

## No Decision Yet on District Court Murder Evidence

No decision had been made as of Tuesday afternoon by Dist. Judge J. Richard Ernst if sufficient evidence had been entered during preliminary examination Friday, Saturday and Monday relative to binding Johnny Heard of Oscoda over to circuit court on a murder charge.

The 28-year-old dental technician from Wurtsmith Air Force Base was arrested April 4 by Oscoda Township officers and charged with the 1976 slaying of an Oscoda party store owner, Lorraine Kenan. There was no eye witness to the shooting and Heard was arrested on circumstantial evidence. He is being held without bond at the Iosco County Jail.

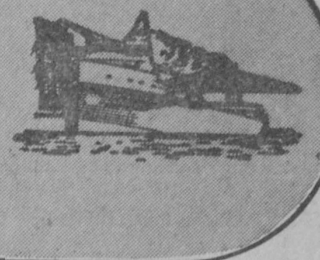

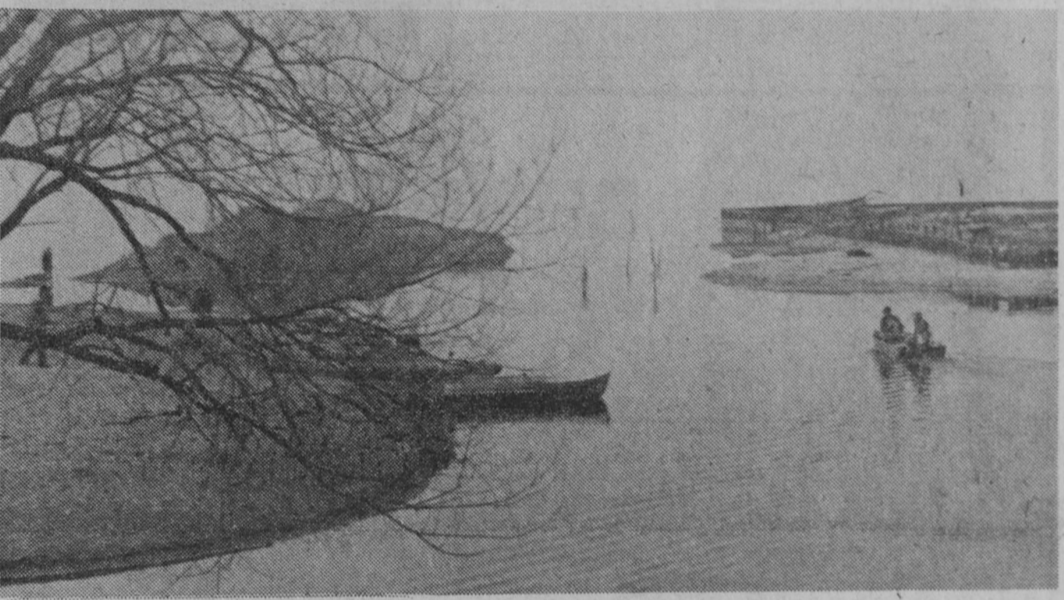

## Upriver Counties Considering

# 'Last Ditch Stand' Against AuGres Drain Project

Two upriver counties in the AuGres River drainage district plan to make a "last ditch stand" in challenging Arenac County, the Michigan Department of Agriculture and the state drain commissioner concerning proposed flood control measures for the Tri-County Drainage District.

At the conclusion of its April session held last week, Iosco County Board of Commissioners adopted a resolution requesting that the augmented drainage board be re-convened to consider a motion rescinding its action of two years ago approving the project.

Donald Griffin, a county commissioner who represented Iosco County on the augmented drainage board, also proposed that the state be requested to appoint a new representative to the drainage board other than Stanley Quackenbush, the contractor dredging the channel had to pound through a thick shelf of ice remaining on the river bottom.—Tawas Herald Photo.

Quackenbush declared that the augmented drain board determined that the project was practical and desirable. A majority vote of the nine-member board approved the project. "That is what the law calls for and, with this approval, plans were to proceed," Quackenbush told residents of the three counties during a hearing on preliminary plans held at AuGres.

Members of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners met with Ronald Tyler, the commission's recently retained legal counsel, to make plans asking for a new motion for a determination as to the practicability of the drain.

Indications have been received that Ogemaw County Board of Commissioners would support Iosco in the matter.

The two upriver counties are to question the legality of the vote taken two years ago approving the project. At that hearing held at Tawas Area High School, Griffin attempted to amend a resolution by deleting Iosco and Ogemaw Counties from the assessment district to finance the project.

After giving preliminary approval for a vote on Griffin's amendment, Quackenbush, who served as chairman of the augmented board, ruled that the motion was out of order. Following remarks by special legal counsel then retained by Ogemaw County, two Ogemaw County members sided with Arenac County representatives to defeat Iosco's solid opposition to the project.

Several Burleigh Township farmers have declared that the cost of a dam site following condemnation proceedings would be extremely high, that other property would be flooded by the dam and that the dam would be of no recreational benefit due to the fact that the water retention area would be dry most of the year.

The county board of commissioners questioned representatives of the county road commission concerning reports that several new bridges would have to be constructed should the proposed drainage project be approved.

Numerous property owners of Western Iosco County have voiced opposition to the project over the

years and this opposition apparently has grown since announcement of plans last month for incorporation of a water retention structure on Johnson Creek south of Whittemore.

day that it was his opinion that the county could be forced to finance construction of the bridges if the watershed project goes through.

According to the Soil Conservation Service, the controversial project is not designed to eliminate flood conditions in the lower portion of the watershed, but it is designed primarily to protect against storms every three years and for storms every five years in the summertime.

In the past, the two upriver counties have been opposed to being included in financing construction of channels and other water diversion devices in Arenac County. Although never officially adopted, 91 percent of the project's cost would be borne by Arenac County, six percent by Iosco County and three percent by Ogemaw County.

## Council Approves Sheriff Contract

A one-year contract with the county sheriff's department to continue its police service to Tawas City was adopted Monday night by the city council. The council's police committee is to continue its study into police protection and possibly make a recommendation later concerning future direction of police matters.

The proposal, calling for the sheriff's department to provide its service at a cost of \$31,608, was adopted by a five to one roll call vote. In favor of the proposition were Mayor Herbert Cholger, Councilmen Charles Landon, William Ezo, Jerry Cotter and James Lansky. The lone no vote was cast by Councilman Robert Rollin, who felt the matter should be given further consideration.

Following a meeting last Friday night by the police committee, a counter proposal was made to East Tawas on its offer last week stating that it would provide police protection at an annual rate of \$36,000.

Mayor Cholger said the committee felt that proposals by both the sheriff's department and East Tawas were offered more police service than was needed by Tawas City. A letter submitted by the police committee to Mayor Robert Bolen of East Tawas asked consideration of a new proposal calling for reduction to 40 hours a week at a proposed rate of \$2,000 per month, or \$24,000 annually.

The offer was rejected Monday night by the East Tawas Council. Following the meeting, Mayor Bolen said he felt the offer by East Tawas had been fair and that his council would stand by it.

Mayor Cholger expressed the opinion that the sheriff's department should designate one officer to spend a day or two each week on the streets to make a show of enforcement. Councilman Rollin agreed, expressing his opinion that the sheriff's department should spend additional time enforcing the parking ordinance.

Sheriff George Westcott said it appeared that some city officials were looking for a public relations person in uniform. He said that he had heard criticism from only two persons on the council and that he had heard no criticism from businessmen concerning the service provided by his department.

Mayor Cholger indicated that the council committee may study the possibility of hiring its own personnel for police work.

## Canoe Racing Program Opens Saturday on AuSable River

AuSable River canoe racing program for 1977 opens Saturday and Sunday with a spring warmup race from Foote Dam to Oscoda.

A sprint for professional racers is to be held Saturday, 6:00 p. m., starting at the Oscoda Sportsman's Club on the backwater of Foote Dam. The race will require about 35 minutes to run and 10 places will split \$125.

Sunday's program starts with a pancake breakfast from 8:00 to 11:00 a. m. at the sportsman's club. Registration for racing is to take place at 12 o'clock noon.

Amateur and professional races start at 1:00 p. m. The course is from the sportsman's club to the AuSable Inn, Oscoda, and will require about two hours.

Prize money of \$500 will be awarded to 15 places. Trophies are to go to the top three winners in each division.

A benefit beaver dinner is to be held from 2:00 p. m. to 9:00 p. m. at Desi's Taco Lounge, Foote Dam.

From 20 to 30 professional teams are expected for the race with entries from Michigan, Minnesota and Canada.

Other AuSable River races during 1977 include the Five Channels Canoe Race on July 2, 3, 4, along with the 240-mile nonstop AuSable River Marathon on July 30-31.

Race sponsors include the Oscoda-AuSable Chamber of Commerce, Grayling Chamber of Commerce, Hale Area Chamber of Commerce, in cooperation with the Michigan Canoe Racing Association.

## Mary Hilbert Appointed New Treasurer of Tawas City

On recommendation of the city manager, Mary Hilbert was appointed Monday night by the Tawas City Council as the new city treasurer. She is to succeed Mary Byrd, who retires April 30.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that 11 applicants for the position had been interviewed. He said that his recommendation was based on accounting backgrounds of the applicants.

Mrs. Hilbert and her husband, H. R. (Jim) Hilbert, formerly operated Tawas Lanes.

Starting pay during a three-month probationary period is to be based on an annual salary of \$5,800. At the end of three months, the pay would be based on an annual salary of \$6,000 and at the end of six months the pay would be advanced to the annual salary of \$6,250, which is paid the present treasurer.

The present city treasurer is to assist in training the new appointee.

In other business, a special meeting of the council was set for Monday, May 9, to open bids on park dock construction, to hear a report from Harold Knight on a plan for industrial relief and to consider the city operational budget for 1977-78.

The city manager said that the council would have three or four meetings to discuss the proposed

budget prior to the May 16 budget hearing.

The preliminary budget presented by Bublitz Monday night calls for total expenditures of \$349,524, which includes \$225,910 for general operating, \$10,000 for fire improvements, \$87,400 for streets and \$16,214 for debt retirement.

Of the total general fund operating cost, \$108,289 is obtained from local property taxes and the balance comes primarily from state revenue sharing.

Based on a valuation of \$11,581,765, the city would raise \$180,096.42 through taxation of 15.55 mills, the same millage as the current year. This would include 9.35 mills for general fund operating, .90 for fire improvements, .90 for equipment improvements, three mills for major and local street funds and 1.40 mills for debt retirement.

Despite the fact that the city's valuation is up by \$874,729 over the current year, Bublitz felt the millage should not be reduced. He pointed out that due to federal and state formulas, for every mill reduced, the equivalent of two mills of taxes would be lost in two years through a reduction in revenue sharing money. The general fund operating millage was reduced to accommodate a council suggestion to establish the equipment improvement fund.

The preliminary budget indicates that some funds are available for street blacktopping, which would also utilize revenue sharing funds. Local funds are also coupled with revenue sharing money to finance storm sewer construction.

Bublitz said that the general fund operating budget is \$17,327 higher than the current year and can be accommodated with a lower millage rate due to an increase in state revenue sharing money.

The city manager said that fixed cost of operating is not too flexible and the city has experienced a higher inflation rate in expenses during the past year than is normally realized.

## Council Believes Smaller Main Sufficient; Table Plan for Study

Action on the proposed North Street storm sewer was tabled Monday night for further discussion with engineers concerning the size of main to be used in the project.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported that plans received from the engineers called for a 42-inch main at the river end. In its westerly direction along North Street, the main tapers down through several sizes of pipe until it reaches 12 inches.

Members of the council and the city manager expressed concern that the size of the storm sewer being recommended by the engineers is too large and subsequently too costly for this city's purposes.

Cost estimate for materials using the 42-inch main at the outer end is \$49,000. By substituting a 30-inch main, the cost would be reduced by \$12,000.

Reduction in pipe size would also lower the labor cost. The present plan calls for the city crew to perform the work at an estimated cost of \$10,000. Estimated cost of work by a contractor would be \$40,000.

In other business, the council took the first step toward adopting an ordinance prohibiting the exhibiting of obscene performances. The ordinance is to be read at the next regular meeting, followed by publication.

When asked for his recommendation concerning the ordinance, Sheriff George Westcott said he felt it should be adopted. He said that his department had investigated reports of "topless" dancers at two business places in the county and believed that an ordinance would be the only way to curb such performances.

The ordinance, similar to those recently prepared for Oscoda and AuSable Townships, defines obscene performances and provides penalties for violators.

Edward J. Barry, a member of the faculty of Tawas Area School, appeared before the council and explained a request for CETA labor to work on a reclamation project for the Tawas River. Barry prepared the request with the assistance of the city manager, Thomas Jacques, representatives of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and Soil Conservation Service.

Barry reported that it would not be known until later this week if the request for CETA labor was approved. He said the project would be of positive benefit to the entire community in that it would improve water quality, improve fishing and restore the river to its natural state.

Water quality of the river would be tested by the state before the project is started and after it is completed. Work would include bank improvement, removal of debris from the bottom and construction of natural fish shelters.

The council would have full control of the work and riparian owners would have the opportunity to be heard at public meetings. The project area includes the stream from M-55 to the river mouth.

A request from Banksiana Corporation for a dance permit at Lad's Padd, which had been approved by the sheriff's department, was approved by the council.

A \$354 allocation to Tawas Knuthole League to aid in its summer baseball program was authorized by the council.

Fees for use of the public boat ramp on Ninth Avenue were established by the council. The daily launching fee is \$2 and the annual fee is \$7.50. Receipts from the launching ramp are to aid in dredging the river mouth.

Approval was given to amend an agreement with the federal and state government on a regional sewer project which would permit an inflow analysis test on the city's existing sewer system. A television system would be used to determine infiltration of ground water into the sewer system. Total cost of the amendment to the step one grant would be \$65,000, with the city's share to be \$13,000.

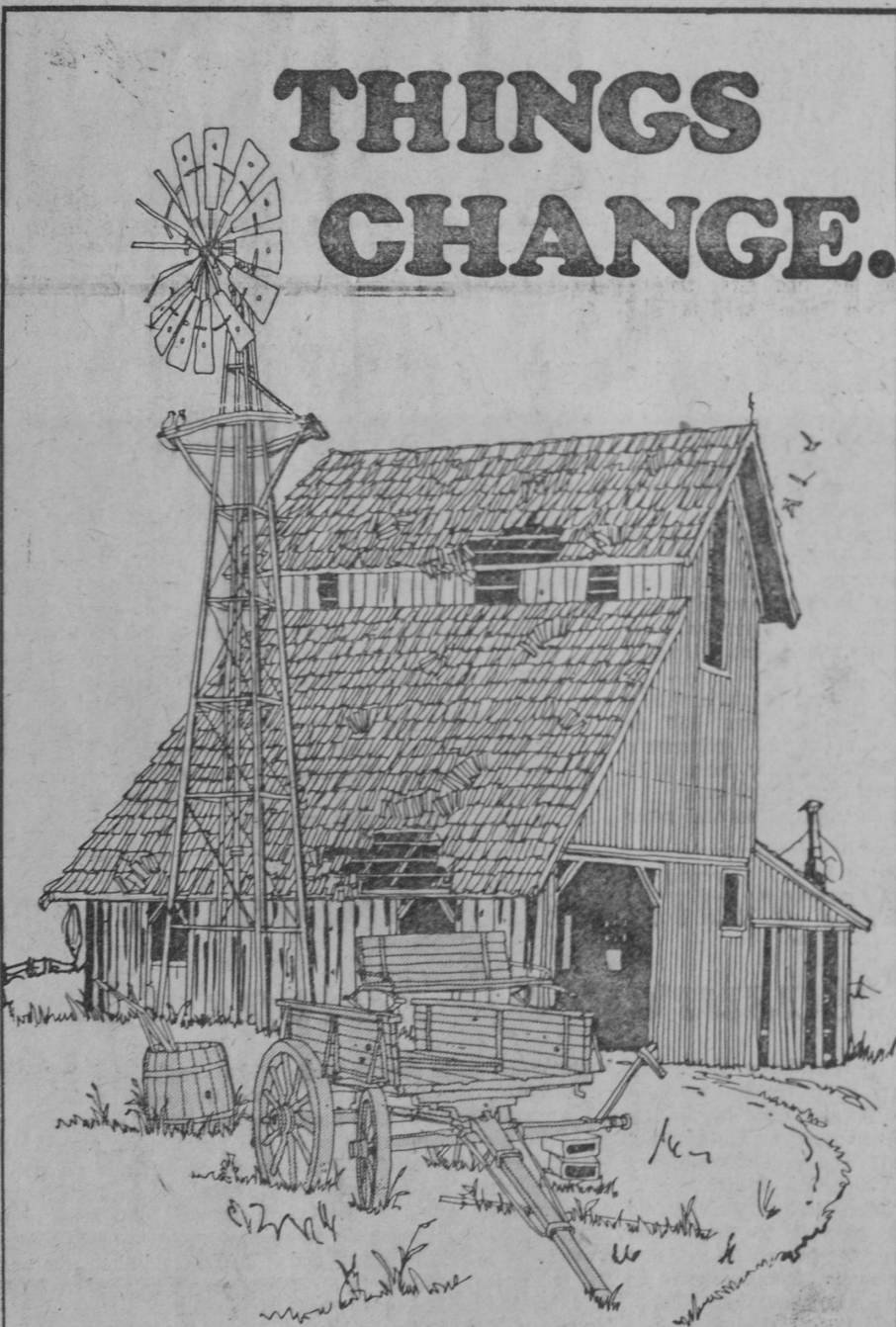

## Melvin Thompson Named to National Glaucoma Group

Melvin E. Thompson of East Tawas, vice president of the 10-million-member American Association of Retired Persons, has been chosen to represent the association on the 13-member National Committee on Glaucoma Education.

The committee, which consists of 13 major voluntary, professional and labor organizations, was organized by the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness (NSPB) as a new initiative to combat preventable blindness.

Two-million Americans, about one out of every 50 over age 35, have glaucoma, according to NSPB estimates. Half of them do not realize it. With early detection, they could be spared from vision impairment and blindness. Glaucoma, if discovered and treated early, can usually be arrested, but any vision loss cannot be restored.

"The difficulty in glaucoma control is that the disease nibbles slowly and painfully away at vision," Thompson explained. "Early symptoms—if there are any at all—are generally only vaguely disturbing, and may come and go, so the potential victim even then is inclined to postpone medical care."

AARP's membership on the new committee was noted by Virginia S. Boyce, NSPB's executive director, "Although glaucoma education and screening has been one of our top priorities for many years, it has simply been impossible for our society to reach effectively the tremendous and growing population at risk—now 90-million Americans over the age of 35. The commitment and participation of a 10-million-member organization in this program will be a tremendous asset to our nationwide effort."

### County Hires Law Firm for Criminal Work

The law firm of Timothy K. Weaver and Ronald J. Tyler has been engaged by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners to assist the county prosecutor's office in criminal prosecution.

During its April session last week, the commission approved an annual rate of \$12,500 to be paid the law firm for unlimited criminal work.

At the same time, the commission reaffirmed its recent action to engage the firm to provide civil counsel to the board of commissioners. The rate of pay for this work is \$1,800 per year for up to 45 hours of civil work with addi-

tional hours to be paid at a rate of \$40 per hour.

The proposal was approved by a three to one roll call vote. In favor were Donald Griffin, Joseph Fox and Carlton Merschel. Jack Allen was opposed.

In other action, the commission heard the annual report of the Iosco County Road Commission. The road commission had receipts last year of \$1,323,567 and the major portion of its expenditures included \$509,884 for construction, \$399,144 for maintenance and \$135,792 for winter maintenance.

The road commission maintains 225.79 miles of primary roads, 661.61 miles of local roads and maintains 80 miles of trunkline under state contract.

The annual road tour by the county road commission and county board of commissioners is to be held May 27.

The county board of commissioners approved an allocation of \$2,061 from federal revenue sharing funds to Sherman Township.

A meeting is to be held between representatives of the county commission and representatives of both East Tawas and Tawas City to consider requests from those two units for federal revenue sharing funds to assist in financing parks and recreational projects.

Due to the fact that work by the allocation board has been eliminated during the next five years, following approval by voters last fall of pegging millage at the existing level, the county's budget for next year probably will not be finalized until July. The regular budget hearing is to be held in October, which would include public consideration on the expenditure of federal revenue sharing funds.

### Tawas A. Fine Arts Festival

More than 350 fine arts students of Tawas Area Junior and Senior High School will participate in the festival of the arts to be held Friday and Saturday, April 22-23.

Purpose of the festival is to demonstrate the talent of students with displays of work or performances.

### Labor Department Commends NG Employees' Safety Record

Michigan Department of Labor recently commended Gold Bond Building Products Division, National Gypsum Company, National City, for its safety record of two years without a lost-time accident.

The company employs 151 people and produces gypsum wallboard. All employees in the company have been given a free pair of safety shoes, according to LaVerne Koepke, safety and personnel supervisor.

The safety shoes were awarded by the company for the employees' 1976 record of no lost-time accidents.

The plant's safety and health committee members include seven union stewards from the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers Union Local 7-239 and the safety and personnel supervisor.

The committee meets monthly, taking up a different topic each month for discussion. It also reviews any past accident and goes over any recommendations made by employees.

In January, the plant was divided into four areas for a safety contest. Each area was started off with \$25. For each month the employees in that area work without a doctor case, they are entitled to participate in a drawing for the

money. Every month without a doctor case increases the amount \$5. If there is a doctor case during the month, the drawing is not held and the amount drops back to \$25. The drawing is conducted in each of the four areas of the plant separately.

The company requires all em-

ployees to wear safety glasses, safety shoes and head protection throughout the plant.

Along with safety training conducted by Edward Kotnik, safety consultant for the Michigan Department of Labor, all foremen in the plant have received first aid training.

#### \$3.5 Million in New Construction

## Iosco Co.'s Equalized Value at \$206,084,147

Iosco County was equalized Thursday at \$206,084,147, with a valuation of \$189,936,077 established for real property and \$16,148,070 for personal property.

Included in the total was approximately 3.5-million dollars in new construction and nearly 1.8-million dollars in new personal property as brought in by the various assessing units.

Although the new real estate

total is \$189,936,077, an increase of \$9,233,327 over 1976, this represents only a three percent actual increase over last year's valuation due to the 5.3-million-dollar increase in both real and personal property.

To equalize the county, all units except Tawas City have equalization factors this year on real property. No factors were given on personal property.

Tawas City, which had an 11 percent factor added last year to its assessed total, had a complete reappraisal of property in 1976 and the new figures were used in 1977 assessing.

A total of \$22,353,576 was added to assessed valuations on real estate in the other 13 taxing units.

Equalization factors and the amount added to each unit were as follows: Alabaster, 1.0889 (\$700,237); AuSable, 1.0422 (\$593,761); Baldwin, 1.0402 (\$637,532); Burleigh, 1.0385 (\$162,587); Grant, 1.3032 (\$2,935,594); Oscoda, 1.3337 (\$13,534,822); Plainfield, 1.0854 (\$2,424,880); Reno, 1.0489 (\$188,099); Sherman, 1.1359 (\$498,310); Tawas, 1.0232 (\$167,201); Wilber, 1.0398 (\$227,151); East Tawas, 1.0182 (\$265,314); Whittemore, 1.0116 (\$18,088).

Iosco County Board of Commissioners has applied for a \$157,936 CETA program which would provide manpower to conduct a complete reappraisal of property in all units except Tawas City and East Tawas, which have completed this work. It is the hope of the commission that the reappraisal will eliminate factoring in all units.

**MAN OF LEGISLATIVE VISION**

History often repeats itself: In 1935, Michigan residents were complaining that property could no longer carry the heavy tax burden and a member of the state house of representatives from Iosco County introduced a bill into the state legislature calling for an income tax.

Today, Michigan has an income tax but its adoption has not resulted in relief to property owners; funds derived from the income tax legislation were specified for the general fund and the tax has gone to finance mounting state operational costs.

In 1935, State Rep. Fred C. Holbeck's income tax legislation was adopted in the house of representatives, but failed in the senate, a fate dealt to four of eight bills placed in the legislative hopper that year by the Iosco County solon.

An influential veteran of the state legislature, Holbeck apparently became tired of seeing the senate defeat his legislation so, believing he could straighten things out among his upper house colleagues, he became a candidate in 1936 for the senate.

A well-known and highly successful farmer near Long Lake in Western Iosco County, Holbeck's local constituents of Iosco gave him a solid endorsement in his race for the senate, but he lost out in his bid for the Republican nomination. The successful nominee was Miles M. Callaghan, popular Ogemaw County politician, who later won the seat in the general election and served one term before being defeated by Ben Carpenter of Clare County.

Holbeck attempted to regain his seat in the house of representatives in 1938, but he lost in his bid for the Arenac District Republican nomination to Alexander M. (Sandy) McKay of West Branch. Iosco County was included in that district.

Viewing the state of affairs of the depression era from a latter day perspective of more than 40 years removed, Holbeck deserved a better fate at the hands of voters of the mid-1930s: The legislation introduced by this farmer-solon brought a refreshing breath of relief to the thousands of small land owners in the state when innovative ideas were needed to cope with a national, state and local financial crisis.

And his concern for the "little man" came at a time when Michigan's legislature was under an odious cloud of corruption—under-the-table payoffs were a routine matter for some members of the legislature and it was a matter of several years before the offenders were either prosecuted or removed from office by the ballot box.

In 1913, Holbeck, together with a party of businessmen, came to Long Lake on a fishing trip. While here, he became greatly impressed with the thousands of acres of the finest farming land lying idle.

A year later, he was ordered to the country by his physician and his mind turned to Long Lake. A couple of months later, he conceived the idea of building a farm out of some of the wild land.

Ninety acres were brushed off the first fall and buildings were started. By the fall of 1915, farming operations were in full swing and, in 1916, he bought his first Guernsey cattle—two heifers and a bull. From this start developed one of the finest herds in the country.

By 1920, The Tawas Herald reported that cream sales from Holbeck's Nordland Farms had exceeded \$25,000 during the preceding six years and the sale of surplus registered Guernsey cattle had exceeded that amount—a profitable operation in the days of the high value dollar.

"Today," stated the Herald in 1926, "Nordland Farms have become not only one of the most productive, but one of the prettiest farms in the northern part of the state."

Holbeck took his seat in the state house of representatives in

January 1929, having won the Republican nomination in a hotly contested, three-way race with Dr. Charles F. Klump of East Tawas and Lloyd Little of Sand Lake. Each man aimed to succeed Rep. Douglas Black of Standish, who was ill and not a candidate for re-election.

Although Klump led in Iosco County with a 939-680 margin, Holbeck won in the district, 2,077 to 1,536, receiving major support from the farming areas.

Holbeck gained a name for himself in the very first session of the legislature by being a leader in opposing a Wayne County-sponsored move to merge a number of counties in the northern part of the state. The plan was favored by metropolitan newspapers and the state auditor general maintained there would be a great saving in governmental expenses to taxpayers of the region.

The Iosco County solon argued, however, that the savings would only be superficial, that regional growth would be hindered and that traditional self government would be thrown into confusion by radical elimination of county lines. (As an example, Iosco, Arenac and Ogemaw would have been formed into one county under this plan and a county seat would have to be selected.)

Holbeck was named to the committee which had charge of this particular legislation in the house of representatives and the bill was defeated. Holbeck successfully argued that the main reason for the bill was that the northern counties would lose six seats in the state legislature and Wayne County would gain a like amount.

(Similar legislation has been introduced at various times in later history, but lower counties of the state gained control of the house of representatives through redistricting according to the federal census every 10 years.)

That same year of 1929 saw Holbeck opposing a bill which was particularly designed to give property tax exemptions to the YMCA and YWCA. He successfully argued that the two organizations could not be considered charitable institutions, inasmuch as operation of summer camps on choice lake front property in Northern Michigan was a profitable operation for them.

Financing of state schools was of prime interest to Holbeck and he supported enactment of the Turner Bill which, in 1930, was designed to raise \$2,000,000 through a state general tax for poor districts of the state. Iosco schools received \$17,404 under this plan.

"If by chance your school is not listed, do not feel badly, but congratulate yourself and your school officers on their ability to run the school on an economical basis," said Holbeck in a letter to his constituents. "Only those schools in which the school tax exceeded \$10 on \$1,000 of assessed valuation came under the act."

Money received from this bill was in addition to the primary school money annually received from the state and represented an effort on the part of the state to equalize the burden of education, which I maintain should be a state rather than a local obligation," stated Holbeck.

He said he worked harder on this bill than on any other meas-

ure that went through the legislature. "I hope that the application of this measure will affect an immediate lowering of school taxes in many districts," he stated. He warned that if the bill did not accomplish its purpose, it would not long remain on the books.

In 1930, Holbeck introduced and succeeded in getting through the legislature a drainage law which permitted the state, with federal assistance, to pay the cost of trunkline drains in the same manner that trunkline highways were financed.

"This bill was the first of several pieces of legislation I have in mind and was the beginning of the fight by rural members of the legislature to reduce the terrible burdens of taxation now carried by the farmer and other small property owners," said Holbeck in his advertising campaign in 1930 to win re-nomination. Holbeck was returned to Lansing by a large majority.

In 1931, Holbeck introduced a bill to compel oil companies to sell gasoline and motor oils throughout the state at the same price after allowance was made for transportation costs. (This argument is still being heard today.) In discussing his proposal, he pointed out that gasoline was two cents a gallon cheaper at Detroit than at Lansing and three cents a gallon higher at Saginaw than at Lansing.

The Iosco solon was best known for his Holbeck-McNitt bill which passed the legislature and saw counties taking over all township roads, maintaining them from funds derived from the gasoline tax. Under the law, all township roads were taken over by the county and state in five years, which meant there was no further need for raising money for road purposes by the townships.

"At once, a big load of taxation the farmers and small home owners had been carrying for years was rolled away," said Holbeck. "I have insisted for the last five years that all the roads of Michigan should be maintained and improved from funds derived from the gasoline tax and this will be the first step in this direction."

During the previous 10 years, townships of Holbeck's district had raised the staggering sum of \$1,442,097 for road taxes.

Taxes were of prime importance to Holbeck, who introduced a bill in the state legislature in 1933 which allowed consolidation of 1930-31 property taxes. Known as the 10-year tax moratorium, it allowed property owners to pay their taxes for those two years in 10 annual payments with an interest rate of four percent on all unpaid amounts and no penalty or collection fee. As a result, many hard pressed property owners were en-

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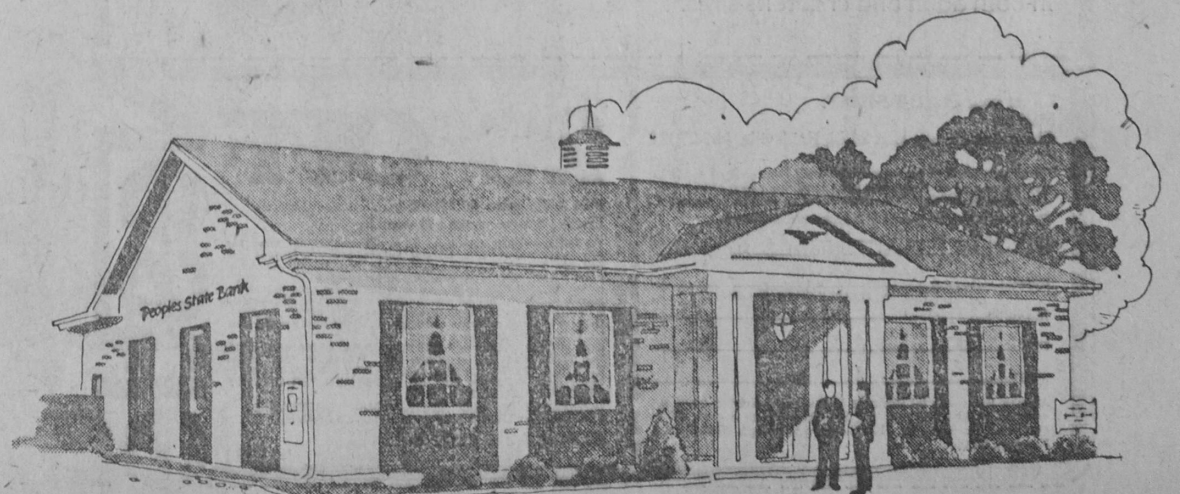

able to prevent the sale of their farms and homes under the delinquent tax gavel.

In 1935, Holbeck introduced a bill into the legislature which would have levied a three percent tax on all incomes. The bill was later amended to a flat rate of 1 1/2 percent, with a \$1,500 exemption for single persons, \$2,500 for married persons and a \$500 exemption for each dependent.

The bill specified that money received from the income tax—estimated at from \$6,000,000 to \$10,000,000 annually—was to be equally allocated to the primary school fund and old age pension fund.

Schools had gone through a grave financial crisis in 1931 following adoption of the 15-mill constitutional limitation and the primary school system was threat-

ened with disruption. Many schools were on half-day sessions and all public school operations were being curtailed.

Holbeck opposed an increase in the state sales tax in 1935, explaining to his constituents that "a sales tax gets the money from people least able to pay and violates the theory that taxes should be paid by those best able to pay."

In December 1935, Holbeck wrote that many important changes had been made in state laws during the past session. "Some of these changes were for the better and some were not so good. We have seen a great change in our tax system and this had to come as property could no longer carry the load."

In announcing his candidacy for the senate, he pointed with pride to legislation which he sponsored in the house of representatives. "My part in securing passage of a number of important measures is well known: The township road bill which abolished all road taxes on

property saved property owners millions of dollars annually; the 10-year delinquent tax moratorium has kept many thousands of home owners from being turned into the road; I spent many long months of hard work upon these two bills."

As a member of the general taxation committee for six years, he was particularly interested in his bills calling for tax exemption on homes owned and occupied by citizens over the age of 65 and his bill calling for an income tax on all net incomes over \$3,000.

Holbeck emphasized that he was in favor of an income tax to fi-

nance schools, which was a state obligation and that the burden should be entirely taken off property; he was opposed to the growing tendency to allow the different state departments to make rules which, in effect, are laws under which citizens are being arrested and put in jail. "Our constitution provides that all laws should be made by the people through their elected representatives," he declared.

Holbeck failed in his bid for the senate seat from this district and it would be many years before some of his tax reforms were enacted by the legislature. One of the

major problems of the 1930s—school financing—still has not been solved in the 1970s, despite enactment of a state income tax.

If Holbeck were alive today, he would be alarmed at the growth of state government. He probably would be in agreement with removal of the sales tax on food and drugs, despite the disruption in state financing.

In his political "swan song" of 1935, he stated, "I would get rid of the administrative board which, to my mind, has taken the right to govern itself away from the people and cost the state many millions of

dollars; and I would do everything possible to stop the present trend toward centralization of government, which means, in the end, the downfall of local government and everything it stands for."

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## County EDC OK'd by Commissioners

Iosco County Board of Commissioners Wednesday approved an ordinance establishing a nonprofit county economic development corporation. Included in the application received January 26 were proposed bylaws for the new corporation. A copy of the ordinance has been filed with the corporation vision of the Michigan Department of State Treasury. Approval of governor is required for incorporation. The commission's ordinance to take effect 60 days after publication and final approval by state.

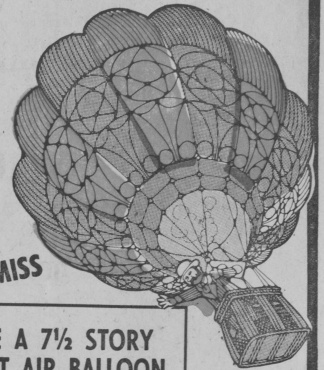
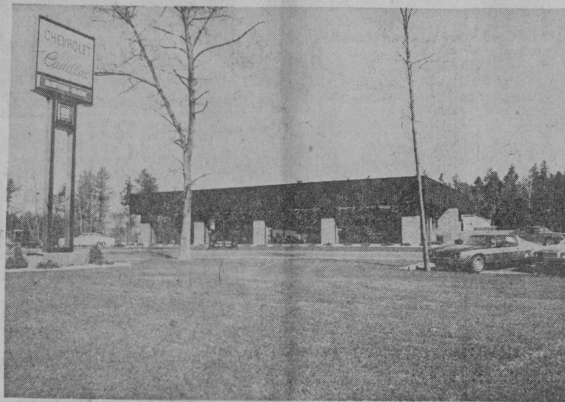
