





But gradually doctors no-ticed that while the vast majority of children with rickets were cured by this treatment, others weren't. Not until 1937 was it found that some patients needed at least 100 times the normal dosage of vitamin D. Then it was clear this type of rickets was due not to a deficient diet, but to some other problem.

Researchers learned that these children had vitamin Dresistant rickets, an inherited disorder, traced to a defective gene on the X chromosome. Patients with this birth de-

fect of body chemistry do not retain calcium or phosphates from foods. Because these minerals are necessary for normal bone formation, rickets result.

"A real live wire has been prevailed upon by the Republicans of Iosco County to enter the race for the nomination for representative from the Iosco District.'

This was the word of The Tawas Herald on June 7, 1912. The "real live wire" candidate 65 years ago was Elwin Berge Follette, supervisor of Plainfield Township and better known as "E. B." to his neighbors.

Follette was the first person in Plainfield Township's history to represent Iosco County in the state legislature. More than a decade later, Fred C. Holbeck, Long Lake farmer, was elected to the state house of representatives from Plainfield.

The Herald, which editorially supported Democrat Woodrow Wilson for president in 1912 as well as the entire Democratic slate for Iosco, endorsed Follette for the legislature.

"He is an active young man, well qualified to represent the district and one who is today carrying on a great deal of work in the development of this section of Michigan,' stated the Herald.

Follette had served his township as supervisor in 1911-12, but more importantly to the editor, had demonstrated during the previous three years "that the light lands of Northern Michigan will produce paying crops

In 1912, rural voters of Michigan held the successful farmer in the highest esteem among those aspiring to political office. The editor made a mental note of the fact that Follette had also demonstrated practical and scientific methods in his farming practices.

It should be noted, too, that a close friend of Follette was an employee of the Herald and would be in a position to influence the edior. P. N. Thornton, who joined the Herald staff in 1911, was a former Hale resident and worked for Folette at one time.

Peter J. Hottois, Burleigh Township Democrat, 818-323, for the seat in the state legislature representing Alcona, Arenac, Iosco and Ogemaw Counties. A third candidate, Lansing E. Lincoln of Omer, received 441 votes.

In 1916, Follette was opposed for the Republican nomination in the primary election by Will McGilivray, Oscoda newspaper editor. McGillivray was endorsed by the Republican County convention earlier in the spring.

"Follette was endorsed by the Grange and has made a record while at Lansing that commends him strongly to the voters and the Herald believes that he will be renominated," stated this newspaper on August 18, 1916.

The Herald hedged slightly on endorsing Follette, however, as it had this to say about McGillivray: "If elected to the position to which he aspires, he would undoubtedly make good."

The Iosco County Gazette said that McGillivray's claim to the consideration of the voters is well established. "He has always been found on the firing line of the party when every man was needed. He has never before asked for office and it would seem now is the opportune time to reward faithful service."

Iosco Republicans rewarded Mc-Gillivray's faithful service by nominating him as the party's candidate for state representative in the September primary election. The Oscoda editor then defeated J. Edward Betz, Oscoda Democrat, in the November election, 1,089-638. Thus ended the four-year reign of E. B. Follette as Iosco's representative in the state legislature. The county was represented at Lansing by a newspaper editor rather than by a farmer.

With this kind of a practical farm background, it is no wonder that Plainfield's candidate to the state legislature was enthusiastically supported by rural Iosco County voters.

The Herald editor noted that Follette "was a man of progressive ideals in all things, even to politics. He is an active member of the Grange and a man who will represent the people and not the special interests-the Republican Party can make no mistake in nominating him."
