Developer Wants Water and Sewer on Plank Road

A request to provide water and sewer service outside the city limit on Plank Road was turned over to Tawas Area Board of Education before the request is considered by the Tawas City Water Board.

Ken Schaaf Builders of East Tawas proposed to construct a 32-family complex in the Walt's Town Subdivision on the north side of Plank Road near the high school athletic field.

Water and sewer lines extending from the end of Harris Avenue to

Tawas Area School were financed by the school district when the lines were constructed in 1956. Several homes in that area, along with the Iosco County Medical Care Facility, were allowed to connect to the mains, but actual control rests with the city.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that this was presently a "dead end" water main and the junior and senior high school has experienced low water pressure. He believed that any request concerning water availability in that area should first go to school authorities.

In answer to a question posed by Councilman Jerry Cotter concerning providing municipal water and sewer service outside the city limit, the city manager said that the Plank Road area was being considered for annexation to Tawas City or reorganization with Tawas City and East Tawas under proposed new boundary lines for possible future incorporation into one city.

Under the present change in boundary lines submitted to the Michigan Boundary Commission, which is being considered for a vote of the people, the Plank Road area is not included in the proposed change. It has been reported, however, that the city planning commission is considering expansion of the proposed boundary line change.

Bublitz said that expansion of the area water system starting this spring could alleviate the water problem at Tawas Area School, "but at this point we really do not know what effect it will have on friction loss on the line serving Tawas Area School."

In any event, he said that Tawas Township or the developer would have the responsibility for providing engineering for any proposed extension of sewer or water lines.

Police 'Have Had It' With Perchville Beer Tents

Local police agencies said Monday that they "have had it" as far as operation of a beer tent during future "Perchville USA" festivals.

Police Chief Donald Docking of East Tawas said that his department made several arrests Saturday afternoon following a fight between drunks at the beer tent.

"We could have made more arrests, but we just did not have the personnel," said Docking.

Sheriff George Westcott said his department was short-handed and, although members of his department made periodic inspections at the tent, such a crowd situation could not be handled adequately.

Westcott said that there were many instances of minors drinking beer in violation of the state law. "Although minors were refused service at the bar, other persons of legal age would buy beer for them," said the sheriff.

Both Chief Docking and Sheriff Westcott said they would refuse to sign a permit for any application for a special license to serve alcoholic beverages in a tent during the annual festival.

No Damage in Chimney Burnout

Prompt action by East Tawas Volunteer Fire Department Monday night prevented damage to a residence owned by Carolyn Larson on Adams Street. A fireplace chimney became overheated during a burnout.

Jury Being Selected for Murder Trial

Selection of a jury to hear a first degree murder trial in Iosco Circuit Court had not been completed as of Tuesday noon and a second list of 16 potential panelists from the district court's jury list were to be interviewed in open court Tuesday afternoon.

If and when selected, the jury will hear a case against two Bay City men, Fred Tomkins and Gary McClellan, who are charged with the September murder of Danny A. Christian, 27, who was found dead in a wooded area near Oscoda following a fall fishing trip.

Only two circuit court panelists from a list of 80 designated by the Iosco County Jury Commission remained to be examined Tuesday afternoon by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller, the attorney for the defendant and the prosecution.

Ten women and four men had been seated in the jury box shortly before noon Tuesday, but two panelists were excused from being seated and others can still be excused through pre-emptory action.

During the course of Monday's opening session, Judge Miller ruled that a defense motion for a change of venue in the trial be held in abeyance until it is determined if a jury can be selected.

Two defense motions submitted Friday, one to quash the case and a second to suppress and exclude prior convictions of the two men as evidence in the case, were denied by Judge Miller.

Council Appoints Two New Planners

Two new members were appointed Monday night to the city planning commission by the Tawas City Council.

David Westcott, local manager for Forward Oil Company, was named to replace Carl Babcock, whose letter of resignation was accepted by the council, James Russo Jr., engineering design and consulting service operator, was named to replace Russell Carney.

Babcock's term had expired and he indicated that he did not wish to be reappointed. He is a member of Tawas Area Board of Education. Westcott's appointment will be for three years.

Russo will fill the unexpired term of Carney, whose term ended in 1978 was declared vacant due to inactivity.

A letter of resignation submitted by Robert Hemphill was not accepted by the council in the hope that he will reconsider being reappointed.

Roy E. Bergeron, who has

moved to East Tawas, submitted his resignation as a member of the tax board of review. The council must name a successor prior to March 7 and it was recommended that John N. Brugger, former mayor, be contacted to determine if he would accept the appointment.

Dates for the tax board of review were established for March 14, 15 and 16. Hours on the first two days will be from 9:00 a. m. to 12 o'clock noon and from 1:00 to 5:00 p. m. On the third day, hours will be from 3:00 to 9:00 p. m.

The council, following similar action by the East Tawas Council, authorized a 10 percent salary increase for the city assessor. A two-year agreement was authorized establishing Tawas City's share of the assessor's salary at \$4,566. East Tawas has agreed to pay a salary of \$6,895. Fringe benefits will be based on a ratio of 65 percent to be paid by East Tawas and 35 percent by Tawas City.

The salary increase is to be retroactive to January 1.

Council Lacked Quorum; Meeting Delayed a Night

Due to the lack of a quorum, Monday night's regular meeting of the East Tawas Council was postponed to Tuesday night.

City Clerk Clyde Soper reported Tuesday morning that one member of the council is ill, another is vacationing in Florida and the third member was unable to attend the meeting because of work.

Among items to have been discussed at the delayed meeting Tuesday night was a proposition from L. G. McKay Jr. to sell the McKay home on US-23 to the city for use as a library-museum.

Other items included an update on the status of funding for the Deloise (Dewey) Durant Park, a request from Carl Helmer for multiple family housing on Bay Street, an ordinance from Police Chief Donald Docking adopting the state uniform traffic code, status of the road commission garage and its possible use by the City of East Tawas or in combination with the City of Tawas City.

Council Tables Discussion on US-23 Drain; Await State Plans

Discussion with the Michigan Department of State Highways concerning city participation in US-23 drainage south of the Tawas River has been tabled until proposed construction plans are received.

The city council indicated two weeks ago that it was interested in development of a new storm drainage system in that area. Total cost of the project has been estimated at \$185,000, with the city share established at \$56,000.

Financing of the proposed system has not been determined as yet by the council. It was indicated that a proposed special assessment district was being opposed.

In other business conducted at Monday night's council meeting, a change in zoning from multiple family housing to B-2 business was received for two lots at the southwest intersection of M-55 and Lake Street (US-23).

Truman Barbier, who has purchased the land under contract from Ard Richardson, submitted a request to change the zoning on Lot 5. A residential dwelling is presently located on the property. A similar request was received for a zoning change from Wilton Finley, owner of Lot 6 located at the rear of Lot 5 and fronting on Court Street. No indication was given as to the proposed commercial use of the property.

A letter from Finley requested the council to adopt a motion disqualifying Councilman William Ezo from voting on any question pertaining to the property. The letter from Finley indicated that Ezo "owned" property adjacent to the two lots and cited a state law which forbids a councilman from voting on any question in which he has a personal interest.

Ezo denied ownership of any adjacent property and stated the property in question was owned by his parents. His request for a legal opinion from the city attorney was authorized by the council.

The request for the zoning change was submitted to the city planning commission for its recommendation. At the present time, the entire two-block area from M-55 south to North Street is zoned for multiple family housing.

Martin O'Driscoll, chairman of the river mouth harbor committee, appeared at the meeting and requested plans be made to dredge the river mouth this spring. The city is to make application to the Army Corps of Engineers for the necessary permit.

A survey prepared by Edmands Engineering Company concerning the area drained by Dead Creek is to be submitted to the Iosco County Board of Commissioners for

consideration of establishing a drainage district.

Sheriff George Westcott made his annual report concerning police protection provided by the sheriff's department. The report indicated that the department investigated 1,043 complaints in the city, made 87 arrests, issued 350 tickets, investigated 927 vehicles, investigated 1,353 people, checked 3,961 business places and made 133 liquor inspections.

Westcott said that 87 traffic accidents were recorded in the city during the year, which included 52 property damage and personal injury accidents, along with 35 non-traffic accidents.

The sheriff said that 36 percent of the accidents involved cars parked along US-23. He said there were five accidents at the M-55-US-23 intersection, 11 property damage accidents and one personal injury accident at the Whittemore Street intersection, six property damage and four personal injury accidents at the First Street intersection, five property damage and two personal injury accidents at the Mathews Street intersection. There was one property damage accident on Bay Drive and one on First Avenue.

The sheriff was given authority to conduct a survey of parking along US-23 and to remove parking spaces at intersections where necessary.

The council decided not to participate in mayor's exchange day as part of the Michigan Week observance in May.

Authorization was given to the city manager, mayor and any councilmen desiring to attend the annual conference of the Michigan Municipal League at Lansing on February 23.

Two Burglaries Investigated

Two breakings and enterings were investigated last week by Iosco County Sheriff's Department. A cabin owned by John Wick, Dearborn, located on Esmond Road, Plainfield Township, was entered. The second burglary was a storage shed owned by Roy Micho, North US-23.

Police Commend School Bus Fleet

Tawas Area School's transportation department and bus fleet received high praise Tuesday morning from the Michigan State Police.

Sgt. John Cluff, safety and traffic division at Bay City, said that the bus fleet had been inspected January 24-25 and great improvements had been made since the annual inspection a year ago.

"The addition of new buses helped a great deal, but we found the over-all fleet to be in a good, safe operating condition," said Cluff. He said that was a far cry from last year when a number of buses had to be red lined.

The state police inspector said that the school's new transportation director, Edward Poppe, should be commended for his work. "He is getting off in the right direction in a bus maintenance program and eventually Tawas should have one of the better fleets in the state," said Cluff.

Under legislative action, the state police are charged with the responsibility of conducting annual inspections of school bus fleets throughout the state. "These inspections are important, for school buses carry the most valuable cargo in the state," said Cluff.




Old Business:


New Business:



Snowmobilers Request Less Road Plowing


A representative of Hale Area Chamber of Commerce Wednesday asked the Iosco County Board of Commissioners to use its influence toward improving snowmobiling conditions on roads of Western Iosco County.

Douglas Brown, chamber of commerce president, complained to the commission that county snowplows had cleaned roads to such an extent that it was having a negative impact on tourism.

Brown expressed the opinion that snow should be left on the edges and shoulders of roads for the use of snowmobiles. He said that many machines had been damaged due to the lack of snow.

Stating that it was difficult to obtain maintenance on the road during summer months, Brown felt the road commission "was overdoing the job during the winter" with plowing and application of salt when it was not necessary.

Although the commission took no official action on the request, Comm. Donald Griffin stated that the reason for plowing snow back from the edges of roadways was to prevent severe road breakup in the spring.

Oscoda Subdivision's

Drainage District Appears Illegal

Lakewood Shores drainage district as established by the original developer appears to be illegal, according to a report Wednesday by Harry Krueger, county drain commissioner.

In a report to the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, Krueger said the Lakewood Shores Property Owners Association is now negotiating as to responsibility for filing a new petition on the drain.

Krueger stated that the property owners association believed that either the county or Oscoda Town-

ship had assumed responsibility for the drain, which is not working properly at the present time.

County commissioners pointed out that although the county department of public works had been the vehicle for securing finances for a water system serving that subdivision, under its contract the county assumed no obligations for that system or drainage.

Krueger said that Oscoda Township had adopted a resolution in 1968 indicating it "would take care of the drain" and he said the property owners had indicated they would hold the township to that responsibility.

In other business, the commission received word from the Michigan Tax Tribunal that it would be conducting property tax appeal hearings at the Iosco County Building starting Monday, April 4, and extending for two weeks.

The commission adopted a resolution giving permission to Tawas Bay Artists to use the county building August 6-7 for the 17th annual Tawas Bay Waterfront Art Show.

A letter from Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller advised the commission that, due to lengthy criminal trials, the circuit court's budget could be exceeded by \$10,000 this year.

Annual reports were presented by the county clerk, Cooperative Extension Service and 4-H Clubs. Fees received from the register of deeds office amounted to \$51,377.32 during 1976, according to a report from Leon Putnam. This amount was nearly \$8,000 more than received during the preceding year. Real estate mortgages filed during the past year amounted to \$16,297,071.02.

The commission authorized a letter to be sent to the Bureau of Urban and Public Transportation to proceed with the purchase of six new buses for expansion of the county's DART transportation system.

A lease agreement was adopted with McIntosh-McKay Chevrolet-Cadillac for a 1977 unmarked car to be used by the sheriff's department. Monthly charge is to be \$162 with full maintenance provided.

On recommendation of its public safety committee, the commission directed that no dog kennel licenses be issued by either the animal control officer or county treasurer unless a land use permit is first obtained from the local governmental unit in which the kennel is to be located.



RECALLED DAYS OF Early Merchants

The businessman, probably the most neglected person insofar as an area's history is concerned, had a champion in the late Joseph Barkman of Tawas. Besides his lifetime interest in saving and collecting ledgers, correspondence, pictures and other artifacts dealing with early day stories of the Tawas, he left a brief description of how business operated in another age.

Speaking before the Iosco Historical Society, which he designated as the beneficiary in his will to receive and preserve his vast collection, Barkman recounted the business activities of his father, Abram Barkman, who came to Tawas City in 1883 when he was 16 years of age. The son's program given January 8, 1970, was a unique first hand account of childhood recollections, which was recorded on tape and is in the historical society's collection.

Arriving in Tawas as a door-to-door ribbon peddler, Abram Barkman worked for five years in T. W. Simon's general store at the corner of Mathews Street and Lake Street in Tawas City. Following this "apprenticeship," he established his own business at East Tawas. He was to remain as a member of the Tawas business community throughout his long life.

Barkman purchased a frame building on Newman Street from A. J. Urquehart, harness maker, converting the lower portion into a general store with upstairs for living quarters.

In his recollection of the store owned by his father, Barkman said that dry goods were carried on shelves on the left hand side of the building. Calico in different colors was sold at 3 1/2 cents a yard, gingham was handled in different patterns, along with muslin, sheeting, outing flannels in different colors, pure white woolen flannels, pillow casing, bed spreads, percales. When a person came in to buy 15 or 20 yards of outing, "we always knew they were expecting an increase in the family, in that the material was used for making diapers," recalled Barkman.

In the early days, many women could not afford winter coats, so they made use of woolen shawls, which came in a wide variety of styles in the Barkman store. In the finishing lines, the store carried embroidery, laces, silk ribbons, taffeta ribbons, baby ribbon. Silks and satin came in cardboard boxes and a small stock of lace curtains in different patterns was carried.

All hosiery for women and children was black in color. Prices for hosiery ranged from 10 to 15 cents and the customer would have to be in the higher salary bracket to pay 25 cents a pair. Corsets were handled in different styles, some with whale bone and others with steel staves.

A full line of notions was carried, as well as heavy gold wedding rings. A large stock of buttons on cards was carried, along with several cabinets of thread on spools. These spool cabinets are

much in demand today by collectors, and several were preserved by Barkman.

Tawas was a railroad town in its early history and railroad men purchased the best class of overalls in stock, selling for around \$1 a pair. These overalls were manufactured by Hamilton Carhatt Company of Detroit, whose slogan proclaimed: "They wear like a pig's nose." In the winter, McMillan pants manufactured at Malone, New York, featuring the pegged cuffs of the era, were a heavy seller.

In the early days, there were many tricks used in merchandising. "When someone came in to buy a suit, the clerk would conceal a fat wallet in the coat pocket. When the customer felt the bulge, he always had the idea that some other party trying on the same coat had left his pocketbook by mistake. I can imagine what the party thought after buying the suit and taking it home, only to find that the cheap pocketbook was stuffed with paper."

Hats, caps, derbies in different colors were handled. If a customer could not be fitted, there was always the hat stretcher. If the hat was too large, the clerk would use a small piece of felt, about the size of a lamp wick, that was inserted in the hat band.

"One time, the store sent a statement to a farmer for several caps. A few days later, the irate farmer came in and wanted to know what was the idea of billing him for caps when he only had girls. Father told him that he had a dunce of a clerk and to disregard the bill. After the farmer left, father told the clerk to send the bill to another customer as he had so

many boys he would not remember if he purchased them or not." In the shoe line, the store carried different classes of shoes for men, women and children. One of the most popular lines was manufactured by the Selz Shoe Company. Another line was manufactured by Hirth Krause Company of Greenville, which is now the parent company of the famous Hush Puppy line of shoes.

In the early days, there was no such thing as one price on an item. Merchants had to mark their goods a little higher as he would expect the customer would want it much cheaper. "I will always remember the time that a Finlander came in to purchase some goods. After he picked out all of his items, the clerk said the bill totaled \$40, a sizeable amount for those days. The customer offered \$20 and it was hard bargaining to get more out of him. So, if the store priced merchandise high enough, a small profit would still be shown and the offer was accepted."

Neckwear included regular ties, four-in-hand and bow ties in prices ranging from 25 cents to \$1. The first collars were made of paper, later to be replaced by celluloid and finally by cloth. Women's gloves came in mocha and fine leather. If the fingers of the gloves were a little tight, the clerk would use a glove stretcher to make them fit the customer's hand. Handkerchiefs were big sellers at Christmas time and prices ranged from five to 25 cents.

"One time, Andrew Merschel asked my father if he believed in Christmas. Naturally, father told him 'no,' but he believed in Christmas dollars," recalled the son.

When traveling salesmen came to town to take orders, they would bring from 10 to 14 trunks of samples with a packer to handle them. Not having room in the store, the salesman would display his wares at the hotel or right on the sidewalk. The shoe salesman had three or more trunks with single samples of all kinds of shoes in separate trays.

All of the merchandise received by the store came in white pine cases, some five feet in length. If the store owner sold these cases for 50 cents each, he thought he was getting a good price. Today, the lumber in the cases would cost between \$20 and \$25.
