

# Boundary Commission Sets Hearing on City's Petitions

An adjudicative meeting to rule on legal sufficiency of petitions filed by Tawas City asking for annexation of portions of Tawas and Alabaster Townships is to be heard Tuesday, April 22, by the State Boundary Commission.

The boundary commission, a section of the Michigan Department of Treasury, is holding ad-

judicative hearings on seven different annexation petitions filed in four counties.

The petition involving Tawas Township is scheduled to be heard at 11:00 a. m. and the one for Alabaster Township is set for 11:10 a. m.

Although action on April 22 is expected to be only routine, if the boundary commission rules

the petitions are sufficient, it is expected that future hearings will become heated as both Tawas and Alabaster Townships can be expected to oppose any annexation.

The city's plan for proposed annexation was first discussed last November at public hearings held with officials of each township. Township officials indicated then that they would fight any annexation petitions presented by the city.

Maps of the areas proposed for annexation when adopted by the city council on November 5 indicated that the city seeks to annex approximately 240 acres of Tawas Township territory and approximately 40 acres of Alabaster Township.

Proposed areas for annexation were modified somewhat from initial maps presented by the city manager and indicated the city sought less additional territory than originally discussed.

A bill presently before the state legislature sponsored by the Michigan Townships Association would effectively curtail future annexation proposals. Included in the new criteria would be one stipulation that a vote would be required in those areas affected.

Under the present law, a vote is not held unless the area to be annexed contains a population of 100 persons. None of the areas being considered for annexation by the city meet the population requirement for a vote.

## Twp. Hall Deluged by Baldwin

Baldwin Township voters showered a deluge of "no" votes during Tuesday's rain, defeating the township hall proposal by nearly a 10 to one margin, 353-37. Some 391 voters, representing 43 percent of the township voter list, showed up at the polls to administer a decisive "no" to bond the district for \$290,000 and convert the former Michigan Consolidated Gas Company building into a township hall.

## CETA Workers Hired by Sheriff

Six CETA trainees in a special six-month program were hired by the Iosco County Sheriff's Department this week to take some of the pressure off understaffing at the county jail.

Hired under a new work experience program at no cost to the county were three matrons

and three jailers, all of whom would not have deputy status but would provide such services as booking of prisoners, issue clothing and bedding to prisoners, handle visitations, check cells every 15 minutes, run the commissary and similar duties.

Sheriff George Westcott said Tuesday that in addition to reduction of department staffing by five persons since a year ago, operations at the jail were currently in a bind due to department members on vacation or sick time.

Westcott said he was presently short three road officers due to the lack of finances and that hiring of the special CETA trainees would provide the manpower to relieve officers of jail duties to permit their return to road patrol work.

## Rep. Alley to be Guest of TCBA

State Rep. Tom Alley of West Branch is to be the guest of the Tawas City Business Association Thursday noon at a meeting to be held at Covle's Restaurant.

He is to discuss pending legislation of interest to the area as well as possible assistance he might provide in promoting area projects. Persons wishing to suggest an agenda topic should contact Leonard Hoesbach, association president, prior to the meeting.

Representative Alley is to be conducted on a brief tour of the city prior to the meeting in order to acquaint him with present proposed plans for the mouth of the Tawas River and proposed development of the city's industrial park.

Fast Tawas business people have been invited to the meeting.

On May 1, a representative from Peoples State Bank of East Tawas and Detroit National Bank and Trust Company is to present a program on trusts at the association's regular noon luncheon meeting.

## No Contests, East Tawas Voting Light

With no opposition for incumbent candidates, only a little more than eight percent of East Tawas' registered voters turned out for Monday's annual election to name city officers.

Veteran Mayor Robert Bolon received 160 votes and was top vote getter of the day.

Grace Pelton was re-elected treasurer with 159 votes and Clyde Soper was re-elected city clerk with 157 votes.

Councilmen re-elected were Gerald Klenow, First Ward, 43 votes; Eugene Fernette, Second Ward, 59 votes; Ralph Western, Third Ward, 47 votes.





## Project Too Big for LWC Funds

# Gateway Park Has Initial Rebuff

Proposed development of the mouth of the Tawas River as a new Gateway Park to Lake Huron country has suffered an initial setback in the lower echelon of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, but City Mgr. Lowell Thomas hopes for better things to come from the United States Army Corps of Engineers.

The city manager told members of the city council Monday night that his initial contact with DNR officials at Lansing indicated that the state does not expend Land Water Conservation funds for shore stabilization projects, but would participate in development of the proposed park's interior.

Shore stabilization actually is the key element in any improvement at the river mouth, entailing construction of a riprap breakwater at the entrance into Tawas Bay and sheet steel piling along the east side of the river channel.

In its preapplication for state administered LWC funds, plans developed by the city's planning consultant and parks and recreation board emphasized that this entrance and channel protection was important to development of the interior of the proposed park, being billed as an appropriate entrance for US-23 travelers to the Lake Huron coastal system.

Thomas was informed by DNR officials, however, that the project may qualify for federal funds administered by the United States Army Corps of Engineers and the city manager said he had received a positive response during his preliminary contact with that agency's De-

partment office.

The city manager was told that federal funds are available for emergency stabilization projects of up to \$250,000 to prevent erosion of public shore facilities. The maximum amount under this funding would represent one-half of the total estimated cost of the project's first phase.

Thomas said he was awaiting information and forms concern-

ing an application for the federal funds. He believed the local project would be eligible inasmuch as the city owns the east side of the river mouth, that the property had been used for years by recreational fishermen and boaters and that erosion was a constant problem to the property.

Thomas said that the shoreline stabilization, dredging and filling was absolutely necessary

before the project could proceed. Plans also call for narrowing the river channel with the expectation that a flushing action would result to help keep the river clear of shifting sand.

The city had submitted its preapplication for \$477,000 in LWC funds as the first phase of an ambitious 1.342-million-dollar long-range project which has been the dream of local residents for about 50 years.

Since the initial rebuff on this funding, the city now hopes to secure other federal funds to help finance the initial phase and would make application for "piggyback" funds from the Upper Great Lakes Regional Commission.

The local share would be funded by a \$30,000 allocation from the Iosco County Parks and Recreation Commission and \$95,000 from the city.

## AuGres R. Drain Opposition Forms

About 200 persons attended a result of two recent public meetings Saturday night at Ar-enac Eastern High School, where a show of hands indicated that a majority of those present were opposed to the proposed AuGres River Intercounty Drain involving property in Arenac, Iosco and Ogemaw Counties.

Organization of Citizens Against AuGres River Intercounty Drain was formalized with election of officers. Heading the organization are William Olar, president; Pearl Schleip, executive vice president; Larry Shaffer, secretary; Julia Chiroi, treasurer.

The organization plans to comprise of property owners within the district, came as the

hearings concerning the proposed intercounty drain. It was explained by Olar that there is no personal animosity against farmers who desire the project, but those opposing the project object to the method of its financing under Public Law 566.

Donations were asked from people attending the meeting and from all concerned taxpayers for the purpose of hiring legal counsel. Checks may be made out to Citizens Against AuGres River Intercounty Drain, Julia Chiroi, treasurer, 2397 Stowell Road, Turner, Michigan 48765.

The organization plans to have another public meeting in the near future.

## Petitions Seek Speed Reduction on US-23

Petitions have been circulated in Tawas City seeking to lower the speed limit on US-23 from 45 miles per hour to 35 miles per hour from a point east of the river bridge to Townline Road.

Robert Pawloski, owner of Tawas City Sports Center and Marina and a member of the city council, told councilmen Monday night that businessmen and citizens were concerned over the high rate of speed of traffic in that area, especially because of the large number of residents and visitors who walk

along or cross the highway in that area.

Coun. Donald Hayes was of the opinion that even with super strict enforcement of the present 45-mile-per-hour speed limit, traffic would still travel too fast in that area.

A resolution proposed by Hayes and seconded by Pawloski was adopted by the city council asking the Michigan Department of Transportation to lower the speed limit to 35 MPH. The resolution is to accompany petitions being mailed to company petitions being mailed to Lansing.

## Council Authorizes Bids on Final Phase of Fishing Pier Improvements

Authorization was given Monday night by the Tawas City Council to proceed with opening of bids at the May 5 meeting on completion of the fishing pier at the Tawas City Park according to plans developed three years ago.

This project is being funded on a 75-25 percent basis by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources Fishery Division and the city. The state's share of the final phase is expected to be approximately \$57,000.

About 25 percent of the cost would entail underwater work

to strengthen the existing sheet piling. The remainder would include filling and leveling of the interior, construction of asphalt sidewalks on each side with a lawn area in the center, installation of wooden rails, lighting and picnic tables. Riprap would be installed on the east side to protect against erosion.

City Mgr. Lowell Thomas said a number of alternates were being offered in the bidding in order that the project would be held to the budgeted amount.

In other business, the council approved a new contract for law

enforcement provided by the Iosco County Sheriff's Department. The contract calls for an increase from \$38,930 annually to \$41,930, representing an increase of 7.7 percent. Approval was given by the council on recommendation of the city manager.

The council authorized an appropriation of \$28,111 in federal-state funds to pay Edmonds Engineering Company for its services under the step one grant in the federal 201 sewer study program. This study program cost \$205,000 and involved the Tawas-

es and adjoining townships. Tawas City's share of the local cost is to be approximately \$17,000 to \$18,000.

The council reviewed and adopted a community recreation plan developed by John Beckett, Ann Arbor planning consultant, and the city's parks and recreation board last Thursday.

Only minor changes were made in the plan which has been in the development stage for the past three months. A number of

### Meaningless Presidential Primary

Michigan taxpayers will again foot the tab for a meaningless presidential primary election on May 20 which will cost in excess of one million dollars. This election is ill-timed, means little because the vote does not bind delegates of one party at the national convention and will attract few voters to the polls.

The election is meaningless and has been so since its inception a few years ago. The outcome means nothing in the country's two-party political system as a voter is free to cross over into any party of his choice.

That fact was evidenced in the past when George Wallace, of all people, was named by Democrats as this state's choice for the presidential nomination. That turnout came as the result of a cute trick pulled by Republicans, who saw no contest that year in the nomination of Richard Nixon as the choice of state Republicans, and confused the political process by voting for Wallace in the Democratic column.

As a result, the Democratic Party is ignoring the May 20 primary in Michigan and only two candidates, Edmund G. Brown Jr. of California and Lyndon H. LaRouche Jr. of New York, are on the ballot. Michigan might ask: "Where are 'Jimmy' and 'Teddy'?"

The Republicans have listed John B. Anderson of Illinois, George Bush of Texas, Benjamin Fernandez of California, Ronald Reagan of California and Harold Stassen of Minnesota as presidential nominees. What a poor crop of presidential timber, but the vote will be meaningless as the candidate for this party will have been pretty well determined by election day.

Michigan held its first presidential primary election as long ago as 1916, but it was discon-

### Know Your Michigan Law

Our highly industrialized society produces millions of tons of hazardous wastes each year. Recognizing that proper handling of these wastes is critically important, the Michigan Legislature recently passed the comprehensive Hazardous Waste Management Act to control the transportation and disposal of hazardous industrial garbage.

With this law, Michigan distinguishes itself as the first state in the country to deal specifically with the problem of designating sites for hazardous waste disposal facilities. Each proposal for construction of a disposal facility must be approved by a nine-member site approval board, which is charged with the task of identifying and easing any local concerns that may arise regarding the proposed site.

Local participation in the final determination concerning the site's construction is assured by the law's requirement that four of the board members be representatives from local government—two from the municipality and two from the county of the proposed site. The remaining five members would be drawn from state universities and from three state agencies. Local participants would serve only for the specific site involved.

The siting board must conduct public hearings and consider all aspects of the construction proposal, including the risk and impact of possible accidents, contamination, explosions, environmental impacts, maintaining consistency with local planning and existing development, and the concerns and objections of the local community.

The act also calls for the formation of a state planning committee, consisting of representatives from the waste management industry, environmental organizations, state officials and members of the general public. The committee will prepare a comprehensive state plan for managing hazardous wastes.

The law addresses the problem of transporting hazardous waste. By use of a manifest system, the department of natural resources will track the course of hazardous waste as it is transported from its point of origin to an ultimate point of disposal, treatment or storage.

The new law further establishes a 20-million-dollar trust fund for long-term care of disposal facilities in addition to a one million dollar service fund for immediate use in cleaning up environmental damage resulting from hazardous waste emergencies.

A special hot line has been set up to assist the department of natural resources in identifying hazardous chemical dump sites. Citizens with any information should call (517) 373-7660.



### Deadline April 30 for State Mechanic Testing

All Michigan motor vehicle mechanics who want to take June 1980 state certification tests must apply by April 30, Sec. of State Richard H. Austin announced April 4.

The tests will be given June 7, 14, 21 and 28 at 26 state-wide locations.

According to Austin, Michigan's Motor Vehicle Service and Repair Act now requires every repair garage to employ at least one state-certified mechanic in the categories of major repair offered by the garage.

Effective January 1, 1981, however, the certification requirement applies to all mechanics doing major repair work.

"These June tests," Austin said, "are an opportunity for mechanics to take the first step toward getting certified."

Mechanics wishing to take the examinations may obtain applications from the Michigan Department of State, Bureau of Automotive Regulation, Lansing, Michigan 48918. Applications are also available at all department of state branch offices throughout Michigan and at most Michigan Employment Security Commission offices. Further information may be obtained by calling 517-373-9064, Lansing.

Combine four cups ground cooked ham with one small onion, finely chopped. Soak two cups seasoned bread crumbs in one-half cup hot water, mix with ham mixture and two eggs slightly beaten. Line an eight by three-inch loaf pan with foil and sprinkle with one-quarter cup brown sugar and one-quarter teaspoon ground cloves. Place four canned peach halves on the pan. Press meat mixture into the pan and bake one hour at 350 degrees. Turn out on a heated platter and carefully peel off the foil.

To add a vegetable to the menu, it is a little early for fresh Michigan corn on the cob but corn pudding or escalloped corn, as some people prefer, is delicious.

Add some tasty coleslaw made with Michigan cabbage, carrots and onions to the menu and baked apples for dessert. Rome Beauty, queen of the baking apples, and Northern Spy, both popular varieties in this state, are excellent baking apples.

Michigan apple growers lead the nation with their production of Northern Spies and produced about 100-million pounds of the two varieties last year. A total of 680-million pounds of apples of all varieties were harvested in 1979, third largest production in the nation.

Pickles are a picnic perennial, as are Michigan carrot and celery sticks, for a garnish tray. Other Michigan items you might want to add to your garnish display are deviled eggs, cottage cheese, stuffed or French fried mushrooms or onion rings.

If the weather should change, do not let it spoil your plans. Just move your picnic indoors. Pick up a potted plant and use its freshness to bring the outdoors inside! The state's floriculture industry is the fourth largest in the nation, earning \$2.1-billion dollars in 1978 (latest figures available).

## East Tawas Auto Dealer Sues State

An East Tawas-Oscoda auto dealer is taking the Michigan Secretary of State's office to court seeking to reverse a March 7 administrative order by that office suspending the dealership's state license from May 12 through May 21.

The attorney for William Look and Sons contends that the secretary of state's office acted in violation of statutes, used unlawful procedures, its finding were not supported by evidence and that the order was "capricious and clearly an abuse of unwarranted exercise of discretion."

The secretary of state's office held a hearing October 25 at which it was alleged that a salesman at the firm's Oscoda branch had made a representation in bad faith to a customer in that the salesman had established a price on an automobile with the customer, which included a trade-in price. Upon delivery of the car October 26, 1977, the price was \$500 higher than the agreed cost and the customer refused to accept the new price.

Although the state maintained at the hearing that the agreement was binding between the dealership and the customer, Look contended that the salesman was not authorized to make an appraisal of a trade-in, which was the responsibility of dealership's manager and clearly indicated that fact to the customer at the time of the transaction; that an actual inspection of the trade-in car had not been made until the next day by the manager, who found the salesman's estimate to be \$500 too low to complete the deal due to body rust and rear axle noise in the customer's trade-in car.

It was found at the administrative hearing that the customer was injured as a result of the alleged violation of the Michigan Vehicle Code in that he later purchased a car from another dealer at a higher cost

than that quoted by the local firm.

The hearing officer ruled that Look appeared to be conducting a business in a generally conscientious manner and that "the violation appeared to be an isolated instance."

In seeking to set aside the ruling, the attorney for the Look firm also pointed out in his petition to Iosco Circuit Court that his client was not represented by counsel during its appearance before the state administrative agency, which was a violation of statute.

The city-operated small boat launch ramp on Ninth Avenue near the mouth of the Tawas River will open for this season Saturday, April 12. Ample parking is available and the area is supervised by city personnel on week-ends and holidays. Tawas City goes to some expense to keep the river mouth open by dredging each season; therefore, the city charges a nominal season ticket fee or sells daily launching tickets. Tickets are available for purchase at the city hall or from the attendant on duty at the site.

## Mechanical Code Adopted by Iosco

Adoption of the state's new mechanical code came Wednesday with very little debate by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners. Enforcement of the new code became effective Saturday.

This action followed a public hearing two weeks ago, but that discussion centered chiefly on local versus state enforcement of the code.

Iosco commissioners opted for local enforcement by adopting a fee schedule presented by Edward Sterling, director of the Iosco County Building and Safety Inspection Department.

That schedule calls for a flat rate of \$25 for inspecting any new residential dwelling and \$10 for inspecting equipment in other than new single residences.

The comprehensive fee schedule adopted by the county covers every installation of residential and commercial heating equipment (gas, oil, solid fuel and solar equipment), as well as air conditioning and refrigeration systems for commercial purposes.

As a means of lessening the burden to property owners, while still complying with the state-mandated program, Iosco County's fee schedule represents about one-half the charge suggested by the state, but believed to be high enough to pay the cost of administration of the program.

Some home owners may ignore the law which requires that a permit be obtained prior to installation of equipment covered under the new act, but they will be risking a date in court if apprehended.

## Suggest Stand-by Ambulance at All Two-Alarm Fires

A suggestion by the Tawas City Business Association to have an ambulance standing by at all "two alarm" fires was taken under advisement Monday night by the city council and turned over to the fire department for a recommendation.

A letter sent by the association expressed concern over the fact that two firemen were injured in the recent blaze at Barbier Motor Sales, East Tawas. The opinion was expressed that when fire departments of both communities are called to a blaze, there should be a stand-by ambulance due to the possibility of injury to firemen.

Mayor David Westcott, who is a member of the fire department, said the suggestion may not be practical and pointed out that the hospital's ambulance service was centrally located between the Tawas and was in an excellent position to provide quick response.

The matter was turned over to Fire Chief Herbert Blust for a recommendation.

The city council and administration is to begin making plans to entertain a delegation from Imlay City during the annual observance of Michigan Week starting May 19. Tawas City officials visited Imlay City last year and were "royally received." Local officials hope to match that welcome with a similar program as part of the annual exchange of mayors.

A report from the Michigan Liquor Control Commission stated that an SDD liquor take-out license had been approved for Ed Free's King's Market, while a similar request from Brugger's Foodland had been denied by the state. It was understood that Brugger's had appealed the state's decision.

Considerable discussion was held on the city's sidewalk ordinance adopted last year. City Mgr. Lowell Thomas felt a study should be made by the council to determine if the ordinance should actually be enforced in residential areas which requires property owners to provide maintenance on a sharing basis with the city.

Thomas pointed out that many areas of the city do not have sidewalks and it may be unfair to enforce the ordinance against those property owners with sidewalks. He felt that a sidewalk construction plan should be adopted by the council should property owners wish to become involved.

priority changes were made in short-range goals to permit additional time for completion.

Financing of the five-year program depends greatly on receipt of federal and state funding, with the remainder furnished by the city through revenue and proposed bonding.

First reading was held by the council on amendments to the city's zoning ordinance which would control home occupations in residential areas.

The council accepted designation of the city as a management agency for operating waste treatment facilities and the sewer interceptor system as identified in the area-wide water quality management plan for East Central Michigan.

The city indicated its willingness to implement the recommendations of the plan to the best of its ability and practicality within the limits of funds available from local, state and federal sources.

Federal law provides that only those agencies designated by the governor and approved by the Environmental Protection Agency are eligible to receive Section 201 facility construction grants.

The city manager reported that work is progressing on the 1980-81 operational budget which is due for initial review at the next meeting of the council.

The council approved a request from Tawas Chamber of Commerce for the annual fireworks display at the city park on July 4.

Refresher training simulates all aspects of actual battle. The crew is taught to react as a team to nuclear and chemical attacks, fires and damage within the ship, personnel injuries and other emergency situations. When the training is complete, the ship will rejoin the fleet as a battle-ready unit.

A 1974 graduate of Alpena Senior High School, Simmons joined the navy in June 1975. His wife, Nancy, is the daughter of the Robert Trefas, Alpena.

## Charged With Breaking Into Beach Rd. Home

Norman Snider, 24, Tawas City, was charged April 2 with breaking into an occupied dwelling on Tawas Beach Road. The arrest was made by Michigan State Police from East Tawas.

Officers said that Mary S. Sutton was awakened by the barking of her dog and she heard the door of her residence being forced open. She notified state police, who had assistance from the Iosco County Sheriff's Department.

Officers said they found Snider in the living room reading a magazine. They said he appeared to be intoxicated and confused over the fact that he was looking for a party and had entered the wrong house.

## Reservations for Group Camping

United States Forest Service officials have announced that they will be accepting reservations for group camping at the Bowman Bridge Recreation Area, located on the Baldwin Ranger District, this summer. Preference will be given to groups directly using the Pere Marquette National Scenic River. The minimum size of group that will be considered is 10 people and the maximum group size will be 25 people per group site. A per day use fee will be charged for each site, which includes a nonreturnable fee for reservation. The reservation system is regulated on a first-come, first-served basis with only four groups allowed within the group area at one time.

Interested user groups should apply to the District Ranger, United States Forest Service, Baldwin, MI 49304, or phone (616) 745-4631 for a camping permit at least 30 days in advance of intended use. Requests must include the name, type and size of the group, the dates of intended use and alternate dates of use, and the group's designated representative with an address and telephone number.

The Bowman Bridge Recreation Area was constructed in 1978-79 and a portion of the area was opened to camping in July 1979. The area is located on the Pere Marquette National Scenic River and, in addition to camping, has facilities for launching canoes and for parking 50 vehicles.

The Bowman Bridge Recreation Area is located 4½ miles west of Baldwin. The area will be open to camping starting May 16.

Frank Walker has not been on a motorcycle in 16 years—his last "appearance" was in connection with a safe driving campaign published in this newspaper—but he once held several world records on quarter-mile board tracks and at one time represented the Indian Motorcycle Company.

Best known for his 30-year career in the Michigan State Police—which he joined in 1919 when officers were mounted on horses—Walker first commanded the state's motorcycle division, then had charge of the United States Border Patrol running down bootleggers on the Detroit River and returned to command a half dozen state police posts in Michigan.

His last assignment was commander of the state police post at East Tawas and he has resided since then at 402 Fourth Street in Tawas City. He still enjoys working around his yard, which is always one of the neatest in town.

Walker's feats on motorcycles are legendary in state police circles, although there are few, if any, active officers around today who were members of "Michigan's finest" when he retired 30 years ago; in the ranks of the retired, there are few, if any officers, who recall his famous ride at Lansing.

He began racing on dirt tracks at county fairsgrounds in Michigan and Ohio in 1913. The following year at Covington, Kentucky, he broke the world's speed record by averaging 91 miles per hour for 25 miles on a quarter-mile board track. This was considered super speed on machines of those days and newspaper clippings in his scrapbook show he won races at Cleveland, Ohio, and at Detroit.

During World War I, Walker enlisted in the United States Army in 1917 with the rank of sergeant and spent two years overseas with a motorcycle unit, serving at the front in France as a dispatch rider.

One of the interesting phases of Walker's long police career was the border patrol. In August 1925, on recommendation of State Police Commissioner Allan G. Straight, he was placed in charge of 35 men and 10 speedboats which patrolled the United States-Canadian border along Lake Huron, Lake Erie, Lake St. Clair and the Detroit River.

Along with liquor smugglers apprehended, a number of aliens were picked up for entering the country illegally. The liquor boats confiscated were sold at

public auction and the bootleggers would buy them back. It was a tough law to enforce and the repeal of prohibition put an end to the rumrunners along the waterfront.

Before ending his state police career at East Tawas, Walker commanded posts at Wayne, Grandville, Mt. Pleasant, Ypsilanti and Flat Rock. He received eight certificates of citation for meritorious service, which included arrests for bank robbery, armed robbery, breaking and entering, car theft and other felonies.

Walker was around motorcycles for more than 35 years and he was still riding one the year he retired here, but that was his own and not a state machine. The Michigan State Police discontinued use of motorcycles years earlier because it was losing too many good men through accidents. High speed chases by

officers on motorcycles were just too hazardous.

A few now-graying officers still smile when they hear about the legend of Frank Walker, which had been repeated to them years ago by senior SP officers. A cub reporter in 1949 enjoyed hearing that story and recalls it today.

When Walker joined the Michigan State Troops—that is what the state police was called in 1919—he was given the regular motorcycle proficiency test offered recruits.

None of the instructors present recognized the name of the new trooper, who just happened to be one of the country's expert riders prior to his wartime experience. Before his first day of instruction, Walker said that he had never before driven a motorcycle. Deciding he would have a little fun, Walker and his machine suddenly took off in a cloud of dust and headed straight into the garage at the Lansing headquarters of the state police.

Expecting to find the new recruit and the machine flattened against the far wall of the building, his brother officers stopped in their tracks and were confounded when Walker and his machine roared out of the other

door—still at a breakneck speed.

Walker admitted many years later that it was "a fool trick," but he had a twinkle in his eye when he said it. The instructors did not know that they had been "set up" for the exhibition. Walker had poured sand on the floor and had long practice at controlled skids on race tracks before entering the state police.

Because of his long experience, Walker immediately became commander of the state's motorcycle division. The retired state police officer has not tried any controlled skids in recent years, but he has always had some good advice for young motorcycle riders—"Too much speed, disobedience of traffic rules by yourself or some other driver and you could be in real trouble."

After his retirement in 1949, he served Tawas City as justice of the peace for four years. Until the last week in March, he was still taking his daily walk to the post office, but an old motorcycle injury nearly 70 years ago must be catching up with the "Old Sarge" as he is thinking about installing a postal carrier box in front of his house.

# Proceedings of Iosco County Board of Commissioners

## MARCH SESSION (CONT'D)

March 19, 1980  
A regular meeting of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners held at the County Building in Tawas City on March 19, 1980, pursuant to published schedule.

Meeting called to order at 2:30 p. m. by Chairman Webb and the roll called.

Present: Stech (District 1), George (District 2), Merschel (District 3), Ulman (District 4) and Webb (District 5).  
Absent: None.

The clerk passed out copies of a report he prepared breaking down unemployment benefits paid during the year 1979 to former employees of the county, county parks and CETA program, for which reimbursement is due the Michigan Employment Security Commission, indicating the county's share of the reimbursement obligation to be \$3,520,000; further reporting on the necessity to provide funding in the county budget for tax refunds required to be made by the county treasurer pursuant to judgments of the Michigan Tax Tribunal with respect to appeals by property owners.

Commissioner Merschel reported in reference to a letter received from County Attorney Ronald Tyler pertaining to a request by Attorney Thomas Huck for correction of an error on a deed recorded in 1962, which passed title on a certain parcel of property in the county from the County of Iosco to Otto and Louise Ernst, presenting and moving adoption of the following resolution. Motion supported by Ulman and carried.

Your building and grounds committee recommends that Chairman John Webb and County Clerk D. Keith Pappas be authorized to sign the attached deed submitted by Attorney Thomas Huck, running from the County of Iosco to Louise E. Ernst, correcting a deed recorded in Liber 248, page 134, of the records of the Iosco County Register of Deeds.

Commissioner Stech presented and moved adoption of the following resolutions:

WHEREAS, District Health Departments in the State of Michigan are formed pursuant to Part 24, Section 2415, of Act 368, Public Acts of 1978; and

WHEREAS, in this formation process single county health departments and district health departments are responsible to the same "local governing entity"; and

WHEREAS, for purposes of Workmen's Compensation Insurance, single county health departments are allowed to belong to the "Michigan Counties Workers' Compensation Fund"; and the district health departments in this state, by administrative decision, are not allowed to belong to this fund, thus preventing districts from sharing in the savings and other benefits of this fund;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That Iosco County, being one of the local governing entities comprising District Health Department No. 2, does hereby petition Bruno Czyrka, representing the "Bureau of Workers Disability Compensation Insurance Programs" to become a member in the Michigan Counties Workers Compensation Fund, thus eliminating the inequity and discrimination against District Health Departments by the "Bureau of Workers Disability Compensation Insurance Programs."

Supported by Merschel and carried.

Your airport committee recommends that Chairman John Webb be authorized to sign the loan agreement with the State of Michigan for the sum of \$50,000 to be used for airport development. The agreement, on the part of Iosco County, shall be contingent upon the approval of the Michigan Aeronautics Commission to provide funds in the amount of \$97,500 as the state's share of the project.

Supported by Merschel, and following a period of discussion wherein it was indicated that the pay-back would be at the rate of \$6,800 per year, anticipated to be derived from airport revenues, carried.

Your public safety committee recommends that the Iosco County Board of Commissioners approve the issuance of individual "Visa" charge cards to the sheriff, the undersheriff and the Iosco County detective.

Supported by Merschel and carried.

Commissioner Ulman presented and moved adoption of the following resolution, whereupon the motion was supported by Stech and discussed at some length: Merschel expressing his disapproval of the action, indicating it would be a disservice to county residents; Ulman voicing the opinion that the board should lobby against undesirable parts of the code; Stech indicating that the code is too comprehensive for counties the size of Iosco; and Webb indicating that if the code must be enforced, he would rather have it done by local people than state people.

Motion carried and resolution adopted on the following roll call: Ayes: Stech, George and Ulman; Nays: Merschel and Webb.

WHEREAS, Act 230 of Public Acts of 1972 was amended to make it mandatory that the approved mechanical code be enforced by each municipality and township; or, that in lieu thereof, the county shall administer and enforce the state approved mechanical code effective April 5, 1980; and

WHEREAS, the cost of such administration and enforcement to Iosco County will be excessive because of the tremendous increase in fuel costs and wages for additional staff; and

WHEREAS, placing more personnel on the public payroll will not solve the problems which existed before the enactment of the mechanical code; and

WHEREAS, creating new, or increasing current permit fees to underwrite the additional costs to the County of Iosco will place a greater burden on the taxpayers of Iosco County; and

WHEREAS, the County of Iosco is facing increased state mandates and costs for providing new services, yet experiencing declining revenues each year due to tax limitation proposals; and

WHEREAS, the County of Iosco has suffered from reduced state funded services, which is critical because this conflicts with the state mandated administration and enforcement of the mechanical code; and

WHEREAS, if single family dwellings could be exempted from the requirements of the mechanical code, thereby relieving rural counties of a great financial burden;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Iosco County Board of Commissioners requests that the requirement for

administering and enforcing state mechanical code by counties under 50,000 population be waived; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent by the county clerk to all counties having a population under 50,000, Representative Tom Alley, Senator Mitch Irwin and Senator Robert Young.

Finance Chairman George presented and moved adoption of the following resolutions:

Your finance committee recommends that travel expense vouchers for County Road Commissioners A. J. Aulerich and Henry Conley in the amounts of \$23.00 and \$27.54, respectively, be approved for payment from road commission funds.

Supported by Stech and carried.

Your finance committee recommends that, after review, the chairman of the board of commissioners and the county clerk be authorized to approve per diem compensation for meetings through today and salary for the month of March for the board of commissioners.

Supported by Merschel and carried.

Motion supported by George, and, following a discussion, it was moved by Stech and supported by George to table the matter until 1:30 p. m. at the next official meeting. Motion to table carried.

The business scheduled for the day having been concluded, it was moved by Stech and supported by George to adjourn until April 2, 1980, 2:00 p. m., or subject to the call of the chair upon 24 hours notice to board members and the news media. Motion carried and meeting adjourned at 3:55 p. m.






