Lindemulder maintains, however, that regardless of the fact that his doctorate degree is being questioned at Alpena, he has a master degree from Western Michigan, that he has many hours of post graduate work in his field at that university, is certified as a social worker in Michigan and is legally qualified as a mental health professional.


"I was the only director in Michigan appointed to the state's mental health task force," he stated.






TOM BUSH (32) takes off on a long run for the Hale Area Eagles in Friday night's game against AuGres-Sims.-Tawas Herald



Great Debate in '38 MARRIED VS. 'SINGLE' TEAC

If buildings could talk, the old Londo School southwest of Hale probably would recite a story about an event which took place nearly 40 years ago. But, old buildings cannot talk-only humans have that advantage-and, after being reminded of the story, several Hale area residents talked about the incident when Plainfield Township's premier politician learned that his daughter 'played" politics.

The story involves a young mother, who took a stand against the board of education, whose president was none other than her own father, over a subject which has not been heard in many years-hiring of married vs. single women teachers. Evidently others with mischievous inclinations considered the question of whether they should run the school, or if the new teacher should run it-they decided against trying it themselves. The pupils soon discovered that their marks were just what they should be, based on the brain power and application and not on who's who.

The Londo School ran along smoothly until the question came up concerning who was to receive the contract for the next year. Word went out that a "single" teacher was going to be hired. By this time, the pupils favored the present teacher—bedlam had been supplanted by behavior and a majority of the people in the district were in favor of retaining one who had the situation under control.

The school board, or at least the president, considered employment of a "single" teacher. Putnam soon found that he and his daughter, the mother of six children, had opposite views. She smiled when he explained his views on the subject, turned on her heel to get out of the farm pickup and started a campaign for the retention of Mrs. Dorcey.

IDA DORCEY'S first teaching assignment in Iosco County was the Londo School in 1937-38. The school had the reputation of being a difficult one to handle and she replaced the regular teacher, who resigned after the first three months of the term. Mrs. Dorcey finished that term and the next year there, then taught at National City for five years before going to Whittemore where she was the chemistry teacher for 28 years. Now retired, she served as the first president of the Iosco Commission on Aging and is the current treasurer. She and her husband, Charles, live at



Michigan's 'Bird of Fire'



The endangered Kirtland's warbler, a small yellow-breasted songster whose entire population is estimated at only 400, is described by wildlife biologists as "a bird of fire." Because of its very restrictive habitat requirements, the warbler nests only in young jackpine stands in a small, area of northern Lower Michigan. Under natural condi-tions, the type of jackpine forests that provide Kirtland's nesting habitat are produced by fire. High heat is needed to open up cones so seed may be released, newly exposed mineral soil becomes ideal for seed germination. However, modern forest fire control has allowed trees to mature and has nesting. So, in special areas set aside for warbler management, the Department of Natural Resources, with assistance of federal agencies, uses controlled fires as one tool to maintain Kirtland's habitat. Several hundred acres of cutover state forest land will be burned in this program each year for many years to come. DNR goals center on a future Kirtland's warbler population of 1,000 nesting pairs.


