



"The aim of this rule is to prevent the spread of insects and plant diseases," explains Joseph Cox, extension specialist in landscape architecture at Michigan State University. "So you are really protecting yourself by having your plants inspected."

If this sounds like more bother than you are ready to put up with, consider buying native plants from your local nursery. Many "wild" plants have been domesticated and are readily available from plant Delia R. Lindahl dealers. The nurseryman can help you select a plant that will do well in the conditions your home grounds provide, Cox suggests.


