

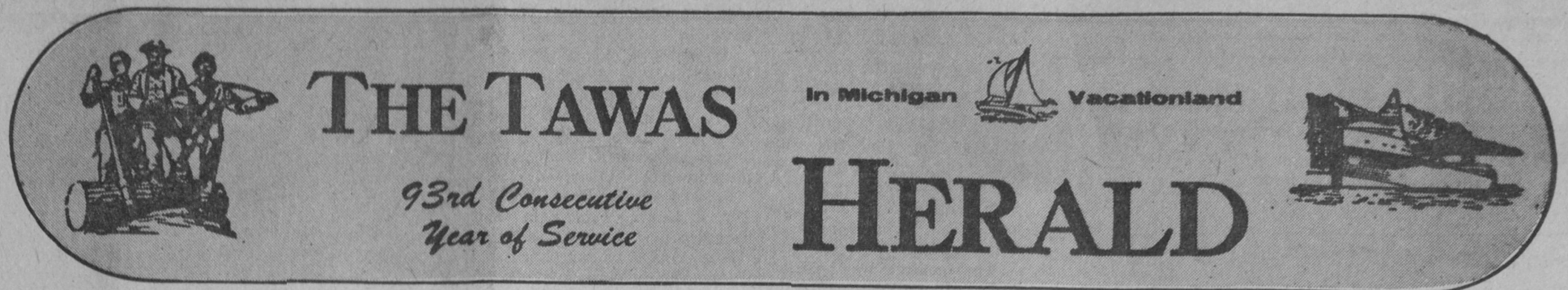
## Special Election May 24

Three Republicans and two Democrats are listed on the primary election ballot for Tuesday, May 24, in Plainfield, Reno, Grant and a portion of Oscoda Townships. One candidate from each party will compete for the office of Fifth District county commissioner in the November general election.

Democratic candidates include Wade J. Forshee and Robert W. Pember. Republican candidates are Lyle A. Long, Warren B. Oak-

ley Jr. and John D. Webb Jr. The successful candidate in November will fill the vacancy on the board of commissioners caused by the recent death of William Wercley of Hale.

In addition to this ballot, Plainfield Township voters will receive a township proposition ballot which seeks a tax levy of one mill for a period of five years for construction and maintenance of local roads.

## Tawas City Adopts Budget; Sets Tax Levy at 15.35 Mills

Following discussion of finances over the past month, Tawas City Council Monday night adopted its 1977-78 general and street fund budget, as well as approving its revenue sharing budget.

The city is to spread a tax levy of 15.35 mills to raise \$177,780.80 as the local share of the \$248,398 budget.

The 15.35-mill tax levy, which is the same as the current year, includes 9.35 mills for general fund operating, \$108,289.50; .85 of a mill for fire improvement account, \$9,844.50; .85 of a mill for equipment improvement fund, \$9,844.50; 3.00 mills for streets, \$34,745.29; 1.30 mills for debt retirement, \$15,086.29.

The fire improvement millage is to finance purchase of a new fire truck and the equipment improvement fund was established to upgrade city equipment.

The general fund operating budget totaling \$228,710 includes revenue from such sources as: Current property taxes, \$101,860; sales tax, \$30,000; income tax, \$9,000; fire protection contracts, \$13,000; state business tax rebate, \$10,000; delinquent property taxes, \$9,000; intangibles tax, \$4,200; transfer from street funds, \$7,000; liquor license returns, \$2,200; anti-recessional funds, \$6,000.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that \$173,000 of the budget comes from sources other than property taxes. If the total budget had to be derived from property taxes, it would require 30.30 mills of taxes. Not included in the above budget

is \$57,952 in federal revenue sharing funds. Total allocation during the next entitlement period is \$41,338, with a balance available of \$16,614, for a total of \$57,952.

Proposed disbursement of these funds includes \$8,000 as the city's share of the 1974 special assessment sewer district, \$16,000 toward the North Street storm sewer and \$33,952 for new street construction.

The council took no action on a request from the county treasurer, who recommended that the city again charge a one percent fee for tax collection to bring it in line with other communities of Iosco

County and to simplify printing of tax statements.

The city authorized a one percent collection fee for winter taxes for county and schools, but took no action on the summer city tax collection. Collection fees amount to approximately \$17,000, which would require lowering the millage rate.

The city eliminated the collection fee a number of years ago in order to take advantage of the federal revenue sharing formula. Councilmen said they would consider the summer tax collection fee next year.

## State to Rule on Tawas Petitions

The State Boundary Commission announced last week that it would hold a meeting Wednesday, May 25, to rule on the sufficiency of petitions asking for the incorporation of the Tawas into one home rule city.

According to James S. Hyde, executive secretary, the meeting is to be held at 3:30 p. m. at the Treasury Branch Office, Logan Center, 3222 South Logan, Lansing.

Approval of the sufficiency of petitions is expected for a general vote of the people of the two communities on the question.

Petitions were filed by Brent Babcock on January 6 seeking the consolidation. This movement was begun last summer by Babcock, who was assisted by representatives of both communities in circulating the petitions.

Following receipt of information from the boundary commission in January, a movement was started to expand boundaries of the proposed new city into adjoining areas of Tawas and Baldwin Townships.

Since then, nothing further was done on the proposed expansion and the boundary commission will rule on the original area listed on the petitions which comprised only the two cities.

## Four Killed Friday Night at McIvor

Four men from Wurtsmith Air Force Base were killed and three other persons were injured Friday night in a two-car crash on South Sand Lake Road at McIvor in Sherman Township.

Killed were James E. Reed, 26; Richard A. Nelson, 23; Kenneth E. Cardwell, 19, and Richard M. Wendorf, 21.

In critical condition at a Saginaw hospital is Daniel C. Wilson Jr., 19, also of Wurtsmith.

Treated at Tawas Hospital were Eugene M. Near, 23, Whittemore, and Kimberly Jean Strauer, 16, Whittemore.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said the car driven by Reed was northbound on Sand Lake Road and the car driven by Near was southbound.

The car with the five men in it became airborne when it crossed the railroad tracks at a high rate of speed. The driver lost control of the vehicle and it hit the Near car headon. The Oscoda car then continued another 83 feet and hit a utility pole.

All occupants were thrown out of the Oscoda car. The crash occurred at 11:30 p. m.

## Brown Trout Derby Boasts Good Success

The Brown Trout Derby sponsored by Tawas Chamber of Commerce is still continuing with good success. There have been 294 browns and 84 lake trout registered at the chamber office.

The largest brown taken weighed 10 pounds, 13 ounces, and the largest lake trout weighed seven pounds, 13 ounces.

Saginaw Steelheaders held a fishout last week-end on Tawas Bay and Detroit Steelheaders caught 53 fish from 16 boats in its recent week-end trip here.

Donald Pelton of East Tawas won a fishing line in the fourth weekly drawing conducted by the chamber of commerce. Additional fishing gear is available for drawings for the next four week-ends. Drawings are made from entry forms registering the catches.

The derby is to continue through sundown on June 4.

## Police Continue Investigation of Two Stabbings

Area police are continuing the investigation of two stabbings last week-end. Rodney E. Kenney, 16, Oscoda, was stabbed Saturday night during a party in a hall at Mikado. David L. Daniels, 26, Oscoda, was stabbed early Sunday morning as he was entering the Sand Bar at Oscoda.

## Tawas City Council Holds to Hope of Public Works Construction Grant

The City of Tawas City is still keeping its fingers crossed on one of two applications for federal public works projects filed last December. Although one project was definitely scratched when funds were allocated, a second project is still in the federal hopper and could be considered under a new four-billion-dollar public works program adopted by congress.

In a report to the city council Monday night, City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that the Economic Development Administration is still holding Tawas City's application prepared in December for a city hall, fire hall and library complex. If approved under the new program—and that still is a big "if" according to Bublitz—the proposed 60 by 132-foot building would be funded entirely by the federal government.

Information received by Bublitz indicates that congress had doubled its allocation of money for public works under the new program. Tawas City's application is one of 22,000 which were held when applications exceeded the 1976 allocation of two-billion dollars and would be considered first under the new program.

Bublitz said that if consideration is to be given to this project the city would receive word in the future to update its plans.

In other business Monday night, the council approved an expenditure of \$1,615.13 for purchase of special paint and installation of the First Avenue tennis court. Federal revenue funds are to be utilized.

Mayor Herbert Cholger proclaimed the week of May 22-28 as Small Business Week, which is being observed nationally to honor the 13-million small businesses which contribute to the nation's economy.

The council adopted a lease agreement with the county department of public works to clarify consent of the city to use the water tower behind the city hall in the water expansion project for Tawas City, East Tawas and Baldwin Township.

## TA Choruses to Present Concert Sun.

Tawas Area Junior and Senior High School choruses, under the direction of Daniel Bergh, will unite Sunday, May 22, 8:00 p. m., to present their annual pop concert at the high school gymnasium.

Appearing with the group will be pianists, Norma Worsham and Nyda Bronson, who will play selected duet arrangements. Jose Bananas and his Bunch, a faculty Dixieland band, and a group of ladies singing four-part harmony from the prospective Sweet Adelines, Incorporated, will also be featured.

Junior chorus will entertain with selections from its festival performance earlier in the year, for which it received a first division rating. The program will also include academy award winning selection, "The Way We Were."

The high school chorus will perform a variety of pieces including "Elijah Rock," "Day by Day," from "Godspell," "I Need to be in Love."

Tickets are available at the door or from chorus members. The public is invited to attend.

## East Tawas Council Approves Budget; Discuss Sewer Work

Final adoption of a \$303,880.46 budget for 1977-78 was given Monday night by the East Tawas Council. A total tax levy of 14.5 mills was authorized by the council.

The tax levy includes 11.83 mills for general operating, \$184,135.96; debt service of 2.67 mills, \$41,559. plus 1.17 mills for the 1967 general obligation sewer bond issue and 1.5 mills for the 1975 Tawas Lake No. 1 sewer construction.

A resolution adopted by the council authorized Mayor Robert Bolen to sign a consent agreement to allow the city extra time to bring its waste water treatment system up to federal Environmental Protection Agency standards.

According to the agreement, all communities are required to provide secondary sewage treatment by July 1 of this year, but a letter from EPA noted that delays in development of federal and state grant programs to aid with construction had prevented compliance by the above date.

Under the consent agreement, the city has 24 months to start construction on secondary sewage treatment.

William Smith, superintendent of public works, reported that the Tawas Lake sewer project was completed. He recommended that the amount of money owed to the contractor and retained by the city be cut from 10 percent to five percent of the project's total cost. The \$26,547 remaining is to be held back until the project receives its final inspection and approval.

The superintendent reported that \$10,000 had been collected in connection fees from property owners in this sewer project and the city hopes to have \$20,000 collected by November to assist with making the first payment on bonds.

It was reported that bids received on construction of the East Tawas, Tawas City and Baldwin Township expanded water system were lower than anticipated and approximately \$200,000 could be made available for loan to other projects. The mayor was authorized to investigate if a \$100,000 loan would be available, at the

regular five percent interest rate, for constructing additional water service in the Tawas Lake area and along Green Street.

In other business, a delegation of Newman Street residents requested information concerning the city's plans for the ditch on the east side of that street past the athletic field.

It was reported that the city plans to grade the ditch and to plant grass seed this year. Estimated cost of installing a culvert and filling the ditch is \$18,000 and the council felt this cost would be prohibitive at the present time.

In August or September, the city plans to grade Newman Street in

that area and install a new black-top surface.

Gary Nelkie attended the meeting and asked council consideration for expansion of bicycle routes along city streets. He was referred to the city superintendent for study. It was reported that local groups may seek construction of a bicycle path to Tawas Point.

## Water-Sewer Extensions Suggested for Industry

A recommendation to include future water and sewer extensions to serve proposed expansion of Tawas City's industrial development area was heard at Monday night's council meeting.

At the present time, the city is negotiating purchase of 40 acres of land in Tawas Township which is adjacent to the city's industrial park on Ninth Avenue. At the same time, the city is attempting to obtain an option for the purchase of an additional 73 acres.

John Brugger, former mayor, appeared before the council Monday night and recommended that the council give consideration to extension of water and sewer facilities to the new site should it be secured.

Purchase of an additional 40 acres of land was recommended by the Upper Great Lakes Development Commission when it assisted the Tawas and Baldwin Township in financing expansion of water facilities to serve area industrial needs.

At the present time, the city is considering use of a portion of the 40 acres as a site for a new lagoon

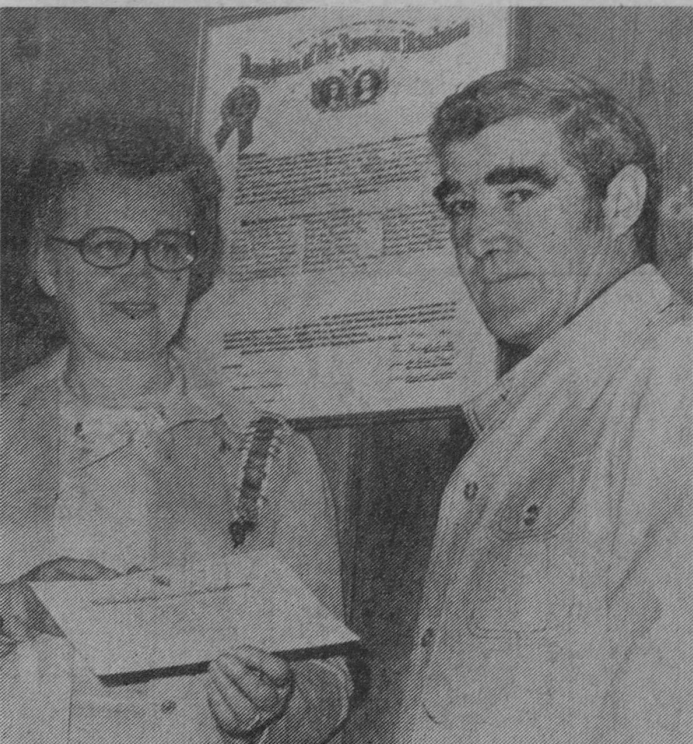
system for secondary sewage treatment should a plan for regional sewage treatment facilities not materialize.

A public hearing is to be held Thursday, June 23, 7:30 p. m., at the city hall in Tawas City to receive comments and views of interested persons from the Tawas, Alabaster, Baldwin and Tawas Townships concerning the regional plan.

According to a public notice printed on page 5 of this newspaper, eight different alternatives are to be considered including either mechanical or lagoon secondary plants at various locations. The ninth plan of study simply states "no action."

Three weeks ago, the City of East Tawas indicated it planned to drop out of the regional concept and make application for federal assistance to construct its own secondary sewage treatment plant. The Tawas City Council immediately took action to purchase property west of its Ninth Avenue industrial site from the Hughes family in the event that plans for a regional system do not materialize.

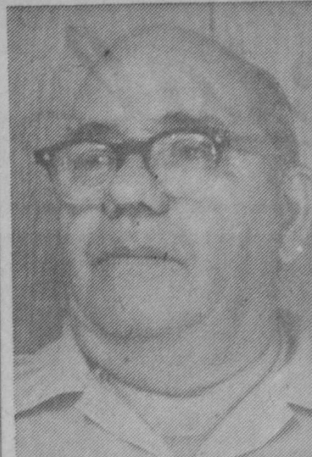

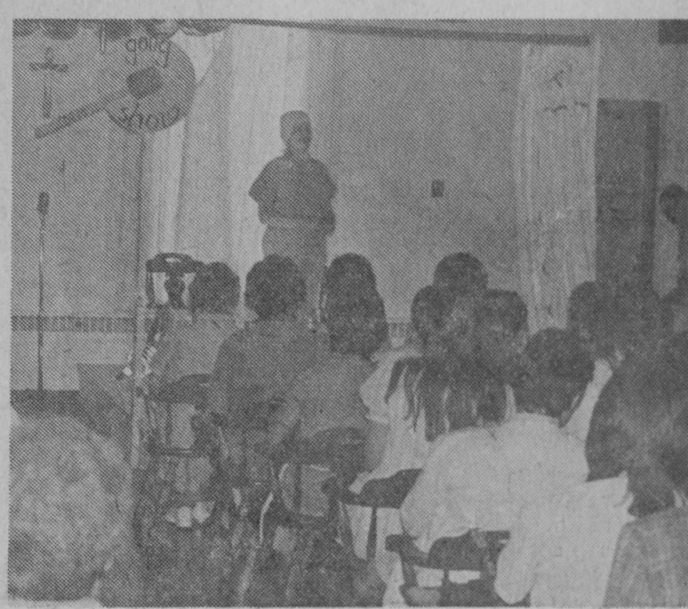

# WATCHERS of the SKY



## DURING WW II

Organization of civilian defense activities during World War II saw establishment of aircraft spotting posts in four communities of Isosco County. This arm of the Air Defense System, little remembered today with the passage of 35 years, was manned mainly by housewives, senior citizens, boy scouts and school children during a national emergency which seemed very real at the time.

Night and day, at lonely outposts in Northern Michigan, thousands of aircraft spotters voluntarily underwent loss of sleep to protect downstate industrial areas from bombing raids. Their services rarely got into the headlines—often they watched patiently through the long hours without seeing or hearing an airplane.

"But the duty they so faithfully perform is vital," said an advertisement sponsored by Michigan Bell Telephone Company in 1942. "In case of air attack, it will be their trained eyes and ears that detect the approach of Axis bombers. Citizens of Michigan who sleep soundly in their beds at home owe a debt of gratitude to the aircraft warning service."

Observers manning the posts maintained a 24-hour-a-day vigil, scanning the skies to give advance warning of possible enemy air attack on strategic installations—principally the Soo locks, as far as Northern Michigan was concerned.

Happily, no enemy planes were ever spotted by these civilian observers but, after the war, it was reported that one alert housewife-observer correctly identified a German fighter plane flying over her station. As it turned out, the plane had been captured by Allied forces in Europe and was undergoing testing in this country.

First notice that observers were needed in manning local observation posts came on October 9, 1942, in an announcement printed in The Tawas Herald. Norman Salsbery, chairman of the Isosco County Civilian Defense Council, said that excellent cooperation was being received in obtaining volunteers.

Four observation posts were established in this county—Tawas City, Oscoda, Whittemore and Hale. Observers served four hours a week and operation of the four posts required a large number of volunteers.

A general county meeting was held at the Isosco County Courthouse with about 50 persons attending, representing each section of the county. Maj. C. M. Barnes, regional signal officer at Ft. Brady, presented information on various phases of the work and gave instructions on the proposed organization of the posts.

Ernest Burtzloff, chairman of the Tawas City Civilian Defense Council, appointed William Hatton as chief observer at the local post, with Karl Kobs as his assistant. About 200 observers and alternates were required for the operation. About 75 percent of the volunteers came from Tawas City and the remainder were from East Tawas.

The observation tower at Tawas City was located near the First Avenue pumping station and was constructed by city employees. The spotting station here was an eight-foot-square frame building with a three-foot-wide platform around it. It was supported on a 20-foot tower and had an enclosed stairway. It was heated by a fuel oil stove and was equipped with a telephone.

William Gilmore was chief observer at the Oscoda post with Mrs. P. McPhail as his assistant. The observation tower at Oscoda was located on top of the public school garage.

By October 27, 1942, the Tawas City observation post was in service and Mrs. Eleanor Cooke of East Tawas was the first airplane spotter to go on duty. The first plane to pass over and be officially reported by telephone to Ft. Brady was turned in by Miss Marie Alstrom, who was on duty at the time.

established in Isosco County and were in service following the bombing of Pearl Harbor. During the London Blitz, England had utilized civilian aircraft spotters in its defense service and the United States developed a similar program. In the fall of 1942, four aircraft warning posts were

The first daily crew leaders included Mrs. Archie Ruckle, Fred Brabant, Archie Colby, L. H. Braddock, Chester Roberts, Mrs. William Rapp and Mrs. Wilton Finley.

Initially, housewives and youngsters vied with each other to be included on the roster of the airplane spotters. The novelty soon wore off for many of the boy scouts who were included in the program—sitting in the drafty booth on top of the 20-foot tower was a long vigil and soon became boring.

In a letter forwarded to all airplane observers of Isosco County, Brig. Gen. T. E. Marchant of Air Defense Headquarters pointed out that it was important to remember "that we are all members of a single organization—an immense tieup of military and civilian agencies—all working toward the single purpose of completely efficient coverage of all flights in this area. Although you are on a purely voluntary basis and without real military discipline, your status can be described as semi-military," he stated.

"Yours are the eyes, the ears, the intelligence, the alertness upon which one of the most important aspects of the military defense of this country depends and, to that

considerable extent, the army must rely upon you as completely as it does on its own soldiers. If a system of civilian observers does work, as we believe it can and will work in this area, vitally needed military and navy personnel are relieved for other duties without fear of lessened efficiency."

L. H. Braddock became chief observer at the Tawas City post in August 1943. Service pins were presented that year to 70 volunteers, who had served 50 or more hours at the local post. The "wings" were conferred during a ceremony at the Tawas City High School auditorium.

Because of the close proximity of Oscoda Air Base and its squadron of fighter planes, manning observation posts in Isosco County was rather active during daytime hours. Each flight was systematically reported to Ft. Brady, no matter if the aircraft was friendly.

Through victories in Europe and the Pacific by Allied forces, the aircraft warning service within the Central Air Defense Region was deactivated in February 1945. "We feel that our mission has now been accomplished and we are most grateful for the part that observers have played in bringing this

region to the high state of efficiency which it reached and maintained," stated Lt. Col. C. A. Cassidy of Ft. Brady.

"I feel that all observers can feel a keen sense of personal satisfaction in a job well done," said Cassidy.

Before being phased out of the war effort, Chief Observer Braddock presented special awards to observers in the local post who served more than 100 hours.

The observation tower at its First Avenue location was dismantled following World War II and its activities were practically forgotten. Ten years later, during the "Cold War" threat with Russia, a ground observer post was established at Alabaster. Manned by 33 volunteers on a 16-hour-per-day basis, Isosco's first observation post for the purpose of detection and identification of aircraft in the nation's air defense system since the end of World War II was located at the Alabaster Township Hall.

With the modern advances made in detection of aircraft through radar, this last ground observer post was soon disbanded. The nation's defense system now depends on electronic eyes and watchers of the sky of World War II are no longer required.



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# Advised to Get Permit for Solar Heat Collector

An Oscoda property owner was told Thursday by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners that it had no power to change the state building code and recommended that he obtain an \$8 county building permit in order to complete construction on a solar heating plant started on the roof of his residential dwelling.

The county department of building and safety inspection issued a stop work order last week when Steven Peterson, owner of the property, refused to obtain a building permit for the work.

Appearing before Thursday's session of the county commission, Peterson expressed the opinion that the solar heat collector he was constructing on the roof of his house did not fall within the jurisdiction of the state building code. The state does not have a mechanical code covering furnaces and Peterson objected to the county permit requirement as a matter of principle.

Peterson said that a furnace could be constructed on the ground away from the house without a permit and felt the same exclusion should be granted to the solar heating system being constructed on the roof of his dwelling.

Although stating that he desired an inspection by the county, the property owner felt a permit was not necessary inasmuch as there is no state mechanical code.

Francis J. Block, director of the building and safety inspection department, told the commission that construction of a solar energy collector had been classified as a wood frame structural addition and, under the law, requires engineering and architectural plans to show the effects of the added

live loading, dead loading and lateral wind loading on the existing structure. Additionally, zoning approval and a building permit are required.

He said that construction of an appurtenance to a heating device on the roof of a house fell into the same classification as construction of a television aerial on a roof, which requires a permit and inspection in order to comply with state law.

Block said that a permit and inspection was necessary to determine if the installation met basic requirements, that the issue was one of law and could only be resolved by the court, inasmuch as the county commission, his department and the building board of appeals have no prerogative in the matter.

A representative of the state building code department present at the meeting said that such an installation on a roof would require a building permit.

The county building and safety inspection department director volunteered to inspect the roof of the house and to develop structural plans to allow installation, if the board so directed, but he insisted that the \$8 permit was necessary for the structural change to the roof.

Because of precedent in the matter, Peterson said he may pursue the question in the court.

**Cleaning "On A Shoestring"**  
Cleaning on a shoestring can be approached two ways—from the standpoint of time or money. You can create your own home-care products or buy commercial products. Home-created products often are less expensive but require time to prepare. Many cleaning products are ingredients that have been pre-mixed, perfumed and packaged in bottles or aerosol cans. These products may cost more but take less time to prepare.

Read labels of commercial products carefully, since many products are abrasive and damage surfaces. Try your own home-care products. You may like them better!

**Basic Ingredients for Creating Home-Care Products**

Home-care recipes include ammonia, vinegar, baking soda, washing soda, whitening, mineral spirits, linseed oil and soap jelly. Look for them at supermarkets and paint, hardware or drug stores.

Remember: Never mix chlorine bleach or any cleaner with ammonia as an ingredient with ammonia or any other cleaner.

To make soap jelly, use: One cup shaved bar soap or soap flakes and one quart boiling water.

Dissolve shaved soap or soap flakes in boiling water. When entirely melted or dissolved, pour into wide mouth jar. Let stand in a cool place until it jells.

**General Household Cleaners**

Try this homemade cleaner: Two tablespoons ammonia, two tablespoons liquid detergent, one quart water. Mix and use for general household cleaning.

**Furniture**

Keep furniture clean with dustless cloths which gather dust in-

stead of scattering it. Make dust cloths from soft cloth that does not leave lint:

1. Put cloth in tin container or jar in which a few drops of furniture-polishing oil or wax have been spread. Cover tightly and leave overnight. The cloth will absorb just enough oil or wax to remove dust and polish at the same time. (Do not use oil to dust waxed surfaces, because it softens the finish.)
2. Mix one tablespoon of mineral spirits with one quart of hot water. Dip squares of clean cloth into this solution, wring out, dry and store.
3. One tablespoon mild soap powder, one quart warm water, one tablespoon of household ammonia, two tablespoons of boiled linseed oil or a good furniture polish. Mix ingredients well and dip soft, cotton cloths into the solution. After a few minutes, squeeze out, dry and store.

Store dust cloths in covered containers such as glass jars or coffee cans. Keep them clean; wash them often. Treat cloths after each washing.

**Polishing Silver**

Try these silver polishes:

a. One cup boiling water, one teaspoon salt, one sheet of aluminum foil, one teaspoon baking soda.

Add salt, soda and aluminum foil to boiling water. Place silver in boiling water so that each piece touches the foil or comes in contact with a piece of silver that touches it. Boil two to four minutes. Wash in hot sudsy water, rinse and dry. (Make enough solution to completely cover the silver.)

b. Make paste of one part ammonia or castor oil and three parts whitening. Apply with cloth to silver in hot soapy water, rinse and dry.

c. Add one teaspoon ammonia (or denatured alcohol) to one-fourth cup soap jelly-whitening mixture. Rub paste over silver. When tarnish is removed, wash in suds, rinse and dry.

d. One cup boiling water, 1½ cup whitening ¼ cup soap flakes. Heat soap flakes in water until dissolved. Remove from heat and add whitening. Stir to smooth paste. Use as any other silver polish.

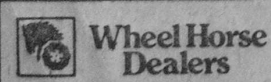

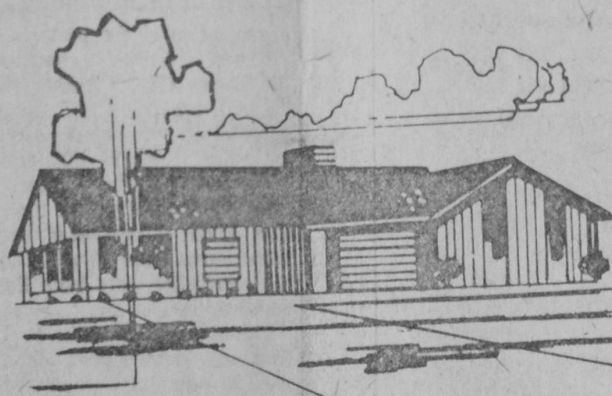

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## State Tax Commission Accepts Iosco's Equalized Valuation

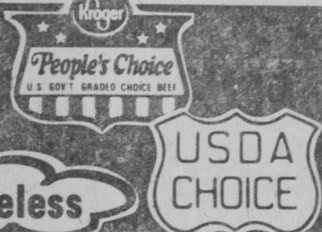
For the second consecutive year, the state tax commission has accepted Iosco County's equalized valuation as the state equalized figure for tax purposes.  
 John Rose, county tax equalization director, received notification Wednesday that the \$206,084,147 total adopted last month had been accepted by the state. This includes \$189,936,077 for real property and \$16,148,070 for personal property.  
 This was not the case for 12 other counties of the state which received increases on the county equalization totals. The only county in this area to receive such an increase was Alcona, which was boosted by four percent. A month ago, Alcona's assessed total received a 6.30 percent increase as the county equalized figure.

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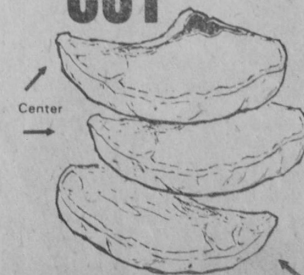

### Panfish With Flies



Fly-rod fishing with popping bugs or small flies can land as many or more panfish than fishing with live bait, according to the Department of Natural Resources. Although many anglers commonly use worms for catching blue gills and other panfish, fly casting is an old, effective method as shown by the photographs above. Evening fishing, from early spring to mid-summer, is very productive with a properly-presented fly or popper. A fly rod is not necessary. Poppers and small flies can be fished with a spinning rod or even a cane pole. Fish can be caught from a boat, by wading, or casting from the banks into shallow areas of lakes and streams. The back waters of the Grand River are a good place to start.

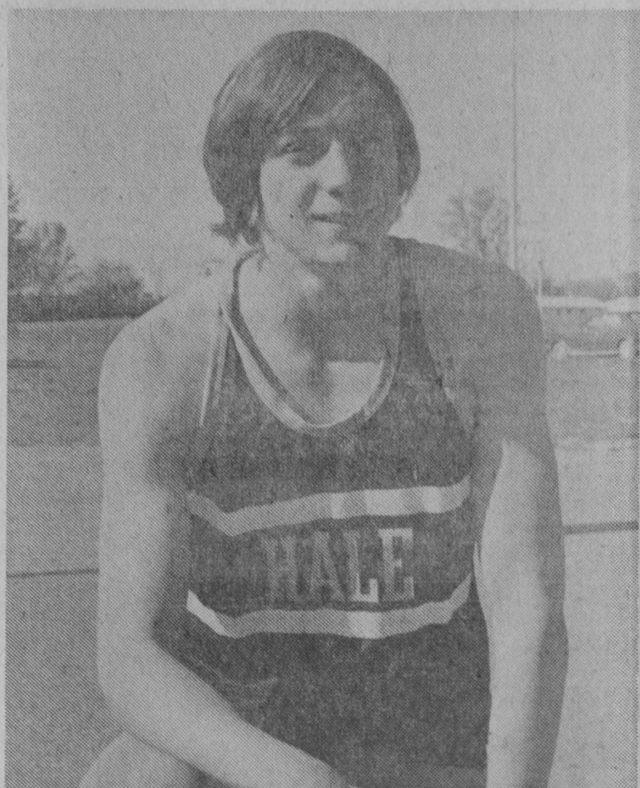

## Rick Weaver Sets Track Records

Rick Weaver, 17, a junior at Hale Area High School, who established two county track records last week in the meet held at Tawas Area School, is looking forward to the remainder of the current track season as well as to his senior year and a possible future in college competition.

A 3.5 scholastic grade point average student, Weaver won the county long jump with a mark of 22 feet, 1 1/2 inches, one of the top distances recorded in the state for a school of any class, while setting a new county record in high hurdles with a time of 15.3 seconds.

During the recent Chip Relays at Central Michigan University, Weaver won first place in high hurdles with a time of 15.3 seconds, was on the school's 440-yard relay team which won second place and the 880-yard relay team which turned in another second place win.

At the Patriot Invitational at Unionville, he won first place in long jump, 21 feet, 10 1/2 inches; second place in high hurdles, 15.5 seconds, and was on the shuttle hurdle relay team which won first place.

He won four first places in the recent Atlanta invitational track meet.

Weaver was to compete in the Oscoda invitational track and field meet Saturday and will compete in the regional meet May 21 at Atlanta, in the league meet May 26 at Atlanta and in the Petoskey Relays on May 28.

Coach Thomas Elliott of Hale said that Weaver has progressed steadily throughout his high school track career. Last year, he was second in the state in long jump and third in high hurdles. He was the first Hale student to be named an all-stater in track.
