

### Boundary Petitions **Under Study** for Tawas

Officials of Tawas City and East Tawas have received notification from the Michigan Boundary Commission that petitions were filed January 6 seeking consolidation of the Tawases into one city and establishment of boundaries of the proposed community.

Materials received from the state included a copy of a map showing the area encompassing the proposed consolidation, along with copies of signatures of persons signing the petitions.

This movement was begun last summer by Atty. Brent Babcock, Tawas City, who presented petitions and other information to officials at Lansing.

It is expected that an involved legal process will lead up to an eventual vote by residents on establishment of a new city government and a commission to develop a new charter.

The last time such a vote was held on this question was in 1968, when a proposal to establish a charter commission lost by a mere four votes. This was the only consolidation vote ever held in the history of the twin communities.

### People Can Earn More, Still Get Social Security in 1977

and earn more and still get their social security benefits starting in January, according to social

security officials here. "In 1977 people can earn as much as \$3,000 and get their full social security retirement or survivors benefit," a spokesman said. "The yearly earnings limit for 1976 was \$2,760. The increase keeps the amount in line with increases in general average wages."

For earnings over \$3,000 in 1977, social security benefits will be reduced by \$1 for every \$2 earned. "But no matter how much people earn for the year," the spokesman said, "they can get their full social security benefit for any month in which they neither earn over \$250 nor do substantial work in their own business." The 1976 monthly earnings limit was \$230.

Different rules apply to disabled people who are getting social security disabliity benefits. "And people 72 and over will continue to get their full social security benefits regardless of earnings," the spokes-

People who earn over \$2,760 and get benefits in 1976 must send a report on 1976 earnings to social security by April 15,

The social security tax rate remains the same in 1977-5.85 percent of covered wages paid by employees and The 1976 base was \$15,300. employers; 7.9 percent of Since benefit amounts

covered self-employed income. The earnings and contributions base-the amount on which social security contributions are made-will be the first \$16,500 of covered earnings for the year, starting in January.

Since benefit amounts are based on average earnings covered by social security, the increase in the wage base means that while some people may pay more in social security taxes, they will be entitled to higher payments later.

Social security pays over \$6.2 billion a month in retirement, disability, and survivors benefits to over 32 million people. The Social Security Administration is an agency of the U.S. Department of Health, Educa-

Q. I'll be a December bride. I already have a social security card. Should I report my new name to social security?

A. Yes. It's important that your earnings both before and after the wedding be correctly credited to your record. Call, write, or visit any social security office to get a form for making the change. You will get a social security card showing your new name and the same number you now have.

Q. My aunt is 81 and will soon enter a nursing home. Who should handle her social security payments if she is no longer able to?

A representative payee may be needed to handle your aunt's social security benefits in

her best interest. You or some other relative or responsible person should discuss the matter with the people at any social security office.

Q. My daughter is 16 and has a severe kidney ailment. Since she has never worked and neither my wife nor I get social security benefits, is there any way my daughter can get help from Medicare?

A. If either you or your wife has worked long enough under payments. social security, Medicare can help pay the bills for your daughter if she has permanent kidney failure. Call or write any social security office for more information.

Q. I live alone in a rented room and my only income is \$150.50 a month from social security. Can I get supplemental security income?

A. If you're 65 or over, blind, or disabled, and your resources are limited, you may be eligible for some supplemental security income (SSI) payment. It might be just a few dollars a month. but every little bit can help nowadays. Call or write any social security office for information about applying for SSI


