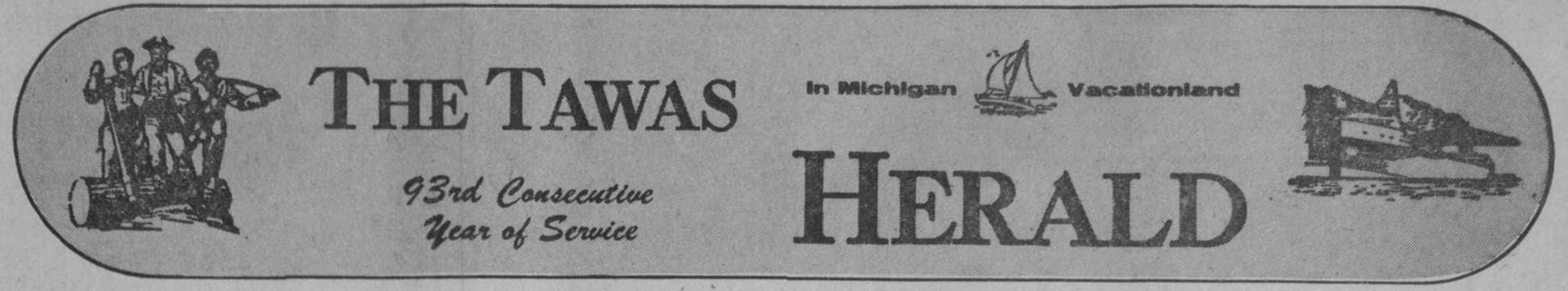


## February Events

### Resigns from Board of Directors

## McKay to Channel Efforts to Develop Property

L. G. (Ladd) McKay Jr., who was elected Tuesday to his 27th term on the board of directors of Peoples State Bank, resigned after chairmanship the 50th anniversary meeting of the bank's shareholders.

McKay, who controls the major stock in the bank and had served the past 10 years as board chairman, said that although he had reached his decision rather quick-

ly, it was with a great deal of consideration.

"I plan to devote full time now to development of two new apartment buildings and a new subdivision at East Tawas, along with development of my waterfront property in Tawas City," said McKay.

"I have hired an Ann Arbor architectural firm to see that the waterfront property is properly developed into motel-recreational uses and these same professionals will be developing a new subdivision on East Lincoln Street."

McKay said that survey work would begin immediately on one new apartment building on East Lincoln Street and that construction on that project would begin in the spring.

Due to these new interests, which he has been considering for a number of years, McKay said he would not have time to devote to the bank's board of directors. "I have served 26 years on the board and 10 years as its chairman—normally, one is permitted and often is required to retire after that length of time," he stated.

"I do not have to stay around the bank to protect my majority interest. We have a very competent board of directors, which works long hours and has received many compliments from state banking authorities for its careful

direction of bank affairs," he stated.

He said, too, that Roger McIntosh had taken over active management of McIntosh-McKay Chevrolet Sales, which would allow him to channel all of his efforts in development of his Tawas area property.

In addition, McKay said his resignation following the re-election would allow the board of directors to appoint an immediate replacement, rather than to wait the required year for such action.

McKay said that he was most enthusiastic concerning development of his property in Tawas City, which comprises 1,000 feet of Tawas Bay frontage and 680 feet of US-23 (Lake Street) frontage between the Kroger Store and the city park.

In recent years, he has considered development of the property into a "Holiday Inn" type of resort, which would include moorings for power boats at the former site of the old Prescott dock. An avid sailor, McKay said that Tawas Bay had never been used to its fullest recreational advantage and he plans to do something about it.

"I have challenged my architects to develop a plan for this property, which consists of the best frontage on the Great Lakes.

Northeastern Michigan was once the state leader in the resort field, but we have fallen behind other sections of Michigan. Development of the new Michigan Waterways Commission dock project at East Tawas starting this year should help to turn this around and development of a new motor inn overlooking Tawas Bay should be another asset for the entire region because of its convention possibilities," he stated.

Initial steps toward this end were taken several years ago when McKay purchased the former Iosco Hotel in Tawas City with its Class B liquor license. Through changes in state licensing, he said he planned to apply for a new license at the resort and replace the old hotel building—now Lad's Padd—with a modern tavern at the rear of the property overlooking Tawas River.

His new Banksiana Subdivision at East Tawas (Pinus Banksiana is the scientific name for jack pine) is to be newly developed to replace a plot which formerly had been considered. Trees are to be transplanted in present roads and some trees are to be removed. Development would include a new plat, construction of paved streets, curbs and gutters, water, sewer and underground electrical service.

Preliminary plans for the two

new apartment buildings on Lincoln Street were presented last year to the East Tawas Council.

"So you can see, I will be going down a new path and a new life; I am saying 'goodbye' to the old and 'hello' to the new," said McKay.

The former bank chairman took over that position from his father, the late L. G. McKay Sr., in 1966, after serving as manager of the Chevrolet dealership since his return from World War II.

The senior McKay had been associated with banking at East Tawas since April 23, 1903, and operated Ealy McKay banks until May 1927. He established Peoples State Bank of East Tawas on June 28, 1927.

John Lippert, president of Peoples State Bank, reported Tuesday that the bank had enjoyed an exceptionally good year in 1976, grossing nearly \$300,000. The bank declared its second 10 percent stock dividend in three years and the remainder was retained in its capital account. Lippert announced a forthcoming sale of new stock in the amount of \$132,000 par value.

Present directors re-elected be- ginner McKay and Lippert include Charles Schreck, Paul Chevis, Hugo Keiser Jr., Harold Knight, Howard Look, Richard Harris and Lloyd Peltier.

### Winter Hard on Water Mains

## DPW Repaired 13th Break Monday

A certain amount of job expertise is acquired through repetition, but the Tawas City Department of Public Works would rather not have any more water line breaks this winter. This is wishful thinking, however, as the department repaired its 13th break of the season Monday and more are expected before spring.

Last Wednesday, the DPW crew repaired a break on Ninth Avenue in the record time of 25 minutes. This meant that water service to Tawas Plating Company was interrupted only briefly and that production was not seriously curtailed.

That break was not as serious as one last week caused by ground frost, which closed schools for one afternoon and required six hours of work to repair. Monday's water line break was on Eighth Avenue near the Tawas City Elementary School and was repaired in short order. This break was in the vicinity of a break earlier in the season.

At its recent meeting, the city water board authorized purchase of a "leak detector" to speed up the process of repairing water main breaks.

The department of public works emphasizes that home owners can eliminate some present and future water line freezes on private prop-

erty by leaving a tap running in each dwelling. Although this will add some cost to water service, it could mean prevention of an expensive plumbing repair bill should a water line become frozen.

This "leave the tap running" policy is emphasized, too at East Tawas by William Smith, superintendent of public works. Smith said Monday that his department had not experienced Tawas City's problem with broken cast iron water mains, but he said that his crew had thawed five frozen lines crossing city streets.

These copper service lines connecting to larger mains became frozen when reached by frost un-

der heavy pounding of traffic. "We tried to use steam to thaw one line, but we were unsuccessful. It has been a policy not to use an electric welder on a line under a street due to the possibility of damage, but we had to make an exception Monday."

Smith said that an electrical welder was finally used Monday on one line along Bay Street, which had been frozen since early last week.

The East Tawas DPW superintendent said that many frozen lines had been reported on private property, for which the owner is responsible.

## Man Died of Exposure on Bay Ice

Following an autopsy Sunday, death of a 29-year-old East Tawas man was attributed to exposure. The body was found by fishermen Saturday afternoon on the ice of Tawas Bay.

Investigating Michigan State Police said that Dan Forest Coulter, an unemployed janitor, was wearing only cut off jeans, a light weight shirt and hiking boots when his body was found at 2:00 p. m.

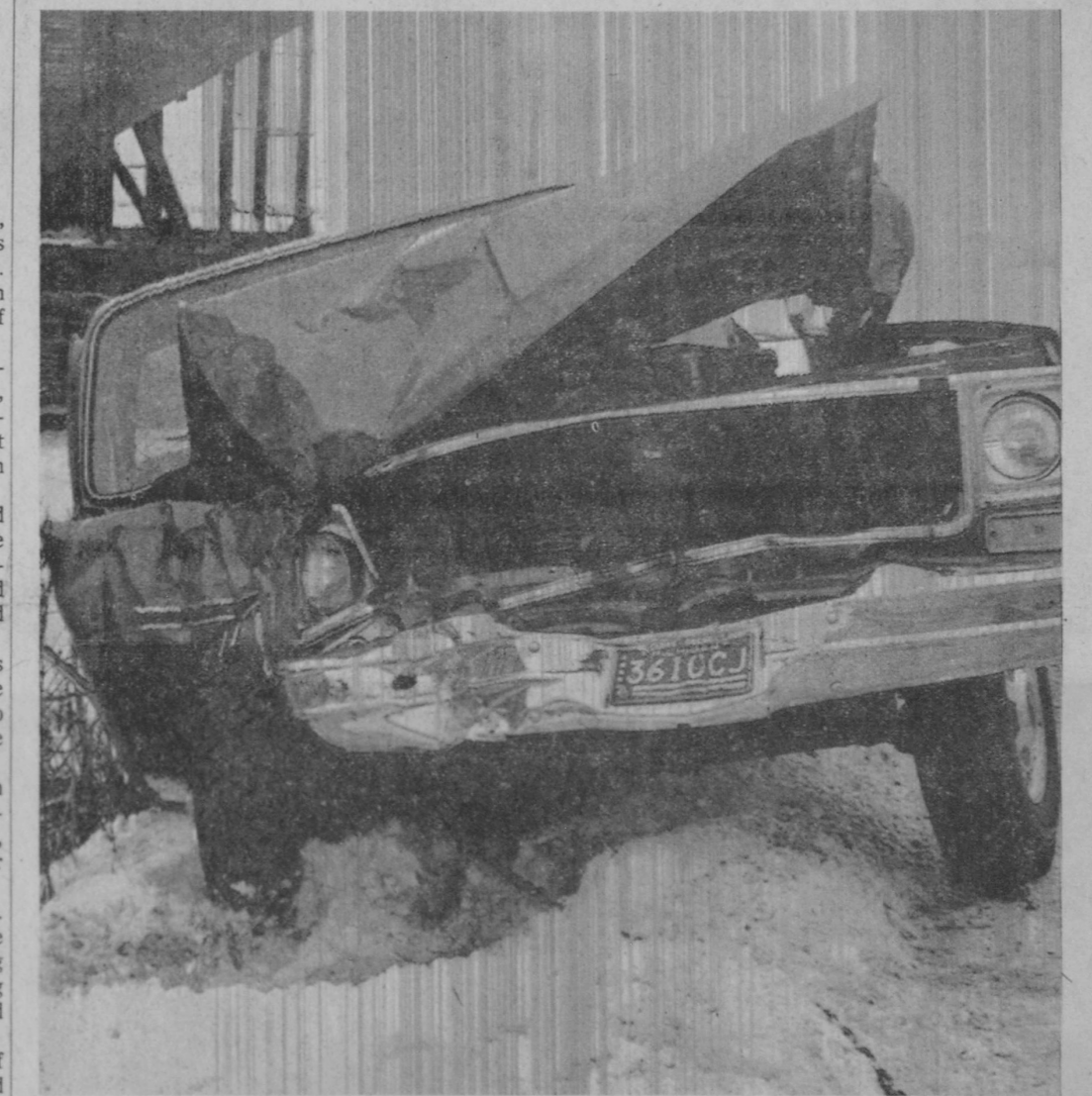
Coulter apparently had walked out on the ice at Tawas Point some time Friday night or early Saturday morning and started toward East Tawas. His body was found two miles from shore.

Police said that no foul play was suspected. Officers followed the dead man's footprints back to shore and could find no evidence that he had been with anyone.

Officers said that Coulter was an avid hiker and, checking his apartment at Tiki Motel at East Tawas, found his back pack and other equipment prepared for use.

He was last seen alive at 9:30 p. m. Friday. A motorist told police that Coulter had been hitchhiking along US-23. He was wearing warm clothing at the time, said the witness.

Coulter had been a resident of East Tawas for about a year and formerly had lived at Pontiac. His father, Robert L. Coulter, resides at 7181 North US-23, Oscoda.

## Escapes Train Collision With Only Minor Injuries

Willard Hayes, Carpenter Road, Tawas City, sustained leg, arm and facial injuries Tuesday morning when his pickup truck slammed into the front of a Detroit and Mackinac Railway locomotive at the National City crossing south of Rainbow Gardens.

Hayes was rushed by ambulance to Tawas Hospital.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said that Hayes was headed south on National City Road. The crash occurred shortly before 11 o'clock.

A member of the train crew who witnessed the crash, Jerry Kendall, brakeman, Tawas City, said he was riding in the locomotive cab on the left side. He saw that the pickup was going to collide with the train and applied the locomotive's emergency braking system prior to the impact.

The train stopped after seven cars passed through the crossing. Hayes' truck was thrown into a ditch on the east side of the road. Damage to the truck was total and damage to the locomotive was estimated at \$500.

John Novak of Alpena was engineer of the train and Arnold Kuerbitz of Tawas City was the conductor. William Kendall, brakeman, brother of Jerry, was riding in the caboose with Kuerbitz.

The conductor said the train was headed east toward National Gypsum Company's White Rock Quarry with a string of empty gondola cars.

Two patrol cars were dispatched

to the scene by the Iosco Sheriff's Department. One car skidded into a ditch on an icy road and a third patrol car was dispatched to the scene by Michigan State Police from East Tawas.

## McKay Residence Offered to City

Following a meeting last week with city officials, L. G. (Ladd) McKay announced today that he was submitting a letter to the East Tawas Council offering to sell to the city the former residence of his parents on US-23.

This residence, which has frontage on Tawas Bay and is located west of the city park, was termed as the "city's finest" when constructed around 1890.

Should the offer be accepted, it is expected that the house would be used as a new location for a library and museum. The Jones residence between the west end of the city park and the McKay residence

would be removed for park expansion, according to one plan under consideration.

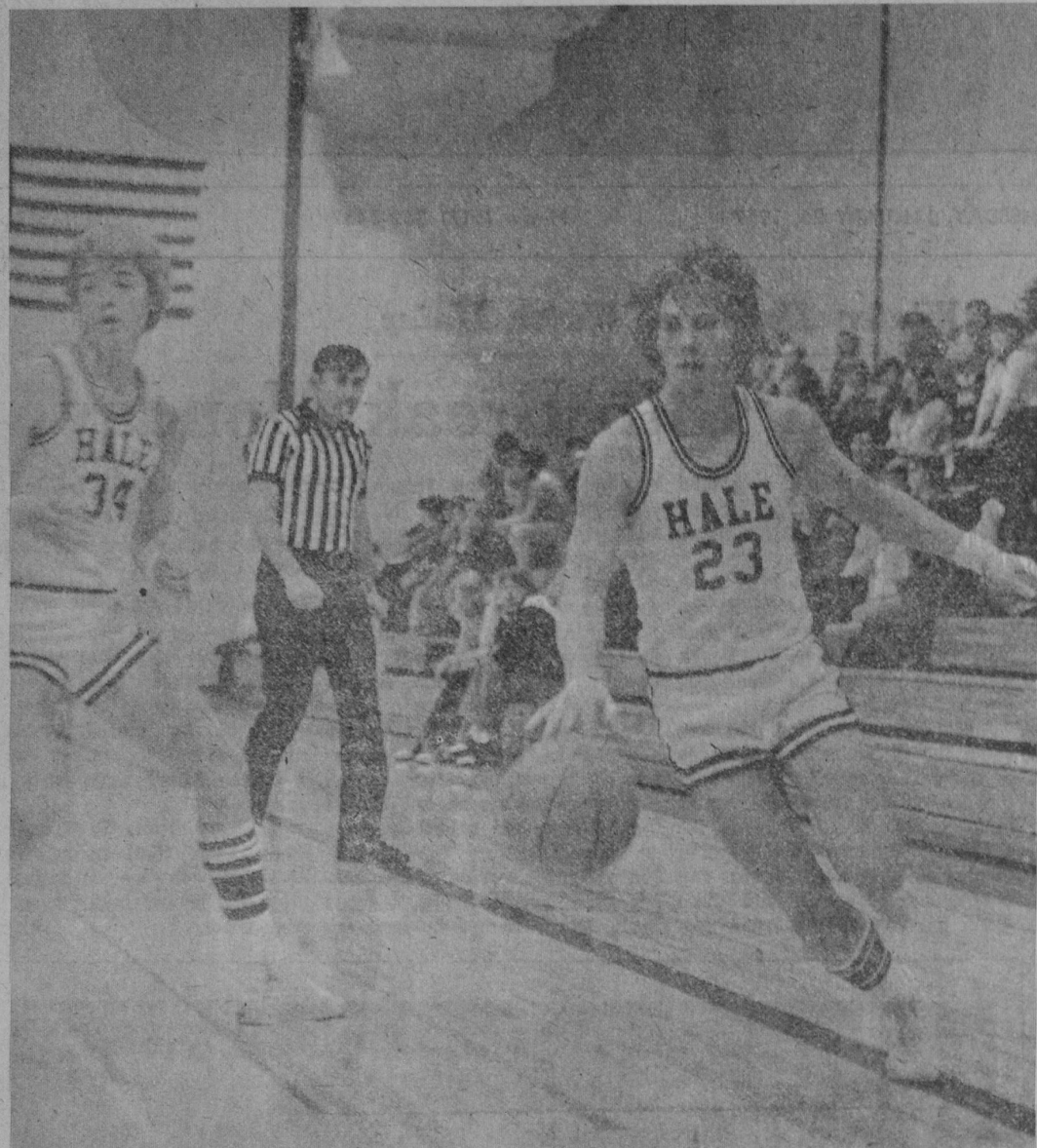
Future acquisition of lake front property for recreational and other public purposes from the city park west to Pine Street has been under consideration for many years and is included in the city's master plan.

McKay said the property has been appraised at \$66,800 by the city's tax assessor and he was offering it for \$70,000. On receipt of a check, McKay said he would donate \$5,000 to the city to be used for altering the house for public purposes.

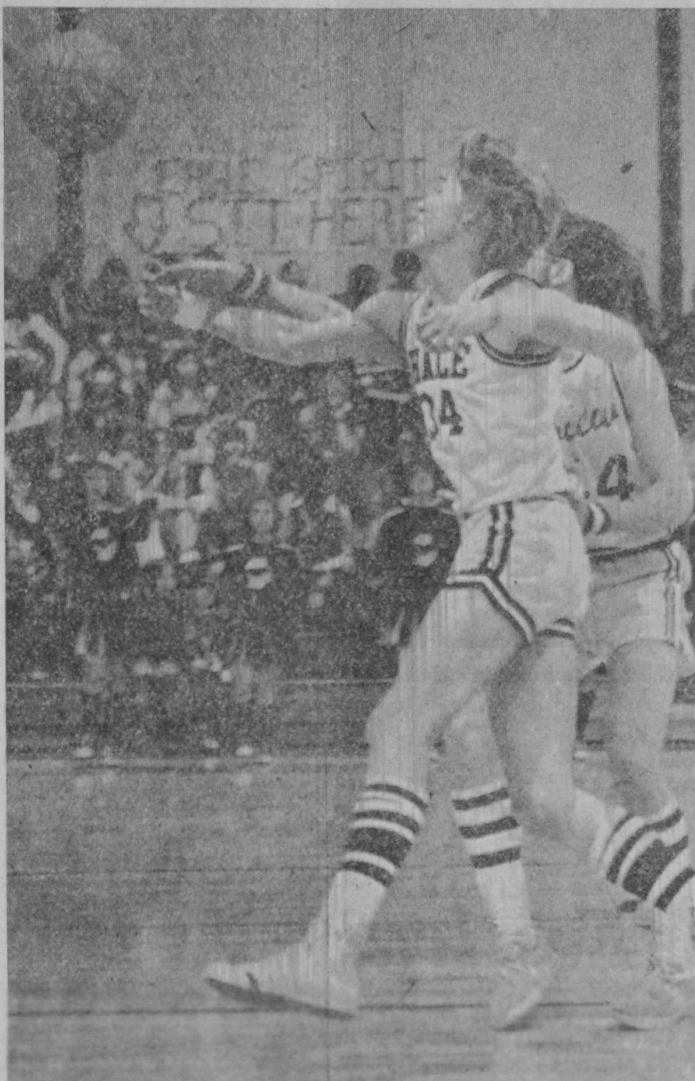

The preliminary game went to Fairview, 57-46.

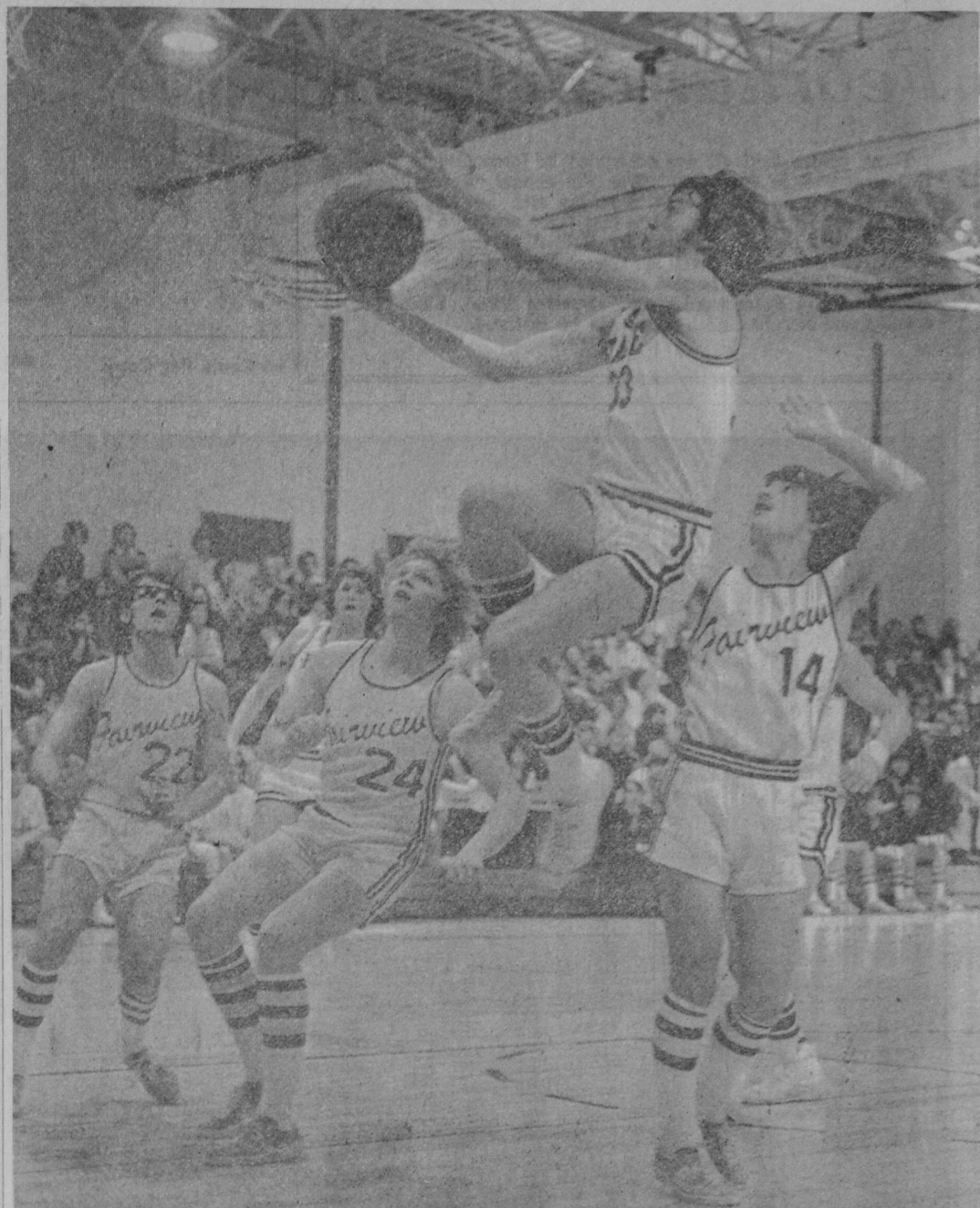

Other conference action saw the unbeaten Ogemaw Heights Falcons, NEM leaders, winning over Whittemore-Prescott, 56-47; Gladwin edged Pinconning, 76-75.

The Braves jumped off to a quick start against the Panthers and held on for the victory.

Mark Fisher led the winners with 22 points while Jeff Tousley added 16. Butch Duvall had 14 and Neil Warner scored 10.

Tim Swanson of Central led all scorers for the night with 31 points. Other Panthers scoring in double figures were John Meyers with 12 and Tom Strong with 10.

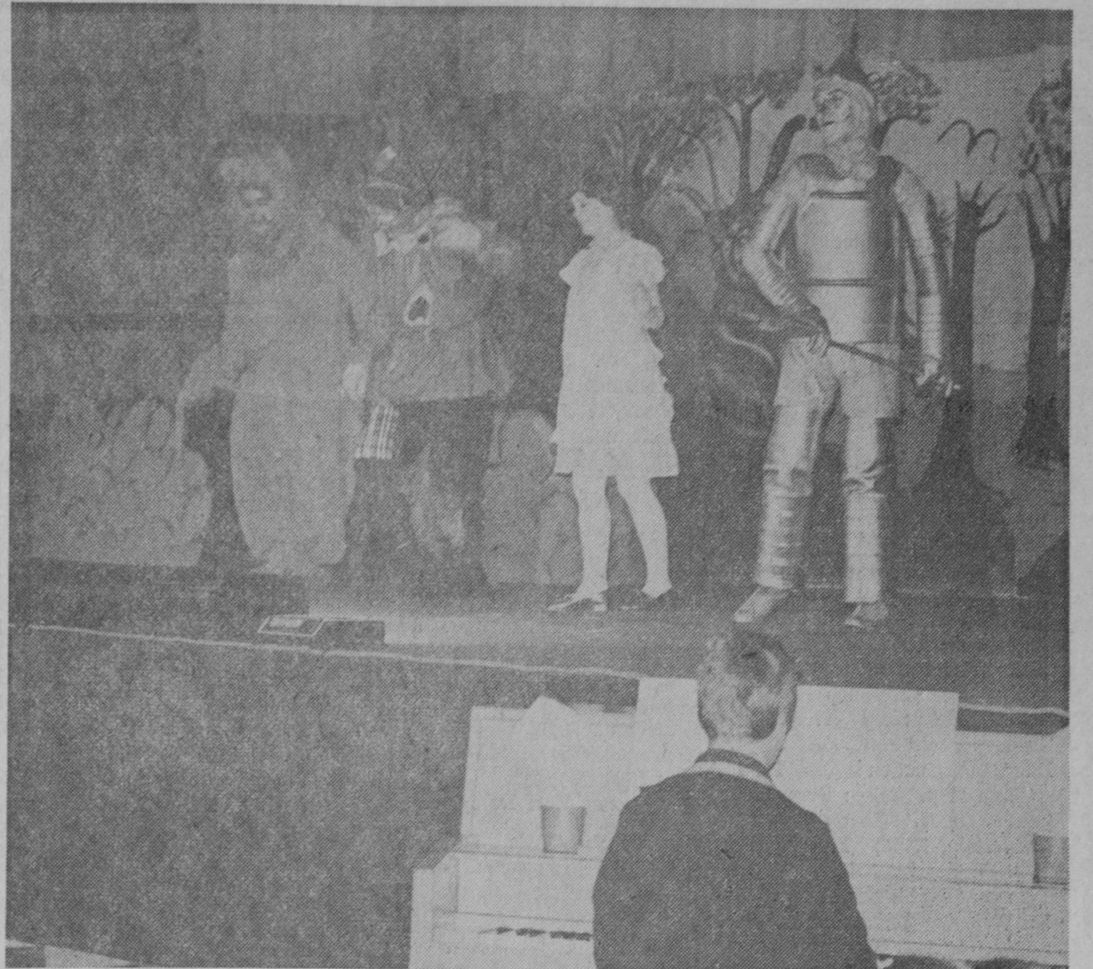

The free IRS Publication 501, "Your Exemption and Exemptions for Dependents," covers claiming children as a dependency deduction and can be obtained by filling out the handy order blank appearing in the instructions portion of the tax package.

## Report Shows County Had Record Revenue During 1976

Total revenue collected by the Iosco County treasurer's office in 1976 amounted to \$1,392,780, up \$199,935 over the preceding year, according to a report Wednesday to the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

County Treas. Edward Nelkie's report said that revenues had increased every year but one during the past nine years. In 1968, total revenue was \$453,891.

Actual revenues received by the county included \$313,661.53 in fees, which was \$1,338.47 under the budget estimate; real estate taxes of \$900,291.28, an increase of \$42,940.28 over the budget; state income tax of \$145,559.20, which was \$9,440.30 less than anticipated in the budget. Other fees included \$26,976.51 from Tawas City for police protection and a forest service contract of \$6,291.

Fees collected by county officers included: Animal control, \$2,763.50; building inspection, \$34,204; county clerk, \$39,960; district court, \$75,987; equalization department, \$2,413; probate judge, \$4,955; register of deeds, \$51,377; county treasurer, \$89,281; sheriff, \$12,689.

In other business conducted Wednesday, the commission authorized payment of \$35,625 in revenue sharing funds to Oscoda Township for industrial development.

The county is to have another state probation and parole officer and the commission authorized conversion of a vault and closet in

the present office as quarters for the new person.

Approval was given to the appointment of Joyce Lixey as probation officer for the 81st District Court. The appointment is temporary pending the naming of a permanent officer.

The county clerk, county treasurer and register of deeds, along with three members of the United Steel Workers Union, were designated as a classification committee for jobs in the county building.

It was announced that the committee meetings of the board of commissioners are to be held the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month at the county building. Although no official action can be taken at those meetings, it would provide a time for discussion of public matters to be presented at regular meetings on the first and third Wednesdays of each month.

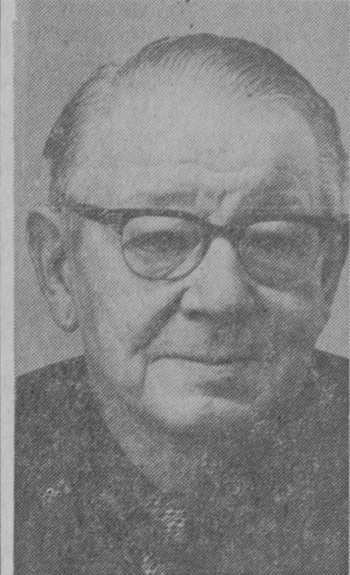
## Aulerich Heads Parks & Recreation

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## Commission Hears Building Report; Request for Dept. Salary Increases

Construction permits with a value of \$6,574,972 were issued in seven townships and two cities of Iosco County during 1976 by the county department of building and safety inspection.

In his annual report Wednesday to the county board of commissioners, Francis Block, administrator, said that 551 permits were issued by the building division, 609 electrical permits, 277 plumbing permits and 27 soil erosion and sedimentation control permits.

The building division serves Oscoda, Baldwin, Reno, Burleigh, Sherman, Grant and Wilber Townships as well as Tawas City and Whittemore.

The department provides plumbing inspection service and soil erosion and sedimentation control for the entire county and provides electrical inspections for the entire county with the exception of East Tawas.

Block reported that permits issued by his office totaled 1,465 with department revenue of \$34,204.44. The office issued 253 correction notices, made 2,579 inspections with 37,492 miles of travel, investigated 20 complaints and made 480 electrical releases to Consumers Power Company.

A recommendation by the director that the base fee be increased from \$20 to \$30 for building inspection, as permitted by the state fee schedule, was taken under advisement by the commission. Block felt that the increase would make the department self sufficient and would generate \$6,200 for the general fund.

Donald Griffin, Oscoda commissioner, expressed the opinion that the department was not in business to make a profit and felt that the proposal should be studied carefully before any action is taken.

Block expressed the opinion that salaries of the administrator and two inspectors were inadequate. He said the office was open 10 hours a day during the building season and nine hours a day during winter months. Block said his \$10,500 annual salary was the lowest paid to a building official in the state and that he was the only department head in the county not given a salary increase for 1977. No action was taken by the board of commissioners.

The board authorized the director and one inspector to attend a meeting of the Northern Michigan Building Inspection Association at Gaylord on January 28.

### TO THE CUSTOMERS OF MICHIGAN CONSOLIDATED GAS COMPANY Notice of Hearing on Michigan Public Service Commission Proposal Relating to Conservation of Natural Gas

The Michigan Public Service Commission (Commission) in its Order and Notice of Hearing dated December 22, 1976 in Case No. U-5272 initiated proceedings to elicit evidence and comments on a proposal by its Staff for the installation by gas utilities of ceiling insulation, flue restrictors, and other furnace attachment devices in the homes of residential customers for the purpose of inducing energy conservation.

A public hearing in this matter is scheduled to commence at 9:00 a.m. on March 1 and continue on March 2, 1977, in the Commission's Offices in the Mercantile Building, 6545 Mercantile Way, Lansing, Michigan.

Any interested person or organization shall be permitted to participate as a party in the proceeding. All persons and organizations, other than the regulated gas utilities, that desire to participate in these proceedings shall, on or before February 11, 1977, file with the Commission a notice of their intent to participate in the hearing.

The proceedings herein shall be conducted in the manner of a legislative inquiry and statements, though made under oath, shall not be subject to cross-examination. The Administrative Law Judge and the Staff shall, however, be permitted to pose questions to clarify the positions of the various witnesses.

The Commission believes that increased conservation of gas in the State of Michigan is particularly necessary, and that the Commission should encourage the conservation of natural gas and, if possible, assist in increasing the supply of natural gas for the benefit of present as well as potential customers of Michigan gas utilities, the State, and the nation. The proceedings are for the purpose of obtaining a thorough analysis and assessment of the Staff proposal under which gas utilities regulated by the Commission would contract to have minimum levels of insulation, flue restrictors, furnace modifications or other cost-effective devices designed to promote the conservation of natural gas installed in the residences of customers desiring to participate in the program. As proposed, the utilities would be allowed to place the cost of labor and materials in their rate base so as to earn a return on their investment.

The Staff estimates that the installation of ceiling insulation and furnace devices in all Michigan residences currently served with natural gas will produce gas savings of 80 billion cubic feet per year at an annual cost of \$117 million. The average cost increase of the conservation program to Michigan customers is estimated to be 13¢

per Mcf. However, it is anticipated that the cost of the program would be more than offset by the savings resulting from a reduction in consumption. The Staff proposal indicates that although rates would have to increase slightly to cover the cost of the program, customers could realize an actual savings, because of a reduction in consumption, in the amount of \$40 to \$80 annually.

The Commission ordered all regulated gas utilities to appear and present evidence which analyzes and assesses the proposal outlined in the Order and Notice and to file a written summary of their oral presentation at the conclusion of their testimony. Further, the Commission requested that the evidence presented at the hearing in this matter shall relate to:

1. The question of whether the proposal is an effective manner by which to achieve the desired objectives,
2. The costs and problems associated with the implementation of the proposal.
3. The revenue impact on the company if the proposal is adopted and implemented.
4. The amount of increase, if any, in the cost of natural gas to the customers of the particular utility which may occur after the implementation of the program.
5. The question of which rate class or classes should absorb any possible costs which arise out of the implementation of the program.
6. Any amendments to the proposal or alternative methods of achieving the same objectives.

Subsequent to the conclusion of the hearings, parties may file briefs in which they analyze or comment upon any evidence presented at the hearings in this matter. Such briefs shall be submitted to the Commission on or before March 25, 1977.

## In Grandpa's Day Weather Was Rugged

### If You Think It's Cold—Listen In

Scientists predicted last year that the world was headed for another ice age—after more than two months of record low temperatures, the nation would agree with the new ice age premise.

These same scientists also point out that when grandpa used to say the weather was more rugged back in his day, he was not just spinning yarns. Records show that winters really were colder before 1900 than they were in the first half of the twentieth century. There was a gradual warming trend to about 1950, when the thermometer began to drop and it has continued downward.

In making such dire predictions, however, climatologists should be aware that every winter prior to 1900 was not cold. For instance, here in Michigan in 1877 and 1878, residents believed they were headed into a new warm age. Local newspapers recorded that no ice had formed in Tawas Bay during either of those two winters and snow was in such supply that lumbermen were going bankrupt—a covering of snow on the ground was necessary to move saw logs.

The situation became so critical due to the lack of snow that the lumbermen decided to build a railroad out of Tawas to bring in their logs. That idea initially proved to be a fiasco—there was so much snow in 1879 that the railroad could not operate!

The lowest temperature on record for Iosco County was in 1934. On February 9 of that year, the Silver Creek Ranger Station in Huron National Forest recorded 46 degrees below zero; at 8:00 a.m., the recording was 38 degrees below zero.

The state's all-time low was set in 1934 at Vanderport in the Northern Lower Peninsula when the temperature fell to 51 degrees below zero.

Although the above two records may be isolated cases, it would appear that the "warming trend" theory after 1900 could be just so much hot air. The winter of 1937-38 is another classic exception to the theory—that was the winter when conditions became so severe that deer laid on the ground with-

out moving for days on end to conserve energy, according to one conservation department official. Hundreds of deer starved right here in Iosco County.

Despite some evidence that weather conditions may run in cycles, the threat of a new ice age may not be just a bizarre story—a recent study of the last ice age, which began 18,000 years ago, has unearthed the hitherto unknown fact that it was the cause of droughts. The study has shown that it snowed very little during the ice age and the world became increasingly arid—just as it is becoming today.

Climatologists say that the world may be heading into a cold snap that might linger for years—how long, no one seems to know. In the past, cool spells usually lasted for between 100 and 150 years with a minimum of about 40 years.

On the other hand, several successive mild winters probably would bring dire predictions of a world wide warming trend—just as

was the case a few years ago when it was feared that the arctic ice cap was disappearing.

The Hartford Courant hit the nail on the head 80 years ago when

it commented: "Everybody talks about the weather, but nobody does anything about it." The world can be thankful that science has not achieved that power.

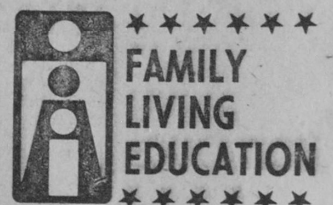

**BWARE OF BRIBES, THREATS AND PROMISES**

The third article in a series of four on effective family communications. Sometimes the easy ways of dealing with children can be self defeating causing more of the problems that parents are trying to avoid. Bribes, threats or promises are easy to make and may have an immediate impact upon children but they may also pave the way for more trouble. Haim Ginott, a noted child psychologist, finds fault with each of these ways of seeking compliance. He explains how each can be interpreted by a child in ways that parents have not intended and can cause behavior problems that parents had not anticipated.

Bribes may get immediate results the first few times they are used but a child will quickly learn to expect something in return for everything that he does.

Bribes teach a child that it does not pay to be helpful if you are not going to be rewarded. With such a system, misbehaving is the first step in getting something special. A child also learns to ask for what he will get in return for being cooperative. This can become a bit of a burden in many ways for any parent. Of course, children need to be rewarded for their good behavior, but if bribes always accompany requests for cooperation they will soon lose their meaning. Making unrealistic promises can

also lead to problems. Often promises can become impossible to keep. When broken, so is the sense of trust that a child needs to develop in his parents. Children, too, can break promises which does little for helping parents develop confidence in their children. It is just best to avoid making promises unless you can be assured that it will be possible to keep them. It is

important for children to learn that occasionally promises do have to be broken, but if this does not happen frequently children will learn to trust their parents' good intentions. Be cautious when you make promises and you will build trusting relationships with your children instead of giving them reason to question your honesty.

Threats can become invitations for more misbehavior. The mother who says, "John, if you slam that door one more time I will lock you out of the house forever!" is asking for more slammed doors. Imagine the fantasies that such a statement could provoke! The

"one more time" would be sure to come and then what would have Mom and John accomplished? To John's disappointment, Mom has not locked him out and John has slammed the door one more time. John has learned not to pay any attention to such wild threats and Mom is frustrated at her inability to get John to be helpful. Instead of using a threat, John's mother could have said, "Hey John, when you slam that door my head really hurts and it frightens the baby. Please try to remember to close that door more quietly." John now knows why mother prefers quiet doors. The request makes sense to

him and is not a senseless rule that has no meaning to him. Instead of using bribes, promises or threats, build a more honest relationship with your child that focuses upon the task to be accomplished. This will help your child respect the reasons for your request and provide him with a better understanding of why you ask him to cooperate with you. If the reasons for limits are explained and a child knows that he is respected, he will more willingly respect your requests. He will also be growing in his ability to be a more cooperative and social member of the family.

# DART Bus System to Expand in Iosco County

Expansion of the DART bus transportation system to serve all areas of Iosco County was given formal approval Wednesday by the county board of commissioners.

This question has been under discussion at the county building since October, when it was proposed by the Trio Council on Aging and the Michigan Department of

State Highways and Transportation.

After delaying action until new members of the county board of commissioners assumed their positions in January, the board gave its tentative approval a week ago.

Under the new program, the present three-bus system would be expanded to six full time buses through a system developed by the

department of state highways and transportation.

First year costs for this new system would amount to \$227,700. The state has committed \$203,000 to the operation and the county's commitment is \$1,000, which was approved last week by the board of commissioners.

Included in the state's portion would be \$96,000 in capital outlay

for new buses. Fare estimates for the first year amount to \$23,700.

Joseph Fox was formally designated as the county's transportation coordinator to act as the official liaison between the county board of commissioners and the department of state highways and transportation. A system director would be appointed by the county board of commissioners.

In its official resolution, the county board of commissioners indicated its intention to continue public transportation service beyond the first year if the service is successful and if it is financially feasible for the county to do so.

The second year of operation has a total estimated cost of \$142,200, with revenue estimated at \$30,000. State Assistance would amount to

\$47,000 and the local funding balance would be \$64,700.

The board of commissioners would determine the planned method of financing 90 days prior to expiration of the first year of service. If the service proves successful, the county probably would ask voters to approve necessary tax millage to finance the service.

**Proposed Flood Elevation Determinations for the CITY OF TAWAS, MICHIGAN**  
The Federal Insurance Administrator, in accordance with Section 110 of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (P. L. 93-234), 87 Stat. 980, which added Section 1363 to the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (Title XIII of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 P. L. 90-448), 42 U. S. C. 4001-4128, and 24 CFR Part 1917 (Section 1917.4 (a)), hereby gives notice of his proposed determinations of flood elevations for the City of Tawas, Michigan.

Under these Acts, the Administrator, to whom the Secretary has delegated the statutory authority, must develop criteria for flood plain management in identified flood hazard areas. In order to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program, the City of Tawas must adopt sound flood plain management measures that are consistent with the flood elevations determined by the Secretary.

Proposed flood elevations (100-year flood) are listed below for selected locations. Maps and other information showing the detailed outlines of the flood-prone areas and the proposed flood elevations are available for review at City Hall, 508 Lake Street West, Tawas, Michigan 48763.

Any person having knowledge, information, or wishing to make a comment on these determinations should immediately notify Mayor Herbert Cholger, City Hall, 508 Lake Street West, Tawas, Michigan 48763. The period for comment will be ninety days following the second publication of this notice in a newspaper of local circulation in the above-named community.
