### School Sells BT House to Highest Bidder

On recommendation of Supt. Robert Halle, bids received two weeks ago for sale of the building trades house were rejected and new bids were received.

The bid of Steven M. Hlinka of \$45,219 was accepted for the house located on Lot 59 of North Park Acres Subdivision, plus the south one-half of Lot 60. The second bid received was from Casimer Cybula for \$42,000.

The school had advertised the house on one lot, but because of its location on a corner lot, both bidders apparently wished to also purchase the south half of the adjoining lot, also owned by the school.

Hlinka entered his first bid of \$43,010 for the house and lot, plus the south one-half of the next lot Cybula entered a bid of \$41,553 for the house on one lot, as advertised. He indicated, however, that he was interested in purchasing the additional property if it was offered.





### Everyone in Offices Has Important Job to Do

One of the complaints most social security often heard in social security offices, and the local office is no exception, concerns the apparent inactivity on the part of many employees, a social security representative said to-

Nothing could be farther from the truth, the spokesperson went on. Every person in the office has his or her assigned duties and completes them every day.

This notion apparently arises from the fact that not all of the people in the office are available to interview people visiting the office. Many of the people. however, are not qualified to conduct interviews, but they do have important duties to perform-duties which are vital to

Of those qualified to conduct interviews, only a portion of them are available to interview people visiting the office on any particular day. When they are not interviewing, they are processing applications they received earlier, or they are returning telephone calls received from people who wish to

The people available for interviewing try to work as quickly as possible and yet provide the full and complete service people have come to expect from social security.

The representative gave these tips to people who wish to avoid a possible lengthy wait in the Security Administration.'

First, do not come to the

office the first week in the month. That is the week social security checks are delivered and it is a very busy week in all social security offices. Waiting time is often quite long. Visit the office after the 10th of the

month. An even better way to avoid a wait is to do your business with social security over the telephone. Almost every kind of situation can be taken care of over the telephone, from applying for benefits to reporting a - change of address.


