

All Public Bodies Must Comply

New Open Meetings Act Becomes Law Friday

A work session of Tawas Area Board of Education is to be held next Monday night to review proposed revisions and updating of school district policies.

Individual members have reviewed and are to make recommendations on policies concerning administration, personnel, a code of ethics, business and non-instructional operation.

Also to be considered is adoption of a new policy to comply with the new Open Meetings Act and the Freedom of Information Act. Format of the new policy is to follow one suggested by the Michigan Association of School Boards.

With few exceptions, the Open Meetings Act requires public policymaking bodies to conduct business at open sessions; only the state legislature excluded itself and judges from certain provisions of the law.

Beginning Friday, all public bodies except the legislature and panels of judges can meet in closed sessions only for one of the following reasons:

1. When a closed meeting of an educational body is requested by a student or the parent of a student facing discipline, suspension or dismissal;
2. When a public employee facing discipline, suspension or dismissal requests a closed hearing;
3. For strategy or negotiation sessions involving collective bargaining;
4. To consider purchase or lease of property;
5. To consult with an attorney involving trial or settlement strategy if an open meeting might be costly to the public;
6. To review applications for a job or appointment to office, when the candidate requests that his or her interest in the post be kept confidential;
7. To consider material exempt from disclosure by other state or federal statute.

A public body holding a closed meeting must explain under what specific provision of the new law that the meeting is being held. Minutes must be kept of the meeting and those minutes may be made public by court order.

Anyone who believes a public body is violating the law may complain to the county prosecutor or to the Michigan attorney general, or a civil case can be filed under the law without the cooperation of these officials.

A decision made by a public body can be invalidated if it is found in violation of the law.

A public official intentionally violating the law is guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000. An official found guilty a second time may be fined up to \$2,000 and jailed for up to one year.

An Open Records Law, companion to the Open Meetings Act, takes effect April 13. Known as the Freedom of Information Act, the law makes most records kept by government bodies available to the public inspection and copying.

Most exceptions provided in the act protect law enforcement files, personnel or medical files whose release would "constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy."

Two Vacancies on TA Board

Four persons are circulating petitions for two four-year vacancies on Tawas Area Board of Education, according to a report Monday night by Supt. Robert Halle.

Others interested in circulating petitions to become candidates for the annual election June 13 have until April 11 to file petitions at the administration office, East Tawas.

The four persons presently circulating petitions are Kathryn Leitz, Joseph Reinke, James Russo and Dean Parrish.

Two veteran members of the board of education, Dr. James Jacques, presently serving as president, and Carl Babcock, a former president, have indicated they will not be candidates for reelection.

Besides electing two persons to fill vacancies on the board of education, voters will be asked to approve an operational millage proposal.

Indications were at Monday night's meeting of the board of education that voters would be asked to renew the 12-mill tax levy which was approved for one year in 1976.

Next meeting of the board of education is to be held April 18 and it is expected that the exact millage proposal rate will be discussed that night or at a subsequent special meeting.

Last day of voter registration for the June 13 annual election is May 16. Voters may register until 5:00 p. m. that day at the administration office, East Tawas.

Patterson Set as Iosco County GOP Speaker

L. Brooks Patterson, prosecuting attorney of Oakland County since January 1973, will be guest speaker at a meeting of the Iosco County Republican Committee to be held April 13 at the AuSable Inn, Oscoda.

Prior to his election as Oakland's prosecuting attorney, Patterson proved himself to be an outstanding trial lawyer in both the civil and criminal practice of law.

Since taking office, Patterson personally has continued to try capital cases before juries. He has nearly tripled the output of criminal jury cases and has energetically undertaken the prosecution of narcotic pushers, increasing the number of convictions by over 2,000 percent.

Dedicated to the concept that the victims and society must be aggressively represented as the defendant normally is, Patterson has reduced plea bargaining in all criminal cases.

In 1973, he was voted one of the five outstanding young men of the year by the Michigan Jaycees.

Appointed to Hospital Bd.

Mrs. Charles Schreck has been appointed a trustee of Tawas Hospital, according to an announcement Thursday by Robert W. Elliott, president of the hospital's board of trustees.

Affiliated with Schreck Lumber Company of East Tawas as a corporate officer, Mrs. Schreck is a member of the hospital auxiliary, the Ladies Literary Club and the American Red Cross.

She served a four-year term on Tawas Area Board of Education and was president when she retired from office in 1975.

Iosco Gets SB Tax Check

Iosco County received the first payment for its share of the state's single business tax. The amount of \$19,519.14 goes to the county general fund and \$645 to Iosco Medical Care bond retirement fund.

According to County Treas. Edward Nelkie, the payment is in lieu of inventory previously assessed as personal property and is based on the 1975 state equalized valuation of such tax exempt inventory and the tax rates certified to the state treasury.

This came about pursuant to Chapter 6, Section 134, of the Single Business Tax Act 228, Public Act of 1975.

The state treasury sends payments direct to all townships and cities which qualify under Act 228.

School Must Balance Projected Expenditures for New Budget

An update on a tentative budget formulated two months ago for 1977-78 operation of Tawas Area School District indicated that presently projected expenditures would be from \$15,000 to \$18,000 higher than anticipated revenues.

Supt. Robert Halle told members of the board of education that he estimates that revenue would show a 2.78 percent increase over the current year, based on the same local operational millage rate and the same state aid formula as adopted last year by the legislature.

The superintendent projects a four percent increase in the state equalized valuation of the district, although the exact figure will not be known until later this month when tabulations are made by the county tax equalization department.

Halle said that the presently projected deficit of \$15,000 to \$18,000 represents an expenditure increase of 4 1/2 to five percent, which is basically the same percentage of increase as was seen last year.

All governmental bodies, by law, must balance expenditures with revenue. "I believe we can adopt a budget to live within the 12 mills of operational taxes which were approved last year and have now expired," said Halle.

The superintendent said the board of education should make sure the budget is realistic. He cautioned the board of education by saying, "This is not my budget, it is your budget and the school district's budget."

The tentative budget is to be considered at a special work session of the board of education next Monday night.

In other business, Trustee Carl Babcock asked that the administration seeks clarification concerning probationary teachers who were "pink slipped" two weeks ago. At that meeting, probationary teachers were notified that their employment with this school district was to terminate at the end of the current term due to uncertainty of operational revenue for the next term. This policy was adopted a year ago by the board of education.

Babcock said he was concerned over the matter of unemployment compensation to be paid to teachers whose services are to be terminated. He questioned if the teachers would be eligible for unemployment compensation at the end of the current term, or if not required due to the lack of funds, would the effective date of unemployment compensation start with the new term next fall.

The board accepted the low bid of James Presson of Oscoda to serve as the school district's auditor for the coming term. Presson, who is a certified public accountant, entered a bid of \$3,000 for the work. He currently serves as auditor for Oscoda Area School and Iosco Intermediate School District.

For auditing purposes, the board of education "forgave" a debit in the building and site fund which loaned \$495 to the general fund for purchase of property in 1974 for a building and trades house.

The superintendent was directed to obtain information on the purchase of a four-wheel pickup, with attached snow plow. This unit is to replace a 1966 truck.

Bids from three firms to provide repair work at the Tawas City Elementary Unit and the administration office at East Tawas were rejected. Complete specifications concerning the work are to be prepared and the school is to advertise for bids.

Iosco Studies Last Stand on Drain

Iosco County Board of Commissioners, which with its predecessors, the former county board of supervisors, has long opposed this county's involvement in the Augres River drainage district, must now "put up or shut up" concerning its stand.

Donald Griffin, who represented the county on the now disbanded augmented drainage board, said Monday that it may be too late now to do anything other than "concede defeat."

Griffin said that he and other commissioners must now sit down with Ronald Tyler, the commission's recently retained legal counsel, to determine if there is any basis for this county to seek a court injunction against the project.

The only basis for such an injunction, he said, would be to question the legality of a vote taken two years ago approving the project. At that hearing, Griffin attempted to amend a resolution by deleting Iosco and Ogemaw County from the assessment district.

The motion was ruled out of order by Stanley Quackenbush, state drain commissioner, and the project was approved as being "practical and desirable" when two Ogemaw County members sided with Arenac County to defeat Iosco's solid opposition.

Since then, Ogemaw County Board of Commissioners has again supported Iosco County in its effort to stop the project due to the uncertainty of costs.

"If it is decided to question the legality of Quackenbush's action on my proposed amendment and the court refuses to issue an injunction, it probably would be time to stop fighting it—the longer the delay, the more difficult it would become in court," conceded Griffin.

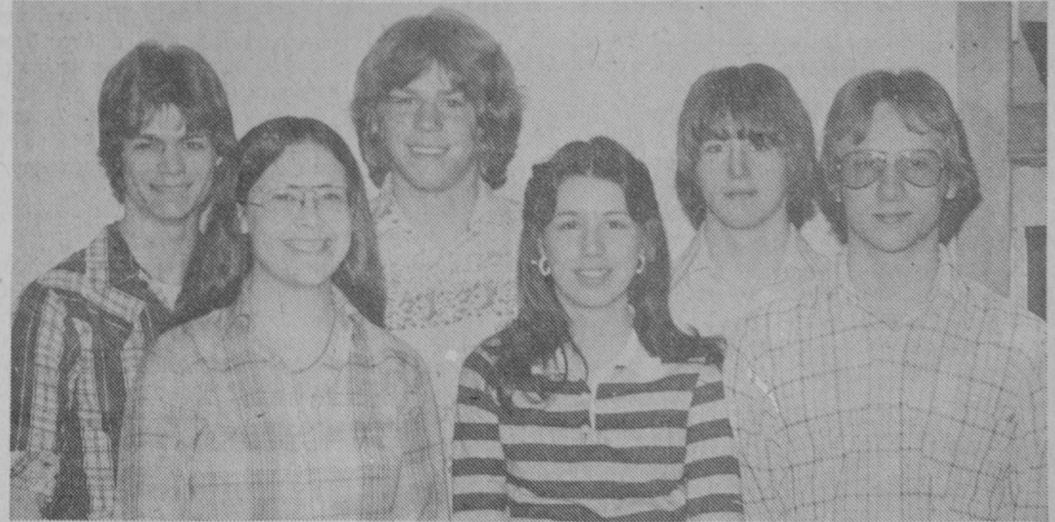

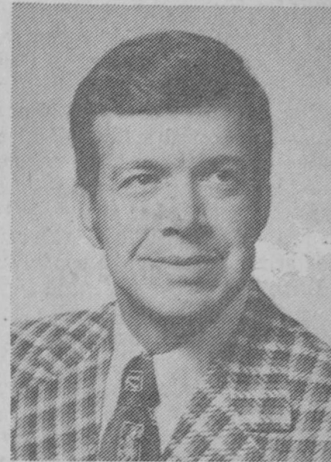

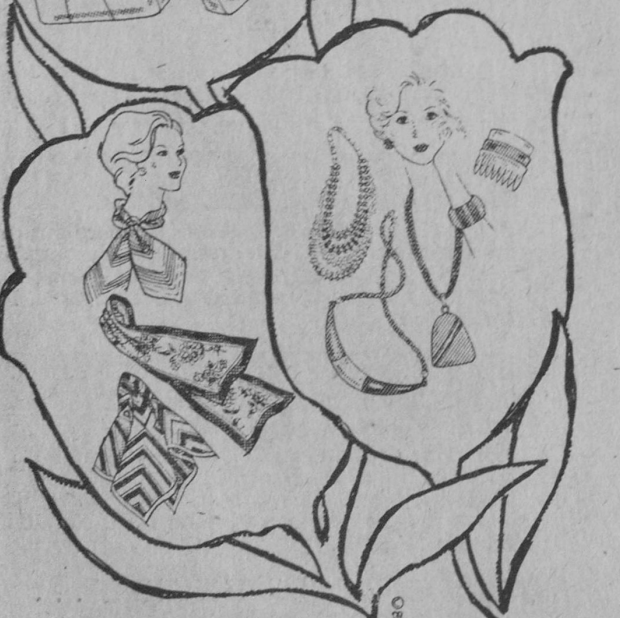

Oscoda Man Captured After Escape; Companion Killed

Neil E. Price, 21, Oscoda, who with Ronald M. Delzer, 41, escaped March 11 from the Colorado State Penitentiary at Canon City, was recaptured Thursday in Illinois. Delzer was fatally wounded.

The two men were traveling with Kenneth K. Klowitter, 20, Mikado, when their car broke down on Interstate 74 near Urbana, Illinois. An Illinois state trooper stopped behind them and called for a tow truck.

During a routine license check, the officer found the plates did not match the car. During questioning, the driver told the officers that Delzer and Price were prison escapees.

The officer called for a backup

unit and ordered the two escapees out of the car. When the officer was putting the cuffs on Price, Delzer pulled a .22 caliber pistol. The officer put Price in front of him and fired two shots at Delzer.

Price and Klowitter were held at the Champaign County Jail. Before escaping prison, Price was serving a term for theft and a five to 10-year sentence for a previous escape. Delzer had been serving a 20 to 30-year sentence for aggravated robbery. He was from Chicago, Illinois.

A number of years ago, Price was sentenced to Jackson Prison for an Isosco County burglary. He was being sought here under a still outstanding warrant for a 1973 burglary.

and maintenance costs of the project, along with assessments procedures, should be clarified.

A ratio of 91 percent of the cost to Arenac, six percent to Iosco and three percent to Ogemaw had been discussed said Merschel, but no definite percentages have ever been established. "Because of our opposition to the project, Iosco County has been threatened with 33 1/3 percent of the cost," he stated.

Merschel said he was also opposed to any at-large assessment in Iosco County because the entire county would not benefit from the project. He pointed out there were three other major drainage rivers in this county.

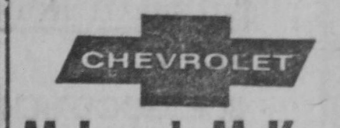

County Park Development to Get Revenue Sharing Money

Expansion of the development role of the Iosco County Parks and Recreation Commission was indicated Wednesday afternoon during a joint meeting with the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

The parks and recreation commission, formed about 10 years ago under state law, has devoted most of its efforts to development and operation of the now highly successful Old Orchard Park on the AuSable River.

The county board of commissioners indicated Wednesday that a portion of the \$800,000 to be received by Iosco County in federal revenue sharing funds will go toward assisting local communities with development of parks, both tourist and locally oriented.

In recent years, county federal revenue sharing funds have been allocated to construct much needed water and sewer systems at Old Orchard Park. Representatives of the parks commission said that Old Orchard Park was now

becoming self-sustaining through its recent modernization and would begin to repay federal revenue sharing funds to the county treasury.

Carlton Merschel, acting chairman of the county board of commissioners, said that the meeting had been called to develop a more closer working relationship with the park commission. He said that the City of East Tawas had recently appeared before the park commission to seek assistance from that group, but had been advised to appear before the county board of commissioners.

During discussion, members of the park and recreation commission pointed out that members were unsure as to the specific request for assistance from East Tawas officials and advised them to appear before the county commission for a clarification. Merschel said it was now apparent that too many projects and too much detail included in East Tawas' proposal

had made it unclear as to the specific request.

East Tawas appeared before both commissions and asked for financial assistance with its proposed Deloisse (Dewey) Durant Park, boat launching ramp and purchase of the McKay property on US-23 to expand the city park.

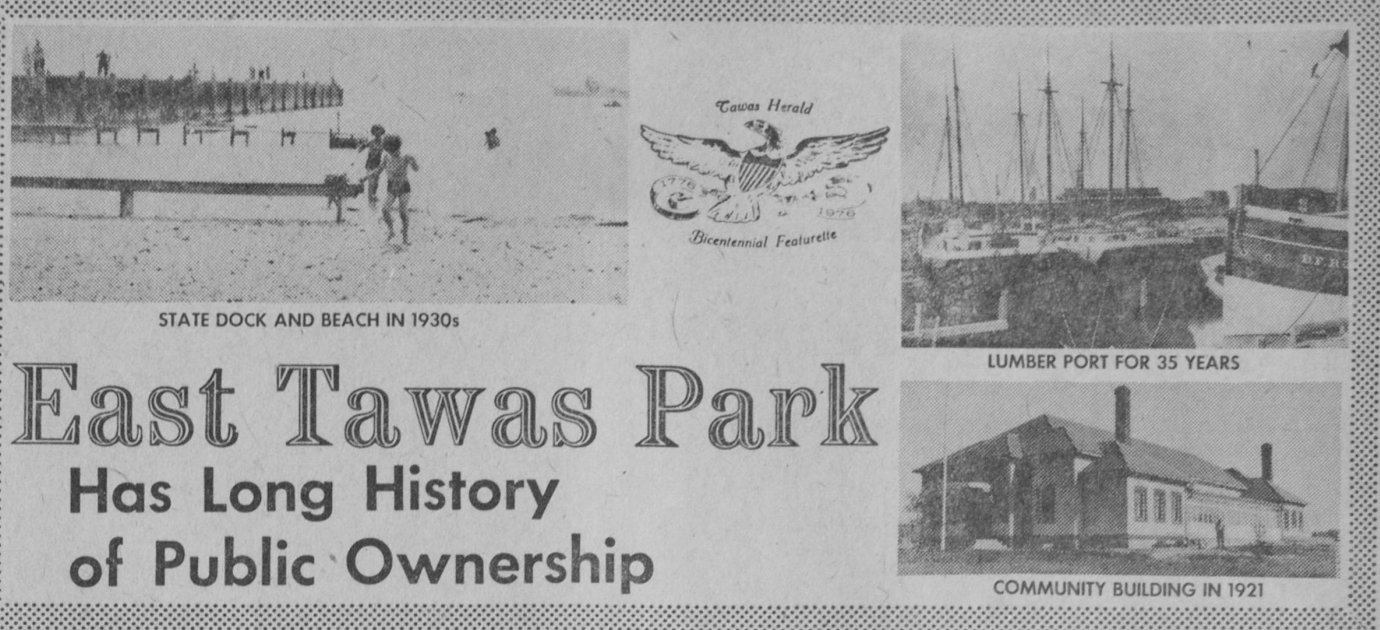
Charles Smith of Oscoda, veteran member of the park board, pointed out to the county commission that no funds had ever been specifically allocated to the parks and recreation commission to aid local communities in development of parks, although it had assisted in preparing grant applications for several projects and used some Old Orchard Park revenues to assist with matching funds on township projects.

Robert Foster of the park commission said that approximately \$20,000 from Old Orchard Park revenue had been set aside to match federal funds received for other county park projects.

Duane Walters of the parks and recreation commission stated that a five-year comprehensive plan for county park development had been completed by Wade, Trim and Associates. Copies were presented to members of the board of commissioners.

Projects proposed by East Tawas, Tawas City and several townships are included in this plan and the parks and recreation commission felt that it should be reviewed by the county board of commissioners in order that priorities might be established.

Donald Griffin, a member of both commissions, felt that federal revenue sharing money to be reimbursed from Old Orchard Park should go to providing matching funds for other park projects in the county. As county finance chairman, he felt that a long range program should be established for disbursement of county federal revenue sharing funds, to (See PARKS, page 6.)



East Tawas Park Has Long History of Public Ownership

One of the most valuable shoreline areas along the Great Lakes observes its 12th anniversary this year as a city park; it also marks the start of construction on a federal, state and local project which should prove to be one of the most important recreational developments in the history of Eastern Michigan.

The East Tawas City Park has a long history of public ownership. The property was first acquired by the City of East Tawas in 1891 and utilized for a new industrial complex; it later became the site of an important state park and, in 1965, completed a full circle of public ownership by reverting back to East Tawas as a city park.

Dawning of the "Gay 1890s" was an era far removed locally from a feeling of prosperity—the hope for the future was rather dismal, in fact. Northeastern Michigan's white pine era was finally coming to an end and two sawmills located on Tawas Bay at East Tawas had turned their saws for the last time. The idle sawmills on the property had been turned into

ashes once the wheels stopped turning.

The picture began to brighten in the fall of 1892 when the new firm of Temple Emery and Nelson Holland proposed to build an industrial complex on the site of the burned out sawmills. The city acquired property along Tawas Bay at the foot of Newman Street and turned it over to the new enterprise.

Work began immediately on constructing a new sawmill to handle pine logs which were rafted and shipped across Georgian Bay and Lake Huron from Canada. The firm also constructed the Holland Hotel at the corner of Newman Street and Bay Street to take advantage of the tourist and resort business which was then beginning to blossom as an important economic factor in the area.

The Tawas Bay area, which long had been considered one of the finest sheltered ports on Lake Huron, began to take on new hope when this new enterprise developed a substantial industrial boom. It all came to an end in 1897 when the supply of white pine logs from Canada was "dried up" by action of the Ontario legislature. Without logs, the mill could not operate and machinery was soon dismantled and moved to a new location in Canada.

The local business climate again took on a bleak appearance with the loss of this important industry. The huge commercial dock constructed at the foot of Newman Street, once a bustling port for shipment of manufactured lumber, soon fell into disrepair.

It was not until 1920 that the picture actually began to change. Development of the automobile industry and improvement to the state's road system had a dramatic effect on Northeastern Michigan, which was now just beginning to enjoy a surge of traffic from automobiles bearing downstate factory workers bent on summer week-end escapes from the blistering heat of the downstate area.

"Northeastern Michigan is going to be well taken care of by the recently organized Michigan Park Commission," commented The Tawas Herald on May 14, 1920.

This newspaper's lead story that

week stated that the park commission decided to appoint two engineers to lay out parks which were taken over by the commission.

"The first work to be done in the eastern half will be on the park which the City of East Tawas has donated along the lake front. It is adjacent to the Detroit and Mackinac Railway and the Dixie Highway," stated the Herald.

By 1921, the property which once served almost 30 years as the site for sawmills, had been transformed into a state park with picnic tables, benches and a well to provide water for campers.

"The community is fortunate to have these accommodations and a (See POPULAR PARK, page 3.)

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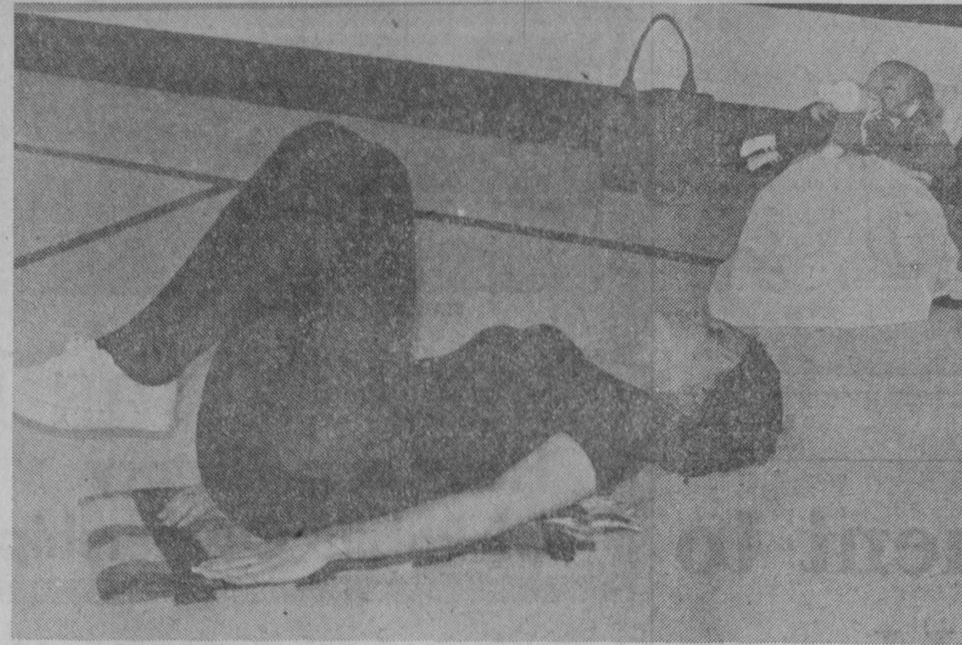
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Slimnastics Help Tawas Women Keep Fit-'N-Trim

Tawas women are keeping fit and losing unwanted pounds, thanks to a slimmastics program conducted by Louise Rickroade. The free program has been conducted for the past 10 weeks in the social center gymnasium of Immaculate Heart of Mary Church.

The program is open to all women of all faiths and ages of participants range from 10 years to senior citizen age. About 40 women are on hand for one-hour sessions Monday, Thursday and Friday of each week.

Most of the participants are busy mothers and housewives and one commented during a break in the class last week that the sessions made her feel younger. "I was always led to believe that such exercises would tend to increase one's appetite. I have not found that to be true and I return home ready to do more housework than ever after an hour of slimmastics," she stated.

"It is the best insurance a woman has to keep in shape," said another participant.

The women bring their children to the gymnasium during the classes to avoid hiring a baby sitter. Facilities are furnished free of charge by IHM Church and sessions are held from 9:30 to 10:30 a. m. three days a week.

The instructor said that response to the program has been tremendous.

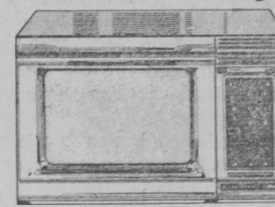

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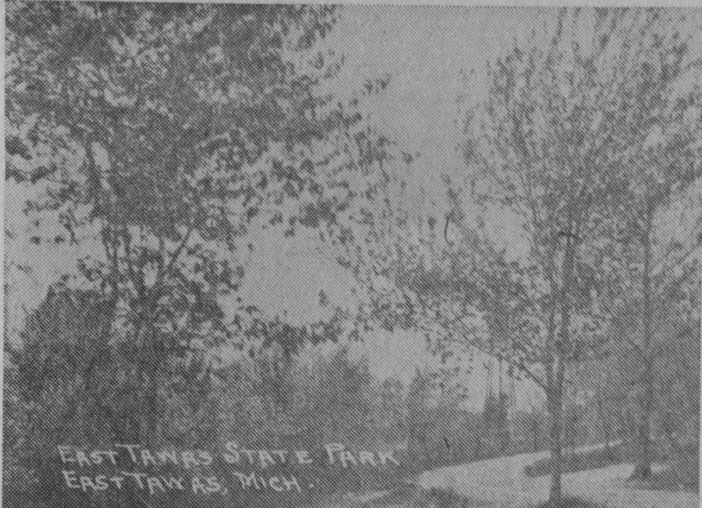

public park in such a desirable location," stated the Herald. "It is evident that the people of East Tawas appreciate the advantage of a cool place on these hot days of summer as attested to by the large number of bathers to be seen at any hour of the day at the state park. The remark is often heard that "there is no finer bathing beach in Michigan."

Members of the state park commission inspecting the new facilities were entertained at the Tawas Beach Clubhouse for dinner by the East Tawas Board of Commerce. Among commissioners present were John Baird of Saginaw, director of the Michigan Conservation Board; John L. Lusk of Lansing, secretary; Commissioners Mellon of Ann Arbor, Marston of Bay City, Lawrence of Iron River and Roth of Ann Arbor.

Development of the state park also saw improvements being made to the old commercial dock for the ever increasing use by pleasure boat owners.

Construction of the East Tawas Community Building, which was financed through countywide donations, was completed in May 1971. This building offered new facilities for public gatherings, recreational activities and also contained an office for the state park manager. Early park rangers at East Tawas included Simon Goupil and Earl Gentry.

Use of the East Tawas State Park grew by leaps and bounds as traffic through Northeastern Michigan saw a rapid expansion and opening of the new concrete Huron Shore Road—US-23—provided an even greater use of park facilities. As part of a Works Progress Administration (WPA) project in the mid-1930s, designed to put men back to work during the depths of the national business depression, a new dock was constructed at the foot of Newman Street. This new facility added greatly to the utilization of the state park, which was rapidly becoming one of the most popular in the state. In addition, the former railroad depot located west of the US-23-Newman Street intersection was removed during the original highway construction project in 1932.

Campers at East Tawas had the advantage of being within walking distance of stores, theatre, post office and other conveniences provided by the Newman Street shopping district while, at the same time, had the opportunity to enjoy camping, swimming and boating facilities offered along the shore of Tawas Bay.

This use was to expand rapidly during the 1930s and, just prior to the start of World War II, the state park dock was again improved under a new state financed project. The dock became headquarters for

several perch fishing party boats. The war years proved to be particularly busy for the state park. Due to automobile, gasoline and tire limitations because of the war effort, East Tawas State Park was used heavily by downstate motorists during the summer months.

Over the years, the state park diminished in size somewhat due to widening of US-23, construction of the state police post at the east end and the water filtration plant west of Newman Street, but the excellent facilities provided by the state were adequate.

In June 1955, Gov. G. Mennen Williams formally dedicated and then turned over to the public the new Waterways Commission Dock. A crowd of several hundred spectators gathered at the base of the new structure to witness the ceremony.

"Welcome, Governor Williams!" banners were posted throughout the community and the governor was welcomed by Mayor Elmer Werth and Carl Babcock, chairman of the East Tawas Harbor Committee. Harbormaster was Joseph Fox.

Construction of the new dock was a major development in the expansion of boating facilities on Tawas Bay. In 1963, the recreational business here received a serious jolt when a flash fire caused heavy damage to the dock and repairs were not completed until the summer of 1964.

Prior to the fire, the state acquired 175 acres of land on Tawas Point which had been declared surplus by the federal government. A state park was opened there on a limited basis in July 1961 and construction soon saw development of a new and larger state park.

Negotiations were commenced immediately by officials of East Tawas and the former state park was returned to the city effective January 1, 1965. A new park commission composed of Merton Kiley, J. E. LaBerge, Wayne Pollard and Lewis F. Besancon commenced plans for renovating the newly acquired city park.

The city council authorized a \$35,000 revenue bond issue to finance this work, which included \$11,000 for renovating the old community building. When the property was owned by the state, the conservation department once notified the city that it intended to remove the old building, but this action was blocked by the city.

A city ordinance formally established the park commission in March 1965 with Kiley as chairman. Joseph Badalucco was the first park manager.

Developments under the park commission have been substantial and receipts from the park have helped to finance improvements to other parks at East Tawas. In recent years, the former residence of Dr. Harold Jones was acquired for future expansion at the west end of the park.

The city park now enters a new phase of expansion as the city council is now considering proposals to acquire the former McKay residence and Evans home for park expansion. The McKay residence is being considered for a library and museum building.

Perhaps the greatest development in the 57-year history of the property as a public park is the \$3,000,000 project which starts this year on an extension to the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock and development of harbor docking facilities.

In addition, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources

and City of East Tawas are engaged in a joint venture to develop a new small boat launching ramp and parking lot at the site presently occupied by the city garage east of the state police post.

Development of these two projects will add greatly to the harbor and recreational facilities and should result in additional business expansion to meet new and increased usage by pleasure craft.

When completed, it will be a far cry from the small state park established in 1920, which boasted of a few picnic tables, camping sites and a deep well to provide drinking water for campers.

FAMILY LIVING EDUCATION

WHERE TO FIND ANSWERS TO YOUR FOOD QUESTIONS

When you have a question on foods or nutrition, you want an answer you can rely on. But finding a reliable source of informa-

tion can be puzzling. The newsstands and bookstores are loaded with books and magazines with articles on the latest food scare, wonder weight loss diet and how-to-feed-your-baby controversy. How can you tell which ones are reliable? Unless you are a trained nutritionist, you probably cannot. So let the specialists help you.

One nearby source of helping in evaluating food information is the county Cooperative Extension Service. To answer your questions, the extension staff can draw on the resources of Michigan State University Department of Food Science and Human Nutrition.

Books and pamphlets, the names of organizations and professional associations to contact may be suggested. Some of these include the state and national associations of the American Dietetics Association and the American Home Economics Association, the Michigan Department of Public Health, the Food and Drug Administration and the American Medical Association. The public library is another possibility. Look there for "Nutrition References and Book Reviews," by the Chicago Nutrition Association. It divides books on nutrition and foods into three categories: Recommended, recommended with

reservation and not recommended. In each case, it explains why. If the library does not have the book, suggest it be acquired. When you have to be your own expert, use these rules of thumb:

Anyone can call himself an expert and write a nutrition book. Look for biographical information on the author—if often appears on the back cover—and check for training in nutrition and connection with a university or research group. Note: An "M. D." after an author's name is no guarantee he knows his nutrition.

Beware of someone who is selling something. An author who is

the only source for the miraculous pounds-off substance he is writing about and the clerk at the local health store may or may not have training in nutrition. They are out to make money, however, and that, not the state of your health, is their chief concern.

Beware of self-appointed consumer advocates with simple answers to complicated questions like the relationship of fiber and health. It will take many years for the research on this and other such questions to clear up the exact relationships involved.

Be critical, even of articles in reputable magazines and books

put out by well known publishers. Editors and publishers are usually not experts in nutrition. They are in business to make a profit. And recipe books and nutrition books sell. The writers may or may not be trained in nutrition.

In the long run, nutrition education in the public schools is needed to help tomorrow's consumers become better informed and better equipped to make critical judgments about the reliability of food and nutrition information. Today's consumers should take advantage of the many sources of reliable information and assistance available.

MDA Requirements Call for Inspection

Landscaping with native Michigan plants is not as simple as it sounds. There is more to it than digging up a tree and taking it home. The Michigan Department of Agriculture (MDA) requires that all native perennials, shrubs and trees be inspected at the original site and accompanied by an inspection certificate and native tree tag before they can be moved.

"The aim of this rule is to prevent the spread of insects and plant diseases," explains Joseph Cox, extension specialist in landscape architecture at Michigan State University. "So you are really protecting yourself by having your plants inspected."

If this sounds like more bother than you are ready to put up with, consider buying native plants from your local nursery. Many "wild" plants have been domesticated and are readily available from plant dealers. The nurseryman can help you select a plant that will do well in the conditions your home grounds provide, Cox suggests.

"An advantage of plants native to a particular area is that they are well adapted to the growing conditions there," Cox points out. "They will survive normal winter weather, for instance. They do vary in their preference for soil moisture, acidity or alkalinity, and fertility and in their need for shade or sun. That is where your nurseryman can help you."

Digging up a plant along a roadside and carting it home not only violates the MDA inspection rule but also makes you a

plant rustler. And it may put you in conflict with Michigan's protected species list. "Many wildflowers, trees, shrubs, vines and other plants are protected because of their rarity," Cox points out. "Moving them without inspection is illegal and it may threaten the survival of the species or variety."

If you see a plant that you would like to have for your home grounds, find out what it is, Cox suggests. Then, learn as much as possible about its cultural needs. If your site can provide the proper growing conditions, check with the local nurseryman, botanist, extension agent or plantsman.

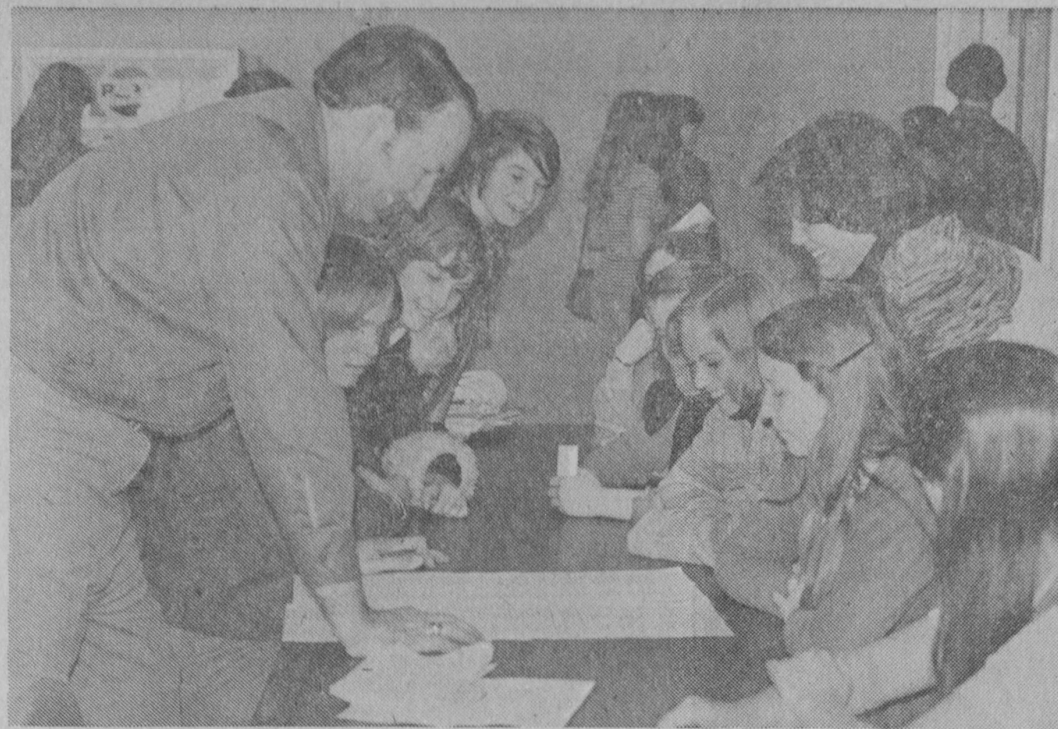
"Buying healthy plants from a licensed nurseryman is surely the easiest—and the safest—way to add native Michigan plants to your landscape," Cox says.

New Driver Training Class Opened Monday at TAHS

Seventy-two students were enrolled for a new session of driver training classes starting Monday morning at Tawas Area High School.

The classes, which require 30 hours of study in the classroom and six hours behind the wheel, are under the direction of David Niles of Lake City.

A certified instructor, Niles graduated from Central Michigan

University in 1975 and later was elected to the Lake City Board of Education, becoming one of the youngest school board members in the state.

Prin. John Alexander said the school was now "back in step"

with its driver education program, which was disrupted earlier this year with the resignation of three driver education instructors in the local school system.

Thirty youngsters, who had started driver education last summer, had not completed behind-the-wheel instruction when the board of education authorized the hiring of replacement instructors. These students are now nearing completion of the classes under Larry Sroufe of Beaverton, a certified instructor.

Starting in June, the school will conduct its regular summer instructional period for students taking driver education. A youngster must be 15 years of age by the middle of June in order to qualify for entry into the classes.

Alexander said that the one-hour classes opening Monday would be held from 7:30 to 8:30 a. m. and from 3:00 to 4:30 p. m.

include parks and recreation, industrial development and other "human needs."

Smith suggested that the county board of commissioners visit Mecosta County to investigate operation of its comprehensive parks system. He said, however, that the present scope of the Iosco Parks and Recreation Commission had necessarily been devoted to Old Orchard Park operation.

Possible development of a planning committee from within the parks and recreation commission was suggested by Foster. "Operation of Old Orchard Park has come a long way since 1970," said Foster. "Had it not been for an expenditure of federal revenue sharing money there, county general fund money would have been required to continue operation of that park. Now, we are at a point where we can begin to return this federal revenue sharing money to the county."

Smith pointed out two problem areas facing the county. He said a decision must be made soon as to the status of the AuSable Park, which is not self-sustaining and is operated under lease by the state. That lease expires in two years and the county may have to take over responsibility for its operation.

In addition, Smith felt that the county board of commissioners should take definite steps to put pressure on the federal government to correct "a deplorable condition" at Lumbermen's Monument. Smith said that grounds of this popular area attraction had been neglected in recent years and that pressure should be used to insure that funds were provided the Federal Forest Service to properly maintain this property.

Discussion is to be held on holding quarterly meetings of the parks and recreation commission in various locations of the county, rather than to hold all meetings at Old Orchard Park. Executive meetings of the board are to continue at the park.

Members of the park commission attending Wednesday's session, besides Smith, Walters and Foster, included Harry Krueger and Alfred Baker. Chairman Arthur Aulerich was unable to attend the meeting.
