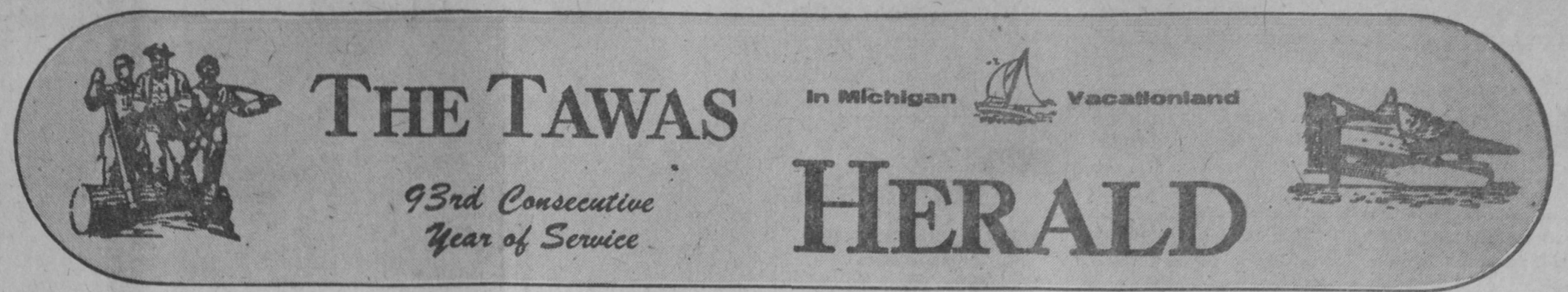


Jury Acquitted Oscoda Man of Felonious Assault Charge

A 44-year-old Oscoda man, Thomas W. Harrison, was acquitted of felonious assault Wednesday by an Isosco County Circuit Court Jury.

Harrison contended during the three-day trial that he had defended himself when attacked by Lee Williams, Oscoda, and Leon Williams, Hale, both 41. The two men were found in the snow outside of Harrison's home on January 8. Both survived severed jugular veins.

Presiding at the trial was Judge John X. Theiler, Bay County. Isosco County Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller was sitting as the one-man grand jury probing the administration of a former Bay County sheriff.

Construction Started Last Week on Manitou Village Apts.

Ground was broken Wednesday for a \$750,000 apartment complex on Fourth Avenue, Tawas City, to be known as Manitou Village.

"Our goal is to provide the nicest apartment project in the county," said George Myles, Jerry Cotter and James DeRosia, partners in the development.

Under consideration for the past two years, the project is to be located directly south of the North Street site of the new nursing home facility to be constructed by Provincial House, Incorporated, and within walking distance of the Tawas Area Senior Citizens Drop-in Center located in the American Legion Hall on North Street.

Name of this new apartment complex is indigenous to the area in that the word, Manitou, appears in Longfellow's "Song of Hiawatha," in which Tawasentha and

words of other Indian origin appear.

The apartment complex is to be designed in two sections, one on each side of and facing Fourth Avenue. Construction on the east complex is expected to be completed by mid-November and the west complex is to be completed by mid-December.

Each unit will be 222 feet in length, of two-story construction and each will contain 24 apartment units. Included will be eight one-bedroom units and 40 two-bedroom units. The latter will contain 780 square feet of floor space in each unit.

Parking spaces will be provided for 72 cars or 1 1/2 cars for each unit. A green belt is to surround each apartment complex.

Individual apartment units on the ground floor will each have sliding glass doors leading to patios and second floor units will have sliding glass doors leading to balconies. Each unit is to be equipped with a range, refrigerator and garbage disposal. Laundry facilities are to be located in each building and all apartments are to be fully carpeted.

Open House Friday at New County Garage

Open house for the new central garage and office complex of the Isosco Road Commission is to be held Friday, 10:00 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. and 6:00 p. m. to 8:00 p. m. The new building is located on M-55, east of the Sand Lake Road intersection in Grant Township.

Ground was broken for the building in April 1976 and was completed in about a year. Cost has been estimated at \$900,000.

One Killed, Five Hurt on Motorcycles

A 20-year-old Detroit man was killed Sunday when his motorcycle crashed in Plainfield Township. The accident was one of six involving motorcycles investigated last week by the Isosco County Sheriff's Department.

Killed was Daniel K. Smith. Investigating officers said that he missed a curve on Long Lake Road at Webb Road. The motorcycle was airborne for about 35 feet before crashing in a field.

Sheriff's Dept. Lists Complaints Investigated

Four larcenies, two breakings and enterings and two vandalism complaints were investigated last week by Isosco County Sheriff's Department.

Vandalism complaints were reported at Tawas Area High School, where an automobile tore up the football field and hit a fence, and by Max Osborne of Tawas City, who reported that someone had thrown an anchor through the bottom of a 12-foot aluminum boat.

Sherman Voters Reject Millage

Voters of Sherman Township rejected two millage proposals during a special election last week.

By a 33-10 margin, township voters turned down a one-mill proposal for three years for fire protection. A second proposal seeking one mill for three years to be used for roads and bridges lost, 27-15.

County Commission to Discuss New Contract for Sanitary Landfill

At the top of Wednesday's (today) agenda for the Isosco County Board of Commissioners will be a discussion on a new contract for the county's sanitary landfill.

At a meeting last month, W. C. Roach, one of the owners of the landfill, presented a new three-year contract calling for a 25 percent increase this year and pay-

ments during the next two years to be based on county population and an inflation factor.

Carlton Merschel, acting chairman of the commission, said that the old contract called for a payment of \$75,000 annually, using federal revenue sharing money. The first year under the proposed new contract would amount to \$100,000.

The acting chairman said that annual payment for the sanitary landfill service represents about one-half of the county's federal revenue sharing funds. He felt the commission would have to make a decision if this was the best use of this federal money, inasmuch as some units presently provide individual landfills.

Merschel said, too, that some consideration would be given to controlling the amount of stumps and rubbish from demolished houses being dumped at the county landfill.

It is expected that the county commission will approve an extension to the old contract for three months in order to develop terms of a new contract.

Five Channels Canoe Race Held Sunday

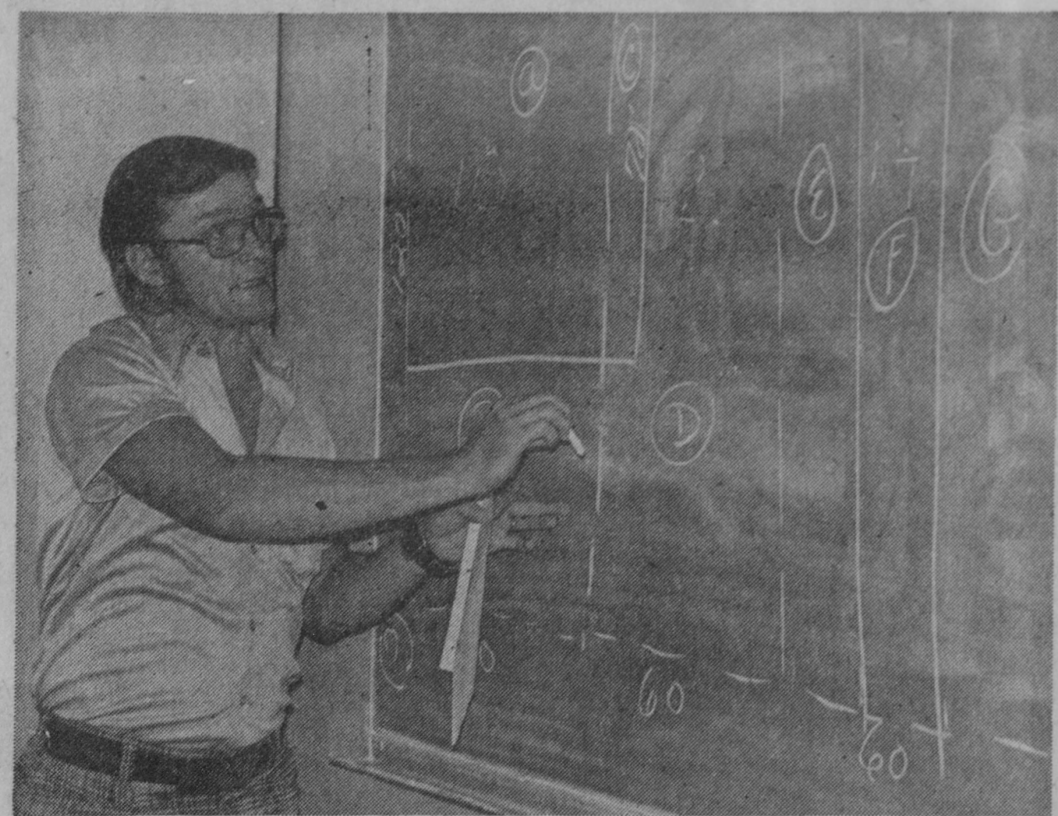
John Baker of Ann Arbor and Bob Welsch of Southgate won the third annual Five Channels Canoe Race held Sunday on the AuSable River.

Ground Broken in Tawas City for Provincial House, Inc., Nursing Home

Financing arrangements have been completed and bids have been received for construction of a Provincial House skilled nursing facility at 400 West North Street, Tawas City.

The announcement was made Wednesday by Patrick J. Callihan, president of Provincial House, Incorporated, the Lansing based health care company which owns and operates 15 other nursing facilities throughout Michigan.

Provincial House received a certificate of need from the Michigan Department of Public Health for a 117-bed facility in August 1975. The certificate is the first stage of the state planning process for construction of health care facilities.

Approval to expand the proposed facility to 120 beds was received in January.

Arrangements for an FHA insured loan in excess of \$1,000,000 through the Peoples State Bank of East Tawas and the National Bank of Detroit were finalized on June 21.

Design architect for the facility is the Manson, Jackson and Kane firm of Lansing and the in-charge architect is John Dye of Oscoda.

The nursing home will be built in an X-shape with four patient wings meeting at a central nursing station. From this central hub, nurses on duty will have a direct view of each patient doorway, Callihan explained.

"This plan has been used in most Provincial House facilities and it has proven to be an aid to

control, efficiency and the well being of our patients. The Tawas City facility will incorporate all the improvements we have made to this plan over the past decade," said Callihan.

Provincial House's construction division, PHI Construction Company, is general contractor on the project. Bids were received from

subcontractors and suppliers on June 22 and awarding of most of the subcontracts was made before the end of June.

Construction actually began on Tuesday, July 5, with a groundbreaking ceremony tentatively planned for late July. Completion of the new nursing home is scheduled for March 1978.

Joseph Fox, a member of the county board of commissioners, was instrumental in Provincial House's decision to build a facility in Tawas City, according to a company spokesman. Fox provided assistance in many areas, including locating the four-acre site which appropriately met all nursing home requirements.

Two Whittemore Youths Rescued at Bathing Beach

Harwin DeShano, 14, Whittemore, expressed his personal gratitude Wednesday to two local residents whose prompt action saved his life and that of his 11-year-old brother at the Tawas City Park.

Harwin and his brother, Ronald, were swimming at the bathing beach when they attempted to retrieve an inner tube which had floated into deep water.

"The water was up to my neck, the waves began to go over my head and I was being pulled under by the current," he stated. "A lady swimming near by came to my assistance and pulled me in to shallow water. My brother also came out to help, but he went under, too, and another swimmer helped him to get in."

Harwin said that when he regained consciousness, he was lying on a picnic table. "I guess I was 'out' for about four minutes and nearly drowned. I was taken to Tawas Hospital, just as my mother drove up in the car."

Young DeShano was treated at the hospital and then released. The rescuers were Gailya Hunt and an unidentified swimmer.

Burns Fatal to CG Chief Jerry Thomas

Chief Jerry P. Thomas, who commanded the Tawas Point Coast Guard Station for 4 1/2 years, died Friday night, July 1, at San Antonio, Texas, of burns received the previous week.

Although information received here is incomplete, a spokesman at the local coast guard station said that Chief Thomas received second degree burns over 85 percent of his body.

He had been at his home cutting grass and decided to check his camper. The camper exploded when he opened the door and it was believed to have been caused by escaping gas.

Chief Thomas was commanding officer at Tawas Point until July 28, 1976. He had served 19 1/2 years in the coast guard and left a year ago for his new command at the United States Coast Guard Station, Galveston, Texas.

Funeral services are to be conducted Thursday, July 7, 1:30 p. m., from Cederberg Funeral Home, 402 North Michigan Avenue, Saginaw, with the Rev. Charles Stuart officiating.

He was born May 23, 1938, at Saginaw.

He is survived by his wife, Kay Ann; four children, Diana Lynn, Tania Jean, Jerry P. Jr. and Scot Alan; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Preston Thomas of Hale; two brothers, Donald and James Thomas of Saginaw; a sister, Mrs. Ronald Lauer, Saginaw.

CONSUMERS POWER Company announced last week that it had offered to sell to the Department of Natural Resources 4,730 acres of the utility's land on the AuSable and Manistee Rivers. Consumers Power is asking \$1,966,000 for 1,524 acres on the AuSable and 3,206 acres on the Manistee. The price is based on appraisals by two private firms, with minor differences resolved

in meetings that followed the independent appraisals. Most of the AuSable acreage lies along the north bank of the river in Crawford and Oscoda Counties between Grayling and the Mio dam. Smaller amounts of acreage lie on the north side of the river below the Mio Dam in Oscoda County and on both sides of the river below the Foote Dam in Iosco County.

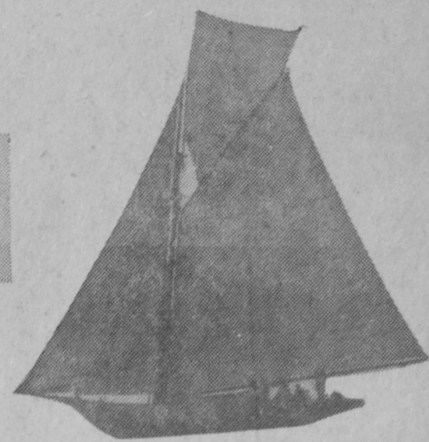

The namesake of one of the most famous racing sailboats in area history, Comanche, returned to Tawas Bay on June 25. This sleek 30-foot Islander owned by Richard Harting Babcock of Livonia will never see the competitive racing of the original Comanche owned by Babcock's great grandfather, N. C. Harting, but it has practically the same cruising ability.

Babcock, his wife, Verla, and their two sons cruised from Detroit to Tawas Bay and spent the week at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock at East Tawas. They brought with them one of the family's prized possessions, a silver trophy won by the original Comanche, which has been handed down to a family member by each succeeding generation.

"Nick" Harting, an early day stenographer in Iosco County Circuit Court and owner of the Iosco County Abstract Office for many years, was an avid sailor and one of the founders of the Ottawa Yacht Club in 1891. Harting did not limit his sailing to racing as The Tawas Herald noted in 1895 that "N. C. Harting and his family went to Bay City Monday with his yacht, Comanche, for a few days visit with relatives and friends."

The names of Harting and Babcock have been linked with yachting and yacht clubs here for more than 90 years. N. C. Harting was a skipper for many years and served as race chairman for numerous regattas. His crew consisted of his two sons, Richard and Nicholas Jr., and his son-in-law, Rasty Babcock. Rasty Babcock's son, Harting Babcock, is the father of Richard Harting Babcock. Rasty's youngest son, Carl Babcock, deceased, was a long time sailor and one of the founders of Tawas Bay Yacht Club in 1946. Carl's two sons, Carl Jr. and Brent, are both members of the yacht club and Carl Jr. is a past commodore.

Pleasure as well as competitive sailing on Tawas Bay is thought to have originated when early commercial fishermen used their small working sailboats for pleasure on Sunday afternoon family cruises. These small fish boats were fast sailors and dominated early racing events here against expensive yachts.

The real competition began in 1897 when the Detroit and Mackinac Railway donated a silver cup—the first of many—to be awarded the over-all winner of the first annual regatta. Harting's Comanche was the fastest boat in the regatta and crossed the finish line first in all races, but lost to a new fishing boat from Bay City in corrected time.

Races were held on a 10-mile triangular course which had its

starting and finishing line at the Commercial Dock at East Tawas, present location of the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock. The last leg of the course was along the shore for three miles between Tawas City and East Tawas.

Headquarters for sailors was the clubhouse at Tawas Beach Park owned by the D&M. Mooring facilities were located there and the railroad ran special trains between the park and Bay City, bringing hundreds of spectators for four days of racing. Fare for the round trip was \$1.

The decade starting with 1897 was the "golden age" of competitive sailing on Tawas Bay due to the great interest in racing held by J. D. Hawks, president of the railroad. In addition to furnishing silver trophies each year, Hawks promoted races among some of the top boats on the Great Lakes.

"Pres. J. D. Hawks of the D&M has offered a purse of \$500 for a race between the Detroit and the Cadillac to be sailed on Tawas Bay and offered to bet \$500 on the Detroit," reported The Tawas Herald in 1902.

"Tawas Bay is probably one of the most beautiful sheets of water on the lakes for a sailing regatta and the annual meets there bid fair to rival those of Put-In-Bay and Toronto," reported The Bay City Tribune in July 1902.

Most of the attention of racing enthusiasts centered around two boats, the Cadillac and Detroit, both owned by Detroit yachtsmen. The Cadillac, under Capt. Howard Shaw, apparently was favored to win, but the Detroit "administered a glorious defeat to the Cadillac and considerable money changed hands on the result," reported the Herald on August 22, 1902. The railroad's president was a big money winner.

Starting with 1900, the Herald reported with each succeeding year that Tawas had hosted "the finest fleet of yachts ever seen on Tawas Bay." Races pitting the Detroit, Cadillac and other top boats were front page news for three years from 1902 to 1904.

"The best yachts on the Great Lakes will be here to compete for the many valuable prizes offered in addition to \$750 in cash," reported the Herald in August 1903. "The special feature will be a race between the Detroit and Cadillac for a purse of \$250 and a handsome silver punch bowl."

The annual races of Tawas Beach Yachting Association "opened on Tawas Bay Tuesday with excellent weather and a large attendance of enthusiastic yachtsmen from all sections of the state and one of the finest collections of boats ever gathered here," reported the Herald on September 4, 1903.

"Of course, the most interest was centered on the race between the crack yachts, Detroit and Cadillac, of Detroit, two of the very best boats on the Great Lakes. The old favorites with Tawas people—the Sultana of St. Clair, the Jennie and Aurora of Bay City and the Mistake of Alpena—were all on hand."

The Cadillac won the Detroit Free Press trophy and purse of \$250 by the small margin of 12 seconds "in one of the prettiest races ever sailed in the bay."

"Lots of excitement marked the closing day of the regatta. In the straight away race and return, the Mistake of Alpena capsized when near the gas buoy and the crew was rescued by Commodore Fletcher's steam yacht, Winjah, and the boat was towed in. The race was won by the Whitecap of Detroit, with the Sultana second and the Myrta third."

The Cadillac repeated as the winner in 1904, carrying off the \$245 prize money and The Detroit Free Press trophy. The Wrinkle of Toledo, Ohio, won The Saginaw Evening News cup and \$140 in cash. The Aurora of Bay City won the D&M cup, while the Hussar II of Toledo, Ohio, won The Bay City Tribune cup.

"The Saturday afternoon race was sailed under the strongest kind of a puffy shore breeze. Several times, spectators' hearts almost stood still as the yachts heeled over until their cabin rails were foaming a foot deep under water. At one time, it was considered the Aurora had gone over and the lifesaving crew, which was among the spectators, held itself in readiness," reported the Herald.

The Herald's report of the 1904 race, probably written by N. C. (See COMANCHE, page 4.)

Gas Company Begins Filling Important Fields

Michigan Consolidated Gas Company has begun refilling its five underground storage fields which last winter played a key role in the utility's ability to supply natural gas to all of its one million customers.

"Our company's storage field system provided the crucial gas reserve which enabled Michigan Consolidated to maintain uninterrupted service to all its firm customers throughout last winter's extremely cold weather," said Charles R. Montgomery, the utility's president.

Montgomery said that while other gas-short midwestern states were experiencing factory shut downs and school closings, Michigan's workers stayed on their jobs and schools remained open.

"Michigan Consolidated's storage field system enabled us to meet the unprecedented demand for gas caused by the coldest winter on record," Montgomery

said. "Due to the heavy demand for gas last winter, storage field supplies were depleted to a greater extent than in past years," Montgomery said. "However, we are now refilling the fields at a peak rate of up to 800-million cubic feet per day."

Gas being injected into the storage fields comes from producing areas in the Gulf of Mexico, the Texas-Oklahoma panhandle, Canada and Michigan. These deliveries are on schedule and the utility expects to have the fields full by late summer.

Michigan Consolidated operates five major storage facilities in Michigan's Lower Peninsula.

The storage fields are depleted gas-producing formations. Once the original reserves of natural gas were produced, the empty fields became ideal for storing large supplies of natural gas which had been produced elsewhere.

July 4, 1952—The Detroit and Mackinac Railway has leased the old coach shop containing about 14,000 square feet of floor space, along with adjoining land, to the Timco Corporation, manufacturer of oil and gas-fired furnaces. About 40 persons will be employed when the plant opens August 1.

TEST FOR SPOILAGE NOT FAILSAFE

If you have purchased a product called "Food Checks," do not rely on it as a test of food safety.

"Information from the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in Detroit indicates that levels of food spoilage microorganisms must be dangerously high to cause the color change that is supposed to indicate spoilage," says Anita Dean, Michigan State University foods and nutrition specialist.

Food Checks is a red liquid in a plastic container about the size of a postage stamp. When it is added to food that is spoiling, it reacts with carbon dioxide given off by food spoilage organisms and turns yellow.

"A color change is a good indication that food is spoiled," Mrs. Dean says. "But the lack of a color change does not mean that food is safe to eat. The organisms that cause food poisoning may be present in dangerously high numbers even though no color change occurs."

According to the FDA, a large number of cases of Food Checks have been distributed to food stores in Southeastern Michigan and possibly other areas of the state as well.

"Consumers who bought this product are advised not to use it to determine whether food is safe to eat," Mrs. Dean repeats. "If you doubt the safety of any food, whether it was commercially prepared or home-canned, do not take any chances; throw it out."



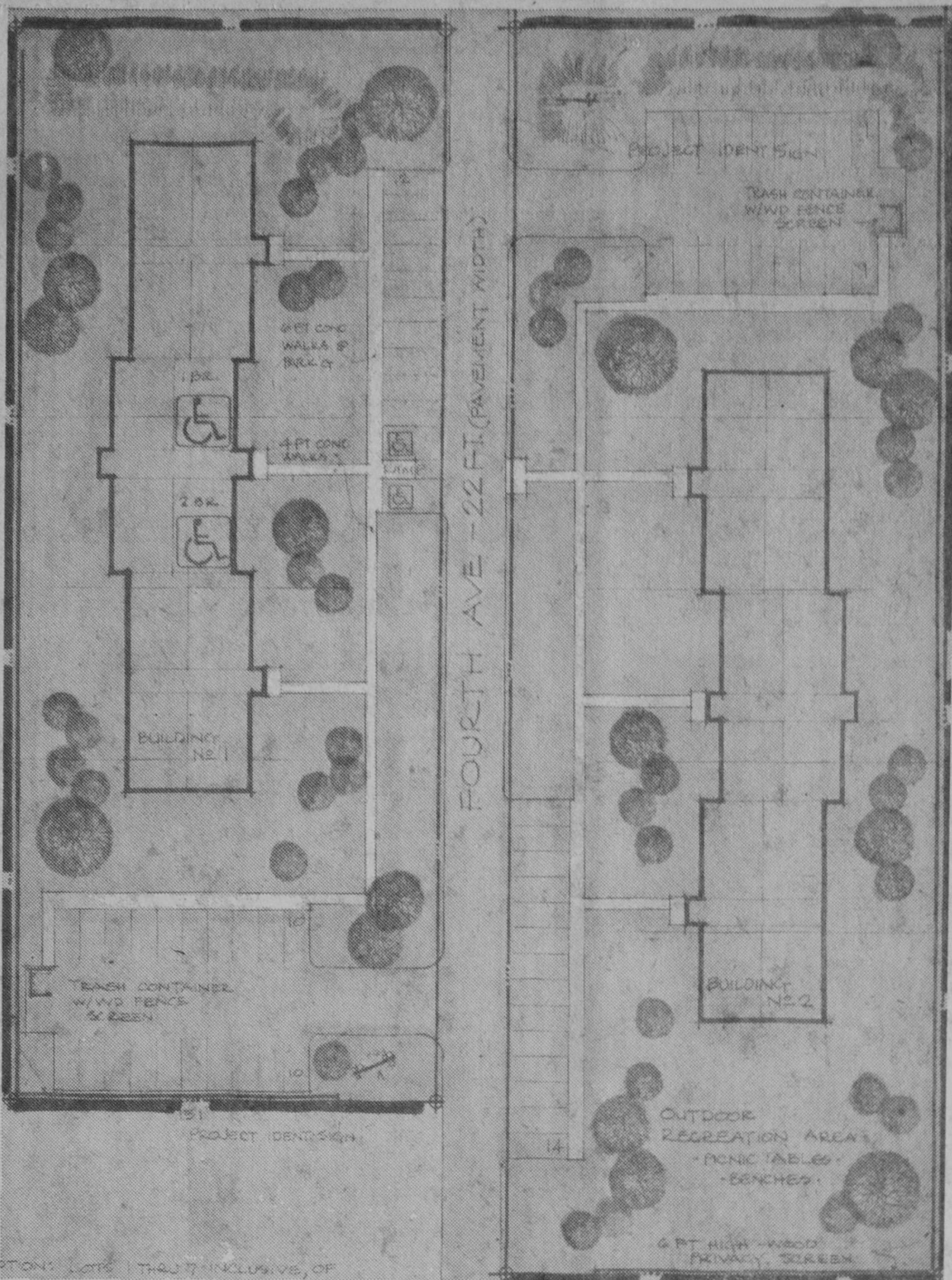

'Miss Dig' Helps Prevent Accidents

"Miss Dig," the utility communication system that has reduced damage to underground utility lines in Michigan, is going overhead.

A pilot project in Oakland County near Detroit and in Ingham, Eaton and Clinton Counties near Lansing will begin July 1. Contractors and homeowners who will be working near overhead electric lines can call the Miss Dig telephone number to receive utility assistance in avoiding accidents.

Miss Dig is a telephone notification system that was set up in 1970 to prevent damage to underground utility lines. Now, it will provide a convenient method of receiving utility assistance where overhead lines may be involved.

State and federal safety standards set out responsibilities where

contact with overhead lines is possible. For example, calculations based on the Michigan Occupational Safety and Health Act show that clearance to any conductor of at least 12 feet, 11.2 inches is required when working in the vicinity of a 138-kilovolt line, a common transmission line voltage.

A contractor or anyone planning to do overhead work will call the toll-free statewide Miss Dig number, 800-482-7171, at least 48 hours (two working days) prior to the activity, between 6:00 a. m. and 7:00 p. m.

A trained operator will obtain information on location and type of work and dispatch this by private teletype to a Miss Dig participating member with overhead lines in the area.

head Electric Pilot Program are Consumers Power Company, Detroit Edison, Eaton Rapids Municipal, Lansing Board of Water and Light and Tri County Electric.

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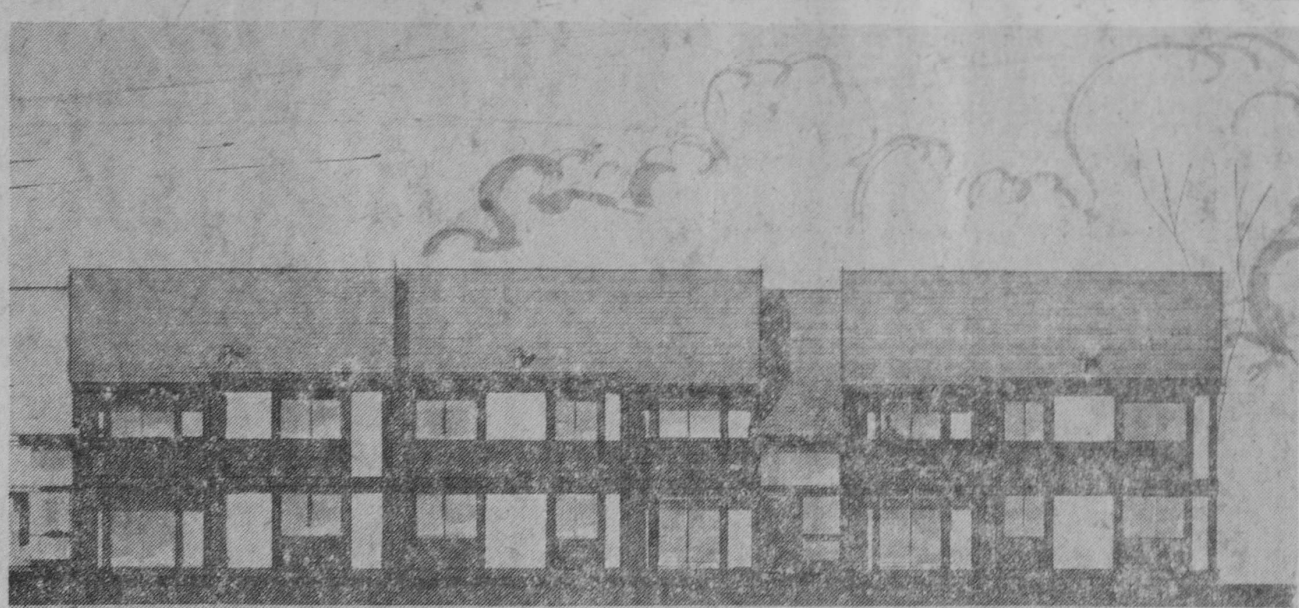

5-Month Wait for Social Security Disability Benefits Is Required

Social security disability payments generally cannot start immediately after people apply for them because the law requires a 5-month waiting period, according to social security officials here.

Social security pays monthly disability benefits to eligible workers and their families if the worker is disabled and not expected to be able to do any substantial work for a year or more. Payment generally starts with the 6th full month of disability. "The first check generally arrives early in the month after that," a social security spokesman said.

"During the waiting period," he said, "examiners get your medical records from the doctors, hospitals, and other institutions that treated you for your disability. You pay for getting those records, if there's any charge."

"Later, additional medical information may be necessary, and you may be asked to undergo additional tests and examinations," he said. "The Government pays for those."

Medical decisions on whether or not people are disabled under the social security law are made by doctors and other disability experts in the appropriate State agency. They evaluate the medical condition and consider the vocational factors of age, education, training, and work experience.

Work requirements are also checked during the waiting period.

"To be eligible for disability benefits," the spokesman said, "most workers need 6 1/2 years of work under social security with 5 years of it in the 10 years before they became disabled. For workers disabled before age 31, the requirement scales down to as little as 1 1/2 years, depending on age."

People disabled since childhood can get social security disability payments without a waiting period when a parent starts getting social security retirement or disability benefits—or

dies after working long enough under social security.

Disabled people who haven't worked long or recently enough under social security to get disability benefits may be eligible for supplemental security income (SSI) payments. The SSI program, administered by social security, makes monthly payments to people with little or no income and limited resources who are disabled or blind or 65 or over.

"There's no waiting period under the SSI program," the social security spokesman said. "Payments start when eligibility is determined. In some cases,

SSI disability payments may be made to people while they're waiting for a formal eligibility decision. And SSI disability payments can be made during the 5-month social security disability waiting period in some cases."

People can get more information about the social security disability program and the SSI program by calling or writing any social security office, he said.

The Social Security Administration is an agency of the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

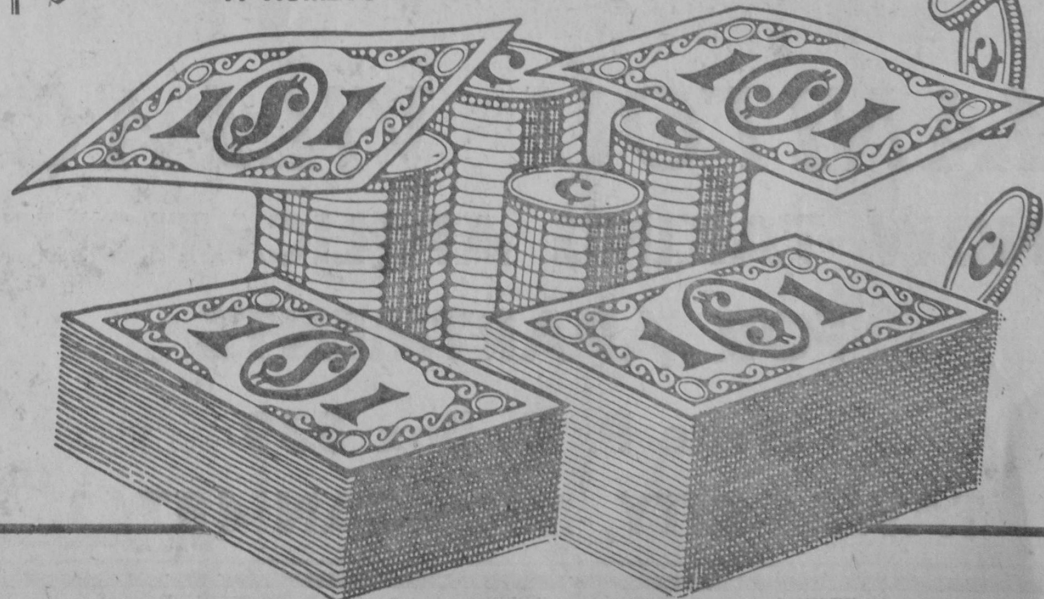

Harting, stated: "Sultana, with her enormous fin keel, heeled over until her topmast seemed to be but a few feet from the water and her rail was three feet under. Cadillac stood on her beam and one of her crew, evidently in a spirit of dare-deviltry, hung over her side and touched his feet to her centerboard as she lay over at an angle of less than 45 degrees."

That was the last race on Tawas Bay for the Cadillac, but the Herald reported in 1906 that Tawas Bay "hosted the finest fleet of boats ever gathered on the bay. But for the sad accident on Sunday, the meet would have been the greatest and most successful in the history of the association."

The "sad accident" eluded to by the Herald is believed to be the only fatality recorded in sailboat racing competition here. Nearly all of the boats had taken part in a regatta of the Bay City Boat Club. The boats left Bay City for Tawas and ran into a severe rain squall off Point Lookout. The Pastime of East Tawas, the Wrinkle of Toledo,

Ohio, and the St. Clair of Detroit all capsized.

Laurence K. True of Chicago, Illinois, who was taking in the balloon jib of the St. Clair when the squall struck, was blown overboard and drowned. He was a member of the senior law class of the University of Michigan.

The sad fatality cast a gloom over the sport for the TBVA meet, "which has taken away the enjoyment of the occasion," commented the Herald.

The Pastime, which was owned and sailed by the Pastime Club of East Tawas, of which Rasty Babcock was a member, was formerly known as the Mistake of Alpena. The boat went over in the storm with all canvas set. The crew was rescued and the boat towed to Point Lookout. "She arrived home Monday afternoon in tow of a tug and minus her spar," reported the Herald.

Among the sailing yachts in attendance for 1907 racing were the Spray, the St. Elmo, Wave, Cleveland, Borealis, St. Clair, Otsiketa and Pastime. "The bay has been full of yachts, motor boats and steam yachts," reported the Herald. Included was the steam yacht, Manzantina, owned by Com-

odore Price of the Chicago Yacht Club, owner of the Spray.

The 1907 season apparently was the last of the regattas for Tawas Bay which featured prize money and silver cups for the large racing class yachts.

The Herald noted in August 1911, that "N. C. Harting brought his new sailing yacht, the Borealis, up from Bay City last Sunday. This boat was built about five years ago and is considered the finest 21-footer on the upper lakes. She is certainly a beauty and some fast." Competitive sailing has continued down through the years on Tawas Bay and district or national regattas of Lightning and National Class sailboats of the past two decades have attracted larger numbers of boats than at any other time in history, but the excitement of the 1897-1907 era has never been matched.

Gone are the 30 to 40-foot gaff-rigged yachts, the super fast boats of the Cadillac-Detroit class, the \$500 purses and side bets and the special passenger trains which brought hundreds of spectators to Tawas Bay to watch the races.

Sailing on Tawas Bay made a complete circle when the great grandson of the original owner of the Comanche, which was retired 66 years ago, sailed into Tawas Bay with a new Comanche.
