## Whatley to Resign Commission Seat

Forrest R. Whatley, who has represented District No. 2 on the Iosco County Board of Commissioners since August 17, is expected to announce his resignation this morning (Wednesday) during the board's January meeting.

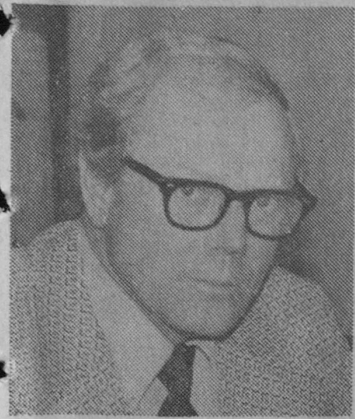
The resignation will become effective February 1.

A veteran of 26 years of service in the United States Air Force, Whatley said yesterday he had accepted a position of director of security, Defense Electronic Supply Center, Dayton, Ohio.

Whatley's entire military career was involved in air force law enforcement and security. He was stationed at Wurtsmith Air Force Base from 1973 to 1975 and retired in the Oscoda area.

He served as program coordinator in the Tawas area for Kirtland Community College and taught courses in law enforcement, American government and inservice training officer for law enforcement agencies of Iosco and Arenac Counties.

He was elected to succeed Donald Griffin at a special election held last August. Another special election would be required to fill the position.

## Would Discuss Provincial Proposal

Discussion on proposed operation of the county medical facility by Provincial House, Incorporated, is to continue Wednesday, January 11, before the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

The discussion could end at that point, or the proposition may be given further consideration. Should the latter course be followed, a complete investigation would be conducted by the commission and public hearings would be held.

Carlton Merschel, chairman of the county board of commissioners, said Thursday he would insist that those hearings would include input from the county social services department, administration of the medical care facility, Michigan Department of Social Services and Michigan Department of Health.

In accepting a grant from federal Hill-Burton funds when the facility was constructed in 1964, the county committed itself for 20

years to provide care for elderly and indigent persons who could not pay their own way in the facility.

The meeting January 11 is to provide an update for two new members of the commission who had not taken part in discussion of the proposal made last year by representatives of Provincial House, Incorporated, the Lansing-based firm which is currently constructing a nursing home on North Street in Tawas City.

The firm said it was interested in operating the county medical care facility in conjunction with its own facility. Representatives indicated that through the private firm's more efficient operation and volume buying, there would be a saving of public funds for operating the county facility.

Information on a proposed four-county juvenile detention facility is also to be outlined to commissioners at the January 11 meeting by Probate Judge William McCready.

## Acquittal Ends Murder Trial

After eight days of testimony, Johnny Heard was acquitted Wednesday by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

The 28-year-old former dental technician at Wurtsmith Air Force Base did not gain his freedom, however, as he was returned to the federal penitentiary at Milan to complete his sentence on an unrelated charge.

Heard was charged with the March 26, 1976, murder of Mrs. Lorraine J. Kenan, owner-operator of a party store north of Oscoda.

The victim's body was found in the back room of the store by customers. She had been murdered by a .22 caliber slug and the party store cash register had been robbed.

Heard was charged with the crime and a preliminary hearing in district court was held April 12, 13 and 16, 1977, before Dis. Judge J. J. Mills, who had been assigned from 82nd District Court. Heard was bound over to circuit court by Judge Mills.

There were no eyewitnesses to the crime and evidence seeking to link the defendant to the crime was circumstantial.

Circumstantial evidence introduced into the trial included the sudden and unexplained acquisition of money by the defendant, together with recollection by a witness that a blue car owned by Heard was similar to one which had been seen near the scene of the crime.

Edward M. Keller, attorney for the defendant, indicated he considered identification of the car as a weak point and pointed out differences in the testimony given by prosecution witnesses at the preliminary examination and during the trial.

## Cross-Country Trails Opened

Tawas Ranger District of the United States Forest Service expects to receive its new trail brooder and conditioner in early January. It will be the only such unit in use in the Lower Peninsula for maintaining cross-country ski trails.

The local ranger district has established three ski trails in Huron National Forest, including an 11-mile trail at Corsair Picnic Grounds, a five-mile trail along the AuSable River and the 23 miles of the shore-to-shore riding and hiking trail in Iosco County.

All of the trails are signed and maintained by the forest service. The AuSable trail starts at Largo Springs and extends to Sidtown Resort.

### Three Projects Being Completed

# Record Construction During 1977

Two projects are nearing completion in the biggest construction year in Tawas City's history.

The new Kroger Store on US-23 is expected to be open before the end of January and finishing touches are being put on one segment of the Manitou Village apartment complex on Fourth Avenue.

Construction on the third major project, Provincial House, Incorporated's new nursing home on North Street, is expected to be completed before spring.

Valuation of the three projects will be in excess of \$3,000,000 but actual valuation will be much higher due to equipment and stock at the Kroger Store which is not included in the above figure.

The first project to get under way in April was the 143 by 176-foot Kroger Store located in the block facing US-23 between River and Wheeler Streets.

Expansion and development of the new Kroger Store had been under consideration since November 1976. Owners of the property, Mr. and Mrs. John D. LeClair, Mr. and Mrs. John A. LeClair and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas LeClair, presented plans for the new building to the city council.

At that time, the council vacated a portion of River Street for store parking purposes and later vacated the entire street for that purpose. The former American Legion Hall on River Street was purchased by the LeClairs and removed for expansion of parking. Construction was completed earlier this fall on the 185-car parking lot, which has exits off US-23-River Street, Wheeler Street and Court Street. The latter provides an alternate route to First Street on the west and M-55 on the east.

Final work is being completed on installing fixtures in the building and work is to start soon on stocking the store.

O. S. Rose Builders, Incorporated, Tawas City, is general contractor for construction.

The new building is to replace the former Kroger location directly across US-23 which originally was constructed by the LeClairs and opened in October 1958.

Construction on the Manitou Village apartment complex started the first week in July by the owners, Kenneth Myles, Jerry Cotter and James DeRosia.

Under consideration for the past two years, the apartment complex is designed in two sections, one on each side of and facing Fourth Avenue. Each unit is 222 feet in length, of two-story construction and each contains 24 apartment units. Included are eight one-bedroom units and 40 two-bedroom units. The latter contains 780 square feet of floor space in each unit.

Parking spaces are to be provided for 72 cars or 1 1/2 cars for each unit. A green belt is to surround each apartment complex.

Individual apartment units on the ground floor have sliding glass doors leading to patios and second floor units have sliding glass doors leading to balconies. Each unit is equipped with a range, refrigerator and garbage disposal. Laundry facilities are located in

each building and all apartments are fully carpeted.

Ground was broken for the new Provincial House, Incorporated, nursing home on July 5. An FHA loan in excess of \$1,000,000 was finalized in June by the Lansing firm.

Provincial House received a certificate of need from the Michigan Department of Public Health in August 1975 for a 117-bed facility and the permit was expanded to 120 beds in early 1977.

The nursing home is being built in an X-shape with four patient wings meeting at a central nursing station. From this central hub, nurses on duty will have a direct

view of each patient doorway.

Provincial House's construction division, PHI Construction Com-

pany, is general contractor on the nursing home and apartment complex, the Tawas City Council authorized construction of a new

storm sewer along North Street. This project was completed two weeks ago.

\$1,745,500 Project

# Tawas Hospital's Renovation-Expansion Plan Gets State OK

Tawas Hospital has received approval from the Michigan Department of Public Health to proceed with its \$1,745,500 project to renovate the facility and to purchase nuclear medicine equipment.

This announcement was made Friday by Donald Snyder, hospital administrator, following receipt of an approval letter from R. A. Reihmer, chief of the department of public health's planning and construction division.

The proposed project was announced in late October and calls for expansion of X-ray services to accommodate the nuclear scan equipment and to relocate beds for a more effective staffing pattern. Snyder said Friday that final plans for the project would now be completed and he expects construction to start in May.

Estimated cost of the project includes \$50,000 for site acquisition, \$1,069,767 for construction, \$300,000 for equipment, \$106,000 for contingencies, \$80,000 for architect and engineering fees, \$10,000 for attorney fees, \$35,000 for finance costs and \$93,000 interest during construction.

Source of the above funds would include \$205,000 cash on hand from funded depreciation, a \$200,000 bequest for radiology equipment, anticipated contributions of \$250,000 and a loan of one million dollars.

The new radiology department is to be expanded into the present laboratory area and the laboratory is to be moved into what now com-

prises the medical records and inhalation therapy department.

The original nursing wing no longer meets requirements of the state due to the small size of rooms and a 34-bed nursing wing is to be constructed on the north end of the hospital to form a "T." A new nursing station is to be constructed, along with a new hospital entrance.

The old nursing wing is to become a service area for patients, including inhalation therapy and physical therapy. The surgery de-

partment is to remain in that wing.

The last construction project at Tawas Hospital, which saw a new north wing, was completed in 1972. The new project does not include a medical office building which is in the planning stage and would be financed by doctors or by rental.

"As the year 1977 draws rapidly to a close, most of us in the area are aware that Tawas Hospital will begin a program expansion," said Snyder. "Many people have a special place in their hearts for the hospital, either because of the excellent care they experienced or because of care given to a member of their family or a close friend."

Snyder said, "This warm feeling

has developed because our doctors, nurses and all others involved in the hospital program have been our friends, interested in us as individuals and concern for community welfare."

He said that persons had indicated to members of the board of trustees they would like to make contributions to the hospital building program, which will greatly increase services to all. Anyone interested in making such a gift is urged to contact the hospital administrator.

Tawas Hospital is in its second year of a two-year accreditation by the Michigan Department of Public Health.

## WIOS Seeks FM License

John Carroll Jr. of Carroll Enterprises, Incorporated, owner of AM Radio Station WIOS, Tawas City, announced Thursday the corporation had made application with the Federal Communications Commission for a construction permit for a new FM broadcasting station.

The proposed new station, operating on Channel 280A, 103.9 Megahertz, three kilowatts, would be operated in conjunction with but separate from the present AM station.

The studio would be located at 523 Meadow Road, present site of the WIOS studio, and the transmitter would be located east of Island Lake. The tower would have an over-all height of 257 feet above ground.

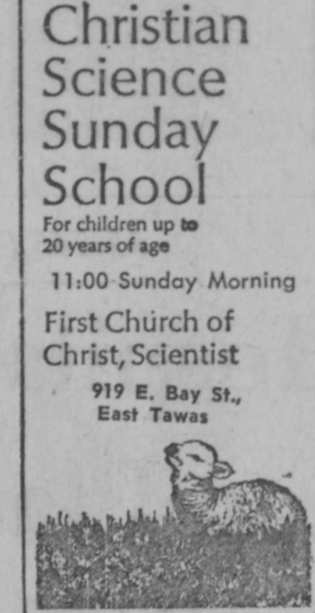
Joseph Schmidt Died January 1

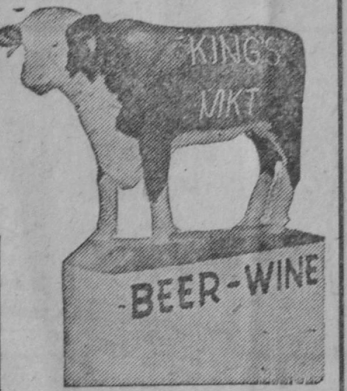

**164 Participated in Iosco County CETA Program**

Region 7B Employment and Training Consortium, serving nine counties in Central Michigan, now has 1,721 persons participating in eight different programs under CETA (Comprehensive Employment Training Act). Six of these programs are operated by the consortium while two are under the jurisdiction of the individual counties with CETA funds administered through the consortium.

In the consortium program, these persons are participating in Title I in-school and out-of-school programs, adult work experience, classroom training, on-the-job training and Title VI special projects. Title VI and Title II public service employment programs are operated at the county level and by county personnel.

There are 717 worksites involved in the eight programs. These sites and participants are monitored and evaluated by Region 7B headquarters personnel as well as counselors assigned to offices in each of the nine counties.

Expended in Iosco County during 1977 was \$171,515 in Title II public service employment and \$223,060 in Title VI public service employment. Worksites numbered 82 and participants totaled 164.

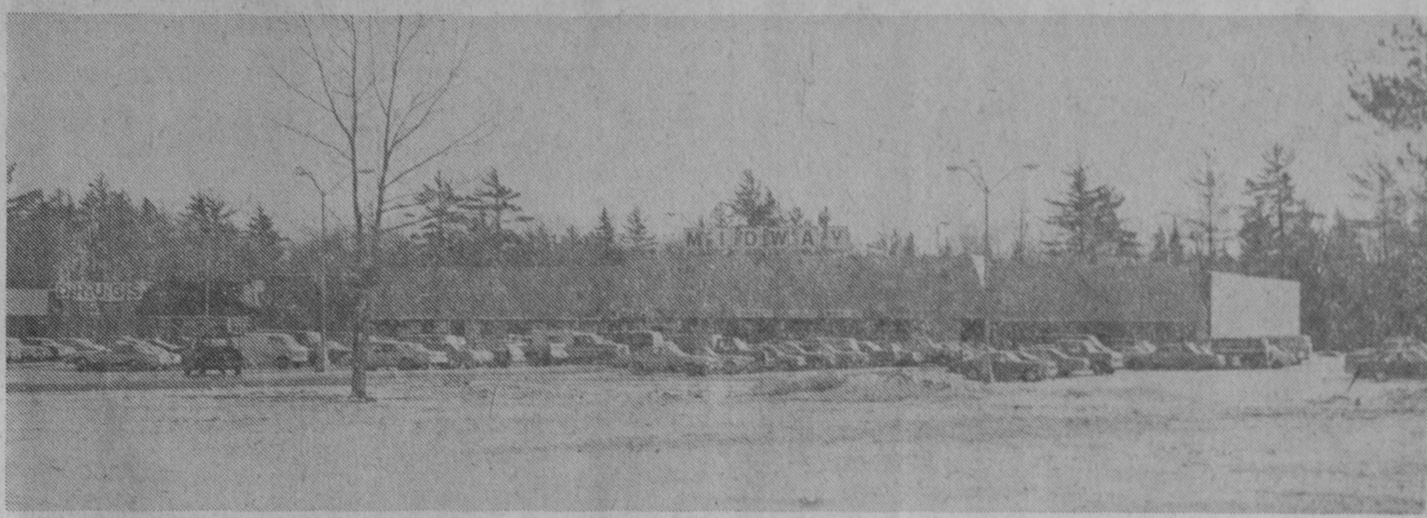

BURNING ISSUE IN 1912:

# WHO IS SHERIFF?

Iosco County politics have never been more exciting than during the five-year period from 1912 to 1916. One of a number of unusual incidents which took place during that era was the election of two different Democrats to the office of sheriff.

That, in itself, is an occurrence which has never been repeated in traditionally Republican Iosco County, but events surrounding the 1912 election are worthy of recall as citizens of the county and even the courts never agreed as to who was the rightful sheriff!

The headline of the November 8, 1912, issue of The Tawas Herald tells part of the story: "The Nation Goes Democratic; Almost Unanimously, Wilson is Elected by the Largest Majority Ever Given a President."

On the local level, the real race in Iosco County came between Sheriff Collie Johnson, Republican, and John Jordan, Sherman Township Democrat. On the face of election night returns, Johnson won the election by the slim majority of only two votes.

Jordan, naturally, filed petitions with the county board of canvassers for a recount of votes, specifically in the City of Whittemore, the second precinct of Oscoda Township, plus the Townships of Tawas, Baldwin and Wilber.

To protect his own interests, Johnson then petitioned for a recount of votes cast in the Townships of Sherman and Reno—that turned out to be his undoing, or so it seemed.

"It is not charged that any fraud has been practiced by the boards of election commissioners in any of the precincts, but that different instructions on the marking of ballots has caused the loss of votes to the candidates. The outcome will be watched with much interest by all," stated the Herald.

That recount caused considerable interest as the county canvassing board announced the following Monday night that Jordan was found to have a majority of nine in the recount and issued him a certificate of election.

The votes in Baldwin and Reno Townships were thrown out entirely because no initials were found on the ballots, having been placed on the perforated corner with the ballot number and torn off. In Baldwin, Johnson lost by a majority of 12 and in Reno, Jordan lost by a majority of 17, giving Johnson a net gain of five on the votes thrown out.

Only slight changes were made in the election inspector's report of any of the other townships, with the exception of Wilber and Sherman, the contestants gaining or losing from one to three in each of the other precincts.

Had Johnson not called for a recount in Jordan's home Township of Sherman, he would have won the election. The county canvassers found that the Sherman Township election board had made a 10-vote error in counting Jordan's ballots. Jordan had also picked up six votes in Wilber Township to give him a majority of nine.

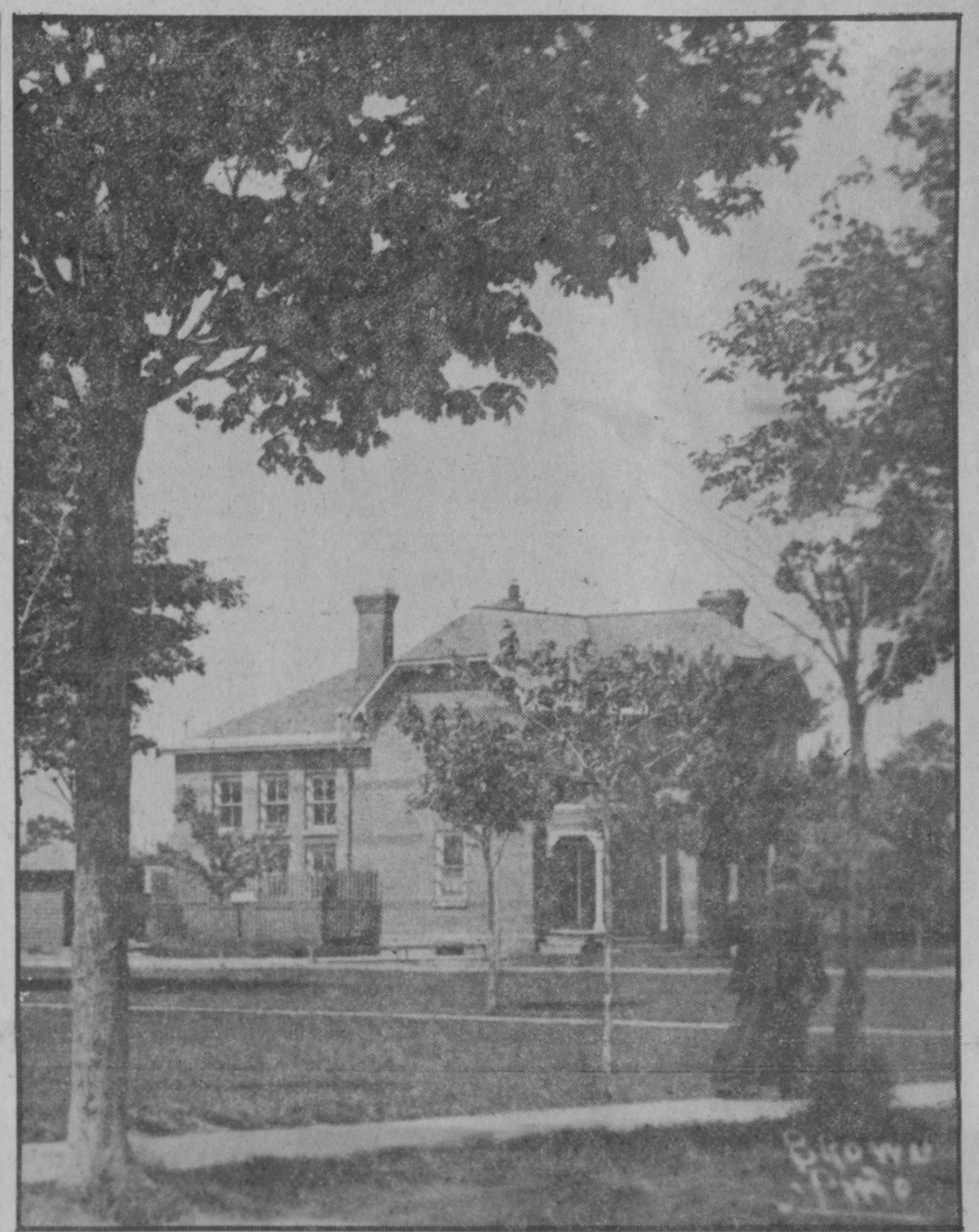
The county canvassing board included John W. Tait of East Tawas, William McFarlane of Oscoda, Eugene Bing of Tawas City "and their ruling was just and fair to both sides," commented the Herald. Charles A. Jahraus was attorney for Johnson and John E. Kinane of Bay City looked after Jordan's interests.

The new sheriff took office January 1 and all went well until January 10, when Ex-Sheriff Johnson served notice that he was about to commence quo warranto proceedings to test Jordan's right to the office of sheriff. "On what grounds he bases the action is not yet stated," reported the Herald.

The case was taken up March 12 before Judge Maine J. Connine and the question before the court to decide was whether or not the ballot box of Sherman Township had been tampered with. This, it should be recalled, was where Jordan was the loser on election night, but was the actual winner in the recount.

The Herald reported March 12, 1913, that after 24 hours, the circuit court jury failed to agree on a verdict and was discharged. The case was set for another hearing on April 23. "The case was the most largely attended of any that has been held in the circuit court for a number of years," stated the Herald. "Nothing further was heard on the matter until the last week in May when the Herald reported that the second trial of the quo warranto case had been won by Johnson. The jury trial had been moved to Harrisville.

The attorney for Sheriff Jordan immediately moved for a new trial, but pursuant to an order issued by Judge Connine, Jordan vacated the office of county sheriff on June 12, 1913, having held the office for less than six months, and Johnson filed his oath for the position.



THE "PRIZE" awaiting candidates for sheriff was the old county jail, constructed of brick in the 1880s and located east of the courthouse. According to state law, certain county officers, including the sheriff and treasurer, could only

serve for two consecutive terms. Iosco voters defeated a Republican candidate for sheriff who had served three terms on a technicality, replacing him with a Democrat, but later elected the Republican to another two-year term.

arrangement was permanent," Jordan started looking for a new job and on July 11, 1913, the Herald reported that he had received an appointment as field man for the state tax commission.

"Mr. Jordan will make an efficient man for this position as he has had considerable experience in estimating property values, having been supervisor of his township for a number of years," stated the Herald's editor, Len J. Patterson, a solid Democrat.

The wheels of justice traditionally turn slowly and Jordan was enjoying his new position with the state tax commission when the supreme court announced it was remanding the Jordan-Johnson case back to Iosco Circuit Court for retrial.

By then, Judge Connine had died in office and he was succeeded by Judge Alfred Widdis. It was a rather hollow victory for Jordan as the term of office was coming to a close and he dropped the matter.

A rather strange circumstance resulted as, in those days, state law said that a man could hold the

office of sheriff for only two consecutive terms. Through the result of the above litigation, Johnson actually held the office for six years, with the exception of nearly six months in which Jordan was sheriff.

It was never settled as to who was the rightful sheriff during 1913-1914, but Johnson held the office the major portion of that time, as well as from 1910 to 1912 during his first term of office, plus being re-elected in 1914.

"Technically, he is asking for a second term," the Herald said of Johnson on August 18, 1914, "but many voters feel that he is asking for a fourth term, instead, and will support one of the other candidates."

Voters settled the "technicality" by turning Johnson out of office in November 1916, by electing Thomas Hill, a Democrat, to the office of sheriff. Hill, a resident of Plainfield Township, was the only Democrat to serve as county sheriff and had been defeated by Johnson in his first run for office in the 1914 election.

That final election in 1916 was one in which Democratic and Independent candidates benefited by wholesale splitting of tickets and straight ballots were a rarity.

Voters had the satisfaction of seeing that a sheriff could not serve more than two consecutive terms in office, a provision which was later eliminated from the state laws, and Johnson had the satisfaction of defeating Hill in the 1918 election, 836-453.

A political war horse, Johnson lost the Republican nomination for sheriff to Willard J. Robinson in the primary election of September 1920. He did not finish without a fight for he ran on slips against Robinson in the November election, only to lose by an overwhelming majority.

JOHN JORDAN of Sherman Township was a candidate for sheriff in 1912, losing the race by only two votes and then winning in a recount. He served less than six months before losing again.

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## Citizens Have Duty to Report Crime

One of the biggest roles citizens can play in crime prevention is to cooperate with the police by reporting crime. This is the word of Tawas Kiwanis Club in its community crime prevention program.

A citizen can aid in the detection and suppression of crime and thus protect his own property and welfare by being alert and telephoning the police whenever suspicious persons or happenings or unusual noises are heard at the home or in the neighborhood.

Do not attempt a personal investigation and do not turn on additional lights or make a lot of noise. This will not only prevent the thief's possible capture but could endanger one's own well-being.

Do not delay, but go directly to a telephone and call the police. Tell them that a crime has been witnessed and give its location. Hold the line for any other information which might be needed.

The caller may give his name or choose to remain anonymous. Remember, if you witness a crime, do not take it for granted that someone else may have called the police. If it was unreported, your action in telephoning may prevent a crime or even save a life. Authorities stress that many cases are solved with the cooperation of area residents.

One never knows how much a small bit of information can help to solve a case or prevent further crime. The concerned citizen is the criminal's worst enemy. Be part of the solution, not part of the problem.

Mrs. Goupil was a member of Emanuel Lutheran Church. She married Earl Goupil, who preceded her in death in 1967, at Tawas City in 1929.

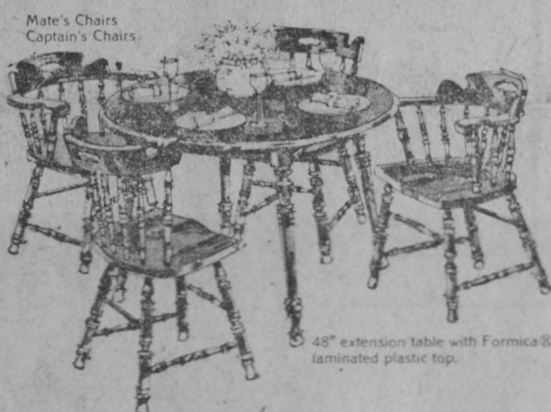

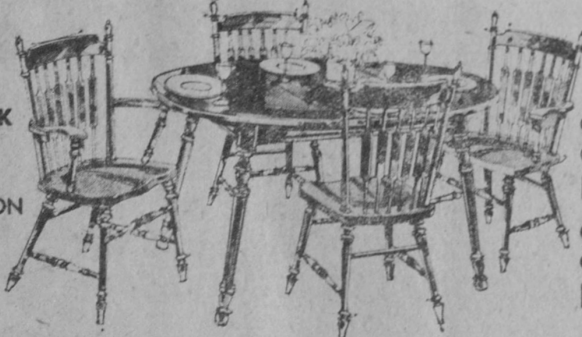

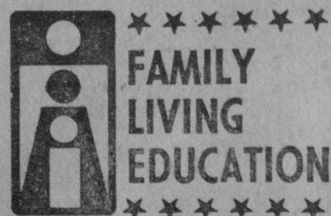

A HEARTH-WARMING IDEA

If one loves that warm, glowing fire on cold winter nights, but dislikes awakening the next morning to a cold house, here is an interior design energy-saving tip.

The morning after chill develops after the fire dies and the fireplace with its open damper, changes from a source of heat to a monster that draws warm air from the room and up the chimney flue. This same monster will also keep the furnace running longer as it tries to recoup the heat loss. Now the problem can be solved. As soon as the fire dies down, or when the

family is ready for bed, put a fireproof cover or lid in front of the fireplace opening.

It is best to use heavy-gauge galvanized sheet metal. The lid should be large enough to overlap the fireplace opening by two or three inches. A metal barn door or gate handle (obtainable from most hardware stores) should be bolted to the lid, about in the center, for easy handling. Steel shelf brackets can serve as feet. Bolt two large brackets to the front bottom edge and a smaller bracket to the back, in the center of the lid. This will provide stability when the lid is placed over the fireplace opening.

The entire front can be painted with a black, heat-resistant paint. In addition to making it possible to enjoy the fireplace, no matter what the weather, the cover also provides safety. When a blazing fire is left, set the lid in place and no sparks can fly out while the room is unattended.

US-23 Exit With I-75 at Standish

15 Years Ago—

January 2, 1963—US-23 will be retained as a state highway connecting with I-75 at an interchange in the "curve" area south of Standish, according to information from state highway officials at a public hearing held at Pinconning. The new I-75 will go through Northern Bay and Arenac Counties approximately three miles west of US-23 and M-76.
