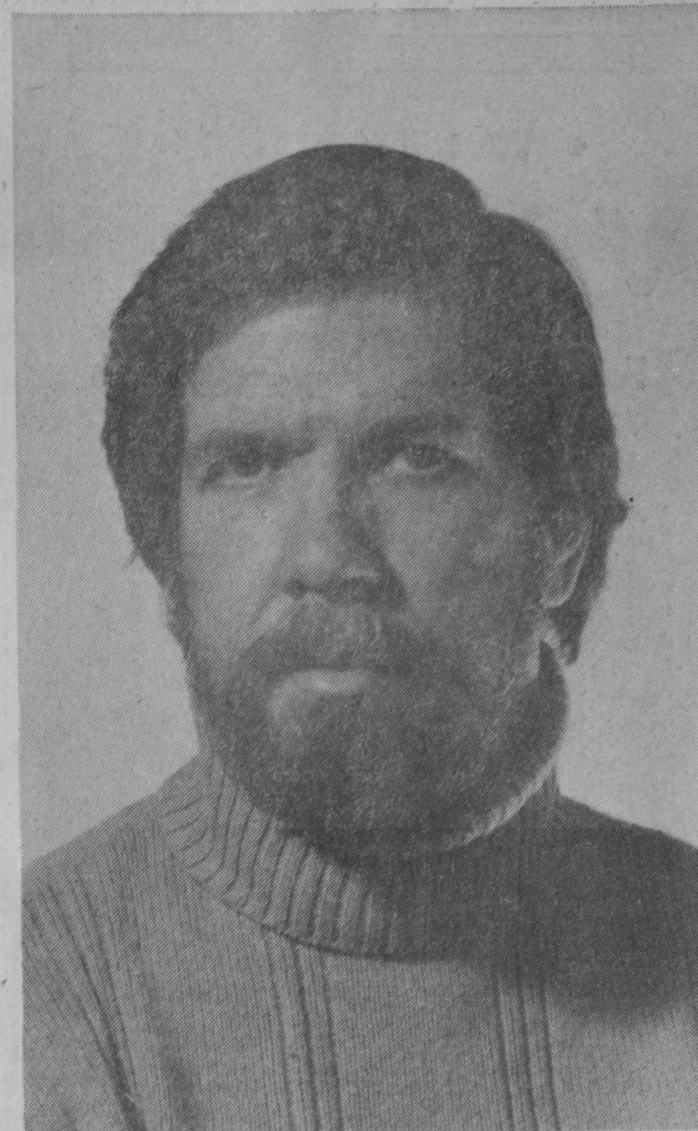




## Larry J. Blovits is Judge for 18th Annual Art Show

# Waterfront Art Show This Week-End

Eighteenth annual two-day Tawas Bay Waterfront Art Show will be held Saturday and Sunday at the Tawas City Park and Iosco County Building.

Hours are from 9:00 a. m. to 9:00 p. m. on Saturday and 9:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. on Sunday.

This show has gained the reputa-

tion of being one of the top summer attractions in Michigan, with its beautiful setting on Tawas Bay. The show is open to all amateur and professional artists and craftsmen, exhibiting only original items of their own design.

Included are original drawings and paintings, handmade jewelry,

sculpture, pottery and ceramics, silk screen print making, photography, hand tooled leather, macramé, batik, weaving and creative candles.

The show is limited to 225 exhibitors and work of artists is to be juried and limited by categories. More than 200 exhibitors have registered from Michigan, Ohio,

Florida, Arizona, Wisconsin and other states.

This show annually attracts upwards of 3,000 visitors and parking lots are jammed in the area

both Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

Awards, ribbons and cash prizes are to be presented to exhibitors Sunday afternoon.

## East Tawas Ready to Transfer Land

A map and description of lake front property owned by the City of East Tawas which is to be turned over to the state for development of a new boat ramp is to be considered at next Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council.

City Atty. Michael Freel is to prepare a deed for transferring the city's rights to the state. The matter is currently being studied by the council's lands and buildings committee.

The deed is to have a provision which will see the land revert back to the city in the event the property is not used for a boat ramp.

This project has been under consideration for a number of years and has run into numerous stumbling blocks during that time.

The above property comprises the parcel east of the Michigan State Police Post to include the parking lot on the west side of Hester's Market. A portion of the property was once the location of the municipal sewage disposal plant and the eastern portion was the location of Anderson Coach Company.

The main building of the former Anderson Coach Company was destroyed by fire a number of years ago and the concrete structure along the east side of Wadsworth Street once served as the coach company's warehouse.

The above building presently serves as the city garage and is to

be eventually demolished for the boat launching ramp and parking project. The city is to secure new quarters for a department of public works garage.


City Clerk Clyde Soper said Tuesday morning that the only detail to be worked out now was approval of lake bottom land transfer from Gordon MacAndrew to the city and then for the city to transfer it to the State of Michigan.

MacAndrew had a lifetime lease on the lake bottom land when he used the former Lake Huron Fish Company's dock and fish house for his party boat headquarters. He later retired from business, but still held a lifetime lease on the lake bottom.

In order to resolve the matter of utilizing the property for a boat ramp, the city purchased MacAndrew's rights, with the intention of turning the property over to the state.

Soper said the city had received no word recently regarding approval of the transfer and said local officials were to contact the Michigan Department of Natural Resources to learn of any progress.

The above problem seems to be the only thing blocking development of the boat launching facility, which is to be completely owned and operated by the state. The project is to be constructed in stages as money becomes available through Bureau of Outdoor Recreation funding, which is administered by the DNR.

## Fair's Fat Stock Sale Proved Winner for Iosco Youngsters

Bidding in Saturday's fat stock sale at the Iosco County Fair was slightly below that of last year, but young stock raisers who had worked hard for months in raising livestock were rewarded with some excellent prices paid for cattle, lambs and swine.

Bidding was active in the arena and the top price of \$2 per pound paid by Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Hale went to Shelly Perrin of Prescott for her 1,180-pound grand champion steer.

The reserve champion steer weighing 1,155 pounds brought \$1.60 per pound to Dennis Prescott of Prescott, purchased by McIntosh-McKay Sales.

Connie Robinson of Reno Township had the grand champion steer for showmanship, weighing 1,105 pounds, while Joseph Klepinski of Prescott was awarded a trophy for his junior grand champion steer for showmanship, weighing 1,340 pounds.

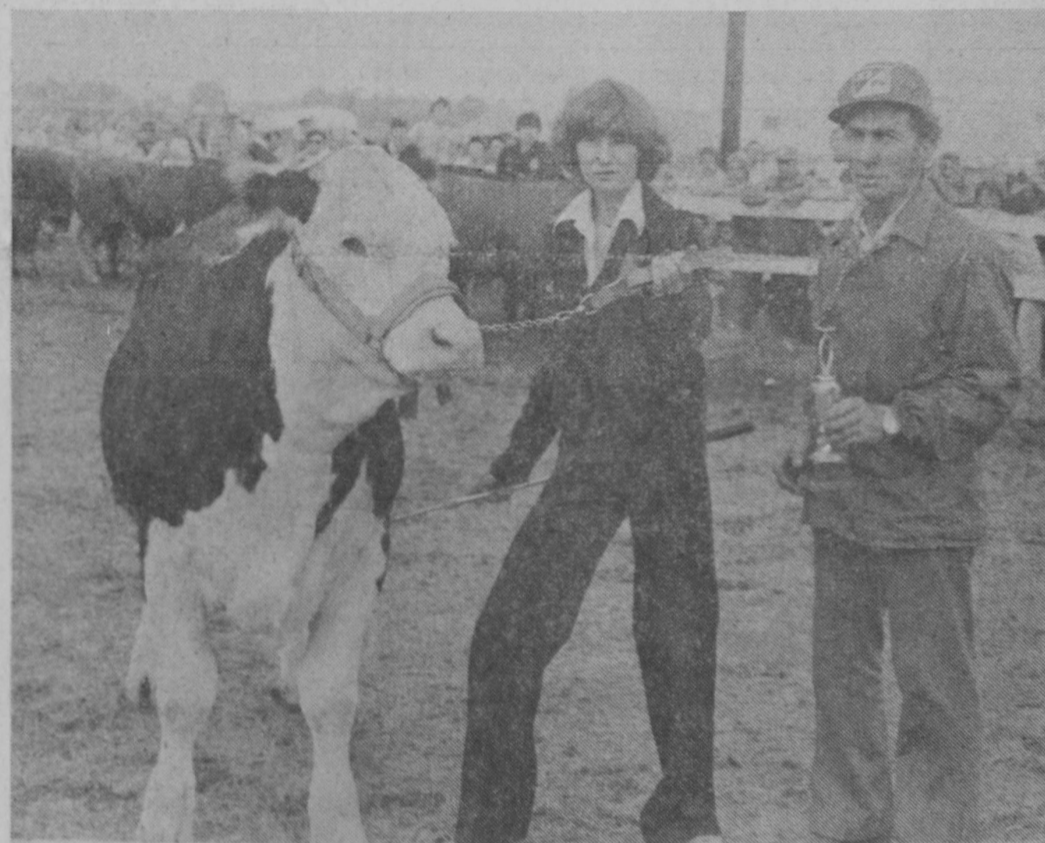
Darrell Robinson of Reno Township received a trophy from Mackinac Land and Cattle Company for his 1,340-pound steer, which registered the best weight gain.

Auctioneer Kay Siegrist, who last year set a state record with \$2.17 per pound paid for the grand champion steer at the Iosco County Fair's fat stock sale, again

handled part of the sale Saturday. Other youngsters entering livestock and selling them at auction were Rod Perrin, Rod Provoast, William Britt, Nancy Britt, David Sievers, Wendy Wight, Barbara Erickson, John Franklin, Sheryl Robinson, William Walls, Jeff Clark, David Mervyn and Chris Sievers.

All of the youngsters were winners in this event, which drew more bidders than ever and a crowd of around 200 persons at the livestock arena.

Most of the youngsters were members of either the Future Farmers of America chapters or Iosco 4-H Clubs.

## D&M Expects Traffic Increase on Old Penn - Central Tracks

Increased freight traffic between Bay City and Mackinaw City via 105 miles of former Penn Central track was announced last week by the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company.

Local railroad officials issued a word of warning to West Branch

residents and other communities along that route that trains may be traveling through the area during various hours of the day, something which West Branch motorists have not been accustomed to in several years.

The increased service along the former Penn Central route, which the D&M had operated under a state subsidy since 1976 when the PC stopped providing service in

that area, is scheduled to start July 31.

Since 1976, there has been limited train traffic in the West Branch area and most of that was in the early morning hours. The D&M plans to experiment with travel times to see which are the most efficient.

For this reason, railroad officials urged caution when approaching crossings in the West Branch area.

## Grant Expected for Hale Center

Award of a \$49,000 grant in a \$64,500 project to complete the second stage of remodeling at the Hale Area Retirees Center is expected to be made August 18 at Lansing.

Douglas Brown, delegate at large for Hale Area Retirees and the Senior Citizens Corporation, said Saturday that preliminary approval for funding had been received from the 14-county Older Americans Agency.

This application had been in the approval process for the past 1½ years. Earlier this year, the application was denied on grounds that

the center was not ongoing at that time, but it later received top priority from the 14-county agency.

Brown said that the project would finance work remaining on the building, including a kitchen, paneling, carpeting and a recreation area. The center has been serving approximately 900 persons.

Because of the number of persons using the facility, Brown said that plans are being made for expansion.

The building formerly served as the county garage at Hale and was purchased by Plainfield Township.

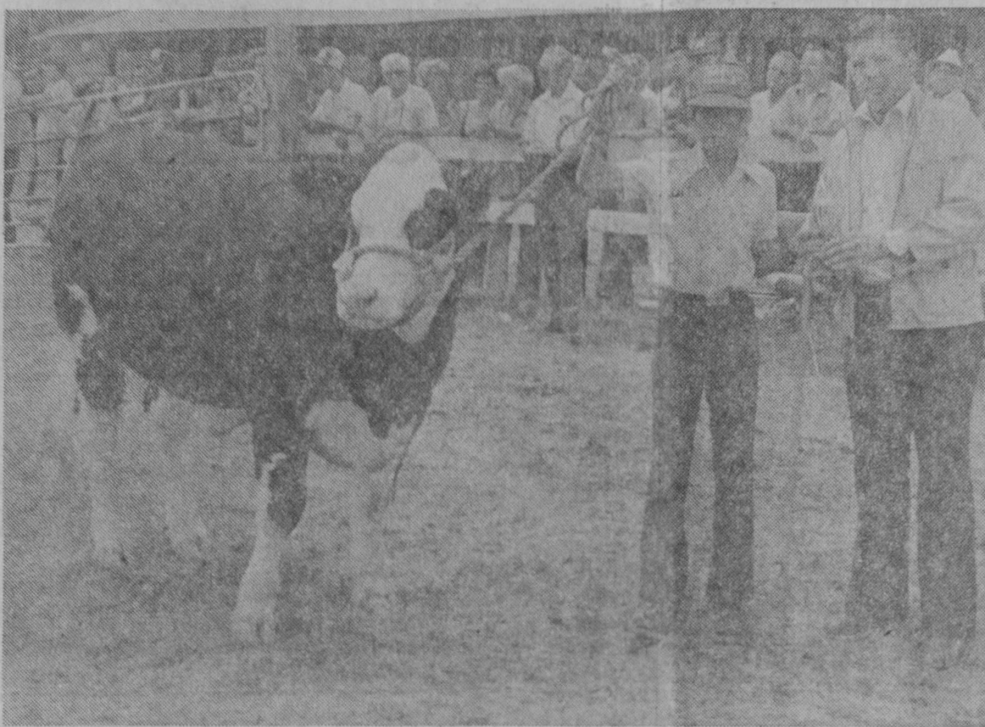

**Iosco Couple Suing Kroger**

An Iosco County couple, Mr. and Mrs. Ronald E. Korthals, have filed a two-count damage suit in circuit court seeking \$90,000 in damages from the Kroger Company.

The plaintiffs allege that Mrs. Korthals slipped on the floor of the Tawas City Kroger store on December 27, 1976, claiming that she sustained an impacted fracture of the neck.

The Korthals claim that the food chain negligently permitted water, ice, snow and slush to remain on the floor of the store. It is further claimed that she sustained great pain and suffering, including permanent loss in range of her right arm.

Mrs. Korthals asks damages of \$65,000 and her husband seeks \$25,000 for loss of service of his wife, loss of society and companionship.

The vandalism complaint was also reported at the Tawas City Elementary Unit. A vehicle was used to snap a safety chain across the front entrance and one window was smashed in a portable classroom.

**What's Wrong with America?**

Not a thing — As a matter of fact, the people living in America today have enjoyed more material blessings than any other society in the history of the world! HOWEVER — We do have some problems that have been accumulating for the past 40 years that we must correct or we're going to lose many of our material blessings and probably some of our freedoms.

We cannot continue to ask or to allow government at any level, federal, state or local, TO DO MORE FOR US, and in many instances, TO US. Nothing that government does for us is free, and usually it is more expensive than if the citizens do the jobs themselves.

Our federal authorities have been able to be good fellows by, in part, operating on a deficit budget, currently at some 750 billion dollars, with an annual interest approaching 50 billion dollars. Incidentally, if we took the complete assets of the entire Rockefeller family, it wouldn't even pay the interest on the national debt for one week!

At the state and local levels we have been imposing a tax burden on people to the extent that there is, in many cases, very little incentive to work productively. As the difference becomes smaller and smaller between the rewards of private, productive employment and that of some easy government give-away program, more and more people will choose the latter.

A recent study has shown that state and local governments have increased 520% in the last 20 years, more than double what the federal government has, and that's too much. Many of these functions are unnecessary, they are often duplications of other agencies, and very often restrict and inhibit the freedoms of citizens rather than help.

I think the people of this state are ready

to accept less of many of these services, and the only way to accomplish this is to limit the amount that government at every level can spend. I completely support tax limitations on property, at the state level, and at the federal level. As a matter of fact, I don't think any limitations will be completely effective unless we can get them at all levels.

Dr. Milton Friedman, a renowned economist, has stated that the one and only cause for inflation is the continual increasing of the money supply by the federal government; the running of the printing presses. He might well add that the reason they're constantly printing more money is that we have tolerated the spending of an increasing amount each year on dubious governmental programs. I think the impetus to get the federal government out of functions that belong at a local level have begun, and if state and local governments will resist the urge to go to Washington with their hats in their hands, we will have made a giant step toward whipping inflation.

If any of this is to work, it is essential that the private enterprise sector make every effort to provide jobs for those currently receiving government subsidies, even at the expense of some automation. It certainly must be better to have people working and producing some amount, rather than pay excessive taxes so that the government can support these same people while they do nothing.

## Former FBI Agent Feted as Outstanding Citizen of Year

Louis L. Wright of 2564 Northeast Drive, Tawas City, professor emeritus of criminal justice and former chairman of the criminal justice department at Monroe Community College, Rochester, New York, was awarded the outstanding citizen award by the Monroe County Law Enforcement Council.

The council is composed of the sheriff and chiefs of all law enforcement agencies of Monroe County. The award was made Friday during graduation ceremonies of the sixth recruit class of the regional criminal justice education and training center.

Wright received the award for his outstanding contributions to the criminal justice system of Monroe County. He retired from Monroe Community College in 1977 after having served as chairman of its criminal justice department.

As chairman, he was instrumental in the establishment of the regional criminal justice training center. He has been credited for providing for the significant expansion of the criminal justice program at Monroe Community College and, in this regard, received the distinguished professor of the year award from Monroe Community College's board of trustees and administration in 1974.

Prior to assuming his position at Monroe Community College, Wright was a special agent with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, serving at Salt Lake City, Utah; Portland, Oregon; Detroit, and also as resident agent in charge of the bureau's office at Bay City.

As special agent in charge of the Bay City office, he was responsible for the investigation of violations of federal laws in Northeastern Michigan.

East Central Michigan's mobile Muse-Hopper museum, which was to have been located at the Tawas City Park this week, has had a change of location.

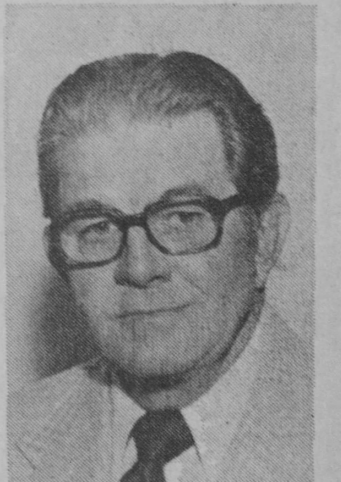
The information-packed exhibit opened Monday at the picnic area of the East Tawas Park. It was also featured at Lumbermen's Monument on Sunday.

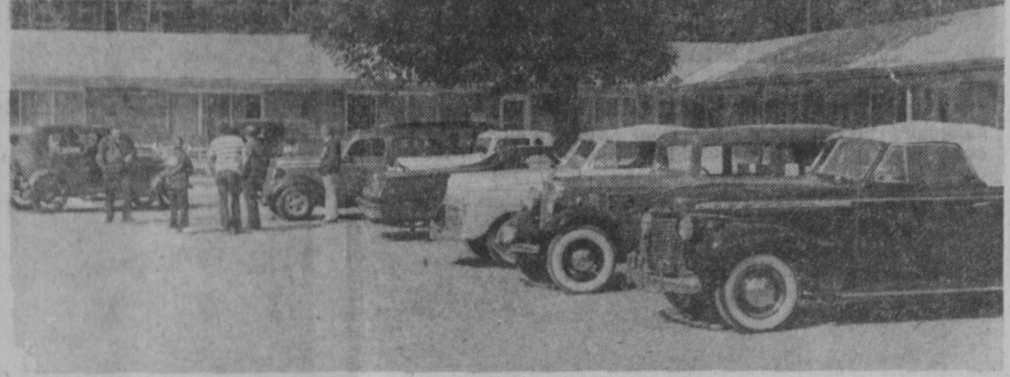
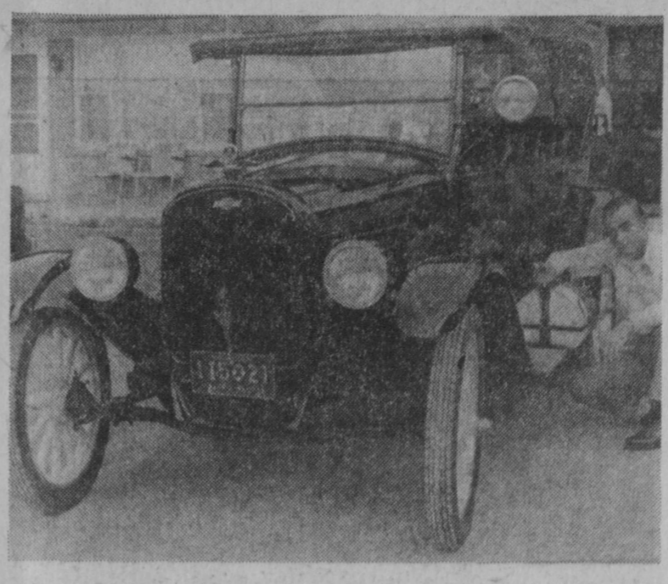

# Election Next Tuesday!

Veteran election officials are predicting that Michigan's primary on Tuesday, August 8, will not bring

out any great turn-out of voters, but it is not for a lack of contests. A look at a proof ballot for the

primary election finds 60 or more candidates listed for office in contests at the national, state, county

and township levels. Some township voters will receive an additional ballot for local propositions.



County Clerk D. Keith Papas reminds voters that this is a primary election where candidates are to be selected by party and winners will square off in the general election in November. For this reason, a voter may only select candidates in one party section of the ballot—an X in front of the square for a candidate in any other section will completely void the ballot.

Starting at the state level, Gov. William G. Milliken is unopposed for renomination by the Republican Party. One of the following four Democratic candidates will be listed on the November general election ballot: Zolton Ferency, William B. Fitzgerald, Patrick H. McCollough and William R. Ralls.

In the congressional section of the ballot, Robert P. Griffin, incumbent senator from Michigan, is being opposed by L. Brooks Patterson, both Republicans. There are six candidates for United States senator listed on the Democratic side of the ballot, including Anthony A. Derezinski, Carl Levin, John R. Otterbacher, Phil Power, Paul A. Rosenbaum and Richard F. VanderVeen.

Seeking to fill the vacancy of Philip Ruppe, 11th District representative in congress, are Edmund

# SAGA OF THE TAWAS BEACH FLYER

For about a decade, Tawas Bay had enjoyed a minimum amount of popularity as a Great Lakes summer resort when the Detroit and Mackinac Railway announced in early 1897 that it planned a major development on Ottawas Point.

Travel to this region had been restricted to passenger steamboats and a narrow gauge railroad connecting with the Michigan Central at Alger prior to 1896, but that year the D&M opened its new route to connect with the Flint and Pere Marquette Railroad.

The first train to reach Bay City traveled over the standard gauge tracks on September 16, 1896, opening through traffic from Detroit to Alpena. Completely new passenger equipment was purchased to modernize what had been a road formerly comprised by a combination of old logging railroads.

"The road bed is as smooth as a race track and makes but one curve between Emery Junction and Bay City and is beyond question the finest piece of railroad in Michigan," bragged The Tawas Herald in its September 18 issue.

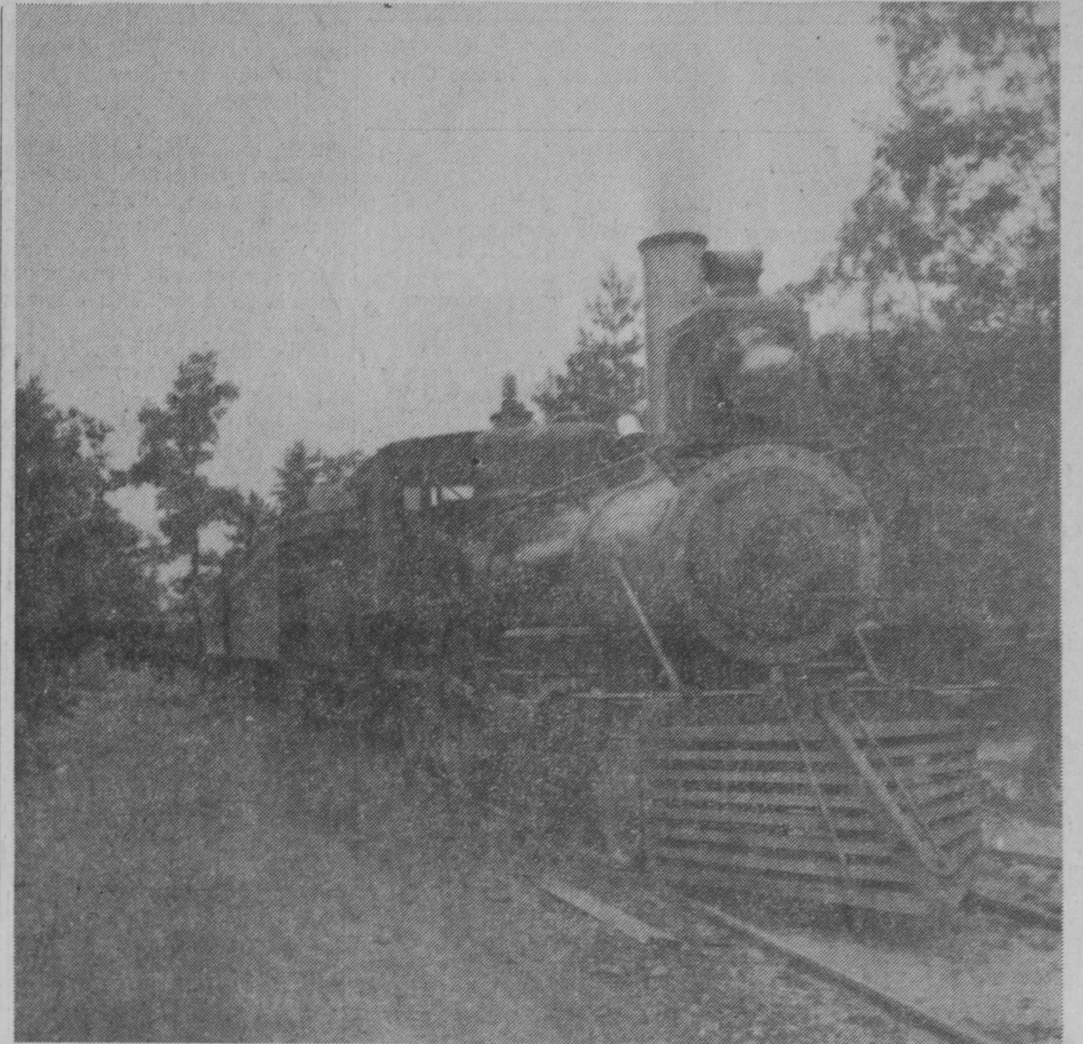
Accompanying newsmen and railroad officials from Northeastern Michigan on that first run was C. M. Garrison, the D&M's advertising manager, who was to play a major role in the development of passenger service into the region. Garrison did not miss a bet in emphasizing the blessings of the new route—he passed out a bushel of apples to the excursionists which had been grown in the Gates orchard near East Tawas.

But the quality of fruit grown in Northeastern Michigan was not to be the bounty which the railroad hoped to harvest through an extensive advertising program. D&M officials had taken stock of what other larger railroads had accomplished in increasing passenger revenue by establishing summer resorts along main lines.

J. D. Hawks, president, an aggressive railroad executive who had been hired by the D&M, felt that times were ripe to develop similar resorts along this railroad. Along with Tawas Beach, Linwood station was moved to a point 1 1/2 miles south of its former location and Linwood Park was established.

It should be remembered that development of the automobile was still only a gleam in the eyes of such dreamers as Henry Ford of Dearborn and the principal means of transportation throughout the land was by railroad.

"Tawas Bay is destined to become one of the most popular summer resorts in the country," commented The Tawas Herald on July 30, 1897. "The new resort grounds of the D&M Railway in the bight of the bay are located in one of the prettiest places to be found anywhere on the Great Lakes. When

there during its heyday. This picture, from an original eight by 10-inch glass plate negative by A. G. Emery, was probably snapped before 1900. The property once comprising the park is included in land now owned by Tawas Beach Club.

the company has finished clearing and fixing them up, no more handsome grounds can be found."

The editor's prediction proved true as 1897 saw a mad rush of Bay City, Saginaw and even Flint residents to the new Tawas Beach Park and all came by way of the railroad, which was to make D&M stockholders extremely happy. There followed a steady stream of Macabees and other fraternal organizations, all bent on enjoying a brief interlude in the north woods.

The first excursion to the new park was on August 18, 1897, when 50 cars in four trains brought nearly 5,000 Bay City grocers and butchers to the new resort grounds on Tawas Bay.

"This was the opening day of what promises to be the most popular resort in Michigan. . . Nothing but praise was heard from the visitors for the effort of the D&M officials in opening up what cannot fail to prove a very popular resort. The grounds are most handsomely located with fine shade. A large pavilion, bath house and dock have

been erected and the grounds are supplied with seats and tables without number."

In its August 6 issue, the Herald noted that "Beautiful Tawas Bay as a racing and cruising ground is fast becoming famous. Hardly a day passes that some steamer or sailing yacht does not enter this port and invariably lingers a day or two and goes away only to regret leaving our waters and pleasant shores." The railroad promoted longer stays by yachters through sponsorship of regattas.

By 1899, President Hawks told stockholders that "prospects for business during the coming year are such as to justify an expectation of a showing that will be even better than for the past year." He noted that the business from new extensions had more than met expectations. "Such new towns as Onaway, Millersburg, Twining and Turner are having a very marked and substantial growth which will be permanent as they are all surrounded by good farming land which is being rapidly settled."

Hawks took particular pride in reporting on the new parks. "The picnic ground at Linwood Park did a good business. Tawas Beach not only did a large excursion business, but branched into a summer resort. The 10 cottages built by the company were all rented for the season and three times as many could have found tenants."

"There was not a day's sickness among the cottagers during the season," noted Hawks. "This resort is the logical summer resort for people from Saginaw and Bay City. Its safe bathing beach, fine groves, splendid boating bay, good fishing and even temperature make it all that could be wished for. A hotel is one of the needs of the place. The road added to its reputation during the year as the hunting and fishing road of Michigan."

The railroad's 1900 annual report indicated that the number of passengers carried by the D&M showed an increase of 48 percent over the previous year, with an increase in passenger revenue of \$60,105.67. "This gratifying increase in the passenger business was largely owing to the success of efforts made to encourage the excursion business. The increased business done at our summer resort and excursion grounds at Tawas Beach being responsible for a large percentage of the increase."

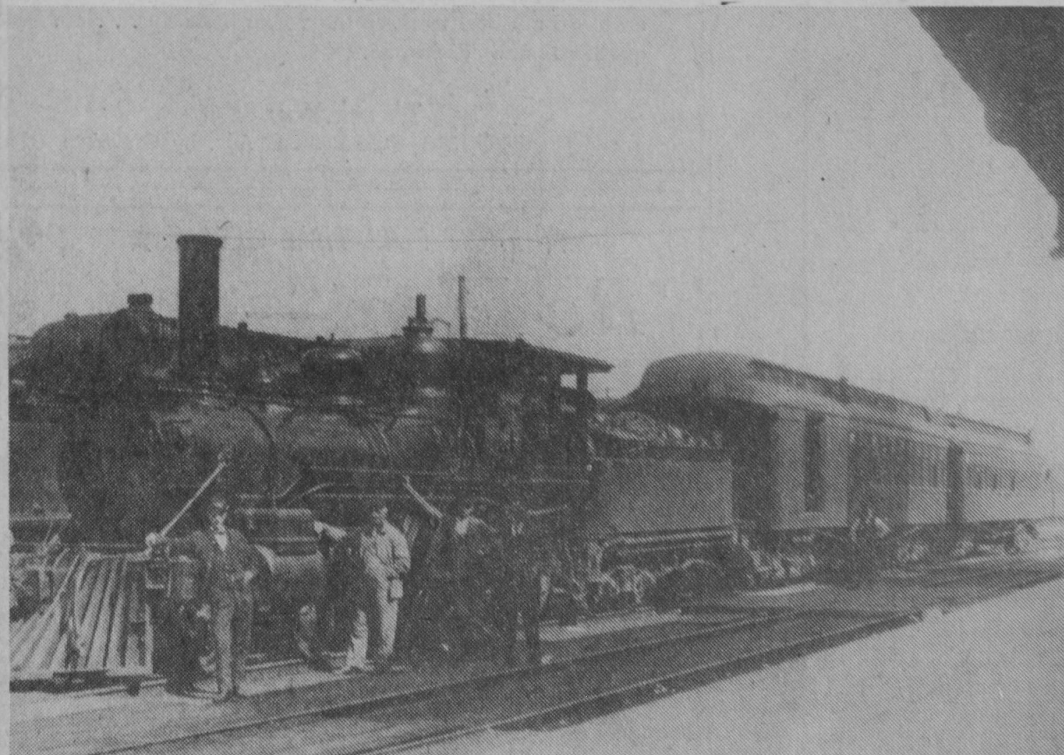
Advertising Manager Garrison left no stone unturned to promote the excursion business on the Huron Shore Line. Colorfully printed timetables and brochures were distributed by the thousands throughout the state telling potential customers of Tawas Beach.

Stated one brochure: "A mile beyond East Tawas, past the factories and mills, away from the noise and turmoil of the town, down in the bight of the bay, is the pride of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway—Tawas Beach."

"Here, the company bought 200 acres of land with three-quarters of a mile of beach. The land was a succession of old lake beaches with lower land between, rising gradually from the lake level to quite a height near the rear of the property, where there is a quick drop to the level of Lake Solitude."

"The land was covered with a beautiful grove of pine and oak, which, fortunately, forest fires had not damaged. The beach was cov-

Primary Election Important! — Iosco Can Point the Way

Voters are urged to knock pre-election predictions into a cocked hat by showing up at the polls on Tuesday, August 8. That is the date for the primary election which will select party candidates for the general election in November.

It is reasonably predicted that not more than 50 percent of Iosco's 14,358 voters will show up at the polls for the primary election. That is the average percentage of voter turnout for the past decade and this county actually runs ahead of the average for the rest of the state.

One thing that may throw the percentage off slightly is the fact that "deadwood" in registration lists—those persons who register to vote but never show up at the polls, remain on the registration lists by supreme court edict.

In the 1976 primary election, 48.69 percent of Iosco's 13,760 registered voters at the time showed up at the polls. Individual units varied with 60 percent of Tawas City's registered voters casting their ballots and 55 percent of East Tawas' registration list showing up at the polls; on the other end of the scale, Plainfield Township's 39 percent was the poorest showing in the entire county. That is not expected in this election as there are important contests at the township level which will add spice to the primary election ballot.

What will happen on election day, however, is unpredictable as voters have notoriously avoided the polls in some primary elections.

For example, Iosco County's primary election of 1972 featured seven candidates for sheriff, four races for county commission posts and contests in eight townships.

Campaigning for office that year went down in the record books as "one of the hottest in history," yet only 48 percent of the total number of registered voters cast ballots.

Primary elections ARE important in our form of government—it is then that the actual party candidates are selected for the general election in November.

It is not too many years ago when local candidates for the general election were chosen by party caucuses and conventions. That system of selecting candidates, which was also used at one time in picking candidates for state offices, was discontinued because a few people could dominate a caucus or convention in a power play. The primary election system was adopted to give all voters an equal opportunity to select candidates for the general election.

The record of the people in primary election participation has not been inspiring; it is time for the people to turn things around by voting. After all, the nominees picked in August could well become the successful candidates in November and who take office on January 1. This year's primary ballot is brimming with candidates.

Let Iosco County show the way to the rest of the state in regard to elections. VOTE AUGUST 8 IN THE PRIMARY.

Races in Five Iosco Co. Townships Add Spice to Aug. 8 Primary Election

Five townships have races in the primary election to be held Tuesday, August 8, and special tax levy proposals are to be placed before voters in three units.

Most of the election excitement at the local level is focused on Alabaster, AuSable, Oscoda, Plainfield and Tawas Townships, each with one or more races for township offices. Elections at this level usually see a number of sticker candidates, so the 1978 vote could be interesting. Township candidates are as follows:

ALABASTER

This unit has one race on the primary ballot and is assured of two races in the November general election. Leona Benson, veteran township treasurer, who has had trouble winning the nomination in primary elections, but has an amazing record of winning as a sticker candidate in general elections, will be opposed by John H. Weible, incumbent and former supervisor, for the Republican nomination.

The candidate winning the nomination will be opposed by Joan J. Lorenz, Democrat, in the general election. The other race already assured for November will be between Alice B. Makinen, Democrat, and Gary Lutes, Republican, candidates for trustee.

Unopposed in the election are Robert H. Crawford, supervisor, Republican; Raymond (Pete) Rescoe, clerk, Republican; Tom Trahey and Harry Wellna, Democrats, constables.

AUSABLE

The Republican side of the ballot in this township is overflowing with contests, but not a candidate filed for the office of trustee. Harold J. McNeill, Raymond A. Andrus and Dale Lamrock Jr. are contending for the Republican nomination as supervisor; Della Schweickert and Paul L. Blumenfeld are Republican candidates for clerk; Marguerite M. Alexander and Calvin McLaren, both Republicans, seek the nomination for treasurer. Donald J. Marcoullier, a Republican, is the lone candidate for constable.

BALDWIN

This township has enjoyed considerable prosperity in recent years and none of the incumbent officers have opposition. Candidates on the Republican side of the ballot are Richter E. Lixey, supervisor; Frieda Rempert, clerk; Joyce A. Klenow, treasurer; Joseph Badalocco, trustee. No Democrats filed for the election.

GRANT

No contests are listed in this election, but interest has been added with a special tax levy proposition. Candidates for re-election are Olen Herriman, supervisor, Democrat; Lucile Blackmore, clerk, Republican; Dale Butzin, treasurer, Republican; Lowell Aspin, trustee, Republican.

Grant Township voters will be asked to renew a special tax levy, two mills for six years to be used as follows: One mill for fire protection, three-quarters of a mill for garbage pickup and one-quarter mill for road and bridge maintenance.

OSCODA

There are two races listed here in the primary election and one contest has been assured for the November general election. Robert K. Foster, former county commissioner who served the past year as township supervisor, will be opposed by William J. Steiert, both on the Republican ticket; Edward J. Tate, Republican, and Stanley L. Kowalski, Democrat, will contend for the clerk's position in the general election; Maxine F. Bissonette, Republican, is unopposed for treasurer; William L. Stone, Delphine A. Weils, Chesley W. Summerville and William C. Christman, Republicans, are contending for three two-year terms of trustee.

PLAINFIELD

Considerable excitement is being

generated in this township with three different races. Ray D. Kesler, Republican, is unopposed for re-election as supervisor; Elizabeth M. (Betty) Timmer, incumbent, is being opposed by Sally Ann Bell for the Democratic nomination of clerk, while Joyce L. Saunders and Shirlee Vee Kesler seek the Republican nomination for the same office; Barbara Malcho, Democrat, is the incumbent treasurer and is unopposed; Lawrence J. Bleeda and Royden Parkinson, incumbent, Democrats, are opponents for the trustee position; Leon L. Brunson and Richard A. Lange, Democrats, are candidates for constable.

RENO

No candidates filed for the office of township supervisor but candidates for other offices include Leonard Robinson, clerk; Winona Redmond, treasurer; Eilert Barnes, trustee; Joseph Barnes, constable, all Republicans. It is expected that the supervisor's slot will be filled by a write-in candidate.

SHERMAN

A write-in candidate is expected

in this township, too, for the supervisor's position. Candidates filing for office are Harold A. Parent, clerk; Harvey E. Smith, treasurer; Michael J. Jordan, trustee, all Democrats.

Sherman voters will be requested to levy one mill of taxes for three years for fire protection.

TAWAS

One race is listed on ballots for this unit. LaVerne J. Koepke, Republican, is unopposed for re-election to the supervisor's position; Katherine Wasyk and John J. Katterman are Republican candi-

County Commission Candidates Lack Primary Opposition

No opposition is anticipated for four Republican candidates seeking nominations to the county board of commissioners in the primary election Tuesday, August 8, but two positions will have opposition from Democratic candidates in the November general election.

The fifth seat on the county board of commissioners was left vacant by the recent death of Jack W. Allen, First District commissioner from Oscoda.

Officials at the Oscoda Township Hall said Thursday that they were unaware of anyone announcing candidacy as yet for this office. Blank stickers have been pasted in over the name of Allen on the primary election ballot, permitting a voter to write in the name of a candidate. Additionally, in those precincts using machines, a voter will be able to write in the name of a candidate for this office.

Besides filling the vacancy of Allen, there will be at least one more change in the makeup of the county board of commissioners when it convenes for the first meeting of 1979. Joseph Fox, veteran commissioner from Tawas City, announced in May that he would not be a candidate for re-election.

Filing petitions as a Republican candidate for the Fourth District seat presently held by Fox was Marian L. Uiman, who presently serves as clerk of Tawas Township.

Other Republican candidates filing for renomination to the board of commissioners in the August 8

primary election are John D. Webb Jr., Fifth District; Carlton Merschel, Third District; David George, Second District.

Democrats filing for nomination to commission seats were Hope Rescoe, Fourth District, and Robert Pember, Fifth District. Mrs. Rescoe presently serves as the Alabaster Township clerk and Pember has been active in politics for many years at Hale.

District No. 1 comprises Oscoda Township east of F-41, part of Wurtsmith Air Force Base, plus that area east of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway tracks to the south of F-41.

District No. 2 includes the easterly two-thirds of the Capehart housing area at Wurtsmith and the area to the south, including part of Northern AuSable Township.

District No. 3 includes AuSable Township except that portion north of old US-23 and west of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway tracks, plus all of Wilber Township, the eastern part of Baldwin Township and the City of East Tawas.

District No. 4 comprises the western half of Baldwin Township, all of Alabaster, Sherman and Burleigh Townships, plus the Cities of Tawas City and Whittemore.

District No. 5 includes all of Reno, Grant and Plainfield Townships, Oscoda Township west of Wurtsmith Air Force Base and the Capehart housing unit west of Mission Drive.

Plan Appointment Seek Applicants for Vacancy on Iosco Commission

Because of the confusing situation at Oscoda relative to filling the vacancy of the late Jack Allen, Iosco County Board of Commissioners is accepting applications from individuals wishing to be appointed to fill Allen's unexpired term for county commissioner from District No. 1.

All applicants must be registered voters living within Precincts 1 or 3 of Oscoda Township and letters of application will not be opened before 10:00 a. m. on Wednesday, August 9, the day after the primary election.

It is necessary to have five members serving on the board of commissioners between now and January 1, 1979, when the new commissioner elected in November will take office. During that interim period the appointee by the county board of commissioners will fill Allen's vacancy.

A notice published by the county board of commissioners is as follows:

"To perform job responsibility, applicant should expect to average up to three days a week plus some evenings on the job. ## TRASH TELLS A TALE

In the United States, garbage is really big business. Three times as much money is spent to get rid of garbage each year than is expended on medical research. This nation generates 70 percent of the world's solid wastes, even though it has only six percent of the world's population.

Those figures may make one wonder whether some of this waste should not be garbage. People in a

research project at the University of Arizona discovered some interesting facts about trash.

The "Garbage Project" started as an exercise in archaeological research. But instead of studying ancient remains, students examined the remains of last week's home life. With help from the Tucson Sanitation Department, students picked over bags of refuse from randomly selected households in different sections of the city and recorded their findings.

The amount of food waste was shocking when the data were analyzed. The average household in the sample was throwing away between seven and 10 percent of the food purchased. If the amount discarded down the kitchen disposal were added, the figures would be greater, nine to 14 percent.

In examining the garbage, researchers found large chunks of food, not just plate scrapings. In fact, more than half the individual food items discovered weighed more than a half ounce. Researchers even found things like a whole TV dinner thrown out.

Much of the dollar value of the waste was meat and other animal protein foods. The largest quantity of wasted food was fruits and vegetables. While the majority of the produce was fresh, a good amount of canned and frozen food also went into the garbage. Next in line were bread and pastry products. Researchers found things like half loaves of bread, cookies and whole sweet rolls.

All of this wasted food means wasted money. The University of Arizona computers said the average two person household in the sample threw away almost \$100 worth of food in 1974. Think of how much fresh food \$100 buys. And think of the value this food could have provided in nourishing a growing child.

The project turned up one fascinating item. Remember the big jump in beef prices in 1973? Well, the amount of beef wasted also went up during that period! Maybe people started hoarding and bought more than could be used efficiently of an item and then threw more away.

Results of the garbage project should make everyone think. Take a look at the refuse in your own home—what do you find? Is it really garbage—or is some of it good food thrown away?

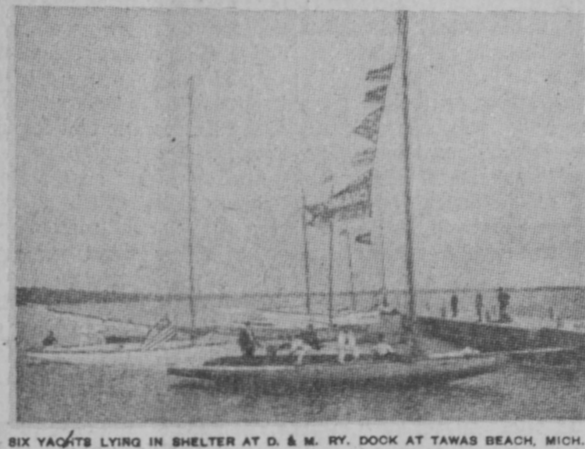

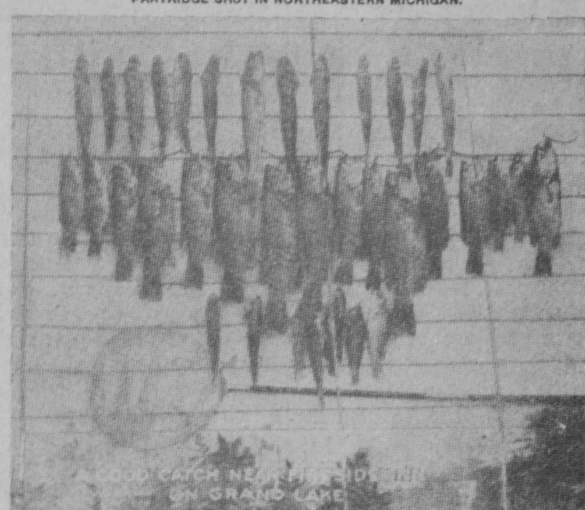
SIX YACHTS LYING IN SHELTER AT D. & M. RY. DOCK AT TAWAS BEACH, MICH.

ONE OF THE CLASSIEST timetables ever printed by the Detroit and Mackinac Railway was issued June 20, 1915. It included 27 pages of information about communities along the Lake Huron Shore Line, pictures of locomotives, stations, schedules of trains, a list of real estate dealers and owners of Michigan lands, a map of the D&M route and its eight different divisions serving

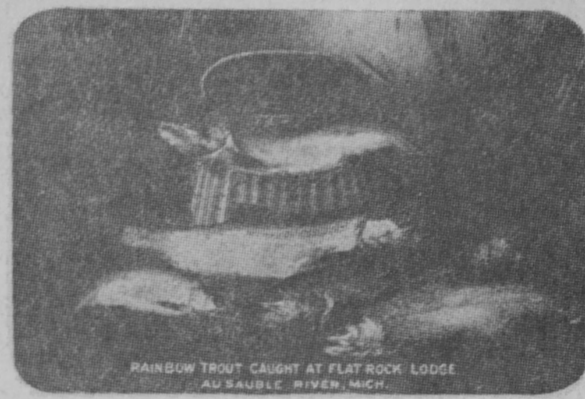
Northeastern Michigan. Featured in the brochure was a picture section showing cottages at Tawas Beach, the Tawas Beach club house and yachts. It also included a list of Michigan summer resorts along its route and pictures promoting hunting and fishing in Northeastern Michigan. "Inexpensive outings and vacations" were the key words in the promotion of the region. Be-

sides J. D. Hawks, general manager, the 1915 list of officers included C. A. Pinkerton Sr., superintendent of car service, who was to become president of the railroad about 20 years later. Such colorful timetables are now highly prized collectors' items. The railroad printed other types of materials promoting the resort business in this section of Michigan.

ered with accumulated rubbish of years. This was logged and burned and the beach thoroughly cleaned. Then, for the first time, could people realize what the railway company had acquired for a picnic ground, viz: The handsomest beach in Michigan.

"The dancing pavilion directly faces the beach and dock. The bath houses are a little higher up the beach, with a plank walk leading directly to the water. There is hardly a shell or pebble to be found on the beach. The water deepens gradually and, owing to the protection of Tawas Point, is much warmer than in the open lake.

"Nature and the railroad company have joined hands in making Tawas Beach an ideal spot for an outing and one must be hard to please if not satisfied with the facilities for rowing, sailing, bathing, fishing, dancing or rambling in the woods here afforded."

Thousands of people were drawn to Tawas Beach during the 18 or 19 years it was in operation and local residents enjoyed the facilities, too. The D&M baseball diamond on Tawas Beach Road was the scene of many games between rival teams from the Tawas as well as between local and visiting teams.

A railroad timetable printed in 1915 stated that some of its trains ran directly to the beach, where "excellent and comfortable club-house (hotel), with orchestra, bowling alley, billiards, dancing pavilion, tennis courts," awaited visitors.

Also furnished were cottages with electric lights and running water. "An ideal spot to get close to nature and spend an inexpensive

vacation and outing."

The timetable also noted three trains daily in each direction between Tawas and Bay City, including the famous Tawas Beach Flyer, which transported regular summer residents of Tawas Beach to and from Bay City on a fast trip of two hours and 15 minutes.

The days of this popular resort were becoming numbered, however, as the automobile and good roads had already made inroads into the railroad's passenger business—the "world" of the week-end excursionist was broadened by the rubber tired automobile—despite poor roads of the day, more and

more families were searching out new places to visit with a more convenient mode of transportation.

The end of Tawas Beach as a public summer resort came when the federal government deemed that railroads must dispose of such properties and Tawas Point was sold to an association of Saginaw and Bay City residents, who had been enjoying the facilities there for years.

Today, the Tawas Beach Club is still enjoyed by summer residents, many of whom can trace their family involvement to the days when their parents or grandparents commuted daily between the park and

Saginaw Valley communities.

The old railroad grade crossing Tawas Beach Road was removed a number of years ago when the road was improved, thus writing the final chapter in the colorful era when the railroad promoted tourism in this region through its summer excursion trains. Those pioneering efforts in the tourist industry laid the basis for today's resort business in the region.

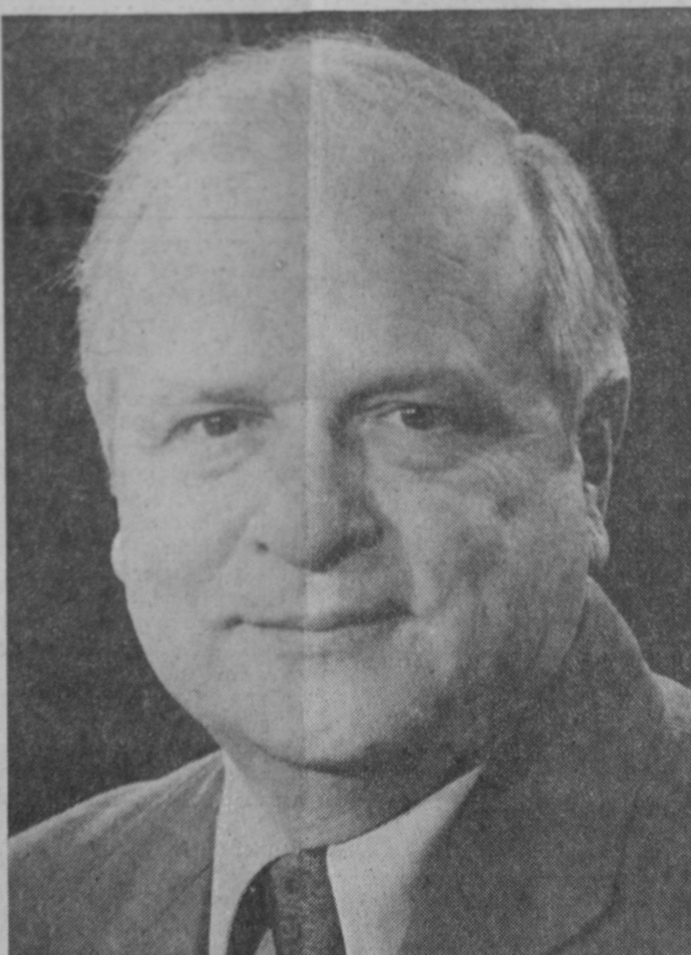

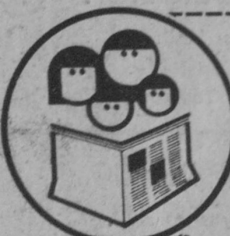
