Gas Company Submits

Home Energy Conservation Program

Acting on a program advanced by the Michigan Public Service Commission, Michigan Consolidated Gas Company Monday became the only utility in the nation to seek state authority to implement a comprehensive home energy conservation program including fuel-saving furnace devices as well as insulation.

The utility asked the MPSC to approve its plan, which would make available ceiling insulation and fuel saving furnace devices to its 877,000 residential heating customers on a voluntary basis.

The plan would enable participating residential heating customers to have ceilings insulated and approved devices installed on gas furnaces and customers would then be able to pay the cost of the job to the company over a five-year period.

To recover the cost of the program, the utility is asking MPSC to approve a commodity charge which would be applicable to all of Michigan Consolidated's residential, commercial and industrial customers. "The customer's annual bill during each year of the

program for gas, including the commodity charge and repayment of the insulation and costs should be less than his annual bill would have been without this program," states Charles R. Montgomery, Michigan Consolidated president. "Once the cost of the insulation and furnace retrofit devices has been paid in full, the customer's bill would continue to be substantially less every year than it would be without the program."

It would take an estimated three years to complete installation of ceiling insulation and retrofits in residential dwellings. The program

could result in up to 27-billion-cubic-feet of gas saved annually in the company's service area.

If approved, Michigan Consolidated would begin surveying homes of those residential heating customers in its service area throughout the state who desire to participate in the program and determine how much ceiling insulation a dwelling would need, the size of furnace devices required and the total cost of both.

In order to obtain the lowest possible cost, the utility would solicit bids from private contractors who qualified under MPSC standards.

Top hitters for Alpena were Dennis Smith, who had two hits in five

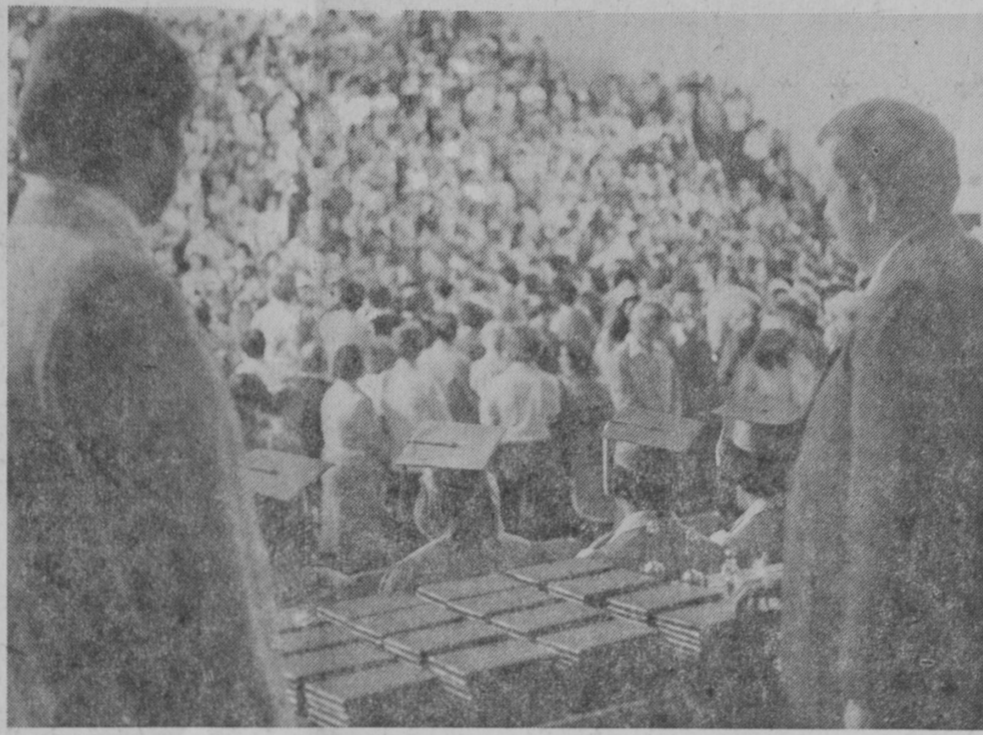
Regional Agent Coming June 9

SPEDY Jobs Available on June 13

Beginning Monday, June 13, over 715 jobs will become available for youth in a summer program that may be the first work experience for many 14-21-year-olds in the nine counties of Region 7-B Employment and Training Consortium. SPEDY (Summer Program for Economically Disadvantaged Youth) will involve placing over 700 young people at approximately 180 worksites in Arenac, Clare, Gladwin, Gratiot, Iosco, Isabella, Midland, Ogemaw and Roscommon Counties.

Eligibility for the program will be determined by family size and income. Poverty guidelines for the program show a family of one may earn a maximum of \$2,970. For families larger than one a sum of \$960 will be added for each additional family member. Thus, a family of four may have an income of \$5,850 and be eligible for the program.

The 10-week program is being funded by CETA, Title III, in the amount of \$842,796 in Region 7-B. Youths will receive a minimum wage of \$2.30 per hour for a 25 to 40-hour work week, depending upon their age.

Object of the program is to provide these young people with a meaningful work experience as well as a paycheck. Some participants will be selected to participate in remedial reading and mathematics courses for a period of four weeks.

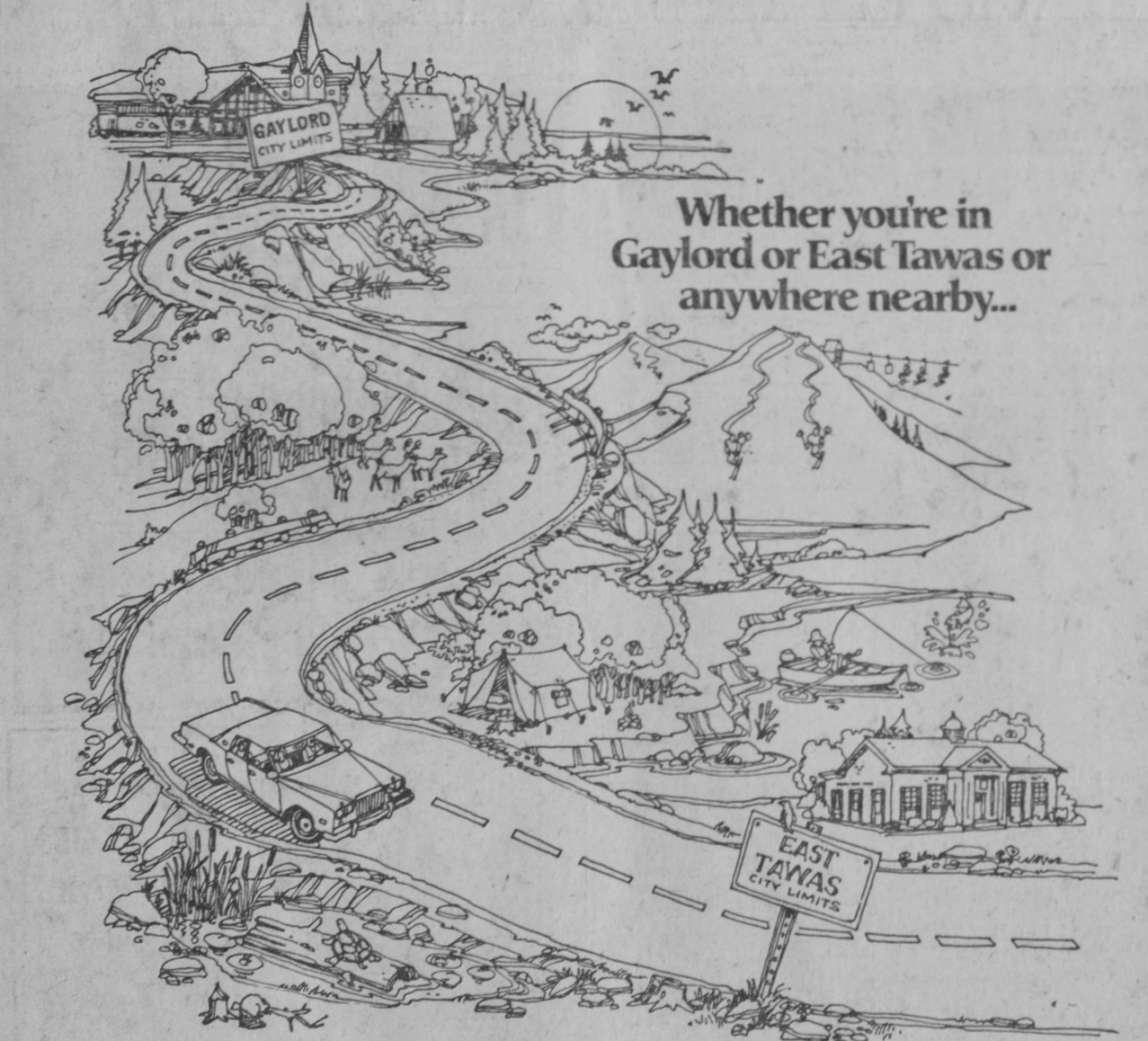
The youth are hired and paid by Region 7-B Consortium. A full-time counselor, located in each of the counties, will visit each worksite on a weekly basis to assist the youth and immediate supervisors. Alan Walton is counselor in Iosco County.

Region 7-B, with headquarters at Mid Michigan Community College, Harrison, is guided by an advisory Council and an administrative board. Lynwood Roe, Midland, is chairman of the council while Donald A. Case, Clare County, is chairman of the board. Council members represent various organizations and agencies in the nine counties while the administrative board is comprised of a commissioner from each county. Each group meets once a month.

Start Construction After July 4 on Provincial House Facility

After several months of delay because of the red tape involved in obtaining permits and financing, Provincial House, Incorporated, Lansing, announced Wednesday it and "off and running" on its proposed new nursing home in Tawas City.

Jeffrey Poorman, vice president of the firm, said that final closing on a loan with Farmers Home Administration would take place later this month and actual construction would start the first working day after July 4.

"We have obtained a building permit, a soil erosion permit and have received approval for city utilities," Poorman told members of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

The new 120-bed privately-owned nursing home is to be located on North Street in Tawas City west of Emanuel Lutheran School.

The Lansing-based firm, which operates nursing homes at several locations in Michigan, said it would serve as its own general contractor for construction of the new building, but 80 percent of the work would be performed by sub-

contractors. The firm is to advertise for bids later this month.

Poorman said the facility would cost in excess of one-million-dollars and would be designed along the lines of the firm's nursing home at Gaylord. "A few changes have been made in the plans and we believe that the facility will be the best we have ever constructed," said Poorman.

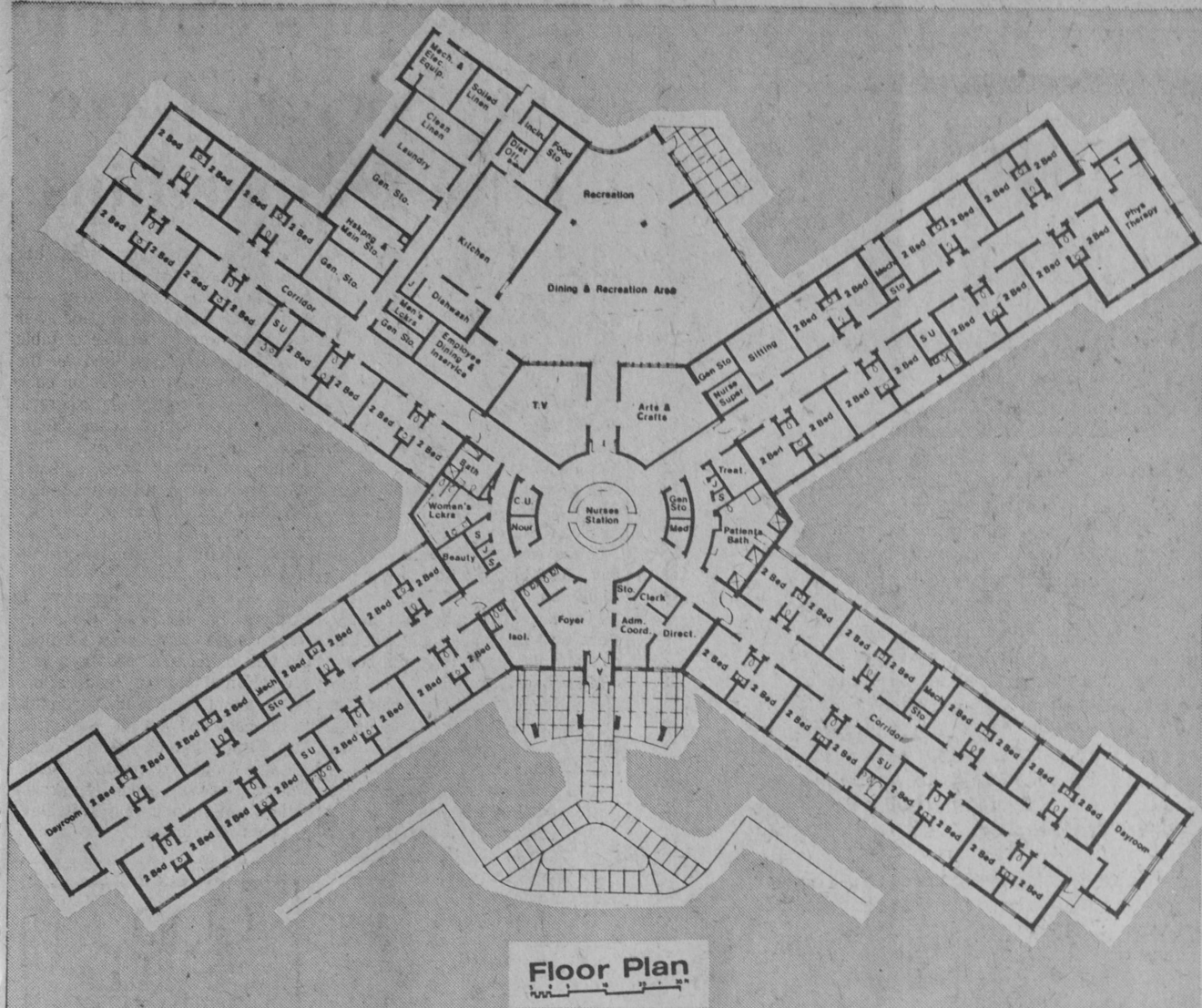
Provincial House, Incorporated, has been considering a nursing home in Iosco County for the past two years. The firm first considered a site north of M-55 and east of the Wilber Road intersection, but utilities were not available there. The firm next considered a site at Oscoda, but a hassle developed over the proposed site there and the firm again returned to the Tawas area to view potential sites.

After rejecting two sites due to elevation problems, Joseph Fox, county commissioner, suggested property within the confines of Tawas City and owned by Zion Lutheran Church. After inspecting the property, Poorman felt it was a perfect site and an option to purchase the land was obtained from the church board.

Poorman said Wednesday that, depending upon weather conditions for building, the new facility should be completed by the spring of 1978.

The nursing home is expected to provide employment for 100 persons when it goes into operation, with about 90 percent of the total staff coming from the local area.

The new facility is to face North Street and is to be constructed in the form of an "X" with four patient wings extending out from a central administrative core.



Harbor May Get New Appropriation

The house appropriations committee has recommended spending an additional \$163,000 on the Tawas Bay Harbor project next year, United States Rep. Philip E. Ruppe, Houghton, reported May 27.

Ruppe said that a bill sent to the full United States House of Representatives by the appropriations panel recommends spending a total of \$8,163,000 for Michigan harbor and river construction, including the Tawas Bay project.

Other projects receiving the nod from the panel include Ludington Harbor, \$3,700,000; Muskegon Harbor rehabilitation, \$1,500,000; the Saginaw River navigation project, \$2,800,000.

"The construction of the harbor facility for Tawas started in May. The 2.15-million-dollar project involves the building of a breakwater by the federal government and construction of boat slips behind the breakwater by the Michigan Waterways Commission.

The construction work is being carried out by the Roen Salvage Company on an initial 1.7-million-dollar contract.

"The fact that this project continues to garner the support of the powerful house appropriations committee is a strong indication of its importance to not only Tawas, but to the entire Great Lakes region," Ruppe said.

8. Various methods of sludge disposal.
9. No Action.

Each treatment alternate includes, in addition to City sewage treatment facilities, sanitary sewer construction in the Townships of Alabaster, Baldwin, and Tawas.

The purpose of the hearing is to receive comments on the Facility Plan and the environmental impact of the proposed alternatives.

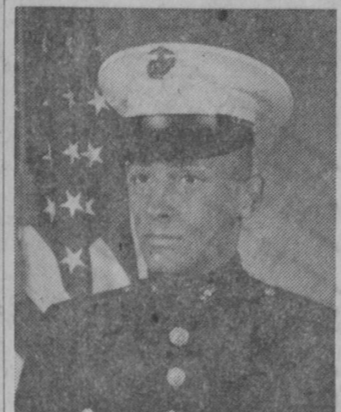
