





Competitive sailing has continued down through the years on Tawas Bay and district or national regattas of Lightning and National Class sailboats of the past two decades have attracted larger numbers of boats than at any other time in history, but the excitement of the 1897-1907 era has never been matched.

Gone are the 30 to 40-foot gaffrigged yachts, the super fast boats of the Cadillac-Detroit class, the \$500 purses and side bets and the special passenger trains which brought hundreds of spectators to Tawas Bay to watch the races.
