





# More Than Six Registered for Postal Exam

More than six persons signed up to take clerk/carrier exams that will be given by the postal service at a future date, Postmaster Blust at Whittemore said today.

"We have not replenished our job register since 1975 and this undoubtedly helped contribute to the number of applicants who want to take the tests that may lead to postal service employment," she said. "But, I think the response we got also indicates local residents consider postal service jobs attractive. I think our pay, fringe benefits, economic security and ability to advance on merit are major reasons for the large number of ap-

Salaries, not including fringe benefits, for clerks and letter carriers begin at \$6.40 an hour and increase to \$7.50 an hour over an eight-year period. Annually, this represents a \$12,894 starting salary for a full-time employee that increases to \$15,116 in eight years.

Postmaster Blust emphasized it is unknown how many vacancies will occur in the next two years at

"Any vacancies will be filled by offering jobs to those who do well on the exams and are placed on

our updated register," she said. The postmaster said an inspec tion of the present job register showed many names of people who had moved or for one reason or another were no longer available to accept postal jobs.





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

As a pre-institute treat for early arriving visitors, a fishing party boat had been pressed into an impromptu trip on Tawas Bay. To handle the overflow crowd, a scow normally used to haul the nets of commercial fisherman was also utilized. The tug, with scow in tow, was to make a 40-minute pleasure cruise on the bay.

About 50 youngsters were aboard, with between 20 and 25 on the scow, when the tug proceeded eastward in the bay for approximately a mile and then started its return trip to the East Tawas dock. At a point about 500 yards off shore from Tawas Inn, some of the youngsters aboard the scow started yelling that they were getting their feet wet. The barge was a self-bailing type and some water was coming in through the scup-

The youngsters started to move around and a number of them suddenly ran to the front of the scow and it started taking on more water. The youngsters then ran to the rear of the scow and it partially submerged. Despite shouted warnings to stay on the barge, the now panic-stricken youngsters began jumping into the water.

All of the above took place in a matter of a minute or two. Three or four youngsters who remained on the scow with a minister serving as a counselor were all right-the water only came up to their knees, reported one newspaper account; but those who jumped overboard were in serious trouble in deep wa-

Life jackets were thrown into the water to aid the victims. Observers on shore witnessed the tragedy and immediately spread the alarm. Within a matter of minutes, small boats were headed from shore for the disaster scene.

Thomas Marr, a Detroit resident who operated a tourist resort on the shore near where the tragedy occurred, was one of the first per-(See TRAGEDY, page 6.)





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
