Committee to Study Iosco Landfill

As could be expected, townships and cities of Iosco County faced with paying for the operation of a sanitary landfill would rather have the financing handled by the county board of commissioners.

And, if it is indeed the case that the county can no longer support operation of the present landfill with federal revenue sharing money, representatives of the local units felt that the county board of commissioners should be the coordinating agency seeking required revenue by asking voters to approve a special tax levy.

This seemed to be the concensus of opinion of those representatives attending a special hearing Thursday night on the solid waste disposal problem of the county. Most local units were represented at the hearing called by the board of commissioners, but one or two townships apparently felt the problem was not applicable to units receiving solid waste disposal services under contract outside the county.

The county board of commissioners announced recently that after June 30, 1981, the expiration date on its contract with

Multi-County Landfill, it would no longer use federal revenue sharing money-even if renewed-for landfill purposes. The stated reason was that the money was needed to finance federal and state-mandated programs to be financed by the county.

The county currently pays \$116,000 annually to Multi-County Landfill for this service.

Discussion between commissioners and representatives of the local units of government pointed out that several thousands of dollars in county funds had been expended during the

past four or five years to develop solid waste disposal plans mandated by the state.

Com. Carlton Merschel stated that the money "might as well have been flushed down the drain" as none of the three plans have been accepted by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. The latest plan, costing \$6,000, was developed with the assistance of experts hired by East Central Michigan Planning and Development Region.

ship that the landfill problem should be an obligation of the entire county, not just individual units. He urged the commission to think positively concerning a landfill in cooperation with the local units.

It was stated that new rules governing landfills had been delayed due to a court suit instituted by Delta County. Enforcement of the new regulation is presently in limbo because of the suit and it is hoped that certain provisions of the act will be amended to exclude counties of Iosco's size.

In the meantime, James Belson of Burleigh Township reported that the DNR had sent that township notices and signs ordering closing of the township dump. Belson said if the DNR wants the signs posted, "they can put them up." Other landfills in the county have not been certified and a landfill in Ogemaw County, which provides contractural service to one unit, has not been certified. Benefits Can Be Paid To Many Survivors

be paid to many survivors of workers who die after working long enough under social security, a social security representative said recently.

These survivors include the worker's unmarried children under 18, under 22 if students, or disabled before

reaching 22; a parent caring for a child under 18 or disabled who gets benefits; a widow or widower 60 or over, or 50 or older if severely disabled; and dependent parents 62 or older. In addition, a surviving divorced wife can generally get the same benefits as a widow if the marriage lasted 10 years or

> A lump-sum payment of \$255 can be made to the worker's widow or widower who lived in the same household. If there is no eligible widow or widower, the lump sum is generally applied towards the funeral expenses.

It is important that survivors apply for benefits as soon as possible following the worker's death. This is especially important for widows or widowers 60-65 or 50 or over if disabled. This is because, for these people, benefits cannot be paid before the month of applica-



Minutes of a Special Meeting of the City Council of the City of Tawas City, County of Iosco, Michigan, (the "City") held on the 11th day of August, 1980, at 5:00 o'clock p. m., Eastern Daylight Time.

PRESENT: Councilmen Hayes, Lansky, Upson, Keiser, ABSENT: Mayor Westcott.

The following preamble and resolution were offered by Councilman Hayes and supported by Councilman Martin.

WHEREAS, this City Council does hereby determine that it is necessary to acquire and construct street improve-ments in the City described as follows:

Street: Whittemore Street.

Termini: From 260 ft. to 425 ft. NW'ly of US-23, T22N,

Proposed Construction: Proposed 2 span, laminated timber superstructure with timber pile bent center pier, timber retaining abutments, bituminous wearing course, overall structure length approx. 65 ft., curb to curb width 32 ft.

Termini: From 210 feet North of Fourth Street to 340 feet North of Fourth St., T22N, R7E, Sec. 25.

Proposed Construction: Proposed 1 span, laminated timber superstructure with timber retaining abutments, bituminous wearing course. Overall structure length approx. 40 ft., curb to curb width 32 ft.

(the "Street Improvements"); and

WHEREAS, the cost of Street Improvements is estimated to be Three Hundred Sixty-nine Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$369,300); and

WHEREAS, to finance a part of the cost of the Street Improvements the City Council deems it necessary to borrow the sum of Sixty-five Thousand Dollars (\$65,000), and issue bonds therefor as authorized by the provisions of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, as amended ("Act 175"), the balance of the cost to be defrayed from other funds of the City available therefor; and

WHEREAS, the Street Improvements are in accordance with the purposes enumerated in Act 51, Public Acts of Michigan, 1951 ("Act 51"); and

WHEREAS, the revenues received by the City from the Michigan Transportation Fund pursuant to Act 51 in the year preceding this contemplated borrowing are more than sufficient to comply with all the requirements specified in Section 4 of Act 175.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. The plans and estimates of cost of the Street Improvements. are hereby approved and adopted.

2. The period of usefulness of the Street

is estimated to be not less than twenty (20) years. 3. The City Council hereby determines to borrow the sum of Sixty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$65,000) and issue bonds of the City therefor pursuant to the provisions of Act 175 (the "Bonds"), for the purpose of providing funds to pay part of the cost of the Street Impro-

4. The Bonds shall be designated 1980 MICHIGAN TRANSPORTATION FUND BONDS and shall consist of thirteen (13) Bonds of the denomination of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) each, numbered consecutively in direct order of maturity from 1 to 13 inclusive, dated as of October 1, 1980, and payable serially, with the option of prior redemption as set forth in the form of the bond, on each-October 1st, in the years and amounts as follows:

Amount—\$5000 Years—1981 through 1993, inclusive.

The Bonds shall bear interest at a rate or rates not exceeding ten percent (10%) per annum payable on April 1, 1981, and semiannually thereafter on April 1st and October 1st of each year. Both principal and interest shall be payable at a bank or trust company qualified to act as paying agent to be designated by the original purchaser

5. To provide moneys to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds and in accordance with the provisions of Act 175, there is hereby made an irrevocable appropriation of the amount necessary to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds from the moneys to be derived from State-collected taxes returned to the City for highway purposes, pursuant to law. The Treasurer of the City is directed, each year that any of the principal of and interest on the Bonds remains unpaid, to set aside in a separate depositary account, to be designated 1980 MICHIGAN TRANSPORTATION FUND BOND DEBT RETIREMENT FUND, sufficient moneys from revenues received during such year from the Michigan Transportation Fund pursuant to law to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds next maturing.

6. Pursuant to Act 175 and as additional security for the prompt payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds there is hereby irrevocably pledged the limited full faith and credit of the City, and in the event of de-ficiency of funds primarily pledged to the payment thereof, the City covenants and agrees to provide for such deficiency from such resources as are lawfully available

7. The Bonds shall be signed by the Mayor and counter-signed by the City Clerk and the corporate seal of the City shall be affixed thereto, and the interest coupons annexed to said bonds shall bear the facsimile signa-tures of the Mayor and City Clerk. The bonds when exe-cuted shall be delivered to the Treasurer and be delivered by him to the purchaser thereof on payment of the purchase price, in accordance with the bid therefor, when







COMMISSION ORDER

(under authority of Act 165, P. A. 1929 and Act 230, P. A. 1925, as amended) STATEWIDE TROUT AND SALMON REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission at its meeting on July 11, 1980, under the authority of Act 165, P. A. 1929, as amended, and Act 230, P. A. 1925, as amended, ordered that for the period beginning August 10, 1980, and ending January 1, 1982, no person shall take, or attempt to take, any species of trout or salmon from any of the waters of this state except by hook and line during the open seasons prescribed, and within the minimum size limits and maxi-

mum possession limits indicated below. Statewide open seasons on all streams and designated trout lakes shall be from the last Saturday in April through September 30 (longer on waters design by the Director for extended fishing under Act 165) all trout and salmon. Statewide open seasons on all other inland lakes and the Great Lakes shall be any time for all trout and salmon. Size limits shall be 8 inches on Lower Peninsula streams, 7 inches on Upper Peninsula streams and 10 inches on lakes. The daily limit for trout and salmon shall be 5 fish singly or in combination but no more than 3 lake trout or splake, except that in the following areas of the Great Lakes it shall be unlawful to take or attempt to take lake

In all the waters of Lake Superior east of a line drawn due north of Crisp Point (Sec. 1, T51N, R8W), to the international boundary line and thence east to the city of Sault Ste. Marie.

In all waters of the St. Mary's River. In all the waters of Lake Huron north and west of a line drawn from Forty Mile Point (Sec. 23, T36N, R4E), Northeasterly to the international boundary line, thence north and west to the point where the St. Mary's River flows into Lake Huron, thence west

to the Mackinaw Bridge.
In all waters of Lake Michigan north of a line beginning from the Michigan-Wisconsin state boundary line east to the tip of the Leelanau Peninsula and thence extending in a northerly direction to the

Village of Good Hart. In the following waters of the Great Lakes it shall be unlawful to take or attempt to take more than one

lake trout or splake: All waters in northeast Lake Michigan lying inside of a line drawn from the tip of the Leelanau Peninsula extending northerly to the Village of Good

In the following waters of the Great Lakes it shall be unlawful to take or attempt to take more than 2 lake trout or splake:

In all remaining waters of Lake Michigan south of a line beginning from the Michigan-Wisconsin state line east to the tip of the Leelanau
