

TC Elects Councilmen Next Tuesday

Tawas City voters are to fill three positions on the city council, due to expire December 31, at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 8.

Six persons are candidates for three council seats and Mayor Herbert Cholger is unopposed for re-election to a second two-year term. Candidates for four-year terms on the council include James J. Lansky and William L. Ezo, in-

cumbents. The third incumbent, William L. Groff, is not a candidate for re-election.

Lansky, former fire chief, was appointed to fill the unexpired term of the late Howard Hatton in 1971 and was subsequently elected to office. Ezo has served one term on the council.

Other candidates include Hugo J. Keiser, Arlene J. Dillon, Jerry J. Snoblen and Lyle E. Healey.

Keiser resigned from the city planning commission in order to file nominating petitions for the council vacancy. A retired businessman, he served one term on the council, served on Tawas Area Board of Education and was a member of the city charter commission.

Mrs. Dillon is a housewife, mother and an employee of Peoples State Bank.

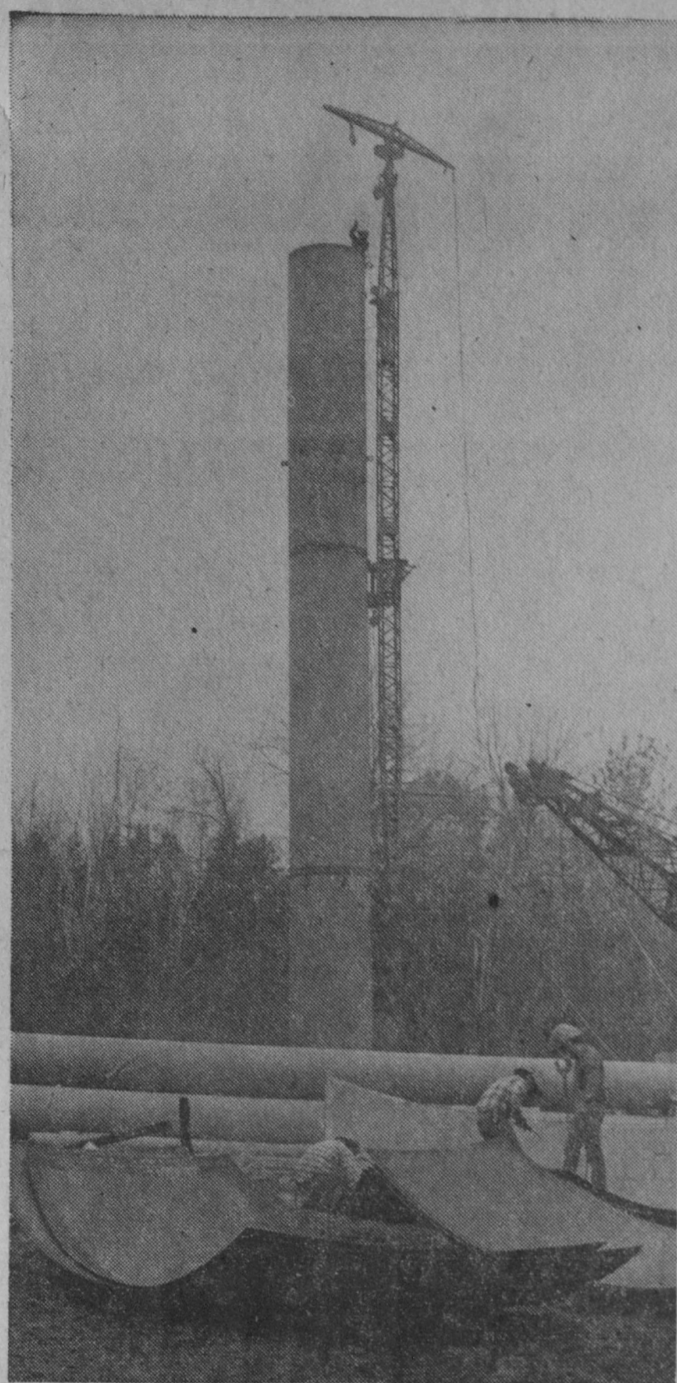
Snoblen, motel owner, resigned from the water board to become a candidate for the council. He had been appointed to fill a vacancy earlier in the year. Healey was appointed earlier this year to fill a vacancy on the zoning board of appeals. Both men were unsuccessful candidates to the council in past elections.

Under terms of the city charter, candidates for city offices are elected on a non-partisan basis and

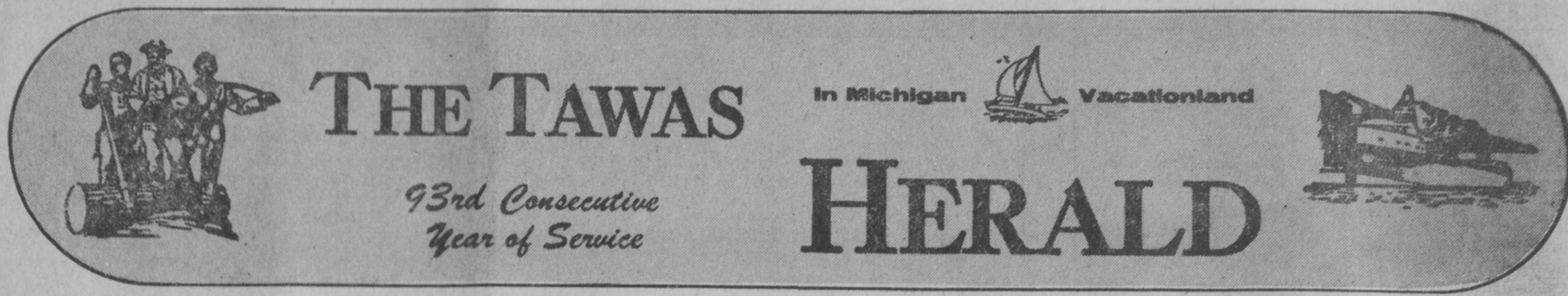
the three councilmen to be picked in November are to represent the city at large.

The three top vote getters in the August primary election were Lansky, 146 votes; Keiser, 124 votes; Ezo, 103 votes. Next in line were Mrs. Dillon, 84; Healey, 61; Snoblen, 56.

Polls for the election are located at the Tawas City Elementary Unit, to be open for voting from 7:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m.

Line Being Tested

Leak in Water Main Delays Project Completion

A delay in pressure testing on a new water main extending from East Tawas to the Tawas Area Industrial Park on Aulerich Road in Baldwin Township is holding up completion of the project. As a result, water service to two new buildings in Baldwin Township may not be provided for another week or more.

At Tuesday morning's meeting of the Isosco County Department of Public Works, a representative of Edmonds-Engineering Company said that the contractor for water main construction had made no progress on testing of the mains

and that the engineering firm would not recommend further pay to the contractor until the testing was completed.

According to the contract signed in April, GGL Contractors of Belleville, which submitted the low bid of \$688,233 for construction of water main in the system, had until October 1 to complete the work.

The firm has asked the county DPW for an extension of time on the work, but no official action has been taken as yet.

The Belleville firm made rapid progress during the early part of the summer on construction of the

main through Baldwin Township, East Tawas and Tawas City, but wet weather during August and September caused some delay, according to George Moyer, foreman for GGL.

Appearing before the DPW Tuesday morning, Moyer said that the request to delay construction of the main to the filtration plant at East Tawas until October 1 helped to delay the project. He also cited several other instances which caused delays.

Moyer stated that the firm's subcontractor performing the testing work had been on the job since a week ago Monday. It is believed there is a small leak in the line south of Aulerich Road, but about two miles of water main are involved and no progress has been made as yet toward locating the defect.

The contractor's foreman be-

lieved the leak would be located shortly.

At the request of the engineering firm, GGL is to concentrate its testing on the main paralleling US-23 to Aulerich Road in order to speed water service to the new social services building recently completed and to the new Midway Family Center.

It was reported that the new Midway Family Center is being temporarily served with well water.

According to information at Tuesday's meeting, that water main would provide only minimum pressure until next spring when elevated storage tanks are constructed at each end of the system at the industrial park and in Tawas City. As a result, commercial water sprinkling systems probably would not be operative until then.

Before permission is granted to tap into the water main, the DPW

is to require each user to sign a release indicating that it understands that full water pressure will not be provided until next spring.

In other action Tuesday, the DPW released Mercury Contracting Corporation, Farmington, from its contract to construct additional water mains at East Tawas. The

firm did not include a \$54,186 item in its bid for the cost of water main. Its five percent bid bond amounting to \$9,000 was returned.

Because of the additional cost, one portion of the work was deleted and a new contract of \$184,608 was awarded to Gary Steadman, Bay City, for the project.

AuSable Project Gets FHA Offer

A tentative offer of a \$70,000 loan to assist with emergency construction of a water main in AuSable Township was received Friday from the Farmers Home Administration.

According to a report Tuesday morning at the regular meeting of Isosco County Department of Public Works, the total project was to have been financed under a \$140,000 bond issue.

Kenneth Myles, attorney for the DPW, said that the FHA loan offer means there would be a lower interest rate on borrowing money for the project and that the application for a bond issue would require revision. Part of the project is being financed under a special assessment tax.

Myles said that the township's

original application for an FHA loan had been denied, but additional information had been submitted since the original application and a tentative loan offer had been made.

This project would finance construction of a water main to serve an area of AuSable Township where privately owned wells were poisoned by a toxic substance which seeped out of a septic tank system.

An industry once located at AuSable dumped an industrial cleaner into its septic tank system a number of years ago. The toxic substance later contaminated the wells and steps were taken to serve the area with water from Oscoda's municipal waterworks system.

Marsh Serves on Pollution Study

Robert Marsh of Baldwin Township, one of eight Michigan citizens appointed to begin deliberations and make known their views on nonpoint pollution and how it should be dealt with, recently attended the first of three meetings at Traverse City.

The panelists are meeting at the request of the International Joint Commission's Pollution from Land Use Activities Reference Group (PLUARG), an international refer-

ence group that has been studying nonpoint pollution in the Great Lakes for the past five years.

PLUARG will make its final report to the IJC in 1978, including recommendations for dealing with abatement of nonpoint sources of pollution.

The nine panels meeting in the United States represent the first time that an IJC reference group has sought input from the public sector prior to the submission of the reference group report to the IJC.

Each of the panels will write a report to PLUARG containing its views and recommendations. PLUARG will seriously consider the reports of the United States and Canadian panels as it forms its final report. The panel reports will be published and made available to the public.

Burglars Brought Own Hamburger for 'Cookout'

Michigan State Police from East Tawas investigated a breaking and entering of Dr. Norman Payea's hunting lodge off Towerline Road, Grant Township.

Payea told officers that a car parked in front of his hunting cabin took off at high speed when he pulled into the driveway. He found burning coals in the fireplace of the cabin and evidence that the burglars had been cooking hamburgers.

The only food missing from the kitchen was a can of beans. Payea said the burglars had evidently brought their own hamburgers.

Police agencies in Isosco County reported a relatively "quiet" Halloween with very little property damage Monday night, although there were numerous reports of eggs being thrown at automobiles traveling along M-65 at Whittetmore and on Newman Street at East Tawas.

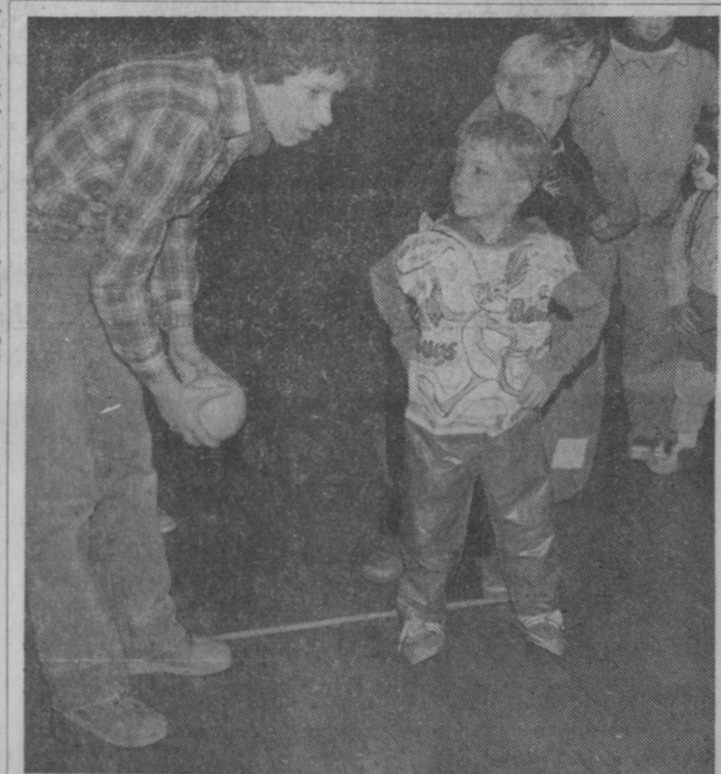
Isosco County Sheriff's Department reported Tuesday morning that there was the usual number of road barricades changed during the night and debris thrown along highways.

City patrolmen at East Tawas had their hands full for two straight nights in trying to cope

with "pranksters," who opened water hydrants in various sections of the city and caused an immediate drop in water pressure to users.

Donald Docking, chief of police, said that several hydrants were opened the night preceding Halloween, so-called "Devil's Night," and that water pressure dropped to a dangerously low level. Members of the city crew were called upon to assist officers Monday night in closing hydrants.

Fisherman Died of Heart Attack

Death of a 52-year-old Pontiac fisherman found slumped on the bottom of a boat on Saginaw Bay Saturday morning was caused by a heart attack, according to a report by Dr. James Jacques, county medical examiner.

The victim was Clifford R. Mahan, who owned a summer home in the area. Family members told the medical examiner that Mahan had a history of heart disease.

A Douglas Drive resident observed Mahan operating his boat around 11:00 a. m. off shore from Benson Road, Alabaster Township. About one-half hour later, he observed the boat drifting close to shore, he discovered the body slumped on the bottom and he notified Michigan State Police at East Tawas.

An ambulance was dispatched to

the scene but the man was dead.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, November 1, from the Jacques and Kobs West Chapel, Tawas City. Burial was in the Reno Township Cemetery. The Rev. Kenneth Tousley officiated.

He was born June 7, 1925, at Lansing. He was a member of the Detroit Sportsmen's Congress and Local No. 58 of the Electrician's Union.

He is survived by his wife, Gola; five daughters, Linda Mahan of Auburn Heights, Sandra Hudson of Sterling Heights, Kathy Locher of Rochester, Shirlee Craycraft of Mt. Clemens and Nancy Remington of Rome, Georgia; three stepchildren, Daniel and Ronald Ropert and Nana Frank; 10 grandchildren; three brothers, George, Earl and Clayton Mahan; two sisters, Florine Butler and Betty Proctor.

A winter resident of St. Petersburg, Florida, he was taken to the St. Petersburg General Hospital on Wednesday, October 26, where he passed away three days later.

Born February 12, 1892, at Monroe, he was married to the former Ruth E. Dillon of East Tawas on November 15, 1917. He was a veteran of World War I.

In 1924, the Keisers purchased the Red Cross Pharmacy in Tawas City and were joined in the business by their son, Hugo J. Keiser Jr., in 1947. He retired in 1955.

He was a member of Jesse C. Hodder Post No. 189, American Legion, Tawas City, and the Fraternal Order of Masons. He served several terms on the Tawas City Board of Education and had been active as an officer of the Tawas City Chamber of Commerce.

He is survived by his wife; one son; a daughter, Janet D. Rapp; three grandchildren, and five great grandchildren.

No Appointment Necessary for Diabetes Testing Nov. 7-11

November 6 - 12 is Diabetes Week, a major event in the drive for diabetes detection.

Diabetes is a disease that results when the pancreas gland does not make enough insulin. Insulin permits the sugars and starches eaten to be changed into energy needed by the body. Most common symptoms of diabetes are excessive thirst, frequent urination, constant hunger, changes in vision, loss of weight, itching, tiring easily, cuts and scratches heal slowly.

Individuals over 40, overweight, a blood relative of a diabetic or a mother of a baby who weighed

over nine pounds at birth are in the diabetes high risk group.

The best way to protect oneself and family is to be tested. Tawas Hospital, in cooperation with the American Diabetes Association, is again offering free blood testing for diabetes.

Last year, 438 area residents were tested for diabetes in the form of a simple blood test. Out of the 438 people tested, 19 new cases of diabetes mellitus were discovered.

This year, the testing will be done at Tawas Hospital on November 7-11 from 8:00 a. m. to 2:00 p. m. No appointment is necessary. If interested in diabetic testing, follow the instructions below exactly as stated. At the same time a blood sample is drawn, blood pressure will be taken at no charge.

TEST MEAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR TWO-HOUR POST-PRANDIAL BLOOD SUGAR TEST

It is important to include all the following food in the amounts listed in the sample meal plan. If planning to be tested in the morning use the sample breakfast meal. If tested in the afternoon, one may choose the sample lunch (dinner) meal instead. One should eat the test meal no longer than two hours before being tested. Arrive 15 minutes early to allow time for paper work to be completed.

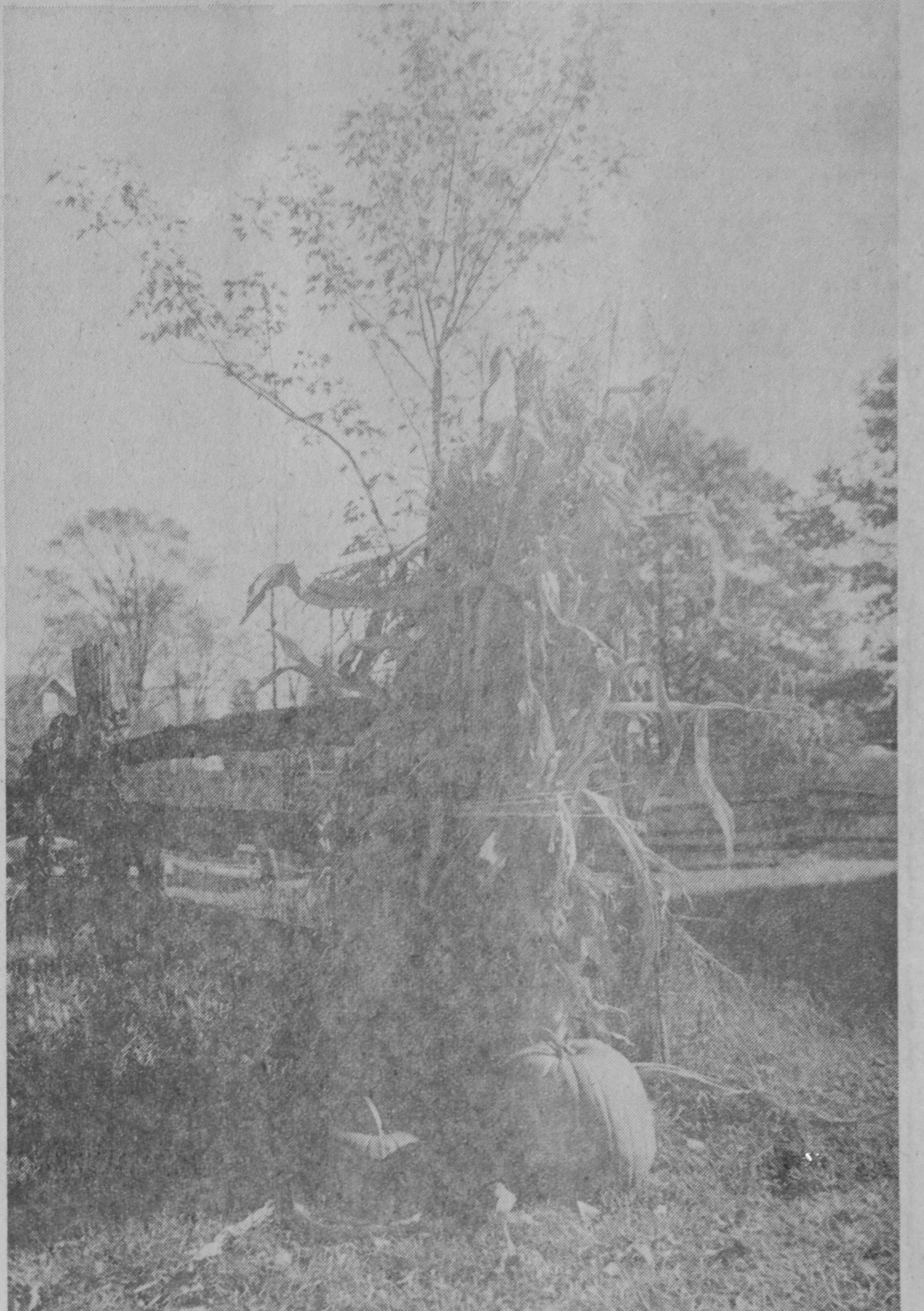

Applicants Can Help Speed Claim for SSI

People who plan to apply for supplemental security income (SSI) payments can help speed the processing of their claim, a social security spokesman said today.

SSI payments are made to people who are age 65 and over, or blind, or disabled and who don't own much property or have much income. SSI is administered by social security.

They can help, by getting together material to support their claim before they contact a social security office to apply.

The spokesman suggested that people get the following kinds of information together first:

- Proof of age, unless the person already gets social security benefits.
- The person's latest tax bill or assessment notice if the person owns real property other than his or her own home.
- Names of any persons who help support the applicant and the amount of money provided.

- Bank books, stock certificates, and bonds.
- Motor vehicle registration.
- Proof of pensions and annuities.
- A copy of the person's most recent tax return if self-employed.
- If blind or disabled, a list of the doctors, hospitals, or clinics where treated.

A person can apply for SSI payments at any social security office. The basic Federal SSI payment is \$177.80 a month for an individual and \$266.70 for an eligible couple. Not everyone gets this much, however, because most other income causes the SSI payment to be reduced.

The value of a person's real and personal property may have an effect on eligibility. Not all property counts, though. A person's home doesn't count and neither does a car of reasonable value, nor small life insurance policies.

Property that does count includes savings accounts, stocks, bonds, jewelry, and other valuables. If the value of this kind of property is more than \$1,500 for an individual or more than \$2,250 for a couple, SSI payments cannot be made.

Q. My wife and I get supplemental security income payments. She just entered a public health facility and Medicaid will be paying for most of her care. Will this affect our monthly SSI payments?

A. Probably so. When an SSI beneficiary is in a public or private health facility which receives Medicaid payments for more than 50 percent of his or

her care, the SSI payment is reduced. But, in cases where only one member of a couple is in a Medicaid facility, the income of each member is considered separately in determining the amount of payment. You should notify a social security office right away. The people there will tell you exactly how your SSI checks will be affected.

Weaver also had nine tackles and five assists on defense for the Eagles.

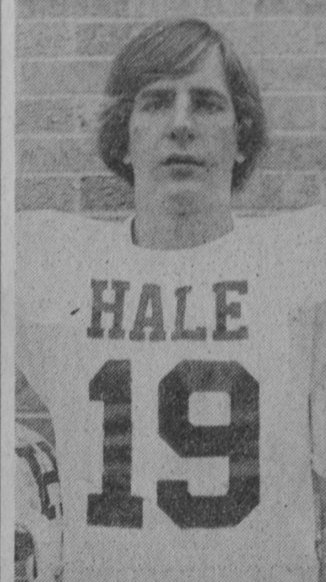

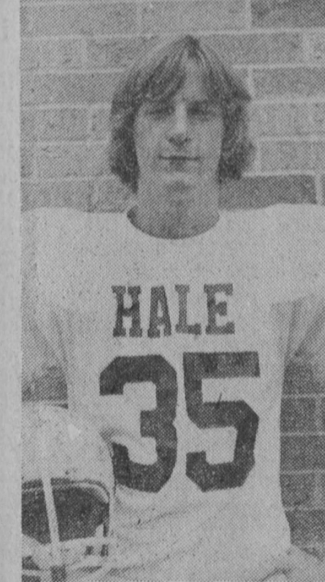

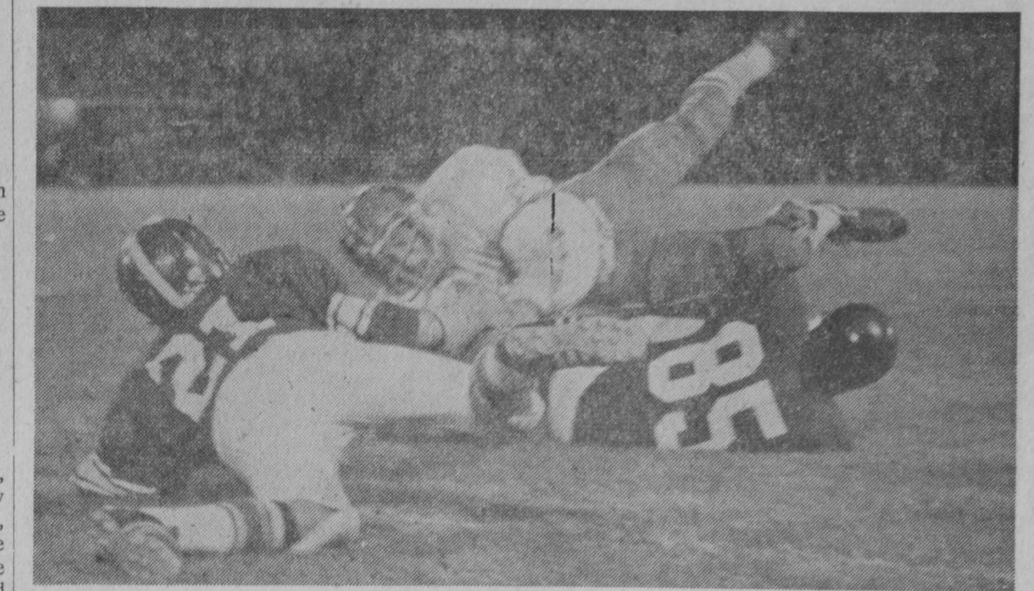

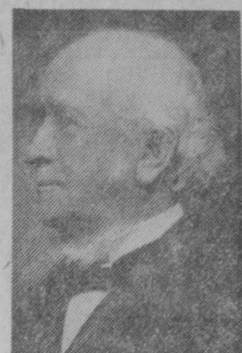
Gold Bond Had Record Sales-Earnings During 1977

National Gypsum Company, which operates a wallboard plant and gypsum quarry in Iosco County, reports that the company's sales, net earnings and earnings per share for the third quarter of 1977 were the highest for any quarter in the company's 52-year history.

Third quarter net earnings rose 37 percent to 13.2-million-dollars, or 81 cents a share. This compared with 1976 third period of 9.6-million-dollars, or 59 cents a share. Sales for the quarter were 211.4-million-dollars, a 22 percent increase from sales of 173.4-million-dollars a year ago.

Net earnings for the nine months increased 34 percent to 27.4-million dollars, or \$1.68 a share, which matched 1976's full year per share earnings. This compared with 20.4-million-dollars, or \$1.25 per share, for the nine months last year. Sales increased 20 percent to 549.4-million-dollars from 459.5-million recorded in the corresponding 1976 period.

Holding on to "stump lands" after the valuable white pine had been harvested was almost unheard of during Michigan's lumbering era. The usual practice was to strip off the merchantable timber and then allow the less valuable land to go back to the state to avoid paying property taxes.

This was not always the case as many thousands of acres of Iosco's pine lands were later sold for farming purposes. It was a long, hard struggle to pry out stumps, but the work was accomplished over a period of years; in the meantime, some farmers sowed crops among the stumps, which provided a start for farming even if such a practice complicated work during harvest time.

A record book of the Saginaw Salt and Lumber Company, which had extensive holdings of pine lands in Iosco County, indicates that thousands of acres in Reno, Sherman, Burleigh and Grant Townships were sold for farming purposes as early as the 1890s.

One of those lumbermen who did not dispose of his land after harvesting the pine was the Rev. C. H. Prescott of Tawas City—and he faced the opposition of his son when he did not follow the procedure of most local lumbermen. Today, this Baptist preacher could rightly be called the "father" of this region's cattle raising business.

A school teacher and successful businessman in New England and Pennsylvania before becoming an ordained Baptist minister, Prescott was energetic and noted for making smart business deals. He showed foresight in 1853 when he purchased coal and timber land in Jefferson County, Pennsylvania, confident that a low gap in the Allegheny Mountains just east of his lands would not be overlooked by railroad promoters.

That land route was not overlooked and he became one of the most extensive timber dealers along the Allegheny and Ohio Rivers. He was ordained in 1870 and eight years later, came to Michigan. While serving as a missionary for his church, he was identified with the lumbering business at Bay City and, against his better judgment, invested in the Lake Huron and Southwestern Railroad, which was then building westerly out of Tawas City. The following year, he purchased one of the finest sawmills on Tawas Bay, which had not operated for two years and was obtained at a bankruptcy sale.

The railroad's board of directors had no actual experience in operating a railroad, but cared not for any of Prescott's suggestions, even though he was president. That was a mistake for the railroad soon became financially embarrassed and was sold at public sale in October 1879.

Although he lost about \$25,000 in

failure of the railroad, Prescott decided to try and save part of what he had lost by purchasing the entire railroad. Prescott purchased the narrow gauge line at a bargain rate and operated the new Tawas and Bay County for a few months by himself until a new company was organized under state law. Under later reorganizations, the railroad became the Detroit, Bay City and Alpena and finally the Detroit and Mackinac Railway.

At the time of purchasing the railroad, Prescott acquired a large block of pine land when assets of C. D. Hale of Tawas City, who inaugurated the railroad enterprise, were sold at bankruptcy sale. Those lands comprised some of the best white pine holdings in the region and were located in Western Iosco County and Eastern Ogemaw County.

Prescott's lumbering operations on those lands required more than 20 years and continued into the present century. In 1905, the Prescott mill in Tawas City was totally destroyed by fire, but lumbering operations were to continue for several more years.

It was then that Prescott made another decision—he would retain ownership of the land and establish a stock raising business, becoming Iosco's first cattleman. His son later recalled he tried to talk his father out of starting the ranch, but later became "entirely won-

over." Prescott died in January 1913 at the age of 85 years, but by then his ranch was known far and wide as the largest in Michigan. Management of the business was handled by his son, George A. Prescott, former state senator and secretary of state, who was assisted by his sons, Charles T. and George A. Prescott Jr.

The ranch in Iosco and Ogemaw Counties in 1913 comprised 10 sections of 6,400 acres, surrounded by miles of woven wire fence, traversed by swift flowing streams of pure water and all under cultivation or covered with clover, timothy and blue grass.

In addition, the Prescotts owned a 2,000-acre ranch three miles away known as the Gage and Mitchell Ranch and Prescott was a member of the firm of Prescott, Gage and Mitchell which operated a 4,000-acre ranch in the same locality, known as the Sayles Lake Ranch, for a total of 12,000 acres in ranches.

The ranches, eventually comprising about 8,000 acres, were located near the Village of Prescott on the Prescott Division of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway. At times, 100 or more men were employed in the operation during peak seasons.

In explaining operations at the ranch, George A. Prescott said in 1913 that it was mainly a grazing

proposition. "With this wonderful pasturage we can put from 200 to 300 pounds on an animal in a summer at a very low cost. We buy all the stock we can in the spring and sell most of it in the fall. If the price at Chicago, Illinois, is not too high, we bring in a lot of western steers and pasture them. In the fall, we pick out a few for winter feeding."

Farming was on a three-crop rotation basis—corn, oats and seeding to clover, with the oats getting the land back to grass. Corn was used for ensilage and oats were fed to horses. In 1913, the ranch threshed 5,300 bushels of oats from 100 acres of land.

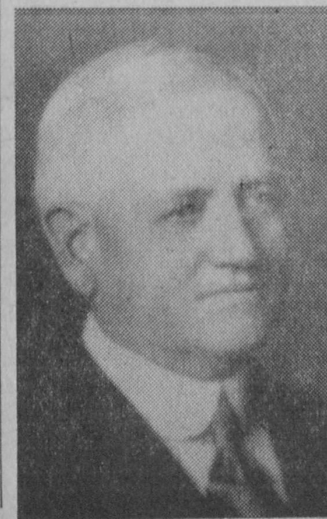
In 1913, the ranch had 1,400 head of cattle, 7,600 sheep and from 60 to 70 horses. The firm grainfed 300 steers in addition to cattle "roughed through" the winter.

On much of the land in the early days, no effort was made to pull the stumps or cut down the second growth of trees which grew quickly and naturally after the heavy timber was cut off.

"Can you see anything wrong with this country?" asked Prescott in an interview printed in the Michigan Investor. "There is nothing like it! One cannot find better land anywhere. It is a stock raising country that cannot be excelled."

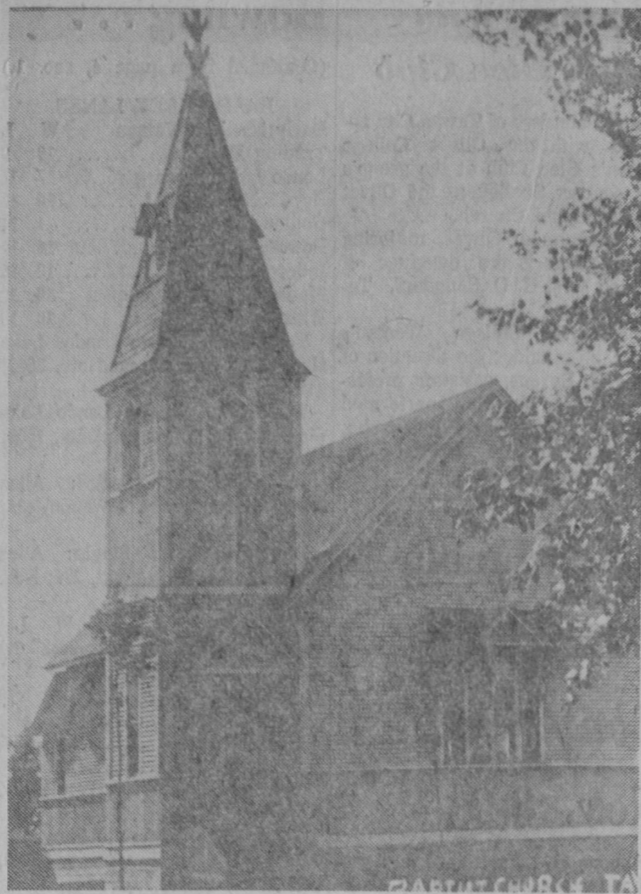

ranches were to be established over the years in Iosco County, but none matched the size of the Prescott operation.

The Prescott family continued to operate their large ranch for another 40 years before selling the property. It is now owned by the Mackinac Land and Cattle Company, comprising what is said to be the largest cattle ranch east of

the Mississippi River. Heading that firm is Charles A. Pinkerton Jr., chairman of the board of Detroit and Mackinac Railway.

C. H. Prescott, the originator of cattle ranching in Northeastern Michigan, often commented he would have given up a good business to enter the ministry, if not forbidden by his physician. Although this unlikely cattleman was unable to follow his chosen field as a man of the cloth, his personal interest in religion saw him being the leader in establishment of Baptist Churches in this county.



FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH in Tawas City was one of several Baptist Churches in the county fostered by the Rev. C. H. Prescott. Although an ordained minister, ill health prevented him from being an active preacher.

Shortage of Dead Timber Forest Service Now Issuing Permits to Cut Green Wood

During the past few months, free use permits have been issued to individuals to gather firewood in Huron National Forest for personal use. Tawas Ranger District policy in the past has been to allow gathering dead and down timber by permit. In some areas, a shortage of dead and down timber is showing up; therefore, areas have been designated where green wood may be cut by permit under the same free use system.

Green wood areas that have been designated are clearly marked on the ground and special maps given with the permit so cutters can easily determine where these areas are. Field checking shows that people are cutting outside these designated areas. In some instances, illegal cutting is taking place no where near a designated free use area.

Although permits are free of charge and wood is being made available in many parts of the Tawas District, a small number of people are violating the privilege of gathering wood, causing concern to district personnel. Any wood cutting on the national forest, except for camp or warming fires while camping on the national forest, must be done by permit. Anyone without a permit is breaking the law and subject to Federal Regulation 36 CFR 261.6. Also, anyone selling wood obtained under a free use permit is subject to

the same penalty. Both violations carry a \$50 fine and/or an appearance before the federal magistrate at Bay City.

Tawas Ranger District requests that each person who desires to gather free use wood from the national forest make it his responsibility to secure a permit from the district ranger's office in the Federal Building, East Tawas, and make sure to heed the instructions on the permit.

If this free use policy is to continue, the cooperation of everyone who is gathering firewood is needed.

How to get a job is the focus of an all-day workshop scheduled by Michigan State University's Cooperative Extension Service for Friday, November 11. Planned to build the personal skills people need to get a job, the workshop is open to interested persons on a first come, first served reservation basis. Enrollment will be limited to allow interaction among participants.

With several applicants for each existing job opening, personal job-seeking skills have become critical. The person who is realistic about his own ability and who can successfully communicate his assets will get the job.

Dr. Frank Bobbitt, specialist in Manpower Training from Michigan State University's Center for Rural Manpower and Public Affairs, will conduct the workshop. Topics to be covered include self-analysis, job analysis, finding job openings, developing a resume, filling out applications and interviewing techniques.

Doctor Bobbitt has conducted similar workshops in many Michigan communities. The response to his techniques has been positive.

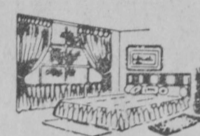
