

Mutual Savings Plans Grand Opening at New Building

Grand opening of Mutual Savings and Loan Association's beautiful new office building at the corner of Newman and East State Street, East Tawas, is to be held Monday through Saturday, January 8-13.

Claude Nash, assistant vice president and manager of the East Tawas branch, said that a gala array of prizes and free gifts will be

available all during the grand opening week.

Construction on the new building began last spring requiring relocation of offices, but the move was made to the 2,400-square-foot structure a month ago.

Four teller areas are located within the block and brick structure, along with three private of-

ices. The firm presently employs five persons.

Nash reports that a one-button drive-in savings system reducing long waiting lines is the newest service available for customers.

The drive-in customer need push only one button to get immediate person-to-person contact with the teller and a pneumatically-operated remote transaction system lets a teller serve more than one customer at a time.

Customer transactions are transported in a large transparent carrier that travels through a pneumatic tube to the teller. The carrier is locked in transit and nothing can slip out. When the transaction is complete, the teller simply returns the carrier to the customer. Tellers

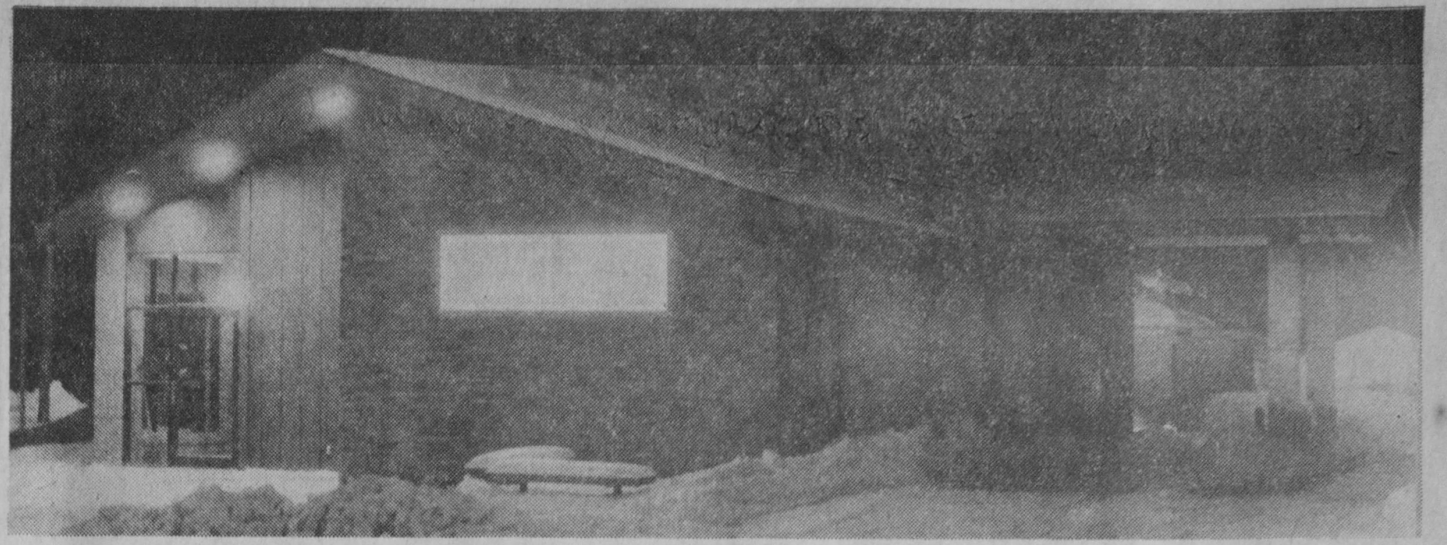
can see each customer and talk to them individually on separate audio circuits.

Nash called the new service "the ultimate in speed and convenience and a service that customers will also find easy to use."

The new building provides an attractive addition to the Newman Street business district, anchoring the northeast corner of the block between East Westover and East State Streets.

As a special bonus, the first 25 customers each day of grand opening week will receive a free frozen food knife. In addition, prizes are to be awarded each hour.

Refreshments will be served and there will be balloons and suckers for children.



Five Snowmobilers Hurt

Injury Crashes Plagued Iosco

A rash of nine personal injury accidents were investigated during the past week by the Iosco County Sheriff's Department. Five of the accidents involved snowmobiles.

Two crashes reported Thursday sent two persons to the hospital with minor injuries. Steven V. Carlu, 21, Alger, apparently fell asleep while operating a semitruck on M-55 west of Tawas City. He crossed the highway east of Sand Lake Road, traveled 100 yards in the ditch before hitting a driveway, then traveled another 35 yards before coming to a stop.

The second accident Thursday involved a car driven by Herbert A. Steele, 77, National City. The driver apparently sustained a heart attack and the car hit a row of mail boxes on Plank Road.

One accident Sunday saw Winifred W. Rutenbar, 25, Dallas, Texas, treated for minor injuries. The northbound car attempted to pass another car and the driver lost control. The vehicle jumped a guard rail on US-23 in Alabaster Township and it went down an embankment. A passenger, Todd W. Rutenbar, 24, escaped injury.

Early Monday morning, a car driven by Mary Jane Patrell, 39, East Tawas, went out of control after hitting snow plowed along the side of Tawas Beach Road. The car rolled over and the driver sustained minor injuries. Janice Walters, 35, Sterling Heights, escaped injury.

The five snowmobile accidents were as follows:

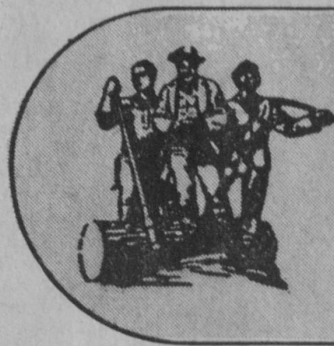

Iosco Sheriff's Dept. Lists Complaints

Among complaints investigated last week by Iosco County Sheriff's Department were two breaking and enterings, a larceny, a vandalism complaint and arrest of a snowmobile operator for violation of the state law.

A cabin owned by Donald Hall, South Branch, was entered by forcing open a garage door. A vacant cabin was also entered but officers were unable to determine if anything was missing.

Lynn N. Erickson reported the theft of three colonies of bees and hives from Keystone Road, Burleigh Township. The hives were last checked in November.

Dwight D. Dery, South Branch, reported Sunday around midnight that he heard three shots fired outside his house. After the lights went out, he went to investigate and found a power line had fallen over his car. A small fire had started and he notified the Plainfield Township Fire Department and the sheriff's department. Three subjects drove up in a car before officers arrived and officers believe that one may have been responsible for shooting the power line. Consumers Power Company was notified and the case remains under investigation.

While on patrol in Tawas City December 26, officers spotted two snowmobiles operating on Margo Street. One machine was operating without a headlight. The 15-year-old operator did not have a registration card in his possession and he was cited into probate court. The machine was confiscated by the sheriff's department.

River Has City Priority

City Received Assistance in Preparing HUD Application

Tawas City is to "take a flyer" at applying for federal money for economic development and community improvement.

At two public hearings held Thursday, Boynton (Bud) St. James of the city's parks and recreation board introduced John Czarnecki of the state department of management and budget, who assisted in preparation of a preapplication for a 1.2-million-dollar HUD grant to be submitted January 15.

St. James stressed that the first hurdle was to get HUD approval of the city's preapplication. If HUD expresses an interest in the projects, a more comprehensive plan would be developed.

Thomas Jacques, the city's forestry consultant, emphasized that in the event that the city's application does not meet the criteria for HUD funds, nothing would be lost as the experience gained could be utilized in future applications.

Jacques said the city council recently approved an application for Land, Water and Conservation funds administered by the state to develop the mouth of Tawas River with a marina and boat launching facilities. If approved, 50 percent of the cost would be paid by LWC funds. Application is also being made to the Upper Great Lakes Regional Commission to pick up 30 percent of the cost, leaving 20 percent as the city's share.

It is the intent of St. James and

Jacques to fund the city's share of the river mouth project with HUD funds, plus several other projects under consideration. Should HUD financing not be available, other sources of revenue would be required for the river mouth project if it receives LWC funding.

Tentative costs estimated by Jacques for the various projects included \$425,000 for the river mouth, \$65,000 for a creek side arboretum, \$132,000 for a neighborhood park in the south end of the city, \$162,000 for a park in the northern area of the community, \$46,000 for improvement to the park on First Avenue, \$150,000 for a campground and \$35,500 for a lake shore study.

No site has been selected for campground purposes. Jacques said consideration had been given to several locations, but no specific site was required under the preliminary application. One site mentioned for possible campground use, the L. G. McKay property east of the city park, definitely has been dropped from consideration.

McKay appeared at the hearing and said he still had plans for commercial development of that property and that it was not for sale.

Carl Babcock stated at the hearing that he felt commercial development of the McKay property would provide a valuable addition to the city's tax base and that loca-

tion of a campground there would not be in the best interest of the city because of its valuation and location on Tawas Bay.

Leonard Hosbach, president of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association, said that membership of the association had expressed the same opinion through a vote taken at its Thursday noon luncheon meeting.

Babcock pointed out that the city had purchased considerable property at the river mouth during the past two years, amounting to approximately 700 feet of lake frontage, and believed the park board should concentrate its efforts toward development of that property.

St. James said that river mouth development had top priority. He said he was not certain if present city land at the river mouth was large enough for campground facilities and that inquiry had been made as to the availability of land for purchase on the south side of the river.

He expressed the opinion that development of a campground would add materially to the area's economy through business improvement.

The parks and recreation board spokesman believed the city's master plan should be updated in order to have a basis for looking at future needs. He said that recommendation would be made at a future meeting of the city council.

Bopp-Busch Expanding Here

New Stamping Press Arrives

Future benefit to be derived from the recent establishment of an industrial development district in Tawas City was noted Thursday noon with the unloading of a new piece of equipment at Bopp-Busch Manufacturing Company on Industrial Avenue.

About 1½ hours were required to unload a Minster 150-ton stamping press which will go into operation later this year at the local industry.

Chester C. Busch, president of Bopp-Busch Manufacturing Company, said that production in the firm's new division is expected to start in April or May. Additional employment for the area could easily reach 25 or 30 persons, he stated.

This stamping press, weighing about 30 tons, was manufactured in Ohio and is the first piece of new equipment unloaded at the firm's steel industrial building constructed last year.

Busch said the 100 by 100-foot building may not be large enough to fit anticipated needs and an addition may be required for office space and stock storage.

This new high production machine will be stamping automotive parts at a rate of about 2,000 per hour once it goes into operation.

Busch said other equipment is to follow in the weeks ahead for installation in the new facility.

The new plant, along with the firm's tool and die division on the south side of Industrial Avenue, is part of the main operation at Augres. Busch said the firm decided to locate its new facility here because of the availability of land furnished by the city a number of years ago along with the assurance of a supply of natural gas by Michigan Consolidated Gas Company.

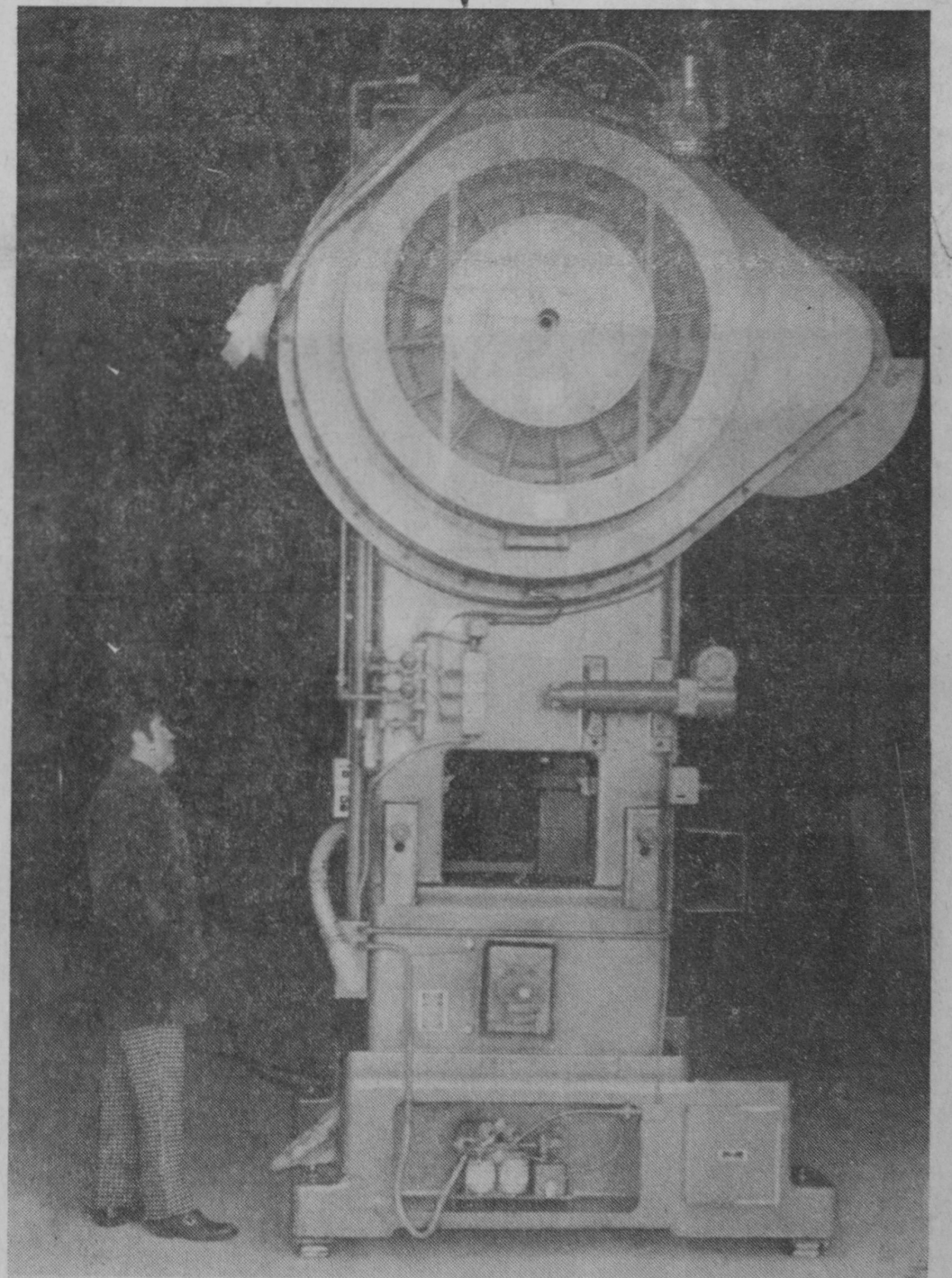
Earlier this year, the city council approved establishment of an industrial district here for Bopp-Busch under terms of a state law which provides property tax benefits to firms wishing to expand industrial operations.

Final approval of the district is awaited from the state tax commission and the property tax exemption may not be applicable until a year later than anticipated.

A total of six different districts have been approved by the city council for various firms. The only approval received to date from the state tax commission was one for Tawas Industries, Incorporated.

Obey City's Snowmobile Code

Snowmobiles are permitted to operate on streets of Tawas City, but ordinance No. 177 provides certain restrictions, warns acting City Mgr. Rachel Sue McCreedy.

"If operators will keep in mind the rights of others, complaints can be kept to a minimum," states Mrs. McCreedy.

Snowmobiles may operate on city streets, but not sidewalks, at no speeds greater than reasonable and proper with a maximum speed of 10 miles per hour.

The ordinance prohibits operation while under influence of liquor or drugs or in a reckless, careless

manner. Snowmobiles are prohibited from operating in any cemetery or park, on private property without consent of the owner, on M-55 or US-23 or the shoulders of these highways. Snowmobiles are prohibited within one block of the hospital.

No snowmobile is permitted to operate between 10:00 p. m. and 6:00 a. m. and machines must be registered according to state law. The operator must have a valid motor vehicle operator's license. If the operator is between the ages of 12 and 16 years, he must have a valid safety certificate.

Operators must come to a complete stop at all intersections, travel as close to the right edge of the plowed area of the street as practical, obey all traffic signals, signs and devices. The snowmobile must yield to all vehicles and pedestrians and travel in single file.

Penalties under the ordinance includes a fine, jail term and confiscation of the machine.

The acting city manager said that a complaint had been received concerning operation of snowmachines at the cemetery. She said that violators would be prosecuted.

Editorial— Look Before You Leap

Through the process of trial and error over many years, operation of local government has evolved to a point where any sudden shift in policy often results in the government being placed in an embarrassing position—often resulting in the vocalizing of views by elected officials.

That it is often best to "look before you leap" is an old adage which has often proven good advice to follow. That fact could be brought home to the Iosco County Board of Commissioners when it holds its organizational session this month.

Two resolutions adopted at the commission's final meeting in December could become quite controversial.

The commission voted to cancel its workmen's compensation insurance provided by a local agency and authorized enrollment in a new plan developed by the Michigan Association of Counties. Through this action, formal notice of cancellation of the old policy has been submitted.

County officials learned Friday, however, that Iosco was the only county in the state to submit its payment to the new carrier for enrollment in the state association's plan and the effective date of the new policy will be March 1, rather than January 1, as anticipated by the local board.

As a result, the county board of commissioners must go back to the local agent and ask for reinstatement of the previous workmen's compensation insurance policy, although the state association's carrier reportedly has given assurance that Iosco County would be "covered" in the event the old policy is not reinstated.

Because of the lack of knowledge concerning the highly specialized field of insurance matters, this corner can offer no comment concerning the pros and cons of changing workmen's compensation insurance carriers.

However, the editor was present when the proposal was discussed by the board of commissioners a week ago and duly reported that both the county treasurer and the commission chairman advised members that a complete study should be made before the county "jumps into something."

Past experience with insurance matters in the county should have been a lesson to all that a local study should be made before any radical change is made. In spite of "expert" advice from an outside consultant costing \$3,800, the county blundered a year ago when carriers were changed and it was discovered later that important protection was lacking in several instances—the county had to pay additional premiums and there was no saving of tax money.

Adoption of a second resolution a week ago, dealing with vacancies of employees in county offices, reportedly came on advice of a Michigan State University specialist speaking at a workshop for county commissioners. The resolution automatically transfers to the county contingency fund all budgeted money for a vacant position that is county funded.

Here, again, some caution should have been used before adopting recommendations of an "expert." The matter should have been discussed fully at a committee of the whole meeting and with some input from other elected officers.

This hasty action could open a real "can of worms," requiring a ruling by the state attorney general. Responsibilities and duties of such elected officials as the county clerk, treasurer, register of deeds and others are established by law; so, too, are responsibilities and duties of the board of commissioners. The "gray area" separating legislative and administrative functions of county government may require legal consideration.

It seems to this corner that the byword in any governmental operation should be a cooperative effort for the public good between various elected officials. A good place for that cooperative effort to start would be right at the county building.

Foresters Protect Wildlife

The Red-cockaded woodpecker isn't a spectacular bird. It's about seven inches long, and it has a zebra-striped ladder back, a black crown and a large white face patch. Chances are very few people will ever see one. However, there is something very special about it: The bird is officially listed as "endangered." But fortunately, foresters and others have been protecting the species, and it now appears to have a good chance to survive. Recent bird counts show an increase in Red-cockaded woodpeckers.

The Red-cockaded woodpecker once made its home only in diseased Shortleaf and Loblolly pine. It did not adapt to healthy trees. In their efforts to save the Red-cockaded woodpecker, foresters initially left certain diseased pines untouched, and the number of Red-cockaded woodpeckers appear to have stabilized and could possibly increase. Latest reports indicate that leaving dead trees may no longer be necessary to preserve these birds.

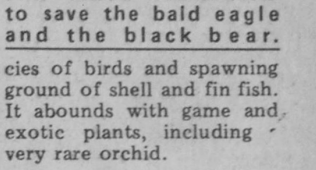
The Southern bald eagle is still listed as an endangered species. It is threatened in many places around the country. To help the bald eagle, foresters are preserving all eagle nesting trees on company land. They are

also distributing posters, free, which warn that killing or molesting this majestic creature is a federal offense. Another threatened species is the North Carolina black bear. One of the main habitats of this species is an area called Green Swamp Sanctuary, owned by Georgia-Pacific, which helps make certain that this species does not go the way of the extinct passenger pigeon by setting up a preserve.

Recently the company sold part of a huge mangrove wetland to the State of Florida, then deeded the ground of shell and fin fish. remainder of the land to the state. This is a well-known exotic plants, including very rare orchid.

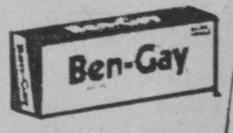

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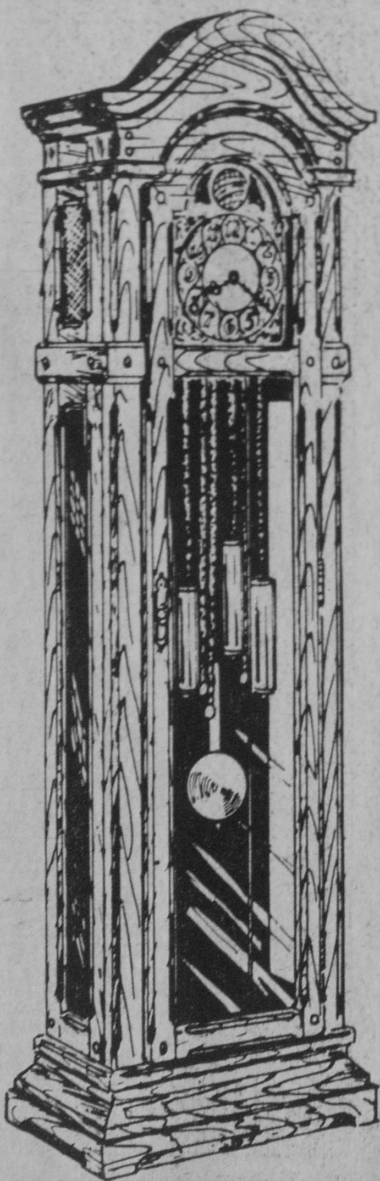

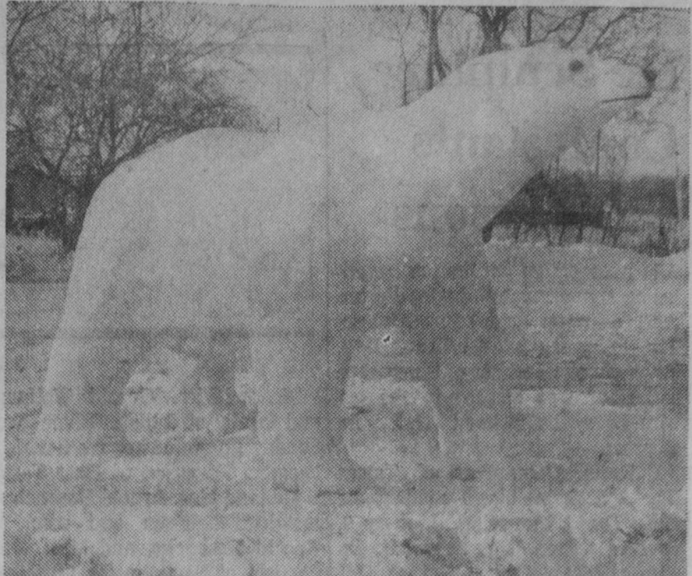

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Getting Kids Started in Cross-Country Skiing



Cross-country skiing is easy for kids to learn. In fact, it can be a child's stepping stone to learning any type of skiing. A child's natural habits as a walker make him a natural for cross-country even before he puts skis on.

Even though all ski touring first-timers won't have the stride and glide of an experienced skier, they will be able to move around and have fun. Once this has happened, the learning process will take its own course. Kids will begin to ask questions as their interest grows.

When children have the opportunity to play on skis, they learn quickly, since they learn better by experimentation and imitation than by verbal instruction. It's easier for them to watch and imitate motion than to try and translate verbal instruction into action.

It's also a good idea for kids to ski in groups. They'll learn more. There are many "sno-play" games kids can play on cross-country skis: follow the leader, hide-and-seek, tag, capture the flag and relay races to name just a few.

To get the most enjoyment from their snow play, kids shouldn't have to worry about equipment. Cross-country bindings are simple enough for any child to get into on his own, and out-

fitting kids for cross-country is inexpensive. For under \$80 a youngster can be completely equipped. Cross-country equipment is light and gives freedom of movement. It fits loosely, and doesn't restrict a child's natural walking movements.

A child should start with a soft pair of cross-country skis with very little camber and plenty of climbing wax to ensure a good kick. Nothing is more frustrating than a pair of slippery skis.

There are a lot of waxless skis to choose from, and if you dislike waxing, one of the many models available may be right for your child. Each has its advantages and disadvantages; experience will help you decide which is best. Personnel in a good ski shop can also provide the assistance.

Bear in mind that less clothing is needed for cross-country than for alpine skiing. So don't overdress a young skier. Too many clothes will inhibit his freedom of movement and make him hot and uncomfortable. If outfitted with proper equipment — good wax, the right clothing, extra clothes for stops and changes in the weather, some food and a nice trail to ski along — a child should be set for a morning or afternoon of enjoyable touring.

Holland House Suit Postponed by Court

A suit brought by the state fire marshal to force the Holland House at East Tawas to correct alleged potential fire hazards has been postponed until January 19. The hearing was to have been held Friday in Iosco County Circuit Court. A show cause hearing was to have been held November 29, but additional time was given to the owner to answer the complaint. Det. Lt. Robert Huddy, Third District fire marshal, made a determination that the building constituted a fire hazard on October 6 and gave the owner 30 days to advise of his intentions to comply with an order to make corrections. The fire marshal noted 17 deficiencies in the building and the Michigan Department of Labor's building inspection division noted 63 different electrical deficiencies.

SNOWMOBILE OPERATION IN TAWAS CITY

The City of Tawas City Ordinance No. 177 provides for the operation of snowmobiles on the streets of Tawas City. However, these machines must be operated as provided in this ordinance. Some of the more important sections are as follows:

- Snowmobiles must be registered according to State law.
- No speeds greater than reasonable and proper; MAXIMUM: 10 mph.
- No operation while under influence of liquor or drugs, or recklessly or carelessly.
- No operation in any cemetery or park.
- No operation on private property without consent of owner.
- No operation between 10:00 PM and 6:00 AM.
- No operation on M-55 or US-23, or shoulders thereof.
- No operation within one block of hospital.
- Operator must have valid motor vehicle operator's license; if between 12 and 16, a valid state safety certificate.
- No operation on sidewalks.

Operator must come to a complete stop at all intersections; must travel as close to the right side of the plowed area of the street as practical; must obey all traffic signals, signs and devices; must yield to all vehicles and pedestrians; must travel single file.

Penalties include fines, jail, and confiscation of the machine.

Snowmobile weather is here. If operators will keep in mind the rights of others, we can keep complaints to a minimum.

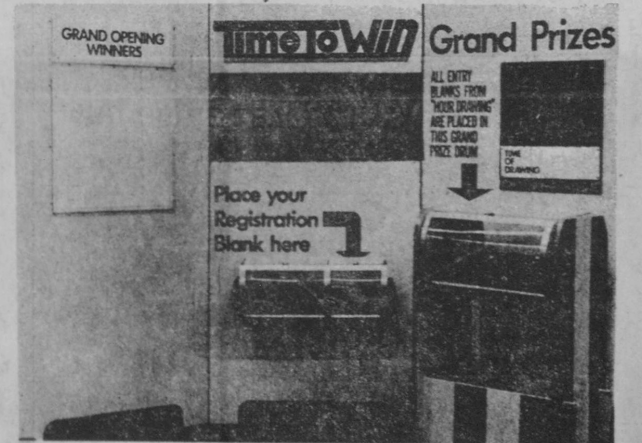

Rotary Club Honors Dr. Lewis C. Pinney

With nearly 30 active years and a perfect attendance mark behind him, Dr. Lewis Cass Pinney of Alabaster Township was honored Wednesday night by the Tawas Area Rotary Club.

A member of the Saginaw Rotary Club for 25 years and a four-year charter member of the Tawas club, he has taken active interest in the Rotary International Youth Exchange.

Since retirement, the Pinneys live on Benson Road in Alabaster Township, overlooking Saginaw Bay. In the summer months, they catch the sunrise at their home here and then travel to their home on Bois Blanc Island to watch the sun set in the background of the bridge crossing the Straits of Mackinac.

Named for Michigan's first governor, Lewis Cass, Pinney was born August 14, 1912, at Cass City, Tuscola County. He attended high school there, then entered a military academy in 1930. He studied at the University of Michigan for 1½ years starting in 1931, dropped out during the early depression years and returned to the university's dental school in 1934, graduating in 1937, the last year of the three-year dental course. He entered the graduate school at the university in 1937 and graduated in 1939 with a master degree in orthodontics.

While at Ann Arbor, he was a night time secretary for Fielding H. Yost for approximately four years, an experience related by Pinney that "it was a lot of fun observing Yost's reactions and meeting a lot of his friends."

Pinney started his practice of orthodontics at Saginaw in 1939 and was there for 35 years.

He and his wife, Audrey, have seven children and 17 grandchildren. Their interests include sports, youth and Rotary camp, which is headed by the Saginaw Downtown Rotary. While at Saginaw, he was a member of the Fordney Club composed of west side businessmen and now has a membership of more than 300. The club collected over \$175,000 for Memorial Field at Arthur Hill High School.

Collecting antiques and watching the birds and squirrels attracted to their front yard feeder in Alabaster Township provide major interests for the Pinneys today, along with participation in Tawas Area Rotary Club.

The dinner party honoring Pinney was held at Tawas Golf and Country Club and making a special award was Ernest Britton, past division governor, who presided at the original chartering of the local club four years ago.

Frank F. Taylor, a three-term mayor of Tawas City around the turn of the century, was a practical man who wished to be remembered for his good works. He is one of the few persons in local history ever to write his own obituary—just to make sure the editor had his facts straight!

Some years prior to his death in Tawas City on January 15, 1947, Taylor submitted an obituary to The Tawas Herald, asking Editor P. N. Thornton to lock the document in the newspaper's safe until it was needed—and to tell no one about it as he did not want to unduly alarm his family.

Born at Dexter on April 6, 1862, Taylor came to Isosco County around 1887. He was an active businessman here for about 38 years before becoming a county officer. He lived to the ripe old age of 84 years and nine months.

The obituary information furnished to the newspaper briefly described his activities as a businessman and civic leader. The report neglected to mention, however, that he was once the prime mover of a bicycling organization in the Tawas.

The June 5, 1896, edition of The Tawas Herald records that F. F. Taylor was elected president of the then newly organized Tawas Cycling Club. Other officers included L. J. Patterson, vice president; Miss E. Donahue, secretary; J. E. Dillon, treasurer.

The bicycle "craze" had just hit its peak and similar clubs were being organized in cities large and small. Here in the Tawas, the wheeling officers of the new club were Edward Conner, captain; Philip Richardson, first lieutenant; Albert Ash, second lieutenant; L. M. Whittemore, bugler; Michael Murphy, color sergeant.

"A committee was appointed to attend to building a bicycle path to Ottawas Point, which will be completed as soon as clay can be secured," stated the Herald's report. (It is interesting to note that 82 years later, bicycling has had a rebirth and interest has again been expressed by local residents to construct a bicycle path from the Tawas to Tawas Point, as it is now called.)

"The club will look after the entertainment of visiting wheelmen, who are expected to visit Tawas on the (railroad) excursion from Bay City and Alpena next Sunday," reported the Herald. "A committee has been appointed to secure a suitable place, to be in charge of a competent person, where visitors may have their wheels checked and looked after."

The club started out with a membership of about 35 persons, following its initial meeting held at the East Tawas City Hall, "and it is to be hoped that every person inter-

ested in wheeling will join, as no one thing will have more influence toward good roads throughout the county than good, live bicycle clubs."

Fees for club membership included \$2 for men, \$1 for ladies and 50 cents for children under 16. Selection of colors for the club was left to the ladies, who selected maroon and cerise. "The ladies are to be congratulated on the good taste in the selection of the colors," stated the Herald.

Rules adopted by the club prohibited use of sidewalks for cycling, except when the roadway was absolutely unrideable; promoted strict regard to others in the use of public roadways and urged riders to use caution when approaching horses, either standing or driving.

"No member, when riding with the club, shall be allowed to pass officers in command without permission," stated one rule. Another rule decreed that "all riders will implicitly obey and observe the orders of the captain or officer in charge when riding with the club."

The Tawas Cycling Club was instrumental in constructing a bicycle path to Tawas Point and used

its influence to promote the general construction of good roads in the county. The club enjoyed success for about a decade, but was soon forgotten when the automobile came on the scene. Promotion of good roads actually led to the club's demise as those improved highways were just what was needed to see general acceptance locally of the horseless carriage.

Tawas Cycling Club could not have selected a better man for its president. In addition to his interest in cycling, he had been associated with some of the earlier mercantile firms at East Tawas. Later, he entered business in Tawas City under the firm name of F. F. Taylor and Company, operating one of the largest dry goods businesses in this section of Michigan.

In 1924, he disposed of his store in the Prescott building (now occu-

ped by Alpena Candy and Cigar Company) to C. L. McLean and retired from business.

Following his retirement, he was appointed register of deeds to succeed G. A. Pringle, who had passed away. Taylor served as Isosco County register of deeds for 10 years.

Besides serving Tawas City as mayor for three years, he helped to organize the Isosco County Chapter of the American Red Cross and was its secretary for many years. He took an active part in the affairs of the Isosco County Agricultural Society and was interested in many other organizations which promoted the welfare of his community.

Taylor's obituary stated he was a life member of the Masonic Order and had been a member of the Odd Fellows for 60 years. He was a member of the Tawas City Methodist Church and had been Sunday school superintendent for 12 years.

Some years before his death, Taylor gave permission to his two grandsons, Richard and James Prescott, and a neighbor boy, Roy Landon, to repair his old bicycle in the basement of the G. A. Prescott Jr. residence, where he made his home with his daughter and son-in-law.

Taylor's geared bicycle was one of the most unusual wheels ever to appear on the streets of the Tawas. He had been the local agent for this particular bicycle for a number of years before the end of the cycling craze. In the early 1940s, the three boys tinkered with the geared bicycle and soon had it running, but discarded it in favor of the then more popular bicycles with balloon tires.

If living and able today, Taylor would be in the forefront in promoting bicycle paths in Isosco County. Cycling has taken on renewed interest in recent years and, with a shortage of fuel for automobiles clearly predictable in the future, the bicycle craze has made a full circle.

Taylor's unique gear driven bicycle would make an interesting addition to the collection at the Isosco County Museum, but like so many other early day bicycles, it disappeared from the scene nearly 40 years ago.

Few persons have ever written their own obituary, but it seems strange that Taylor would have neglected to mention his interest in the Tawas Cycling Club.

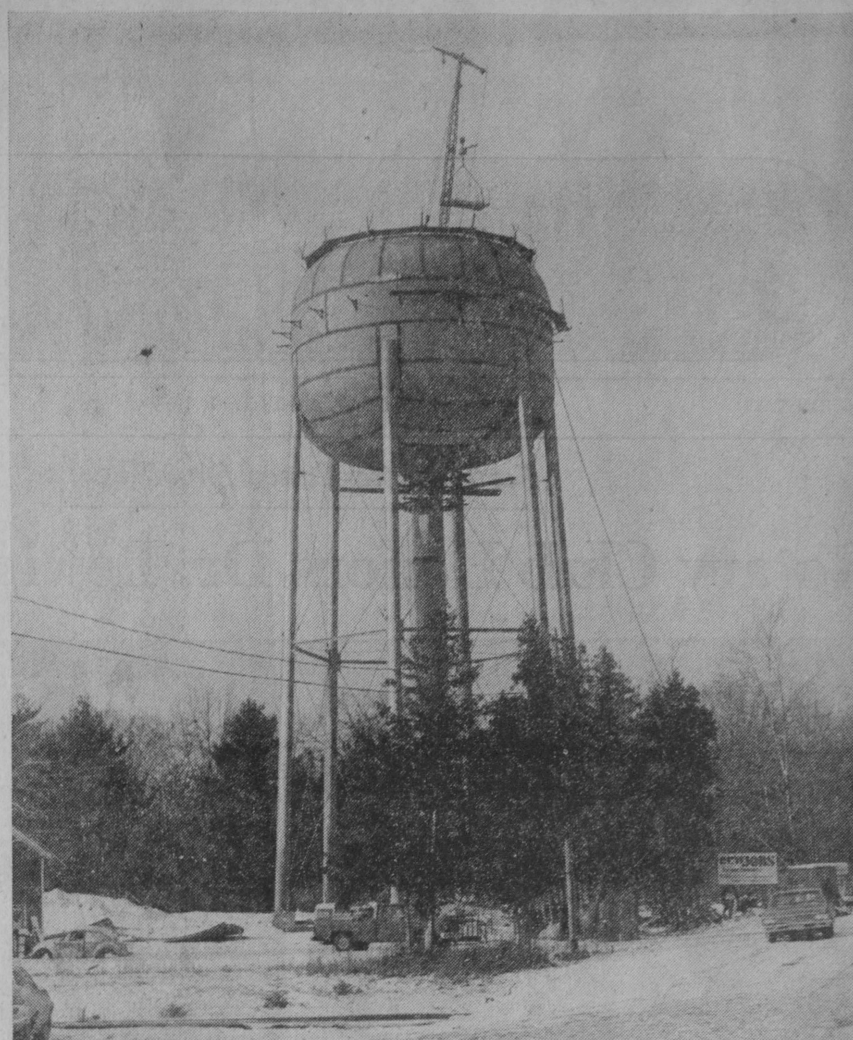

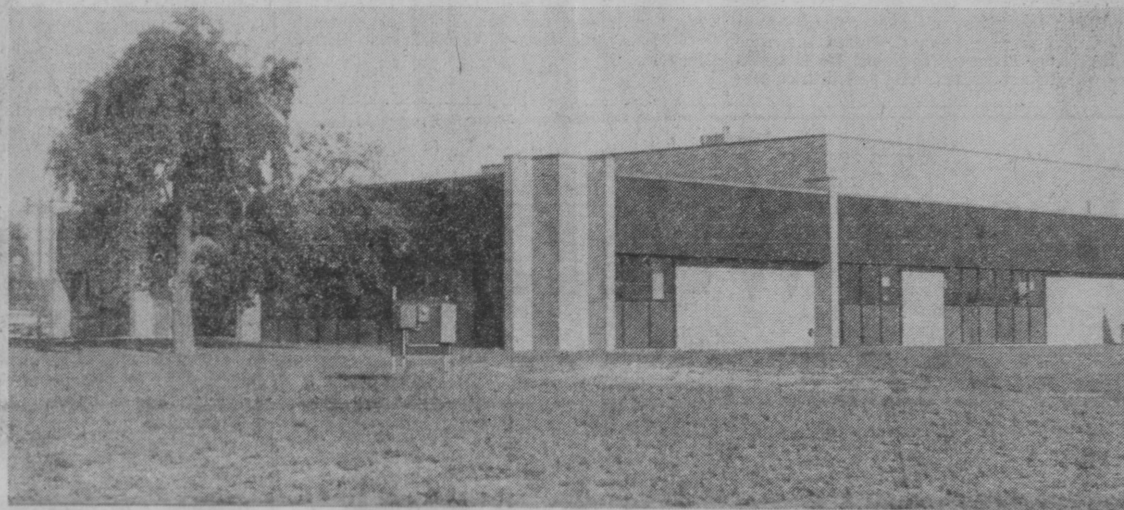

County Inspection Department Approved

\$11-Million in Construction Permits



Manitou Village and Provincial House Nursing Home were completed.



Commissioners planned and work began on Iosco County building additions.

More than \$11,000,000 worth of building permits were issued in 10 of 14 units of Iosco County during 1978 by the Iosco County Department of Building and Safety Inspection.

The department, headed by Edward Sterling, provides inspection for the Townships of Oscoda, Wilber, Reno, Grant, Burleigh, Sherman, AuSable and Baldwin Townships, as well as Tawas City and Whittemore.

AuSable Township discontinued its building inspection department only recently and the above total does not include the major portion of construction in that township for the year.

The largest number of permits issued in any single month was May when 99 permits were approved with a valuation of \$1,080,188 and the highest valuation of permits in any single month was August when 76 permits had a total valuation of \$1,823,259, closely followed by 85 permits in September valued at \$1,822,570.

Statistics of other months were as follows: December, 11 permits, valuation of \$252,010; November, 42 permits, valuation of \$731,541; October, 55 permits, valuation of \$1,730,271; July, 73 permits, valuation of \$1,272,555; June, 85 permits, valuation of \$854,939; April, 72 permits, valuation of \$1,534,334;

March, 32 permits, valuation of \$588,814; February, four permits, valuation of \$14,820; January, three permits, valuation of \$37,250.

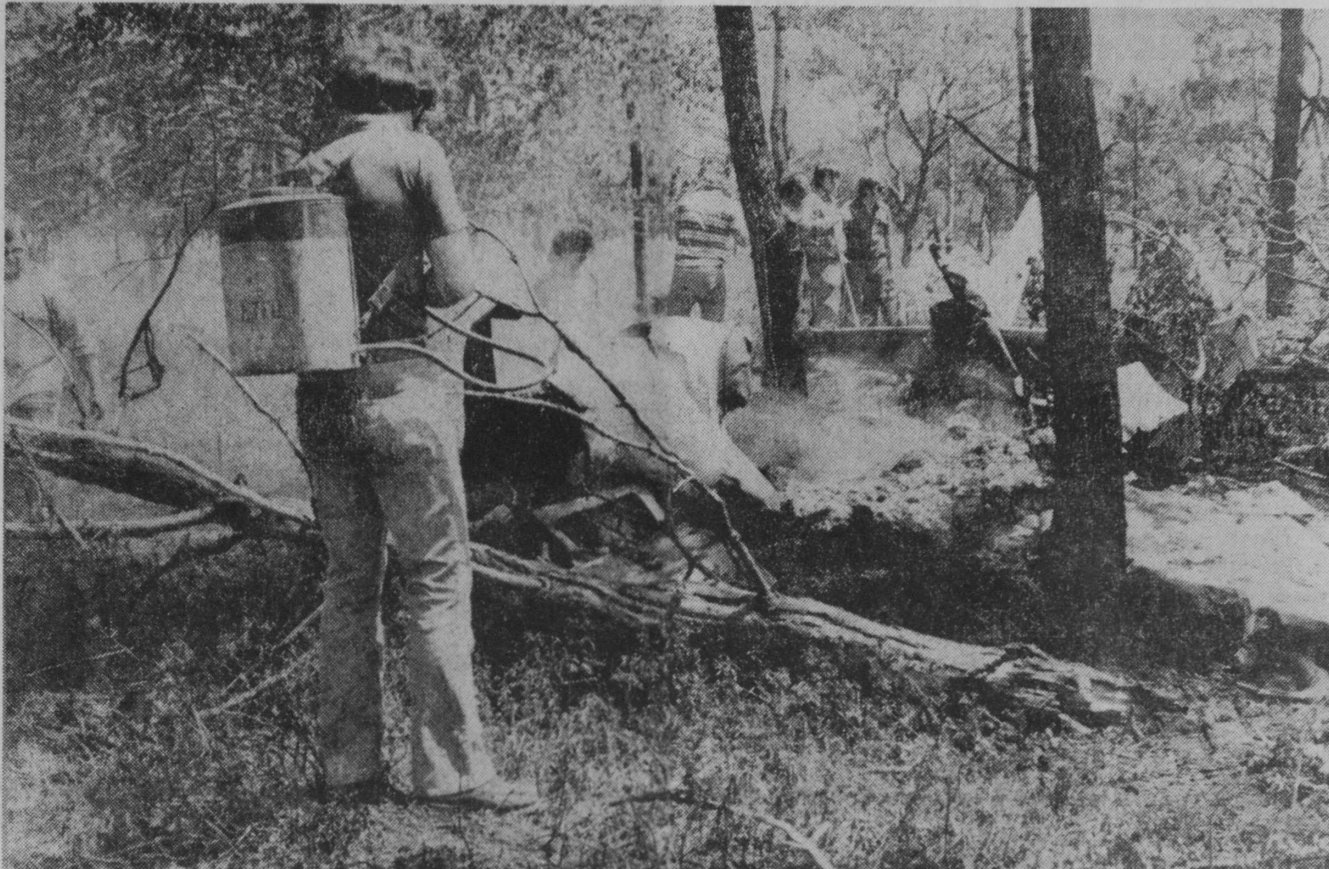

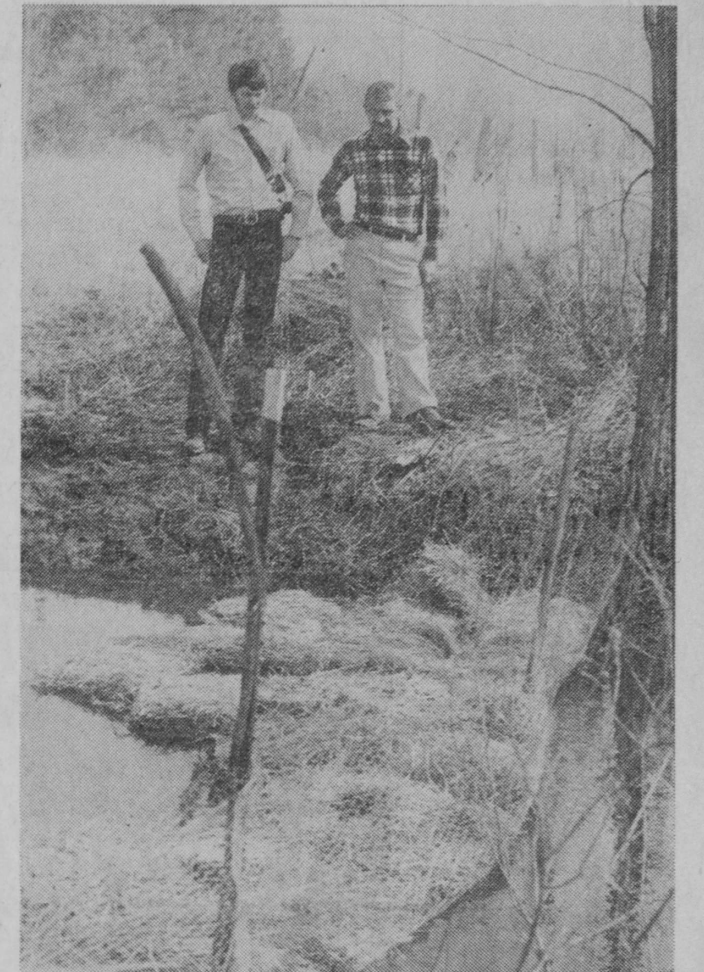

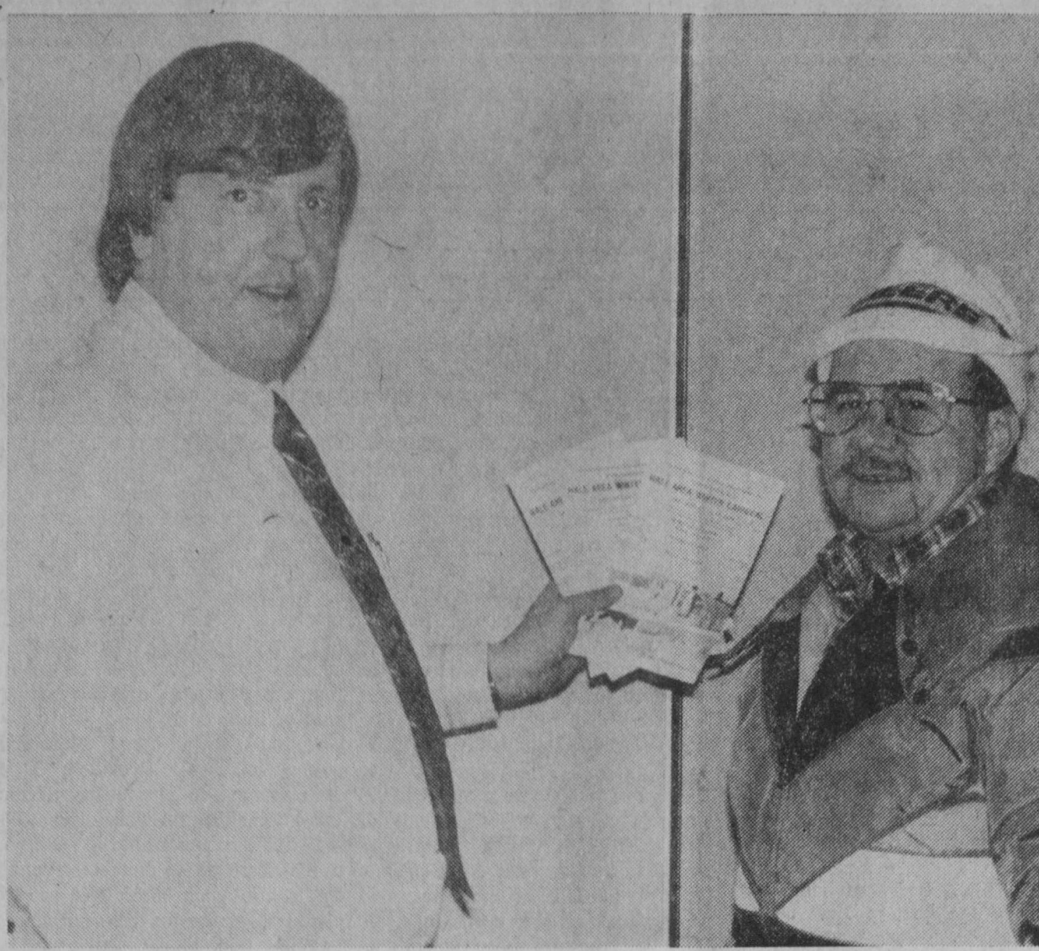
