## TA Announces Honor Students

Michael J. Barry has been named valedictorian and David M. Kennedy, salutatorian, of the Class of 1977 at Tawas Area High School, according to an announcement Monday by Prin. John Alexander.

Barry is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward J. Barry of East Tawas and Kennedy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. David Kennedy of Tawas City.

The school received word last week that Barry had received a \$1,000 National Merit Scholarship as one of 14,000 finalists considered for the 1,000 scholarships.

This national program is designed to identify and honor academic excellence among secondary school students of the United States and to award scholarships to a sizeable number of highly able students each year.

The Merit program is a privately funded endeavor, the only major scholarship competition that is both independently supported and national in dimension.

Barry has also received a \$1,000 school alumni distinguished competitive scholarship from Michigan State University.

The valedictorian has a 3.79 grade point average, is president of the local chapter of the National Honor Society, has participated four years in the school band and is student director. He received varsity letters in football, participated in track for four years and is co-captain in his senior year, serves as sergeant-at-arms of the student council and was a winner in the Veterans of Foreign Wars' Voice of Democracy Essay Contest. His hobbies include canoeing, running and bicycling.

He plans to enter Michigan State University and will study chemical engineering.

Kennedy, who has a 3.52 grade point average and was a National Merit Scholarship finalist, also has been active in school. He was a member of the National Honor Society, is president of the band, is a member of drama and debate clubs.

His interests include music,

drama, writing, science, reading, travel, politics and people. He has taken an active part in community theatre and plans to explore the possibility of working in summer stock theatre. He has submitted stories to national, local and statewide publications and may try to further a career in writing. He is presently working on a novel.

He plans to attend Northern Michigan University in the fall where he will probably major in physics.

## Stark Leaving for New DNR Assignment

William Stark, 34, manager of Tawas Point State Park for the past six years, is being transferred to a new position as manager of the Metamora Hadley Recreational Area near Lapeer.

On paper, the move is to become effective May 1, but due to a total of 51 transfers in the state park system operated by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, his actual moving is expected to be delayed several weeks.

The new park manager here will be Ronald McMurray, present manager of Clear Lake State Park near Atlanta.

Except for construction of the original camp sites, Stark has been here during the major development of Tawas Point State Park. Latest developments this year include construction of a beach house on the Lake Huron side and construction of a water treatment system.

During his stay here, Stark has been an active member of Tawas Area Lions Club, he served two years ago as Baldwin Township chairman of the community chest and is a member of Tawas United Methodist Church.

He and his wife, Carol, are parents of two children.

An airman assigned to the dental clinic at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Heard is charged with the March 27, 1976, shooting death of Lorraine Kenan, 38, Oscoda. She was killed while working in a family-owned party store north of Oscoda.

## Water Treatment System for Park

Tawas Point State Park is in line for a new \$46,556 water treatment system, Sen. Robert W. Davis of Gaylord announced Friday.

Construction on an aerator, filter, steel building and associated work for the project is scheduled to begin in September, after the 1977 park season, according to Michigan Department of Natural Resources engineers and will be completed May 1, 1978.

## For 1977-78 School Operation

# Seek 12-Mill Renewal

A proposal seeking renewal of 12 mills of operational taxes will be placed before voters of Tawas Area School District at the June 13 annual election.

Voters will also fill two vacancies on the board of education from a slate of five candidates, including Dean Parrish, Joseph Reinke, James Russo, Norma King and Kathryn Leitz.

Renewal of the 12 mills of taxes, which had been approved for one year by voters in 1976, had been contemplated at past meetings of the board of education. The board took formal action on the measure during a special meeting last week.

Supt. Robert Halle said he believed the board could adopt a budget to live within the 12 mills of special operational taxes, but school financing for 1977-78 is still uncertain.

Three factors were still unknown when the board adopted the proposed millage rate: State aid, state equalized valuation of the district and enrollment for the coming year.

Unless a drastic change is made by the state tax commission, and that is not anticipated at this point, the second factor should have been solved last week through tabulations of state equalized valuations of units comprising the school district as prepared by the county equalization director and adopted by the county board of commissioners.

The first and third factors will remain unknown for many months. At the present time, at least two state aid bills are being considered by the legislature, which has seldom taken action on a final bill in recent years until late summer.

Enrollment figures for the next term will not be known until an actual headcount is taken next September and guesses being made at this point are pure speculation.

As of last week, the district's budget for 1977-78 showed a 2.78 percent increase over the current year and projected expenditures were still \$15,000 to \$18,000 higher than anticipated revenue.

All governmental bodies, by law, must balance expenditures with revenue and this will have to be

shown by the August budget hearing. By then, the legislature should have adopted its final state aid bill.

Under the current Bursley state aid bill, this school district would have a deficit of \$30,000 to \$40,000 for 1977-78 school operation, but the local board of education is hoping that an alternate bill being considered would be the final one

adopted by the legislature. That second bill would provide a balanced budget.

The length of time for the proposed renewed 12-mill rate of local taxes was not established last week by the board of education and this is to be acted upon at the board's next regular meeting on May 9.

## Mrs. DeBeau Heads Hospital Council

Mrs. Lawrence N. DeBeau has been named chairman of the newly formed Development Council of Tawas Hospital, according to an announcement by Robert Elliott, president of the hospital board of trustees.

"We are very pleased that Millie DeBeau has accepted the chairmanship of this new community organization which is being formed to help develop the future of the hospital," Elliott said. "The Development Council will assist in community relations and services of Tawas Hospital as well as developing financial support on a continuing basis to fulfill equipment and capital needs. The council will be composed of 50 to 60 people from throughout the hospital's service area."

Development Council will work with the board of trustees and the administration of the hospital in fulfilling the long range objectives of the institution. In addition to providing financial support, the council will help develop the public relations and communications program for the institution. Committees will be formed to work specifically in community relations, annual support, deferred gifts and foundations and corporations. It is anticipated that the council will be fully organized by June and will become a permanent, on-going organization within the hospital structure.

Mrs. DeBeau has long been active in many community activities, including Republican Women of Isosco County, Quota Club of Isosco

County, Tawas Area Chamber of Commerce and Tawas-Whittemore Area Community Chest.

Yvonne Dobson won best of show for cake decorating, while Tammy Bayer and Julie Trudell were ceramics best of show winners.

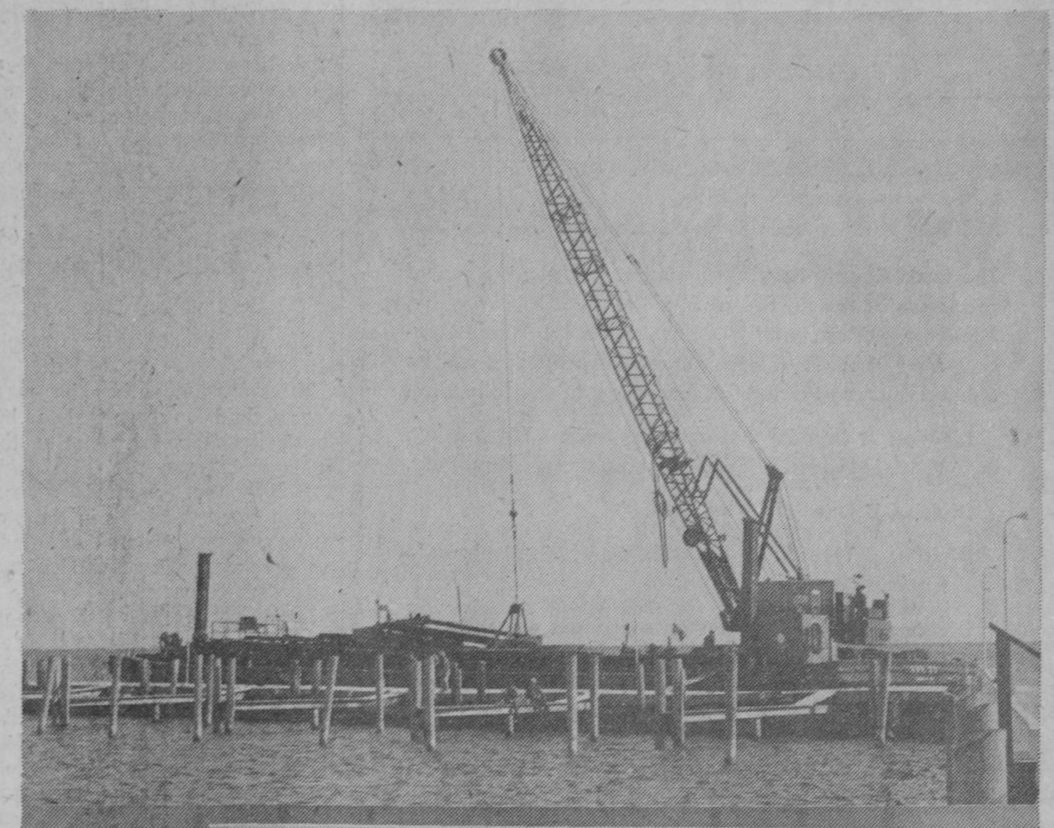

## TA Businessmen-Civic Leaders Hear Gaylord's Success Story

Ten businessmen and civic leaders from the Tawas met Wednesday at Gaylord to hear that com-

munity's success story in community development. The visit was sponsored by TAWAS, the resort division of Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

Robert Haight, president of TAWAS, said that the local group was met by a blue ribbon committee of Gaylord businessmen and officials for an open discussion on resource use.

Ten years ago, Gaylord exhibited all the signs of the community "on the skids." The main street was drab and unattractive with 15 or more vacant stores. More importantly, Gaylord's youth was not satisfied to live in a declining area and were moving to urban centers to seek jobs and eventually raise their families.

In 1958, the Gaylord Industrial Development Corporation was formed and its first success came in 1963 when United States Plywood Corporation decided to build a 5.5-million-dollar plant there. That plant is now in production and taxes, labor and raw material expenditures amount to over 1.4-million-dollars annually.

At the same time that Gaylord's industrial base was being developed, a new program was under way to provide both the tourist and resident population with a new image for the community. Gaylord has an annual snowfall of 121 inches and is one of the top winter sports playgrounds in the Lower Peninsula.

A proposal for adopting an Alpine motif was enthusiastically received and, since the first renovation in 1964, success of this theme has been contagious as more than 49 business places are using it.

Gaylord's community development program is a success story recognized throughout the state; the imagination and perseverance of its residents has seen to that.

Haight said that ideas learned from the trip to Gaylord would be presented to the board of directors of Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

Included will be discussion of a theme for this community as a guide for future development.

## Tawas Board Revising Its School Policies

Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night continued its comprehensive revision and updating of school policies relative to budgeting, noninstructional operations, board bylaws, community relations, administration, personnel, students and instruction.

When work is completed by the board of education and administration, policies are to be discussed and read at public meetings before formal adoption.

Considerable time was spent Monday night discussing the community relations portion of the policies, which deals with the school system's external relations with mass media of communications, citizens committees and other school oriented organizations.

This section also deals with complaints concerning school personnel, use of school buildings and with other governmental and private groups concerned with education.

"The board believes that the best interests of this school district are served when lay citizens and professional school people work together toward school improvement," states one portion of the text. "Residents of the school district should be encouraged to express their desires for the quality of education they wish to have in their school district."

It is the policy of the board that two-way channels of communication be kept open at all times between the school system and the people of the school district. "The (See BOARD, page 5.)"

## Point to Lack of Maintenance at Monument

Tawas Kiwanis Club has petitioned members of congress to "look into a very grave situation" in Isosco County at the Lumbermen's Monument.

The Kiwanis Club points out that grounds and facilities at this nationally publicized monument overlooking the AuSable River have fallen into disrepair during recent years, due to lack of maintenance by the United States Forest Service, which has charge of the property.

(Prior to announcement of the Kiwanis Club's letter, a story concerning the Lumbermen's Monument had been prepared by The Tawas Herald and is to appear in next week's issue as part of this newspaper's series of historical featurettes. The story recounts the dedication of the monument 45 years ago and discusses the lack of maintenance funds provided by the United States Forest Service by the federal government, as well as encouraging federal authorities to develop a historical interpretive center at the site.)

In its petition, the Kiwanis Club encourages use of CETA or some other federally funded program to provide manpower to assist in maintaining the site.

"Several years ago, studies talked of putting the monument in a domed building with surrounding display cases of pictures depicting the lumbering area. A sincere effort and program should be made on this or some similar adequate project," declares the Kiwanis Club.

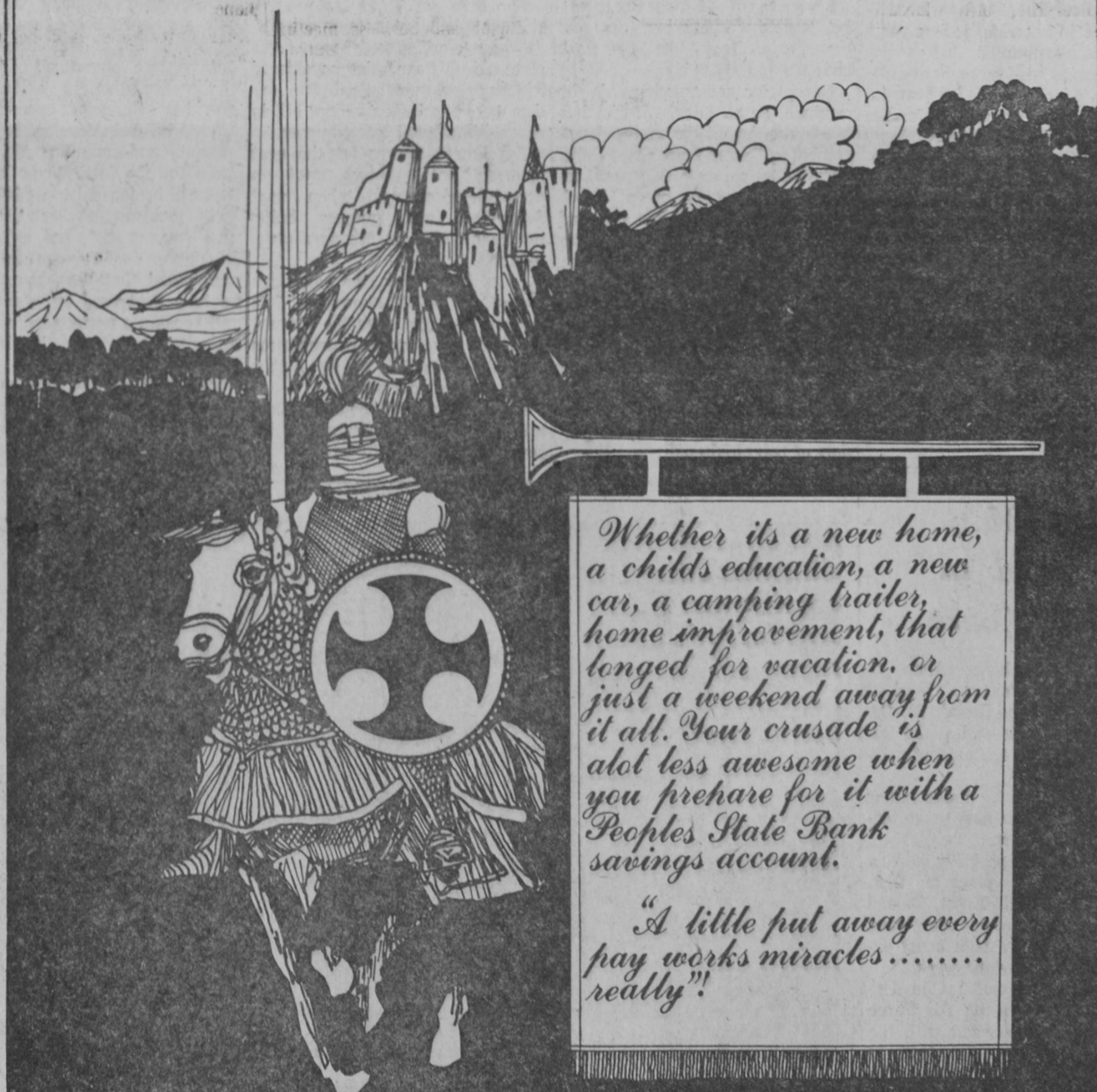

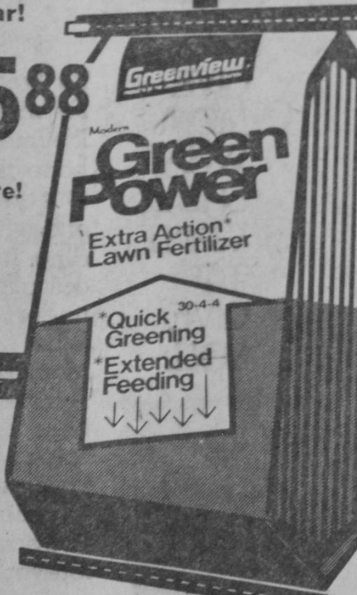

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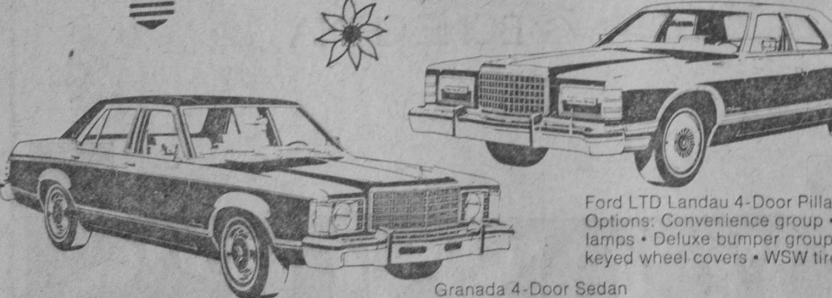
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**Trout Derby**

### Gives Tips on Home Canning

By SUSAN B. LAMBRECHT

Home Canning—The Safe Way  
After the Pontiac botulism scare, most of us are likely to be extra careful when we do our canning this year. Home canned food can be just as safe as commercially canned food if you use the correct equipment and procedures. Correct equipment means using a pressure canner for processing all vegetables, meat, fish and poultry and a boiling water bath for processing all fruits, tomatoes and pickles. Correct procedures mean following up-to-date United States Department of Agriculture recommendations.  
Canning recommendations have changed over the years as we have learned more about spoilage and

about the micro organisms which cause it. Grandmother's old standby, the open kettle method, is recommended only for jellies today. If you use the kind of pressure canner with a dial gauge, be sure to check it before you begin the canning season. A special thermometer with testing directions is available on loan from the Iosco County Cooperative Extension Service office.

For all pressure canners, clean the petcock and safety valve openings by drawing a string or narrow strip of cloth through them. Do this at the beginning of the season and often during the season.

For more information on canning equipment or procedures, check with the cooperative extension office.

Make sure your home canned foods are safe for your family and friends to eat.

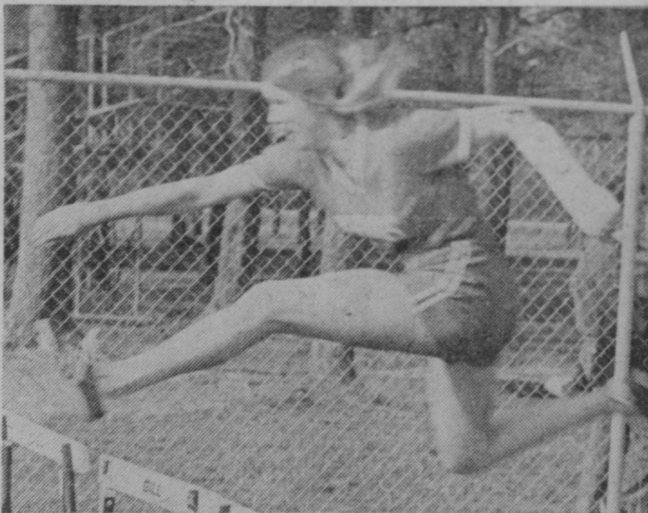

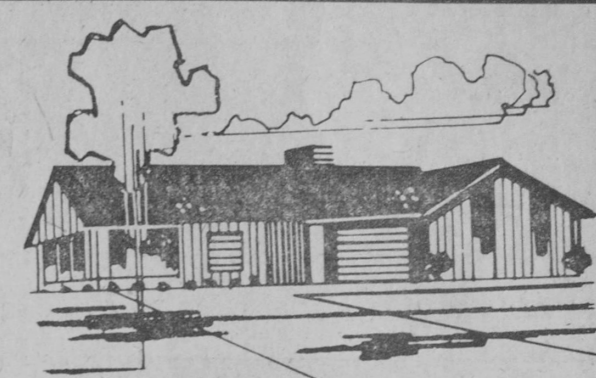

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## Unit Treasurers Collected 85 Percent of Iosco County's Local 1976 Tax Levy

Iosco County collected \$5,455,672.76 of its 1976 tax levy of \$6,479,369.71, according to a report Monday by County Treas. Edward Nelkie. This amount is an over-all collection of 85 percent.

Taxes returned delinquent to the county treasurer's office amounted to \$1,023,656.95 on 5,278 descriptions.

When taxes are returned delinquent, the property owner is required to pay a collection fee of four percent, plus three quarters of one percent interest per month

making a total penalty of 13 percent for the first year and nine percent thereafter.

Alabaster Township had the best record of tax collections with 95.57 percent of its \$309,934.94 tax levy collected. Actual amount collected by John Weible, treasurer, was \$296,204.58, with \$13,730.36 returned delinquent.

Other collections were as follows:

AuSable Township, Mary Spencer, treasurer: Tax levy of \$515,874.66, with \$412,402.17 collected

and \$103,472.49 returned delinquent for a percentage collected of 79.94 percent.

Baldwin Township, Joyce Klenow, treasurer: Tax levy of \$516,979.04, with \$456,341.64 collected and \$60,637.40 returned delinquent for a percentage collected of 88.27 percent.

Burleigh Township, Sharron Ott, treasurer: Tax levy of \$138,520.11, with \$115,447.73 collected and \$23,072.38 returned delinquent for a percentage collected of 83.34 percent.

Grant Township, Dale Butzin, treasurer: Tax levy of \$382,676.91, with \$328,000.60 collected and \$54,676.31 returned delinquent for a percentage collected of 85.71 percent.

Oscoda Township, Maxine Bissonette, treasurer: Tax levy of \$1,817,007.06, with \$1,472,554.49 collected and \$344,452.57 returned delinquent for a percentage collected of 81.04 percent.

Plainfield Township, Barbara Malcho, treasurer: Tax levy of \$1,104,097.60, with \$941,736.07 collected and \$162,361.53 returned delinquent for a percentage collected of 85.29 percent.

Reno Township, Winona Redmond, treasurer: Tax Levy of \$133,610.91, with \$109,240.25 collected and \$24,370.66 returned delinquent for a percentage collected of 81.76 percent.

Sherman Township, Harvey Smith, treasurer: Tax levy of \$160,105.13, with \$144,371.33 collected and \$15,733.80 returned delinquent for a percentage collected of 90.17 percent.

Tawas Township, Irene Hughes, treasurer: Tax levy of \$218,245.27 with \$189,179.96 collected and \$29,065.31 returned delinquent for a percentage collected of 86.68 percent.

Wilber Township, Opal Mallon, treasurer: Tax levy of \$171,605.07, with \$145,617.60 collected and \$25,987.47 returned delinquent for a percentage collected of 84.86 percent.

East Tawas, Grace Pelton, treasurer: Tax levy of \$459,311.32, with \$370,004.98 collected and \$89,266.34 returned delinquent for a percentage collected of 80.56 percent.

Tawas City, Mary Byrd, treasurer: Tax levy of \$491,196.99, with \$426,138.39 collected and \$65,058.60 returned delinquent for a percentage collected of 86.76 percent.

Whittemore, Edward Graham, treasurer: Tax levy of \$60,204.70, with \$48,432.97 collected and \$11,771.73 returned delinquent for a percentage collected of 80.45 percent.

The treasurers collected \$3,517 in dog license revenue. Oscoda Township was the highest unit with \$1,018.

## Rose City Resident Gets Reward

Consumers Power Company today announced that it will pay a \$500 reward to a Rose City resident who supplied information that led to the apprehension of a juvenile who confessed to throwing a dog chain into an electric transformer, causing a power outage.

The incident interrupted electric service to 1,790 customers for about 87 minutes on the evening of March 18.

John E. Wessels, the company's district manager in East Tawas, said that Consumers Power Company has a standing reward policy for information leading to arrest of individuals tampering with company equipment and facilities.

"Tampering with an electric distribution system has serious implications for both the individual involved and the community served," Wessels said. "While we regret the inconvenience to our customers caused by the power outage that evening, we are fortunate that no more serious incidents occurred and that no one was injured. A nearby hospital had standby electric equipment available and local authorities patrolled the streets."

Wessels said the dog chain landed in an area of the electric equipment that caused the transformer to short out, resulting in power being interrupted in Rose City and portions of Cumming and Rose Townships.

# Talking Pictures in Tawas

### Scene of Silents, then Sound

Long before the days of radio and television, moving picture houses provided the major means of mass popular entertainment. This story concerns a coup by a theatre owner to bring "talking pictures" to local audiences.

The moving picture industry had grown by leaps and bounds prior to World War I, originating from sidewalk nickelodeons of larger cities that offered primitive, flickering movies which would later be considered a short subject nature.

Although first considered to be a vulgar form of entertainment, the motion picture industry grew rapidly and was finally accepted by mass audiences throughout the country.

Motion picture houses were opened in the Tawas and at Oscoda prior to World War I and Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Berube were among the pioneers in the local field in this new form of entertainment. In 1920, they sold their moving picture house in Tawas City to Miles Main and established the Family Theatre at East Tawas.

Main, a former Detroit Tiger pitcher, was in the automobile business locally for a number of years and also operated a moving picture theatre in the Auditorium, a concrete block building constructed on the present site of a parking lot situated west of Keiser's Drug Store.

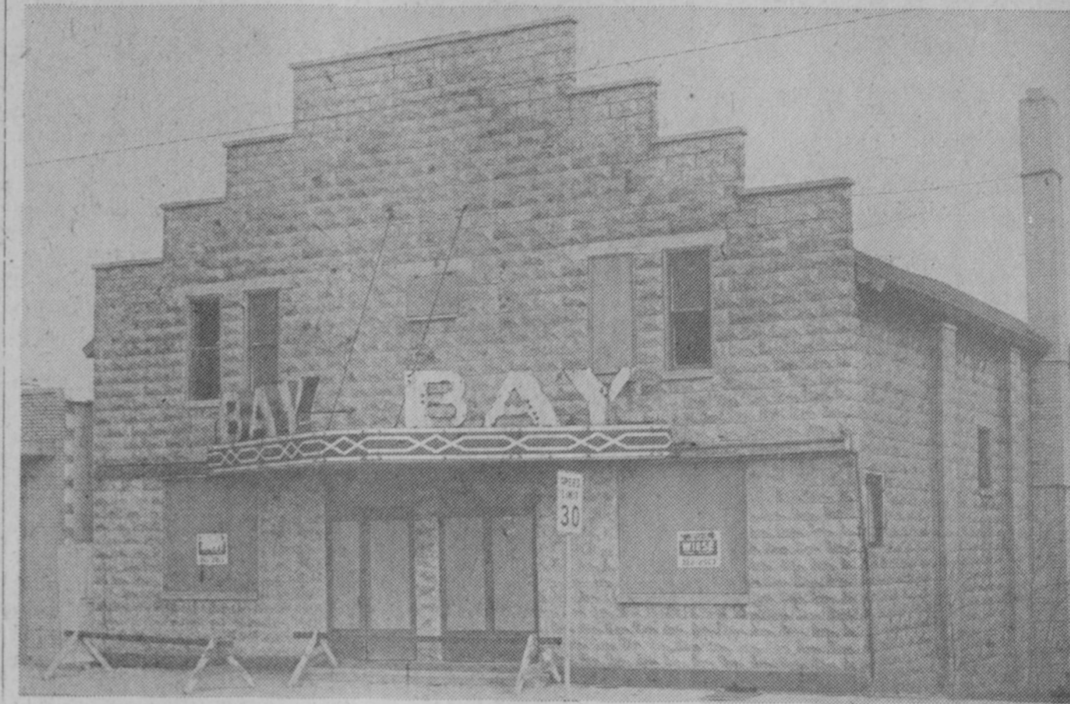
Main later expanded his business with State Theatres located at Tawas City and Oscoda. The Tawas City moving picture house was leased to Jack Davis of Bay City for a number of years before Main again took over management in 1928.

By the late 1920s, the moving picture industry based at Hollywood, California, had grown to such a point that the names of star actors of the three or four major firms were known throughout the world and their exploits made front page headlines.

Despite this phenomenal growth, one problem still remained to be solved by the industry—motion pictures of the day were silent and viewers had to read the dialog of actors, breaking continuity of the film's story line when the words were flashed on the silver screen.

On June 14, 1929, The Tawas Herald made the surprise announcement that the State Theatre in Tawas City had just completed installation of equipment to show Movietone talking pictures.

"The work of installing the necessary apparatus has been in progress for the past few weeks, but due to the fact that the opening date could not be definitely designated, the good news has not been made public heretofore," stated the Herald.

The report on the "good news" was an understatement, as it was one of the best kept secrets of the age in the local area. Douglas Ferguson, who had taken over management of the State Theatre on January 1, 1929, utilized several years of his experience in management of motion picture houses to make the announcement with as much hoopla as possible.

A one-half page announcement in the Herald proclaimed: "The new marvel of the age—hear and see motion pictures at the State Theatre. Our screen speaks; See what you hear!"

The son of a veteran Tawas City grocery store owner, Ferguson, as a high school student, had operated projectors at the State Theatre for Main and later was employed by W. S. Butterfield Theatres, one of the largest motion picture circuits in Michigan. He managed motion picture houses for Butterfield at Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti and Bay City before taking over the State Theatre in Tawas City.

In the Herald's announcement concerning talking movies, the Herald stated that Ferguson "has gone to the enormous expense of \$6,000 to install equipment and obtain the necessary rights to bring the public of this community the best and newest form of amusement that money and good judgment can bring—Movietone talk-

ing pictures, talking comedies and talking vaudeville acts."

The opening attraction at the State was the Metro-Goldwyn-Meyer all-talking comedy, featuring Charles Chase in "The Big Squawk," a Movietone vaudeville act featuring the famous singing harpist, George Lyons, playing and singing four selected numbers and a feature picture (not talkie), starring Olga Chekova in "Pawns of Passion."

"The policy of the theatre will be to bring the biggest and best attractions to the screen of the State Theatre that are produced," stated the Herald. "Two Movietone feature attractions are scheduled for each week. This theatre now renders the same productions offered in the largest theatres in the largest cities."

Installation of equipment to show talkies in Tawas City caught the competing movie house completely by surprise and Ferguson owned exclusive Movietone rights for the entire area, which was then the only means of showing talkies. Local competitors were at a loss to show talkies for about two years, when an entirely new system was perfected.

As a result, the State Theatre in Tawas City enjoyed packed houses for this new and improved form of entertainment. Business was so brisk that other merchants along

Lake Street began to complain to the city council of the lack of parking in front of their stores on Saturday nights.

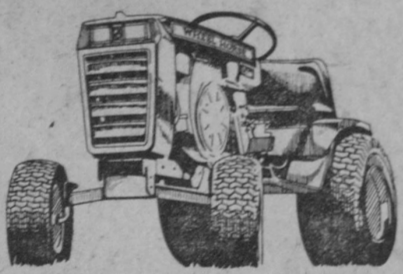
"The motion picture industry really was not ready for talkies when Movietone came out with its new equipment," recalls Ferguson. "The films produced by Movietone were originally intended for silent productions and were modified for sound when voices of actors and music were dubbed in."

Ferguson said the quality of the sound was rather poor, according to today's standards, and voices often got out of synchronization with the picture shown on the screen. "The cost of showing talking films was rather high for a small town with limited audiences," said Ferguson. "The Movietone system consisted of an attachment for standard movie house projectors which provided sound dialog and music through the use of disc phonograph records. Warner Brothers later came out with its Vitaphone system, which could be rendered over the Movietone equipment."

Prior to the installation of the new Movietone equipment, Ferguson had utilized two Victrola phonographs to provide music to accompany silent films at the State Theatre. Despite this previous experience, Ferguson recalls that it was a real problem to keep Movie-

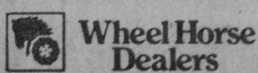

# Mental Retardation Division Recently Expanded Program

More than 45 mentally retarded adults of Iosco, Ogemaw and Oscoda Counties are currently involved in a program which will enable them to become a more functional part of their community. The Iosco-Ogemaw Community Mental Health Mental Retardation Division has recently expanded its day activity program in an effort to better meet the needs of the retarded in the area.

There are now two centralized day activity centers. The center for Iosco County is located at the Hope Lutheran Church hall, Oscoda. Residents of Ogemaw and Oscoda Counties are served through a center located in the hall of the Calvary Baptist Church, West Branch.

Each center offers training in basic daily living skills, based on the individual's needs and is geared to his functional level. Centers are held on a twice a week, year around basis.

The retarded from this county are transported from their doors to the center by the Iosco Public Transit bus. There, they are met by a professional and volunteer staff.

Two activity counselors, Lindsey Mertz and Donna Morris, provide the training in skills and activities necessary for adult living and

social adjustment. The volunteers, dedicated men and women from the local community, devote five to 10 hours a week of their time and energy to assist in skill instruction and to offer program input from their own areas of interest and expertise.

The activity program focuses on the individual. Instruction begins at the level of performance related to the simplest of adult living skills and progresses to the point where these individuals are able to assume increasing adult responsibilities in accord with their potential.

Developing appropriate grooming and personal habits, independent traveling skills, homemaking, work and communication skills, recreational and leisure time interest are the basic objectives included in each person's service plan.

In one aspect, this program bridges the gap from the school to a sheltered workshop for those post-school age mentally retarded, who are not ready for a work-oriented program. However, many of the 18 center attenders from Iosco County have benefited from being involved in both the day activity program and a sheltered workshop.

In addition to biweekly activi-

ties, the groups are anxiously awaiting many special upcoming events which include the Mid-Michigan handicapped bowling tournament at Midland, regional special Olympics competition and state special Olympics at Mt. Pleasant, a visit to Mackinac Island, trips to the county fairs and various local events.

## Two Auto Negligence Suits Filed in Iosco Circuit Court

Damages totaling one-million-dollars are being sought in an automobile negligence suit filed in Iosco County Circuit Court concerning a two-car collision November 14, 1975, in Sherman Township.

A second auto negligence suit was filed in circuit court here involving a fatal accident on July 7, 1975, at East Tawas.

A two-count suit was filed by John L. Shaffer Jr., Ethel J. Shaffer, John L. Shaffer III and Cheryl L. Shaffer vs. Ronald E. McIvor and Elda McIvor of Prescott and Vincent J. Pezzimonte, doing business as Rainbow Gardens at National City.

John L. Shaffer Jr., with John L.

Shaffer III as a passenger, was operating his motor vehicle in an easterly direction on Whittemore Road. At the National City Road intersection, the plaintiff's petition claims that Ronald E. McIvor ran a stop sign and collided with the Shaffer vehicle.

The two Shaffers sustained permanent injuries in the crash. John Shaffer III asks damages of \$200,000 and John Shaffer Jr. seeks damages of \$250,000. Wives of the two men seek damages of \$25,000 each.

The second count claims that Rainbow Gardens had served intoxicating beverages to McIvor, who was operating Elda McIvor's automobile. The plaintiffs seek identical damages of \$500,000 against the owner of the tavern.

Plaintiff in the second case is Thomas Sullivan, representative of the estate of Larry D. Sullivan, deceased. The defendant is Thomas Danforth Dixon.

The petition states that Sullivan was a passenger in Dixon's pickup truck, which left Oscoda and proceeded on US-23 to East Tawas. The petition claims that Dixon drove in a negligent manner, losing control of the vehicle and striking a telephone pole. Larry D. Sullivan died four hours after the crash.

Sullivan, brother of the deceased, along with his mother, Virginia, and brother, Lee J. Sullivan, ask a judgment totaling \$204,172.85.

## Junior Braves Split Decisions

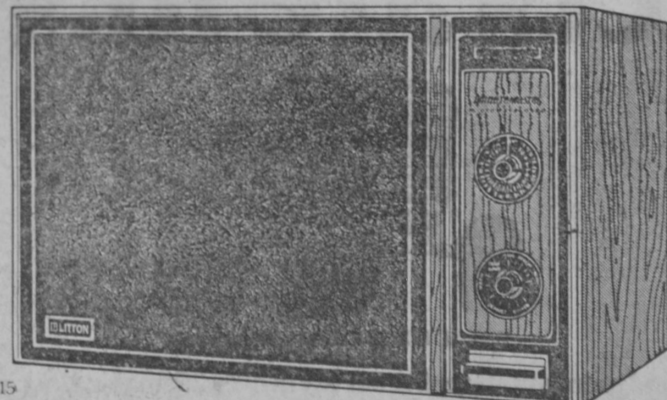
Tawas Area Junior Varsity Braves won two baseball games and lost two games during action last week.

The Herald reported in 1929 that Ferguson "expressed the opinion that, during the past five months which he has been operating the State Theatres of this city and Oscoda, that he has been very well satisfied with the whole hearted way in which the show patrons have accepted his choice of amusement and, also, that he is very thankful for the support which the public has given the attractions at both theatres."

Ferguson was to operate the State Theatre for another two years before disposing of the business to new owners. In 1931, the Family Theatre at East Tawas installed new equipment to show sound-on-film movies, a revolutionary step forward in the motion picture industry. Similar equipment was installed the same year in the Tawas City motion picture house.

But Ferguson's coup in providing the first talking pictures to local audiences—no matter how poor the quality of sound synchronization and primitive equipment—is still remembered to this day by many Tawas City residents. Ferguson is now retired from business and he and his wife live in Baldwin Township.

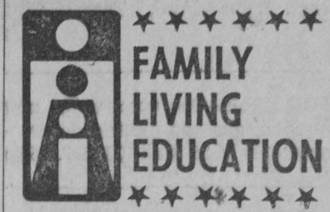

The Independence is a 1,046-foot long "Forrestal" class aircraft carrier. She carries a crew of 2,790 officers and enlisted men, plus 2,150 personnel assigned to an attack aircraft wing. She has the capability of carrying 85 jet aircraft and can travel at speeds of up to 35 knots.

During the cruise, the ship is scheduled to participate in numerous training operations and exercises with other sixth fleet units and ships of allied nations, and to visit various Mediterranean ports.

Nothing spells SPRING in larger letters than fresh fruits and vegetables. They do more than raise our spirits... they contribute a large proportion of needed vitamins A and C, minerals and fiber.

Many Americans eat too much meat, leaving too little money to buy fruits or vegetables. Vegetables especially get short-changed. And it shows. In a survey conducted by the United States Department of Agriculture, it was found that shoppers with good diets spent their average food dollar like this: 38 Cents on meat, poultry, fish, eggs, nuts and dry legumes; 12 cents on flour, cereals and bakery products; 14 cents on milk products; 21 cents on fruits and vegetables; 15 cents on sugar, fats, beverages and seasonings.

Shoppers with poor diets spent their average food dollar like this: 45 Cents on meat, poultry, fish, eggs, nuts and dry legumes; 12 cents on flour, cereals and bakery products; 10 cents on milk products; 14 cents on fruit and vegetables; 20 cents on sugar, fats, beverages and seasonings.

In essence, shoppers waste too much money on meat. The more limited the food budget, the more limited one must be on the size of meat servings as well as on the kinds of cuts purchased.

Most shoppers are surprised to find that two servings of meat, fish or poultry supply adequate protein for an adult. Children under six years of age require only one serving. A serving is two to three ounces of boneless, cooked, lean meat.

For one-half servings of meat, substitute one egg, one-half cup cooked dry beans or peas, two tablespoons peanut butter or a one-ounce slice of American cheese.

To interest your family in eating more from the vegetable group, try garnishing vegetable dishes. Chopped onion and bits of fried bacon with seasoned green beans is an old favorite. Parsley adds color and flavor to buttered carrots and boiled potatoes. Lemon wedges, ready for squeezing over broccoli, zip up the flavor at no additional cost in calories.

Most youngsters like cheese, so cheese sauce can turn less popular vegetables into more desirable fare from their viewpoint. Cheese sauce does add calories and cost, so its use should be limited. Allow two tablespoons of sauce per serving of vegetable.

An eight-ounce jar (one cup) of cheese food spread that can be heated and used as is for cheese sauce over hot vegetables sells for about 90 cents. A similar product that has good keeping qualities can be made for about two-thirds the cost and little work. The recipe below, figured at February prices, yields about two cups of sauce for \$1.23.

**Cheese Sauce/Cocktail Cheese Spread**  
 1/2 lb. processed cheese, cubed  
 1 5.33 oz. can evaporated milk  
 1/4 cup water  
 1/4 lb. butter or margarine  
 1 tsp. scraped onion or  
 1 tsp. garlic salt or  
 1/2 clove garlic, scraped  
 Measure ingredients into top of double boiler. Stir over hot water until cheese is melted and all ingredients are well blended. Use as is over hot, well drained vegetables. Sauce may be made ahead or

leftover cheese sauce may be put into a jar, sealed and refrigerated. Heat to serve in the top of a double boiler. This sauce will keep two-three weeks refrigerated. Yield: Two cups. When cold, mixture has the consistency of cream cheese and makes a good spread for crackers.
