

Let's look at the facts. First, about 69 one-pound loaves Brown, 627; Harry Davis, 614; change of \$1 per bushel in the price of wheat affects the net farm value of wheat ingredients in a one-pound loaf of bread about 1.2 cents a loaf.

> That means if the farm price of wheat increases \$1 per bushel, the net cost of the wheat ingredients in a onepound loaf of bread increases about 1.2 cents.

Now, let's look back a few years. In June 1972, just one month before the famous sale of wheat to the Soviet Union, bread prices in the U.S. averaged just 24.7 cents over-all total; packaging 2.5 farmer received. And, socents-7 percent of the total. Depreciation, business taxes, repairs combined took only cent. Miscellaneous costs ac- wheat in the bread. counted for 6.4 cents-18 percent of the total.

prices averaged 41.2 cents a pound (while farmers were getting an average of \$3.72 per bushel for wheat) and the net farm value of the wheat ingredients in the bread was 4.5 cents.

In other words, while the price of bread increased 16.5 cents a loaf during the period, the farm price of the only 1.9 cents. Looking at it another way, if you took the wheat out of the bread, gauges. you'd still pay 36.7 cents for the empty bag!

If wheat isn't the culprit, what is? A 1977 study-back when the fabled one-pound loaf of bread cost consumers 35.5 cents - showed that wheat represented about 2.7 cents (or about 71/2 percent) of the total cost. The net farm value of other food ingredients in the bread was 1.8 cents-or 5 percent of the total. Retailing costs accounted for 3.1 cents-or nearly 9 percent of the total. Baking and costs of distributing the bread to the stores accounted for 26 cents -73 percent of the total.







FISHING through the ice of Saginaw Bay dates back to the early settlers, who came to this shore more than 100 years ago. This feature tells the story of fishermen trapped on an ice flow and what happened to their would-be rescuers.

Saginaw Bay has claimed the lives of numerous summertime swimmers, fishermen and boatsmen during the more than 125 vears of settlement along its shores, but despite many "close calls," the luck of fishermen stranded on ice during late winter usually holds out.

Each season for more than a century, the local press from the Tawases to Bay City has published accounts of hair raising escapes of anglers, ranging from a handful of men to 200 or more, who made their way to shore after being trapped for hours - sometimes days - on floating shelves of ice.

In researching back files of newspapers, the earliest account of such an incident was recorded in 1874 by The Iosco County Gazette, then published in Tawas City.

Headlined: "In Peril," the news account stated that an immense field of ice covering several miles had broken away from the shore near Bay City and moved rapidly out into the bay, driven by a strong southwest wind. On this field of ice were between 200 and 300 fishermen with several teams, their huts and provisions enough for one or two days.

Fortunately, the luck of the ice fishermen held out and the wind changed to the west, drifting the field toward the east shore, enabling many to get off safely. Last reports stated that some 200 got ashore at various points, leaving 75 still adrift. Two men were reported drowned.

Fishermen were wary of conditions that winter and Tawas Bay was completely free of ice in late February. The main reason for any uneasiness by fishermen, however, was the fact that what was to become the worst tragedy in area ice fishing history had claimed the lives of six men in early Janu-







ORDINANCE NO. 198

AMENDING ORDINANCES 142 and 186 as FOLLOWS: AND REPEALING ORDINANCE 99.

THE CITY OF TAWAS CITY ORDAINS:

That section of Section 8 of Ordinance No. 142 entitled "Special Rates" is amended to read as follows: (new wording bold letters.)

The City Council shall establish special rates covering the use of water not measured by a meter, or for any other special use where a special rate is deemed advisable and

THE CITY OF TAWAS CITY FURTHER ORDAINS:

That Ordinance No. 99 is hereby repealed.

That Sections IV, V and VI of Ordinance No. 186 are hereby renumbered as Sections V, VI and VII in that order, and that the text of Ordinance No. 186 is hereby amended by the addition of the following new Section IV and Section V (c):

Section IV: Sewer Charges, Classification of Users, Collection of Charges

(a) The charge for sewage disposal services furnished by the City shall be a percentage of the charge to the user for water which the City may provide, and said percentage shall also be applied against any surcharge which a water user may be charged. If a user is not connected to the City water system, the user is required to install a water meter and clock on the well or other source of water serving the property to ascertain consumption, and the user's sewer charge shall be a percentage of what the water

charge would be if water were provided by the City.

(b) Properties connected to the City's public sanitary sewer system shall be classified, and the percentage to be applied against water charges to determine the sewer

service charge shall be as follows: Schools and Colleges 2. Churches and Lodges 60% 3. Hospitals 4. Governmental Offices such as Court Houses, City Halls, Libraries, Public Works 5. Property outside the City Limits 6. Other tax-exempt properties
7. All other users and properties

(c) All bills for sewage disposal services shall be rendered to users pursuant to a schedule established by resolution of the City Council, which resolution shall provide for a due date to be specified on said bills, and a penalty of 10% shall be added to all bills not paid by the due date. (d) No free service shall be furnished by the City to any

person, firm or corporation, public or private, or to any public agency or instrumentality. Section V: Enforcement

(c) Charges for sewage disposal services shall constitute a lien on the property served. On or before October 1st of each year the City Manager shall deliver to the tax assessing officer a certified statement of all sewer charges then six (6) months past due and unpaid. The tax assessing officer shall then place such charges on the next general tax roll and the same shall be collected as part of the general City taxes.


