

## Fernette Defeated Roach

Eugene Fernette was elected to a two-year term on the city council in Monday's general election when East Tawas voters gave him a 60-46 margin over Wilbur C. Roach.


That was the only contest in the city election as all other candidates were unopposed.

Fernette reversed his position from the February primary election when he ran second best to Roach, 45-37. The third candidate in the primary, Robert Johnson, incumbent, received 36 votes in that

election and Fernette apparently picked up a greater number of Johnson's votes than did Roach.

Robert Bolen was re-elected to another one-year term with 161 votes, with Grace Pelton receiving 157 votes for city treasurer and Clyde Soper received 158 votes for city clerk.

Running unopposed in the First Ward was Gerald Klenow, who received 16 votes, while Ralph Western, the unopposed Third Ward candidate, received 43 votes.



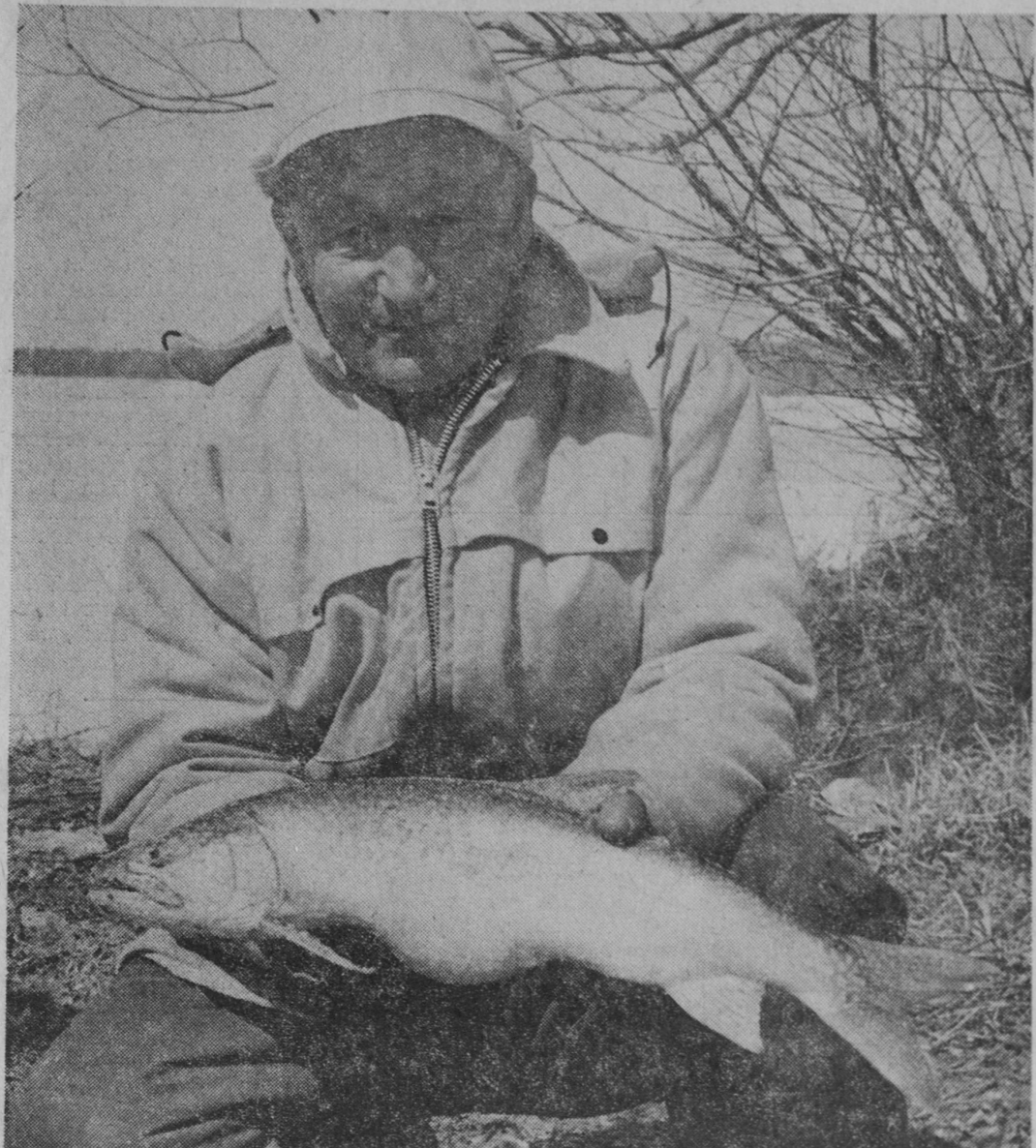

**EXCELLENT FISHING SUCCESS** was reported last week on Tawas Bay. ## Plainfield Bd. Pledges Funds for Hale Senior Citizens Center

Plainfield Township Board pledged a contribution of approximately \$15,000 for matching funds in the event that a federal grant is obtained for completion of the Hale Area Senior Citizens Center. This action was taken at Saturday's annual meeting attended by about 45 residents.

Notification was received two weeks ago that the Hale Area Senior Citizens had been denied funding on its recent application through the Older Americans Act to remodel the former county garage at Hale into a center.

Funds raised by the senior citizens, plus township money used to purchase the property and a \$15,000 contribution in federal revenue sharing funds from the county have already been expended on the project.

At a meeting held with federal grant officials March 28, township

officials and association officers pointed out the need for the Hale Area Senior Citizens Center, citing impressive statistics to show the amount of use that facility receives.

The township and the Hale Area Senior Citizens Retirees Advisory Board is to resubmit an application for \$60,000 in federal funds under the OAA legislation, but \$15,000 would be required as the local contribution.

Ray Kesler, township supervisor, told those attending Saturday's annual meeting that the township has approximately \$28,000 in federal revenue sharing money. A portion of that money is to be used to construct a new addition to the township hall to house a vault and the remainder, estimated at \$15,000, would be earmarked for the matching fund. Legality of such a contribution is now being studied.

The new vault would provide fireproof quarters to safeguard important township records.

In other business conducted Saturday, a tentative operational budget of \$125,000 was adopted.

Salaries adopted at the meeting included \$11,000 for the township supervisor, which represented \$5,000 for the elective position of supervisor, \$5,000 for acting as the township assessor and \$1,000 for his certification as a level two assessor.

An increase of approximately 10 percent was granted for the township clerk and treasurer, raising those salaries from \$6,555 to \$7,300 each. The township board had conducted a study of salaries paid to 10 other townships of similar size, valuation, number of parcels and population.

The pay for trustees was changed from a per diem basis to an annual salary of \$720.

## Long Term Development Discussed

# Would Update River Mouth Plan

Authorization to obtain an estimated cost for updating plans for development of the Tawas River mouth was given Monday night by the Tawas City Council at a joint meeting with the parks and recreation board and the planning commission.

Future development of the river mouth, the city having acquired ownership of the east side only last year, was one of the major topics of discussion by the three groups. Other discussion points included planning for the city park, development of a city hall-library-fire station complex, plus improvements to the baseball field on North Street, development of a recreational area on city property near the elementary school and other projects.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz outlined a \$30,000 blacktopping program in 1978 which would improve streets near the new Kroger Store, Manitou Village Apartments and Provincial House's new nursing home. He said those areas were being given consideration because of the added tax base and the large amount of new traffic generated.

The council authorized the mayor and clerk to sign a contract with the state highway department for construction of a new drainage system south of the Tawas River bridge. The city's share would be \$48,400. The contract is to be studied by the city attorney prior to signing.

Bublitz estimated that the cost for updating engineering at the river mouth would be \$4,000. He said that valuable information had been obtained several years ago when previous plans were developed for an application for state funding. The original plan called for utilizing a stone rip-rap harbor entrance, but steel sheeting is now being considered.

Soil borings, water depths and wind direction data is available. Bublitz said that a preliminary plan would be necessary for making application for Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, plus other state and federal funds for development of the project.

It was emphasized that development of a harbor, which has an estimated cost of \$350,000 and the city's share at approximately \$70,000, would be a long range project, requiring from two to five years to coordinate with state and federal agencies.

Should approval of funds for engineering be given by the council, an application would be prepared for submitting to state and federal agencies next year.

In the meantime, it was felt by those attending that some minor maintenance work could be accomplished on the city's new property this year. The city manager said that an application had been made to the United States Army Corps of Engineers in January to dredge the river mouth, but the application is currently in limbo while awaiting approval of environmentalists. The city had hoped to obtain a long term permit for dredging.

It was suggested that a boat slip on the property be filled with sand taken from the river, inasmuch as the entrance to the slip was choked with sand. The council also directed that legal notices be placed on three old fishing craft ordering removal by owners. The city has been able to ascertain the ownership of only one boat and legal steps are required for removal.

Discussion was also held on an operational budget being prepared by the city parks and recreation board. Joan Blust, a member of that board, suggested that a master plan be developed for the park in cooperation with the city planning commission.

Gary Stephan, parks and recreation chairman, said his group would develop priorities for development and would submit plans to the council for consideration. Currently being studied is a \$26,000 program to include blacktopping

of the remaining parking area, the first base side of the baseball field was being considered in the 1978 operational budget, along with replacement of dugouts.

The Rev. Carroll Symons of the parks and recreation board suggested that the city consider development of a public trailer park at some location to provide additional income for development. He felt that the parks and recreation board and planning commission should be

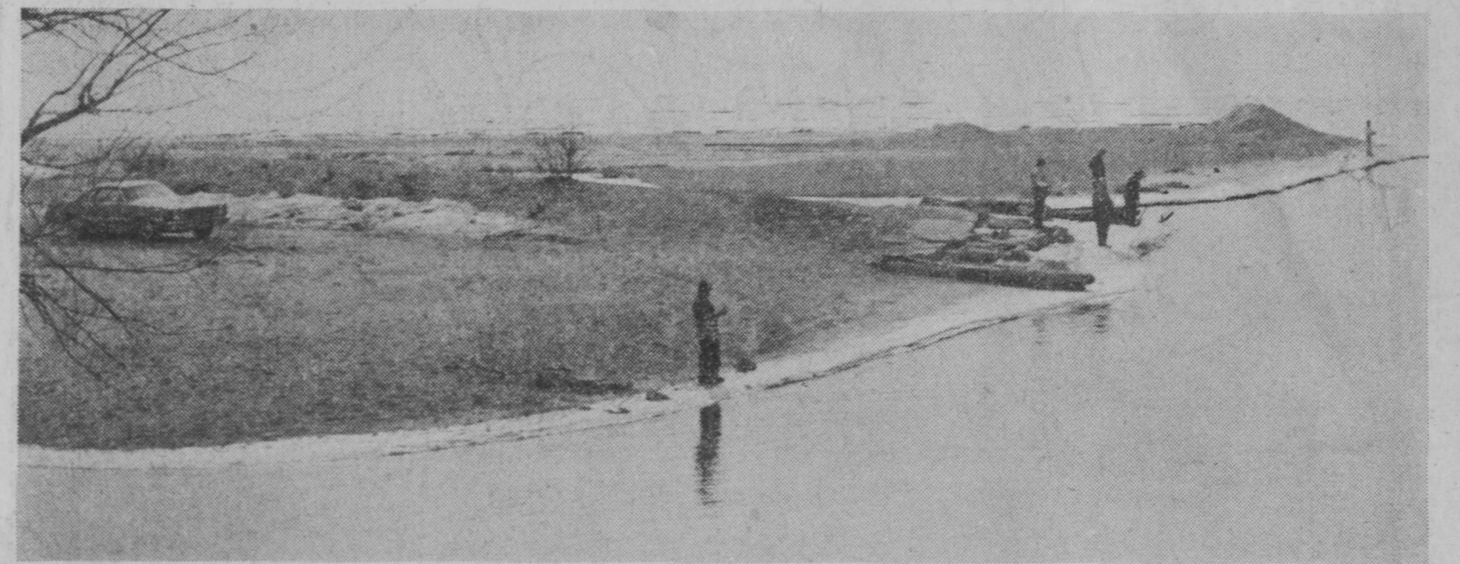
involved. Mayor Herbert Cholger suggested that the site along Tawas River formerly occupied by Fuelgas Company and owned by the Detroit and Mackinac Railway be given consideration for a trailer park.

Robert Pawloski of the planning commission felt that the river mouth project should be given first priority by the city. Symons felt that expansion of parking at the

boat ramps on Ninth Avenue should also be given consideration, along with provision for adequate toilet facilities.

The city manager said that about \$1,000 was available for leveling off the river mouth property this year.

A joint meeting between the parks and recreation board and the planning commission is being planned for future discussion on city priorities.

## Council OK's Optioning Property for Proposed

# New City Hall-Library-Fire Hall Complex

On recommendation of a committee appointed a year ago, Tawas City Council authorized a \$500 option to purchase property presently occupied by a house and rental cabins for expansion of a city hall complex.

He said that 10 different sites had been studied, but the committee always came back to the present location as being the most practical. He felt that with improvements, the present city hall would last for another 80 years and that the present site would provide the nucleus for development of the block.

Cotter said that the city was presently spending money to develop plans for the commercial development of the remainder of the block and believed development of the city hall site could be a catalyst "for something to happen to this block. If you wait for someone

else to develop it, it is not being a very good leader," he stated.

Mayor Herbert Cholger expressed the opinion that the present city hall site was not a logical move because of heavy traffic conditions on US-23 during the summer months, believing that the fire department should be located elsewhere due to the difficulty in entering US-23 during the busy season.

Cholger said, "I would ignore the city's present site for development because of traffic conditions" and felt that it should be developed across the river. He pointed out, too, that the \$65,000 for purchase of additional land, plus a valuation of \$75,000 for the present city hall site, would go a long way for construction of a complex and that a

public building would not be occupying valuable property for commercial development.

Councilman Rollin also felt that development of a city complex on the present site would hurt development of future commercial businesses in the 500 block and said he would have to be "sold on this type of location for a fire hall."

Councilman Ezo, who served on the committee, said the committee had been charged with studying various locations, that it had spent considerable time on the matter and probably was in a better position than anyone else to make a recommendation. Ezo said the council had "sat here for years" listening to people make proposals (See CITY HALL, page 5.)

## Lease Proposal and Rent Increase Heard

# Council in Flap Over Library

Continued location of Tawas City's new library-fire hall annex in a rented building south of the Tawas River bridge, occupied only since January 19 and at an expenditure to the city of \$3,600 for renovation, is now in question.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz told members of the city council Monday night that he had been contacted by Edwin Johnson of Grand Blanc, who proposes to lease the building from its present owner, Robert N. Rollin, a member of the

city council. According to Bublitz, Johnson proposes a three-year lease for the building at a cost of \$275 per month. The city presently leases the building for \$225 a month from Councilman Rollin. In addition,

Johnson said the proposed new three-year lease would require the city to provide maintenance of the driveway.

Upset members of the council expressed displeasure over the proposal. Coun. Jerry Cotter expressed the opinion that the council would never have expended \$3,600 on the building if the city was only going to occupy the building for 90 days. He felt that if the rent does not remain at the agreed rate of \$225 per month, he felt Rollin should reimburse the renovation cost to the city.

"This is a flimflam—we may have to go to court over the matter," said Cotter. "I don't think under the trusteeship of a city councilman you can operate that way."

Other councilmen expressed the same opinion and Coun. Charles Landon said he did not believe the building was worth \$275 a month.

Councilman Rollin said that he had pointed out the possibility that the building might be sold and asked the council to lease the building (See LIBRARY, page 5.)

**Annual Equalization Report  
Due Commissioners April 11**

Annual equalization report for real and personal property is to be presented April 11 to the county board of commissioners by John Rose, tax equalization director.

Rose said Thursday that his department is currently auditing books of the various boards of review in each assessing unit and the final report is not expected to be completed for another week.

Judging from rough draft figures for three units, total real estate in Iosco County should show an increase of less than \$10,000,000 when the report is submitted to commissioners.

Emphasizing that the figures he was quoting were only preliminary and that he probably would meet with several assessing officers to question losses before making his final report, Rose noted increases in real estate valuations of \$340,650 at East Tawas, \$707,460 at Tawas City and \$886,800 for Oscoda Township, to name only three of the assessing units.

East Tawas' tentative total for real estate is \$14,817,650, as compared to \$14,577,650 last year. Personal property totaled \$996,230, as compared to \$987,520 last year, with a new grand total of \$15,565,170.

Tawas City's board of review brought in a total of \$11,060,335 for real estate, as compared to \$10,352,875 last year. Personal property totaled \$1,361,670, as compared to \$1,228,890 last year, for a new grand total of \$12,422,005.

The board of review at Oscoda Township brought in a figure of \$41,336,648 for real estate, as compared to \$40,559,848 a year ago. Personal property totaled \$3,435,430, as compared to \$3,245,523, for a new grand total of \$44,772,078.

Ronald Turner, assessing officer for Tawas City and East Tawas, reports that new construction in real estate in Tawas City included \$629,300 in commercial, \$60,000 for industrial and \$169,060 in residen-

tial. Commercial personal property totaled \$159,060, there was \$25,360 new property in industrial and \$16,960 in the utility category.

Losses in residential real property in Tawas City totaled \$125,900, which resulted when former residential property now used for the

Kroger Store and Manitou Village was transferred to commercial. Additional property exempted included the city's purchase of the Lubaway property at the river mouth, additional property for the hospital and additional property for a church.

New construction at East Tawas included \$38,600 in commercial and \$281,800 in residential. New personal property included \$39,510 in the commercial category and \$16,980 in utilities.

Turner said that a \$79,900 loss in residential included exemptions for three houses owned by the federal government under FHA totaling \$30,000. The remainder was for fire loss and change in categories.

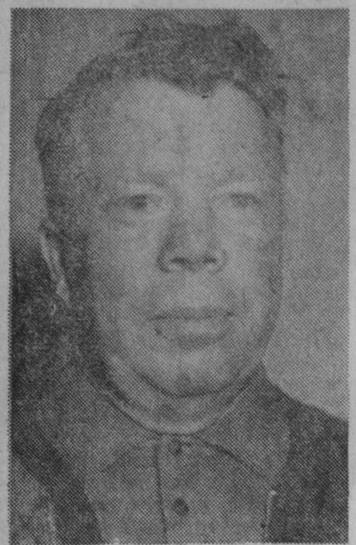

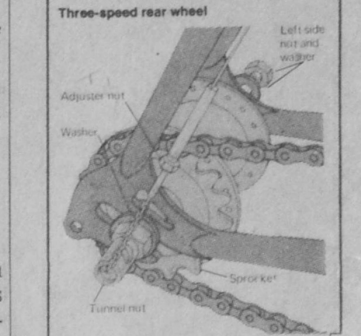

## REPAIRING YOUR BIKE

You can keep your bike safe to ride, without having to take it in to be serviced every time there's a problem, if you know a few simple rules of general care. One procedure you should learn is how to change the rear wheel on a three-speed bike.



## THREE SPEED REAR WHEEL—Learning how to change this wheel is easier than you think.

First, turn bike upside down. Then disconnect adjuster nut and loosen left side nut and tunnel nut. Push away fender braces and lift axle from its slots. Free chain from sprocket.

To remount, loop chain on sprocket and slide axle into slots. Pull the wheel back until chain has 1/2-inch play; finger-tighten nut on left. Then center wheel, tighten nuts and connect adjuster.

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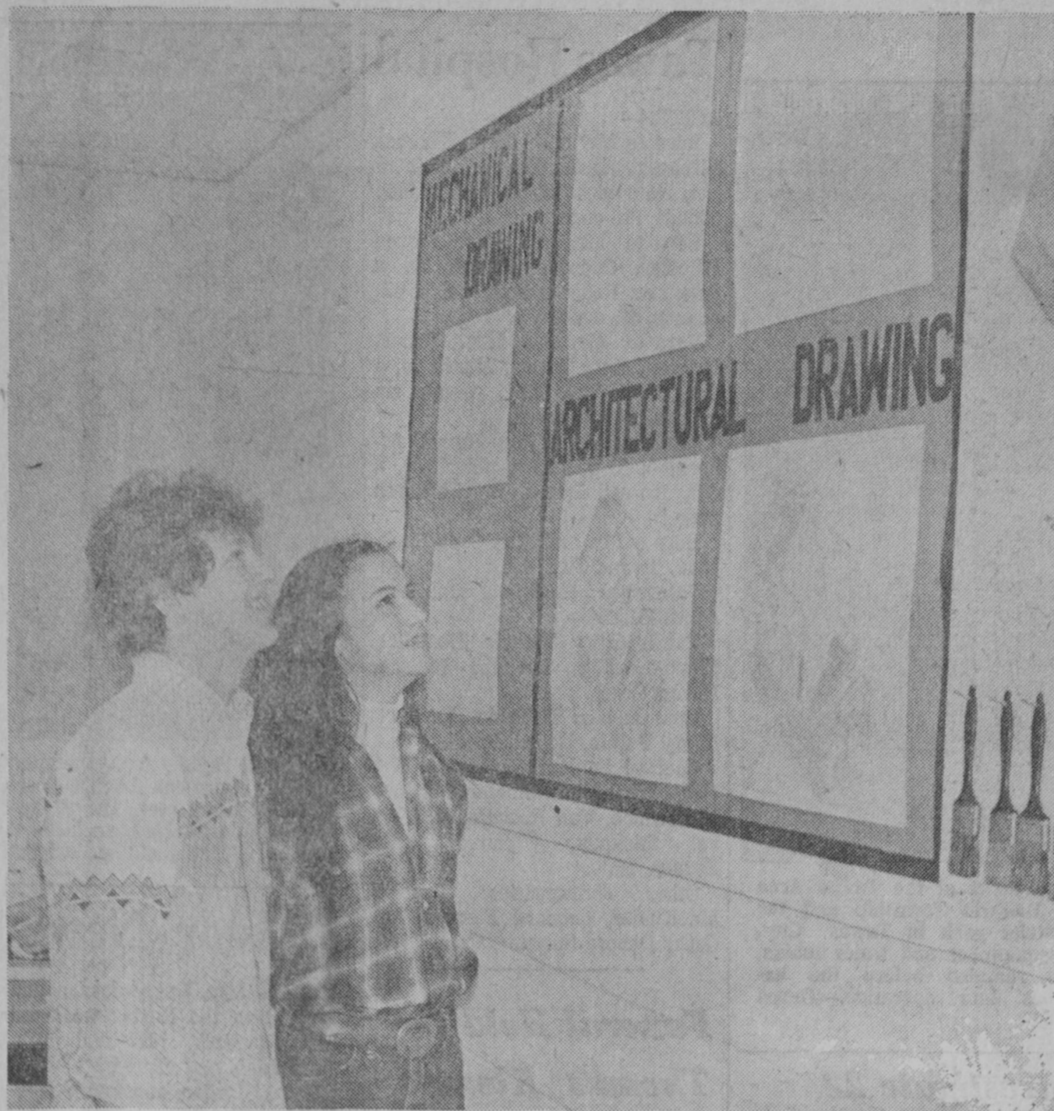

**MAPLE SYRUP TIME**

It is sugaring off time for Michigan. Now is the time producers trudge through mud and woods to collect sap for maple syrup.

Michigan maple syrup is more than a tasty topping for French toast or ice cream. The crop is important to the whole state since each year maple syrup contributes about one point, two-million dollars to Michigan's economy.

Though maple syrup is the most expensive sweetener on the market, it is a favorite of pancake eaters everywhere. Research is under way to help reduce energy costs and increase efficiency of production methods.

Current weather will determine if 1978 becomes a vintage year for Michigan maple syrup. Warm days and cool nights are ideal for good quality sap. Maple syrup grades can vary from light colored, sweet tasting fancy grade syrup to dark colored, caramel flavored second grade syrup. Fancy grade often vanishes from store shelves early in the year, so it is advisable that consumers plan to buy it in the spring when it is in abundant supply. The darker second quality syrup is usually in good supply year round.

Maple syrup in sealed containers keeps well at room temperature but should be stored in the refrigerator once it is opened. Syrup by the gallon is the most economical purchase. It is wise to remove it from the can, heat it to boiling and then seal it in smaller, sterilized glass jars.

If the syrup should mold slightly, it can be restored. Rather than discard it, skim off the mold, heat the syrup to boiling point and skim again.

Remember—this is syrup season, but you can enjoy it year round!

**TC Industrial Tax Exemption Hearing**

A hearing is to be held Monday, April 17, to provide an opportunity for taxing units affected to discuss a proposed industrial facilities exemption certificate for Tawas Industries, Incorporated.

The Tawas City Council approved the firm for an industrial exemption certificate last month during a hearing held for approving similar exemptions requested by Tawas Plating, Bopp-Busch Manufacturing Company and Crew Products.

Under provisions of the 1974 act, the state law is designed to maintain existing jobs and create new job opportunities for Michigan citizens by granting tax benefits to companies wishing to rehabilitate obsolete industrial facilities or to build new industrial facilities.

Those firms approved by the local unit and the state tax commission are exempted from ad-

valorem property taxes for a period of 12 years, a 100 percent exemption for replacement under a rehabilitation district and 50 percent of the value under new construction.

Rachel McCready, city clerk, said that a new public act became effective February 28 and permits the taxing unit to exempt property for 12 years or less, but the council felt that the application from Tawas Industries, Incorporated, should not be treated differently than those approved recently.

In other business, the council approved a \$100 contribution to Tawas Area Chamber of Commerce to promote the annual Brown Trout Derby.

The annual fee for boat launching was raised from \$7.50 to \$10, but the daily fee for use of the city facility on Ninth Avenue is to remain at \$2.

On recommendation of the parks and recreation board, Boynton St. James was named by the council to fill a vacancy on that board.

On recommendation of Coun. Jerry Cotter, the council is to bill owners 150 percent of volunteer fire department fees when the department answers a car fire. Actual cost of answering four car fires last month was more than \$150 each.

for commercial development of the 500 block, but little had been accomplished as yet. He felt that development of the city hall complex would provide impetus for commercial development to follow.

Cotter said that consideration was being given to a special warning light on US-23 to permit entry of fire trucks. He indicated that a preliminary sketch for the complex could be ready in about one month. Cotter felt that a long-term, low-interest loan from FHA could be obtained for the project.

Preliminary plans for a city hall complex were developed last year when an application was made for federal funds. One of the sites suggested at the time was the present baseball field on North Street. Tawas City's application, like most others in Northern Michigan, was lost in the shuffle when major funding went to metropolitan areas.

Ground was broken for the present city hall in September 1924, and electrical service has been renovated in recent years. At various times, the city has given consideration to replacement of the front and doors, along with a general rehabilitation.

The adjacent property, owned by Audrey Adamek, was obtained by the late Henry Kane and the late Charles Curry when the former Charles Whittemore property was sold for delinquent taxes in the 1920s. It had been the site of a large home owned by the son of the founder of the city.

Kane built the present residence west of the city hall and Curry constructed a residence to the east, the property now being occupied by Myles Insurance building. Kane and Curry sold the present city hall site to the city in 1924, and the present building replaced the old city hall on Mathews Street.

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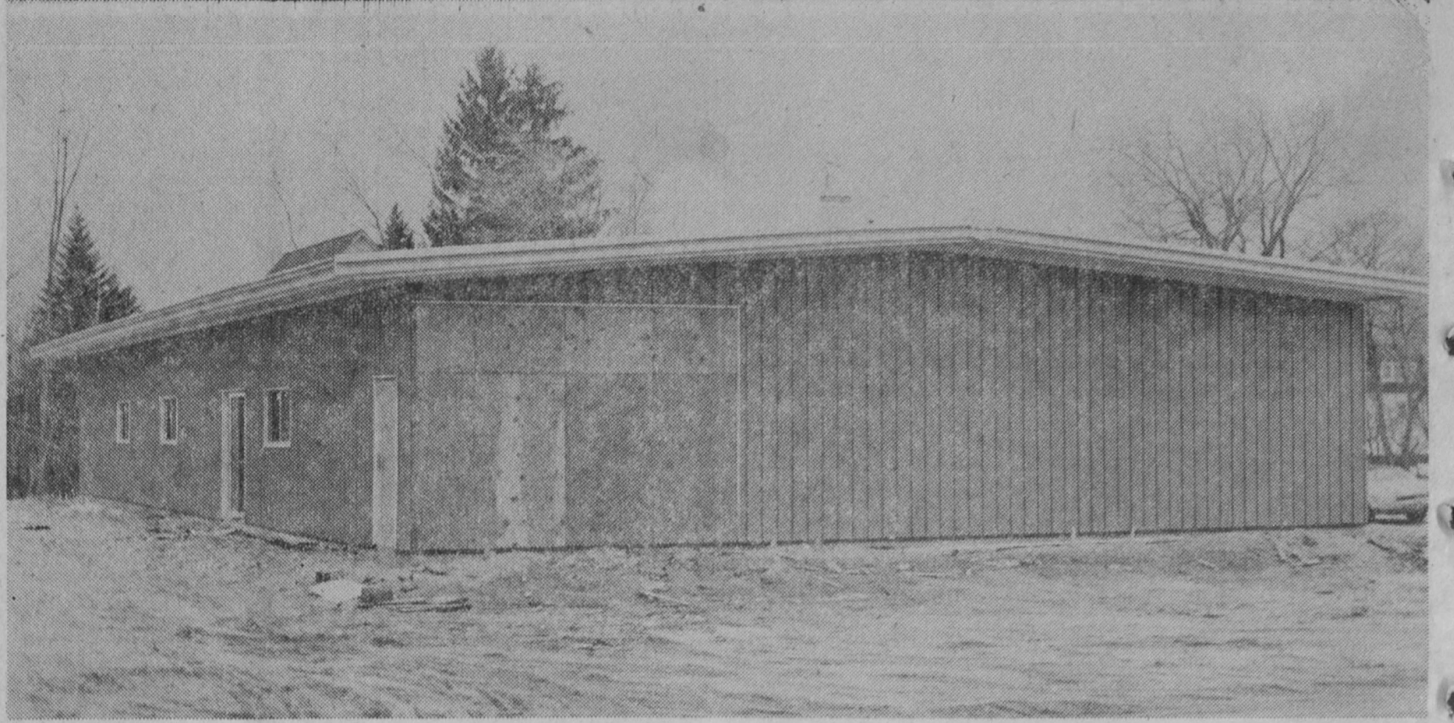

## TA Chamber of Commerce Held Quarterly Meeting

A quarterly general breakfast meeting of Tawas Chamber of Commerce was held Thursday morning at Tawas Golf and Country Club with 26 members present.

Richard Stevens, chamber president, and Roger Jackson, executive director, outlined activities of the organization for the past year.

Reports were given on the annual Brown Trout Derby which is scheduled to start April 8 on Tawas Bay, along with an old fashioned Fourth of July celebration. It was announced that a fireworks display will be held at the city park in Tawas City on Monday, July 3, and plans are being made to hold a parade, band concert, barbecue and other attractions over the weekend.

Steven Sonoga, chairman of Tawas Area Winter and Summer (TAWAS), reported that members of TAWAS would soon give consideration to efforts of promoting business and the Tawas under the chamber of commerce rather than to have a separate dues paying organization for this purpose.

As a businessman and a member

of both the chamber of commerce and TAWAS, he said it had become apparent to him that, if the Tawas area's total business climate is to improve, "it will take more than a minority of the tourist oriented businesses (members of TAWAS) to promote the Tawas as a tourist attraction."

In February, the board of directors of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce unanimously approved a motion to "set a firm pattern at board meetings to direct our efforts towards goals in the areas of industry, tourism and community relations at each meeting."

Sonoga said a study of the tourist and resort business indicated that 70 percent of the annual receipts from lodgings in this area were received during four months of the year while the remaining 30 percent of the lodging business was scattered among the remaining eight months. He felt that something should be done to offer and promote chamber of commerce sponsored activities and attractions to bring more tourists during the off months.

He said that the chamber had begun to promote tourism through its Brown Trout Derby and supported other tourist attractions or promotions. "It just makes more common sense to me to bring all of the efforts of promoting business and the Tawas under the organization whose responsibility it is and the organization all businesses should support—the Tawas Chamber of Commerce," said Sonoga.

Recently, Sonoga, was appointed chairman of the chamber of commerce tourism committee. He proposes that TAWAS members and other interested persons work directly with and through the chamber tourism committee, eliminating duplication of membership dues in two organizations.

The above matter is to be discussed by TAWAS members at a meeting to be held Thursday, April 6, 7:30 p. m., at Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish Hall.

Reports were also heard on progress toward influencing the state toward widening US-23, called the "lifeline for our future."

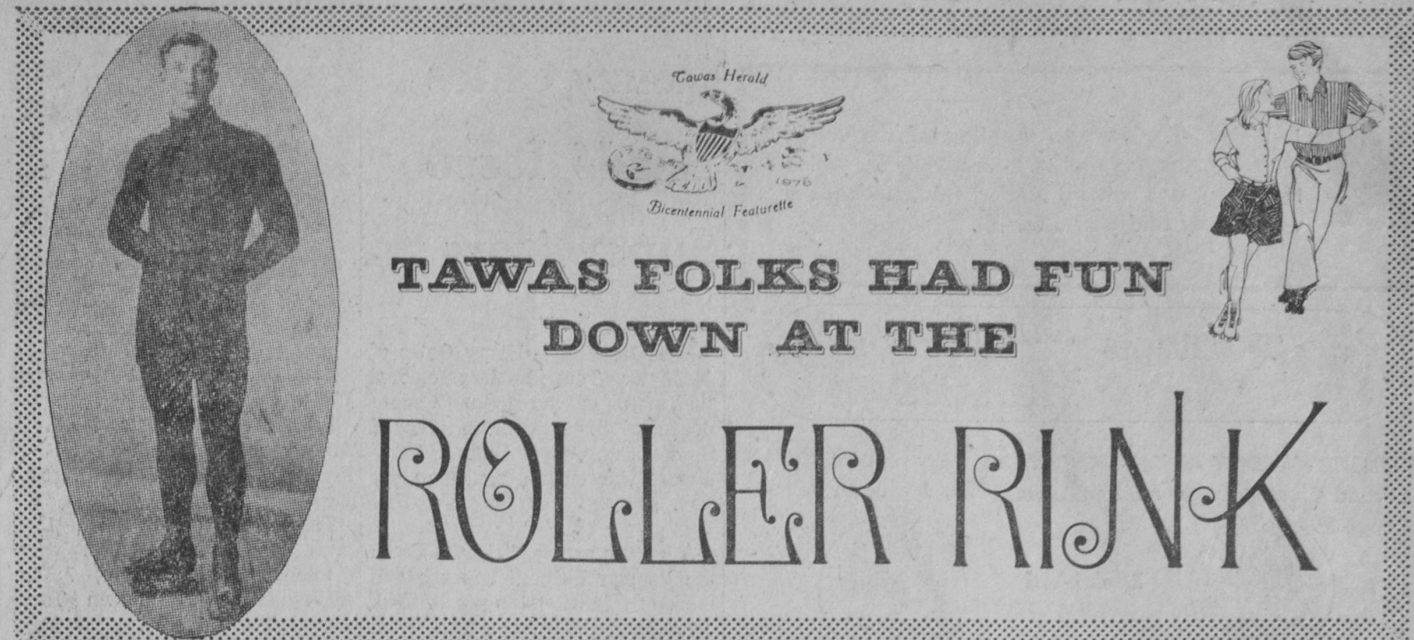

Wessels, district manager for Consumers Power Company. He urges parents and school officials to warn youngsters of the dangers of flying kites near electric power lines.

Wessels also has the following suggestions to help kite flyers of all ages avoid trouble: Use dry string, not wire or anything metallic to fly a kite; make certain the kite has no metal parts, wood and paper are the safest materials; fly a kite when it is not raining and the ground is dry; fly a kite far away from electric power lines; avoid busy streets and highways.

Finally, Wessels says, call the electric utility if a kite gets snagged in a power line. Do not pull the string or climb utility poles.



## TAWAS FOLKS HAD FUN DOWN AT THE

# ROLLER RINK

AL MOORE, a world champion roller skater, shown at left, appeared at the Palace Roller Rink, East Tawas, shortly after it

was opened at East Tawas in 1914. The Palace is believed to be the first roller rink in the Tawas.

Although the origin of roller skating is uncertain, a man demonstrated a pair of skates he invented in 1760 and an American invented an improved skate in 1863 which led to establishment of rinks across the country.

Today, the United States has more than 4,000 roller rinks and about 20-million Americans enjoy roller skating every year.

Roller skating has had alternate periods of popularity and disfavor and the Tawas area would be a typical example. Although there is no rink located here today, roller skating provided entertainment during four different eras of the area's history.

The earliest rink in the Tawas which can be recalled is the Palace Roller Rink west of the present-day William Look and Sons Garage on East Westover Street, East Tawas.

Constructed by Loren Klenow in 1914, the Palace only operated for about two years. During its brief existence, it was promoted through the visit of Al Moore, "the undisputed world champion roller skater," on February 11, 12 and 13, 1915.

According to advertising in both The Tawas Herald and The Iosco County Gazette, Moore presented a program each night with chair jumping, standing and skating high jumps, see-saw balancing act, blindfolded barrel jumping and a "slide for life" with a wheelbarrow.

Despite the promotional efforts by Moore, roller skating never really "caught on" and the business venture was a disaster. Among East Tawas residents who recall the Palace are R. E. McElheron and James McGuire.

When this roller rink closed, the community was again without skating facilities, but only for about four years as Benjamin Sawyer opened a roller rink in his new concrete block building on Lake Street, Tawas City.

A note in the December 24, 1920, issue of The Tawas Herald stated:

"Benjamin Sawyer opened his new roller skating rink in this city

last Saturday evening and has been enjoying a good patronage the past week. Mr. Sawyer has a splendid building which can be utilized for many purposes. During the winter, he will continue to operate the skating rink."

The building, located adjacent to present-day Lad's Padd, had replaced a frame building destroyed during the fire of 1919, which wiped out most of the business district from Mathews Street east to the former Iosco Hotel.

Old-timers of the community remember Sawyer's Hall as a popular meeting place for all ages. A player piano equipped with percussion instruments provided music for skating and an old ship's bell was rung when the management wished the skaters to change directions. Dances were also held there and it served as a meeting place for various organizations.

One of the persons remembering the Sawyer Hall is Arthur Stark of Tawas City, a retired carpenter.

Stark was a powerfully built speed skater in his day and helped in the management of the roller rink for about three seasons. During that time, he defended his local speed skating record by competing against all challengers, including such local speedsters as "Chum" Klenow, Robert Toska and Nelson Sawyer, son of the roller rink owner. Stark never lost a race, which comprised 14 speed laps around the rink.

"I had mastered the trick of cutting sharp corners on that small 40 by 80-foot rink and had the advantage against local challengers and others coming from Alpena, Bay City and Saginaw," recalled Stark.

In addition to meeting all challengers, Stark also assisted the owners by teaching youngsters how to skate.

In 1923, Stark moved to Detroit and once won a free-for-all racing contest at the Old Palace Gardens Roller Rink. "I rode the street car home to the house where I was boarding carrying a 16-pound live

goose which I won in the contest. Everyone enjoyed a good goose dinner," he recalled.

Because of those periods of popularity and disfavor which controlled the roller skating business, one side of Sawyer's Hall alternated as a pool room operated by John Lansky and the other side served as a restaurant and grocery store at various times. It was later occupied by Tuttle's Hardware and the building was destroyed by fire in the early 1960s.

During the 1930s, a roller skating rink was operated briefly at Tawasville, now known as the Buckhorn, and the Edgewater Pavilion at East Tawas was used briefly as a rink. Leslie's Social Center served as a roller skating rink at Whittemore.

There was no skating here until 1948, when Mr. and Mrs. Warren Haddix constructed the East Tawas Rollerdom on Newman Street.

Establishment of the East Tawas rink saw a tremendous growth in the popularity of local roller skating activities for a number of years until the sport again entered a period of disfavor.

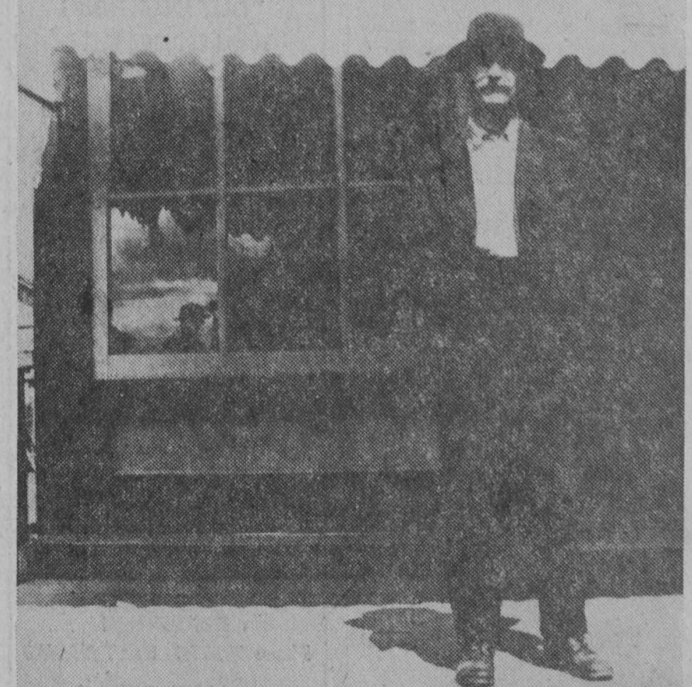
The East Tawas Rollerdom remained idle for a number of years until it was purchased by the Tawas Council, Knights of Columbus, and now serves as the organization's hall.

Today, roller skating is a thing of the past in the Tawas area, although Ruth's School of Dance conducted by Mrs. Louis Klish of East Tawas, carries on the tradition by training youngsters to skate on wheels.

At Oscoda, the military provides a roller skating rink in a former hangar at Wurtsmith Air Force Base. Even the sidewalk variety of roller skating has become a thing of the past and only rarely does one see youngsters enjoying this once popular sport.

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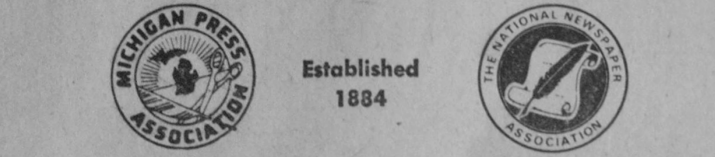
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# Henry Oates Heads Iosco Supervisors

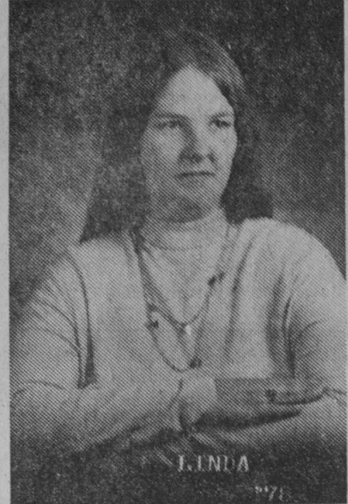

## People Should Apply For SS Number Early

Many people who need a social security number for a job or other reasons, may find they have a problem because they did not apply for their number soon enough, a social security representative said today.

People do not realize they cannot just walk into a social security office and have a number issued on the spot. It takes time, the spokesperson emphasized. A person should apply for his or her number at least 4 weeks before it will be needed.

Because evidence of age, identity, and citizenship or alien status is required, a person can speed up the process if he or she has this needed information when applying.

Examples of evidence a person born in the United States can submit include:

For age and citizenship: A

birth certificate or church record of baptism is preferred, but school record, church record, State or Federal census record, insurance policy, marriage record which shows age and date of birth, military discharge papers, delayed birth certificate, draft card, U.S. passport, or any other record showing age or date of birth can be used.

For identity: Driver's license, State identity card, voter's registration, school identification card, work badge or building pass, draft card or military ID, U.S. passport or U.S. identity card, credit card if signature shown, library card with signature, or any other document showing either signature or photograph.

Naturalized U.S. citizens can bring their U.S. passport,

Naturalization certificate, U.S. citizen identity card, certificate of citizenship, or consular report of birth.

Aliens should bring one of the following: Alien registration card I-151, U.S. Immigration Form I-94, AR3a, I-186, I-185, SW-434, I-95a, or I-184.

Photocopies are not acceptable and all documents submitted will be returned. The spokesperson emphasized that all documents are subject to verification.

Additional information and applications for a social security card can be obtained at any social security office. The address and telephone number of the nearest social security office can be found in the telephone directory under "Social Security Administration."

## Preparation Speeds Application for SSI

People who plan to apply for supplemental security income (SSI) payments can help speed up the application process if they get certain information together beforehand, a social security spokesperson said today.

SSI is the Federal program that provides monthly cash payments to people in financial need who are 65 or older, or blind, or disabled. The basic monthly Federal payment is \$177.80 for an individual and \$266.70 for a couple. Some people receive less because of other income or their living arrangements, while others receive more because they live in a State which adds to the Federal payments.

The representative also

pointed out that it makes no difference how old or young a person is to become eligible for SSI payments because of disability or blindness.

The kind of information needed to process an SSI claim, includes the following:

- Proof of age, unless the person already gets social security checks.
- The latest tax bill or assessment notice if the person owns a house or other real estate.
- The latest rent receipt if the person pays rent, or information showing how much the person contributes toward maintaining the household.
- Bank books, insurance policies, and other papers that show what the person owns.
- Pay slips or other papers that

show the person's other income.

If the person is applying because of blindness or disability, he or she should also have the names, addresses and telephone numbers of doctors, hospitals, institutions, or clinics that provided treatment for the condition and the dates the person was treated.

More detailed information about the eligibility requirements for SSI payments can be obtained at any social security office. The address and telephone number of the nearest social security office can be found in the telephone directory under "Social Security Administration."

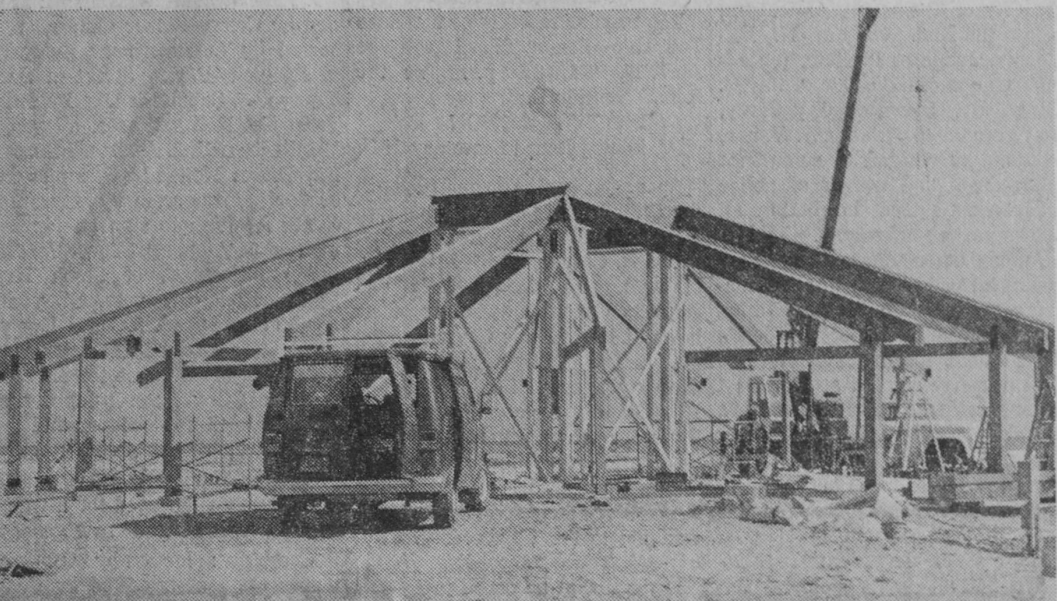
