapists and clerk typists for each county.

The proposed continuation budget adopted for 1976-77 amounts to \$279,905, which includes 10 professional staff members, plus the director and clerical help. A transfer to the new unit from Northeast would amount to approximately \$59,194.

Total budget adopted for the program would be \$387,720, which includes the above continuation budget, \$26,488 for emergency services and \$91,227 for day treatment. County allocation by population would be based on 66 percent for Iosco County and 34 percent for Ogemaw County. Iosco's share would be \$23,926 in 1976 and \$24,566 in 1977. Ogemaw's share would be \$12,326 in 1976 and \$12,655 in 1977. An

allocation from Oscoda County for services would amount to \$4,350 in 1976 and \$4,466 in 1977. Remainder of the revenue is to be provided through state sources.

Two citizens from the Tawas were present and questioned recent action of the board in hiring a new director and "release" of Henry Zimmerman from the staff in Tawas City.

Hiram Rose, chairman from Ogemaw County, stated that David Lindemulder had been hired as a consultant to Iosco-Ogemaw and he is expected by the state to give the same service to the new board as he had provided at Alpena. Rose said Lindemulder was not obligated to fill the position unless he was in agreement.

"We did not betray any public trust in providing a director for three months," said Rose. He said the board had no personnel committee or policies during formation of the board and that the recommendation to hire Lindemulder had been presented to each county board of commissioners.

"Many of us have given many years of service to the public, we represent from 30,000 to 40,000 persons in the two counties and we are not trying to pull a snow job," said Rose.

In regard to Zimmerman, who had been on detached civil service as a state employee with Northeast and is nearing retirement age, several members of the board stated that he had not been released from service as had been reported.

The chairman stated that no decision had been made by the board concerning Zimmerman's employment with Iosco-Ogemaw, but there was a question concerning his fringe benefits and retirement under detached state civil service. It was stated that Zimmerman's application would be accepted as an employee of the Iosco-Ogemaw board, but not under detached civil service with the state which would require the new board to pay the cost of state fringes and retirement benefits.

One member expressed the opinion that it "was an unfortunate situation" and that the board "was going to try and remedy it as soon as possible."

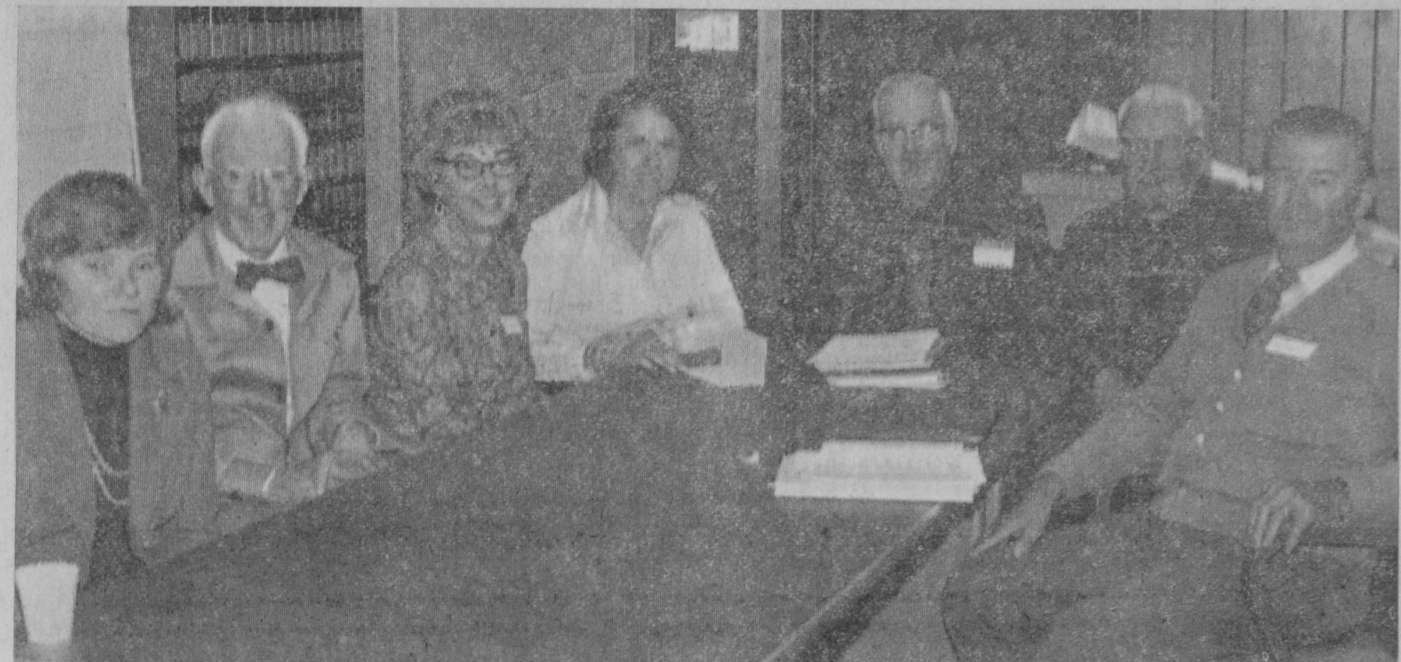

this point he has not lost a dime if he chooses to continue as a state employee, but he may have to move," said Rose.

It was reported that Zimmerman service employees, although it was stated he was scheduled to take his annual vacation in October. Next meeting of the board is to be held October 11.

## Skill Center Lost by Wide Margin

Iosco County's proposed skill center went down with a resounding thud Thursday, losing in all four school districts, 2,590 to 1,240. The turnout of voters was slightly less than when a similar proposal was rejected in December 1974.

The proposal was turned down

by school district voters as follows: Hale Area, 163-479; Whittemore-Prescott Area, 92-345; Tawas Area, 559-1,056; Oscoda Area, 426-710.

When a similar proposal was placed before voters in September 1974, it lost by a scant 67 votes; when it was resubmitted in De-

ember 1974, it was turned down, 3,090 to 885.

Much has happened to the national economy since the fall of 1974—inflation has increased by leaps and bounds and taxes have been increased to meet rising governmental costs.

John Tafelski, superintendent of Iosco Intermediate District, said Friday that the result of Thursday's election was a direct stand by voters concerning the method of taxation for Michigan's schools.

"People are up to their ears in the taxes and promises have been made in the legislature that some changes would be made concern-

ing the method of financing school operation," said Tafelski. "That change has not come about and rejection of such tax proposals seems to be about the only alternative for voters."

Tafelski said that considerable support for the proposal had been received prior to the election, but he believed that some voters later changed their minds concerning the advisability of constructing a skill center at this time.

The proposal sought adoption of an annual tax rate of 1.6 mills. The \$2,132,000 center was to have been financed by federal and local funds.

## Form Committee for Base Hearing

A meeting was held last night (Tuesday) by a special coordinating committee of Iosco-Alcona County business and civic leaders to map plans for an appearance at an upcoming public hearing concerning the possible closure of Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

A public hearing is to be held the second week of October at Oscoda Area School concerning an impact statement which has been prepared for the federal government concerning Wurtsmith's role in the area's economy.

Joseph Fox, a member of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, said Friday that the coordinating committee includes local officials, plus representatives of business firms, banks, schools and area chambers of commerce.

The air force announced in late August that Wurtsmith Air Force Base near Oscoda had been identified as a possible alternative base for closure by September 30, 1977. The information was included in an environmental impact statement concerning relocation and closure of two bomb wings at Kincheloe Air Force Base, plus another air force installation.

## Killed Sunday on Motorbike

A 27-year-old air force officer was killed Sunday when his motorcycle went out of control and struck a road marker near his home at Oscoda.

Investigating state police said that Capt. Hal K. Loop of Wurtsmith Air Force Base was driving alone on F-41 at Foote Site Dam when the vehicle went off a curve. He was thrown off the vehicle and pronounced dead of multiple injuries at the scene.

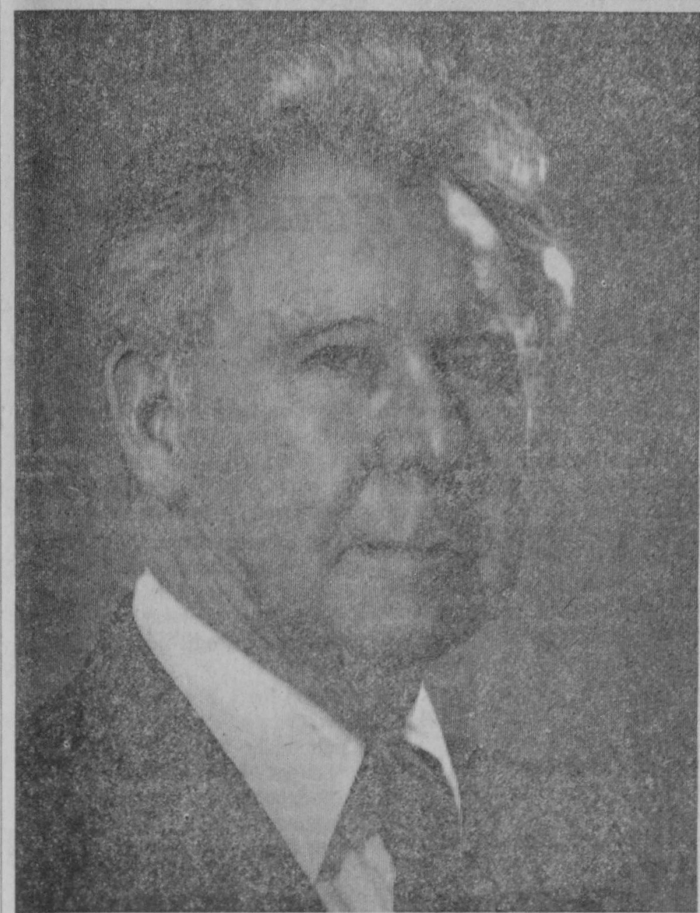

## Two Tawas Seniors are Semifinalists

Two Tawas Area High School seniors, Michael Barry and David Kennedy, have been named among 750 semifinalists from Michigan in the 1977 National Merit Scholarship Program. These academically talented students will have an opportunity to continue in the competition, along with 15,000 students nationally, for about 3,850 merit scholarships to be awarded next spring.

To advance to finalist standing, semifinalists must meet requirements that include being fully endorsed and recommended for scholarship consideration by secondary school principals, presenting school records that substantiate high academic standing and confirming their high qualifying test scores with equivalent scores on a second examination to be held in November.

More than 90 percent of the semifinalists are expected to qualify as finalists and to receive certificates of merit next February. All winners of merit scholarships will be chosen from the exceptionally able group of finalists.

More than one-million students from more than 17,000 high schools

entered the 1977 merit program by taking the 1975 preliminary scholastic aptitude test and the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test.

Semifinalists are the highest scoring students in each state. The number named in a state is proportional to the state's percentage of the nation's total graduating senior class.

Semifinalists attaining finalist status will compete for at least 1,000 \$1,000 scholarships.

The 1977 competition is the 22nd conducted by NMSC. In the annual merit programs completed between 1956 and 1976, more than 45,800 students have won merit scholarships valued at more than \$124,000,000.

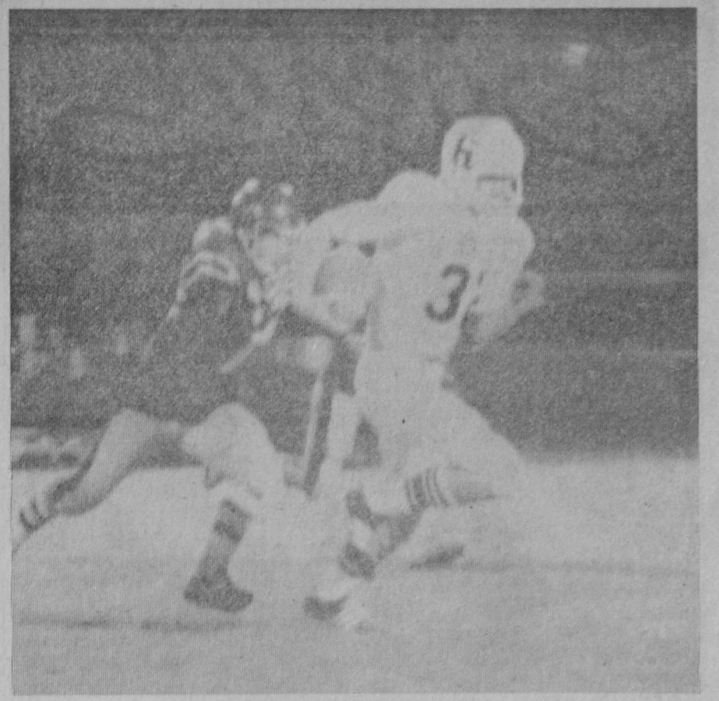

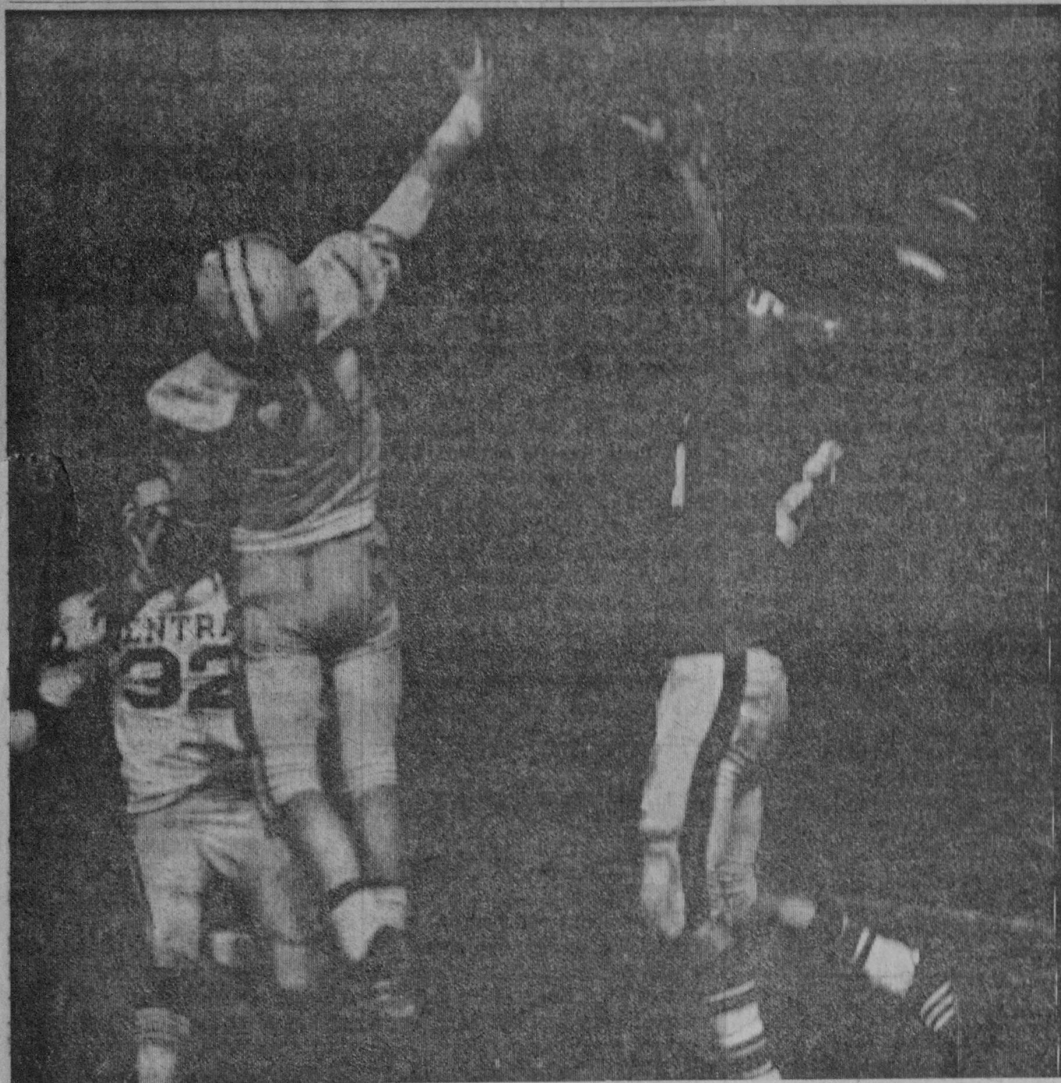
Top defenders were Tod Peters, Tony Dorcsey and Mathews.

The offensive line of Mark Richards, Jay Clement, Vern Reed III, Duane Brandt and Tim Lesneski turned in an excellent performance.

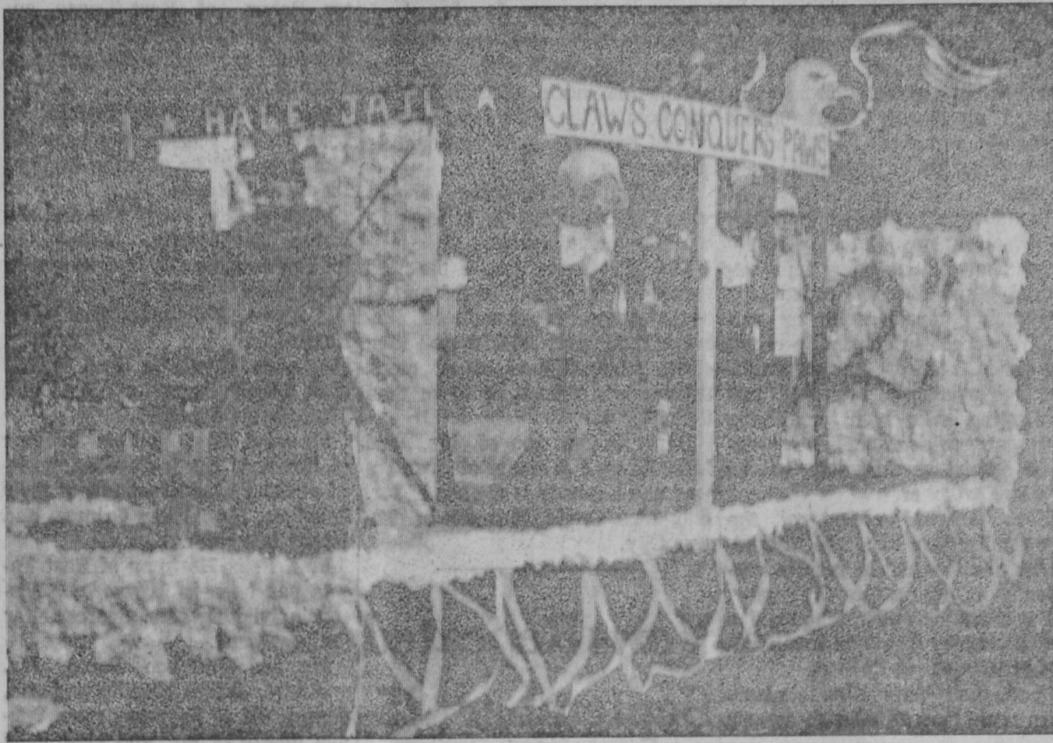

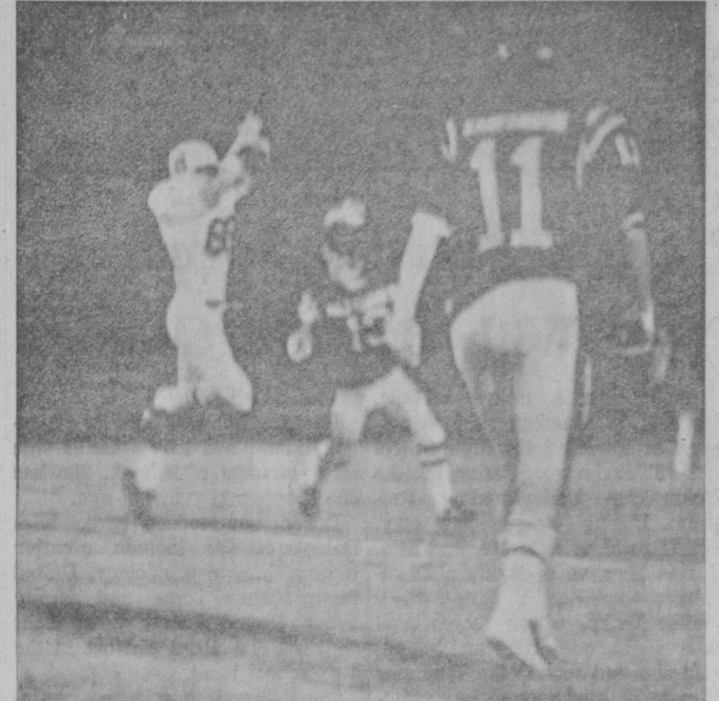
TOM BUSH (32) takes off on a long run for the Hale Area Eagles in Friday night's game against AuGres-Sims.—Tawas Herald Photo.



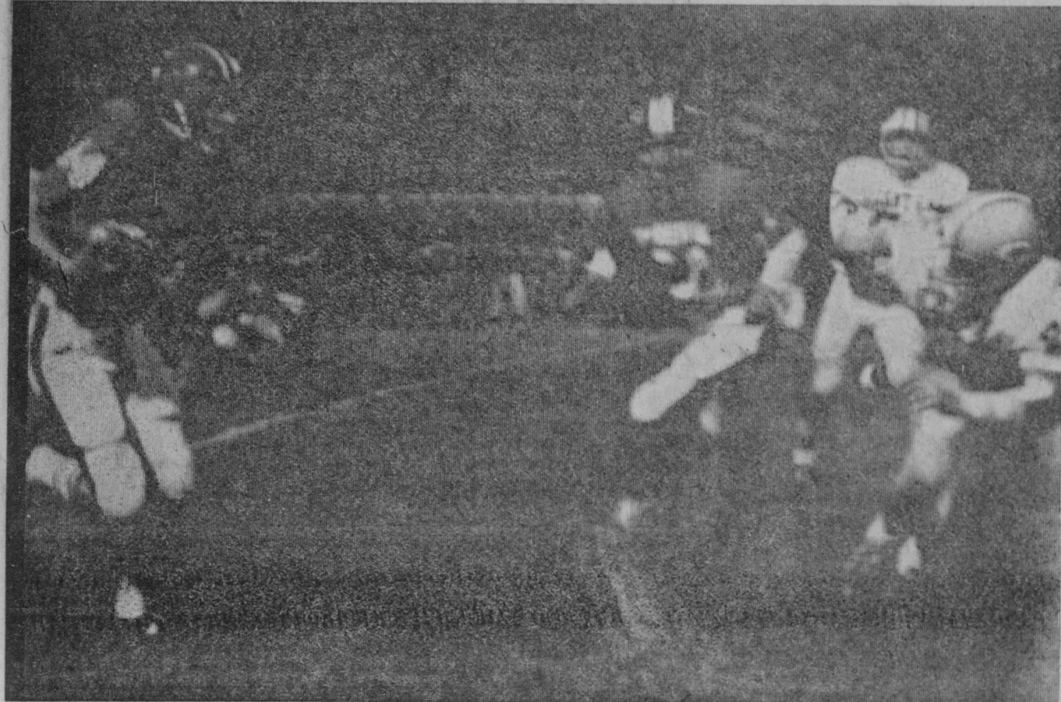

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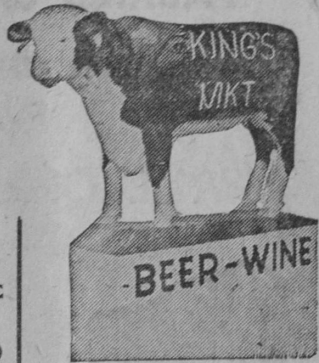

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## Great Debate in '38

# MARRIED vs. 'SINGLE' TEACHERS

If buildings could talk, the old Londo School southwest of Hale probably would recite a story about an event which took place nearly 40 years ago. But, old buildings cannot talk—only humans have that advantage—and, after being reminded of the story, several Hale area residents talked about the incident when Plainfield Township's premier politician learned that his daughter "played" politics.

The story involves a young mother, who took a stand against the board of education, whose president was none other than her own father, over a subject which has not been heard in many years—hiring of married vs. single women teachers. This was once the subject of heated debate and raised so much dust in Plainfield that it took a long time for it to settle.

The late Edward Putnam, veteran township supervisor and president of the Plainfield Township School Board in April 1938, was very decided and outspoken on the subject of hiring married teachers, being against the practice; his daughter, Mrs. Elma Alderton, felt that if a married teacher could subdue a defiant bunch of pupils and, at the same time instill some "learning" into them, it made no difference whether the teacher was married or not.

In this day and age of women's liberation, the question seems to be ancient history—but it was not too many years ago when there was not a married woman on the faculty of the Tawas City Public School. Teaching was one of the first professions open to women, but hiring of married "school-marms" always seemed to be taboo. There were some notable exceptions, however, particularly in Plainfield Township, where a number of married women had served the school district.

Starting with the 1937-38 term, Mrs. Ida Dorcey, now retired and living at Whittemore, had been teaching at the Londo School and, according to the people living in that part of the township, had been doing an excellent job. When she took over the school it did not take her long to discover she had some problems on her hands—she solved the major problem "by wheeling him around and planting one square in the seat of his pants."

The new teacher also insisted that farm boys wash after performing morning chores and before coming to school. One day, a youngster came to school, accompanied not by the sweet breath of spring, but by something that was strangely reminiscent of "essence de barnyard." He was quickly accorded the Order of the Bath—Mrs. Dorcey was for the three Rs: Readin', 'ritin' and rinsin', but parents of the youngster were upset over the incident.

Evidently others with mischievous inclinations considered the question of whether they should run the school, or if the new teacher should run it—they decided against trying it themselves. The pupils soon discovered that their marks were just what they should be, based on the brain power and application and not on who's who.

The Londo School ran along smoothly until the question came up concerning who was to receive the contract for the next year. Word went out that a "single" teacher was going to be hired. By this time, the pupils favored the present teacher—bedlam had been supplanted by behavior and a majority of the people in the district were in favor of retaining one who had the situation under control.

The school board, or at least the president, considered employment of a "single" teacher. Putnam soon found that he and his daughter, the mother of six children, had opposite views. She smiled when he explained his views on the subject, turned on her heel to get out of the farm pickup and started a campaign for the retention of Mrs. Dorcey.

Up and down the district went



IDA DORCEY'S first teaching assignment in Iosco County was the Londo School in 1937-38. The school had the reputation of being a difficult one to handle and she replaced the regular teacher, who resigned after the first three months of the term. Mrs. Dorcey finished that term and the next year there, then taught at National City for five years before going to Whittemore where she was the chemistry teacher for 28 years. Now retired, she served as the first president of the Iosco Commission on Aging and is the current treasurer. She and her husband, Charles, live at Whittemore.

MRS. ELMA ALDERTON, who recently became Mrs. Elton Smith, was a young mother of six children in 1938 when she learned that the Plainfield Township School Board was considering replacing Mrs. Ida Dorcey with a "single" teacher. Contrary to the viewpoint of her father, Edward Putnam, who was president of the board of education, she circulated a petition asking the district to retain Mrs. Dorcey as the teacher—believing it made no difference whether a teacher was married or not. She has been a lifetime resident of the Hale area and she and her husband currently make their home there.

the daughter, circulating a petition among families with children in the Londo School—Paul Revere could not have stirred up more excitement or enthusiasm than did the daughter of the school board president.

Came the night for the annual school meeting at Hale and the Londo School District was well represented by its adults, as well as a number of pupils. Members of the board, besides President Putnam, were A. E. Greve, secretary; Lawrence Lake, treasurer; Florence Dooley and Hugh Slosser, trustees.

All were in their seats when the president called the meeting to order. Glancing with a smile toward where his daughter was sitting, Putnam lost no time in reading the petition and the list of names accompanying it. When he concluded, Secretary Greve moved to retain Mrs. Dorcey for another year.

An uproar started when the question came up of where Mrs. Dorcey spent her money received for teaching the Londo School—she was a resident of Whittemore. The teacher, followed by the board of education president's daughter, arose to say it was Mrs. Dorcey's business where she bought her groceries; Trustee Slosser settled the argument when he suggested

that where Mrs. Dorcey spent her money was her own business and had nothing to do with her teaching.

At this point, Mr. Lake, who sat facing the stove during the entire meeting, turned about to face the audience and made the following observation: What was the use of electing a school board to handle the school problems, such as hiring a teacher, if the thing was going to be run by people putting in petitions to hire so and so.

The replies from the audience seemed to be along the line that people living in the school district in question had a pretty good idea of whether their children were getting a proper education.

Then came the vote: Secretary Greve cast his vote for Mrs. Dorcey; so did Mrs. Dooley and Slosser. Lake's "no" was clear and unmistakable, even if he was facing the stove. President Putnam did not say "aye" or "nay"—he just announced that the motion to retain Mrs. Dorcey had carried and that she could get her contract for another year.

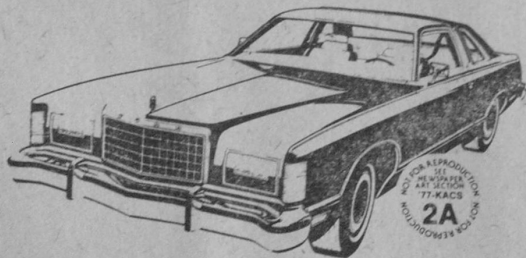

#### HOMEMADE BROWN SUGAR SIRUP

- 1 pound light brown sugar
- 1½ cup water
- ½ teaspoon maple flavoring (or)
- ½ teaspoon vanilla plus a pinch of salt

Bring sugar and water to boil in saucepan, stirring occasionally. Reduce heat and simmer three minutes. Remove from heat and stir in flavorings. Yield: Two cups.

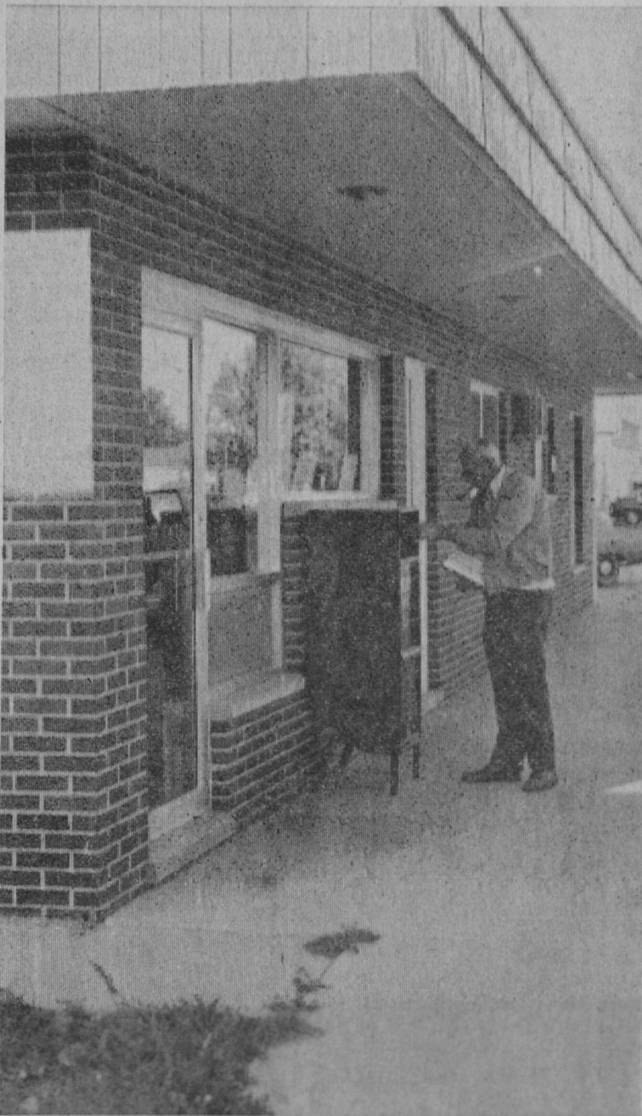

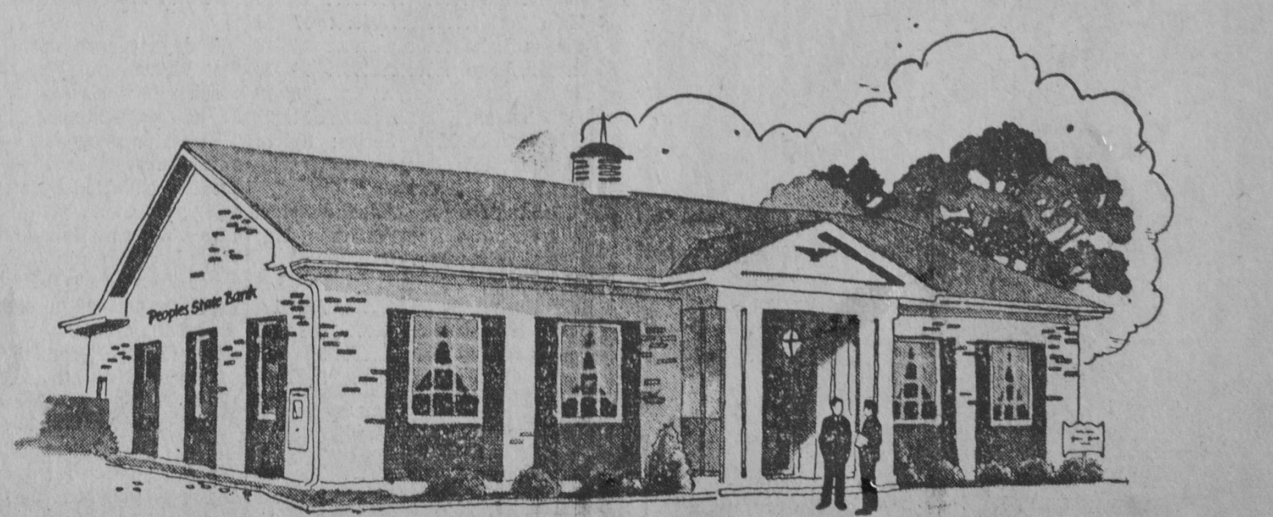
