FRANK WALKER: Legendary State Motorcycle Cop

Frank Walker has not been on a motorcycle in 16 years—his last "appearance" was in connection with a safe driving campaign published in this newspaper-but he once held several world records on quarter-mile board tracks and at one time represented the Indian Motorcycle Company.

Best known for his 30-year career in the Michigan State Police—which he joined in 1919 when officers were mounted on horses-Walker first commanded the state's motorcycle division, then had charge of the United States Border Patrol running down bootleggers on the Detroit River and returned to command a half dozen state police posts in Michigan.

His last assignment was commander of the state police post at East Tawas and he has resided since then at 402 Fourth Street in Tawas City. He still enjoys working around his yard, which is always one of the

Walker's feats on motorcycles are legendary in state police circles, although there are few, if any, active officers around today who were members of "Michigan's finest" when he retired 30 years ago; in the ranks of the retired, there are few, if any officers, who recall his famous ride at Lansing.

He began racing on dirt tracks at county fairgrounds in Michigan and Ohio in 1913. The following year at Covington, Kentucky, he broke the world's speed record by averaging 91 miles per hour for 25 miles on a quarter-mile board track. This was considered super speed on


