Michael Welsch Named Iosco's New Undersheriff

Michael Welsch, 34, a 10-year veteran of the Iosco County Sheriff's Department, became the new undersheriff effective Saturday. The appointment was made by Sheriff George Westcott.

Welsch replaces Basil O'Dell, who resigned earlier last month to take new employment with Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Hale.

Changing from a "plain clothes" officer back to wearing a uniform, Welsch's work now entails administrative rather than investigative responsibilities.

The new undersheriff received his original deputy sheriff's commission in September 1969 from the former sheriff, Ivan O'Farrell. Originally from Wisconsin, Welsch served three years and nine months in the United States Air Force and

Business Firms Endorse Proposal East Tawas Votes Thursday

Forty East Tawas business-professional persons and firms have endorsed the senior citizen housing project bonding proposal which goes before voters of East Tawas on Thursday.

An ad hoc committee for senior citizen housing, supporting the East Tawas Housing Commission, stated in a public announcement printed in this week's issue of The Tawas Herald that a "yes" vote was supported for the following reasons:

"1. The senior citizens of our city and surrounding area require additional apartments to satisfy demands for housing;

"2. There will be no tax increase with the general obligation unlimited tax bond issue. The vote was necessary due to wording in the Headlee amendment to the state constitution, even though local funds would not be used in retirement of the bonds.

"3. The housing commission assures us that it will not expend any more money than required for this project and if the project is not feasible, the bonds will not be sold.

"4. This referendum is required to comply with state law."

Voters are being asked to approve a 1.7-million-dollar general obligation unlimited tax bond issue. The vote was necessary due to wording in the Headlee amendment to the state constitution, even though local funds would not be used in retirement of the bonds.

The housing commission has received a guarantee from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) of \$200,640 annually for the next 30 years to finance construction and operation of a five-floor apartment complex, almost identical to Bay Park Tower which was opened in 1975 at the intersection of Church and Bay Streets.

The new apartment complex would be located at the intersection of Church and Westover Streets, directly north of the present structure, and would provide 44 one-bedroom units for housing the elderly.

Wigen, Tecknell and Associates, Saginaw, provided architectural services for both buildings.

If the bond issue is approved by voters, construction would start in the spring and would be completed in about one year.

Efforts toward obtaining a second apartment complex for the elderly started in 1977 and more than 100 applications have been received for housing in the new building.

Carl Helmer, housing commission director, said that location of Bay Park Tower and the proposed new complex had been commended by HUD and other state officials. Tenants are within easy walking distance of the shopping center, post office, municipal buildings, city park, county museum, theatre and other service centers.

When ground was broken for the original building, then Cong. Philip Ruppe congratulated the housing commission and other East Tawas officials for their foresight in picking a location for the apartment complex which would enhance the lives of elderly persons.

End-of-Year Juggling Act With Funds

Considerable confusion existed late last week at the county building concerning the deficit to be shown in Iosco County's general fund when books were to close Monday on the old year, but chances are that the last line in the general ledger was not printed in red ink.

But, despite the possible lack of a deficit on December 31, Iosco County will have a definite financial problem at the start of the New Year.

That fact was pointed out by County Treas. Edward Nelkie, who said that a settlement on 1979 salaries had not been reached yet with the sheriff's department. Personnel of that department have worked an entire year without a new contract and any settlement reached in 1980 would be retroactive to 1979.

The additional cost of salaries to be paid under the 1979 salary schedule would be carried over into 1980.

In addition to the above, the county board of commissioners adopted a 1980 budget which showed a surplus of \$75,000 at the beginning of 1980. Funds have been juggled constantly during the past week in the county treasurer's office to meet outstanding checks and, if there is a surplus, it will fall far short of the budgeted amount.

Nelkie said Friday that the general fund picture had changed constantly during the past several days. He reported to the board of commissioners that the general fund had a \$15,536 deficit as of Thursday noon, but transmissions from various departments lowered the deficit to \$1,817.03 as of 5:00 p. m. Thursday.

As of Friday morning, the general fund had a surplus of \$19,265, but outstanding checks would more than offset that amount.

Payment of \$40,000 to \$50,000 in state income tax returns is expected to be received after January 1 and could help to provide a financial cushion. The money has been past due from the state for two months.

The treasurer was holding back checks amounting to \$1,372.31 in the airport account while awaiting receipt of a check for \$2,800 owed that fund by CETA, which was expected Monday.

During Thursday afternoon's year-end meeting of the board of commissioners, Chairman John Webb said that Iosco Social Services Board had indicated that it planned to return \$10,000 to the county general fund from its anticipated year-end surplus. During 1979, the county appropriated more than \$96,000 from the general fund to meet financial obligations at the medical care facility.

It is expected that the 1980 county budget of \$2,865,789, which received final adoption in November, will require trimming in the months ahead to meet actual revenue received.

City Planner Meets Thurs. With Officials

A joint meeting of the Tawas City Council, planning commission and zoning board of appeals is to be held Thursday, 7:00 p. m., at the city hall.

City officials are to hold their semiannual meeting with Charles Leman of Villan-Leman and Associates, city planning consultants, to discuss zoning and planning items of mutual concern.

Topics are to include home occupations; sizes of accessory buildings and a definition of garages; minor changes requiring site plan review; criteria for granting variances and roles of the board of appeals and planning commission; possible establishment of such new zones as office, resort and lakefront.

Action Was Necessary for Application

Cities Reach Agreement on Facility

A single secondary sewage treatment facility to serve both Tawas City and East Tawas has not proven economically feasible and applications are to be submitted for state-federal funding to help finance construction of separate treatment plants for each community.

This action was taken following an informal work session Thursday between officials and consulting engineers retained by the two communities.

The two treatment plant concept had been approved by engineering consultants three years ago as the most cost-effective approach, but East Tawas' engineering consultant changed his mind last April and recommended one facility for both cities. Tawas City's consulting engineer had disagreed with that concept.

After reviewing state requirements for operation of a mechanical system of secondary sewage treatment to serve both communities, James Curtis of Spicer Engineering Company, East Tawas' consultant, said Thursday that it was a "toss up" between the two concepts concerning cost-effectiveness and agreed to return to the original planning for individual treatment facilities.

Agreement as to concept was necessary for the Michigan Department of Natural Resources had indicated that state review of the final facilities plan could not proceed until the two communities and their consulting engineers reached agreement on the most cost-effective, environmentally sound and socially acceptable wastewater treatment alternative.

City Mgr. Lowell Thomas said that Thursday's action "cleared the last hurdle for the cities to get on track for federal funding. It was good news and I am very pleased," he stated.

The two communities have completed the first phase of the study.

Thomas expressed the opinion that sharing the cost of hiring personnel to operate the two plants would be economically feasible and discussion would be held in the future concerning joint maintenance and operation.

It is expected that a lagoon system of secondary sewage treatment would be utilized in Tawas City. Using 1977 costs, the city's projected treatment facility is estimated to run about \$3,000,000, with Tawas City's share pegged at 25 percent or \$750,000. By the time the facility is built, the city's share would probably be above \$1,000,000.

Besides providing secondary sewage treatment and upgrading of primary facilities, Tawas City's program would include construction of a sewer force main from the Second Avenue lift station to the present primary treatment plant.

Two weeks ago, the city council authorized signing a consent decree admitting the city's primary wastewater treatment plant is polluting state waters. This action was necessary in order for the city to obtain renewal of its permit to operate the plant and also to improve its standing in state priorities for treatment plant construction.

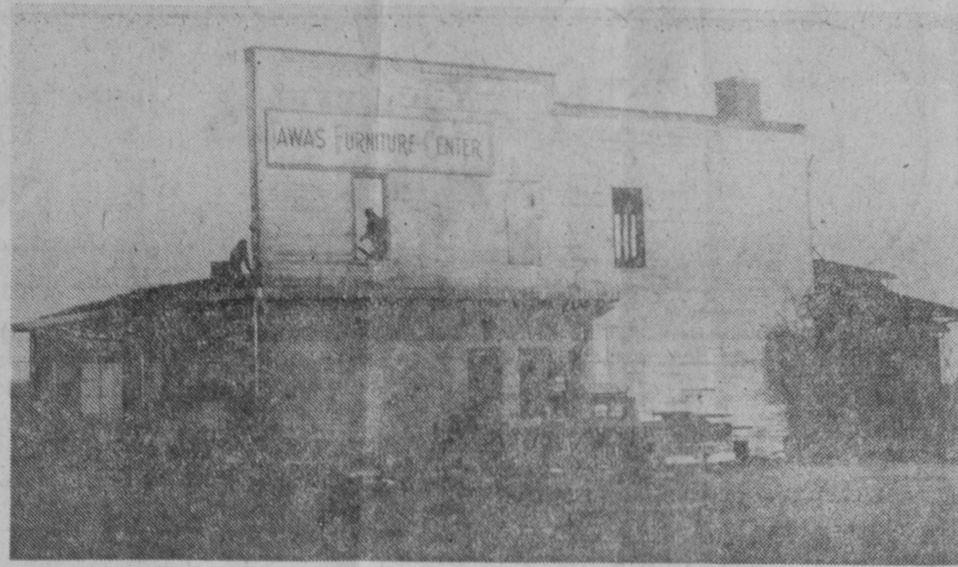

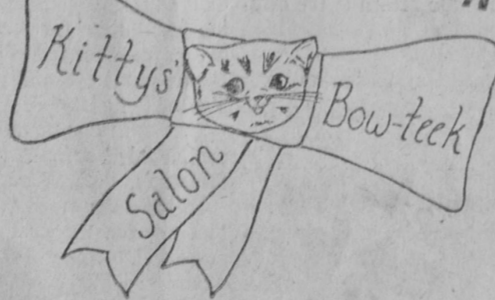

What makes athletic champs? Ask the Junior Olympic testers

What blend of muscle, mind, attitude and coaching skill makes a sports champion?

An answer to this and scores of similar questions are being provided by more than 200 star teen-age athletes from across the nation, who recently took part in a unique testing program while at the University of Nebraska at Lincoln to compete in the 1979 National AAU/USA-Sears Junior Olympic Games.

Representing the cream of the nation's athletic crop, these budding Olympic performers volunteered to undergo psychological, physiological and endurance tests administered by University of Nebraska sports and medical researchers.

The tests were a continuation of a program begun in 1978. They covered a select group of 12 to 18-year-old athletes, many of whom were tested the second consecutive year.

The program was conducted in cooperation with the Amateur Athletic Union; AAU sponsor Sears, Roebuck and Co.; and the Olympics meet director.

The Junior Olympic volunteers included top performers and coaches in track and field, gymnastics, diving, swimming and related Olympic events.

Findings of the program, according to researchers, may lead to new guidelines for coaching techniques and new training programs, and may show the need for coaching certification standards.

The results could also throw more light on weight control, body development and other factors affecting performance.

In addition to sports psychology testing, the research teams conducted tests to determine fat content of the athletes' bodies.

Anthropometric measurements were made of athletes' arms, legs and thighs. Endurance testing was done on top track performers following participation in the events.

In the first year—1978—of tests it was found that:

- Junior Olympians tested scored higher than the normal population in emotional maturity.

- They have higher self-regard and self-acceptance—feel better about themselves—than the normal run of the population. (Male athletes feel more so this way than females but re-

searchers believe it is because greater prestige is placed on athletics among males.)

- Feelings of hostility, depression and anxiety are evident in losers immediately after an event whereas they did not appear prior to the contest.

- Sprinters, distance runners and male gymnasts have lower percentages of body fat than other athletes. Some have less than half the body fat of people in the general population.

- Divers and gymnasts are shorter, lighter and leaner than other athletes. But sprinters are leanest of all. Those in throwing events have the largest arm and thigh measurements.

- Why the continued testing? Maybe a key can be found as to why an athlete who is a world beater in practice "chokes" in competition.

The studies may provide new

educational materials and courses as well as clinics and workshops for volunteer coaches.

And the tests may aid in the program to overtake other nations, such as those in Eastern Europe, that have made great strides in sports psychology as shown by their success in the Olympics.

The researchers hope to expand the studies in 1980 to include volunteer coaches who work with the young athletes.

They also hope to dig further into the "psyche" of the athletes to find out what makes them tick.

Are they more daring and outgoing than most people?

What's the proper psychological preparation to bring about a topnotch athletic performance and what can be done to restore an athlete's confidence after a disappointing finish?

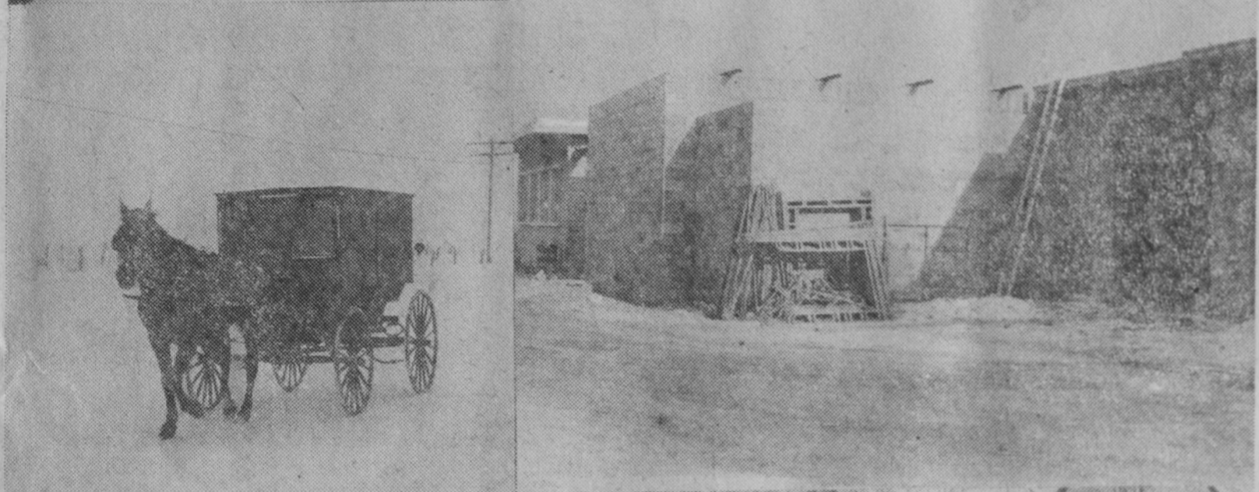
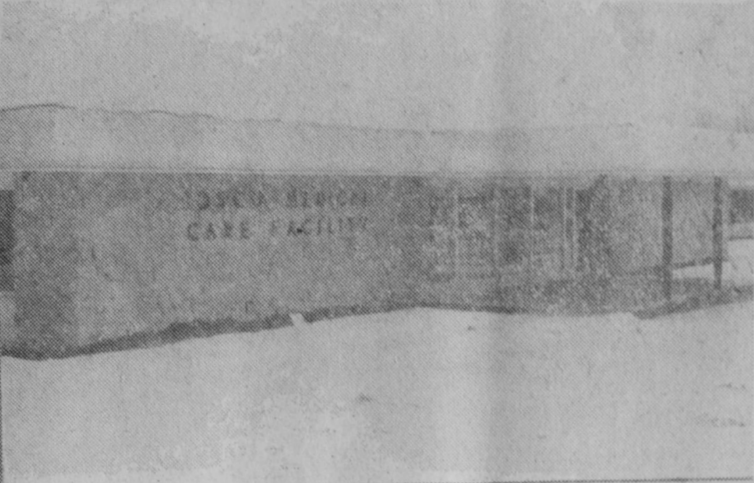

Program Matches Adult Volunteers With Boy or Girl Needing A Friend

Gene Gerber, director of the Tawas Area Community Education Department, has written and prepared a CETA project entitled Big Brothers/Big Sisters which has been approved and is scheduled to begin on February 1.

The program involves matching an adult volunteer with a boy or girl between the ages of eight and 16, who is in need of a friend. 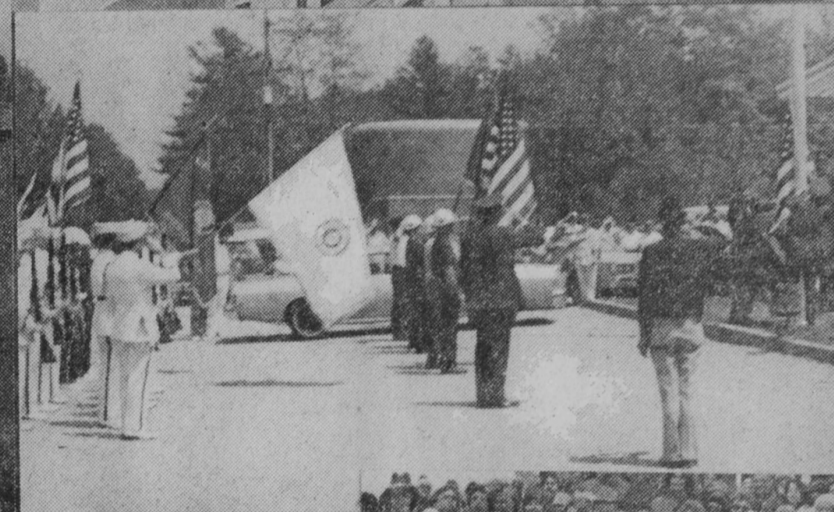
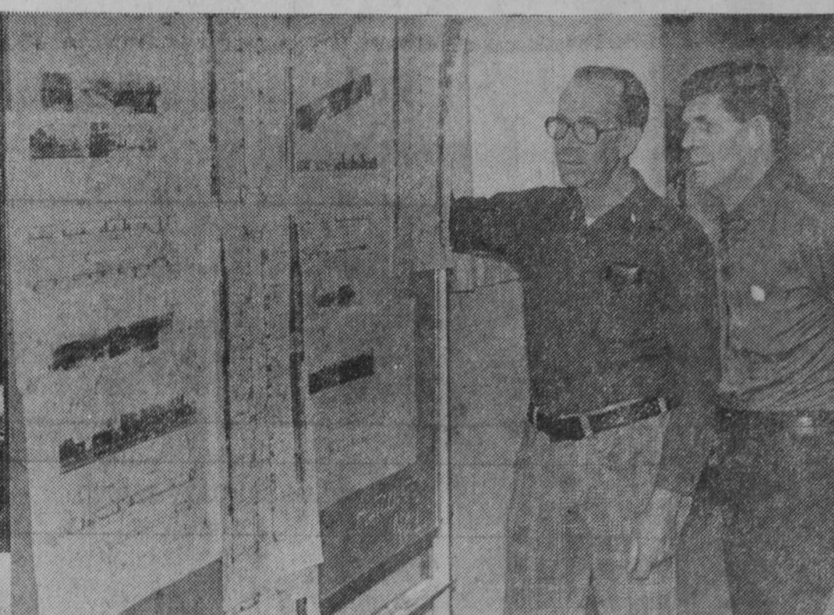

Weight Control Through 'Lighter and Livelier' Series

"Lighter and Livelier" is the theme of a new weight control program offered by Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service in Isosco County. The theme describes how participants in the program should feel after completing the 10 sessions.

Two series will be offered during winter months. A morning series is scheduled for 9:30 to 11:30 o'clock on Tuesdays at Plainfield Township Hall, Hale.

An evening series will be held on Tuesdays from 6:30 to 8:30 o'clock at the Isosco County Building, Tawas City. Both series begin January 8.

Recent research on weight control provides the basis for the program. A combination of specific behavioral guidelines and nutritional information is used to help participants achieve and maintain weight loss.

Included in the program are

10 class sessions spread over a three to four-month period, small group participation, daily food records, weekly weigh-ins and hand-outs of dos and don'ts based on the eating chain. A small materials fee will be charged.

"Lighter and Livelier" is open to anyone who is at least 18 years of age and is seriously interested in a weight control program. Interested persons may contact the MSU Cooperative Extension Service in Isosco County at 362-3449 for further information or may attend the first session of either the morning or evening series on January 8.

Resolution: Plan Your Credit Needs Well in Advance

A New Year's resolution of farmers and other borrowers should be to plan credit needs in advance and make sure additional credit is really needed, according to Dr. John Brake.

Brake, agricultural economist at Michigan State University, says the confusion and volatility surrounding national money markets at the closing of 1979 are clouding the outlook for credit and interest rates in 1980. Many experts believe the economy moved into a recession in the fourth quarter of 1979 but are unsure of the recession's severity.

A number of circumstances are contributing to economic uncertainties. The freeze on Iranian assets in United States banks and concern over tensions in the Middle East could trigger other nations to withdraw deposits from United States banks, according to some analysts. Many Americans, apparently skeptical about the government's ability to control the 13 to 14 percent annual inflation rate, are purchasing goods now in anticipation of higher prices ahead.

Recently concluded labor contracts will boost wages at least 10 to 12 percent higher than productivity increases for several years, given expected inflation rates, Brake says. Interest rates set record highs last year and may fluctuate more in 1980 as a result of the Federal Reserve Board policy, an-

nounced in October, emphasizing money supply growth rather than interest rate levels.

Short-term interest rates are expected to continue fluctuating more than long-term rates. Brake says money market short-term interest rates will have peaked before January 1980 and will decrease during the first and second quarters of next year, along with decreasing bank interest rates. But short-term rate decreases will be only two or three percentage points during the year, depending on the inflation rate and the severity of a recession. Production Credit Association interest rates are likely to increase into the first quarter of 1980.

With interest rates of 12 to 18 percent, costs can be cut considerably by avoiding unnecessary credit purchases, says Brake, who also recommends using extra checking account funds to reduce debt.

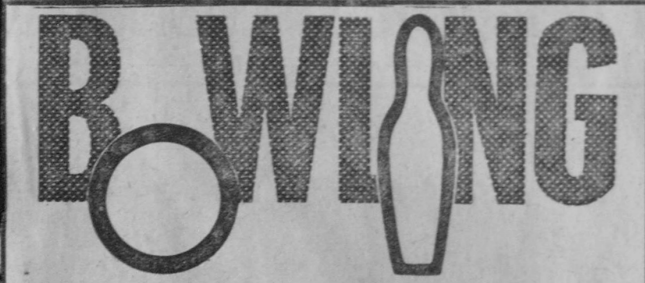

Space age technology and papers bring the future into your den

In the not-too-distant future, millions of Americans may be using a small, portable machine to send and receive mail, peruse home shipping catalogues and have access to library reference materials without leaving their homes.

These machines, known as home facsimiles, will send and reproduce printed information over long distances in less than a minute.

The hardware for these machines is already available in the high speed communications systems being developed by a number of manufacturers right now.

And a team of scientists at Crown Zellerbach's Electrographic Papers Division in Portland, Ore., have already developed special dielectric papers that will produce virtually any document.

While most of us use paper to scribble notes or type a letter, the paper used in these high speed facsimiles is sensitive to light and electronic charges that leave an image on the paper unseen by the human eye.

Special inks known as toners are then bonded to the image, forming words, numbers and every graphic representation you can think of.

The paper is already used with expensive high speed office facsimiles, office copiers and computer printers to reproduce black and white material.

Also used in high speed facsimile devices, the paper will someday be used in small, portable home machines that will send and receive anything from an advertising flyer to the daily newspaper.

And other devices that can print maps, charts and integrated circuit designs on the paper are already turning out complex graphic designs and garment industry patterns at the rate of two inches per second.

The trick will be to meld these technologies into a simple system that most Americans can afford. According to officials at Crown Zellerbach, a network of home facsimiles may emerge within the next decade.

In fact, one overseas telephone corporation has already embarked on a program to make the home facsimile a reality in the 1980s, at a cost of \$400 per family.
