Candidates for four-year terms on the council include James J. Lansky and William L. Ezo, incumbents. The third incumbent, William L. Groff, is not a candidate for re-election.

Lansky, former fire chief, was appointed to fill the unexpired term of the late Howard Hatton in 1971 and was subsequently elected to office. Ezo has served one term on the council.

Other candidates include Hugo J. Keiser, Arlene J. Dillon, Jerry J. Snoblen and Lyle E. Healey.

Keiser resigned from the city planning commission in order to file nominating petitions for the

council vacancy. A retired businessman, he served one term on the council, served on Tawas Area Board of Education and was a member of the city charter com-

TC Elects Councilmen Next Tuesday

Mrs. Dillon is a housewife, mother and an employee of Peoples

Snoblen, motel owner, resigned from the water board to become a candidate for the council. He had been appointed to fill a vacancy earlier in the year. Healey was appointed earlier this year to fill a vacancy on the zoning board of appeals. Both men were unsuccessful candidates to the council in past

elections. Under terms of the city charter, candidates for city offices are elected on a non-partisan basis and

the three councilmen to be picked in November are to represent the city at large.

The three top vote getters in the August primary election were Lansky, 146 votes; Keiser, 124 votes; Ezo, 103 votes. Next in line were Mrs. Dillon, 84; Healey, 61; Snoblen, 56.

Polls for the election are located at the Tawas City Elementary Unit, to be open for voting from 7:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m.

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

Hale Area Schools today announced its policy for Free Meals and Free Milk or Reduced-Price Meals, for children unable to pay the full price of meals and milk served under the National School Lunch, School Breakfast, Special Milk Program, and U. S. D A. Donated Foods Programs.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for (free meals and milk or reducedprice meals). In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space of signa-ture certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the re-ceipt of Federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable State and criminal statutes.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should

Children of unemployed parents may qualify for free or reduced price meals and/or free milk if total family income including welfare payments, unemployment compensation and subpay benefits fall within the prescribed family income guidelines.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, creed, color, or national origin. Under the provisions of the policy the principal will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he or she may make a request either orally or in writing to: Mr. Wayne Case, Superintendent at 728-7661, Hale Area Schools.
