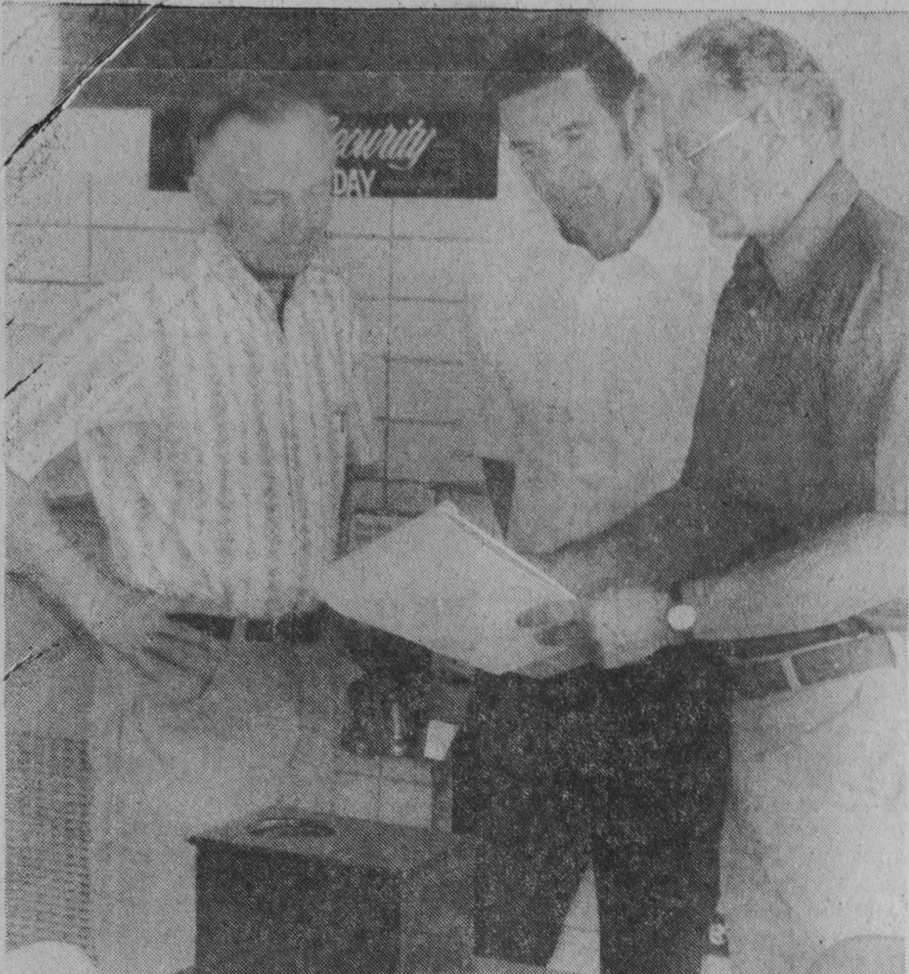

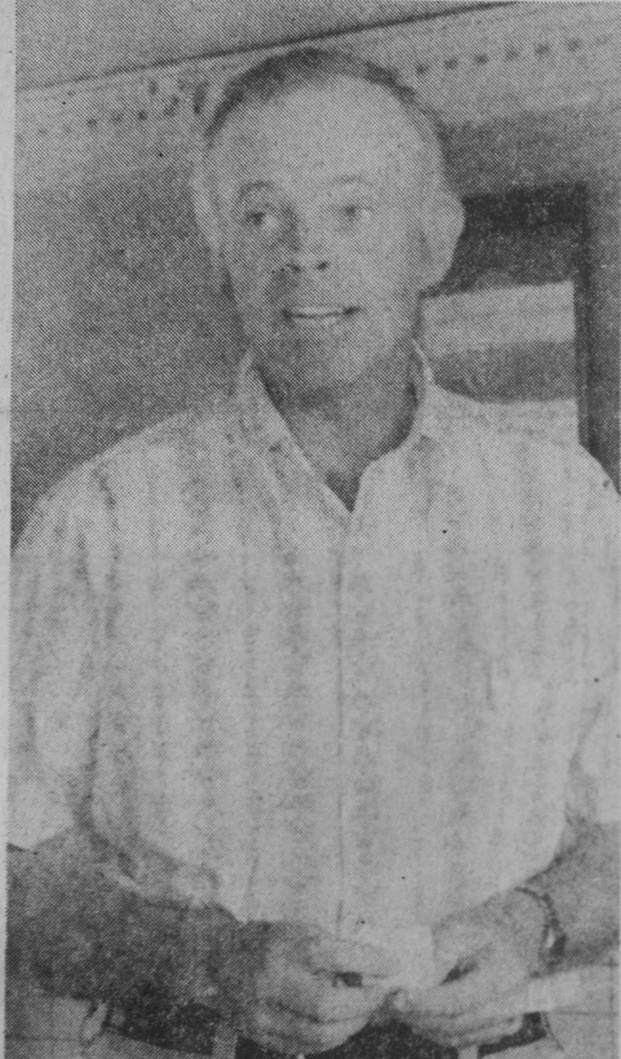

Recount Brought Tie; Webb Won Over Baker in Draw

"I've got it," said John Webb Friday morning as he pulled a slip of paper from a box in the lobby of the Iosco County Building.

This historic "luck of the draw," presided over by County Clerk D. Keith Papas, saw Webb holding a slip of paper on which had been printed the word, nominated; on the other side of the table was Alfred Baker of Hale, who was holding a slip of paper on which the words, not nominated, had been printed.

Until that moment, Webb and Baker were tied for the Republican nomination of county commissioner for the Fifth District. Webb will be seeking his second term in the November general election and will be opposed by Robert Pember, who won the Democratic nomination for that office at the August 5 primary election.

There have been a number of elections in past Iosco history where two candidates ended in a tie vote, but those instances were at the township or city level—never for a county office.

This novel situation resulted when Baker asked for a recount of six precincts which he lost in the primary. Election night totals gave 308 votes for Webb and 307 votes for Baker.

The canvassing board consisting of O. J. MacMurray, Penny Oates, Hope Rescoe and Wilma McGill spent Thursday morning and early afternoon inspecting and tallying ballots in three precincts of Oscoda Township and one precinct in Plainfield Township.

No fault could be found with election board workers in those precincts and, in all six precincts to be recounted, seals were properly locked on boxes and on ballot bags and the number of ballots coincided with the number recorded on the poll books.

When the canvassing board returned to the county building later Thursday afternoon to recount Grant Township's ballots, no change was found in the first precinct. Three errors in counting were found, however, in the election night tally by workers in the second precinct.

The canvassing board found that three improperly marked ballots had been counted on election night. The recount took two votes from Webb and one from Baker, giving the two candidates final totals of 306 votes each.

During the course of the recount, canvassing board members commented many times that they had never seen as many improperly marked ballots as were cast in the August 5 primary election. Many voters split their tickets by voting for candidates of both political parties. This is not permissible under state law and such ballots are not counted.

Numerous instances were found where the voter did not

chose to vote for either candidate for county commissioner, some ballots were completely blank and others were found where the voter chose only to mark his ballot in the race for sheriff.

One ballot in the second precinct of Grant Township was found where the voter placed a check mark in front of Baker's name, rather than using the required "X." Use of a check mark on the ballot invalidates the vote according to state law and signs are posted at the polls so advising voters.

"I would arm wrestle or run a mile rather than go through this," said Baker as the time drew near Friday morning for his turn at the "luck of the draw."

"On my way over here, I was sure that I was going to lose in the draw," commented Webb. "I stayed up election night listening to the returns, but finally I had to go to bed without knowing the final result. I could not get to sleep and my dad kept me in suspense on the telephone the next morning before finally telling me I had won the nomination by one vote."

County Clerk Papas, who supervised mandated procedures for handling the recount, assured both candidates that the canvassing board had been most thorough in its work. In the case of Grant Township, the second precinct was counted three times and the first precinct was counted twice to insure the tally was correct.

Public Hearing Set on Redevelopment

Public hearing on a proposal to establish a commercial redevelopment district in Tawas City is to be held next Monday night by the Tawas City Council. This is to be the regular meeting of the council due to the Labor Day holiday.

The area to be included in the proposed district is from Mathews Street to Wheeler Street along Lake Street.

The proposed zone would be similar to an industrial redevelopment zone, which would permit the city to offer a tax incentive to property owners for redeveloping commercial buildings.

The second monthly meeting of the council is to be held Sep-

tember 15, at which time a public hearing would be held on a proposed downtown development district. If an ordinance is adopted by the council, a nine-man board would be named to act on the authority.

An item to be considered at either of the above two meetings would be a resolution to again place a proposal before voters at the November general election to seek voter approval of municipal improvements.

The proposal would include construction of a new fire hall and renovation of the city hall. The two questions would be placed on separate ballots, according to past action of the council.

CETA Budget Cut 40 Percent

A report to Iosco County Board of Commissioners indicates there will be a 40 percent reduction in public service employment slots under CETA during the current budget period.

There are presently 40 to 50 public service slots filled in this county and the board had the option to reduce employment immediately or to terminate slots over an 18-month period. The latter course has been selected to meet the lower budget.

In other business, the commission signed an agreement with Arenac and Ogemaw Counties to continue funding of three foster homes under a state grant program.

The firm of Weinlander, Fitzhugh, Bertuleit and Schairer of East Tawas received the contract to audit county books

under terms of the federal revenue sharing act. Cost of the audit is to be \$13,000.

The commission signed an agreement with Ayers, Lewis, Norris and May to develop a property zoning program at the county airport. Cost of the work is to be \$5,200.

A new housing commission is to be established under the Department of Housing and Urban Development, which made a \$400,000 community block grant to the county. This new housing commission is to act in an advisory capacity for allocation of the money.

Discussion is to be continued at the next session on a request from Oscoda Township to pay \$11,000 toward the deficit for operating the ambulance service. A \$30,000 deficit is projected for the year.

Trainees Complete Work on Grant Twp. Fire Hall

A summer youth training program funded through a CETA grant administered by Region 7-B Employment and Training Consortium and the building trades program of Tawas Area School completed work Friday on an addition to the Grant Township Fire Hall.

An open house was held Thursday noon for persons helping with supervision of the project and the 15 youths who provided the manpower.

John Alexander, principal of Tawas Area High School and director of the school's vocational program, said that everyone who had inspected the work of the young people was pleased

with the results.

The 40 by 70-foot concrete block addition was constructed under the supervision of David Lutz, work site supervisor for the Region 7-B office at Harrison.

Olen Herriman, supervisor of Grant Township, commented that the township board was pleased with workmanship demonstrated by the CETA trainees.

He said that the township had expended \$15,000 for materials used on the project.

The project started July 1 and work was completed Friday with pouring of a concrete floor in one of three bays which will soon house fire apparatus.

Various building contractors from the Sand Lake Heights area, who are members of the fire department, lent assistance instructing the 14 boys and one girl in laying concrete blocks.

Allen Emry, fire chief, said that all work was to be completed on the basic shell of the building by Friday. The lone exception is hanging of overhead doors.

Fire department members are to complete interior finish work during the winter months, stated Chief Emry.

Persons attending the open house enjoyed a luncheon of roast corn and hot dogs, compliments of the fire department and the township.

Only One Survivor

Four Killed in Crash Near Airport

Four sportsmen planning a fishing trip to the AuSable-Lake Huron area were killed early Wednesday when their twin-engine plane crashed about a mile southwest of the Iosco County Airport.

Only one passenger, a 10-year-old boy, escaped death when the plane dropped too low and cut a swath through the jack pine forest.

Killed were Paul Rinaldi, Columbus, Ohio, pilot of a plane owned by Air Columbus Charters; Robert Lee Johnson, 45, Delaware, Ohio; William O. Walters, 38, Algonac; Dr. Albert R. Valko, 50, Columbus, Ohio.

Injured and treated at Tawas Hospital was Valko's son, Allen, who sustained a fractured leg and face lacerations.

The group left Bolton Field, Columbus, at 2:15 a. m. Wednesday, bound for the mouth of the AuSable River, where Walters docks his boat, "Broadbill," at Main Pier Marina. A car was waiting at the Iosco County Airport to take the party to the Oscoda-AuSable area.

The Piper Aztec plane put down at Berey Field near Utica to pick up Walters and left there at 3:30 a. m.

A dense fog covered this entire region when the plane arrived overhead shortly before 4:45 a. m. and Rinaldi had radio contact with the control tower at Wurtsmith Air Force Base. Personnel in the tower told the pilot that radar showed

the plane to be in close proximity to the county airport.

Rinaldi started his approach to the landing strip, but apparently misjudged the field due to the dense fog cover.

When personnel in the Wurtsmith control tower lost the plane on radar, they immediately notified Wilbur C. Roach, airport manager who resides at East Tawas. Roach checked the airport and found that the plane had not landed.

Local law enforcement agencies began a search at 5:30 a. m. One officer said that fog was so dense that one "could hardly see a hand held in front of the face."

A state police helicopter and an air rescue helicopter from Wurtsmith Air Force Base were called into action, but it was not until 10:30 a. m. that fog had cleared sufficiently to permit aerial observance.

The state police helicopter spotted the wreckage at 11:10 a. m. and the air rescue helicopter carrying a paramedic team from Wurtsmith landed at the crash scene.

The paramedics found that the four adults had been killed when the plane sheared off both of its wings and one engine, landing bottom side up in the brush. The boy was found in the rear of the plane nearly 6 1/2 hours after the crash.

Two ambulances from Tawas Hospital were called to the scene and, after emergency treatment by the air force medical technicians, the boy was carried out of the brush on a litter, then transferred to a helicopter for the trip to Tawas Hospital.

Because of damage to the plane, state police and Iosco County Sheriff's Department officers were unable to remove bodies until three hours after reaching the crash site. Jaws of Life equipment was carried to the scene and used to pry open the wreckage.

Fire at the crash scene was averted when wing tanks on the plane were ripped away about

300 yards from the point where the fuselage came to rest.

Both Valko and Johnson, as well as Rinaldi, were holders of private pilot licenses. Police officers said that Wurtsmith Air Force Base does not permit landing of private aircraft unless planes are in danger of running out of fuel. They said it was obvious that the twin-engine plane equipped with the latest electronic control devices had plenty of fuel to fly to a different airport having ground control capabilities.

Investigating at the scene Wednesday were representatives of the Federal Aviation Agency and the National Transportation Safety Board.

Recount Settles Tie, but Write-in Candidate Loses

As an aside to last week's recount on the Fifth District race for county commissioner, the county canvassing board also held a recount of votes in Plainfield Township in a "race" for the Republican nomination of township clerk.

Quotation marks are placed around "race" in the above paragraph for good reason. There will be no Republican candidate for township clerk, due to a quirk in the election law.

No Republican candidate filed for the office, but Janet K. Lee received 17 write-in votes in the primary. This should have qualified her for a spot on the November general election ballot.

Betty Timmer was renominated as the Democratic candidate for township clerk and she also received 17 votes in the Republican column. Inasmuch as state election law does not permit certification of a candidate for one office by two parties, it would be reasonable to assume that the Republican votes cast for Mrs. Timmer would not be counted.

Apparently this situation is not covered by state election law and Mrs. Lee asked for a recount of votes. Ironically, the canvassing board found that six votes which had been counted for Mrs. Lee had been improperly punched on the voting machine and the end result was that she was eliminated from the running.

She did not receive enough votes to place her name on the general election ballot and, even so, she was still the second choice of voters as Mrs. Timmer received a greater number of votes.

US-23 Gets White Lines

A representative of the state highway department reported to the Herald last week that a white line which delineates the traveled portion of the highway from the shoulder had been painted on US-23 south of Tawas City.

The Herald editor had commented last week in this column that a dangerous situation exists on that portion of US-23 where motorists are using the new nine-foot paved shoulder as a passing lane.

It was incorrectly assumed that the state was "trying to save paint" by using a broken line of white paint to mark the outer edge of the lanes.

Motorists who use the paved shoulder as a passing lane are taking their lives in their own hands, but some do not heed the white line or are not familiar with its purpose. In any event, use of the shoulder for passing is an infraction of the law and a violator is subject to a traffic citation.

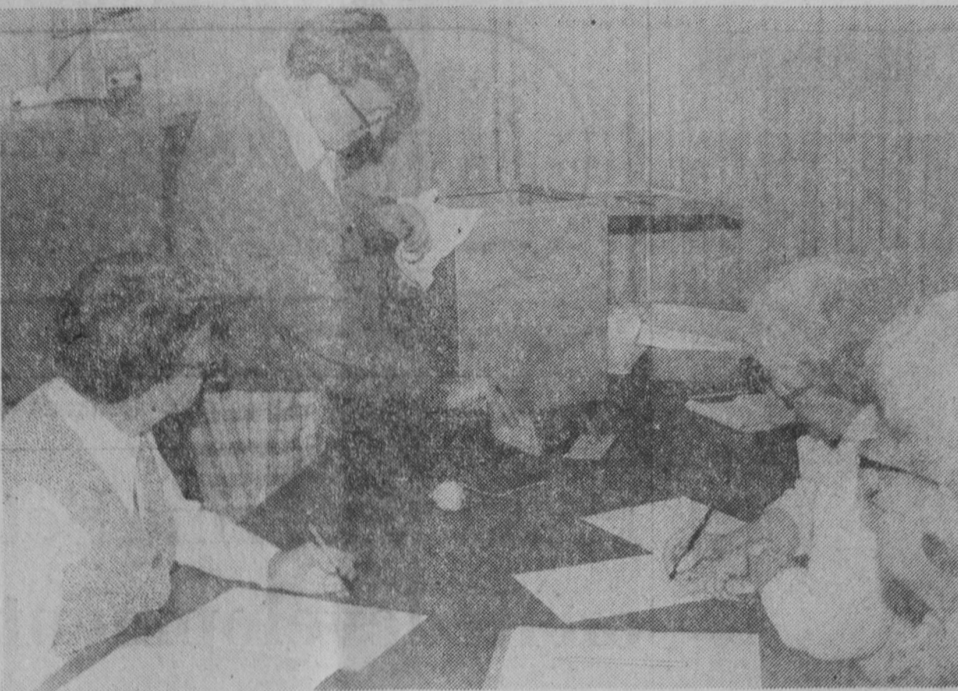

Baker, who said he had been confident prior to the primary election that he would win the nomination by a wide margin, said he had changed his mind about being a "sticker" candidate for the commission seat in the general election.

"I drove over here this morning thinking to myself that if I do not win the draw, I would not seek election," said Baker. "It is a hard grind to win on stickers."

He said any further effort on his part to seek the office would "not be fair to the two people whose names will be listed on the November ballot. It has been two times and down for me. I have had a lot of support, but I am not a candidate in the November election."

Papas said that the \$10 fee posted by Baker for each precinct to be recounted would be returned to him, due to the fact that three errors had been found.

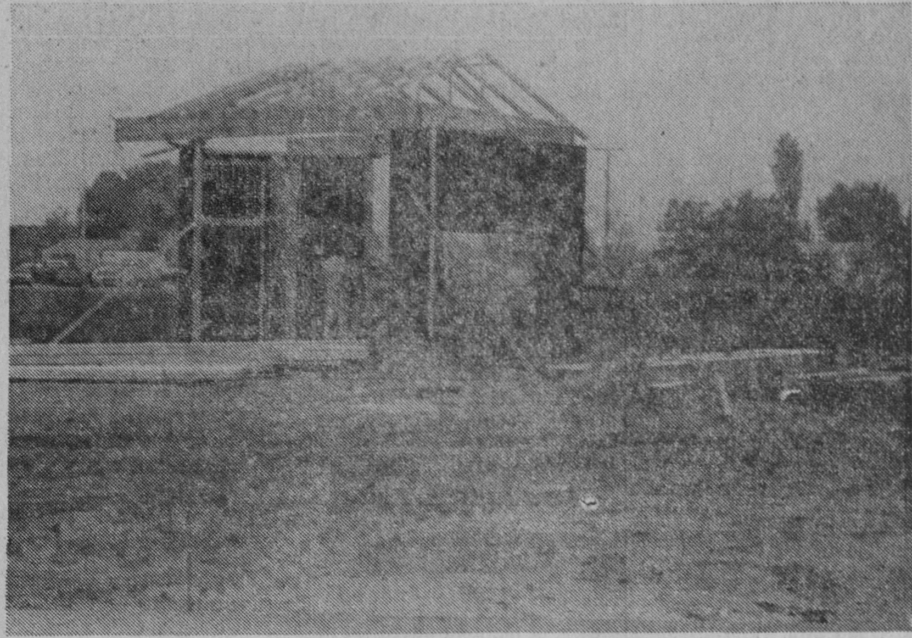

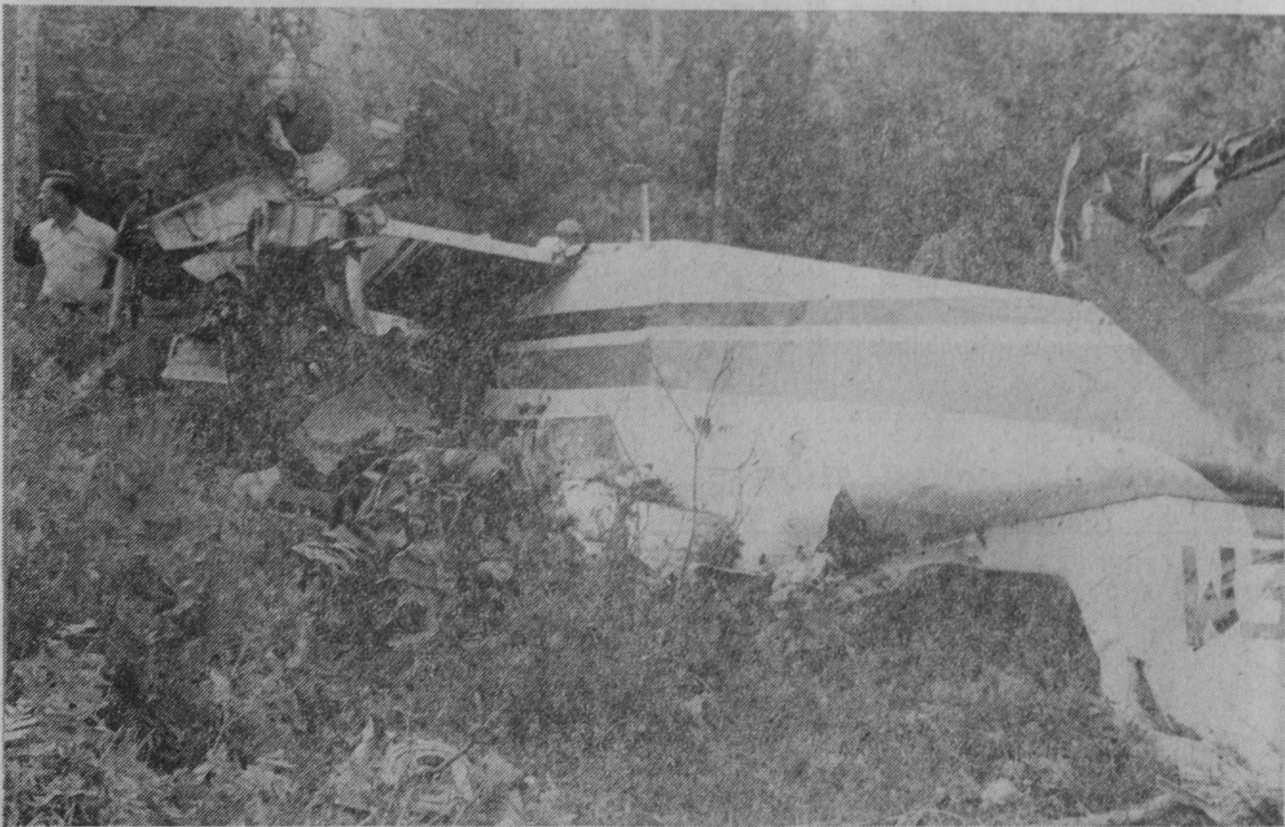

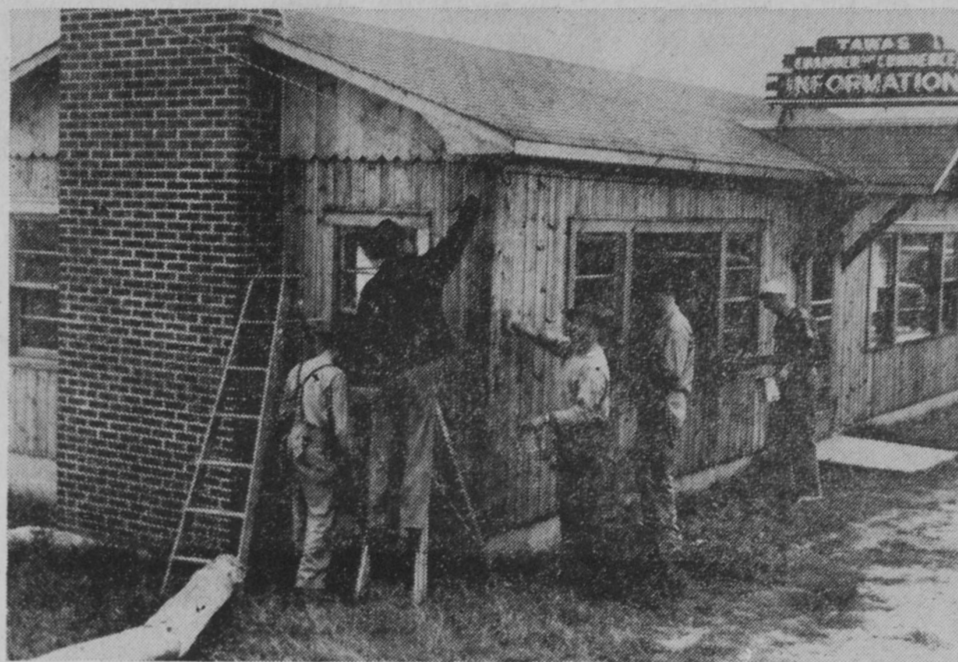

Cooperating with your chamber of commerce is cooperating with your community.

This was the slogan 33 years ago for the newly established Tawas Chamber of Commerce, which was then entering its first year of active promotion of the community.

Tawas City and East Tawas each had an individual chamber of commerce organization until 1947. Each organization had excellent records of promoting the individual communities, with particular emphasis on the spring perch festival by the Tawas City organization and promotion of Silver Valley winter sports by the East Tawas group.

On February 10, 1947, a joint meeting of the two chambers was held at the Barnes Hotel to discuss uniting the two organizations.

Harold Gould, president of the East Tawas Chamber of Commerce, and George Myles, president of the Tawas City organization, pointed out the advantages of one strong chamber for the two communities.

To further the consolidation plans and arrive at a practical way in which it could be accomplished, a committee from each organization was appointed. Representing Tawas City were Mayor John D. LeClair, Judge H. Read Smith and Randall Fox. Members of the East Tawas committee were Earl BeMent, Thomas White and Charles Nash.

Helping to promote the consolidation was the fact that the Silver Valley Winter Sports Committee, originally an arm of the East Tawas Chamber of Commerce, had just completed another extremely successful winter carnival with more than 6,000 people here the second week-end in February.

Due to growth of the winter sports business in Michigan, it was felt that a strong chamber of commerce was needed to promote Silver Valley.

Organization of the new chamber of commerce took place officially on March 10, 1947, during a dinner meeting held at the Holland Hotel. About 100 professional people and businessmen were in attendance.

The two committees named to study reorganization recommended that the new chamber have a paid secretary-manager and provide for a 14-member board of directors to meet monthly. Each of the two cities was to be equally represented on the board of directors and various committees.

Publicity projects to be sponsored by the chamber of com-

merce that first year included winter sports; smelt, perch and trout fishing; summer sports and community activities. In addition, the new organization was to serve as a tourist information bureau, although it had no permanent home to serve as headquarters.

In addition, the board of directors was to promote and encourage location of industry, community improvement and become involved in community planning.

Edward R. Denecke of Saginaw was principal speaker at the organizational meeting and told those attending that "you can now work together more efficiently for the betterment of the area. I suggest, 'Serving Northeastern Michigan,' as the slogan for your organization. The summer tourist trade in Northern Michigan is going to double or triple within the next five years and you will get your share of this increased business."

Named to the original 14-member board of directors were Fox, Myles, A. Don Anderson, Arnold Bronson, Edward Nelkie, E. D. Jacques and H. J. Keiser Jr., all of Tawas City; named from East Tawas were Gould, Nash, Lyle Moon, Wallace D. (Mike) Nunn, William DeGrow, White and Carl Thunberg.

A week later, the board named Anderson as the first president of the organization.

A campaign was announced to sign 200 charter members and

a spring banquet was held April 9 at the Barnes Hotel.

Members of 10 different committees were announced at the banquet, along with details of a \$5,000 operational budget which provided for hiring a full-time secretary-manager.

At its June meeting, the board made the "especially gratifying announcement" that Anderson Coach Company representatives had stated the organization planned to locate in the community. Temporary quarters for constructing trailers were to be located at the Detroit and Mackinac Railway yard and the City of East Tawas was furnishing a building site near the disposal plant east of the state police post.

One of the first promotions of the new organization was a baseball excursion to Briggs Stadium at Detroit to watch a double-header played with Boston. A special D&M passenger train picked up participants from Alpena to the Tawas, leaving here at 7:55 a. m. and arriving at Detroit at 1:00 p. m.

More than 200 of the 323 fans making the trip were from the Tawas and baseball stories told by W. C. "Roxey" Roach were "the main attraction of the trip down," stated The Tawas Herald. "After the game, everyone enjoyed dinner at restaurants, window shopping and a walk along Woodward Avenue."

By September, the organization had 161 members and about

90 were in attendance September 16 at a general meeting and banquet held at the Barnes Hotel.

Guest speakers of the evening were Robert McLaughlin, administrative secretary of the Michigan Tourist Council, and Frank Davis, secretary-manager of East Michigan Tourist Association.

"Tourist business is big business," McLaughlin told the audience as he pointed out that 39 of the 48 states of the nation, neighboring countries on the north and south, were striving for the tourist business. "Michigan must keep up its promotional program to meet this keen competition," he said.

Because of his increased business activities with James H. Leslie and Sons' automotive business, Anderson resigned and Myles was appointed to fill out the term as president. At a banquet meeting held October 28 at the Holland Hotel, Myles and Nunn, chairman of the board of directors, reviewed summer activities and outlined a program of future projects as established by the board of directors. Principal project in this outline was the Silver Valley winter sports program.

The winter sports committee that year included Gould, chairman; Nunn, cochairman; Stanley Humphrey, advertising; Nathan Barkman, recording secretary; John Mielock, maintenance and supervision; BeMent, treasurer; E. D. Jacques, transportation; T. M. "Bill" O'Loughlin, decoration and entertainment; Adrian Ayling, equipment; Victor Marzinski, queen's committee; Charles Nash, housing; Carl Babcock, skiing.

The chamber of commerce's outstanding success during its initial year of operation assured its continuance to this day. Plans were immediately started in late 1947 to provide office quarters and a regular meeting place for the board of directors.

On July 1, 1948, the board of directors announced plans for construction of a new "log office" on a vacant piece of property along Tawas Bay across from the Orville Leslie Ford garage. Fourteen members and directors agreed to sign a note at Peoples State Bank to finance the construction under a six-year program.

Harry Westrich was chairman of the building committee and the first meeting was held at the new office when committee members met with Charles Hamilton, field director, for a report on the fund raising campaign to build Tawas Hospital.

Tomatoes Best When Stewed

Tomatoes are sufficiently high in acid for boiling water bath canning. However, once you turn them into stewed tomatoes by adding green pepper, onion and celery, they become a low-acid food and must be pressure canned.

"Low acid foods, like vegetable mixtures, must be processed in a pressure canner at 10 pounds pressure to kill the spores of the bacteria responsible for botulism. Only acid foods may be safely canned in a boiling water bath.

So, the rule of thumb is: When canning tomatoes by themselves, process them in a boiling water bath, but when canning tomatoes with other vegetables, process them in a pressure canner.

Like most rules, this rule has an exception—tomato puree.

Tomato puree, like stewed tomatoes, calls for green pepper, onion and celery. However, tomato puree may be safely processed in a water bath canner because the mixture is boiled down until thick prior to canning. Reducing the volume of the product increases its acidity so it may be safely canned in a boiling water bath.

For best results in making stewed tomatoes or tomato puree, follow these recommended recipes:

STEWED TOMATOES

- 4 quarts peeled, cored, chopped tomatoes—about 2 dozen large
- 1 cup chopped celery
- ½ cup chopped onion
- ¼ cup chopped green pepper
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 2 teaspoons salt

Combine all ingredients. Cover and cook 10 minutes, stirring occasionally to prevent sticking. Pour hot into hot jars, leaving one-half inch head space. Adjust lids. Process in a pressure canner at 10 pounds pressure—pints, 15 minutes, or quarts, 20 minutes. Yield: About seven pints.

SEASONED TOMATO PUREE

- 4 quarts peeled, cored, chopped tomatoes—about 2 dozen large
- 3 cups chopped onion
- 2 cups chopped celery
- 1½ cups chopped green peppers—about 3 medium
- 1 tablespoon salt

Combine all ingredients. Cook until tender. Press through a fine sieve. Cook pulp uncovered until thick, about 1½ hours. Stir frequently to prevent sticking. Pour hot into jars, leaving one-quarter inch head space. Process half-pints and pints 45 minutes in boiling water bath. Yield: About nine half-pints.

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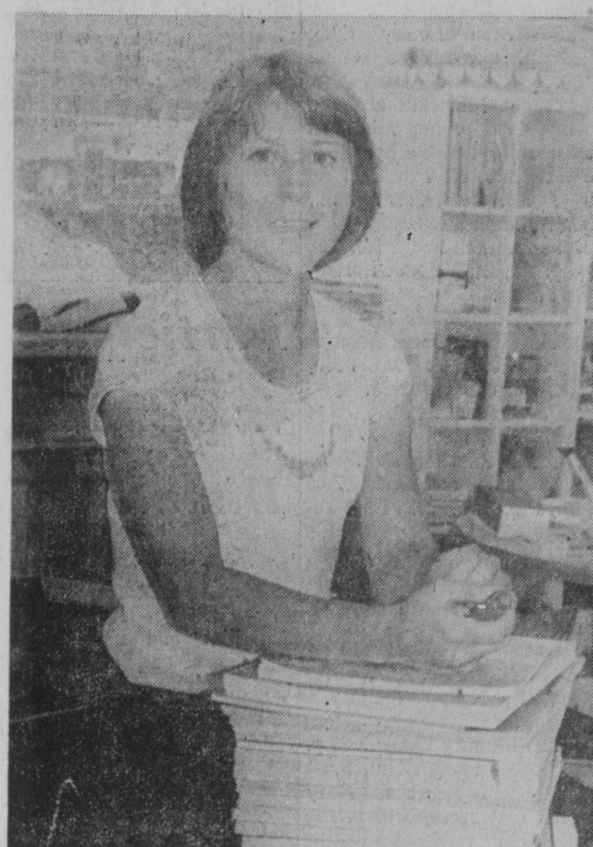

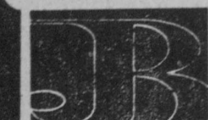
