

Tax Revolving Fund Approved by Commission

Approval was given Wednesday by Iosco County Board of Commissioners to a new tax revolving fund which should simplify budgeting for all units of local government.

Effective in 1978, the revolving fund will begin "buying" delinquent property taxes owed to local units and schools. At the end of the third year of its operation, the fund will have acquired all delinquent taxes owed in this county.

Establishment of this fund will require the county to borrow from \$900,000 to one million dollars the first year. Although it is not intended as a profit-making venture, it

will be more than self-supporting as the interest rate to be paid on delinquent taxes has risen this year from six to nine percent.

The collection fee and interest would go back into the revolving fund, but later can be transferred to the county general fund. All funds would be invested by the county treasurer at the highest interest rate obtainable.

Establishment of this immediate payoff to local units and schools should do much toward eliminating confusion in annual budgeting. It will also mean a saving of work in the county treasurer's office.

County Anticipates Year-End Surplus

Iosco County is expected to end the year with a balance of \$140,000 in the general fund, according to a

report Tuesday by County Treasurer Edward Nelkie.

Action by the county board of commissioners last Wednesday transferred \$24,000 into a much needed public depreciation restricted fund, derived through miscellaneous revenue not raised by taxation or borrowing.

Establishment of the fund will provide the means for maintenance of buildings as well as to finance alterations or construction of new buildings.

The county entered the current year with a \$57,540 balance from the preceding year.

During 1976, fees from the three major county building offices, plus the district court, amounted to \$306,485.14, or about one-third of the general fund total. Nelkie said fees received during 1977 would show a substantial increase.

Part of this increase was gained through delinquent tax revenue from Lakewood Shores at Oscoda, which was paid early in the year. In addition, the county treasurer collected more than \$100,000 interest on public funds invested by his office.

The county also received a check for \$34,000 from the federal government as payment on federal forest land in lieu of taxes. This money had been held up for several months due to litigation brought by townships of the state, but now has been released following action of higher courts on appeal.

Nelkie said a preliminary year-end report on finances would be available January 4 and his annual financial report would be presented to the board of commissioners on January 25.

Social Services Moved Into New Baldwin Office Building

Iosco County Department of Social Services moved recently into its new headquarters on US-23 in Baldwin Township, east of Aulerich Road.

This new leased building contains 6,250 square feet of inside floor space, has 12 interview rooms as well as private offices, a conference room and large work area.

Benson (Pete) Beck, director, said the department had outgrown its former location near the Iosco County Medical Care Facility. That building, owned by the county, is now being remodeled for other office use.

Beck said he and his 32-member staff were extremely happy with the new location and building, which provides adequate parking.

Besides serving as the headquarters for social services, the building also provides office space for the WIN program.

The department of social services, an arm of state government, establishes a financial assessment of low income people. Following applicant interviews and verification of need, the department administers general assistance, food stamps and medical assistance.

Beck said that aid to dependent children (ADC) cases had shown a drop from a high of 450 cases in this county to 345 during October. He said that about 75 percent of the caseload was changing constantly and he felt that the federal CETA program was playing an important part in employing and training fathers for jobs, which results in fewer ADC cases.

Afrikaner Classmate of Tawas Girl Visited McCready Home

Spending the Christmas holiday week-end with Judge and Mrs. William McCready and family was Riana Pretorius, 17, of Louis Trichardt, Republic of South Africa.

Riana is a classmate of Lois McCready, who is spending her senior year in high school at Louis Trichardt, under sponsorship of Rotary International.

The young Afrikaner, who arrived December 21 in this country and is to return home January 8, won her trip to the United States in public speaking competition sponsored by Rotary. After the Christmas holiday, she left to spend several days with a family at Midland.

Riana filled in considerable information and answered questions asked by the McCready family concerning South Africa. Lois, who is the first United States student ever to attend school at Louis Trichardt, lives only a block away from Riana's family.

Afrikaans, a Dutch dialect, is the official language of South Africa and Riana said that Lois was quickly mastering it.

Riana's father, a retired attorney, presently is engaged in the cattle raising business, pasturing approximately 500 head of Herefords and native cattle. He has a farm of 2,700 morgens, or 5,400 acres.

Louis Trichardt, a town of about 2,900 inhabitants, is located near the border with Rhodesia. Riana's family traces its history in South Africa back to the year 1652.

Riana said that students wear uniforms at her school and that perhaps there is a bit more school discipline in South Africa than in this country. Her subjects in school include science, mathematics, Afrikaans, English, biology and an African language.

Lois called her family Christmas Eve and the two girls conversed in Afrikaans. "At \$3 a minute, there were no 'how are you's,'" said Mrs. McCready.

Treasurer's Opinion of MC Facility Ownership

In answer to a recent letter written by the chairman of the Iosco County Board of Social Services, records in the county treasurer's office indicate that Iosco County is owner of record of the 80-acre parcel on which the Iosco Medical Care Facility is situated and no assignment of ownership has ever been made to any agency.

The above property was acquired by the county on March 23, 1963, and became the site of the new medical care facility constructed through federal, state and local funds.

According to county records, \$50,000 is still owed on medical care facility bonds which originally totaled \$300,000. The bonds are being paid through a .15-mill annual tax levy.

In addition, maintenance funds for the building have been provided in the past by Iosco County as well as providing equipment for a new addition in 1967-68.

In early November, Joan Case, chairman of the Iosco County Board of Social Services, wrote a letter to the county board of commissioners stating that county medical care facilities established by law were "legal entities separate both from the state department of social services and from the county board of supervisors, now commissioners."

The chairman went on to say the social services board "appreciated any suggestions in relation to our building, but would like to remind you that it is the responsibility of the social services board to maintain the Iosco Medical Care Facility."

The above exchange concerned a matter of maintaining the roof at the medical care facility. In early fall, the commission was approached by a firm which had contacted the social services board concerning special roofing material for use on the medical care facility.

Manpower Survey Under CETA Nearly Complete

A manpower survey conducted in Iosco County is expected to provide a valuable tool for industrial development when it is completed early next year.

According to Edward J. Barry, who has directed the program which began October 1, reports that the survey is 100 percent completed in the Oscoda area and 94 percent completed in the remainder of the county.

"We have received about 97 percent cooperation from the business and industrial community in this undertaking," said Barry.

Preliminary figures released Friday indicate there are 478 jobs in the Tawas area, 124 in the Hale area, 65 at Whittemore and 308 at Oscoda.

Each business place and industry hiring people has either been contacted personally or by telephone to determine the number of employees and to classify each job in the county.

Information from the Michigan Employment Security Administration indicates there are approximately 1,100 unemployed persons in Iosco and Alcona Counties, with about 77 percent of that number in Iosco.

The manpower survey will determine the potential of the labor force as well as determining the number of workers in a variety of categories and the distance driven to present employment locations.

All of the information is to be fed into a computer at Bay-Arenac School District and would be readily available to potential industries interested in locating here. The information would be updated annually.

This program, conducted under a CETA grant, is a first in Michigan and considerable interest has been shown by other counties in similar programs.

Murder Trial Resumes

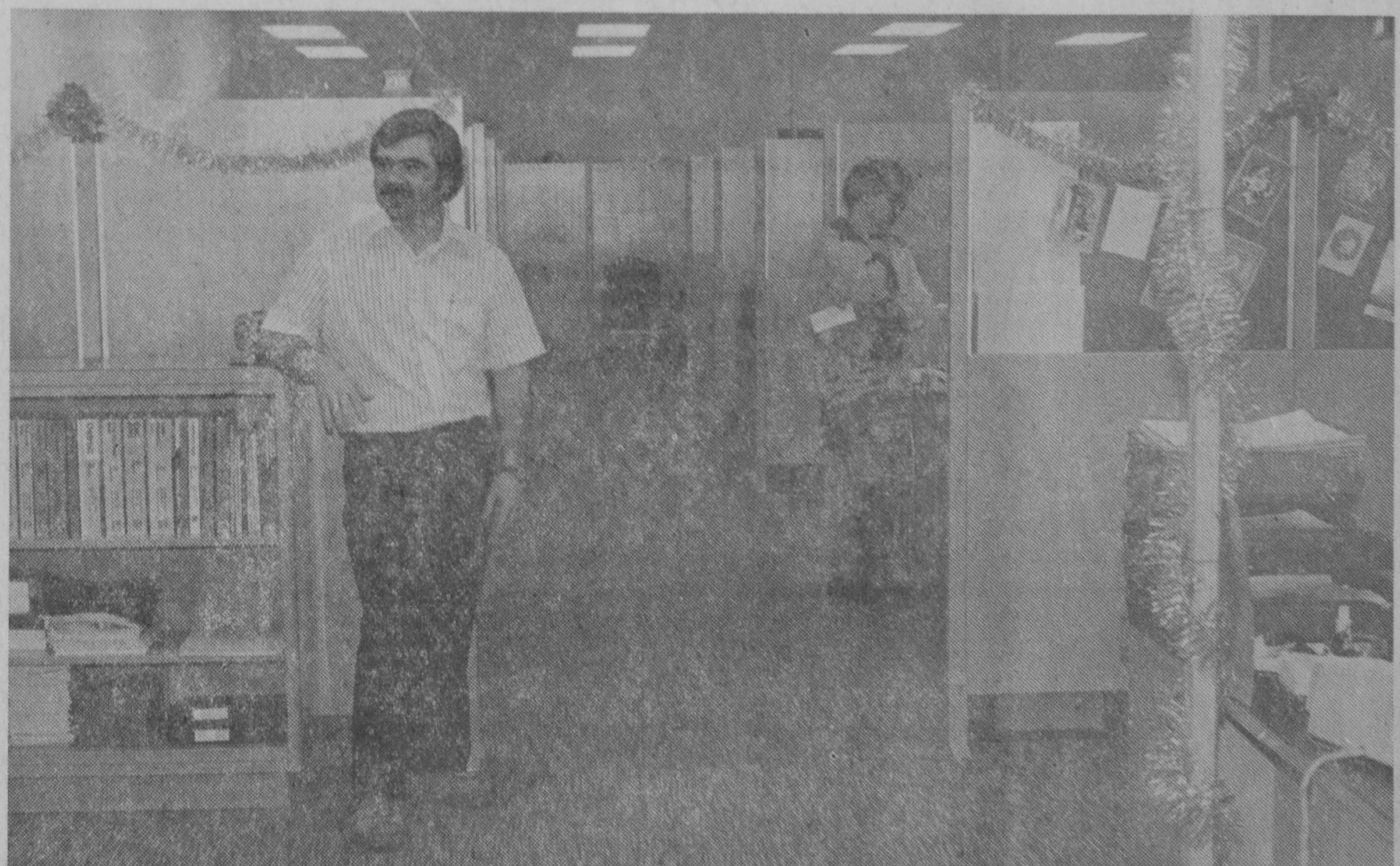
The murder trial of Johnny Heard was to resume this morning (Wednesday) after a recess since last Thursday.

Pickles in Scrambled Eggs?

What did Napoleon, George Washington, John Adams, Dolly Madison, Cleopatra and the first Queen Elizabeth have in common? They all liked pickles.
Thomas Jefferson, another pickle person, once wrote, "On a hot day in Virginia, I know of nothing more comforting than a fine spiced pickle, brought up trout-like from the sparkling depths of that aromatic jar below stairs in Aunt Sally's cellar."
Jefferson would have loved it in our state because, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture, Michigan is first in the nation for producing cucumbers for the pickling industry. In 1976, the crop was valued at 11.5-million dollars with production at 103,000 tons.
There are hundreds of ways to use pickles, other than just fresh out of the jar. A sprinkle of chopped pickle or relish adds zip to most soups. Try dicing a pickle and putting some in scrambled eggs. Or dice one for stuffings, meat loaves or meat dishes. Absolute versatility.
For the calorie counter's stuffed celery, combine one-fourth teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, one-half cup cottage cheese, one-third cup chopped sweet gherkins, a pinch of salt and one tablespoon chopped celery leaves. Mix well and spread on six celery stalks. It is said these have about 30 calories per serving.
Another munchy for the dieter is stuffed mushrooms. Mix together one-half cup chopped mixed sweet pickles and one-half cup chopped apples. Stuff eight large mushroom caps and each serving has only about 25 calories.
Really, I am the right weight. It is just that I am not six feet, two inches tall, where they have my weight on all those charts.

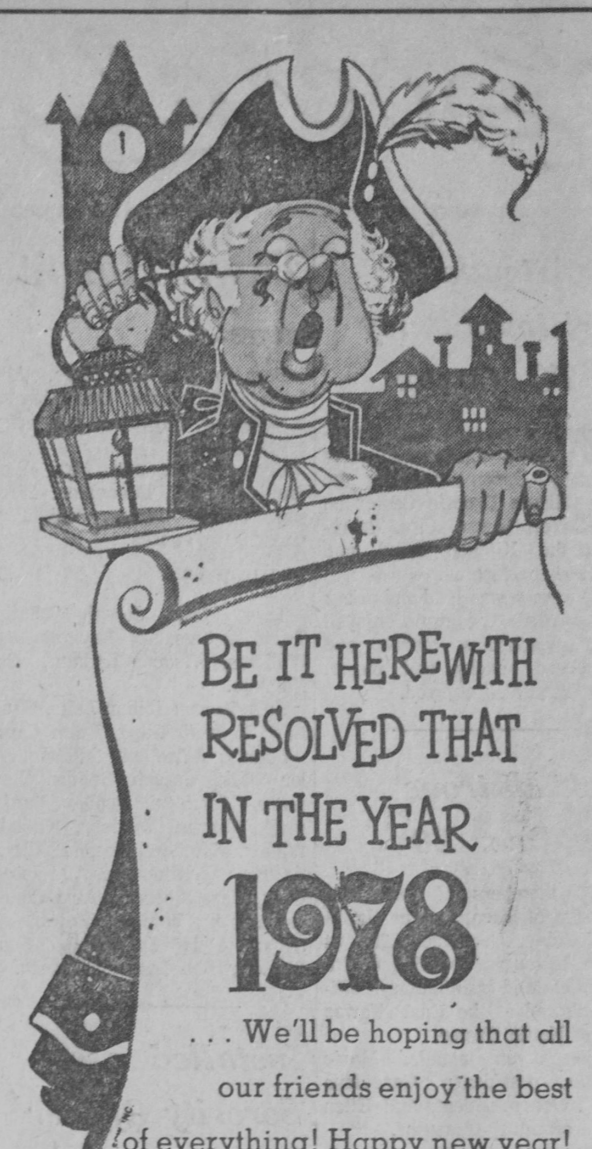

Call Social Security Before Making Visit

Most people can conduct almost all of their social security business over the telephone, thus avoiding a possible long wait in the office, a social security spokesperson said today.

Most anything from applying for benefits to reporting a lost or stolen check can be done over the phone. The representative listed the following services that can be taken care of by phone:

- Apply for social security or supplemental security income (SSI) payments.
- Apply for Medicare.
- Change of name or address for social security records.
- Report change in marital status.
- Report that person has stopped or started work or to report other events that may affect

social security to be eligible for retirement benefits. No one ever needs credit for more than 10 years of work to be insured for retirement checks. The people in any social security office can tell you if you have worked long enough to get benefits on your work record.

Q. I'll be eligible for Medicare in a few months. Should I cancel my private health insurance policy?

A. You shouldn't cancel any health insurance you now have

social security offices are especially busy and a person may have trouble getting a call through.

- Unless a person's business is urgent, the spokesperson suggested that he or she wait until after the middle of the month to call. The later in the month the call is made, the better the chance of making an immediate connection.
- If a person's call concerns monthly benefit checks, he or she should have the proper social security claim number available. And if the call is about Medicare, the Medicare card should be handy.

The address and telephone number of the nearest social security office can be found in the telephone directory under "Social Security Administration."

Q. My husband isn't going to retire for several more years. Although I haven't worked for some time, I was wondering if I have enough social security credit to get retirement benefits on my own work record. How much credit would I need?

A. The exact amount of social security credit you need depends on when you reach 62. If you reach 62 in 1977, for example, you need credit for 6 1/2 years of work, covered under

social security to be eligible for retirement benefits. No one ever needs credit for more than 10 years of work to be insured for retirement checks. The people in any social security office can tell you if you have worked long enough to get benefits on your work record.

Q. I'll be eligible for Medicare in a few months. Should I cancel my private health insurance policy?

A. You shouldn't cancel any health insurance you now have

for your own protection at least until the month your Medicare coverage begins. And, before you make any change in your private insurance, you might want to get in touch with your insurance agent or the office where you pay your premiums to discuss your health insurance needs in relation to Medicare protection. This is particularly important if you have dependents who are covered under your present policy.

Deputies Seek Overtime Pay for 10 Holidays Not Worked

Iosco County Board of Commissioners decided to let a grievance filed October 19 by the Teamsters Union for Iosco County Sheriff's Department deputies go to arbitration with the state labor board.

Several commissioners, along with the county's negotiator, felt that the commission should settle the grievance without arbitration.

The grievance filed by deputies concerns holiday pay. Deputies are hired on a salary basis, but work on a regular 40-hour work week. The contract recognizes 10 paid holidays during the year.

Overtime is paid to deputies working holidays and those deputies who did not work the last two holidays are also demanding overtime, stating they have no control over scheduling.

One of the commissioners opposing the grievance said the contract may allow the employee to take an additional day off from work, but said nothing about receiving time and a half pay for not working on a holiday.

The deputies want the time and a half for not working holidays to be retroactive to October 12, Columbus Day.

County Gets More Revenue, 1978 Budget Revised Upward to \$1,669,383 Level

Iosco County's final budget for 1977-78 was adjusted upward by \$31,000 Wednesday to reflect an increase in revenue. The total budget as it now stands is \$1,669,383.

John Webb, who has served as budget chairman for the commission, said that an additional \$18,005 is to be received through the cooperative reimbursement program approved with the state two weeks ago. That program is designed to make fathers pay child support ordered by the courts and the above fee represents Iosco's share of the collection.

In addition, County Treas. Nelkie said that fund balances at the end of the year would be \$13,000 higher than previously anticipated.

A general juggling of figures saw health and public welfare cut from \$280,385 to \$268,472, due to a \$13,000 reduction at the medical facility through the revised budget of Roy Bergstrom, director.

Civil and criminal justice was advanced from \$303,107 to \$320,535, reflecting, in part, salary increases to the circuit court stenographer and assignment clerk.

Administration and financial management of the county was advanced from \$492,739 to \$508,512.

Irene Snaile was advanced to assistant friend of the court effective January 1.

A three-year contract was approved for John Rose, county equalization department director. This salary is to be \$17,000 next year and is to advance to \$19,500 the last year of the contract.

John Dye of Oscoda was employed as the architect to renovate the former social services building, now known as county annex No. 2. Maximum cost of the architectural fee is to be \$800. The county expects to receive some federal funding on this project because of the energy saving measures to be taken.

The commission authorized conversion of one part-time clerk in the cooperative extension office to a full time position.

The commission contributed \$1,000 to the Iosco County Agricultural Society for support of the 1977 county fair.

The commission entered into a contract with the county road commission for plowing runways at the county airport.

Support of a resolution seeking four-lane highways on US-23 and M-65 to Alpena was given by the board of commissioners.

PROVIDED A 'CURE' FOR EVERYTHING!

One of the amazing facets of American life prior to the establishment of the Pure Food and Drug Administration was the array of patent medicines on the shelves of drug stores. The public was constantly being bombarded with advertising claims for elixirs that would cure everything from the common cold to cancer.

No one has found a sure-fire "cure" yet for the common cold and the medical profession is warning that one highly touted cure for cancer is a deadly poison and is not permitted to be sold in many states, including Michigan. One warning concerning the cure is posted in the admitting room at Tawas Hospital.

There are still so-called patent medicines around and the public is being bombarded constantly on television with some not-so-sophisticated claims by products for cold prevention, a wide array of pain killers or a noted nostrum that somehow puts iron into the bloodstream and helps one to grow old gracefully.

Every once in a while the government will crack down on manufacturers of these medicines and require them to prove their claims, which is usually good for several years of court litigation. One of the latest moves in this direction was to require an old-line firm to prove that its mouthwash actually killed germs. In the not too distant future, that firm will be required to remove the claim from its familiar brown label.

One development which has resulted from the American public's "need" for cures and pain killers has been the hobby of bottle collecting and some of those collectors specialize in patent medicine flasks. The field is endless and extremely interesting as the bottled nostrums almost always were comprised of more than 90 percent alcohol and were consumed in large quantities in a strictly legal means to circumvent local option or prohibition during dry days—as a result, a large collection of medicine bottles can be assembled at a low cost.

Collectors always look for the unusual and when one finds a patent medicine manufactured in his own town it is a real find. The one elixir that is known to have been produced here was "Bristol's Diphtheria and Sore Throat Wash."

A case of the stuff somehow survived the years and was found by the late Joseph Barkman in his lumber yard office across from Tawas Hospital. The label cautions that one should not allow the wash to freeze as the bottle would break "and do not get stains on the clothing as they will not wash out."

During winter nights indicating that the medicine was no different than others and contained its own anti-freeze!

This product was developed, manufactured and marketed by Howard Clark Bristol, a long time resident and businessman at East

Tawas. His death certificate on file at the county building lists his profession as an attorney, but he was better known for his business transactions.

Born December 27, 1838, at Chicago, Illinois, when that city was but a struggling hamlet, Bristol was educated at the Canandaigua Academy, Canandaigua, New York. In his early youth, he acted as a clerk on a wood-burning steamer between Detroit and Port Huron and came to East Tawas with his wife in 1879.

In 1880, Bristol is listed in the "History of the Lake Huron Shore" as occupying a portion of the Mackin Block on Bay Street at East Tawas. "The Mackin Block contains three large stores, two stories high; the first is occupied by H. C. Bristol, the front for pianos and organs and the rear for preparation of corundum, from the extensive quarries of George Carleton." (Corundum is a mineral, aluminum oxide, used for grinding

and polishing. It is not known if Bristol was engaged in producing polish or if it was Carleton's business.)

Bristol acquired a strip of five 40-acre parcels of land along the Detroit and Mackinac Railway above East Tawas and a railroad siding was established there, Bristol Station, where railroad cars were loaded with huckleberries picked on the plains land west of there.

He sold that property in January 1910, and an announcement in The Tawas Herald indicated that he had a 10-acre tract at East Tawas which he offered to anyone who would erect a factory.

That same year, Bristol purchased "an auto-car that will carry a dozen or more people and will be used to carry passengers between the Tawas and Cooke Dam," reported the Herald.

One East Tawas resident, H. Eugene Hanson, recalls that Bristol was always experimenting with something. Bristol once painted his house with a yellowish material which seeped out of the well which furnished brine to the salt block then located on the site of the present day community building. The yellow "paint" provided by nature proved to be impractical as it washed off the house during the first rain.

Bristol apparently had a good thing in his diphtheria and sore throat wash—it is just too bad that it was not effective in curing diphtheria as the Tawas were hit by major epidemics of that infectious disease in September 1910 and in February 1914.

The August 26, 1910, issue of the Herald announced that Bristol "had only 10 bottles of his diphtheria remedy left and those wishing it should secure it at once."

Bristol apparently was not to be caught again with a short supply of his cure. On May 3, 1912, a notice in the Herald said Bristol had "agreed to donate 25 cents of the purchase price of every \$1 bottle of his Diphtheria Remedy to any church the purchaser may designate." As a patent medicine man,

Bristol was learning rapidly. As the next step in advertising his product, Bristol followed the more conventional approach of the patent medicine pitchmen of that era—print an endorsement of the product written by a satisfied user in the local newspaper.

Here is one choice endorsement letter which has been rescued from oblivion and printed exactly as published by the Herald on March 1, 1912:

"East Tawas, January 30, 1912. Mr. Bristol—I wish to say a few words of praise for your most excellent diphtheria remedy as a cure for scarlet fever, sore throat and quinsy. I was called to help care for a young lady very low with scarlet fever. Her throat was very bad. She had one of the best Dr.'s in the city attending her but her throat got so bad all hopes of her living till morning seemed impossible. I thought of a small quantity of your remedy I had at home and as a last resort we tried it and in less than an hour her throat was so much better that all hopes were returned. As soon as morning came, her father got a full bottle of your remedy and it alone cured her. I also used it in two other cases when the doctor could not do any more and it effected a cure in each case, giving them almost immediate relief. If you are in need of a medicine for any form of sore throat you can do no better than use Mr. Bristol's Diphtheria Remedy. Mrs. F. E. Dease, East Tawas, Mich."

With that kind of an endorsement, Bristol could see he had something going with his patent medicine. He announced in May 1912, that he "had received inquiries from Duluth, Toledo and Saginaw relative to the manufacture of his patent life preserver. 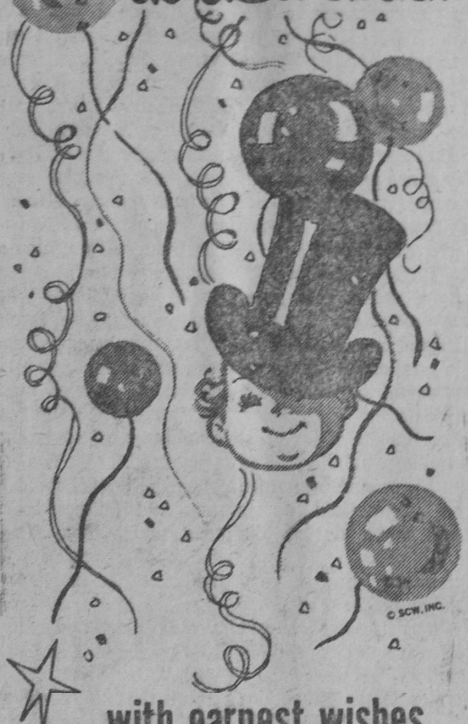

Here are the printed directions for using Bristol's famous elixir, copied from the label of one of the bottles found by Barkman a few

years ago:

"For diphtheria, quinsy, tonsillitis, croup, whooping cough and influenza: Use frequently as a gargle. Be sure to remove all white spots from the throat. To do this, use a swab made from a soft cloth or small sponge, passing it well back of the spots. In severe cases give an emetic following it immediately with a teaspoonful of the wash. This will remove all false membrane. For cramps, dysentery, summer complaint, take inwardly from one-half to one teaspoonful every two hours. For scarlet fever, use frequently as a gargle. Take a teaspoonful every six hours."

Gargling kerosene oil in the throat was a "home remedy" often used on diphtheria victims, according to one early newspaper account. It probably offered about the same relief as Bristol's famous cure, although the contents of his medicine are not printed on the label.

Bristol's famous cure may have been a victim of later government regulations as his advertising disappeared from the Herald after 1915. He died in March 1919 of locomotor ataxia, a disease which had afflicted him for seven years.

New Energy Cost Assistance Program Approved Last Week by Legislature

Some Michigan residents will have an easier time coping with their home heating bills this winter.

The legislature gave its final stamp of approval late last week to an energy cost assistance program which will help low-income and senior citizens pay this winter's heating bills.

About 38-million dollars was appropriated to cover the cost of the program. Some 32-million dollars of that amount will come from a welfare reimbursement the state received recently from the federal government.

It is anticipated that 298,000 low-income households, about half of whom will be senior citizens, will receive benefits under the program.

Here is how the program will work for residents who pay their own heating bills:

An initial flat benefit of between \$100 and \$130, depending upon income, will be paid. Of that amount, 90 percent will go to the heating energy provider and 10 percent to the electrical provider (if the electrical provider is not the heating provider). Then, a second benefit of between \$20 and \$70 based upon consumption of heating energy will be paid. Thus, the minimum payment will be \$100 and the maximum \$200.

For example, a family of four earning less than \$4,000 a year will qualify for the maximum \$200 payment (an initial payment of \$130 plus an additional allotment of \$70), while a family of four earning a maximum of \$7,300 will receive \$120 (the initial benefit payment only).

An elderly couple making no more than \$2,000 a year will be eligible for \$200, while an elderly couple or individual with an income of no more than \$7,000 per year will get \$100.

For those households with heating energy included in their rent, a flat rate benefit of between \$60 and \$160, based upon income, will be paid for electrical energy usage.

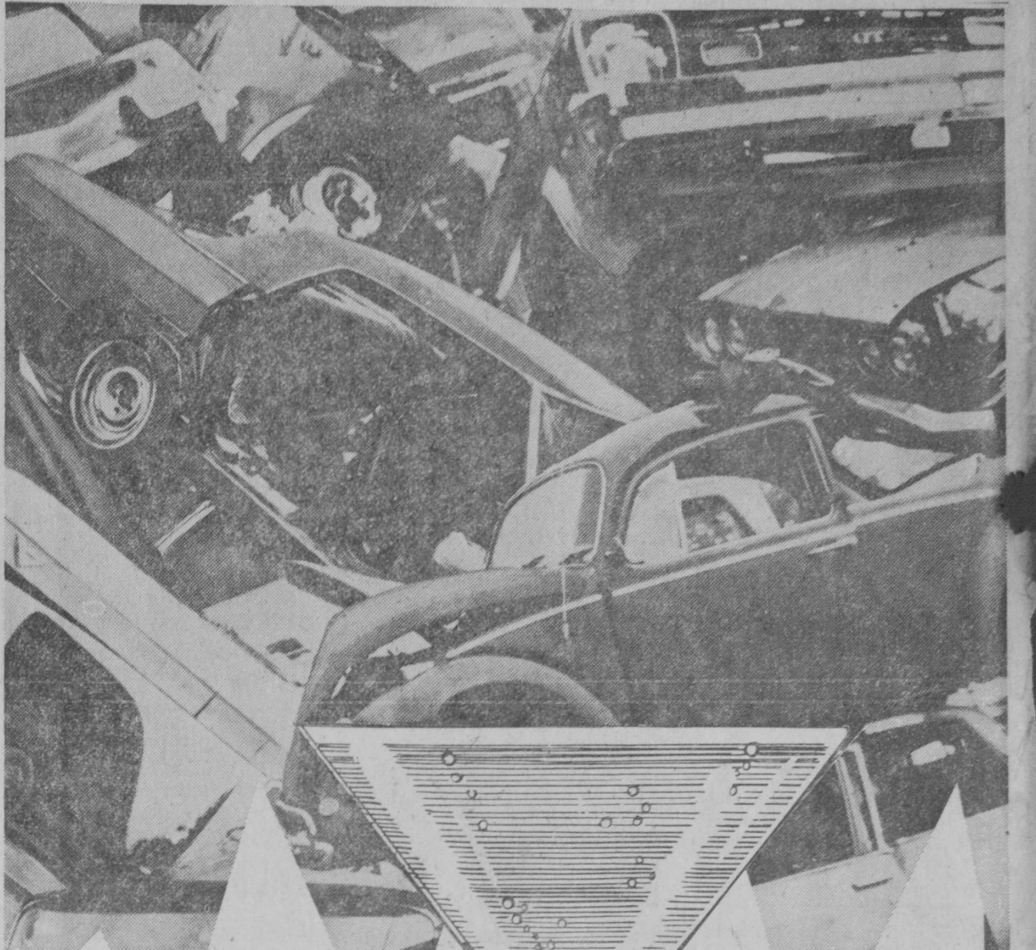
The money will be sent directly to utility companies on behalf of eligible recipients and will then be credited to the family's account.

Only households with incomes within guidelines established under the program (contained in HB 43-71) and with liquid assets valued at less than \$15,000 will be eligible for the program. Specifically excluded from participation are current AFDC and general assistance re-

ipients and students claimed as tax dependents on 1977 income tax returns.

The state departments of social services and treasury will be required to verify eligibility for the

program. Anyone who violates this new law is guilty of a misdemeanor.

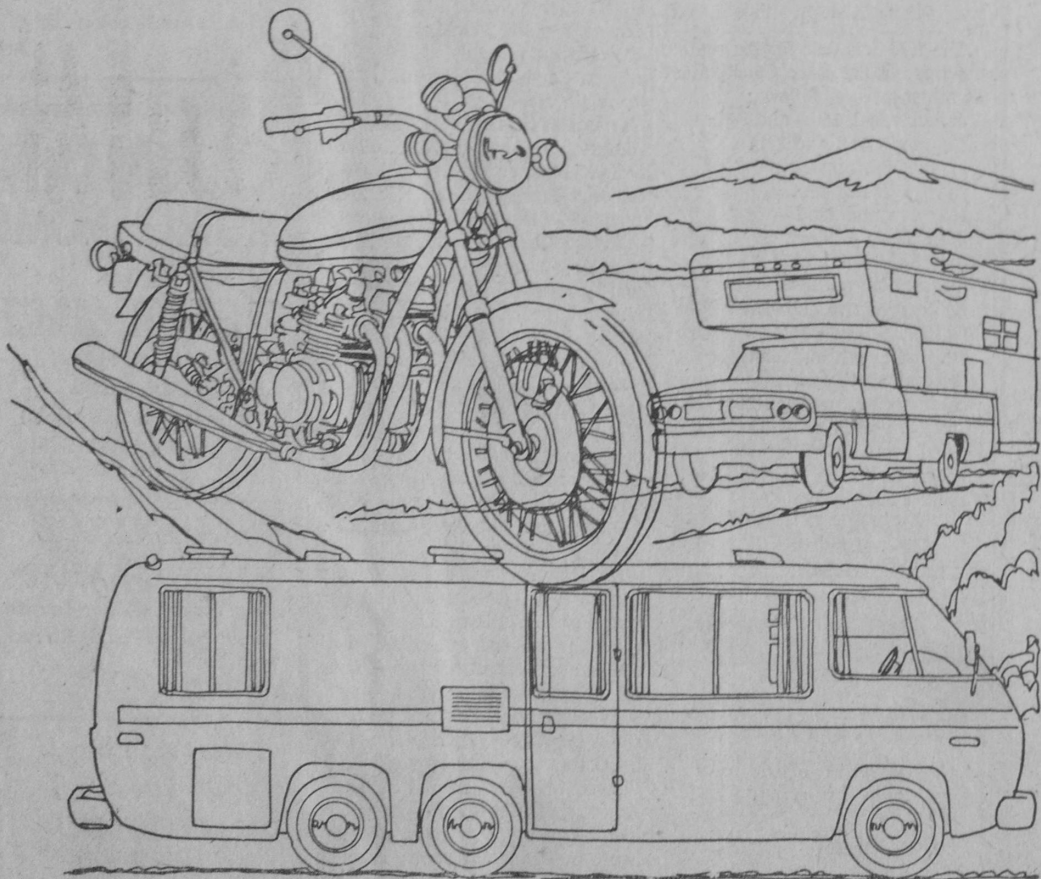
