Abe Lincoln Lives for Tawas Pupils

Youngsters in Tawas' two elementary schools enjoyed a living history program Monday when they "met Mr. Lincoln."

Bruce Hanks of Minneapolis, Minnesota, a distant relative of Nancy Hanks, mother of the 16th president, presented a slide program at East Tawas and Tawas City elementary units and then visited with children in the classrooms to answer questions.

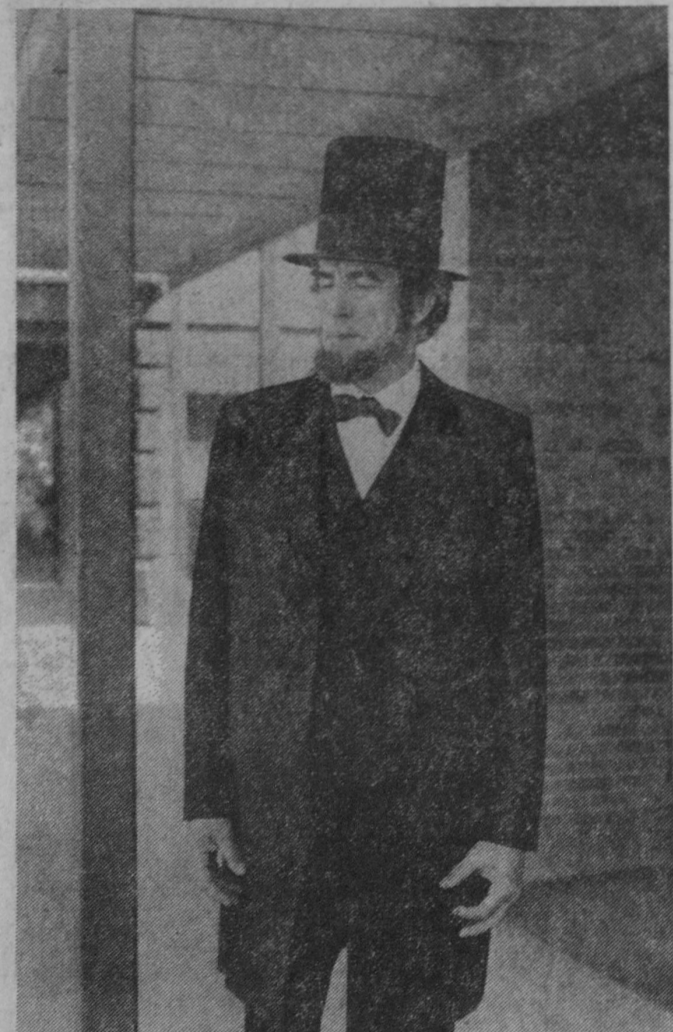
Hanks, a Baptist minister who six years ago began traveling around the country as America's leading portrayer of Abraham Lincoln, created a striking image as he entered the two schools dressed in long frock coat and stovepipe hat.

His resemblance to Abraham Lincoln is remarkable as his height and weight are approximately the same as Lincoln's and the facial characteristics are similar.

Thoroughly prepared for his current work as a minister for 20 years, Hanks presented a color slide program featuring the words and life of Lincoln with emphasis on his moral and spiritual strengths.

The program showed the life of Lincoln from Kentucky to Indiana, from there to his years in Illinois, moving on to the Civil War and Washington, D. C.

Herman Rollin, elementary principal, said "Abraham Lincoln's" visit was a great treat for youngsters and believed that the program was one of the most educational ever to be presented here as it was geared to the level of the audience.

Two Damage Suits Filed in Iosco Co. Circuit Court

Two civil damage claims have been filed in Iosco County Circuit Court.

One suit involving a change of venue from Macomb County is brought by William R. Buhl vs. Sheriff George Westcott, Robert Short of Bob's Auto Parts of Hale and Hanover Insurance Company, bond holder representing the first named defendant.

Started in August 1977, the suit concerns a vehicle owned by Buhl which was stolen December 6, 1974, at Hamtramck. The complaint states the sheriff impounded the vehicle in connection with an arrest and, when he attempted to regain custody of it, the Hale auto parts firm demanded \$10 in towing fee and a storage fee of \$1 per day.

The plaintiff claims the sheriff failed to notify the secretary of (See COURT, page 5.)

Memorial Day

Annual Memorial Day services are scheduled to be held Monday at Tawas City, East Tawas and Hale under auspices of veterans organizations.

Citizens will join veterans in paying tribute to those who made the supreme sacrifice during all of the wars of this country's history.

In each community, there will be parades followed by rites at cemeteries. Programs in Iosco County are as follows:

TAWAS CITY
Veterans and others participating in a parade will assemble at Jesse C. Hodder American Legion Post, located on North Street, starting at 8:00 a. m. for the parade which is scheduled to begin at 9:00 a. m.

Honorary officer of the day will be James E. Dillon and John Alexander will be officer of the day.

Included in the parade will be the Wurtsmith Air Force Base color guard; Disabled American Veterans Chapter No. 130, under the command of Carroll Wolford; Tawas Area High School Marching Band. DAV members and American Legion members will comprise the color guard and firing squad.

Hugh Prescott, commander of Jesse C. Hodder Post, urges all members and families to join in honoring the war dead and to attend the open house at the post home during the afternoon. Refreshments are to be served.

EAST TAWAS
The Memorial Day observance at East Tawas marks the first time since the 1880s that the American Legion Hall on Newman Street will not be used. A parade is scheduled to assemble in front of that building prior to the 11:00 a. m. starting time.

William DeGrow, a United States Marine Corps veteran of World War I, a charter member of Audie Johnson American Legion Post No. 211 and former member of its drum and bugle corps, will be honorary officer of the day.

Marching units of Audie Johnson Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 5678, auxiliaries of both organizations, Tawas Area High School Marching Band, girl scouts, boy scouts and cub scouts will comprise the parade.

The line of march will be from the Federal Building to the Michigan Waterways Dock, where a service will honor those who gave their lives at sea.

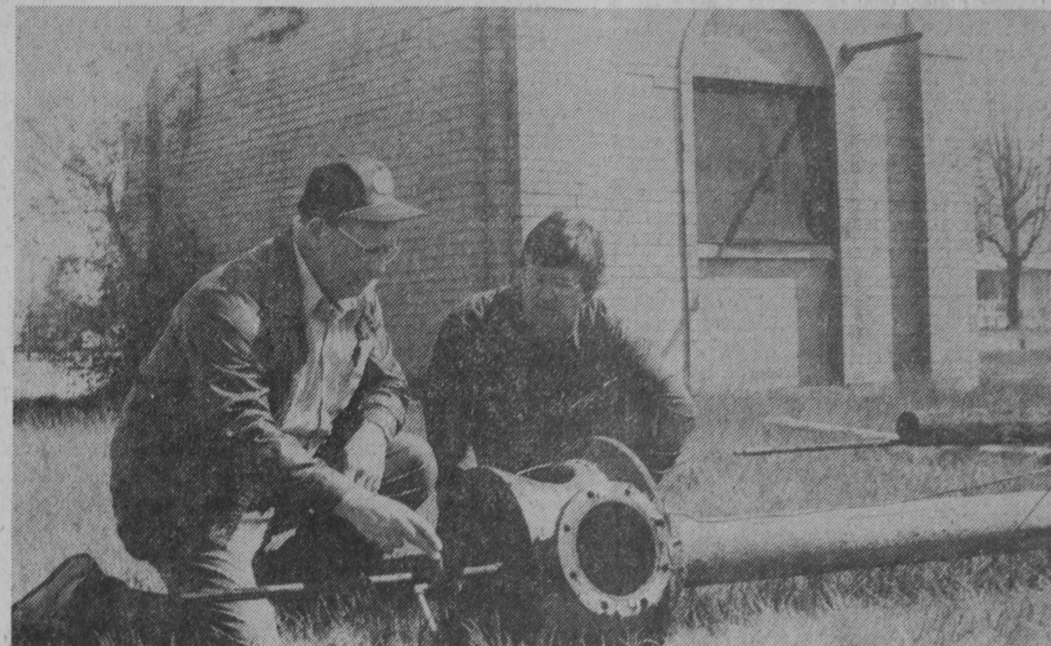
The parade will return north on Newman Street and disperse at the Federal Building. Transportation will be provided to Veterans' Cemetery where the guest speaker will be the Rev. Alfred W. Saulsbury. Cemetery rites are scheduled to start at 11:45 a. m.

Standby Water Pump Fails; City Installs Rented Unit

After more than 40 years of operation, Tawas City's deep well on First Avenue became inoperable late Thursday, causing water pressure to drop to a dangerously low 20 pounds Friday afternoon at the stand pipe and water storage tank at the rear of the city hall.

As a temporary emergency measure, the department of public works has rented a submersible pump which was installed in the 10-inch well Tuesday and service was expected to be restored to full operation before late yesterday afternoon.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said Monday morning that the pump was being rented on a temporary basis until the city council and water board make a decision as to the future use of the well.

The city manager returned Monday night from Sterling Heights with two new pumps, one nine and three-quarters inches in diameter and the second measuring seven and one-quarter inches.

Because of a buildup of scale in the main 10-inch casing, it was not known if the larger pump could be lowered to the 30-foot level. If the larger pump is utilized, the well would produce 250 gallons of water per minute, but the smaller pump would produce only one-half that amount.

When the drop in water pressure was noticed Thursday afternoon, a check at the pump house revealed that the electric motor on the old pump was operating properly. On inspection of the well equipment, it was found that a 100-foot-long shaft which connected from the pump to six impellers within the casing had snapped.

A dragline was used to remove the shaft and six-inch inside casing from the 208-foot well and it was discovered that corrosive action had damaged the inside casing beyond repair and that a screen at the bottom of the well was nearly completely clogged with rust. The city manager believed the screen used occasionally to provide additional water during summer months when a connecting main between the two communities could not keep pace with water demand.

In recent years, however, water demand has increased rapidly in Tawas City and the well has operated steadily to augment the water supply from East Tawas.

Construction has been completed (See WATER, page 5.)

Differing Views on

State Road Patrol Bill

A resolution adopted by the Tawas City Council last week expressed opposition to Senate Bill 1517 concerning state funding of sheriff road patrols, which was on the agenda May 16 for consideration by the Michigan House of Representatives' towns and counties committee.

Rushed through the senate by a vote of 32-0, the Michigan Municipal League has opposed the bill and urged its member cities to contact legislators. City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz contacted area legislators by telephone May 16 to voice council's objections.

In its recent legislative bulletin, MML stated that if the bill is passed in its present form, county boards of commissioners throughout the state could be successfully sued and forced to fund a township road patrol from county funds, substantially subsidized by city and village taxpayers.

"Furthermore," stated the MML bulletin, "at least one county board of commissioners' attorney believes the bill also will put counties or county sheriffs in position to be sued for civil damages for not carrying out the statutory duties proposed in the bill."

As passed by the senate, the bill imposes a statutory duty on sheriffs to provide a road patrol on county roads in township areas. It provides for distributing a proposed 10-million-dollar grant to county sheriffs. The grant itself is not in this bill, but would be in the state police budget bill. No comparable grant is proposed for cities or villages.

According to MML, the bill forces counties to maintain present levels of road patrol services as a condition for getting the state grant, regardless of whether the townships are paying any part of the cost through contracts or not.

The bill also authorizes a city or village, by resolution, to request the sheriff to patrol, provide vehicle inspection and selective law (See SENATE BILL, page 5.)

County Allocates Emergency Money to Meet MC Payroll

Iosco County Board of Commissioners has authorized an allocation of \$22,000 from federal anti-recession money to meet a May 26 payroll at the Iosco County Medical Care Facility.

For the second month in succession, Roy Bergstrom, medical care facility director, appeared before the commission and requested emergency financing. Funding was not necessary a month ago due to a juggling of books, but Bergstrom warned last week that the facility's cash flow had been depleted.

Bergstrom blamed the shortage of funds on higher costs to operate the facility. He said that workmen's compensation insurance had increased 104 percent for a total of \$16,053; utility rates had shown a \$3,414 increase during the first quarter; salaries and fringe benefits had shown a \$23,115 increase; supplies had increased in cost, with a figure of \$2,388 for drugs alone.

Adding all of the additional charges, Bergstrom said that costs were up \$39,000 during the first quarter for operation of the 64-bed facility.

It was suggested by commissioners that a manpower study be made to determine if operational costs could be reduced. The opinion was expressed by a commissioner that, under its original establishment, the medical care facility was to have been operated at no cost to county taxpayers.

Bergstrom replied that the idea was false and said that nowhere it stated that the medical care facility should not cost the county any money for operation.

In other business last week, the commission authorized advertising for bids on additions to the county building which are to be opened June 16. Contracts for construction will be in four separate areas.

The commission approved an allocation of \$68,000 in federal revenue sharing money to the Iosco County Road Commission for the F-41 reconstruction project west of Oscoda. This money, along with county and township funds, is to be used to match federal funds for the construction.

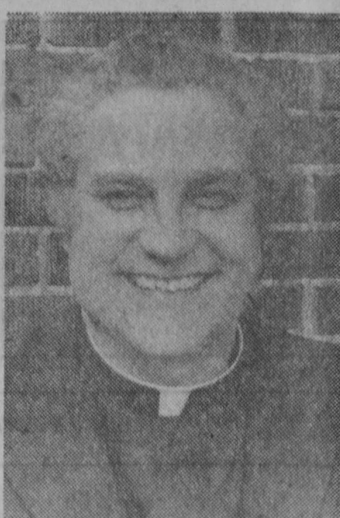

Vice Rector of American College in Belgium

The Rev. Fr. Leonard F. Wilkusi, pastor of St. Andrew Church in Saginaw, has been appointed vice rector of the American College at Louvain, Belgium. The appointment is for a term of five years.

Father Wilkusi, a native of East Tawas, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Wilkusi. A 1954 graduate of Tawas Area High School, he studied two years at St. Jerome College, Kitchener, Ontario, Canada. The next seven years, he studied at the American College of the University of Louvain where he obtained degrees in philosophy, theology and religious education. He was ordained to the priesthood on June 29, 1963, by Bishop John P. Cody.

enforcement services on county roads inside cities and villages.

There is a kicker to this latter provision, however, since there are very few county roads inside cities and villages except in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Counties.

The bill has been strongly criticized by Col. Gerald L. Hough, state police director, who said Friday that "he is convinced the attempts to legislate role definition among law enforcement agencies is a move toward state subsidy of local government at the expense of maintaining an effective state police presence in Michigan."

Hough said he was opposed to any forced legislation concept of role definition in law enforcement. "I am even more opposed to the notion that this sort of legislation should be drawn, pushed and pressured through the legislature, under the guise of improving police services, by powerful unions representing the county sheriffs."

Hough said that forcing state police off secondary road patrols would not make for safer traffic control, but would only demand more of a buildup of sheriff units. He predicts that the 10-million dollars being asked for in the current package would escalate in the future as cities and townships would join lobbying for ever-increasing amounts.

One of the most outspoken critics of this legislation has been State Rep. Ernest W. Nash of Dimondale, a native of Whitney Township in Arenac County and a former member of the state police.

In a telephone conversation Monday night with the Herald editor, Representative Nash said that while Senate Bill 1517 would be again considered Tuesday morning (yesterday) before a house committee, he said that a companion Senate Bill 1518 was still in the senate committee "and we cannot even get anyone to talk about that bill at the hearing."

Nash believes that passage of either SB 1517 or SB 1518 would prevent the state police from functioning except as patrol officers on state freeways and trunk lines.

Charges by Nash, together with those of the State Police Troopers Association, have been categorically denied by the Michigan Sheriffs' Association. In a letter received by the Herald Tuesday morning, Jack P. Foster, executive director of MSA, said that SB 1517 would not reduce jurisdiction or increase jurisdiction of either the Michigan State Police nor the 83 sheriff departments of the state. "Not one penny is being diverted from the Michigan State Police budget (1978-79) to any or all of the 83 county sheriff departments of Michigan. In fact, the proposed next year's state police budget shows an increase of approximately \$29,000,000," said Foster.

The spokesman for the Michigan Sheriffs' Association said the state shares costs with counties in such

areas as courts, mental health, public health, social services, education and many others. "We thus fail to comprehend the reasoning of the state police that all state monies appropriated for law enforcement should go exclusively to them," said Foster.

Representative Nash warned, however, Monday night that local counties would bear the financial brunt under changes proposed in SB 1517.

on the expanded water service to Tawas City, East Tawas and Baldwin Township, but this is not expected to relieve the water shortage for another month or six weeks when new storage tanks constructed during the past year are expected to go into operation.

Under terms of a new contract between the three communities, the well is required to be phased out once the system is in operation. Opinions have been expressed at past meetings of the city council and water board that the well should be disconnected, but maintained in an operational state should there ever be a need for an emergency water supply.

Should the new pump prove to be effective, the well would produce a full 250 gallons per minute without the restrictive screen at the bottom of the well.

City officials must now make a decision if the expense of purchasing the new submersible pump would be a feasible expenditure.

state within 10 days after taking the abandoned vehicle into custody. Buhl claims he suffered damages including depreciation of the vehicle and loss of its use since January 12, 1975. He asks \$5 per day in damages since that date for each day that he has been deprived of his vehicle, plus \$1,000 for depreciation.

The plaintiff also asks that the court determine that retention of the vehicle by Short should be at no cost to him, plus treble damages.

A jury trial has been demanded. The second suit was filed by Myrtle Brown and Edward Brown against Peoples State Bank of East Tawas. The complaint alleges that Mrs. Brown slipped and fell on the floor of the bank lobby on January 31, 1977. No specific amount was asked for a judgment on the two-count complaint.

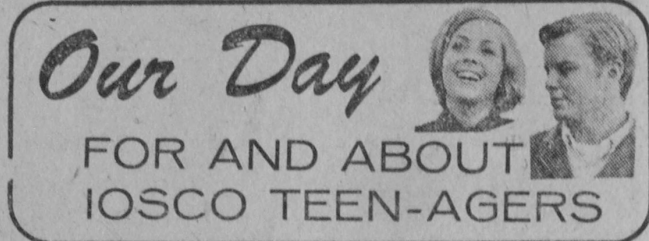

Our Day FOR AND ABOUT IOSCO TEEN-AGERS Describes Schools in South Africa

(Lois McCready, a Tawas Area High School student and daughter of Judge and Mrs. William McCready, is spending her senior year as a student in the Republic of South Africa. This letter to the editor tells of some of her experiences.)

In all of my previous letters, I have mentioned that I am a Rotary exchange student, but none of the letters said anything about school. Now I will assure you all that I really am attending school—five days a week, five hours a day. There are several differences in the schooling, so I will do my best to cover them.

In the first place, school uniforms are worn here, with each school having its own color and

style. For girls, the Hoekskool Lou's Trichardt has a sleeveless gundy jumper worn over a short-sleeved white blouse. Dress length is about four inches above the knee. We wear flat black shoes with white ankle socks. When the weather is colder we wear either a burgundy colored sweater or blazer, both trimmed with white and gold, over the jumper.

There are not only rules forbidding makeup and jewelry, but also, if a girl's hair hangs over her blouse collar, the prefects tell her, "Jy moet jon hare vasmaak!" (Literally: "You must your hair fast make!")

The boys wear khaki shorts and shirts four days a week. The fifth day they have drilling to prepare them for the two years of army service required after completing their school education. They wear "cadet" uniforms consisting of dark brown shorts, shirts and berets. On colder days, they wear the same sweater or blazer as the girls. They cannot wear makeup or jewelry, either, and when their hair touches their ears, they must have it cut. There seems to be much more discipline and the boys are much better mannered. (They let all the girls go in and out of classrooms before entering themselves.)

I am in a small Afrikaans-medium high school, almost 600 students, which means English class is the only class where English is spoken. However, English and Afrikaans are required classes from grade one through matric (matriculation) because both are official languages of South Africa. The school has kids from standard six to standard 10, equivalent to our eighth to 12th grades. Everyone has a full schedule six subjects a day, with extras twice a week including religious instruction, vocational guidance, physical training and youth preparedness. We have 10 periods a day, each one-half hour long, so we have some subjects two or three times a day. School starts at 7:10 a. m. and ends at 1:10 for the day—early enough to avoid the afternoon heat. We eat lunch at home right after school.

My school is a double-story building with all the classrooms opening onto the courtyard. Changing classes is all done outside, either through the courtyard or using the balconies. There are 12 girl and 12 boy prefects to enforce the rules (telling when to fasten or cut one's hair, not to talk on the staircase, to carry the bookcase in the left hand.)

This brings me to another difference: Since we do not have halls, we do not have lockers. We have to carry our books back and forth to school every day in leather suitcases called bookcases. Usually mine weighs about 20 pounds, so my hands are all full of blisters!

The school curriculum is very much like ours, diverging in the fact that American schools offer

Don't miss the... and science here, they study three courses a year—algebra the first day, geometry the second day and trigonometry the third; or physical science the first day, chemistry the second day and physics the third day. A student picks his classes in standard seven and must take the same classes each year after that.

The area around Louis Trichardt has quite a bit of farming, so it is necessary for our school to be a boarding school, not only for the farm kids, but also for Rhodesian students because we are only 70 miles from the border. The girls' hostel has 120 boarders and the boys' has 115 this year. Boarding fee is Rand 118 or \$136 a term, three terms making up a year. At the end of each term comes 2 1/2 weeks of exam writing, when students do nothing but cram. College and university entrance depend principally on examination results.

Going to school in a foreign country and having a language barrier is an experience and, although I am not learning much academically because of the language, if I had the chance to do it all again, I would take it without a second thought!

FORGOTTEN POST OFFICES OF ACTON & SILOAM

Two events of importance to people living in the southwestern part of Isosco County occurred on April 18, 1880: Post offices were established at Acton in Burleigh Township and at Whittemore.

Importance of this action by the federal government cannot be minimized 98 years later. Except for logging roads connecting with State Road running through Reno Township, Burleigh Township residents were nearly completely isolated from the rest of the world.

A narrow gauge railroad constructed from Tawas City in 1879 reached the AuGres River and was later extended through Whittemore to reach Alger on the Michigan Central Railroad, but inland travel for a growing farming community was time consuming and a teeth chattering experience over rough roads of the day.

If one wanted to go to Bay City or the Saginaws, he walked or, before the advent of through railroad travel, he rode to Tawas aboard the narrow gauge logging train and then debarked from Tawas Bay on a passenger steamboat.

Formal establishment of a post office really meant that a tiny farming community had reached a high plateau in civilization and the local post office was a central gathering place for the exchange of news and gossip as well as to receive important mail service.

First postmasters in Acton were Albert W. Rikely, April 13, 1880, to February 15, 1882; James Meikle, February 16, 1882, to April 18, 1882; Orlando R. Croff, April 18, 1882, who served until the office was discontinued on July 23, 1883.

Although the post office at Acton was operated for only three years, it was one of the important links in communications on the old State Road. It is doubtful if an envelope with an Acton cancellation exists today.

The first postmaster at Whittemore was Robert H. Martin, who established the post office in his home.

On January 17, 1889, the Siloam post office was established in Reno Township at the junction of State Road and the railroad line running west from Emery Junction (now National City) operated by the Detroit, Bay City and Alpena Railroad.



SILOAM POST OFFICE was once a timber and livestock shipping center in Reno Township located on the Detroit and Mackinac Railway's Rose City Division at the State Road crossing. Later called Taft, a post office was located there

until the branch line was discontinued in 1923. Today, it could properly be called a ghost town and is pictured above. The family of Jesse F. Sibley, who was postmaster from 1904 to 1920, still owns the property.—Tawas Herald Photo.

Siloam, now a "ghost town" of dilapidated buildings and known locally as Taft, was a busy junction with a store, lodging house, blacksmith shop, feed store, depot and railroad siding for loading of pine logs cut in the area and for livestock.

Postmasters serving at Siloam were Emma M. Hitchcock, January 17, 1889, to March 30, 1890; James D. Cooper, March 31, 1890, to December 16, 1891; Alexander Anderson, December 16, 1891, to March 9, 1894; John A. Syze, March 10, 1894, to April 21, 1898; Elmer E. Odell, April 22, 1898, to December 1, 1902; Joel P. Colvin, December 2, 1902, to November 13, 1904; Jesse F. Sibley, November 14, 1904, to September 19, 1920; Dorman R. Williams, September 20, 1920, to January 15, 1923.

After abandonment of the Rose City division of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway, the post office at Siloam was discontinued on January 15, 1923. The area served by this office was incorporated into rural routes which start at Whittemore and Hale.

Acton, the first post office serving the entire southwestern part of the county, was located in Section 20, of Burleigh Township. Peter Hottis, a resident of Burleigh, would walk to Omer once a week to pick up the mail for that office as there was no through railroad service to this area until December 1883. Postmaster Martin from Whittemore would walk to the Acton office, located in the Rikely residence, and pick up the mail for Whittemore.

Sixteen different postmasters have served at Whittemore since Martin was appointed in 1880.



AMONG the eight different postmasters at Siloam post office was Elmer E. Odell, who served from 1898 to 1902.

Those postmasters include: David Belknap, July 17, 1882, to March 11, 1883; Myron E. Horr, March 12, 1883, to March 22, 1886; Charles A. Wakeman, March 23, 1886, to January 20, 1890; Louis Landsberg,

January 21, 1890, to April 6, 1892; Joel P. Colvin, April 7, 1892, to June 14, 1893; Frank Duplanty, June 15, 1893, to February 27, 1895; James R. Snody, February 28, 1895, to September 30, 1898;

Adam Cataline Jr., October 1, 1898, to November 4, 1902; W. Harry Price, November 5, 1902, to February 5, 1915; Mary A. Hottis, February 6, 1915, to May 14, 1922; Florence C. Curtis, May 15, 1922, to May 14, 1934; Hazel A. Graham, May 15, 1934, to May 20, 1952; Elva Lee Freel, May 21, 1952, to May 14, 1953; John A. Dickey, May 15, 1953, to November 7, 1975.

The present postmaster is Mrs. George Blust, who was appointed to that position in 1976.

Through the years, the post office at Whittemore was housed in various general stores, moving with the advent of new politically appointed postmasters to different locations throughout the community. It was operated under the designation of fourth class until shortly after Postmaster Hottis moved the office to a building used exclusively as a post office and the rating was advanced to third class.

Snody had his office located in a

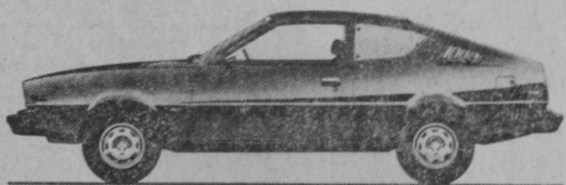


WHITEMORE POST OFFICE of today serves the area formerly handled by post offices at Acton and Siloam. The above building, located

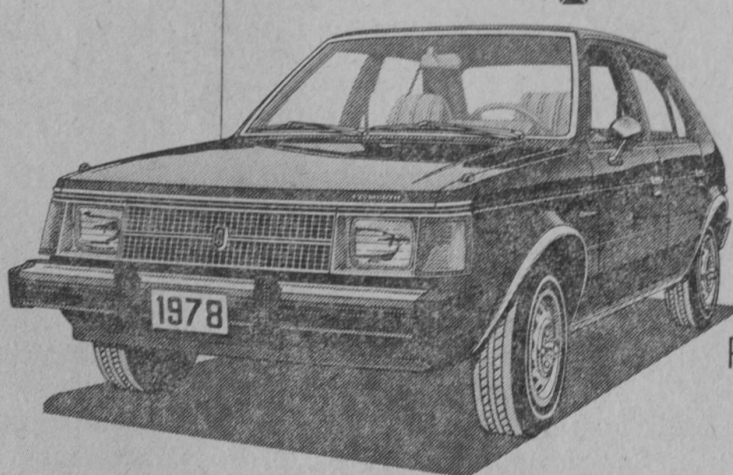

grocery store which stood on the south side of the railroad tracks where the Graham Oil Company pumphouse now stands. When Cataline was postmaster, the office was located in the Simpson Building on the south corner across from the Graham Garage.

Until rural free delivery service was established, mail service to farmers living in the northern part of Burleigh Township and southern part of Reno Township was handled on a nonpaying, voluntary basis provided by residents living in the area covered.

One of the volunteer carriers was William Gordon, who would make two to three trips to Whittemore each week, taking orders for supplies and picking up mail. After placing his orders with merchants and leaving mail at the post office, he would stay overnight at the Drummond House and make the return trip home the next day, delivering mail and supplies ordered en route.

During the tenure of Postmaster Price, the office was maintained in his store, then known as the Beardslee building.

Changes began to take place dur-

ing the years Price served as postmaster. The first rural route of approximately 20 miles was established in Burleigh Township on September 1, 1906. Eli Dutton was appointed first carrier on that route. On April 1, 1909, Charles McLean was appointed first carrier on Route No. 2, which covered about 20 miles in the northern part of Burleigh Township and the southern part of Reno Township. John McLean replaced Dutton on Route No. 1, October 16, 1908.

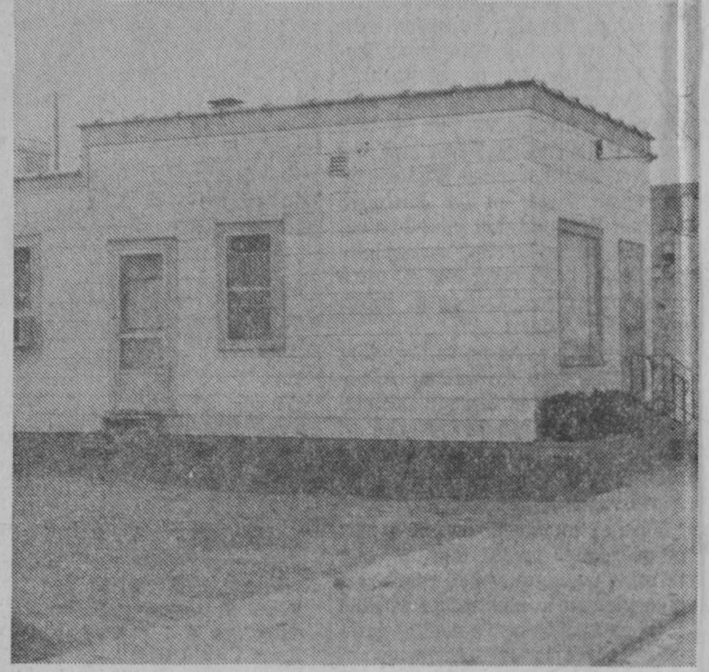
Postmaster Hottos assumed her duties on February 6, 1913, in the office located in part of the old Curtis building, now the Graham garage. A short time later, the post office was advanced to third class rating and moved into the former Fosco County Bank building.

On October 2, 1916, Arthur Johnson was appointed carrier on Route No. 2, succeeding McLean, who moved to Tawas City to enter the mercantile business. On January 2, 1911, Seth Thompson assumed the duties of rural carrier on Route No. 2. For a short time during World War I, while Johnson and Thompson were in military service, Charles Beardslee and Isabelle Earhart served as rural carriers.

By 1932, many changes had taken place through improved road conditions and faster travel with auto-



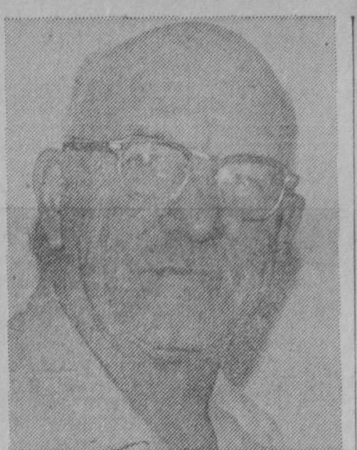
ARTHUR JOHNSON served as the rural mail carrier out of Whittemore for nearly 47 years. He retired May 31, 1963.



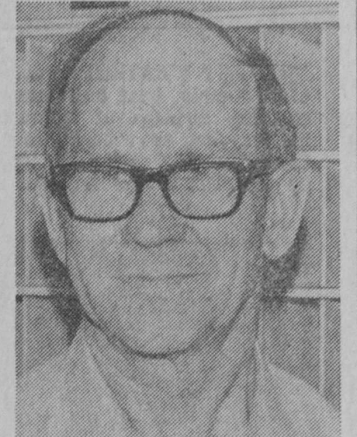

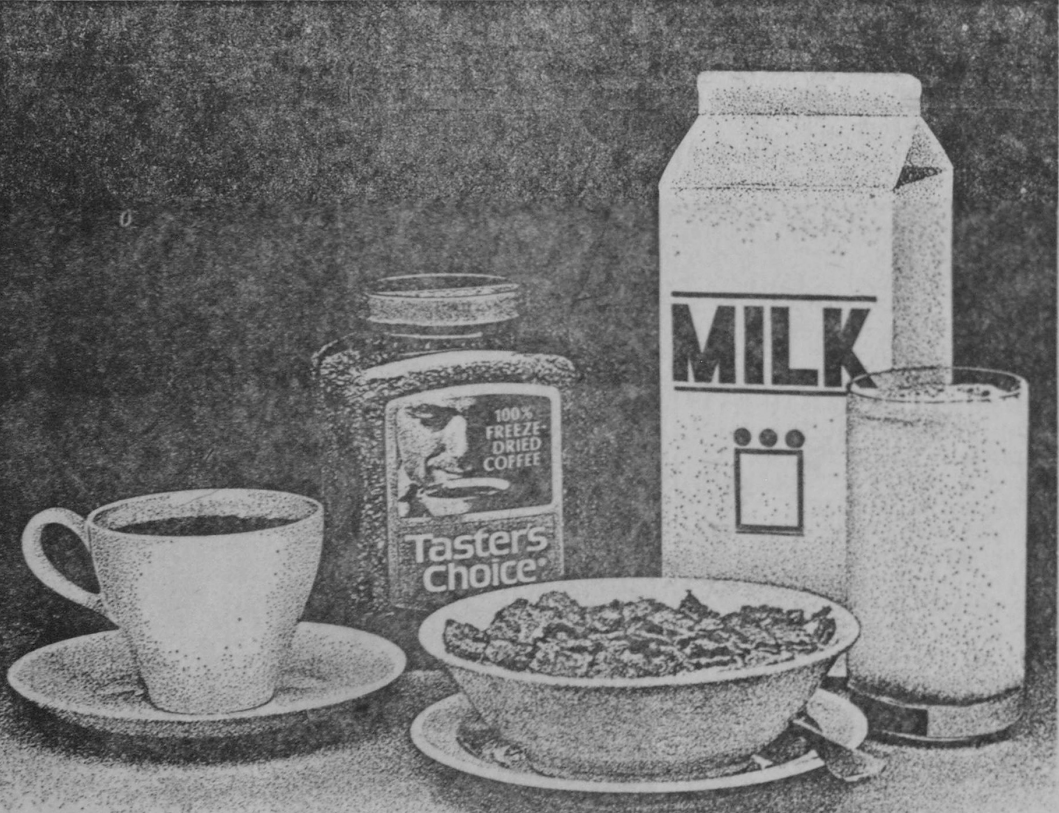

RHUBARB—The Vegetable you Eat for Dessert

Check the back yard! The first "fruit" of spring may be growing here. That is rhubarb, of course. Although it is botanically a vegetable, rhubarb is used as a fruit in cooking. And its appearance is one sign that spring has really arrived!

Now through June is the fresh season in this area. Top quality rhubarb has medium-thick stalks that are firm and crisp. Color will vary from light green through beautiful shades of pink to rosy red.

If rhubarb is the home-grown variety, be sure to cut off and discard all the leaves. They contain oxalic acid, which is harmful to eat. Wash and dry and wrap the stalks. Refrigerate for up to five days or cut into one to two-inch pieces for freezing.

How much rhubarb is needed? One pound gives four or five half-cup servings of rhubarb sauce and two pounds is enough for an eight or nine-inch pie. Rhubarb is great in pie, sauce, gelatin or jams. It can be used as an extender for more expensive strawberries or a substitute for apples in apple crisp. Here are two recipes that use rhubarb:

Rhubarb Crumble—Quick and Easy
Two pounds rhubarb, diced and sweetened to taste (one to 1½ cups sugar); one cup sugar; one cup flour; one teaspoon baking powder; one-half teaspoon salt; one egg.
Place sweetened rhubarb in greased pie pan. Mix dry ingredients. Add egg, using hands to rub in 'till mixture is crumbly. Spread crumb mixture over rhubarb. Bake for 30 minutes at 375 degrees Fahrenheit.

Rhubarb-Berry Salad
One large package strawberry gelatin, one cup boiling water, one 10-ounce package frozen strawberries or raspberries, two cups cooked rhubarb.
Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add berries and rhubarb. Refrigerate until set.

Dickey, the retired Whittemore postmaster, said that many changes had taken place in the Whittemore-Burleigh-Reno area over the years. "The post office was first housed in small corners of stores; then to additions to existing buildings, then to buildings which housed the post office alone. We, as our predecessors did, have watched the population of our city change as all cities do—children are born, raised, move away or establish their own homes and families to become patrons of the office.

"The countryside has changed from dirt roads with forests reaching in many directions, to modern, hard-surfaced highways or good gravel roads. The rural routes have changed from approximately 20 miles traveled by horseback, by buggy and cutters, or on foot, to 80 miles of good roads which are traveled by fast moving, modern automobiles.

"Trains which handled all the mail in the earlier days of the post office have been replaced by trucks; mail which traveled for a number of days to reach its destination in other times can now be delivered almost anywhere in the United States in a matter of two to three days time."

Many people now dead and two post offices—Acton and Siloam—are no more, remembered only in the history of this county, but all combined to provide the important service of carrying the mail to patrons of Southwestern Iosco County. This 98-year tradition of service is continued to the present day.

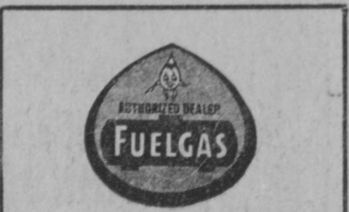
