## River Dredging Started Monday

Following two hectic days of making arrangements by telephone for federal and state permits, work for dredging the Tawas River mouth started Monday afternoon.

Contractor for the city project, Roland Fahselt of Bud's Excavating Service, has only until Friday of this week to open a channel for small boats to enter the Tawas River. After Friday, all dredging must halt for 15 days due to a restriction in the state permit.

After May 1, the contractor is to return to complete the project. City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz was called to Florida April 2 due to the illness of his mother. Before leaving, he had received verbal permission by telephone from the corps of engineers to dredge the river mouth, but final permission hinged on approval of state authorities.

The fish and wildlife division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources had withheld permission due to the fact that smelt and other fish would soon be making spring migrations up the Tawas River.

The city had applied for state and federal dredging permits on March 6 and a delay would have hindered a brown trout derby sponsored by Tawas Chamber of Commerce, which is to open April 15. The Detroit office of the corps of engineers waived the usual 30-day posting of an official notice to permit the dredging.

Through efforts of State Rep. George A. Prescott, who made several telephone calls last Thursday and Friday to Lansing, DNR

fish and wildlife division authorities agreed to the dredging this week when assurances were given that work would be completed by April 15.

Mayor Herbert Cholger went to Detroit Friday and signed the federal permit.

A 40-foot channel, five feet in depth, is being dredged from a point near the US-23 bridge and extending 200 yards beyond the end of the river mouth entrance.

The city manager estimated in the federal permit that approximately 3,500 yards of sand would be removed in the total project. Due to the length of the dredge, estimated between 500 and 600 feet, the dragline operated by Fahselt is casting the dredged material in piles east of the channel.

Bublitz said that much of this sand will then be moved again after May 1 to a storage area on property owned by the Lubaway family east of the river mouth. Permission has been given by the property owners for this purpose.

Due to the large amount of sand to be removed because of low water conditions, Bublitz estimated that the temporary opening work by the contractor this week would cost the city \$1,800. He anticipates that the total project will cost \$3,000.

"Without the active interest of Representative Prescott, this project would have been delayed until after May 1 and most small craft would have been unable to enter the river or use the city's launching facilities on Ninth Avenue," said Bublitz.

## East Tawas Store Marks Anniversary

Observing its 50th anniversary of business this week at East Tawas is the Hennigar Department Store, owned and operated since the spring of 1927 by Harlow Hennigar

and later by his son, Joseph Hennigar.

A 50th anniversary celebration is planned for Friday and Saturday, April 15-16. All residents are invited

The senior member of the firm entered business at East Tawas in 1927 with two partners, Charles McLean of Tawas City and Joseph Danin of Bay City and Whittemore. The three partners purchased Gumm's Department Store at East Tawas, which had been operated for a number of years by H. N. Butler.

Now 92 years of age and retired, Harlow Hennigar recalled last week that he was employed as floor manager at the Bay City Cash Store when he was approached by Danin to learn if he was interested in entering a new business venture.

"I was a young fellow and I told Danin that I had no cash to enter business," said Hennigar. The fact that his prospective partner had no ready cash did not dissuade the shrewd business head of Danin—he wanted a young fellow with experience to operate the store, which was a valuable asset to the partnership.

As a result, Danin and McLean, who were partners in the operation of a mercantile store in Tawas City, took on a third partner in an enterprise which was to be known as the Hennigar Department Store.

With the assistance of Miss Desnege LaBerge, long time clerk in the store formerly operated by Butler, Hennigar and McLean made a physical inventory of the store. "We set the value of the stock at \$7,500, which was agreeable to the Gumm's of Onaway and (See ANNIVERSARY, page 4.)

### FAA Investigated Cause

## Plane Crash Injured Two

Two Wurtsmith Air Force Base officers were critically injured Monday night when their single engine light plane crashed about 100 yards west of Aulerich Road and short of the Iosco County Airport by about one-quarter mile.

Rushed to Tawas Hospital were 2Lt. Danny K. Barkman, 25, owner of the aircraft, and Capt. Rod L. Rudder, 27. Barkman received emergency treatment at Tawas Hospital and was later transferred to a Saginaw hospital by Wurtsmith authorities. The extent of his injuries is unknown.

Rudder sustained a spinal fracture, multiple contusions and a fractured ankle. He remains at Tawas Hospital. Home towns of the two men were unknown locally.

Investigating Michigan State Police from East Tawas reported the crash occurred in Section 14, Baldwin Township, about one-half mile north of US-23.

Barkman and Rudder were still

strapped in the two-seater light plane when state police and patrol cars from the Iosco County Sheriff's Department arrived at the scene. Officers removed part of the aircraft's front cowl in order to reach the two men.

Federal Aeronautics Administration authorities at Grand Rapids were notified of the crash by state police and were to make an investigation at the scene Tuesday.

Investigating officers from the local area learned from others who had been at the county airport earlier in the evening that Barkman and Rudder had been making practice night landings at the local field. Barkman kept his plane at the county airport.

In piecing together unofficial details of the crash, officers believed that the aircraft had run out of gasoline while in the air and the two men attempted to reach the airport with a "dead" engine. Only one blade of the propeller was bent when it hit the ground, indicating that the engine may not have been operating at the time of the crash.

The plane was traveling in a northerly direction slightly west of Aulerich Road. It first hit the ground about 100 yards north of the Starboard Industries plant in the Tawas Area Industrial Park. Then, the plane apparently continued on and crashed about 40 yards north of the first point of impact.

Night shift employees of the firm notified the sheriff's department after hearing the crash.

Checking flight records in the aircraft and at the county airport, investigating officers said Monday night they were able to account for 115 minutes of the plane's 120-minute fuel supply. Official investigation into the cause of the crash was to have been conducted yesterday by FAA officials.

Wreckage of the aircraft, which was imbedded nose down in a sandy area, was strewn about the demolished plane for a distance of about 50 yards.

Officers were told at the scene by other pilots from the county airport that the aircraft's engine had been modified for aerobatic performances.

### Police Service Proposals

Proposals by both the Iosco County Sheriff's Department and the City of East Tawas for providing police protection are to be considered next Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

Continuance of a contract which has provided police protection to the city since 1974 was submitted about a month ago by the sheriff's department. The annual contract was extended for one month while awaiting a decision by the council.

Under the new one-year proposal, the sheriff's department would provide police protection at a cost of \$31,608.

A proposal approved last week by the East Tawas Council calls for that city to provide police protection at an annual rate of \$36,000.

Tawas City operated its own police department from the late 1940s until the spring of 1974, when the council signed a contract with the sheriff's department. Prior to that time, the sheriff's department supervised the city's two-man department for one year.

## County May Hire Private Law Firm to Aid Prosecutor

Hiring of a private law firm to assist in the prosecution of Iosco County criminal cases is now under consideration by Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

The commission is considering hiring the law firm of Timothy K. Weaver and Ronald Tyler to assist Stephen H. Naegele, prosecuting attorney.

Naegele told members of the commission last week that criminal prosecution had reached the point where the load was too great for his office.

Tyler formerly served as prosecuting attorney and Weaver served here as an assistant prosecutor.

The two attorneys said an annual fee of \$14,300 would be the minimum fee which could be accepted for acting as assistant prosecutor. In addition, the firm would continue to receive \$150 per month as a retainer for civil work which was authorized two months ago by the commission.

Other topics to be considered by the commission during the April statutory meeting this week in-

clude allocation of federal revenue sharing money. Consideration is to be given to allocation of federal revenue sharing funds for park projects within the county, but it is expected that the major portion will go toward industrial development and job related activities. Under consideration will be assistance to industrial development corporations in the county along with assistance to Baldwin Township for construction of a wa-

ter line to the industrial park on Aulerich Road.

John H. Weible, president of the Iosco County Historical Society, appeared before the commission and requested financial assistance in the purchase of the McKay property at East Tawas as a museum and library.

Guidelines for allocation of the county's federal revenue sharing money to local units is to be considered during the April session.

## Iosco Filed Eight CETA Applications

Eight different applications for CETA employees have been filed in Iosco County under the expanded Title VI program, but it is expected that the federal allocation to this county will meet only one—actually a combination of three different applications for the same purpose.

The one application supported by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, which has the final "say" on approval, is one authorized two weeks ago by the commission seeking 20 CETA employees to provide manpower for the complete reappraisal of property for taxing purposes.

Two other local units of government, Osceola and Plainfield Townships, also submitted applications for CETA employees to conduct similar property reappraisals in those townships. Each of those units have officially stated by letter that the applications would be withdrawn if the county's proposal is approved.

The remaining five applications from Iosco County which probably will not receive endorsement from the county board of commissioners under the Title VI program, but which may receive consideration under other CETA entitlements, include two each from the City of Tawas City and City of East Tawas, plus one from Burleigh Township.

It is expected that the \$157,936 application for the county-wide reappraisal will utilize all CETA funds allocated to this plan under Title VI. Under this plan, 20 CETA jobs would be opened in the county equalization office for training appraisal clerks.

The appraisal clerk trainees would work about a month in the equalization office and would then be sent into the field to work under certified personnel presently employed in that office.

The much needed property reappraisal has the support of local units of government, but it was noted at the commission meeting two weeks ago that both Tawas City and East Tawas had hired a private firm to perform reappraisals and probably would receive no actual benefit from the county reappraisal using CETA help.

It was stated, however, that the two cities would receive an indirect benefit through equalizing assessments throughout the county and the reappraisal could possibly eliminate factoring by the state tax commission, which could have a direct benefit.

The five applications which now stand little chance of approval at this point under the expanded Title VI program include a \$33,746 forestry program and \$27,228 Tawas River reclamation project submitted by Tawas City; a \$13,459 project for Tom Dillon Park and \$41,449 project for the Deloise (Dewey) Durant Park submitted by East Tawas; a \$41,083 project submitted by Burleigh Township calling for development of a township park, plus planting of 5,000 trees and brushing the cemetery.

The CETA program, designed basically to train people in new jobs, has an outstanding record in the county equalization department where a number of persons have been trained under CETA and are now employed in that field.

The three of us met on the balcony of the Holland Hotel to finalize plans for our partnership."  
Born at Oscoda, Hennigar had many years of experience in the business field before entering the new venture. Starting in 1901, he went to work as a clerk in Mores Marks' mercantile store at Oscoda and worked there for a number of years. He left Oscoda to enroll in a course at the Detroit Business University, then worked for Central Electric Company. He stayed with that firm until 1920 when he moved to Bay City to work for Perkins Produce Company.

Hennigar was to stay with that firm for two years and then came to East Tawas to join Joseph Sempliner as a minor partner in the latter's mercantile store. A fire wiped that firm out of business in 1926 and he moved to Bay City for employment at the Cash Store and the later meeting with Danin, which was to change the course of his life.

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# Cycle Craze

"When the ladies of the Tawas commenced bicycle riding, some of the people seemed disposed to criticize the short skirts and exposure of limbs. Finally one old resident, who had taken an interest in the business said: 'No need of making fun of the ladies. Everything is all right as far as I can see.'"

This paragraph from an 1897 issue of The Tawas Herald came at the peak of a bicycle craze which hit the entire country. Seventy years later, the country entered another bicycle craze—if the old resident of 1897 could return in 1977, his eyes would pop over current clothing styles worn by women bicyclists.

Cycling was introduced in the United States in 1876 when a display of English "ordinary" wheels was shown during the Centennial Exhibition. These ponderous behemoths had a large front wheel and a small back wheel and riders were often the victims of dangerous spills.

The bicycle in America owes its beginning to Albert A. Pope, a shoe manufacturer who abandoned that business after taking one look at the English bicycles displayed at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Pope's well run Columbia Bicycle Works turned out thousands of wheels, the common term for bicycles in those days, and bicycling became the rage of the country.

The bicycles were not cheap—costing from \$100 to \$150—but they

sold at a fabulous rate and bicycle clubs were established throughout the country.

The early bicycle craze even hit here in Iosco County, despite the lack of suitable roads upon which

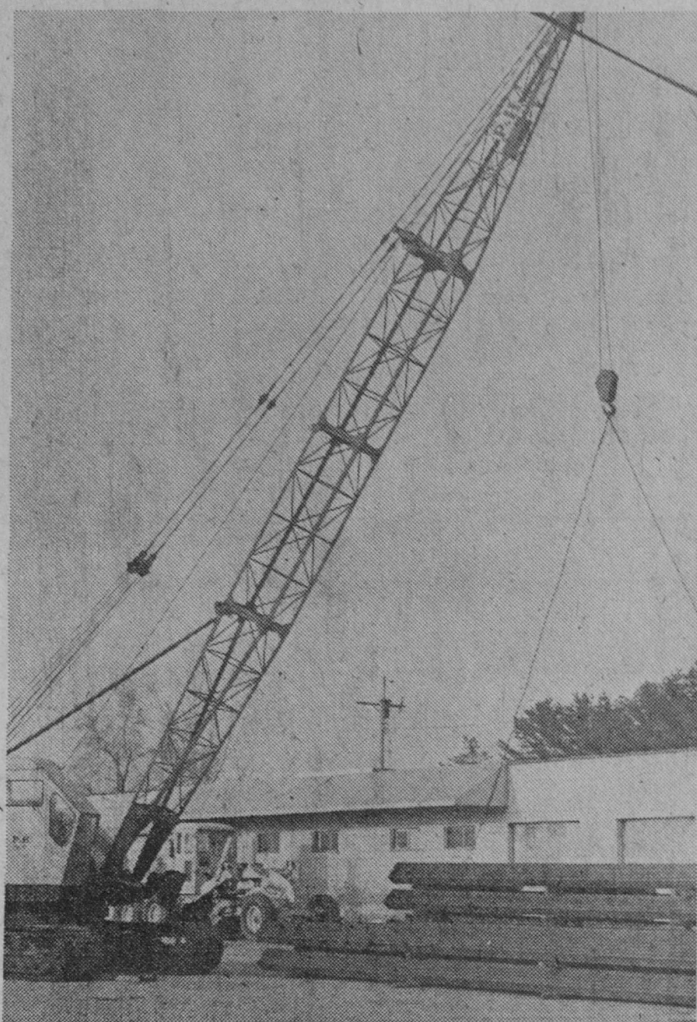
enthusiasts could pedal their cumbersome contraptions. No record of a bicycle club can be found in Iosco County prior to the 1890s, but these high wheel bikes were in use here.

**15 Years Ago—**  
April 18, 1962—A fire which destroyed the lumber mill of Hale Wood Products was no joke to owner, Albert Gardner, even though it took place on April 1. This was the second time in nearly 10 years that Gardner's pallet manufacturing operation was wiped out in a blaze. Work has commenced on building a new structure.

A county operational budget of

\$316,057.87 for the year 1963 was submitted to the allocations board Monday by Iosco County Board of Supervisors. Fees are anticipated at \$25,000, leaving an actual amount of \$291,057.80 to be raised by taxation.

City councils of Tawas City and East Tawas are investigating a proposal from a cable firm which would link the Tawas-Oscoda area in a coaxial cable "snow-free" television service.

Iosco County Board of Supervisors has gone on record opposing appropriation of federal funds to cover cost of constructing 300 new housing units at Wurtsmith Air Force Base. The board feels that federal action is tending to discourage constructing of housing

by private owners throughout the area.

After a one-year "lull," East Tawas Council voted unanimously Monday night to resume its efforts toward construction of a new city hall.

**25 Years Ago—**

April 18, 1952—The Federal Communications Commission has announced a plan calling for 64 new television stations in Michigan operating in the ultra high frequency range, an untapped section of the radio spectrum. The Tawas

area was included in plans for a new station.

John and Charles Trudell, two veteran Saginaw Bay fishermen, are setting smelt nets for the last time and will retire at the end of the run. Between them, the brothers have spent a total of 120 years fishing on Saginaw Bay and Lake Huron.

The crew of Vollmer Construction Company is busy laying bricks for the new Tawas Hospital.

Sgt. James K. McDonald has returned to East Tawas as comman-

der of the East Tawas State Police Post.

Mayor Henry Klenow of East Tawas was re-elected chairman of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors.

**35 Years Ago—**

April 17, 1942—Harry L. Aldrich, regional supervisor for the Michigan Department of Conservation, was guest speaker at a luncheon held by combined chambers of commerce of Tawas City and East Tawas. H. N. Butler was toastmas-

ter. Stephen S. Nisbet, formerly of Tawas City, was elected president of the Michigan Education Association.

Harold F. Black, Reno Township supervisor, was re-elected chairman of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors.

The board of supervisors authorized Sheriff John Moran to employ a full time deputy for his department at a salary of \$1,200 per year.

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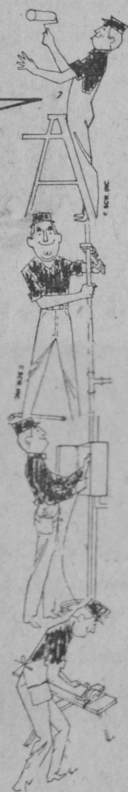

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THIS FASHIONABLE bicycle rider of the early 1900s is the late Julia Rapp Young of East Tawas. Judging from the length of her dress, she did not have to fear exposing her ankles while pedaling her bicycle between the Tawases. The bicycle is equipped with balloon tires, a carbide headlamp and a guard to prevent the billowing skirt from becoming entangled in the rear wheel. The hat must have been rather impractical because of the rather stiff breezes which came off Tawas Bay.

of Tawas City, who posed with his wheel. At the right is the daughter of W. N. Miller, who posed in her three-wheeled velocipede, another popular contraption of the era.

Few of these high wheels survive to this day in this area. According to files of the Herald, Dale Johnson of Hale purchased one of the high wheels during a farm auction about 40 years ago and the Wegner brothers of Tawas City located one of the big bikes in a local barn during the same era. After a few trial spins on the curiosities, the bikes were promptly forgotten and eventually disappeared.

Two years ago, Lester Smith of Whittemore found one of the antique high wheel bikes in the family's barn and practiced with it a few days before riding it in the annual Iosco County Fair parade at Hale.

The Detroit and Mackinac Railway has preserved one of the high wheelers in its transportation collection housed in Tawas City.

Because of poor roads, the real bicycle craze did not hit Iosco County until the 1890s, which coincided with development of the safety bicycle with its two identical wheels and chain drive. The new bicycles brought riders closer to the ground and minimized the danger of serious spills.

Once this new bicycle was on the market, a new rage in cycling hit the country and hundreds of thousands of people scraped together enough money to buy a cycle—right during one of the worst depressions ever to hit the nation.

More than 500 different compa-

nies were turning out wheels during the 1890s and this popularity could be attributed to the fact that the new safety bicycles enabled the fair sex to participate in healthful cycling.

The Ottawa Cycle Club was organized in the Tawases and a cinder bicycle path was constructed from East Tawas to the Tawas Point Coast Guard Station, a particularly pleasant spot for picnics during Sunday excursions of the 1890s.

The Tawas Beach Park opened by the Detroit and Mackinac Railway in 1897 was another popular stopping point for cyclists along that bicycle path.

"There is talk of building a bicycle path between Oscoda-AuSable and Tawas this summer," reported the Herald on May 5, 1899. "It is probable that enough money could be raised here to make a go of it if some energetic person takes it in hand."

No "energetic person" took the project in hand, as there is no evidence of a bicycle path ever being constructed between the two communities.

"All bicyclists of East Tawas, Tawas City and surrounding area are requested to meet in front of the courthouse on July 4 to participate in a bicycle parade to start from that point. The parade is one of the special features of the celebration and bicyclists are earnestly requested to turn out," reported the Herald in July 1899.

Cycling became such a rage that the Tawases soon adopted ordinances requiring all machines to be equipped with warning bells and restricted travel on board sidewalks and the few existing concrete sidewalks to areas which were not frequented by pedestrians.

Development of the safety bicycle also saw introduction of a geared-chainless machine, which proved to be quite popular in the Tawases. Another improvement was the balloon tire, making cycling easier over the sawdust covered streets which were prevalent during the era.

For years, the bicycle was the popular mode of transportation for employees of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway, who rode their wheels to and from work at the mechanical shop buildings located between the two towns.

The real bicycle delirium burned out shortly after 1900, when development of the automobile provided a more spectacular means of transportation. Although Pope continued his Columbia Bicycle

Works, much of that firm's production was turned to production of touring cars.

Here in the Tawases, apparently off the beaten path for current national rages, bicycling continued to be popular up to World War I.

For two or three generations, the bicycle was considered to be the plaything of youngsters and it was not until the 1970s that cycling hit a new popularity. Some 13,000,000 bicycles were sold during 1975, but that was the high point of sales and the craze has begun to wane.

In 1896, a preacher complained that "These bladder-wheeled bicycles are diabolical devices of the

devil and darkness. They are full of guile and deceit." Although the preacher denounced those who "dally along with the bicycle," thousands of men and women dally with the bicycle and roads were thick with wheels.

Bicycle manufacturers are preparing for another boom in bicycling, expecting the country to return to bicycle transportation due to the high cost of gasoline for automobiles during the energy crunch.

Two bicycle routes were constructed in the Tawas area during the recent bicycle craze, one along M-55 and the other along Nunn Road, and there is every reason to

believe that wheeling will continue to be popular.

The Tawases and the Oscoda area are still waiting for the "energetic person" to take the thing in hand and push development of a bicycle route connecting those communities.



