

In order to receive reimbursement from the treasury department, Prescott advised those who have filed their tax forms to send a letter to the treasury department including their name, social security number, the amount included on line 19 and the number of the form they used.

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

"Having high blood pressure in your family does not mean that every member of the family will develop it or even that every member is susceptible to it," Mickelson points out. "But it would seem to me to be plenty of reason to be cautious and follow a policy of

moderation in salt consumption." One way to reduce sodium intake without eliminating or drastically reducing consumption of salty foods is to use a mixture of equal parts sodium chloride and ootassium chloride. This mixture, which is commercially available, can be used in food preparation exactly like regular salt. This reduces by one-half the sodium added to foods prepared at home. To reduce the sodium in the diet as much as possible, make meals "from scratch," Mickelson advises, and minimize the use of highly processed foods that are likely to have high sodium content.


