Final Plans Approved for New Kroger Store

On recommendation of the city planning commission, Tawas City Council Monday night approved plans for construction of the new Tawas Kroger Store. Construction

is to begin immediately. The new building, to be located directly across US-23 from the present store, is to be 142 by 176 feet of block and brick construction. The site plan includes a 185-

car parking lot. Plans for the project were presented by Larry Rose of O. S. Rose Builders, Incorporated, Tawas City. Owners are Mr. and Mrs. John A. LeClair and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas LeClair.

Expansion and development of the new Kroger Store has been under consideration since last November. At that time, the council vacated a portion of River Street for store parking purposes and later vacated the entire street for that purpose.

Under an agreement with the

property owners, the street is to remain open to traffic and the city retained an easement for water and sewer service.

The new store is to be located on the western side of the property with the parking lot extending on both the east and west sides of River Street. The former American Legion Hall was purchased for

parking and is being removed. The parking lot is to have four entrances, one off US-23, one off Wheeler Street, one off Court Street and one off River Street. Court Street extending along the rear of the property is to provide an alternate route to First Street on the west and M-55 on the east, avoiding traffic on US-23.





Find Body of Royal Oak Man Missing Since May

Body of a 67-year-old Royal Oak man, who had been missing since May 1976, was found Sunday morning by a search party composed of Iosco County Sheriff's Department officers and members of the Hale Area Citizens Patrol.

Identification of Leonard John Seece, whose skeleton was found in a wooded area 100 yards south of M-65 and one mile west of the AuSable River Camp, Oscoda Township, was made through papers found in his wallet.

A pickup truck owned by Seece had been found abandoned along M-65 on May 15, 1976. A registration check on the vehicle was made at the time but the owner could not be located. After holding the vehicle for nine months, application was made for a title transter and notification was sent to the owner's last mailing address.

A relative notified the sheriff's department in February that Seece had been despondent when last seen. The ground was covered with snow in February, which delayed a thorough search of the area where the truck had been lo-

The remains were found only a short distance from the coast-tocoast riding and hiking trail.

(Published by direction of the Michigan Public Service Commission)

On March 11, 1977, Michigan Consolidated Gas On March 11, 1977, Michigan Consolidated Gas-Company (Consolidated) filed an application with sup-porting testimony and exhibits with the Michigan Public Service Commission (the Commission) in Case No. U-5365 requesting authority to file revised gas rate schedules designed to increase its annual revenues from sale of gas to customers in Michigan by approximately \$110 million. On March 17, 1977, Consolidated filed an amendment to the Application. Consolidated requests that the revised rate schedules become effective by January 1, 1978.

January 1, 1978.

Consolidated states that it is engaged in two separate lines of business. Its Utility Division, subject to the jurisdiction of the Commission, furnishes natural the jurisdiction of the Commission, turnishes natural gas at retail to approximately one million customers in its districts of Detroit, Grand Rapids, Muskegon, Ann Arbor, Big Rapids, Greenville-Belding, Mt. Pleasant, Traverse City, Ludington, Cadillac, Manistee, Petoskey, Alpená, Grayling, Tawas, Cheboygan and Upper Peninsula, all within the State of Michigan. Its Interstate Storage Division, subject to jurisdiction of the Federal Power Commission furnishes gas storage service for Power Commission, furnishes gas storage service for interstate pipelines and gas distribution utilities serving states other than Michigan. Consolidated's application is filed on behalf of its Utility Division and relates entirely to rates for natural gas sold to customers in Michigan.

Consolidated represents that since its current rates became effective on September 1, 1975, there has been continuing inflation in all sectors of the economy; that it has experienced substantial increases in operating expenses, capital costs, and taxes; and that it will incur additional substantial increases in operating expenses and capital costs in 1977 over the levels experienced in 1976. These increased costs include increases in wage and fringe benefits, other operating expenses, deprecia-tion, taxes, interest charges, and preferred stock

Consolidated states that it has continuously furnished gas to its customers and supplied new and additional gas service for residential, commercial, and essential industrial uses, and that it will continue to do so not withstanding curtailments by interstate pipeline suppliers. Consolidated states, however, that it will be unable to continue certain short-term non-essential sales. Consolidated proposes to create an emergency reserve of gas to protect its customers against future energy supply contingencies by husbanding a total of approximately 20 Bcf of gas in 1977 and 1978. Consolidated requests rates based on a level and mix of gas sales reflecting gas supply available to it and appropriate use thereof.

Consolidated avers that a return of 9% on its utility property, including a return of 14.5% on utility common equity, is reasonable and necessary to enable it to raise capital necessary for serving the public. The Company requests that rates be prescribed which will permit it to recover deprecation expense at the rates for which it is applying in MPSC Case No. 145322. 


