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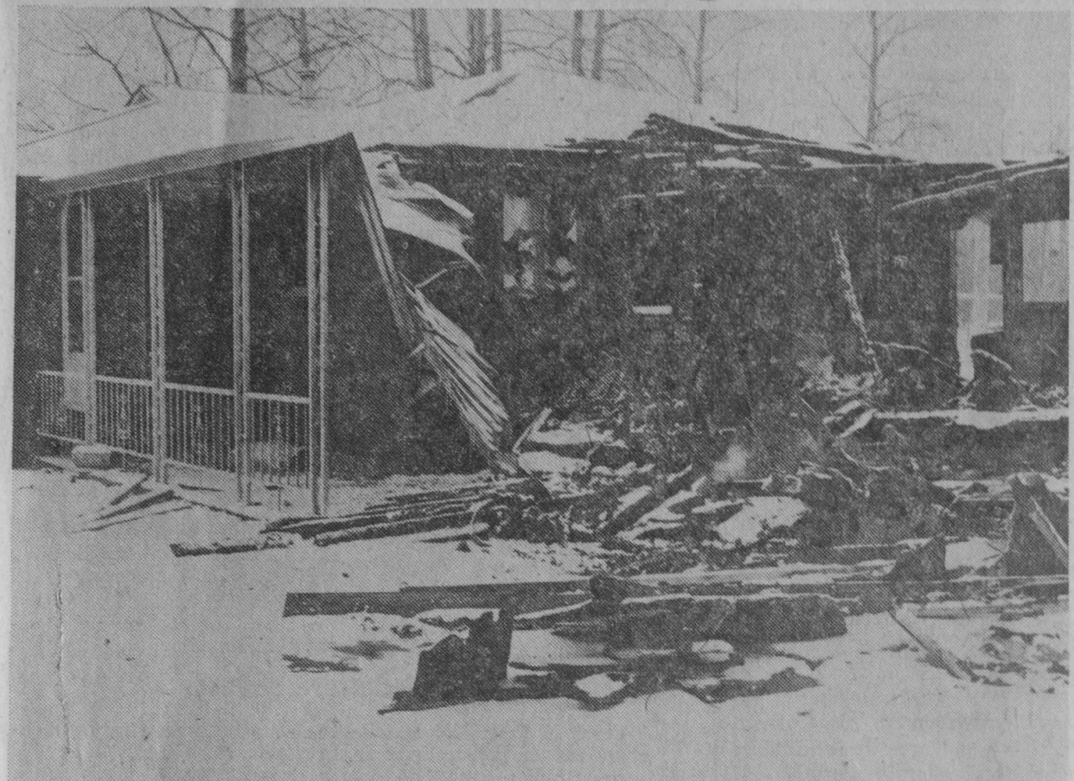

Funeral Today at Whittemore for Four Victims of Tragic Fire

Funeral services are to be held this morning (Wednesday), 11 o'clock, at St. James Catholic Church, Whittemore, for four members of a Sherman Township family who died early Sunday morning in a fire at their residence at 5876 Whittemore Road.

Killed in the blaze were Ronald Sylvester, 37; his wife, Donna, 30, and two of their three sons, Dale, 11 years of age, and Scott, eight years old.

A third son, Michael, 13, escaped from the burning house, was given emergency treatment at Tawas Hospital and was transferred to St. Mary's Hospital, Saginaw. He was reported to be in shock with burns covering 15 percent of his body, including the back and chest. His condition was not considered to be serious.

Whittemore-Burleigh-Reno Fire Department received a call from a neighbor at 2:45 a. m. reporting the fire at the Sylvester residence. Michael told firemen that he was awakened by smoke, called out an alarm to the rest of the family and

escaped from the burning building. The father's body was later found on the living room floor near a bedroom door. The body of his youngest son was alongside him. The mother's body was found in the family room near a door at the east end of the house and the 11-year-old boy's body was found near a door in the living room.

David Mills Sr., father of Mrs. Sylvester, mayor of Whittemore and a member of the fire department, entered the burning building but could not see anything in the darkness and was driven out by smoke and flames. He was not injured.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said the fire was concentrated in the family room of the one-story structure. A converted garage, the family room was heated by a wood stove. It was reported that Sylvester had performed minor maintenance work on the stove earlier in the day.

Friends-told officers that they had played cards at the Sylvester residence until 1:30 a. m. The fire

broke out about an hour later. It was reported that the call to the fire department was delayed somewhat by the fact that the blaze damaged the telephone lines and the neighbor drove to Whittemore to report the blaze.

Ronald James Sylvester was born January 9, 1940, at Kawkawlin. He graduated from Whittemore-Prescott Area High School. He was employed as a truck driver for Grabow Distributing Company, National City. He is survived by his son, Michael; his mother, Louise Sylvester, Whittemore, and two brothers, Gary Sylvester of Whittemore and Leo Sylvester of Midland.

Donna Lee (Mills) Sylvester was born May 3, 1946, at Whittemore and graduated from high school there. She was employed as a teacher's aide by Whittemore-Prescott Area School. She is survived by her son, Michael; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. David Mills Sr. of Whittemore; one brother, David Mills Jr. of Louisiana; two sisters, Nikki Rockey of Whittemore and Judy Tracy of Prescott.

Dale Edward Sylvester, born December 10, 1965, and Scott Richard Sylvester, born September 17, 1968, were both born at Tolfree Hospital, West Branch, and were students at Whittemore-Prescott Area School. A brother, Michael, survives.

Involve Citizens in School Talks

Involvement of an expanded citizens advisory committee in discussing long range plans for Ta-

was Area School was discussed at Monday night's meeting of the board of education.

The present committee was organized last summer to study school finances and make recommendations concerning school budgeting prior to a vote on tax millage. The committee also made recommendations concerning curricular changes, a number of which were carried out.

Supt. Robert Halle presented a tentative program concerning three different alternatives to resolve space shortages experienced at the school, along with advantages and disadvantages pertaining to each alternative.

"In the process of considering any particular alternative, both the present and future needs of the district should be considered," stated the superintendent in his report. "It should be noted that the present lack of space leaves us not only with a stagnant program, but also one that is below the minimum standards of a comprehensive school program."

The opinion was expressed by Trustees Robert Curry and Randall DeWise that the long range study should include curriculum, extra curricular activities, building maintenance and expansion as well as space needs.

Driver Training Resumed at TA; New Instructor

Behind-the-wheel instruction under the state-mandated driver training program resumed Saturday by Tawas Area School for 33 students, who had been unable to complete work toward learning permits due to a combination of factors.

Larry Sroufe, a certified driver training instructor from Beaverton, was hired by the school on an hourly pay basis to handle road instruction for four students remaining from last summer's program and 29 students awaiting 15 hours of driving time from the fall program.

Prin. John Alexander told members of the board of education Monday night that he had posted the driver training instructor vacancies at the high school after three former instructors had notified him they were withholding services. He said there "were no takers" on the local staff and instructors were sought elsewhere.

Sroufe is being paid at an hourly rate of \$5.50, the same rate which was offered to Dick Look, James Wasyk and Michael Viele, who had withheld services. The three instructors had indicated last fall that they did not wish to continue as driver training instructors because no pay increase had been granted under schedule B of the master contract.

During negotiations on the master contract, the school had granted an additional \$1,000 to be split among extra curricular positions under schedule B. Under the schedule accepted by teachers, the money went to other positions and there was no increase in pay for driver training instructors.

During discussion, it was pointed out that driver training had been much easier to schedule under the former split session which had been utilized until the current term. Under the former split session, high school students were able to receive driver training in the afternoon. Due to the lack of cars last summer and fall, a scheduling problem resulted from the fact that Look and Viele were both football coaches, which conflicted with driver training. As a result, behind-the-wheel instruction could not be given.

Wasyk, who handled all classroom instruction, finished his commitment under terms of the schedule B contract, but Look and Viele were unable to provide behind-the-wheel instruction.

Due to a number of "close calls" last summer with student drivers, Wasyk told the board of education

Monday night that he was not ready to go behind the wheel at this time because of the danger involved. When instruction resumed last fall with a new car, that unit was put out of commission on its first day of operation when it was involved in an accident.

Trustee Carl Babcock believed that teachers involved in both coaching and driver training had conflicting schedules. He said, however, that he had not realized two weeks ago that Look and Viele had not completed their responsibilities to the driver education program last fall. After announcement of the resignation of driver training instructors, the board accepted an administration recommendation to appoint Look an assistant track coach.

"The people who accept responsibilities under schedule B, a part of the master contract, had better be prepared to execute and see the program to completion, or the administration should not recommend them for further schedule B assignments," stated Babcock. "The state mandates that the school shall provide driver training instruction."

The opinion was expressed by Trustee Robert Curry that driver training could have been completed after the football season. It was pointed out, however, that special cars required for the instruction were received in late fall.

Supt. Robert Halle said that the administration would continue to look for driver education teachers when additions are made to the staff.

Alexander said that another class in driver training would be started after the Easter vacation and the regular program is to be held again next summer. He said he had received an application from a teacher employed by another district to assist with the instruction next summer.

Iosco Jury Convicted Bay City Men of First Degree Murder

An Iosco County Circuit Court jury deliberated five hours Thursday before delivering a first degree murder verdict against two Bay City men in the September 11 slaying of a Lennon automobile worker at Oscoda.

Facing mandatory life sentences are Fred G. Tomkins and Gary H. McLellan, both 35. Their attorney, C. Michael Gorte, requested Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller to pass sentence immediately.

At the start of the trial, Gorte's motion for a change of venue to another location was denied by Judge Miller. Three days were required to select a jury.

Before rendering its verdict at 5:00 p. m. Thursday, the jury interrupted its deliberations for about an hour when it asked for a review of testimony of three prosecution witnesses, as well as to clarify instructions concerning felony murder.

The verdict was heard by a courtroom packed with spectators. Neither Tomkins nor McLellan showed any emotion as each juror was polled as to his individual decision.

The jury of seven women and five men heard lengthy testimony in the case in which circumstan-

tial evidence obtained by the Oscoda-AuSable Township Police Department was presented by Special Pros. Brian M. Kennedy of Bay City showing that the two men murdered Danny R. Christian, 27, following an argument at an Oscoda tavern.

Evidence in the trial was circumstantial in that there was no eye witness to the crime, other than the murderers and the deceased victim. The murder weapon, established in the trial as a .22 caliber magnum handgun, has never been found.

The special prosecutor, who was appointed at the request of Iosco County officials, singled out the investigative efforts of Oscoda Township Police Raymond Knuth and the witnesses who came forward to testify against the two Bay City men.

Kennedy said credit must go, too, "to the 12 men and women who sat on the jury and were intelligent enough to follow the evidence to where it inevitably led."

According to testimony Tomkins and McLellan threatened Christian before the men left a bar at Oscoda. The victim's body was discovered five days later near Oscoda Area High School. The victim had been shot between the eyes.

A car driven by the Bay City men was later seen by three juveniles on the Mill Street bridge at Oscoda, where someone threw something from a car.

The three juveniles, Linda and Terry Davis, 15 and 14 years of age, and Jerry Covey, 17, were "surprise" witnesses in the case, not having appeared in the preliminary examination held in district court or earlier proceedings of circuit court.

When the trial opened the first week of February, the two Oscoda girls saw a newspaper picture of the two defendants. They notified authorities that they recognized one man as being involved in an incident the night of September 11 at the Mill Street bridge.

Linda Davis identified McLellan as the driver of a car which stopped on the bridge, but did not identify the man who retrieved an object thrown from the car. She also identified a passenger in the car, William Lonchar Jr., 29, of Ewen, who remains at large and is being sought by local authorities.

Covey, a resident of Alpena at the time, was flown here from California to testify in the trial. He was visiting at Oscoda the weekend of September 11 and was on the bridge when the object thrown from the car landed at his feet. He testified that the object was a gun, that a man jumped from the car, picked up the gun and wrapped it in a white cloth, telling him that "you did not see that." He could not identify the man who retrieved the gun.

After the car drove away, Covey walked up to the Davis sisters, with whom he was acquainted, and said, "Wow, that was a gun he picked up."

A ballistics expert testified in the trial that rifling marks on a slug removed from the victim's body matched marks fired by a gun which was stolen at Bay City.

Tomkins and McLellan claimed that they could not have killed Christian since they had not left the bar until 11:45 p. m., but the police log showed the men left the bar at 10:52 p. m. after having caused a disturbance. The bartender had called police to say the men left and police assistance was no longer needed.

Tomkins testified that he had not threatened to kill Christian. McLellan did not take the witness stand.

A wallet belonging to Christian was found the same night by fishermen at the bridge and later was turned over to police.

Iosco County's annual delinquent tax list upon which taxes, interest and charges are unpaid and are to be sold for the amounts claimed by the State of Michigan, is published on pages four, five and six, section two, of this newspaper.

Acting on complaint of the state treasurer, Iosco Circuit Court established Tuesday, May 3, 10:00 a. m., for the annual tax sale. Each parcel of land described is to be offered for sale that day at the county building.

County Treas. Edward Nelkie reports that the 1,301 descriptions listed in the sale represents the largest number of delinquent tax descriptions in recent years. He expects, however, that the list will be narrowed considerably prior to the sale through payment of taxes, interest and charges by property owners.

Born October 30, 1926, at Whittemore, he graduated from high school there in 1944. He served in the United States Navy during World War II. He followed the barber trade for a number of years and later operated a coin-operated laundry at Hale.

He was married to the former Alice Johnson of Hale. He served eight years as a mem-

ber of Hale Area Board of Education and was elected to the county board of commissioners in November 1968. He served on the commission since that time, with one year off as county tax equalization director.

He was a member of the Hale Area Lions Club, Glen Staley Post No. 422, American Legion, and served as chairman of Plainfield Township's centennial committee in 1968.

He had become ill shortly before Christmas and was elected chairman of the county commission at its first meeting in January. Soon after attending that meeting he was hospitalized.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Greg of Pleasant Ridge and Scott of Berkley; his mother, Mrs. Harvey Johnson, Saginaw; three sisters, Wilma Sams of Saginaw, Vivian Cole of Ann Arbor and Vileta Ronan of Pontiac.

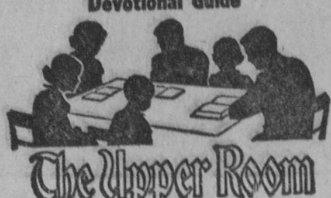

Leader Dog School Needs Friendly Dogs for Sightless

Want to send your dog to school? Leader Dogs for the Blind, expecting another busy spring, needs year-old German shepherds, Labrador and golden retrievers.

Leader Dog, the largest producing school of its kind in the world, trains friendly dogs to be assigned to blind people, free of charge. The dogs are trained for three months prior to being assigned to the individual who will train the fourth month with their new leader.

The Rochester school depends upon contributions of eligible dogs (friendly, healthy and intelligent) for its training material. No dogs are purchased. Leader Dog maintains a constant training program, winter and summer, good weather and bad. It is necessary to have at least 150 dogs, preferably more, on hand at all times.

The Leader Dogs school maintains a puppy program that produces approximately 40 percent of the training stock, so 60 percent of the dogs used must come from families who no longer have need for a big dog in the house.

Leader Dogs receive the best of care during their four-month training period. Upon graduation, a Leader Dog has total dedication, tender loving care, from the person who depends upon him for safe travel.

The contributor receives a photograph of the Leader Dog team if the dog trains successfully. If the dog is rejected, it will be returned to the owner, if desired. If not, it will be placed in a good home.

Open Meeting Concept Not Endorsed

In an extremely close roll call vote, the delegate assembly of the Michigan Association of School Boards voted, 153-152, not to support the open meetings concept being applied to public school collective bargaining.

Those opposing the concept expressed concern that the public interest could not be well served by the "performance atmosphere" that might develop under such circumstances.

Those favoring the concept, however, argued that in spite of the problem involved, the difference between public and private sector labor relations make change imperative.

The taxpayers, they said, have a right to observe officials making decisions that will affect expenditure of 85 percent of the public school budget.

The special meeting of the delegate assembly took place on February 19 at Lansing. It was held in conjunction with the MASA annual mid-winter conference which drew nearly 1,000 board members and administrators from school districts all across Michigan.

Hurry expressed the opinion that the general public should be involved in this determination of "where we are at present" and what "future goals the public desires in its school system."

Discussion with the board of education and staff concerning space alternatives is to be continued and it is expected that discussions will be expanded in the next 30 days to include the citizens advisory committee.

In other business, the board of education authorized Prin. John Alexander to make an offer for the purchase of two lots to be used by the building trades class next term.

The superintendent announced that probationary teachers are to be notified soon of possible layoffs due to the uncertainty of school financing next term. Last year's school operational millage approved by voters was for only one year and \$2,000,000 in funds is involved. Annual notices are required in order for probationary teachers to seek employment elsewhere should finances be curtailed.

In addition, similar notices may be sent to tenure teachers as a precautionary measure. A recent review of state law has indicated that such notice may be necessary as the school district does not

know its financial situation for next year.

Halle said that such layoff notices were not good for the morale of employees, but that it was necessary to give the opportunity to allow both probationary and tenure teachers to seek employment elsewhere should finances not be forthcoming.

Members of the board of education were invited to attend a meeting of a citizens advisory council to the state police which is to be held March 25. This recently organized council, involving area police agencies, courts and the general public, is concerned with drug and drinking problems of youth.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said that the Saginaw driver attempted to slow his car and applied his brakes. The car swerved sideways into O'Driscoll's car.

Many Who Apply for Benefits Just Not Disabled under Law

Many people who apply for social security disability benefits are just not disabled under the law, according to social security officials here.

Social security pays monthly disability benefits to eligible workers and their families if the worker meets both the disability requirement and the work requirement. About two-thirds of the social security disability claims that were denied last year were turned down because people didn't meet the disability requirement, a spokesman said.

"Under the social security law," he said, "you are considered disabled only if you

have a physical or mental impairment that prevents you from doing any substantial gainful work and is expected to last, or has lasted, for at least 12 months—or is expected to result in death.

"If your impairment prevents you from doing your regular work," the spokesman said, "your age, education, and work experience may be considered in deciding whether or not you can do any other sort of work. But—if you can't do your regular work but can do other substantial gainful work, you generally won't be considered disabled under the social security law."

The decision on whether or not people are physically or mentally disabled under the social security law is made by doctors and other disability experts in the appropriate State agency, he said.

To meet the work requirement for disability payments, most workers need at least 5 years of work covered by social security in the 10 years before their disability began. For workers disabled before age 31, the requirement ranges down to 1 1/2 years of covered work, depending on age.

Severely disabled people who haven't worked long enough under social security to be eligi-

ble for social security disability payments may be eligible for supplemental security income (SSI) payments. The SSI program, administered by social security, makes monthly payments to people with little or no income and limited resources who are disabled or blind or 65 or over.

"You can get more information about the social security disability program and the SSI program by calling or writing any social security office," the spokesman said.

The Social Security Administration is an agency of the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Q. I'm 66 but I haven't worked quite enough to get social security benefits on my own record. My husband is 64 and has worked over 40 years but won't retire for another year. Can I get wife's benefits on his record before he applies?

A. Your husband must apply and become entitled to social security benefits before you can get payments on his record.

Q. My mother is 73 and can no longer be cared for at home. Will her Medicare pay anything if she goes to a nursing home where they can help her dress and eat and give her medicine?

A. Medicare cannot pay for care that is mainly custodial, such as helping a person eat, dress, walk, bathe, or take medicine.

Q. I plan to turn the opera-

tion of my small hardware store over to my son and just work there part time. Can I do this and still get social security benefits when I reach 65 this summer?

A. This will depend on your earnings, hours worked, the extent to which you continue to manage, and other factors. You should discuss your plans in more detail with the people at any social security office.

Three from Iosco Attending School Bus Workshop Today

Three Iosco County area public school representatives are among 70 persons attending an Automobile Club of Michigan-sponsored regional student transportation supervisor workshop Wednesday (today).

Scheduled to attend the workshop at Grayling's Holiday Inn are: Edward V. Poppe, Tawas Area School transportation supervisor; Supt. James Franklin and Clarence Bellville, transportation supervisor, Whittemore-Prescott Area School.

The superintendents and transportation supervisors will preview new materials and techniques in

bus safety and training developed by the National AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety.

The program will emphasize the need for training bus drivers for emergencies, bus safety instruction for elementary students and use of school bus safety assistants to help with highway crossings and emergency situations.

Consultants from Auto Club's Safety and Traffic Engineering Department will explain program materials, including a 272-page guidebook to be offered each school system. Also to be viewed are two instructional films and a slide show which will be distrib-

uted free to regional intermediate school district centers statewide.

Produced by National AAA and Central Michigan University, one film details emergency bus evacuation methods, while the second is an animated bus safety film for elementary-age pupils. The slide program is a training course for school bus safety assistants.

A second workshop Friday, March 4, for school districts in 17 Eastern Michigan counties will be held at Delta College near Bay City and will be followed by similar meetings for other counties across the state.

State Police CB Call Signal Changed; Report on Activities

The call sign for Michigan State Police citizen band operations has been changed to KMI 0911, according to Lt. Roderick LaMore of the department's traffic division, who supervises this limited activity.

In reporting the change from the former KZL 3698, LaMore also released figures on state police CB operations during the seven-month period, June through December, that this activity was under way in 1976. The change is made toward achieving uniformity nationally in use of emergency call signs.

State police officers monitor CB traffic on channels nine and 19 from both mobile and base stations in many parts of the state. They began this activity with operations along the Interstate 94 and 96 corridors in Southern Michigan but have since added other areas to their coverage.

LaMore's roundup of figures included the following:

Total contacts, 8,061. These included 2,069 reported violations of traffic or other rules and 5,992 reports of dangerous conditions or requests for assistance.

The violations total included 795 speeding; 718 driving under influence of intoxicants; 61 wrong way driving; 93 equipment and/or license cases; 64 felony cases; 169 nontraffic misdemeanors. Most of these violations, or 1,473 of them, happened on freeways while 596 were on other highways.

Dangerous conditions or requests for assistance calls included 1,646 accidents; 403 vehicles parked on roads; 519 other objects on road; 224 fires; 1,755 stranded motorists; 165 ill or injured persons; 153 message relay or direction assistance; 1,127 miscellaneous. This total of 5,992 included 3,643 on freeways and 2,349 on other roads.

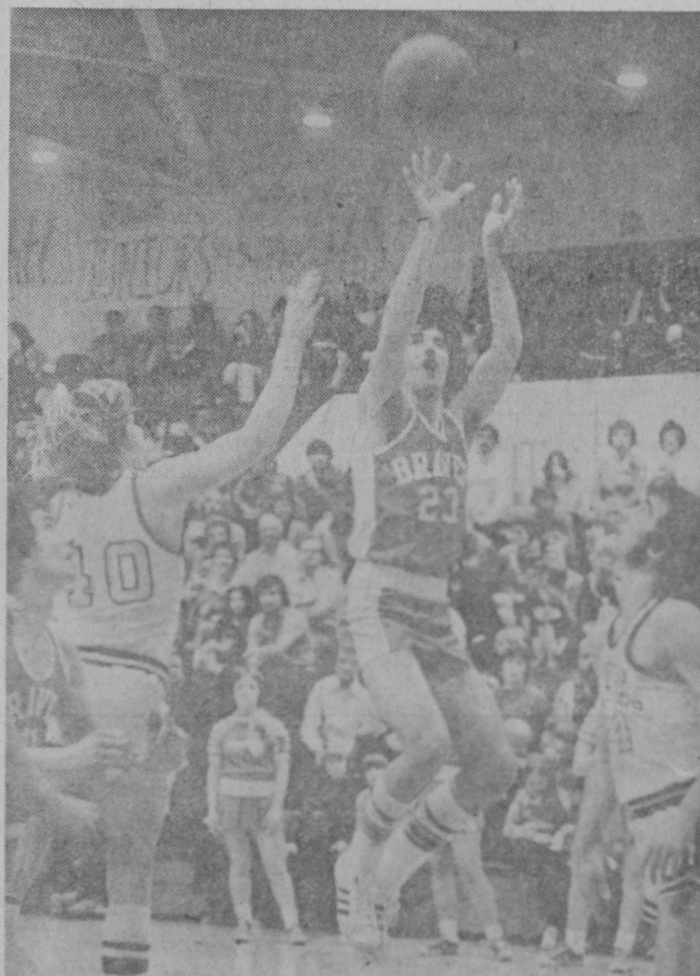

New Director Reports on Iosco-Ogemaw Community Mental Health District

A report from Floyd Smith, recently appointed director of the Iosco-Ogemaw Community Mental Health District, was heard Wednesday by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

Smith told commissioners the biggest problem in his new job appeared to be completion of organizational procedures and to develop communications with the community.

The new director hopes to overcome part of this problem through development of an educational brochure, appearances at area service clubs and printing of placards to explain services.

During a question and answer period, Smith said that the department handles approximately 200 sessions per month with patients, who are referred by private physicians and courts as well as through voluntary visits.

The department employs two therapists in the local area and a psychiatrist is available two days a month as well as on an emergency answering service basis, seven days a week, 24 hours a day.

The new director is to make quarterly reports to the board of commissioners and arrangements are being made to have commission members visit the sheltered workshop in Tawas City as well as the local mental health office.

In other business handled during the informal session, the commission appeared in agreement that it would retain Ronald Tyler, former prosecuting attorney and now a private practicing attorney at Oscoda, to represent Iosco County in a number of matters. It was stated that the present criminal work load of Pros. Atty. Stephen H. Naegle was so great that assistance was needed.

Work would include defense of the county in a recent civil suit filed against Iosco County and the City of East Tawas concerning injury to a swimmer at the state-owned Michigan Waterways Commission Dock, handling default in operation of Old Orchard Park and obtaining a new contractor, matters pertaining to Iosco County's role in the AuGres watershed and expansion of the DART transportation system.

Retainer fees and actual hiring is to be handled at the regular meeting of the board of commissioners to be held today (Wednesday).

Due to inclement weather, there was a poor turnout at a hearing scheduled for Wednesday afternoon concerning petitions filed for the establishment of a county economic development commission. No competing applications were received by the commission and a letter was submitted by original petitioners.

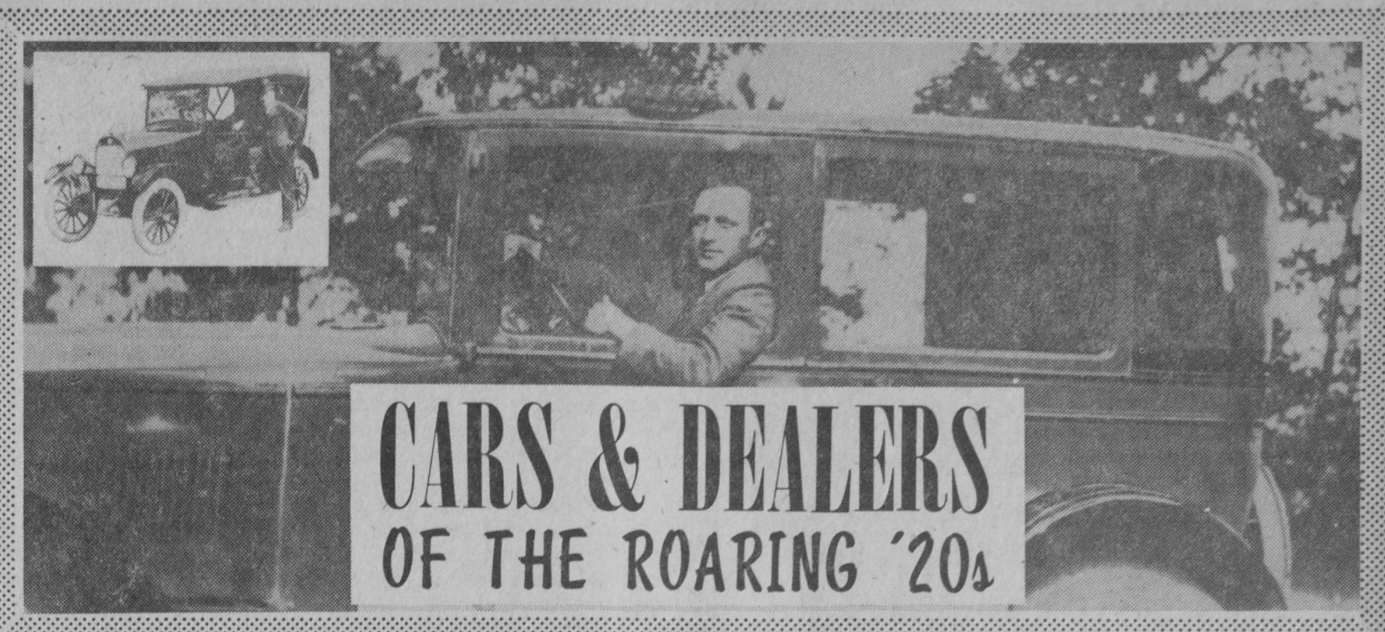
Indications are that all members of the board agree on the need for establishment of an economic development commission and a final determination is to be made at today's regular session.

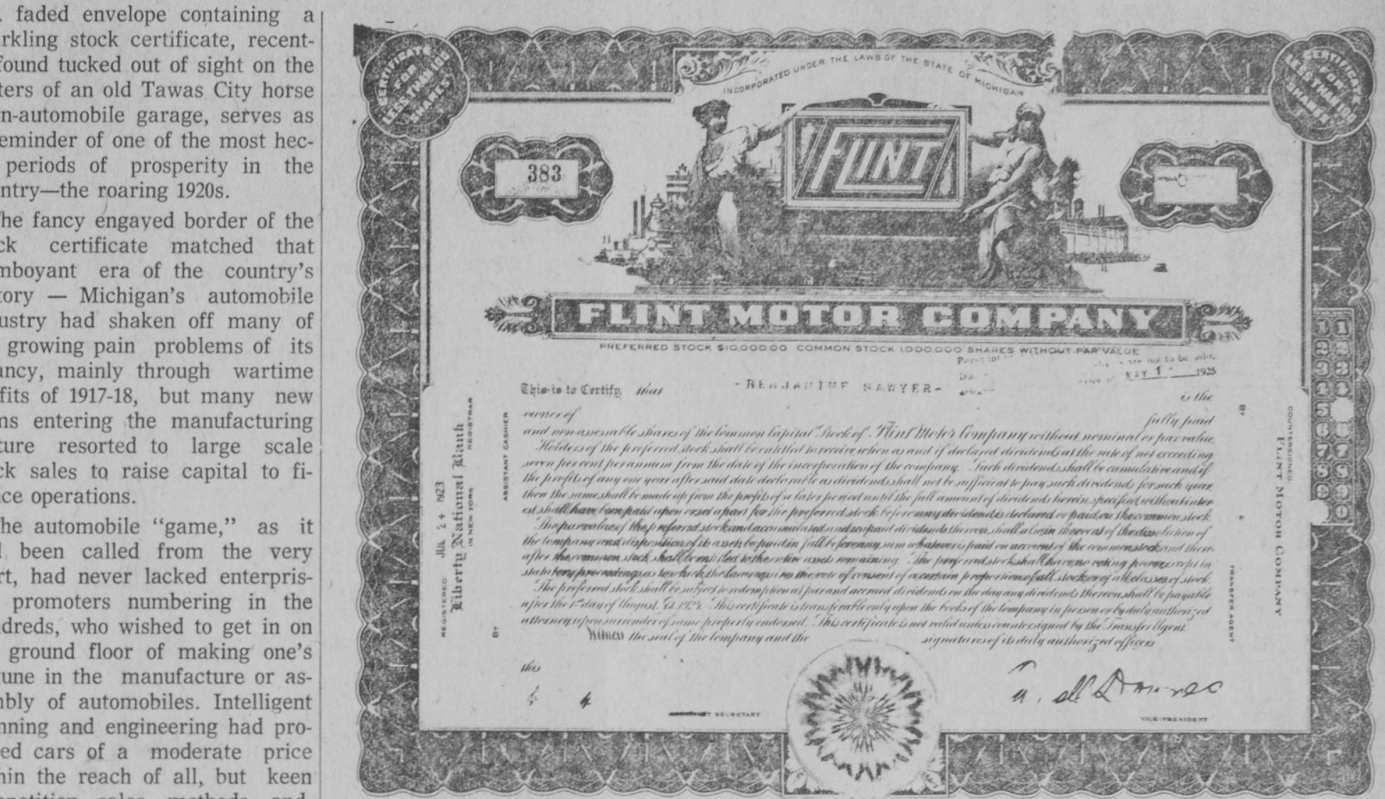

The Star sold for only \$348, but Ford lowered his price and the Star never captured the market. Hundreds of now long forgotten automobile names ended in the same manner.



THIS PURPLE BORDERED stock certificate for five shares in the Flint Motor Company was found recently in an old Tawas City barn. Issuance of the stock in 1922 was an ingenious scheme by William C. Durant for financing his new company after he lost control of General Motors for the second time. Durant sold his stock on the installment plan to 146,000 shareholders but, despite its promising start, Durant Motors never amounted to much—he could not resist the lure of the runaway stock market in the late 1920s and the firm was finally liquidated in bankruptcy.

mobile business and many new agents entered the field throughout the country.

Here in Iosco, Miles Main, a former Detroit Tiger pitcher, became the agent in 1920 for the Oakland Motor Car Company, a substantial firm organized at Pontiac in 1907, which joined the GM combine in 1909.

Main later added the Dort and Dodge motor cars to his line and, in a real estate transaction, obtained a moving picture house in Tawas City from Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Berube, called the Auditorium, which he intended to convert into an automobile sales room and garage.

Other new dealers quickly following this postwar era were Matthew Haglund and Sons at East Tawas, Maxwell and later Studebaker; Richard Look, who took over the former Durant and Adams garage at East Tawas in 1921 and established a Willis Knight dealership; Edward Louks, who established an Overland dealership at Whittemore; Orville Leslie, who became the Ford agent at Prescott in the spring of 1921.

William Look, veteran East Tawas automobile dealer, who was associated with his brother in the Willis Knight and Oakland agency starting in 1922, recalls that the dealer usually had to train the car buyer in the operation of his new vehicle. Many new car purchasers had no previous driving experience and training sessions often required many days.

Look said that the "testing ground" for comparing qualities of the different makes of automobiles was the hill at Five Channels Dam. "The Oakland had a low gear ratio and could reach the top of that steep hill in high gear, which impressed potential car buyers and resulted in many sales," said Look. (Owners of Model T Fords had to back their cars up a steep hill as the car had no fuel pump and the engine would stop from the lack of gasoline on a steep grade.)

"I was not impressed with the Oakland, personally, as it had many mechanical problems and garages around the area were filled with them awaiting repairs," said Look. "We dropped that agency at our first opportunity."

Look particularly liked to work on the Willis Knight due to its sleeve valve arrangement and the engine was very quiet running. Other mechanics apparently preferred to work on engines equipped with regular valves and Look's shop was swamped with work from agencies throughout Northern Michigan.

Look purchased his brother's interest in the business in 1927 and became dealer for Buick and Pontiac, a business which has been continued by his sons.

The Federal Bureau of Public Roads reported in 1920 that there were 7,565,466 motor vehicles of all types in the United States at the end of the previous year; by 1923, the annual production of passenger cars had reached 2,753,945 and 426,505 trucks were manufactured. By the end of the roaring '20s, annual production of passenger cars had reached 4,794,890 passenger cars and 826,817 trucks.

Cars were becoming so numerous on America's highways that a 15-mile-per-hour speed limit was still being enforced by Tawas City



Roaring '20s

(Continued from page 1.)

In 1920, "Too many motorists entirely disregard the speed and traffic laws in the city and it appears as though a member of the state police needs to be stationed here for a time to teach some of them a lesson," editorialized The Tawas Herald.

Accidents were becoming numerous as rural roads had not kept pace with engineering developments of the automobile industry, despite the fact that Michigan built the first concrete highway. One particularly treacherous spot in local roads was the Mason hill on the Hemlock Road west of Tawas City, then a part of M-10—the Dixie Highway—which entered Iosco County from the south through Whittemore, then west along the Hemlock Road through the Tawas, before meandering to Oscoda by way of Wilbur Township.

On June 30, 1921, the Herald reported a fatal accident on the Mason hill. James A. Balen, who was

driving a 12-cylinder Pope-Hartford, "was endeavoring to make Oscoda in two hours from Bay City." He attempted to travel down the clay hill going at a rate of 55 miles per hour, when the car swerved from the road, rolled over twice and landed on top of a fence. The driver died within a few minutes and his passenger was badly injured.

"This was the third car to go off the road at this hill in the past few years," stated the Herald. "Being so narrow, it is a dangerous piece of road and in wet weather the hill is very slippery. Unless a driver is exceedingly careful, an accident is very possible. As this is part of the state trunkline highway, the state should give it attention and not wait until the whole road is improved."

Despite the increase in automobile accidents, motoring had become so popular that it seemed the entire nation was on wheels. Local residents joined the throng which jammed Michigan's highways and a few local motorists even made long distance trips to California or Florida, as reported in columns of the Herald.

Between 1920 and 1925, the annual output of automobiles doubled. In numbers, the Ford Model T led all the rest and Henry Kane, the agent in Tawas City, built up one of the largest agencies in Northeastern Michigan.

The Model T was inexpensive and durable, but the only color offered was black. Other manufacturers produced cars with a more attractive appearance and, seeing his sales decline, Ford in 1927 discontinued the Model T after 15-million had been sold. The next year, the Model A, built to compete with Chevrolet and Plymouth, made its appearance.

Improvements in automobiles during the 1920s included closed bodies, balloon tires, four-wheel hydraulic brakes and shatterproof glass.

The manufacture of automobiles promoted prosperity during the era, providing work for many

thousands of men at high wages—many workers wore the latest fad, expensive silk shirts, to the auto plants, but automobile manufacturing also stimulated other industries.

Numerous shops were set up to produce accessories, the increased demand for gasoline caused the growth of the oil industry (John Swarts established a filling station in Tawas City in 1922), tourists in large numbers sought out new and more distant resorts. S. B. Yawer's Acme Garage was one of the first established in West-ern Iosco County and W. F. Cholger of Tawas City was the dealer for United States Tires.

As automobile sales moved into high gear, new dealers entered the field. L. G. McKay and his Tawas Auto Sales, pioneer Chevrolet dealer, and C. H. Prescott and Sons, Buick dealer, were soon

joined in the field by Frank Dease, Durant dealer; David B. Lovejoy of East Tawas, Hudson-Essex sales; Edward Graham and Son, Star distributor at Whittemore.

Wilbur C. Roach, a former professional baseball player, purchased Henry Kane's Ford Agency in October 1924, representing that firm until 1927, when James H. Leslie became the Ford dealer. Roach, who had been the Dodge dealer, added the Essex to his line.

An easy purchase plan was announced by the Ford Motor Company in 1923. A weekly payment of \$5 enrolled one in this plan "by which thousands of families all over the country are finding it easy to own the car they always wanted," stated an advertisement in a May 1923 issue of The Tawas Herald.

By 1929, production had peaked at nearly five-million automobiles, but the bubble burst on October 29 of that year. Huge amounts of money had been used for specula-

tion in the stock market and prices of stock were bid up beyond any reasonable level. As a result, when the crash came millions of dollars of paper "profits" were wiped out.

During the decade of the 1920s, the economic wheel had made a complete revolution from depression through prosperity to another depression and the automobile industry had boomed through over-production. Signs of a depression on the horizon were clearly shown as early as 1928, during a period of automobile industry layoffs.

After the 1929 crash, production of passenger cars had dropped to 2,910,187 and 599,991 trucks were manufactured in 1930—but that is another era and another story. The stocks issued by many automobile firms were now worthless pieces of paper and that is how the purple bordered stock certificate for five shares in the Flint Motor Company came to be tucked away in a Tawas City barn.

MORE QUESTIONS ABOUT 'THE PILL'

Next week (March 6-12) is National Nutrition Week. It is a time set aside by the American Dietetic Association and many other cooperating organizations to promote greater awareness of what good nutrition is. All of the March Family Living Education columns will focus on aspects of nutrition. This week, we will look at how "the pill" affects nutrition needs.

Women taking oral contraceptives may need to watch their diets more carefully. "The pill" reduces blood levels of thiamin, riboflavin, vitamins B6, B12, C and folacin," points out Dr. Dale Romsos, Michigan State University associate professor of food science and human nutrition. "Also, the pill may cause megaloblastic anemia and increased depression. Taking additional vitamin B6 may counteract this depression."

When a woman uses oral contraceptives, her blood plasma levels of folic acid are decreased. If she should become pregnant within six months of taking the pill, she could develop folic acid deficiency resulting in megaloblastic anemia. There is some suggestion that teen-

age girls taking oral contraceptives may not reach their full adult size, Doctor Romsos points out.
If a woman is on the pill, does she need vitamin supplements? "The first thing to do is to pay extra attention to the diet," advises Doctor Romsos. "Vitamin pills may be necessary in some instances. That should be left up to the physician to decide. But in many cases, adjusting the diet will counteract some of the vitamin deficiencies."
Animal products are good sources of B12. Foods high in protein such as beef, eggs, fish, etc., are good sources of B6. Simply watching the diet more carefully and adding foods high in certain vitamins may be all that is necessary to avoid nutrition problems.
