## Foster is Chairman of Mental Health

Robert Foster, Oscoda Township supervisor, was elected chairman of the Iosco-Ogemaw County Mental Health Board during its annual reorganizational meeting held Monday night at the Iosco County Building.

Serving with Foster are Norman Miller, Prescott, vice chairman; Susan Sweeney, AuSable, secretary; Robert Marsh, Baldwin Township, treasurer. Both Mrs. Sweeney and Marsh were recently reappointed to the board by the county board of commissioners.

Other members of the mental health board include Kathryn Sias, East Tawas; Jane Zess, Sand Lake; Carlton Merschel, chairman of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, East Tawas; Carolyn

Brummund, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Hiram Rose, Rose City; Russell Mason, Rose City; Ralph Spring, West Branch.

The mental health board approved extension of the one year contract of Floyd Smith, director of the mental health district.

The board accepted the audit of its certified public accountant, which was highly complimentary of the work performed by the district's bookkeeper.

Iosco-Ogemaw County Mental Health Board was formed a year ago following a reorganization with the Northeastern Mental Health District.

Consideration is now being given by county boards of commissioners toward a request from Oscoda County to join the district. At the present time, Oscoda County is served by this district under contract, although it remains a member of the Northeastern Michigan Mental Health District.

## Urge Consideration of Joint City Garage

Membership of Tawas City Businessmen's Association went on record December 8 encouraging East Tawas and Tawas City to consider construction of a joint city garage.

Signed by Leonard Hosbach, association president, the resolution urged the two city councils to "consider the possibility of a joint effort for the construction of a common facility to satisfy the current need of both communities."

Both cities are currently considering the need for a new city garage. Discussion at the meeting indicated that a common facility for storage of equipment "may facilitate the exchange of equipment between the communities as necessary."

It was also felt that construction of one facility would also result in less over-all construction costs.

In a letter specifically addressed to the East Tawas City Council, the businessmen's association stated: "We respectfully encourage your body of officers to pursue a course of communication with the council of the other city to at least study the feasibility of such a joint project before embarking on separate avenues of this development."

East Tawas must give immediate attention to a new city garage as the present facility east of the state police post is to be removed for location of a new small boat launching facility. One site under consideration is the former county garage.

Tawas City Council has discussed the possibility of constructing a new city garage at a location other than the present one on Fourth Street.

## Tax Revolving Fund Topic of County Meeting Today

Iosco County Board of Commissioners is meeting this morning (Wednesday) with township and school officials concerning establishment of a county tax revolving fund.

This proposal, which was first considered about three years ago, has been under study here since late summer. The program would improve cash flow to local units of government by "purchasing" delinquent taxes from local units and schools.

To do this, the first year would require the county to borrow approximately \$1,000,000 to establish the special fund. After annual spring settlement with treasurers

of local units, the county treasurer's office would submit a check to each unit for the full amount of taxes owed that unit.

Through investment of the borrowed money, plus investment of the county general fund's share of the delinquent tax payoff, the county would more than break even for its work. The county would receive the penalty owed by delinquent taxpayers, which has been increased by the state legislature from six to nine percent.

Establishment of such a fund would eliminate a considerable amount of work in the county treasurer's office and possibly could avoid the hiring of an additional clerk next spring.

## Crash Killed Oscoda Man

An 18-year-old Oscoda area man was killed Thursday morning in a two-car collision on US-23 near Oscoda.

Killed was Michael Novak, whose father, TSgt. George Novak, is stationed at Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

Township police said the snow covered highway was extremely slippery and Novak's car went out of control. His car collided with one driven by TSgt. John S. Huff, 35, Wurtsmith, who was treated at the base hospital.

The crash took place on the shoulder of the road as the driver of each car tried to maneuver out of the path of the other.

Novak's death was the fifth traffic fatality of the year in Oscoda Township.

## Two Hurt on Snowmachines

Two snowmachine accidents were reported last week by Michigan State Police, East Tawas.

Frederick J. Ostrowski, 31, Hale, was treated at Tawas Hospital Thursday. He crossed Turtle Road and his machine struck a log when it went into a ditch. Ostrowski was thrown from the machine and he injured his left knee.

Jon A. Krekorian, 14, Oscoda Township, was treated at Tawas Hospital when the throttle stuck on his snowmachine. The machine hit a ditch on the east side of Monument Road and the youth sustained back and jaw injuries when he hit the roadway.

## Restaurant Hit Tuesday by Fire

Grant Township firemen battled a five-hour fire early Tuesday morning which gutted the Chapel Lake Restaurant owned by Harold Sprague. The main part of the restaurant and living quarters in the two-story frame structure were destroyed. There were no injuries.

## Tawas Area Board Approves New Transportation Director

Formal approval for hiring David Westcott as the new transportation director for Tawas Area School was given Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

Since the illness and subsequent death of Edward Poppe, former transportation director, Westcott had filled the job on a temporary basis. Authorization was given two weeks ago to hire Westcott on a full time basis, but official ap-

proval awaited Monday night's regular board meeting.

Westcott has been hired on a year around basis at a salary of \$10,000.

Supt. Robert Halle said that there were 20 applicants for the job and all were given a basic mechanic's test.

Westcott formerly managed Forward's in Tawas City. He has been taking an active part in community

affairs, being a member of the Tawas City Planning Commission and the Tawas City Volunteer Fire Department.

Filling in as director of transportation from September through late November was Clarence King, a bus driver who retired a year ago. The superintendent said King provided excellent service for the school district during the interim period before a new director was hired.

## School Takes Applications for New Jr. High Principal

On recommendation of Supt. Robert Halle, Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night approved the taking of applications for filling the junior high school principal's position which has been vacant since the middle of September.

One of those in line for consideration to fill the position is Jerry W. Youngs, present assistant high school principal, who has filled both jobs since the resignation of Robert McDonald, who became the new principal at Hale Area High School.

Halle's recommendation to fill the vacancy had been expected since the board's informal work

session two weeks ago. He said at the time and repeated Monday night that his own inspection of the junior high school operation, as well as recommendations from other administrators and staff, had convinced him that the position should be filled.

When McDonald resigned, Halle had indicated to the board of education that the work would be handled by Youngs on a temporary basis to determine if one person could handle both jobs. It was his opinion that because of the amount of time required to handle both jobs, it would be impossible for one person to do justice to students, parents and the staff.

The position is to be posted at the school effective December 13, under terms of the master contract, and candidates will be interviewed January 3-6. Final candidates selected will meet with the board of education on January 9 and it is expected that the board would make its selection January 16.

"I feel the position needs to be filled as soon as we can do so," said the superintendent.

Should Youngs be selected for the position, there would be an immediate opening for an assistant high school principal and the entire posting and interview process would be repeated.

## Bills Would Alter Property Tax System

Michigan's property tax system would be in for some major changes if a package of bills introduced last week into the state senate is enacted into law. The bills are designed to alleviate some of the glaring inequities in the state's property tax system.

Specifically, Senate Bills 1270 and 1275 would:

1. Replace the current sales study approach to determining the true cash value of a homestead with an on-site appraisal approach which stresses the actual value, rather than the sales value of the property;
2. Require equalization of property every four years, rather than annually;
3. Reduce the present state equalized value from 50 to 48 percent and allow for a two percent leeway, plus or minus;
4. Allow individuals to appeal their final equalization factor directly to the state tax tribunal if that factor is higher than the county's published factor;
5. Allow the value of agricultural land to be assessed on the basis of production capability.

At the present time, much emphasis is placed on how much a person is willing to buy or sell property for, rather than the actual cash value and much time and money is spent on determining the value year after year. Determining property value is not an exact science and is a matter of judgment. Many people feel that some discretion should be shown in determining the value of property.

The provision reducing the SEV from 50 to 48 percent could be a constitutional question requiring a court ruling.

Old newsboys of Tawas Kiwanis Club will kick off their annual Goodfellow newspaper sale Thursday night with Christmas tree lighting ceremonies at city parks of Tawas City and East Tawas.

A tree at the Tawas City Park is to be lighted at 6:00 p. m. and a tree at the East Tawas Park is to be lighted at 7:00 p. m.

Two visits by Santa Claus are set this week in the Tawas. The East Tawas Park Commission and Volunteer Fire Department will sponsor Santa's visit Thursday, 7:00 p. m., at the East Tawas Community Building. The Tawas City Businessmen's Association has charge of arrangements for Santa's visit Friday, 6:30 p. m., at the city hall in Tawas City. He is to distribute candy to children at both stops.

## School Board Action Centered Around Bus-Vehicle Purchases

Discussion on purchase of buses and other transportation items comprised much of Tawas Area Board of Education's time at its regular meeting Monday night.

Overriding a motion to table action, the board voted to purchase three new school buses and authorized advertising for bids.

Much of the discussion was centered around the fact that the district had purchased seven buses during the current term to correct a deficiency in the purchase of buses starting in the early 1970s. Some members felt that only one or two buses should be purchased next term.

Majority of the members felt three buses should be purchased in order to return to the former replacement schedule. No reimbursement is received from the state for buses after the seventh year of operation.

Authorization was given to purchase two 1978 65-passenger buses and one 1978 35-passenger bus. Payment would be made in the next school year starting July 1, 1978.

At the same time, the board authorized taking of bids on a 1966 Ford three-quarter ton truck, a 1967 Pontiac station wagon, a 1969 66-passenger school bus and a 1972 GMC van truck. Bids for purchase of the above vehicles will be received up to 12 o'clock noon, January 9.

On recommendation of David Westcott, transportation director, the board of education authorized a three-year lease arrangement with McIntosh-McKay Chevrolet on a Chevrolet three-quarter ton, four-wheel drive truck. The vehicle replaces the three-quarter ton truck and station wagon and is to be equipped with snow plow.

Cost of the lease is to be \$225 per month for 36 months. Two-thirds of the cost is reimbursed by the state. According to state regulations, had the district purchased the unit, there would have been no reimbursement.

The board of education accepted a bid from Edward Fairbanks of \$280 for a 1965 35-passenger bus and a bid from a student, Patrick Hill, of \$100 for a 1968 American Motors car.

In other business, the board of education approved a bill of \$280 which had been owed on the superintendent's retirement.

The superintendent reported that the school's heating bill appeared to be running less than last year. Resignation of Donald Spencer was accepted effective January 20, but is contingent upon his replacement. Spencer, who has been offered a position in the Detroit area,

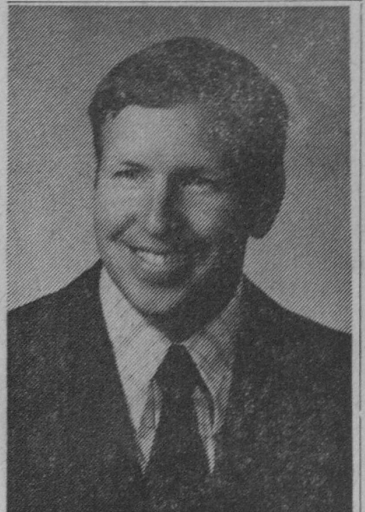
## Murder Trial Opens Before Judge Miller

Seven witnesses for the prosecution testified Tuesday in the non-jury murder trial of Johnny Heard, 28, before Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

The first day of the trial concluded at 4:45 p. m. and is to resume today (Wednesday) at the Iosco County Building.

Heard is charged with the March 26, 1976, murder of Mrs. Lorraine J. Kenan, owner of a party store north of Oscoda.

The former airman at Wurtsmith was later convicted of an unrelated charge of defrauding the government by claiming his girl friend as a military dependent. He is serving a sentence on this charge in the federal penitentiary at Milan.

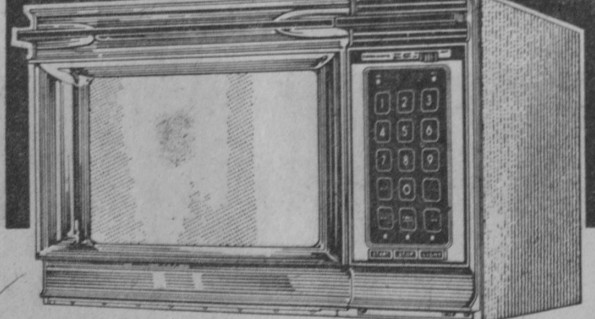

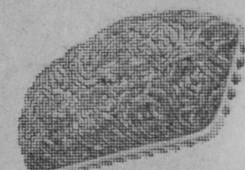

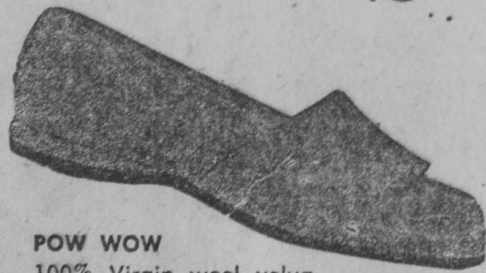

## Special Education Report to TA Board

During a report on special education Monday night to Tawas Area Board of Education, Herman Rollin, elementary principal, told members that the board should address itself to obtaining a new special education director in the future.

Rollin, who has filled the position in addition to his regular du-

ties for the past six years, said that new state requirements had added new responsibilities to the job and additional time would be required.

As the district's elementary principal, he did not believe he would have the time, although he felt that special education director would not be a full time position.

Rollin's remarks were included in a special report which included participation by Thomas Gerback, director of special education for Iosco-Intermediate School District, and Norman Olmsted, intermediate district superintendent.

High praise was paid by Supt. Robert Halle to the intermediate district for its cooperation with local school districts in a variety of roles, including special education. The intermediate district provides special programs at the Bright Horizons Learning Center which cannot be provided by the local districts.

Types of program services provided by Tawas Area School include: Educably mentally impaired, learning disabled and speech therapy.

Teachers include Karen Strughold, primary, 10 students; George Wajda, elementary intermediate level, 13 students; Susan Klatt, junior high school and senior high school level, 23 students; Gail Forbrigg, 19 students; Janet Skinner, 69 students.

After a student is referred by a teacher, parental permission is required for testing. Rollin said that such permission is not always received from parents, which prevents inclusion of some students in the program.

Testing is conducted by Robert Mattson of the intermediate office. Prior to starting the program, an educational planning and placement committee meets with the parent to discuss the student's need.

Once in the program, the student is placed in an individual education plan, involving the parents, teacher and special education director. Short and long term goals for each child in each subject is established. An annual review is held with parents to discuss educational status of the child for future placement. Some students must be re-tested for correct placement.

Rollin felt the district should consider adding additional programs, including: Educably mentally impaired, elementary and secondary; emotionally impaired, elementary and high school counseling; learning disabled, elementary or high school, hopefully with a person certified in emotionally impaired and learning disabled; facilities at both elementary and high school buildings.

Arrangements should be made, Rollin said, for educational planning and placement committee meetings with teachers, parents and supportive agencies such as the health department and mental health department.

Discussion categories would include educably mentally impaired, emotionally impaired, learning disabled, hearing and visual impairments, physical impairment, speech therapy, social worker and diagnostician.

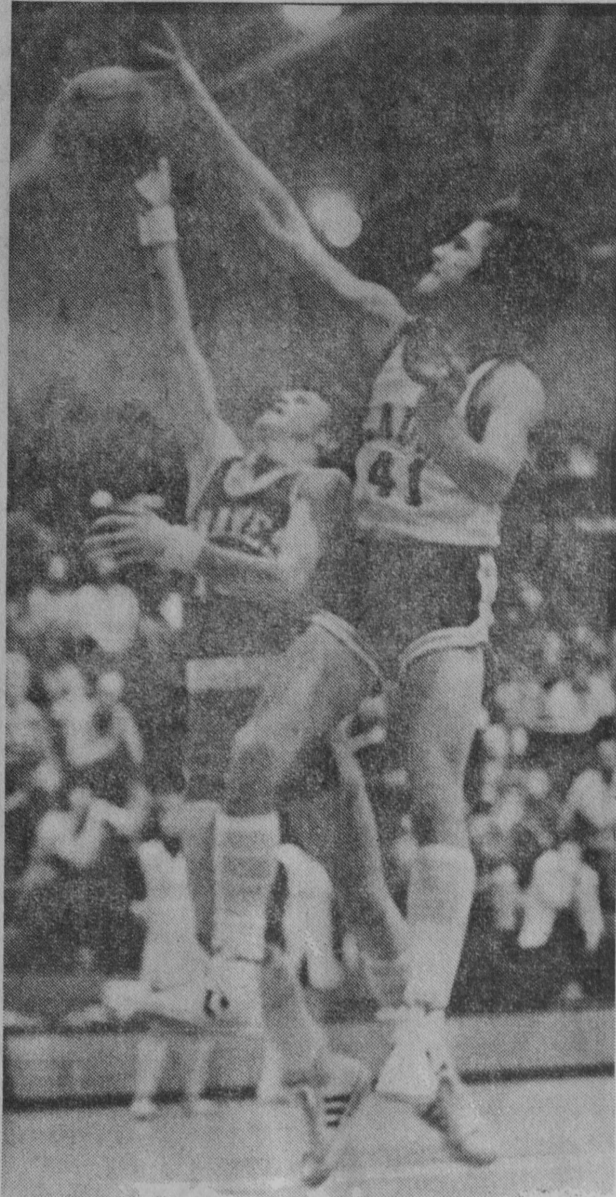

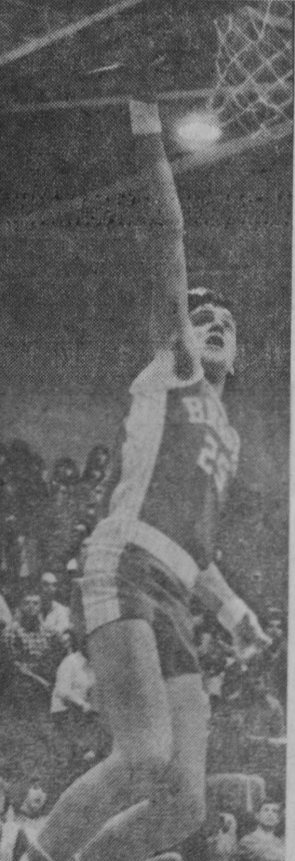

Only Routine Business by Commission

Conley also wrote two other selections specifically for Tawas bands. In 1968, he composed "Tawas, A Suite for Band" and conducted the premiere performance. This selection was also performed at the band's first appearance at the Midwestern Conference in 1969. Conley has also written a saxophone quartet, "Diversion No. 1," dedicated to Sandra Whitman, Nancy Elliott, Sue Vaughan and Gary Daugherty in 1972. This selection is the highest selling ensemble in the Kendor Music Publisher library.

For this year's conference, Conley has written "Diversion No. 3," a major band work. The premiere performance, with the composer in attendance, will be the Christmas concert.

After the concert, a reception will be held in Conley's honor and the public is invited to attend.

THE 40-YEAR FIGHT BY WOMEN FOR

EQUAL SUFFRAGE



THE SUFFRAGE MOVEMENT in this country was not without its pitfalls, as evidenced by the fact that women were being jailed in the nation's capital as late as 1919 when they delivered pro-suffrage speeches in public parks without permission. Typify-

ing a new era for women was the young bathing beauty at left. Although bathing attire of the 1913 era left much to the imagination, women were soon to be liberated from those long stockings and pantaloons.

A proposed amendment to the national constitution states that "equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any state on account of sex."

Proponents of ERA have redoubled their efforts to obtain the required total of 38 approving states needed by 1979 to make it law and observers believe the amendment might make it next year.

When and if this measure is approved—there is still strong opposition—it will culminate more than 125 years of efforts in guiding the national conscience toward guaranteeing the rights of women.

Michigan cannot be singled out particularly as a leader in the equal rights movement—in 1977, the state legislature had not adopted ERA—but its record concerning rights of women is as good as the majority of states.

For instance, the state constitution of 1850 contained no separate bill of rights, but demands for the recognition of women's rights resulted in a clause which gave to unmarried women complete control of any property they had acquired before marriage.

Interestingly, Gideon O. Whittemore, founder of Iosco County, played a part in that constitutional convention of 1850 by being a delegate from Oakland County. A circuit judge and one-time secretary of state, he also was a member of the second convention of assent which met at Ann Arbor in December 1836, to consider Michigan's first constitution.

In the field of education, Michigan was an early leader in granting academic degrees to women. Michigan Central College, which was established at Spring Arbor near Jackson by the Baptist Church in 1844, awarded degrees in 1851 to several women graduates. It removed from Spring Arbor and opened in 1855 at Hillsdale as Hillsdale College.

With these initial victories in the mid-1800s, women continued their demand for reform which helped to bring about the correction of some social, economic and political abuses in a number of states. In Michigan, this led to an

Equal suffrage was delayed for years when women took an active part in the prohibition movement—saloons were the exclusive territory of men in those days.

insistent demand for woman's suffrage and there was strong pressure by various groups to bring about votes for women.

In retrospect, suffragettes made a serious mistake at this early juncture when their leaders also became embroiled in a two-pronged social crusade—woman suffrage and prohibition of liquor. That added battle with the "whiskey element" as the women termed it, was to set back their right to vote in Michigan for more than 40 years.

Iosco County's voting record concerning woman's suffrage is impressive only for being consistent—in three out of four elections, Iosco's male population rejected woman's suffrage. Local men had a change of heart, finally, when they joined those of other counties in 1918 to approve a constitutional provision providing votes for women.

The road was a rocky one in Michigan to gain the vote for women, but male voters here approved the measure in 1919 before woman's suffrage was adopted nationally.

The first vote in 1874, which came about following national publicity gained by Susan B. Anthony, saw Michigan voters rejecting the idea, 264,957-40,047. Here in Iosco County, H. E. Hoard, editor of The Iosco County Gazette, reminded male voters on October 29, 1874, that "the suffrage clause will be voted upon a separate ticket" along with a vote on the proposed new state constitution.

The new constitution, which was defeated in Michigan, lost here by a 289-220 vote and women's suffrage met the same fate, losing by a 388-129 vote.

Women were among the leaders in the movement to restrict the sale and manufacture of liquor and, because of their untiring crusade against what they believed to be a social evil, suffrage was not to be placed again before Michigan voters until 1912.

Here were some of the thoughts of males, as evidenced by printed

placards displayed in street cars: "A suffragette is a woman who thinks she has been devoted long enough; not satisfied with the last word, she always wants the first; she is the corset needed to reduce the government waste; she is a woman who needs the 'poll' for her vaulting ambition; a suffragette is a sting of beauty and a javer forever; a woman whose troubles certainly are not little ones; a woman who would rather rock the country than the cradle."

The foregoing words printed long ago in The Tawas Herald pretty well sums up the prevailing attitude of men of the late nineteenth century.

Dissatisfied with the constitution of 1850, a majority of Michigan's male voters in 1906 asked for a convention to make a new one. Leaders of the convention decided to revise the old constitution instead of trying to write an entirely new instrument of government. Some improvements were made (See SUFFRAGE, page 6.)

**Christmas Tree  
Fires Avoidable**

A yule log burning in the hearth is a sure sign of the holiday season. Unfortunately, so are Christmas tree fires, which according to John Wessels, manager of Consumers Power Company's Tawas District, could be frequently avoided if homeowners observed simple fire and safety measures.

Most trees sold commercially are cut long in advance of use and as a result can become extremely flammable. Potential hazards increase when trees are brought indoors where heat and low humidity accelerate drying.

Records reveal that some 4.5 million dollars in property damage and untold losses in physical suffering, anxiety and disappointment occur each year as the result of Christmas tree blazes.

Consumers Power offers the following recommendations for electrical safety:

Only Christmas lighting equipment carrying the Underwriters Laboratories label (UL) should be used. Do not erect lights outdoors which have not been approved for outdoor use. Before stringing any lights, check for frayed wires, loose connections and broken sockets.

Turn off all decorative Christmas lights when leaving home.

Use noncombustible decorating materials whenever possible. Avoid using candles, paper or other flammable decorations.

Other tips for a safer holiday season include:

Choose a natural tree that looks fresh, has firm needles and is no larger than needed.

Saw the trunk at an angle one inch or more above the original cut to open the tree fibers.

If the tree is purchased some

time before it is erected, store it in a container of clear water in a cool location.

Tree holders should be equipped with a water container which should be kept filled during the entire period the tree is inside.

Support the tree firmly and keep it well away from sources of heat such as stoves, fireplaces, heat ducts and radiators. It should also be kept out of hallways and should not block any exits.

Dispose of gift wrappings quickly and properly.

Trees should be kept indoors for the shortest possible time and removal the day after Christmas is recommended. Any tree showing excessive dryness should be removed immediately.

Wessels also warns against relying on self-applied coatings or solutions to "flameproof" a natural tree. While helpful, none are completely effective, he says.

Artificial trees should be selected with care. Plastic and metalized plastic trees can still burn. Metal trees, while not flammable, could be shock hazards and should only be used with indirect lighting.

Nine Tawas churches are cooperating in a pre-Christmas program of more than ordinary interest again this year. Floats of the several Nativity scenes are being prepared to participate in a parade through Tawas City and East Tawas.

Homemade gifts can stimulate the imagination and cut down on Christmas costs.

A trip to the local library can provide dozens of gift ideas that can be homemade.

After the child receives the gift, make a play area for them.

"Creating is usually not a tidy process," says Mrs. Garlick.

Put a real hammer and plenty of nails in a box for storage.

Put some scraps of yarn, felt and

cloth and paper bags in a grocery bag. Include a few samples of paper bag masks or puppets with the materials for making others.

Take things that can be pasted on to give three-dimensional effect—cotton, scraps of paper, braid, feathers, leaves, corn husks, discarded jewelry, dried beans and scraps of cloth—and wrap them up for collage materials.

With a little imagination, one can make personalized homemade games that copy commercial games. All that is needed is some construction paper, scissors and a magic marker.

A trip to the local library can provide dozens of gift ideas that can be homemade.

In addition to checking handicraft books, look up older issues of children's magazines for suggestions.

Another idea for you might be what is termed "never fail" divinity.

Cook three cups of pure Michigan beet sugar, three-quarter cup of light corn syrup and one-half cup of water in a saucepan until it reads 248 degrees on a candy thermometer.

Remove from heat and let it cool to 220 degrees, about seven minutes. Do not stir it during this time.

Whip two egg whites to the soft peak stage and add the syrup gradually in a fine stream.

Add one teaspoon vanilla and continue whipping for 20 to 25 minutes or until the mixture starts to become dry.

Add one cup of chopped nuts and stir until blended. Then just drop from a teaspoon onto waxed paper and let cool.

It is a super recipe and with black walnuts is even better. Or you may wish to top with halves of Michigan maraschino cherries for that festive holiday touch.

Melt 40 large marshmallows and a quarter pound of fine Michigan Grade A butter in a double boiler. Then add one teaspoon vanilla and

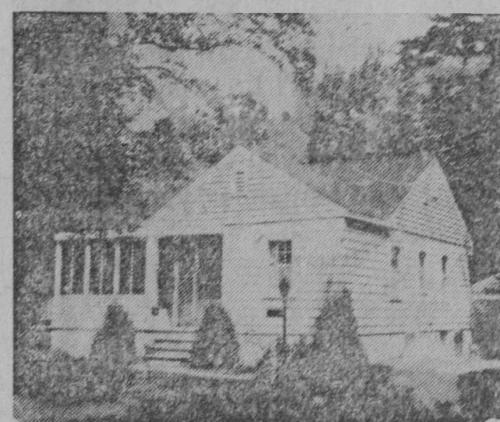

# Suffrage

(Continued from page 1.)

and provisions in keeping with then current demands for reform were inserted.

Although woman's suffrage was not granted, the constitution finally completed February 21, 1908, provided that women who were taxpayers were permitted to vote on bond issues or the expenditure of public funds. This was the first real crack in the armor which males hitherto had considered to be their exclusive territory—the ballot box.

A woman's suffrage amendment was again presented to Michigan voters in 1912, but this lost by the slim margin of 248,135 to 247,375.

The vote on amending the constitution was close in Iosco County, losing by a margin of 688-617. The only units not approving the amendment were Alabaster, Baldwin, Tawas and Sherman Townships and two wards of Tawas City.

Much interest was shown in the election here because of a concerted effort by pro-suffrage supporters. Clara B. Arthur, president of the Equal Suffrage Association of Michigan, told an Iosco County audience on September 13, 1912, that she wanted the ballot because, "without it, I am classed with aliens and am a perpetual minor; because an unfranchised person is not a citizen; because it is humiliating to be in the eyes of the law incapable of expressing an opinion as to whom I want for mayor or governor or president; I want the ballot because it is my right and should be my privilege."

In the October 11, 1912, issue of The Tawas Herald, Editor Len J. Patterson reported that "Tag Day will be observed the Saturday before the election as a final reminder to the men of Michigan that women want the ballot. This will not be done in a sensational manner, but all over Michigan the men will be presented with tags bearing the words, 'vote yes for women's suffrage.' It is expected that over

200,000 male voters will be reached in this way and that their silent appeal will surely mean votes for the amendment."

The tag day proved to be a splendid way to call attention to the amendment, but suffrage was not to be gained by Michigan women. The third election followed closely in the spring of 1913 and Mrs. Clara Benwick Colby of Washington, D. C., addressed an audience that filled the Iosco County Courthouse to capacity.

"Her address was not only interesting, but was highly educational on the suffrage question," stated Editor Patterson. "Her arguments were clear, concise and convincing and the effect cannot fail to strengthen the cause."

But pro-suffrage proponents again made a mistake by submitting the constitutional amendment to voters in 1913, insofar as Iosco County was concerned. At the same election, this county was voting on local option after saloons had been closed here for two years.

The headline and news story of April 11, 1913, told the story: "The County Goes Wet; Women Suffrage Amendment Defeated. By a majority of 203, local option was defeated and saloons and bums will flourish in Iosco County for the coming two years, at least."

"The question of extending equal suffrage to women was defeated in the county by 365 votes and in the state, 264,882-168,738. It is very evident that the advocates of this measure made a mistake by having the question voted on at a time when the liquor question was also brought up."

Woman's suffrage had been supported by the Michigan State Federation of Women's Clubs, the Grange, Gleaners and the Michigan Farmers Club.

Elnora Chamberlain, president of the Michigan Federation of Women's Clubs, was quoted by the Herald as "wanting the ballot for the same reasons that all honorable men want it. I must obey the laws, so I should be allowed to vote for those who make them; I am a citizen and feel a moral responsibility to help by my vote on all the

moral and civic reforms of the day."

In an editorial prior to the election, The Tawas Herald commented that if the women alone had a vote, "it would result in a class of men in public office whose character for morality, honesty and courage would be of a high order."

Despite the high editorial tone of newspapers and leaders of various organizations, women were going to have to wait until World War I to gain the right to vote. The 32nd annual convention of the Michigan Equal Suffrage Association was held January 15-17, 1913, at the Hotel Statler, Detroit.

A fourth and final election was held in Michigan in 1918. Mrs. Charles A. Pinkerton Sr. of East Tawas was chairman of the Iosco County Equal Suffrage Committee and Mrs. C. T. Prescott of Tawas City was committee treasurer.

Mrs. Pinkerton reported in the Herald on September 6, 1918, that five prominent women would tour the state to lecture on behalf of equal suffrage.

"The committee hopes to arrange a patriotic meeting for Tawas, obtaining one of these speakers of national prominence, among them Dr. Anna Howard Shaw. Expenses will be defrayed by voluntary contributions," said Mrs. Pinkerton.

Results of the November election had to share headlines with the announcement that an armistice had been signed ending the war in Europe, but Susan B. Anthony would have been proud of the vote given a constitutional amendment named in her memory.

Equal suffrage won in Michigan, 229,790 to 195,284, and the constitutional amendment carried in Iosco County, 688-617—there were still some diehard males in this county. The proposal was rejected in Alabaster, Baldwin, Tawas and Sherman Townships and two wards in Tawas City.

Nationally, an attempted suffrage demonstration at Washington, D. C., opposite the White House, was broken up by the police and 48 arrests were made. The women were taken to detective

headquarters in police patrol wagons.

"The technical charge on which the suffragettes were arrested was violation of rules and regulations for United States Parks and reservations which prohibit public meetings without a permit," stated the Herald. "An additional charge of public speaking in violation of park regulations was entered against two of the women."

Although reform activities were minimal during World War I, ratification of the 18th amendment in 1919 prohibited the manufacture, sale or transportation of intoxicating liquors.

New impetus to the demands for women's rights followed adoption of national prohibition and Carrie Chapman was elected head of the National American Woman Suffrage Association and built her organization's strength at the precinct level.

The suffragettes became so strong that within a year after the war ended, they induced congress to pass a woman's suffrage amendment to the national constitution and then campaigned for state legislatures to ratify the amendment.

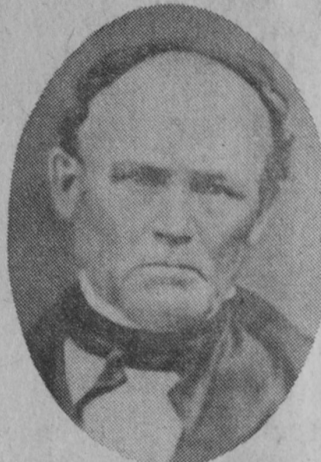
Suffragettes finally reached their goal of more than four decades when, after August 1920, the United States Constitution forbade the federal government or any state to deny the vote to a citizen on account of sex.

The dream of suffragettes, "envisioning a fuller and more meaningful national life with women as co-equal steersman at the political helm," was finally realized.



A SIGN in a Detroit streetcar described a suffragette as "a sting of beauty and a jawer forever." Women wanted the ballot for a number of reasons, one being they did not consider themselves to be completely whole persons without

the right to vote, as the above picture from that era suggests. The movement was best summed up by one Michigan woman, who said she must obey the laws, "so I should be allowed to vote for those who make them."



IOSCO'S founder, Gideon O. Whittemore, was a delegate to the state constitutional convention of 1850 which made the first real concession toward the rights of women.

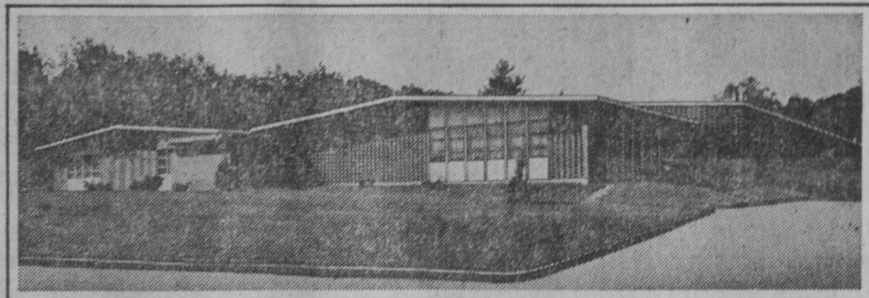

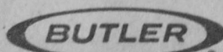
