

Election to Name New Commissioner

Legal steps through the elective process to name a successor to the late William Wereley of Hale, a member of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, were commenced last week.

The commission directed County Clerk D. Keith Papas to take steps to initiate an election in Plainfield, Reno, Grant and a portion of Oscoda Township to name Wereley's Fifth District replacement.

According to a recent attorney general ruling, followed by a supreme court decision, a successor must be elected by the people within a reasonable period of time. Papas expects that the time schedule for holding an election, including receiving of nominating petitions, printing of ballots and required legal notices, would be about 120 days.

If more than one candidate from any political party files nominating

petitions, a primary election would be required preceding the special election.

In the past, such vacancies in office were filled through appointment, but the state supreme court reinterpreted the election law in a case involving Wayne County, which upheld the attorney general's opinion that an election of the people is required. The ruling overturned a Wavne County Circuit Court decision permitting an appointment.

Under the law, the county board of commissioners is permitted to fill the vacancy through an interim appointment until such time as an election is held. Members of the commission said Wednesday, however, that an appointment is not expected because of a possible advantage to an appointee over other candidates who may file for the office.

New Sidewalks - Lakefront Acquisition Studied at ET

Two public expansion and improvement projects are now under consideration at East Tawas, according to reports at Monday night's meeting of the city council.

One project would construct new sidewalks along the Newman Street business area, with possible incorporation of a new and much needed storm drainage system.

Street business area, with possible incorporation of a new and much needed storm drainage system. Consideration is also being given to development of a Newman Street shopping mall, which has been discussed in recent years.

The second project under consideration is purchase of the McKay and Evans residences and property along US-23 which would add 278 feet of shoreline to the city park. A number of years ago, the city purchased the former residence of Dr. Harold Jones which adjoins the west end of the park.

This project would be in keeping with the city's master plan, which calls for lake frontage from the west end of the city park to a point near Pine Street to be utilized for recreational purposes.

Appearing before Monday night's meeting were Donald Mooney and Mrs. Stanley Stasik, who represented Newman Street businesses. They inquired as to the possibility of a sidewalk construction program this year to replace present walks which are in need of repair.

Under consideration is construction of sidewalks using a brick pattern similar to that in front of the Pendleton Shop. It was suggested by Mayor Robert Bolen that the businessmen form a committee to prepare proposed plans and to submit them to the council for consideration and construction this fall.

During discussion, it was pointed out that a new storm drainage system was needed along Newman Street to eliminate the present drain which connects with the sanitary sewer system. It was also stated that work was needed on the street surface and subgrade. In order to eliminate a number of dips in the street surface, considerable excavation would be required.

Because of the cost of such a project, development of a shopping mall and elimination of traffic on Newman Street was again discussed. This project was considered several years ago but no action or plans have ever been finalized.

Mayor Bolen said that sidewalk construction in other parts of the city probably should be delayed to include construction of curbs and gutters, along with needed storm drainage systems.

The city clerk was directed to start making application for Bureau of Outdoor Recreation funds administered by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources to assist the city in purchasing the McKay and Evans property. Word has been received that should such funding be received, the Upper Great Lakes Commission would consider a grant to aid in this development.

The McKay property was offered to the city recently by L. G.

(Ladd) McKay for use as a city library and museum. Preliminary discussion has been held with Miss Ruby Evans concerning purchase of her property to the west of the former McKay residence.

East Tawas has received approval for BOR funds for development of the DeLoise (Dewey) Durant Park on a 50-50 matching basis. This project is to start this year and the city has received an allocation of \$40,000, which is to be matched by a similar local amount.

The city is currently seeking assistance from the Iosco County Board of Commissioners and Iosco County Parks Commission to aid with development of this new park, along with purchase of lake frontage for expansion of the city park.

File Suit Over Oscoda Area Drain

Property owners of Lake Huron Sand Beach Subdivision, Oscoda, have filed suit in Iosco County Circuit Court against the county drain commissioner seeking a restraining order against discharge of storm drain effluent on the plaintiff's property.

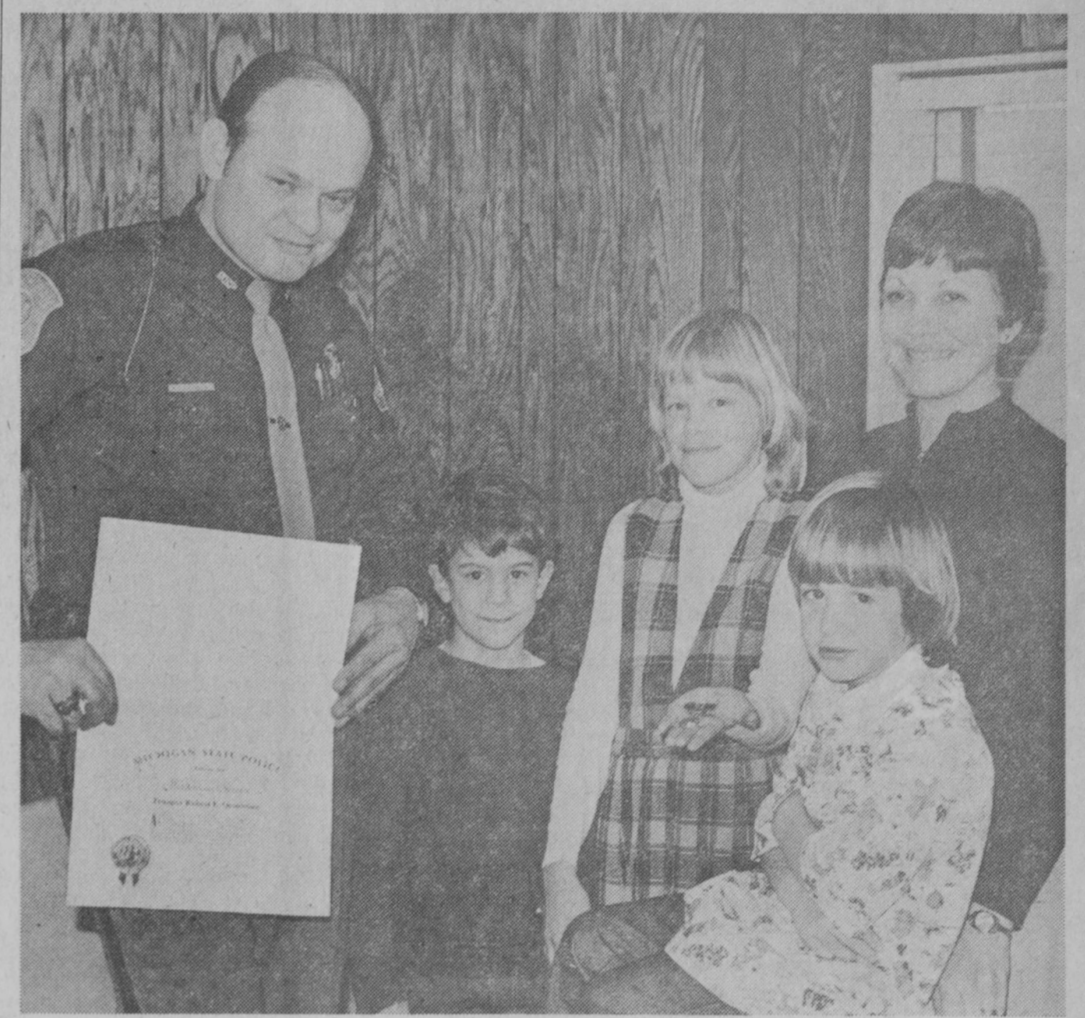
The suit claims that a drain constructed for Lakewood Shores Subdivision was either improperly constructed or lacked maintenance, the result of which caused erosion to property and shoreline in the nearby Lake Huron Sand Beach Subdivision.

According to the complaint, Oscoda Township Board, on May 12, 1969, adopted a resolution authorizing an immediate application to the county drain commissioner for establishment of a county drain to serve Lakewood Shores Subdivision and that the drain commissioner established the drain on August 27, 1969.

The defendant denies that his records contain a petition from Oscoda Township for establishment of the drain, that publication of a drain order was defective and that Lakewood Shores Drainage District has no legal existence.

The complaint further claims that the drain commissioner has failed to perform his duties in correcting the matter. In addition to the restraining order, the plaintiffs seek relief "as the court shall deem just and equitable."

Defendant in the complaint is Harry Krueger, drain commissioner. Plaintiffs are Francis E. Smith, Doris M. Smith, Maxwell Covert, Joyce Covert, Helen B. Trevilian, Frederick Steel, Pauline Steel, Joseph Rioux and Nancy Rioux.

Tawas Area Band Brings Back 18th First Division Rating

For the 18th consecutive year, Tawas Area Symphonic Band received a first division rating in Saturday's District IX Festival of the Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association held at Houghton Lake.

The band again jumped a classification for the seventh time and performed with "A" schools. A number of years ago, Tawas was the first band north of Bay City ever to enter class "A" competition and received a first division rating, which it again accomplished Saturday.

A first division rating denotes an unusually high standard of performance and musicianship, worthy of the distinction of being recognized as a first place winner. The high rating makes the band eligible to participate in the state festival to be held April 30 at Traverse City.

Bands from Alpena, Pinconning, Oscoda, Clare, Houghton Lake, Harrison, Standish-Sterling, Ogemaw Heights, Beaverton, Gladwin and Tawas participated at this site of the festival.

Bands competed against set standards varying slightly between classes of schools. Each band performed three numbers before three judges, plus sight reading before a fourth judge.

Tawas received three first division ratings from the concert adjudicator and a first division rating from the sight reading judge for an over-all first division rating.

There were a combined total of 34 categories which the judges considered for each band. Tawas received five "B" ratings and 29 "A" ratings.

The band played "Variations on a Korean Folk Song," the class required selection; "Souvenir de Porto Rico," and "Introduction and Fantasia."

Judges included Dr. Rex Hewlett, theory and teacher training instructor, Central Michigan University; William Rivard, trombone instructor, Central Michigan University; Edward Downing, former band director at Ann Arbor Public School; Steven Wolf, Mt. Pleasant

High School.

"An unusually fine performance by an unusually fine band," was the comment of one judge. "It is a privilege to play in a group such as this."

Gene Salamony, director of bands at Tawas Area School, said that this year's group is quite representative of Tawas bands.

"While experiencing difficulties, the band surmounted them to show that pride, dedication and hard, conscientious practice will always produce an outstanding band. The community and school can again be justifiably proud of the members of the band."

Would Expand City Projects

A preliminary report on expansion of natural resources related projects this year was presented Monday night to the Tawas City Council by Thomas Jacques, the city's forestry consultant.

Jacques, who has been employed by the city on a consulting basis for the past two years, said that this year's program would see continuance of tree trimming and maintenance, construction of erosion control structures along the river, continuance of park planning and construction, as well as work at the cemetery.

He felt that additional projects this year should include research into federal and state grant applications, placement of a foot bridge across Dead Creek at Tenth Avenue, design and construction of the Bay Drive-Elms Avenue Park, design and construction of an ice skating rink.

Jacques believed that citizens should be polled concerning potential projects to be handled this year.

The city forester said he was to cruise and market timber on city property located on Oates Road in Alabaster Township. He stressed that selective cutting practices would be utilized to retain the natural beauty of the area.

Jacques estimated that the city would receive approximately \$2,500 from its timber sale to go to-

ward the \$6,600 budget which he anticipates this year. Another \$350 would be received under a cost sharing program for tree planting.

The city forester said he had made application for 15 CETA employees for three months of work this summer. He said this program would provide adequate manpower to carry out projects and approximately \$25,000 would be received in CETA wages.

Jacques is to meet with the city park board to develop plans for the coming season of work and is to make a complete report at a future meeting of the council.

In other business, the council contributed \$20 to the Municipal Clerks Association of Michigan. This organization was responsible for insuring that the state reimburse cities for the cost of holding the presidential primary election last year.

Tawas City was reimbursed \$600 for the cost of holding the election. Rachel Sue McCready, city clerk, who is not a member of MCA, felt that the organization would appreciate a contribution to help defray legal expenses involved in obtaining the reimbursement for local units of government.

The city council adopted a resolution commending Mary Byrd for her eight years of service as city treasurer. She is to retire April 30.

One Subject Arrested

Four Burglaries Were Investigated

Four burglaries and two larcenies were investigated last week by Iosco County Sheriff's Department. One burglar was arrested by officers, who had a building under surveillance.

A Hale man was arrested early Saturday morning in a burglary at the Hale Mobil Station on M-65. Officers David Brumfield and Robert Westcott observed a subject force open the station's front door and walk behind the counter.

The officers trained the lights of their patrol car on the building and ordered the man to come out.

Arrested and held on a charge of breaking and entering was Gerald W. Putnam.

A second burglary was investi-

gated Saturday at Hale Area School. The building had been entered by breaking a window. The burglar scaled a metal gate across one corridor and forced his way into the principal's office. Considerable damage was done in ransacking offices. About \$100 in change was stolen.

Two cabin burglaries were investigated. A cabin owned by Claude Harder at 2516 South Kitchen Road was ransacked. An antique organ was stolen and the sheriff's department awaits an inventory of the building on return of the owner, who is vacationing in Florida.

North Street Storm Sewer Financing Under City Study

Financing of a proposed storm sewer along North Street is to be considered March 21 by the Tawas City Council. Two projects which will add more than 1 1/2-million dollars to the city's valuation will commence shortly in that area.

Ronald Shorkey of Ames Construction Company, Saginaw, who with Jerry Cotter and Kenneth Myles of Tawas City, along with James DeRosa of East Tawas, are associated in a proposed apartment house complex on the south side of the street, told members of the council Monday night that FHA financing had been approved for the project.

Shorkey presented an architect's drawing of the 48-unit apartment complex, along with a site plan. The complex is to face North Street and extend along Fourth Avenue.

Plans indicated that the complex would consist of 40 two-bedroom units and eight one-bedroom units. Parking will be provided for 64 automobiles.

Shorkey said that preliminary engineering was being completed and that he expects construction to start by May 1.

One of the problems to be considered by the property owners and the city council is the matter of storm drainage for that entire area.

When the promoters presented plans last August, a storm drain along North Street was discussed and the city made application for federal public works funds to finance the work. Tawas City's application, like practically every other application submitted by Northern Michigan communities, wound up on the bottom of federal priorities and was not funded.

Shorkey said that lack of an adequate storm drain could scuttle the project due to FHA regulations. The existing drain on North Street is at a depth of only 2 1/2 feet in one area and does not have capacity to remove surface water.

Preliminary engineering on a storm drain system to handle North Street as well as the First Street-Fourth Street intersection has been prepared. The city has considered construction of a storm sewer in this area for a number of years due to inadequate drainage. The proposed drain on First Street would extend North to connect

with a new drain along North Street, which would be extended east to the river.

Shorkey expressed the opinion that the added tax base to be gained by the city from the apartment project, as well as the new nursing home to be constructed directly across North Street by Provincial House, Incorporated, would more than warrant construction of a new storm drain.

Mayor Herbert Cholger said that drainage in that area of the city had long been a problem and priorities and was not funded. "We will have to take care of it," he said, however, that the council would have to first consider financing of such a project. "I have no ideas at this point," said Cholger. He felt the project should have a high priority from the council.

It was reported that City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz, who is on vacation until March 18, has compiled considerable information relative to the proposed storm drain system and discussion would be continued at the March 21 meeting. The council set Tuesday, March 22, as the date for a hearing for (See TC COUNCIL, page 5.)

Punch Press Operator Sues Manufacturer A punch press operator, who was injured in an accident February 3, 1976, has filed a three-count suit in Iosco County Circuit Court seeking unspecified damages against the firm which manufactured the machine. Cynthia Henderson, an employee of Starboard Industries, Incorporated, seeks a judgment against Amsted Industries, Incorporated, a Delaware corporation. The plaintiff crushed three fingers on her left hand while operating the 45-ton press in Starboard's Tawas City plant. She claims that Amsted Industries, Incorporated, was negligent in not providing adequate guards on the press.

Many Eligible for Reimbursement on Property Tax

Many people who have already filed their property tax credit statement for 1976 have overestimated their household income and are eligible for reimbursement from Michigan Treasury Department, Rep. George A. Prescott said today.

Employer-paid health, accident and life insurance premiums, as well as amounts deducted from monthly social security or railroad retirement benefits for medicare premiums, are not considered household income under a newly enacted law.

The new law corrects an action by the treasury department which included as household income employer-paid insurance premiums.

"It was never the intent of the legislature to include these payments as income when the Property Tax Relief Act was passed. The new law clarifies our intent," Prescott said.

In order to receive reimbursement from the treasury department, Prescott advised those who have filed their tax forms to send a letter to the treasury department including their name, social security number, the amount included on line 19 and the number of the form they used.

The general form is MI-1040 CR-4. The senior citizen form is MI-1040 CR-1. The form used by paraplegic, quadriplegic and the totally disabled is MI-1040 CR-3. Veterans, widows and the blind use form MI-1040 CR-2. Anyone receiving social security or railroad benefits should state the amount deducted for Medicare on line 13.

The inclusion of this information will help the treasury department in promptly sending out refunds, Prescott said.

The wife of Ronald Allen and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lavern Sharp, Valerie won the Betty Crocker Search Award. She is en-

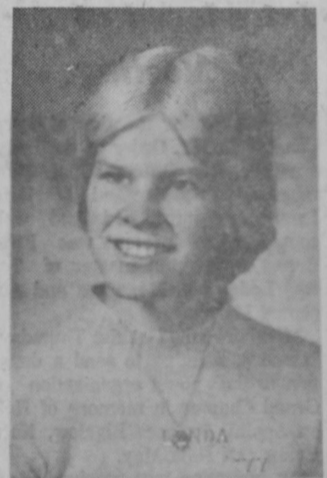
rolling in Kirtland Community College for accounting.

Oscoda Owls Beat Braves for District Championship

Tawas Area Braves came to the end of the 1976-1977 basketball trail Saturday night when they lost, 95-76, to the Oscoda Owls in district tournament championship play at Standish-Sterling High School. Tawas ended the season with seven wins and 15 losses.

If they had ideas of pulling off an upset against the taller and highly talented Oscoda team, it ended for the Braves in the first

quarter as Oscoda outscored Tawas, 23-10. The Braves never gave up trying as they put together a good second quarter to outscore Oscoda, 24-21, and cut the margin to 29-24 with four minutes before intermission. With a little luck on at least four "in and out shots," the final score could have been much closer.

Oscoda turned in a well balanced scoring effort throughout the game

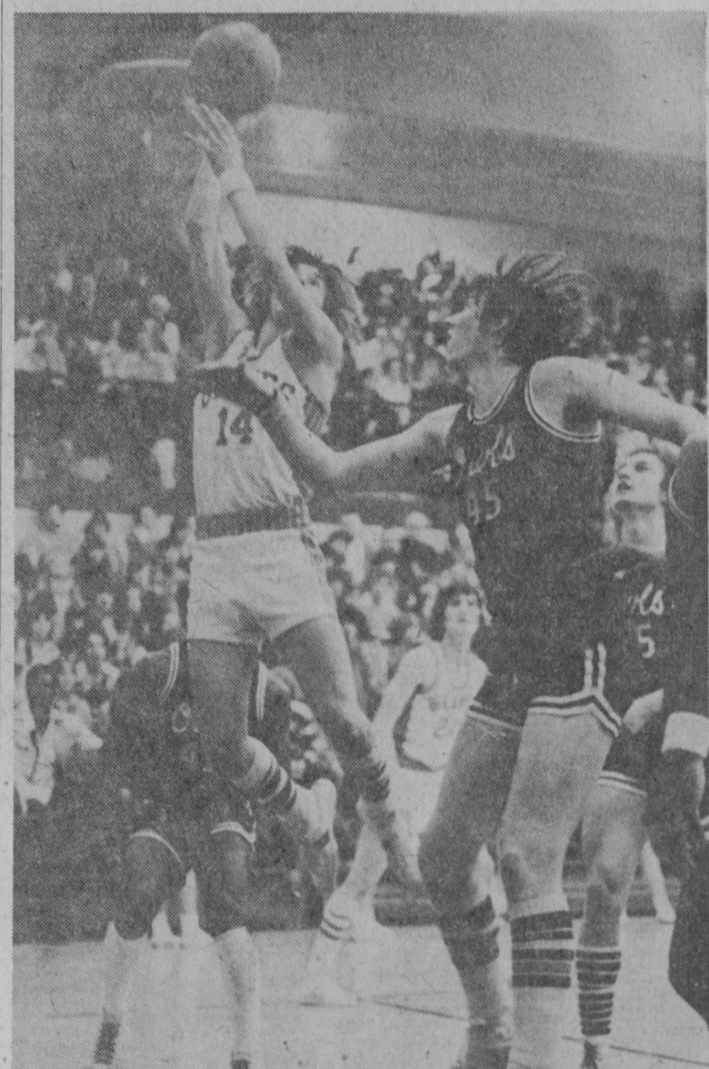

Oscoda, with a record of 16 wins and seven losses for the season, met Cadillac High School last night (Tuesday) in the Mt. Pleasant regional tournament. Although Cadillac had a record of 20 wins and only one loss, the Owls were expected to give that taller squad a run for the victory—if Oscoda stayed out of foul trouble.

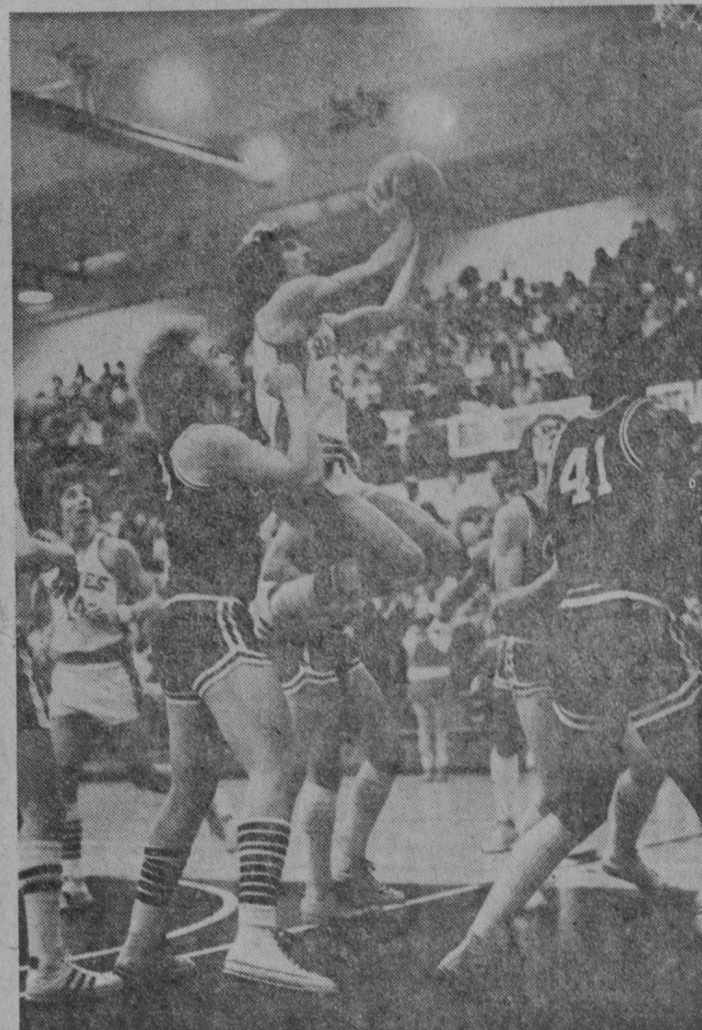

Stan Rang was the only other player to score in double figures, meshing 10 points.

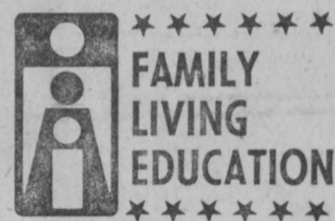
The Eagles ended the season with a record of six wins and 15 losses.

It is healthier for waterfowl to find their own food in the summer months and then migrate to warmer climates in the fall. Therefore, the Audubon Society strongly urges against summer feeding of wild geese and ducks.

SALT AND HYPERTENSION

It has been more than 70 years since doctors first noticed that persons with high blood pressure improved on a salt-free diet. More recent studies with laboratory rats have shown that salt intake is not the only factor in the development of hypertension, however.

"Studies in another institution with several generations of rats turned up one group of rats that were very likely to develop hypertension and another group that were very resistant to it," reports Olaf Mickelson, professor of food science and human nutrition at Michigan State University. "If both groups of rats received a high-salt diet, the susceptible animals developed high blood pressure and the resistant ones did not."

The implication, he explains, is that there is probably a genetic

factor in the development of high blood pressure in humans, too. "The catch is that there is no way to tell whether an individual is susceptible or resistant unless he develops high blood pressure," he notes.

Whether other members of the family have had high blood pressure is a clue, of course, Mickelson points out. In such cases, supervision by a doctor is advised. And one of the doctor's recommendations is likely to be restricted salt intake.

"The evidence is that even a susceptible person will not develop high blood pressure if he limits his intake of sodium," Mickelson says. "Therefore, for the person with a family history of hypertension, or for the naturally cautious person who does not want to push his luck, it is advisable to minimize consumption of cured meats and salty snacks and to avoid heavy use of salt in cooking and at the table."

Rat studies show that the earlier an animal is started on a high-salt diet, the more likely it is to develop hypertension. This suggests that adults with a family history of high blood pressure would be wise to keep an eye on the salt intake of their children as well as themselves.

"Having high blood pressure in your family does not mean that every member of the family will develop it or even that every member is susceptible to it," Mickelson points out. "But it would seem to me, to be plenty of reason to be cautious and follow a policy of moderation in salt consumption."

One way to reduce sodium intake without eliminating or drastically reducing consumption of salty foods is to use a mixture of equal parts sodium chloride and potassium chloride. This mixture, which is commercially available, can be used in food preparation exactly like regular salt. This reduces by one-half the sodium added to foods prepared at home. To reduce the sodium in the diet as much as possible, make meals "from scratch," Mickelson advises, and minimize the use of highly processed foods that are likely to have high sodium content.

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Ron Tyler Retained as Legal Counsel by Commissioners

Ronald Tyler, former prosecuting attorney, was retained Wednesday as legal counsel by the county board of commissioners and was immediately set to work on creation of an economic development corporation.

The appointment, said commissioners, became necessary due to the large criminal work load being handled by the prosecuting attorney's office and a number of civil matters pertaining to the county commission.

Formation of a county economic development corporation was approved following a public hearing on February 23. Initiating the petition asking formation of the EDC under state law were John Lippert, Harris Barkman, Timothy O'Connor and Lloyd Peltier.

Commissioners indicated that unanimous accord had been

reached at the public hearing concerning formation of the new county organization but, since then, word had been received from Ray Kesler, Plainfield Township supervisor, that a second economic development corporation was anticipated for that area.

In other business Wednesday, the commission adopted a resolution directing that all county agencies procuring goods or services "be prepared to show clearly that firms having a business in Iosco County have been given an opportunity to participate in that procurement and to justify any non-inclusion of local firms." The resolution does not change the basic policy that, all things being equal, procurement is to be made from the source offering the lowest price.

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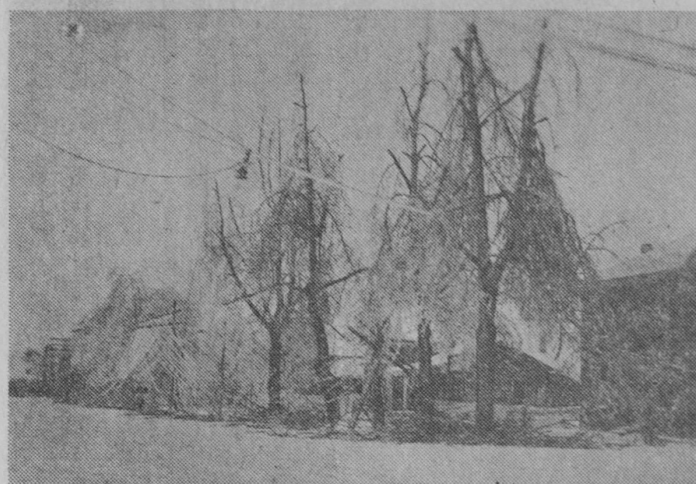
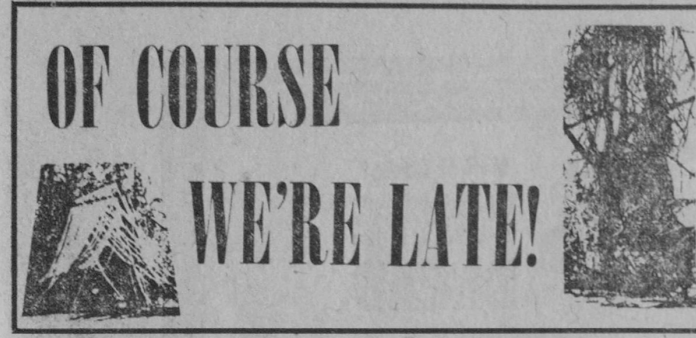

Michigan State University is an extremely large school which places severe demands on students' time. This whirlwind of activity is usually more than one can handle, but the added duties of being a resident assistant (RA) in a dormitory on MSU's campus creates many seemingly unsolvable conflicts.

One student who has fulfilled the dual role of student-resident assistant is Rob Elliott, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Elliott, 1316 Tawas Beach Road, East Tawas. Elliott, who has been an RA for the past 1½ years, is a senior currently living in McDonel Hall on MSU's campus. The six-foot Elliott, a 1973 graduate of Tawas Area High School, admits that there are considerable

constraints placed on student RAs. Besides his normal classload, Rob has to leave a certain amount of spare time during the course of a day so that he may answer any questions or problems that should arise with his floor members. Resident assistants must attend staff meetings every week and be "on duty" on certain specified nights, in case any type of problem should arise within the dorm it-

self. Usually no such problems do come up on these nights, but the RA must always be prepared to handle them if necessary and this greatly hinders his freedom to do the things he wants. Rob is also involved in many outside activities other than his duties as an RA. He was involved last term with the MSU Student Foundation (card block) which (See ELLIOTT, page 3.)

OF COURSE WE'RE LATE!

The largest and most beautiful trees were the first to go, their age and the brittleness of their limbs making them ready victims to the enormous weight imposed on them—being covered with tons of ice. The damage to electrical, telephone and telegraph wires and poles was immeasurable. Along the line of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway—then the principal transportation link with the outside world as good roads were still far into the future—the railroad and Western Union wires and poles were down for miles at a stretch. Thousands of dollars were required to replace and restore this equipment to its former condition. "All communications with the outside world was cut off and it may be some time before service is resumed, as the local lines are also badly damaged and it will take a small army to replace poles and wires and get them in working order," stated the Herald.

Employees of Consumers Power Company and Michigan State Telephone Company, predecessor to Michigan Bell, began work Thursday morning to repair the damages in order to resume service. "But, with the limited means at their command, the men were handicapped in their work, especially as wires were continually breaking; as fast as they were repaired in one place, they would get somewhere else," stated the Herald.

All D&M trains were delayed and, with telegraph service out of commission, the trains were compelled to run entirely by time card. Under those conditions, a train had to wait at its meeting point for the train from the opposite direction, no matter how late that train might have been. As a result, passengers failed to reach destinations on time and mail service was slowed to a standstill. All other service on the railroad was practically at a standstill as much of the work of the Tawas maintenance shop was held up for lack of electrical power.

Naturally, all public schools were closed on account of darkness and lack of electricity. School officials did not have to worry about bus transportation, however, as children walked to schools in those days.

"Had it not been for the great and irreparable damage done, people might have reveled in the beauty of the trees and bushes encased in their glittering coat of ice," commented the Herald. "The smallest twigs on the trees and even weeds and grass were coated with ice until nearly a dozen times their ordinary size. It made a picture that would have been worthy of the greatest painters. "But their beauty was their destruction, as the heavy weight of the ice caused damage that is said by boys who fought in the late war to fairly represent the havoc gone."

That week more than 50 years ago has long been remembered because of one of the most devastating ice storms ever to hit North-eastern Michigan. Fifty-four years later, Thursday, March 4, 1976, the state was hit by a similar storm causing millions of dollars in damages, but this area escaped the brunt of the storm.

In 1922, business came to a complete standstill and all communications with the outside world were cut off for five days or more. In common with all other users of electricity, the Herald was handicapped by "cutting off the current due to breaking of wires by the storm," stated this newspaper's lengthy account of the storm.

"As our Linotype is both heated and driven by electricity, we were unable to use this machine after Wednesday and were forced to revert to the old method of setting type by hand."

The Herald's crew dusted off old cases of type stored in a back room for just such an emergency and work commenced to prepare reading matter for the weekly edition. "Being somewhat out of practice, it has been a slow process and we have been forced to omit some matter for which the copy arrived late," stated a notice on the front page.

The Herald's plight in 1922 was not as serious as that caused by storms 54 years later. In 1922, the Herald's newspaper press could be cranked by hand to meet the publication day deadline. During a similar storm in 1976, many newspapers of Southern Michigan without electrical power for a week or more simply missed publication day press runs and some regular editions had two datelines. Other businesses and industry, also much more dependent upon electrical power than 50 years ago, closed down operations for a week or more.

The storm of 1922 began on Tuesday, February 21, with a three-day storm of snow, followed by sleet and rain. The sleet and rain froze to the trees and electrical wires as it fell. On Thursday morning, the streets and yards containing shade trees were a tangle of broken limbs, telephone and electrical wires. "All during Wednesday and Thursday nights, the crash of falling limbs could be heard constantly and hardly a tree of any description escaped damage from the heavy coating of ice," stated the Herald's description of the storm, all set in hand-spiked type on the front page of its "storm edition."

Fertilize Lawns During the Fall

Early spring fertilizing has been part of recommended home lawn care for a long time. Now Michigan State University lawn experts are trying to change all that. According to Joseph Vargas, MSU plant pathologist, the sudden flush of growth that follows an early spring application of nitrogen helps develop Fusarium blight, the biggest home lawn disease problem.

"The symptoms of Fusarium blight are large, round, dead spots that usually show up first in the spring when the healthy grass greens up around them," Vargas says. "The spots are less noticeable in the late spring but become obvious again during the hot, dry weather of July and August." A good fertilizer program can help keep the turf strong and healthy and minimize the occurrence of the unsightly disease.

After the grass has stopped growing—usually in late November—apply one pound of slow-release nitrogen per 1,000 square feet, Vargas advises. The plants take up some of this nitrogen, which provides for a rich green color in the spring and slow, steady growth rather than the sudden spurt that follows spring fertilizing.

In June, July and August, fertilize again with nitrogen at one-half pound per 1,000 square feet, watering it in thoroughly to prevent burning the foliage. This supplies the lawn with the nitrogen it needs to maintain normal growth during summer.

Rob enjoys being an RA mainly

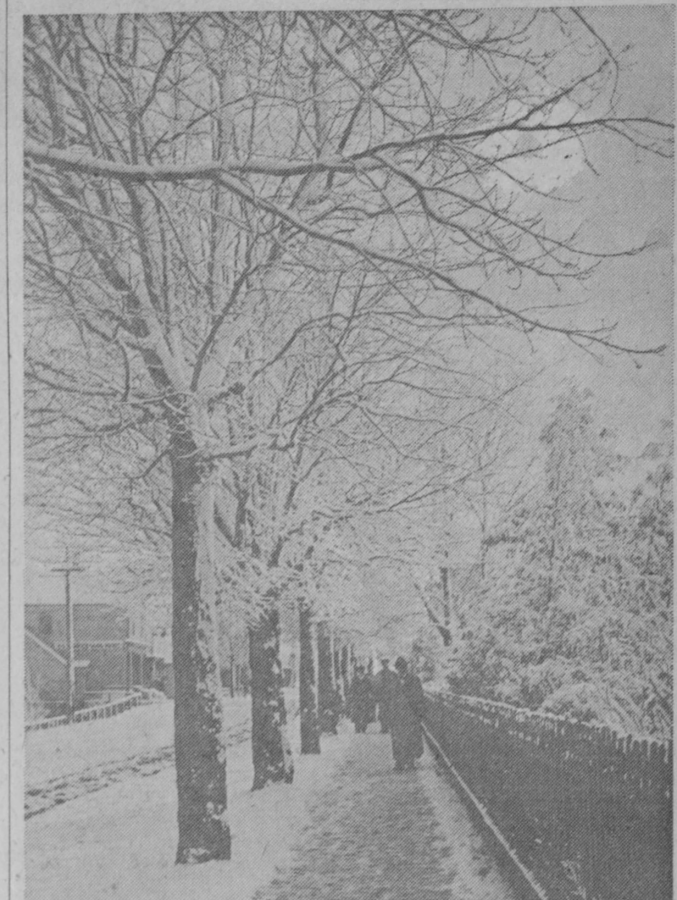

wrought on the trees in France by the Boche shells," stated the Herald.

Many of the trees destroyed by that storm were never replaced and this was an incalculable loss to the beauty of the region.

Electrical power company workers now number in the thousands and major producers pool their resources—both men and modernized equipment—in times of storms. But, despite these improvements, everything stops without electricity.

For example: There would be no "hand spiking" of type in the Herald office should a storm suddenly strike the area. That is a lost art and the type was scrapped years ago. And, there really would be no need for such emergency measures as a 15-ton press cannot be turned over by hand.
