



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

FORGOTTEN POST OFFICES OF



ACTON & SILOAM

Two events of importance to people living in the southwestern part of Iosco County occurred on April 18, 1880: Post offices were established at Acton in Burleigh Township and at Whittemore. Importance of this action by the

federal government cannot be minimized 98 years later. Except for logging roads connecting with State Road running through Reno Township, Burleigh Township residents were nearly completely isolated from the rest of the world. A narrow gauge railroad constructed from Tawas City in 1879 reached the AuGres River and was later extended through Whittemore to reach Alger on the Michigan Central Railroad, but inland travel for a growing farming community was time consuming and a teeth chattering experience over rough roads of the day.

If one wanted to go to Bay City or the Saginaws, he walked or, before the advent of through railroad travel, he rode to Tawas aboard the narrow gauge logging train and then debarked from Tawas Bay on a passenger steamboat.

Formal establishment of a post office really meant that a tiny farming community had reached a high plateau in civilization and the local post office was a central gathering place for the exchange of news and gossip as well as to receive important mail service.



The present postmaster is Mrs. George Blust, who was appointed to that position in 1976.

Through the years, the post office at Whittemore was housed in various general stores, moving with the advent of new politically appointed postmasters to different locations throughout the community. It was operated under the designation of fourth class until shortly after Postmaster Hottois moved the office to a building used exclusively as a post office and the rating was advanced to third class. 

She had first worked as a clerk under Mrs. Curtis and Mrs. Graham, served as acting postmaster for a year and later retired as a clerk under Dickey.

On December 1, 1957, the post of-fice was moved to its present location on the site of the former Detroit and Mackinac Railway depot. The rural route now covers 81.21 miles and provides service for more than 1,000 persons and nearly 500 persons receive service at the post office.

Johnson retired from his rural carrier position on May 31, 1963, after nearly 47 years of service. He has been succeeded by Charles Bai-



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

One pound gives four or five halfcup servings of rhubarb sauce and two pounds is enough for an eight or nine-inch pie. Rhubarb is great in pie, sauce, gelatin or jams. It can be used as an extender for more expensive strawberries or a substitute for apples in apple crisp. Here are two recipes that use rhu-

Rhubarb Crumble-Quick and Easy Sloppy Joes, potato salad, three Two pounds rhubarb, diced and bean salad, fruit gelatin dessert, sweetened to taste (one to 11/2 coffee, tea, milk. cups sugar); one cup sugar; one Monday, May 29 cup flour; one teaspoon baking Centers closed, Memorial Day powder; one-half teaspoon salt; one holiday.

Place sweetened rhubarb in Tuesday, May 30crumb mixture over rhubarb. Bake fee, tea, milk. for 30 minutes at 375 degrees Fahrenheit.

Rhubarb-Berry Salad gelatin, one cup boiling water, one milk. 10-ounce package frozen stawberries or raspberries, two cups cooked rhubarb.

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add berries and rhubarb. Refrigerate until set.




