

As a result, Danin and McLean, who were partners in the operation of a mercantile store in Tawas City, took on a third partner in an enterprise which was to be known as the Hennigar Department Store. With the assistance of Miss Desnege LaBerge, long time clerk in the store formerly operated by Butler, Hennigar and McLean made a physical inventory of the store. "We set the value of the stock at \$7,500, which was agree-
