

Hoard, editor of The Iosco County Gazette, reminded male voters on October 29, 1874, that ""the suffrage clause will be voted upon a separate ticket" along with a vote on the proposed new state constitution.

The new constitution, which was defeated in Michigan, lost here by a 289-220 vote and women's suffrage met the same fate, losing by a 388-129 vote.

Women were among the leaders in the movement to restrict the sale and manufacture of liquor and, because of their untiring crusade against what they believed to be a social evil, suffrage was not to be placed again before Michigan
